TITLE: Resolution 2025-13 of the City Council of the City of Needles, Approving a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) to Convert the Existing River Valley Motel into a Multi-Family Residential Complex, Including 29 Micro-Apartments and 1 Manager's Office Unit, Located at 1707 Needles Hwy (APN 0185-048-09-0000) Within the General Commercial (C-2) Land Use Zoning Designation.

APPLICANT: Armen Ghadimian, 1707 Needles Hwy, LLC, 1707 Needles Hwy, Needles, CA 92363

LOCATION: The project site is located south of Needles Hwy and west of O Street at 1707 Needles

Hwy (APN 0185-048-09-0000).

BACKGROUND: The applicant, Armen Ghadimian, proposes to convert an existing motel into a multifamily residential complex consisting of 29 micro-apartments and 1 manager's office unit. The project includes three (3) one-story buildings and associated site improvements on approximately 0.98 acres. The 29 micro-apartments will range in size from 305 to 340 square feet, while the 816-square-foot manager's unit will include a living area, lobby, and breakroom.

The proposed project is compatible with surrounding uses and includes paved walkways for residents, facilitating "On-site" circulation to residential units, amenities, and other areas within the site. The architectural design will feature a white neutral-tone exterior with dark gray accents, a stucco-coated finish, and shingle roofing. Interior building improvements will involve renovating existing spaces to accommodate multi-family residential use. Interior renovations will convert units to multi-family residential use, adding kitchenettes and upgrading bathroom plumbing fixtures to comply with the latest California Building and Plumbing Codes. Existing air conditioning units will be replaced with a new split-air conditioning system to regulate the temperature of each unit. The project site will also feature a laundry room, storage room, office, and lobby area. Additionally, the proposed project includes a 1,710-square-foot open space courtyard with seating for tenant enjoyment. The existing building footprint will remain unchanged.

The topography of the project site is relatively flat. The project plans indicate the installation of a new five (5)-foot-high decorative iron fence with concrete columns along the west and south sides of the property. An existing four (4)-foot-high decorative block wall along the north and east sides completes the project boundary.

As conditioned by San Bernardino County Fire, the project site will have ingress and egress via a one-way driveway from Needles Highway to Market Street based on the existing drive aisle width. The project includes a total of 30 parking spaces, two (2) of which are designated as ADA-compliant. All ADA parking spaces must comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and California Building Code standards. Additionally, the project is located in close proximity to three Needles Area Transit bus stops.

The project site is physically suitable in size and shape to support the proposed multi-family residential complex. Applicable building codes, zoning codes, fire codes and standards have been imposed on the project to make for a safe, attractive, and well-designed project. The project design incorporates safety measures for automobiles and residents.

CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT (CUP) FINDINGS: In accordance with Section 94.06, the Planning Commission must make the following findings to recommend approval of a conditional use permit:

- 1. The requested permit is conditionally within its jurisdiction according to the table of permissible uses.
- 2. The application is complete
- 3. The use will not endanger public health or safety.
- 4. The development will be in conformity with the Needles General Plan.

PUBLIC NOTIFICATION: A public hearing notice was published in the Needles Desert Star on Wednesday, January 29, 2025, and posted in two conspicuous locations. Notices were sent to property owners within 300' of the proposed project site.

ENVIRONMENTAL: CEQA Compliance - Categorical Exemption (Section 15301, Class 1): The proposed project qualifies for a Categorical Exemption under Section 15301 (Class 1) of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Guidelines. This exemption applies to projects involving minor alterations to existing structures with negligible or no expansion of the existing use. The project consists of the conversion of an existing motel into a multi-family residential complex, which includes interior renovations to accommodate residential units, the addition of kitchenettes, and plumbing upgrades. The building footprint will remain unchanged, and no significant expansion of the existing structure or use is proposed. Additionally, the proposed improvements, including the courtyard seating area and parking lot upgrades, fall under Class 1 exemptions for minor site improvements.

