COMMISSIONERS BROWN AND POWELL ABSENT:

WTR & WW Utility Manager Torrance noted this is the final of the Comprehensive Water and RATE STDY Wastewater Cost of Service Ratemaking Study and is based on the presentation made at the last Board meeting. The intent is to make the utilities solvent including all operations & maintenance expenses, debt service, and capital improvements. The consultant is recommending a 3% increase in water and 6% in wastewater, and staff is recommending the Board accept the Study and forward to the City Council to start the Prop 218 process.

> COMMISSIONER JONES noted that wastewater is proposed for a 6% rate increase through 2029 and questioned if there was any way to not do that 6% increase. Utility Manager Torrance responded that a rate plan is adopted every five years but in October of each year, rates are reviewed and can be adjusted. COMMISSIONER McNEIL agreed that rates are strategically looked at each year and the Board is happy to pass any windfall to the ratepayers.

CHAIRMAN CAMPBELL gave a history of the rate studies done in the past and now catching up to make wastewater solvent.

COMMISSIONER CAIRNS MOVED, SECONDED BY COMMISSIONER JONES, to accept the Comprehensive Water and Wastewater Cost of Service Ratemaking Study dated August 2025. Motion carried by the following roll call vote:

REG ITEMS: Utility Manager Torrance referenced the water, wastewater and electric rate studies just accepted and leaving the electric rate structure status-quo (single rate structure). She went over highlights of a spreadsheet she prepared and

ELECTRIC

COLA INCR distributed at this meeting and spoke on electric line losses, purchasing more power than consuming, and annual hydropower increase due to market prices.

Discussion followed on the new rates compared to the current rates, how they are calculated, and comparison with other electric utilities. City Manager Martinez commended Utility Manager Torrance for the work she's done and the strategic planning to keep rates as low as possible.

COMMISSIONER McNEIL MOVED, SECONDED BY COMMISSIONER CAIRNS, to approve a 2.7% cost-of-living (COLA) increase in electric basic service charge rate as of October 1, 2025; approve an over-hydro rate of \$0.1159 effective October 1, 2025; eliminate the \$.0300 Power Cost Adjustment and approve the methodology to calculate the annual electric base rate and the power cost adjustment rate based on the rate calculation spreadsheets. As of July 2025, the Power Cost Adjustment has a positive balance of \$889,349. Proposed rates eliminate the additional \$.0300 Power Cost Adjustment.

(Secretary's Note: The revised statement of policies adopted increased the power cost adjustment (PCA) balance from \$750,000 to be twenty percent (20%) of the yearly over-hydro budgeted power costs for the fiscal year (annual budget or revised budget as applicable).

EPA LTR RE After a brief discussion on the history of the Greenhouse Gas Emission Rule of 2009 and the financial impacts on local governments, COMMISSIONER GHG EMSN McNEIL MOVED, SECONDED BY COMMISSIONER WALTERS, to authorize the Board Chairman to execute a letter dated September 2, 2025, to the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) supporting the revoking of the Greenhouse Gas Emission Rule. ELECTRIC SCADA

Utility Manager Torrance explained that she and the Electric Line Crew Supervisor have set goals for the electric which started with the meter change-out. The SOFTWARE next is SCADA (supervisory control and data acquisition). The water department has SCADA on all wells, tanks and booster stations in order to monitor activity and it needs to be added to the electric system, including the two primary substations, Eagle Pass and Yoney. She explained all the capabilities that are available with SCADA and the benefit to the electric department and assistance to the crews. Discussion ensued on the proposal submitted, cost and what will be included, and safety and security of the electric crews.

> COMMISSIONER CAIRNS MOVED, SECONDED BY COMMISSIONER WALTERS, to approve Survalent providing Electric SCADA Software not to exceed \$137,126 utilizing the Electric System Improvement Fund. Motion carried by the following roll call vote:

CHAIRMAN CAMPBELL acknowledged the following reports: 1) Western Area Power Administration FY26 Q2 Term Purchase; 2) Present Perfected Rights Report July 2025; and 3) EUSI, LLC operational support services relating to the wastewater treatment facility and collection system July 2025

MGR'S RPT: Utility Manager Torrance provided a written report dated September 2, 2025 briefly explaining: 1) discovered tampering with a sewer manhole lid and ring behind the hospital and removal of approx. 500 pounds of rock from inside the 26' deep manhole. Manhole is now properly secured; 2) power outage at 900 Coronado on August 22; 3) water dept repaired 8 water leaks in August; 4) water treatment plant has been operational for over a month and producing 1.6 million gallons of treated drinking water per day. Will be doing annual routine maintenance on well #11 and #15; and 5) electric dept steel building on California Ave should be completed this month.

BRD ROSTS: COMMISSIONER JONES referenced a newspaper article about a cannabis business being shut down as they were delinquent in utilities. He asked what the policy is before shutting off utilities and what's the customer responsibility and utility responsibility. City Manager Martinez explained the adopted terms and conditions for electric service to ultimately being shut off for nonpayment.