RECOMMENDATION: Adopt Resolution 2025-13 approving a Conditional Use Permit, for the conversion of an existing motel to a multi-family residential complex comprised of 29 micro-apartments and 1 manager's office unit at 1707 Needles Hwy, (APN 0185-048-09-0000) in the General Commercial (C-2) land use zoning designation.







THE ABOVE REFERENCED PROJECT IS UNDER THE JURISDICTION OF THE SAN BERNARDINO COUNTY FIRE DEPARTMENT HEREIN "FIRE DEPARTMENT". COMBUSTIBLE VEGETATION SHALL BE REMOVED AS FOLLOWS: A. THE DEVELOPMENT SHALL HAVE A MINIMUM OF TWO POINTS OF VEHICULAR ACCESS. THESE ARE FOR FIRE/EMERGENCY EQUIPMENT ACCESS AND FOR EVACUATION ROUTES. A. SINGLE STORY ROAD ACCESS WIDTH. ALL BUILDINGS SHALL HAVE ACCESS PROVIDED BY APPROVED ROADS, ALLEYS AND PRIVATE DRIVES WITH A MINIMUM TWENTY-SIX (26) FOOT UNOBSTRUCTED WIDTH AND VERTICALLY TO FOURTEEN (14) FEET SIX (6) INCHES IN HEIGHT. DUE TO THE EXISTING WIDTH OF THE ONSITE DRIVE AISLE YOU SHALL CONVERT THE DRIVE AISLE TO ONE WAY TRAFFIC ONLY BY ENTERING ON NEEDLES HWY AND EXITING ON MARKET ST.. DRIVE AISLE SHALL HAVE DIRECTIONAL ARROWS PAINTED ON DRIVING SURFACE AND "DO NOT ENTER" PAINTED ON DRIVING SURFACE AT MARKET ST.

F19 SURFACE
FIRE APPARATUS ACCESS ROADS SHALL BE DESIGNED AND MAINTAINED TO SUPPORT THE IMPOSED LOADS OF FIRE APPARATUS AND SHALL BE SURFACED SO AS TO PROVIDE ALL-WEATHER DRIVING CAPABILITIES. ROAD SURFACE SHALL MEET THE APPROVAL OF THE FIRE CHIEF PRIOR TO INSTALLATION. ALL ROADS SHALL BE DESIGNED TO 85% COMPACTION AND/OR PAVING AND HOLD THE WEIGHT OF FIRE APPARATUS AT A MINIMUM OF 80K POUNDS.

F24 FIRE LANES
THE APPLICANT SHALL SUBMIT A FIRE LANE PLAN WITH THE BUILDING CONSTRUCTION PLANS TO THE FIRE DEPARTMENT FOR REVIEW AND APPROVAL. FIRE LANE CURBS SHALL BE PAINTED RED. "NO PARKING, FIRE LANE" SIGNS SHALL BE INSTALLED ON PUBLIC/PRIVATE ROADS IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE APPROVED PLAN.

RESOLUTION 2025-13

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NEEDLES APPROVING A CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT FOR THE CONVERSION OF AN EXISTING MOTEL INTO A MULTI-FAMILY RESIDENTIAL COMPLEX INCLUDING 29 MICRO-APARTMENTS AND 1 MANAGER'S OFFICE UNIT LOCATED AT 1707 NEEDLES HIGHWAY, NEEDLES, CALIFORNIA, IN THE C-2 (GENERAL COMMERCIAL) ZONING DESIGNATION, ALSO IDENTIFIED AS ASSESSOR'S PARCEL NUMBER (APN) 0185-048-09-0000

WHEREAS, the City Council wishes to assist property owners in their efforts to build in the City in a reasonable manner that does not create a hazard to health, safety, and welfare or degrade property values or create incompatibility with surrounding uses; and

WHEREAS, on January 10, 2012, City Council Ordinance No. 535-AC was approved allowing the conversion of hotel, motel or motor hotel rooms to multi-family apartment conversions; and

WHEREAS, applicant Armen Ghadimian submitted an application requesting approval of a Conditional Use Permit to allow the conversion of an existing motel into a multi-family residential complex, including 29 micro-apartments and manager's office unit located at 1707 Needles Hwy, in the C-2 (General Commercial) land use zoning designation; and

WHEREAS, Sec. 96.01 (Table of Permissible Uses) and Sec. 112.05 (Conversion of Hotel, Motel or Motor Hotel Rooms To Multi-Family Apartment Conversions) of the Needles Municipal Code Conditionally allows for Multi-Family Residential in the C-2 zone, subject to the approval of a Conditional Use Permit; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing notice for the February 25, 2025 City Council meeting was published in the Needles Desert Star on January 29, 2025, at least 10 days prior to said meeting, and notices were sent to property owners within a 300-foot radius of the subject property specifying the date, time and location of the public hearing; and

WHEREAS, on February 12, 2025, the Needles Planning Commission held a duly noticed and advertised public hearing to receive oral and written testimony relative to the Conditional Use Permit RESOLUTION NO. 02-12-2025-PC and was recommended for approval unanimously; and

WHEREAS, on February 25, 2025, the Needles City Council held a duly noticed and advertised public hearing for approving City Council RESOLUTION 2025-13 approving a conditional use permit for the conversion of an existing motel into a multi-family residential complex including 29 micro-apartments and 1 manager's office unit located at 1707 needles highway, needles, California, in the C-2 (General Commercial) zoning designation, also identified as assessor's parcel number (APN) 0185-048-09-0000

WHEREAS, Section 94.06 of the Needles City Code specifies the criteria by which a Conditional Use Permit may be granted; and

WHEREAS, the Needles City Council has sufficiently considered all testimony and any documentary evidence presented to them in order to make the following determination.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Needles as follows:

<u>SECTION 1</u>. The City Council HEREBY FINDS AND DETERMINES that this project is categorically exempt under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) under Section 15301, Class 1 project consisting of Interior or exterior alterations, including minor interior renovations, plumbing upgrades, and the addition of kitchenettes.

SECTION 2. The City Council HEREBY FINDS AND DETERMINES, with reports and findings, that facts do exist to approve **RESOLUTION 2025-13**, subject to conditions, according to the criteria specified in Section 94.06 of the Needles City Code:

A. That the requested permit is within its jurisdiction according to the table of permissible uses.

FINDING: According to Section 96.01 (Table of Permissible Uses), multi-family dwelling unit residences is allowed conditionally in the C-2 (General Commercial) land use/zoning designation subject to the approval of a Conditional Use Permit by City Council.

B. The application is complete.

FINDING: A dimensioned site plan, application and fees were submitted to the city to demonstrate the project meets the criteria of the Needles City Code.

C. The development will not materially endanger the public health or safety.

FINDING: The properties abutting the subject site are general commercial. Based on the Needles City Code the proposed building provides the required setbacks and is within the overall height allowed in the Code. Additionally, the project is required to have engineered drawings and building permits which will ensure that health and safety requirements are satisfied per the International Building Code. Therefore, the proposed project will not endanger the life or property in the surrounding area.

D. The development is in general conformity with the Needles General Plan.

FINDING: The General Plan designation is "General Commercial" and is consistent with the goals and objectives of the General Plan. The General Commercial Land Use designation permits the proposed use and Policy LU-1.2 encourages "multifamily and mixed-use residential development into General Commercial areas."