RE: Joint-Use Attachment Fee

KRSA has completed an analysis of NPUA's electric joint-use attachment fees. This analysis included a review of NPUA's electric plant and FY2024 financial outcome as provided in the Annual Report to Bond Owners prepared by Urban Futures, Inc. Based on our review, the current joint-use fee of \$7.78 per pole is underpriced comparative to the analysis outcome of \$22.41 per pole. Provided below is a summary of the joint-use analysis results:

AB 1027/PUC §9512, the utility pole attachment fee recovers a proportional share of NPUA's 'annual cost of ownership' for utility poles. NPUA's annual cost of ownership for utility poles consists of 1) its annual operations and maintenance cost (O&M), and 2) its capital maintenance and replacement cost. The utility pole attachment fee was calculated for the test year fiscal year (FY) 2024. Total Usable Space was determined from NPUA's standard use of 45' as supported by NPUA staff. The 'annual cost of ownership' is detailed in the following table and details the "Carrying Charge" of the plant investment.

Determination of Administrative and Maintenance Charges. This analysis relied on the FY2024 results presented in the Annual Report to Bond Owners. Administrative charges include the sum of supplies, administrative and management, power and utilities (exclusive of electric power

purchased), contractual services, and insurance. Maintenance charges include the Maintenance and Operations line item, plus a portion of lineman labor costs multiplied by the Net Pole Plant Investment / Net Gross Plant.

Application Fees

In addition to the annual pole-attachment fee, it is appropriate to assess a one-time application to account for the administrative burden to review and process joint-use applications. This fee should be proportionate to the amount of time spent processing the application and charged at the fully burdened labor cost. For Example:

This review did not do a formal review of NPUA's current processes for processing applications. The above example should be used as a guide and adopted for NPUA's prevailing burdened labor costs and processing times.

- Today, the Needles electric system has **1271** distribution poles and **1,460** attachments
- Last known review of Joint-Use Rates was in 1994.
- KRSA followed generally accepted CPUC/FCC procedures to update the current rates.

Calculation of Carrying Charge

The carrying charge is a blended annualized cost rate that ensures the utility recovers the full economic burden of owning and maintaining the pole when calculating the attachment rate.

Included in Carrying Charge calculation:

- Administrative costs
- Operating and maintenance costs
- Annual depreciation costs
- Financing interest costs
- CPI

Joint-Use Rate

The gross pole investment is adjusted by multiplying it by 0.85 (the 'bare pole factor') to exclude the cost of non-usable elements such as appurtenances, guy wires, and other attachments, yielding the bare pole cost used in the rate calculation.

<u>Space Factor</u> = Calculated usable pole space for attachments based on a 45' standard pole. Attachments are assumed to use 1 foot of space.

Ioint-Use Rate =

Bare Pole Investment x Carrying Charge Rate of 30.5% x Space Factor of 6% divided by Number of Poles = **\$22.41 per attachment.**

EUSI, LLC Operational Support Services Relating To the Wastewater Treatment Facility and Collection System August 2025

Mrs. Rainie Torrance,

Please find below a summary of our services provided associated with the operational support services for the wastewater treatment facilities for the month of August 2025.

- The daily average flow for the month of August 2025 was 0.502 MGD.
- Completed the July 2025 monthly monitoring report for the state.
- Conducted in-house process control testing for the SBRs.
- Sent out the weekly and monthly samples as required by the monitoring permit.
- Tested the plant lift station and plant alarm callouts.
- Administrative coordination with finance and the administrative staff at 3rd street is ongoing.
- Inspected facility perimeter fences and percolation ponds.
- Operations staff decanted the digester to limit the amount of sludge that needed to be sent to the drying beds for further processing and ultimate removal to the off-site landfill.
- Completed routine monthly inspection of the Kubota tractor, the 4" trash pump, and the jetter.
- Preventive Maintenance Program is ongoing per operating hours of the various plant components.
- Completed the bar screen service and inspections throughout the month.
- Completed weekly inspection of the emergency generator prior to and during its weekly test runs.
- Ongoing communication with City staff regarding items associated with the overall wastewater system.

Supplemental repair services, exceptional event(s) during the month of December.

- August 14, 15, 16, and 19 2025 operational staff and wastewater team addressed an issue with a surcharged hospital gravity line. A manhole lid and ring were removed from the manhole barrel and it appears that someone threw rocks into the manhole causing it to back up. See attached photo log herein. EUSI operational staff had over 25 hours of time associated with this work effort over a few days.
- August 25, 2025 City on-call staff was called out at ~2130 hours for a control panel alarm for a filtrate high water alarm. Staff reset the alarm and all systems were found to be in a normal state (city staff responded to this call)
- August 26, 2025 City on-call staff was called out a couple of times overnight for a control panel alarm for a filtrate high
 water alarm. Operational staff found a faulty float in the filtrate wet well. Staff replaced the float and restored the system
 to normal operation. (City staff responded to the calls, no charge for the repairs to the bad float)
- August 31, 2025 operational staff was called out at ~0745 hours for a high water alarm at the River Road lift station. The floats were caught up in debris affecting their operation. Staff cleared an area to allow the floats to properly articulate and restored the station to normal operation (1.5 hrs for this call out, no charge for this activity).



1. Assemblymember Gonzalez Team Visits Needles – Town Hall Oct. 3
City staff met this week with Ashley Yanez, Chief of Staff to Assemblymember Gonzalez, to discuss key community needs in Needles, and we are grateful for the Assemblymember's continued support and that of his team. Together, we will continue working with our state legislature to address important priorities such as infrastructure investment, housing solutions, and improving the overall quality of life for our residents. As part of that ongoing partnership, we are excited to share that Assemblymember Gonzalez will be hosting a Town Hall Meeting in Needles on the evening of October 3, 2025 — please save the date and join us for this important community conversation. Details to follow.