SECTION 3. The City Council HEREBY FINDS AND DETERMINES THAT facts do exist to approve **RESOLUTION 2025-13.**

<u>SECTION 4</u>. The City Council HEREBY APPROVES **RESOLUTION 2025-13**, approving a Conditional Use Permit, to allow for the conversion of an existing motel to a 29 micro-apartment and manager's office unit multi-family residential complex in the C-2 (General Commercial) Land Use Zoning Designation at 1707 Needles Hwy also known as APN 0185-048-09-0000, subject to conditions stated herein below:

- 1. The site shall be developed and maintained in accordance with the site plan dated February 2025.
- 2. The applicant shall comply with all Federal, State, and local laws relative to the approved use including the requirements of the Planning, Building, Fire, Sheriff, and Health Departments.
- 3. The approval of CUP No. 02-12-2025-PC is subject to the twelve (12) months expiration provisions of Section 94.13 of the City's Zoning Code.
- 4. The permit issuing authority may extend for a period of up to twelve (12) months, the date when the permit will otherwise expire pursuant to Section 94.13 if it concludes that: (1) the permit has not yet expired; (2) the permit recipient has proceeded with due diligence and in good faith; and (3) conditions have not changed so as to warrant a new application.

- 5. Approval of a Conditional Use Permit_shall not waive compliance with all sections of the Land Use/Zoning Ordinance, all other applicable City ordinances, and regulations, in effect at the time of building permit issuance.
- 6. A Landscape Plan shall be submitted to the City for approval and shall identify and plant desert efficient species in accordance with the City's planting palette.
- 7. The Applicant shall indemnify, protect, hold harmless and defend, with counsel selected by the City, the City and any agency or instrumentality thereof, and/or any of its officers, employees and agents from any and all claims, actions, or proceedings against the City to attack, set aside, void, annul, seek monetary damages resulting from an approval of the City, or any agency or instrumentality thereof, advisory agency, appeal board or legislative body including actions approved by the voter of the City, concerning the entitlement application. City shall promptly notify both the Applicant and landowner of any claim, action, or proceeding to which this condition is applicable and shall further cooperate fully in the defense of the action. The City reserves its right to take any and all action the City deems to be in the best interest of the City and its citizens in regard to such defense. As a condition of this approval, the Applicant or its authorized representative shall:
 - a. Execute an agreement to defend (with legal counsel of the City's choice), indemnify and hold the City harmless from any and all claims, damages, legal or enforcement actions, including, but not limited to, any actions or claims associated with violation(s) of federal law associated with the permitting, licensing, approval, and/or operation of the project; and
 - b. Maintain insurance in the minimum amount of \$1 million per claim and \$2 million in the aggregate; and
 - c. Name the City as an additional insured on all City required insurance policies; and
 - d. Agree to defend, at its sole expense, any action against the City, its agents, officers, and employees related to the approval of the project.
- 8. The applicant shall locate outside trash bin(s) or trash cans in a secured, enclosed area; not to be seen by public view and shall be locked at all times.
- 9. The project is required to be handicap accessible. All ADA parking spaces shall comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and California Building Code standards.
- 10. All structures, building walls open to public view shall remain free of graffiti or other extraneous markings, drawing, or signage that was not approved by the City or otherwise providing pertinent information about said premises. In the event graffiti or other extraneous markings occur, the Applicant shall remove, or cover said markings, drawings, or signage within 24 hours of notification of such occurrence, weather permitting. Paint utilized in covering such markings shall be of a color that matches, as closely as possible, the color of the adjacent surface.
- 11. Applicant shall keep the premises clear of accumulated debris, sand and dust at all times.
- 12. Violation of the conditions of approval may result in citation and/or initiation of revocation proceedings.
- 13. The applicant/developer/property owner shall provide clustered and/or individual mailbox(es) for the delivery of mail to future residents of the development. The location shall be convenient for the residents and not block the line-of-sight for pedestrians or vehicle traffic. The mailboxes shall be made of durable material and shall be installed in a manner that is resistant to vandalism and meets the requirements of the Post Office.