2. Palo Verde Community College District - Needles Center

On August 26, 2025, City officials, staff, and community members attended the Palo Verde Community College District Board of Trustees Special Meeting/Study Session. The Board received several public comments from residents describing the Needles Center as an essential part of the community, calling it the "connective tissue which allows our community to grow." The message from the community was clear: if Needles is going to grow, the college must grow with it, as it is vital to the city's future. During the session, Dr. Moses reported that the Needles Center is currently operating at a deficit of \$519,477, has not broken even, and is trending in the wrong direction. He noted that the future of the Center will not be competitive with Mohave College (MCC) unless significant changes are made, emphasizing the need to "stop the bleeding." Trustee McNeil raised concerns about the absence of a comprehensive educational plan, pointing out that the college is only now beginning to invest in additional classes to build the student body. An anchor program has yet to be identified by the administration. For the time being, the primary focus is on dual enrollment with Needles Unified School District (NUSD), with a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) in progress. This effort is viewed as the most direct path to generating more full-time students. Outreach efforts will continue, with the main student pipeline identified as NUSD. The Trustee McNeil also highlighted

the importance of offering high-quality programming at affordable tuition rates. For California residents, tuition is \$46 per unit, while Arizona and Nevada students pay \$69 per unit under the Western Undergraduate Exchange Fee agreement, which became effective January 1, 2023. The college continues to provide a variety of resources to support student success, but identifying long-term strategies and academic anchors remains a critical need for sustaining and expanding the Needles Center.

3. Sidewalk Beautification, Accessibility, and Groundskeeping

This week, city crews completed sidewalk and curb improvements at J Street and Casa Linda, replacing deteriorated concrete with fresh upgrades. The project improves the appearance of the area while also providing a smoother, more accessible path of travel for pedestrians. At the same time, our Public Works crew continues to actively maintain city grounds, keeping grass lawns mowed and community spaces looking their best. These combined efforts are part of the City's ongoing beautification program and demonstrate the City Council's commitment to investing in public infrastructure that enhances safety, walkability, and community pride. Residents who notice other sidewalks in need of repair are encouraged to report them by calling 760-326-5700 (press #9) or through the Needles Connect app, available on the Google Play Store (Android) and Apple Store (iOS). By maintaining and upgrading sidewalks, Needles continues to grow as an attractive, accessible, and welcoming community. Together, we're building a safer, stronger Needles!

4. Dance Trax 51 Renovations and Upcoming Recreation Programs

The Needles Recreation Center continues to expand recreational opportunities for residents and youth, supporting the City Council's goals of promoting sports, family-friendly amenities, and community engagement. Dance Trax 51 is currently undergoing major renovations, with City staff working diligently to update the facility and create a safer, more modern environment for students (see attached photos). These improvements reflect the City's commitment to reinvesting in community spaces. Dance classes will officially begin on Monday. September 8th, with registration now open for the 2025/2026 season. A wide range of classes are being offered for students ages 3-18, including tap, ballet, jazz, tiny tot tumbling, stretch and strength, and more (see attached flyer). In addition, the community is encouraged to mark their calendars for the first annual Spirit Dance Camp on Saturday, September 13th from 8:00 AM to 12:00 PM at the Needles Recreation Center. Open to children ages 5–13, the camp will include instruction, snacks, a T-shirt, and a performance opportunity, with registration due by September 9th (see attached flyer). Together, these efforts highlight the City's continued focus on creating accessible, family-friendly recreational programs that engage residents and visitors alike.

5. Lynne's Garden – After School Program Collaboration

The Needles Recreation Center, in collaboration with Krikit Glass, is getting Lynne's Garden ready for the year. Thanks to new garden beds and fresh preparation work, this space is set to thrive once again. Every Wednesday, children in the Recreation Center's after-school program will have the

opportunity to plant, grow, and harvest vegetables and herbs. This hands-on learning experience connects youth to healthy living, environmental awareness, and the joy of seeing their work come to life. Lynne's Garden is more than just a garden — it is a cherished community tradition that reflects Needles residents' pride, creativity, and collaboration. The project also directly supports the City Council's goals of fostering community engagement and celebrating local talent. Special thanks go to the staff and volunteers who have been hard at work preparing the garden beds so our community can enjoy this season together. See the attached photos of the progress being made.

6. Property of the Week: Rivers Edge Golf Course

Rivers Edge Golf Course, the Tri-State's only golf course on the Colorado River, has been a regional favorite since 1962. Owned by the City of Needles and managed by KemperSports since 2021, the par-71, 18-hole layout hosts more than 26,000 rounds annually across 6,460 yards of scenic play. Known for its classic design that blends playability with challenge, the course features five par 3s—three stretching over 180 yards and often playing into prevailing winds—as well as two water hazards that test golfers right from the opening tee shot. Beyond the course itself, Rivers Edge is proudly player-friendly, offering walking and 9-hole rates, while serving golfers of all ages and skill levels from across the Tri-State. The course is home to regular programming such as men's and ladies' clubs, twilight leagues, blind-draw scrambles, and a junior summer camp that fosters youth involvement in the sport. The recently redecorated Colorado Room, located inside the 19th Hole Bar & Grill, provides a premier venue for banquets, tournaments, and community events—pairing memorable golf with a strong community experience. We thank General Manager JJ DeLeon for his leadership in elevating Rivers Edge into not only a top regional golf destination but also a community hub that directly supports Council's goals of enhancing recreation, attracting tourism, and strengthening local pride. The golf course will be closed for overseeding from Monday, September 8, 2025, through Friday, October 3, 2025.