- 14. With the exception for amendments and/or modifications that are consistent with Section 94.15 of the City's Zoning Code, anything not shown on the CUP application or the Site Plan, or which is not specifically approved herein, or which is not in compliance with the CUP, is not approved. Any application and/or plans which are defective as to, but not limited to, omissions, dimensions, scale, use, colors, materials, encroachments, easements, etc., shall render any entitlements granted under this resolution null and void. Construction (if any) shall cease until all requirements of this CUP are complied with, and development entitlements may be withheld until any Code violations are abated.
- 15. No Certificate of Occupancy shall be granted until all Conditions of Approval have been completed and approved by the City and Fire Department unless otherwise identified herein, and all improvements have been completed and accepted by the City.
- 16. Within fifteen (15) days of final approval by the City Council, the Applicant shall submit a notarized affidavit acknowledging acceptance of the conditions of this CUP. This authorization shall become void, and any privilege, permit, or other authorization granted under these entitlements shall be deemed to have lapsed if compliance with this condition has not been undertaken within the specified time limits.
- 17. A scanned copy of the signed Resolution with the Conditions of Approval shall be included/attached in the Building Construction Plans submitted for plan check.
- 18. During construction, the Applicant shall, at all times, maintain the project site free of weeds, debris, trash or any other offensive, unhealthful and/or dangerous material. If after ten (10) days' notice by certified mail, the Applicant does not comply with a notice of violation issued during construction, the City may either cancel building or grading permits and/or implement nuisance abatement proceedings, including placing a lien on the property for costs of abatement.
- 19. The project shall be served by the City's sanitary sewer system.
- 20. All sewer facilities shall be constructed in accordance with the City Standards.
- 21. The sewer lines serving the laundry room and manager's office shall be properly repaired and connected in compliance with applicable standards.
- 22. All deficiencies in the sewer lines on both sides of the building must be identified and corrected to ensure the system is fully functional and meets all regulatory requirements.
- 23. All Conditions of Approval issued by San Bernardino County Fire, (FPLN-2025-00005), shall apply.
- 24. All rooms in the Motel must be converted to long term stay (at least thirty (30) days), and all Dwelling Units must meet the standards for Dwelling Units as stated in Sec. 112.05 (Conversion of Hotel, Motel or Motor Hotel Room to Multi-Family Apartment Conversions) of the Needles Municipal Code.
- 25. The presence of any abandoned, wrecked, dismantled or inoperative vehicle, or parts thereof, on the Premises containing the Dwelling Units is unlawful for any period in excess of ten (10) days. The owner of the vehicle and/or the owner or operator of the Premises shall be subject to the penalties set forth within this Code.
- 26. The Dwelling Unit shall be used for residential purposes only. No commercial uses may take place within the Dwelling Unit or on the Premises, except the operation of the Dwelling Units and any licensed store, restaurant or lounge approved therewith. No owner or operator may sell any liquor or tobacco or operate any other business on the Premises without being licensed to do so.

- 27. The tenant shall ensure that the Dwelling Unit is kept in a clean and sanitary condition so as not to encourage rodents or other pests or create any fire hazards or unsightly appearance inside or outside of the Dwelling Unit which tends to be a threat to the health, safety or welfare of the residents of the Premises or decrease the surrounding property values.
- 28. All Dwelling Units shall be available for inspection by City or County officials upon 24 hours written notice of intent to inspect during reasonable business hours.
- 29. Plans will need to be submitted to Building and Safety for full review for building permit issuance.
- 30. The applicant/developer/property owner shall comply with the latest adopted edition of the following codes as applicable:
 - A. California Building Code
 - B. California Residential Code
 - C. California Electrical Code
 - D. California Mechanical Code
 - E. California Plumbing Code
 - F. California Energy Code
 - G. California Fire Code
 - H. California Green Building Standards Code

<u>SECTION 5.</u> This action shall become final and effective fifteen (15) days after this decision by the CITY COUNCIL, unless within such period, a written appeal is filed with the City Clerk for consideration by the City Council as provided by the Needles City Code.



IT IS HEREBY AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

WHEREAS, the City of Needles (CITY) has observed that many of its street facilities and related appurtenances within its jurisdictional area need occasional maintenance and repair; and

WHEREAS, Streets and Highways Code sections 1685 and 1803 authorize CITY to contract with the County of San Bernardino (COUNTY) for the maintenance, construction or repair of CITY streets, if the legislative body of CITY determines that it is necessary for the more efficient maintenance, construction, or repair of said streets; and

WHEREAS, **COUNTY** and **CITY** are sometimes individually referred to in this Agreement as **PARTY** and collectively referred to as **PARTIES**; and

WHEREAS, the legislative body of CITY has determined that it is necessary for the more efficient maintenance and repair of its street facilities and related appurtenances within CITY to contract with COUNTY for COUNTY to sometimes perform said work, including emergency work, on CITY street facilities and related appurtenances located within the incorporated area of CITY (hereinafter referred to as "CITY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK"); and

WHEREAS, CITY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK will be performed by COUNTY staff and/or COUNTY contractors; and

WHEREAS, public projects of sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000) or less may be performed by the employees of a public agency by force account, by negotiated contract, or by purchase order per Public Contract Code section 22032; and

WHEREAS, CITY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK to be performed by COUNTY staff and/or COUNTY contractors will only be maintenance or emergency work as those terms are defined in the Public Contract Code, and shall not exceed seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000) per project; and

WHEREAS, CITY is solely responsible for determining whether CITY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK to be performed by COUNTY staff and/or COUNTY contractors is maintenance or emergency work and complies with all applicable Public Contract Code requirements prior to requesting the performance of CITY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK by COUNTY; and

WHEREAS, CITY will reimburse COUNTY for all costs incurred by COUNTY in performing CITY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK requested by CITY and completed by COUNTY; and

WHEREAS, Streets and Highways Code section 1710 authorizes **COUNTY** to contract with **CITY** for the **CITY's** maintenance, construction or repair of **COUNTY** highways; and

WHEREAS, COUNTY has determined that it is necessary for the more efficient maintenance and repair of its highway facilities and related appurtenances to contract with CITY for CITY to sometimes perform said work, which includes emergency work, on COUNTY highway facilities and related appurtenances located within CITY's sphere of influence as defined by the San Bernardino County Local Agency Formation Commission (hereinafter referred to as "COUNTY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK"); and

WHEREAS, COUNTY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK will be performed by CITY staff and/or CITY contractors; and

WHEREAS, COUNTY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK to be performed by CITY staff and/or CITY contractors will only be for maintenance or emergency work as those terms are defined in the Public Contract Code, and shall not exceed seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000) per project; and

WHEREAS, COUNTY is solely responsible for determining whether COUNTY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK to be performed by CITY staff and/or CITY contractors is maintenance or emergency work and complies with all applicable Public Contract Code requirements prior to requesting the performance of COUNTY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK by CITY; and

WHEREAS, COUNTY will reimburse CITY for all costs incurred by CITY in performing COUNTY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK requested by COUNTY and completed by CITY; and

WHEREAS, **COUNTY** and **CITY** desire to set forth the responsibilities and obligations of each as they pertain to the work described in this Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS MUTUALLY AGREED as follows:

SECTION I

1.0 For CITY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK provided to CITY:

COUNTY AGREES TO:

1.1 Schedule requested CITY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK upon receipt of a written "Notice to Proceed" from CITY and to provide to CITY a schedule of workdays anticipated for