7. BHHS Legacy Foundation Awards Support to Local Organizations

The City of Needles is proud to congratulate Needles Little League and Fire House Ministries on being selected as recipients of funding from the BHHS Legacy Foundation. This important investment reflects the Foundation's longstanding commitment to improving community health and well-being by expanding access to healthcare, supporting prevention and education, and strengthening local capacity to address health-related challenges. Serving the Greater Tri-State region, including Needles, BHHS Legacy Foundation partners with organizations that promote children's health, enhance medical, dental, and mental health services, and build supportive community networks. We extend our sincere appreciation to Daniel J. Oehler, Chairman of BHHS Legacy Foundation, and all of its Board Members, for their leadership in guiding the Foundation's mission. Their vision and dedication ensure that communities like ours have the resources to thrive, and their support directly strengthens the programs and services that matter most to Needles residents. The generosity of BHHS Legacy Foundation not only uplifts our local nonprofits but also aligns

with the City Council's goals of fostering a healthier, more resilient community. We are grateful for their partnership and recognition of the meaningful contributions being made here in Needles. 8. Regional Route 66 Centennial Strategy

The Mohave County Economic Development Director recently hosted a regional Tri-State marketing meeting to coordinate efforts for the upcoming Route 66 Centennial in 2026. The meeting brought together leadership from Arizona, Nevada, and California to discuss strategies for promoting Route 66 as a tourism and economic driver for the region. Mayor Jernigan attended on behalf of Needles, participating alongside the Discover IE Tri-State Leadership team. Needles was also prominently featured in the international publication *Discover* IE (attached), which highlights our city as the California gateway and starting point of Route 66. The article showcases the historic Old Town corridor, the Wagon Wheel Restaurant, the Needles Regional Museum, and the recently opened Hampton Inn. This recognition directly supports the City Council's goals of enhancing public relations by promoting Needles' visibility, attracting families and visitors through historic and recreational assets, and supporting sports, tourism, and recreation as drivers of local economic activity. Together, these regional marketing efforts and international exposure strengthen Needles' position as a key stop on Route 66 and help advance Council's broader strategy to promote tourism, community engagement, and economic development.

9. Recognition Highlight – ULI Technical Assistance Panel

We are grateful to partner with ULI Orange County/Inland Empire (ULI OCIE) through the California–Nevada Technical Assistance Leadership Exchange. ULI OCIE is proud to support the City of Needles in advancing resilience and public-sector leadership, bringing expert-driven solutions to tackle climate challenges and build stronger, more adaptable communities. This Technical Assistance Panel (TAP) will focus on how Needles can grow by attracting businesses and housing, thrive by addressing community needs, and mitigate extreme heat, infrastructure challenges, and safety concerns. As part of the program, a panel of ULI professionals will tour our community, meet with stakeholders, and deliver actionable recommendations to guide our long-term prosperity. This partnership directly supports the City Council's goals of sustainable growth, economic development, and community safety. We sincerely thank ULI Orange County/Inland Empire and the ULI Randall Lewis Center for Sustainability in Real Estate for investing their expertise in Needles' future. 10. **TeamCalifornia Report: Industrial Growth Opportunities for California**As part of our partnership with TeamCalifornia, the City has received the attached report from Beacon Economics on the current state of manufacturing in California. The report highlights that while the state has seen job losses in both durable and non-durable manufacturing, overall output has remained strong due to productivity gains and the shift toward more capital- and energy-intensive

industries. For Needles, this creates an opportunity to market our competitive advantages—such as publicly owned utility rates, available industrial sites, and direct interstate and rail access—to businesses seeking affordable and reliable operating environments outside larger urban markets. Looking ahead, staff will build on this analysis by developing tasks and a marketing program that reflect the Council's economic development goals, ensuring Needles is positioned to pursue industrial growth opportunities while realistically assessing the challenges.

11. Workforce Development & Career Opportunities

Supporting workforce readiness and expanding economic opportunity are key City Council goals. Palo Verde Community College is helping advance these priorities by hosting an information session with the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California (MWD) on September 8, 2025, at the Needles campus. MWD will highlight Operations & Maintenance Technician IV positions in both Mechanical and Electrical fields, offering salaries of \$46.52–\$61.30 per hour, full benefits, and potential housing. This partnership demonstrates how the College continues to provide residents with education, training, and direct access to stable, high-wage careers—strengthening the local economy and supporting long-term community growth.

12. Reminder - Rider Appreciation Day

On Thursday, September 4, 2025, the City of Needles will host Rider Appreciation Day with free transit services all day, including Needles Area Transit, Dial-A-Ride, and the new Fort Mohave/Bullhead Shuttle. From 7:30 to 11:30 a.m. at the El Garces West Parking Lot (950 Front Street), attendees can enjoy refreshments, giveaways, and learn more about our expanding transit options. Riders are especially encouraged to try the new Fort Mohave/Bullhead Shuttle at no cost during the event, with departures at 8:15 a.m. and 11:30 a.m. Reservations are required by calling 760-326-4789 before 11 a.m. the day prior, as space is limited. *A flyer with additional event details is attached.*

13. Save the Date - St. Vincent de Paul Fundraiser Dinner

1959年に設置したネオンサインが砂漠を照らす

バグダッド・カフェから東へ30分ほど走ったエリアにある「ロイズ・モーテル&カフェ」は、ルート66で一番有名なスポットといえる。1938年に創業者であるロイ・クロウルがガソリンスタンドとしてスタート。ルート66がアメリカのメインストリートとして全米を繋いだ時代、アンボイは旅人で賑わう町であった。1940年代には、ロイと妻ベルマ、義理の息子であるハーマン・バスター・バリスがカフェ、修

理工場、小さなバンガロー形式のモーテルを追加し、24時間営業の複合施設に成長。1950年代にはアンボイの人口が700人に膨れ上がり、1959年に設置された50フィートのネオンサインが、砂漠を照らすランドマークとなったのである。

しかし、1973年のI-40開通でルート66がバイパスされ、アンボイはゴーストタウンに。ロイズも閉鎖の危機を迎えたが、2005年に保存活動家で

日系人のアルバート・オオクラがアンボイの町ごと 42万5,000ドルで購入、2019年にネオンサイン を再点灯させた。2026年には息子であるカイル がカフェとキャビンを再開させるそうだ。

現在、ロイズはガソリンスタンド&ギフトショップ として営業中。スナックやドリンク、ルート66やロイズのオリジナルグッズ (Tシャツや帽子)が購入可能だ。

ルート66を使ってモハーヴェ砂漠を横断

BarstowとVictorvilleは、モハーヴェ砂漠を横断するルート66 沿いに位置する2つの町で、パームスプリングスから北西へ車で約1時間半(約120km)のエリアに位置する。Barstowはルート66と鉄道の交差点として栄えた交通の要所で、その名前はサンタフェ鉄道の社長「ウィリアム・ストロング・バーストゥ」にちなんで名付けられた。見どころの「Route 66 Mother Road Museum」

では、古いルート66の看板や車両などが展示されている。

VictorvilleはBarstowから南西へ約52kmほど走ったところにある町で、こちらにも「California Route 66 Museum」があるので合わせて訪れたい。また、Barstowから5km、Victorvilleから54kmの場所には、人気の観光スポット「Calico Ghost Town Regional Park」がある。

Overview

Manufacturing makes up a relatively small share of jobs in today's economy, yet it remains front and center in national conversations from political speeches to tariff policies to tech-sector strategies. There's a reason for that. For many workers, especially those without college degrees, manufacturing still offers better pay, more stable hours, and stronger benefits than other sectors.

This report by Beacon Economics looks at why manufacturing continues to matter in California (despite recent job losses) and what's changing on the ground:

- How manufacturing jobs compare to other sectors for non-college workers
- The decline in manufacturing employment and how California compares to the U.S.
- Why manufacturing's share of output has held steady or grown despite job losses
- Differences between durable and non-durable manufacturing in output, jobs, and wages
- The central role of electronic computer manufacturing in the state's durable goods growth
- How tariffs, AI, and venture capital are shaping the outlook for manufacturing in California

Even as manufacturing employs fewer people, it continues to punch above its weight in California, where high productivity has helped sustain output despite job losses.

Why We're Still Talking About Manufacturing

The idea of "bringing back manufacturing" remains popular in American politics and public opinion.¹ A 2023 Cato Institute survey found that 80% of Americans support reviving U.S. manufacturing, though only 25% would want the jobs themselves.¹¹ The support is more about what manufacturing represents than a desire to work in it.

Still, there are practical reasons for that support. For workers without a college degree, manufacturing jobs are often better than the alternatives. In California, nearly 90% of manufacturing workers with lower levels of education are full-time, compared to less than 70% in the rest of the economy, according to data from the U.S. Census' American Community Survey. That means more income, benefits, and stability.


Other sectors like oil and gas can offer similar wage gains for workers without a college degreeⁱⁱⁱ, but those jobs depend on geography and resource availability. Manufacturing, by contrast, is not only good for workers, it also plays a broader role in the economy, supporting a wider network of related industries such as logistics, repairs, and component production. Additionally, it expands export capacity, which helps reduce the U.S. trade deficit.

Manufacturing employment has been declining for decades, and the sector is unlikely to regain its former size. But in California, manufacturing's share of economic output has remained steady at around 10% to 12% since 2008. That reflects growing productivity and a shift toward more capital- and tech-intensive work.

The trend is national, but it's especially pronounced in California.


Indexed Employment

California





Manufacturing Share of Employment



California's Manufacturing is Just More Productive

California's manufacturing strength has a lot to do with how productive its workers are, especially in durable goods like electronics, aerospace, and lab equipment. Since around 2011, California's durable manufacturing workers have been producing far more per person than workers in the rest of the country. That likely reflects a shift toward more high-tech, capitalintensive industries. Today, each durable goods worker in California generates close to \$300,000 in output, which is about 70% more than the national average.