- **CITY** concurrence. **COUNTY**, through its authorized representative identified in Paragraph 4.5 and in its sole discretion, shall decide whether to approve or disapprove an individual "Notice to Proceed" and provide specific services to **CITY**.
- 1.2 Utilize **COUNTY's** Department of Public Works labor force and/or contractors in providing services under this Agreement.
- 1.3 Obtain a no-cost permit from CITY for any CITY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK to be performed within CITY's right-of-way. COUNTY's Director of Public Works, or the Director's designee, shall have the authority to obtain a permit from CITY for CITY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK.
- 1.4 Upon completion of each individual work assignment, submit to CITY an itemized accounting of actual CITY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK costs incurred by COUNTY and an invoice for such costs.
- 1.5 COUNTY shall require all contractors and vendors providing CITY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK to have appropriate and adequate insurance coverage for the mutual protection and benefit of the PARTIES. Except for Workers' Compensation, Errors and Omissions and Professional Liability policies, COUNTY shall require and ensure that all COUNTY contractors performing CITY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK shall have insurance policies that contain endorsements naming the CITY and its officers, employees, agents and volunteers as additional insureds with respect to liabilities arising out of the performance of services hereunder. The additional insured endorsements shall not limit the scope of coverage for the CITY to vicarious liability but shall allow coverage for the CITY to the full extent provided by the policy.
- 1.6 Enforce **COUNTY's** contractors to comply with all applicable laws and regulations, including Labor Code sections 1720 et seq. and 1770 et seq. that concern the payment of prevailing wages.
- 1.7 When applicable, **COUNTY** shall fill out and submit to the California Department of Industrial Relations a PWC-100 form.

CITY AGREES TO:

- 1.8 Provide **COUNTY** a written "Notice to Proceed" for any **CITY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK** requested by **CITY**.
- 1.9 Provide a no-cost permit to **COUNTY** for its work within **CITY's** right-of-way.
- 1.10 After COUNTY completes each individual CITY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK assignment and submits an itemized accounting of actual CITY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK costs incurred by COUNTY along with an invoice, to reimburse COUNTY for CITY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK costs within sixty (60) calendar days after receipt of invoice.
- 1.11 Provide a qualified representative who shall have the authority to discuss and attempt to resolve any issues or disputes which may arise concerning the CITY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK with the COUNTY.
- 1.12 Comply with any applicable California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) requirements as well as completing the required CEQA documents.
- 1.13 Determine whether CITY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK to be performed by COUNTY staff and/or COUNTY contractors for CITY is maintenance or emergency work and comply with all applicable Public Contract Code requirements prior to requesting the performance of CITY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK by COUNTY.

SECTION II

2.0 For COUNTY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK provided to COUNTY:

CITY AGREES TO:

- 2.1 Schedule requested COUNTY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK upon receipt of a written "Notice to Proceed" from the COUNTY and provide to COUNTY a schedule of workdays anticipated for the COUNTY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK for COUNTY's concurrence. CITY, through its authorized representative identified in Paragraph 4.5 and in its sole discretion, shall decide whether to approve or disapprove an individual "Notice to Proceed" and provide specific services to COUNTY.
- 2.2 Utilize CITY's labor force and/or contractors in providing services under this Agreem

- 2.3 Obtain a no-cost permit from COUNTY for work within COUNTY's right-of-way. CITY's Director of Public Works, or the Director's designee, shall have the authority to obtain a permit from COUNTY for COUNTY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK.
- 2.4 Upon completion of each COUNTY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK assignment, submit to COUNTY an itemized accounting of COUNTY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK costs incurred by CITY and an invoice for such costs.
- 2.5 CITY shall require all contractors and vendors providing COUNTY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK to have appropriate and adequate insurance coverage for the mutual protection and benefit of the PARTIES. Except for Workers' Compensation, Errors and Omissions and Professional Liability policies, CITY shall require and ensure that all CITY contractors performing COUNTY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK shall have insurance policies that contain endorsements naming the COUNTY and its officers, employees, agents and volunteers as additional insureds with respect to liabilities arising out of the performance of services hereunder. The additional insured endorsements shall not limit the scope of coverage for the COUNTY to vicarious liability but shall allow coverage for the COUNTY to the full extent provided by the policy. Such additional insured coverage shall be at least as broad as Additional Insured (Form B) endorsement form ISO, CG 2010.11 85.
- 2.6 Enforce CITY's contractors to comply with all applicable laws and regulations, including Labor Code sections 1720 et seq. and 1770 et seq. that concern the payment of prevailing wages.
- 2.7 Accept all payments from **COUNTY** via electronic funds transfer (EFT) directly deposited into the **CITY's** designated checking or other bank account. **CITY** shall promptly comply with directions and accurately complete forms provided by **COUNTY** required to process EFT payments.
- 2.8 When applicable, **CITY** shall fill out and submit to the California Department of Industrial Relations a PWC-100 form.