In non-durable manufacturing such as food or clothing production, California also has an edge in productivity. There were big gains in the 2000s and again in the late 2010s, but in recent years, productivity growth has leveled off. That could mean the state has already captured most of the efficiency it can in this area, though new technologies like AI may shake things up again.

Recent Changes in Manufacturing Jobs and Output

Last year, California's manufacturing sector experienced about:

20,000 job losses in non-durable goods

62,000 job losses in durable goods

For a total of over 82,000 jobs lost in manufacturing

The state's manufacturing sector has taken a clear hit in recent quarters. Although job losses have been widespread across the country, the scale and concentration of recent declines in California stand out.

In 2024, the state lost over 82,000 manufacturing jobs, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics' Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages. About 20,000 of those were in non-durable manufacturing, but the bulk (62,000 jobs) came from durable goods, with more than 50,000 jobs lost in the electronic computer manufacturing subsector alone.

California also accounted for a disproportionate share of the nation's recent job losses in manufacturing:

- The United States as a whole lost 22,000 non-durable manufacturing jobs in 2024.
 California accounted for 10 out of every 11 of the jobs that were lost.
- Durable manufacturing lost 157,000 jobs nationwide; California was responsible for more than 40% of that total.


Last year, California accounted for:

Over 90% of U.S. job losses in non-durable manufacturing

Over 40% of U.S. job losses in durable manufacturing

Looking out over a longer horizon, from 2019 through 2024:

- Non-durable manufacturing jobs grew by 41,000 in the rest of the United States, while California added just 9,000.
- Durable goods jobs declined by 172,000 in the rest of the country. California's decline was smaller (22,000) but again, heavily concentrated in electronics.

On the output side, California's story has shifted too. For years, real GDP in durable goods manufacturing grew faster than the rest of the state's economy, helping the broader manufacturing sector outperform.

But that momentum stalled after the pandemic. Non-durable manufacturing has been even weaker, with no real growth in nearly a decade. It briefly outpaced durable goods and private sector GDP in the years leading up to the Great Recession, but never fully recovered after the downturn.

The result has been that manufacturing no longer stands apart from the rest of the state's private economy. What was once a growth leader has now slowed to match the rest of the economy.

And to be clear, this is not because the private economy sped up, but because manufacturing slowed down.



The electronic computer manufacturing industry has played a big role in California's manufacturing story.

Up until about 2012, output in electronic computer manufacturing grew at a similar pace in both California and the rest of the country. But after that, growth in other states flattened, while California kept growing. A lot of the state's gains in durable goods output came from this one sector.

In 2022, output dropped for the first time since the dot-com crash. Demand slowed, and venture capital pulled back. ^{iv,v} Output eventually recovered, but jobs didn't. Starting in 2024, the industry began cutting back—50,000 jobs were lost in just the first quarter, and another 2,000 were lost during the rest of the year. vi

Recent Events and Forecast

Tech layoffs have largely been the result of a post-pandemic correction. After the initial surge in digital demand, consumer spending shifted back toward in-person experiences. At the same time, venture funding slowed, interest rates rose, and many firms began prioritizing efficiency over headcount.


Tariffs could be disruptive for California manufacturers, especially in durable goods sectors such as aerospace, lab equipment, and semiconductors, which rely on complex global supply chains. Replacing foreign inputs is costly and slow. Still, reduced competition might help some firms, so the net impact remains uncertain.

Non-durable manufacturing

could see modest gains under a stricter tariff regime. California still produces an outsized share of the nation's textiles and apparel—industries often undercut by low-wage competition abroad. But these are also low-margin businesses that depend on global inputs, so they're not immune to cost pressures either.

Al and tech are likely to make computer and electronic product manufacturing even more productive. Venture capital is flowing back into California, with 2024 and 2025 showing a clear rebound in funding. This could lead to higher output, even as payrolls shrink. Firms are optimizing around revenue per employee, and Al tools are speeding up that shift.

Conclusion

Manufacturing still matters in California, but it's changing. The state's edge has always come from how productive its workers are, especially in durable goods. That advantage is still clear when you look at the data. Even with recent job losses and slowing real output, California is producing more per worker than other states and still holds a strong position in computer electronics manufacturing.

That's partly why fewer workers are needed. When productivity rises, companies can do more with less. And with AI tools becoming ever more common, that shift is likely to speed up. If California continues leading in tech adoption, it could stay ahead of the curve. But the future won't be about going back to traditional factory jobs, it'll be about adapting to what's next.



This notice is provided to keep the council informed and engaged in decisions that directly impact Needles.

2. Rider Appreciation Day- Fort Mohave/Bullhead Shuttle Launch On September 4, 2025, the City of Needles and SBCTA hosted Rider Appreciation Day to launch the new Fort Mohave/Bullhead Shuttle. Held at the El Garces West Parking Lot, the event offered free rides on Needles Area Transit, Dial-A-Ride, and the new shuttle, along with refreshments, giveaways, and information on expanded transit options. Mayor Jan Jernigan, Councilmembers Henry Longbrake and Larry Ford, City staff, and dozens of residents participated. SBCTA highlighted the strong community response and the dedication of the Needles Area Transit (NAT) team, underscoring the value of rural transit systems. The shuttle advances Council's goal to improve regional connectivity and enhance quality of life. Reservations are required by 11:00 a.m. the prior day and can be made by calling 760-326-4789. - 3. City Crews Respond to Major Thunderstorm
 - On September 4, 2025, a severe lightning storm caused widespread damage and flooding across the City of Needles, prompting an immediate and coordinated response by City crews. Staff worked throughout the day to clear downed trees and roadway debris, restoring safe conditions for residents and visitors. Several roadways, including Needles Highway, N. K Street, L Street, Broadway, and Bailey Street, experienced flooding, and barricades were placed for public safety. The Needles Underpass on N. K Street and National Trails Highway were closed due to high water, and motorists are urged to use alternate routes and avoid driving through standing water. Residents can report concerns by calling 760-326-5700 (press #9) or using the Needles Connect app on Google Play Store (Android) and Apple Store (iOS). Together, we're building a safer, stronger Needles!
- 4. Water Department Targeted Service Replacements & Leak Response On Thursday, September 4, 2025, Water Department crews replaced a 45-foot section of 1-inch service on D Street after recurring leaks, renewing the entire line to prevent future failures. This week, crews also isolated and repaired a separate leak on Lillyhill, restoring reliable service. Temporary pavement patches are in place; permanent asphalt/concrete restoration is scheduled. Our teams work diligently to minimize outage times and customer impacts. These targeted repairs reduce water loss, cut service interruptions, and extend asset life—directly advancing Council goals to enhance infrastructure, improve services, and strengthen quality of life for residents and businesses.
- 5. Electric Department Park LED Upgrades Program
 City staff is advancing the phased LED replacement program in our parks. Work began at Jack Smith Park and, this week, crews focused on the Duke Watkins Dog Park, removing failed fixtures and upgrading them to long-life LED lighting. These improvements boost night-time visibility and safety, cut energy use and maintenance costs, and improve reliability—directly supporting Council goals to enhance infrastructure, improve services, and strengthen quality of life. Next locations are being queued as materials arrive. Residents can report light outages by calling 760-326-5700 (press #9) or using the Needles Connect app on Google Play Store (Android) and Apple Store (iOS). Together, we're building a safer, stronger Needles!

 the dedication of our team and strengthen the City's capacity to serve residents
 and business owners alike. The City of Needles remains committed to investing
 in professional development to ensure staff have the expertise to support
 Council goals of enhancing infrastructure, improving services, and strengthening
 quality of life for our community. As the City continues to add critical

infrastructure—such as the new treatment plant system—staff certifications are essential to ensuring our systems are operated and maintained to the highest standards.

7. Electric Yard Building – Nearing Completion & October Ribbon Cutting

completion, with a ribbon cutting planned for October. Since delivery, the project
has progressed from steel framing to finished concrete pad and driveway, with
equipment on site and final fit-out underway. This \$673,552 investment replaces

long-term replacement costs, and improving operational readiness. The project
advances Council goals around infrastructure modernization, asset

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

On January 14, 2025, Resolution No. 2025-8 was presented to the City Council of the City of Needles. The resolution's title was "A Resolution of the City Council of the City of Needles, California, Supporting Enhanced Investments, Equitable Services, and Workforce Development Programs by the Palo Verde Community College in the Needles Community."

Resolution No. 2025-8 contained many statements which were damaging to the Palo Verde Community College District ("District"). Additionally, several of the statements in Resolution No. 2025-8 were inaccurate, lacking relevant context, or otherwise misleading.

On January 28, 2025, the Board convened a Special Meeting/Study Session regarding Resolution No. 2025-8. At this meeting, Trustee Jon McNeil informed the Board that he and an employee of the District, had contributed to Resolution No. 2025-8. The District's Superintendent/President, Dr. Bruce Moses, requested authority to initiate an investigation into the involvement of District officials in preparing the resolution. The Board granted his request.

The investigation initiated by Dr. Moses found that Trustee McNeil engaged in the following conduct: On January 2, 2025, Trustee McNeil received a draft of Resolution No. 2025-8 from Needles City Manager Patrick Martinez. City Manager Martinez informed Trustee McNeil at this time that the resolution would be placed on the City Council's agenda and requested Trustee McNeil's input on the resolution. Trustee McNeil did not provide any new information to City Manager Martinez; however, Trustee McNeil provided revisions to the draft resolution to reduce what he described as "inflammatory language."

Trustee McNeil's description of the draft resolution's language as "inflammatory" showed that he understood it to be potentially damaging to the District. Though Trustee McNeil understood the draft resolution's contents to be potentially damaging, he did not inform Dr. Moses or the Board in advance that the resolution would be placed on the City Council's agenda and discussed publicly. By offering his input on the draft resolution without informing Dr. Moses or the Board, Trustee McNeil tacitly approved of the information therein without taking measures to confirm its accuracy or context.

By failing to inform Dr. Moses and the Board about Resolution No. 2025-8, Trustee McNeil also deprived them of the opportunity to communicate their concerns about the information therein to the City prior to the January 14 City Council meeting. As such, Trustee McNeil did not work with Dr. Moses and the Board so as to enable them to take measures to address the risk of unfair harm to the District's reputation.

Once the investigation report was final, and at the recommendation of legal counsel, President Styers created an ad hoc subcommittee, consisting of President Styers and Trustee Arneson, pursuant to BP 2715 to review the findings and conclusion of the investigation and therefore make recommendations to the full Board for action or no action. The Board's ad hoc subcommittee recommends the Governing Board adopt the attached proposed Censure Resolution of Trustee McNeil based on the conclusion of the Oppenheimer Investigations Group, LLC investigation.

DISCUSSION

Censure is a formal action of a legislative body to declare its disapproval or condemnation of particular conduct. There is no express authorization in law for censure. It is a proceeding that exists by custom in CA for elected bodies. A legislative body is deemed to have inherent authority to express approval or disapproval regarding the conduct of its members. Any behavior that reasonably relates to a member's discharge of his/her office is potentially subject to censure by the legislative body, including conduct that is merely rude, discourteous, or offensive. No material penalty or adverse consequence result from censure itself—only possible public reproach or criticism outside of possible local action by the body on local practices.

Censure is implemented by a majority vote of the Board by means of a "Censure Resolution." Since a legislative body may not act arbitrarily or capriciously, the Resolution shall contain specific findings based on information presented to the Board which supports the decision to censure one of its members.

A Censure Resolution is presented to the Board by the Board President. An opportunity is provided for public comment. A motion to censure the member must be made and seconded based on the recitals in the Resolution. The motion is then discussed and voted upon by the entire Board, including the member who is the subject of the motion. If necessary, the Board may also choose to amend the proposed resolution. The Board member who is subject to the Resolution shall be entitled to respond to the information contained in the Resolution or he may have a representative speak on his behalf subject to reasonable time limitations set by the Board President.

CENSURE OF BOARD MEMBER JON MCNEIL

WHEREAS, the Palo Verde Community College District ("District") Board of Trustees is committed to the effective leadership and operation of the District; and

WHEREAS, the Board has established and adopted a Code of Ethics and Standards of Practice for the Board, as set forth in Board Bylaw 2715, including the requirement that Board members shall work with other Board members "in a spirit of harmony and cooperation in spite of differences of opinion"; and

WHEREAS, Board Bylaw 2715, further provides that Board members must "maintain the highest standards of conduct and ethical behavior," must base their decisions on available facts, "unswayed by partisan bias of any kind," and must be aware that they are "responsible to all citizens of the District" and not solely those who elected them; and

WHEREAS, Board Bylaw 2715 provides that complaints of Board member misconduct "will be referred to an ad hoc committee composed of two (2) Board members not subject to the complaint." After the ad hoc committee has reviewed and completed its fact-finding process, it shall report its findings to the Board for action, and may make a recommendation to the Board President or the Board as a whole; and

WHEREAS, on January 14, 2025, Resolution No. 2025-8 was presented to the City Council of the City of Needles. The resolution's title was "A Resolution of the City Council of the City of Needles, California, Supporting Enhanced Investments, Equitable Services, and Workforce Development Programs by the Palo Verde Community College in the Needles Community"; and

WHEREAS, Resolution No. 2025-8 contained many statements which were damaging to the District. Additionally, several of the statements in Resolution No. 2025-8 were inaccurate, lacking relevant context, or otherwise misleading. It stated that the District faced "significant challenges" at its Needles Center, including a lack of in-person counseling, course cancellations threatening students' FAFSA eligibility, and declining enrollment jeopardizing the District's financial stability. The District's Superintendent/President, Dr. Bruce Moses, requested authority to initiate an investigation into the involvement of District officials in preparing the resolution. The Board granted his request; and

WHEREAS, by the foregoing conduct, Trustee McNeil violated the principles and expectations set forth in Board Bylaw 2715 to work in a spirit of harmony and cooperation with other Board members; and

WHEREAS, Trustee McNeil is the only Board member from Trustee Area 2, San Bernardino County, where the Needles Center is located. Resolution No. 2025-8 calls for the District to invest more in the Needles Center, notes that Needles property owners have made "significant financial contributions" to the District, and states that greater investment in the Needles Center would be "equitable" in light of this. By providing his input on a resolution which specifically benefited the City of Needles without involving Board members from any other Trustee Areas, Trustee McNeil failed to act for the benefit of the District's whole constituency and created an appearance of improper bias; and

WHEREAS, Board members, as public officials, are expected not to place themselves in positions in which any personal bias may impact their decisions. By the foregoing conduct, Trustee McNeil violated the principles set forth in Board Bylaw 2715 to maintain the highest standards of conduct and ethical behavior and make unbiased decisions based on his responsibility to the District's whole constituency; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to BP 2715, any Board member determined to have violated BP 2715 shall be subject to appropriate disciplinary action, which may include Resolution of Censure by the Board of Trustees.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Palo Verde Community College District Board of Trustees does hereby censure Trustee Jon McNeil for the deficiencies in conduct cited above, in violation of the Bylaws, principles, and/or expectations of the Board; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Palo Verde Community College District Board of Trustees hereby removes Trustee Jon McNeil from all committees and appointments for the 2025-2026 school year; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Palo Verde Community College District Board of Trustees does hereby demand that Trustee Jon McNeil henceforth endorse, adopt, and abide by the Board's adopted policies establishing its Governance Standards, Conflict of Interest policy, and all other Bylaws and Policies of the Board.