COUNTY AGREES TO:

- 2.9 Provide CITY a written "Notice to Proceed" for any authorized COUNTY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK requested by COUNTY.
- 2.10 Provide a no-cost permit to CITY for its work within COUNTY's right-of-way.
- 2.11 After CITY completes each individual COUNTY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK assignment and submits an itemized accounting of actual COUNTY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK costs incurred by CITY along with an invoice, to reimburse CITY for COUNTY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK costs within sixty (60) calendar days after receipt of invoice.
- 2.12 Provide a qualified representative who shall have the authority to discuss and attempt to resolve any issues or disputes which may arise concerning the **COUNTY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK** with the **CITY**.
- 2.13 Comply with any applicable CEQA requirements as well as completing the required CEQA documents.
- 2.14 Determine whether COUNTY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK to be performed by CITY staff and/or CITY contractors for COUNTY is maintenance or emergency work and comply with all applicable Public Contract Code requirements prior to requesting the performance of COUNTY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK by CITY.

SECTION III

3.0 IT IS MUTUALLY AGREED:

- 3.1 CITY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK and COUNTY FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK (at times individually referred to simply as "FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK") shall include only maintenance or emergency work associated with the following facilities: streets/highways, appurtenant fencing, culvert or drainage facilities. FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK may include, but is not limited to, the grading and application of soil stabilization product on dirt roads, as well as providing heavy equipment for storm debris cleanup, striping, chip sealing, maintenance or emergency paving.
- The cost for each **FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK** project shall not exceed <u>seventy-five</u> thousand dollars (\$75,000).

- The total cost for all work performed pursuant to Section 1.0 shall not exceed one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) per fiscal year, absent a prior written amendment to this Agreement. The total cost for all work performed pursuant to Section 2.0 shall not exceed one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) per fiscal year, absent a prior written amendment to this Agreement.
- 3.4 CITY or COUNTY is only responsible to provide the FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK identified in the "Notice to Proceed" from the requesting party (CITY or COUNTY) and agreed to by the non-requesting party (CITY or COUNTY). After completion of FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK on any particular facility, the requesting party (CITY or COUNTY) shall be responsible for all future maintenance and repair work associated with the FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK, unless the non-requesting party (CITY or COUNTY) receives a future request to provide additional FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK under this Agreement, followed by an approval of a written "Notice to Proceed."
- The **PARTIES** shall comply with all applicable laws and regulations, including, but not limited to, all applicable Public Contract Code (e.g. bidding requirements), Labor Code (e.g. prevailing wage requirements), Business and Professions Code (e.g. licensing requirements), and Civil Code requirements (e.g. payment bond requirements).

SECTION IV

4.0 IT IS FURTHER UNDERSTOOD AND AGREED:

- 4.1 The requesting party (CITY or COUNTY) shall prepare and submit to the non-requesting party (CITY or COUNTY) a "Notice to Proceed" that outlines the work requested within the scope and budget limitations of this Agreement. The Notice to Proceed shall include the location (street(s) or highway(s)) the work shall take place on, the scope of the work, the requested schedule, the level of service required (if necessary), and other pertinent terms and details for the project within the scope of this Agreement. The COUNTY Director of Public Works and the CITY Director of Public Works/City Engineer shall have the authority to prepare and submit a "Notice to Proceed." as well as provide estimates and approve all FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK projects under this Agreement. The non-requesting party shall develop cost estimates and project schedules for review by the requesting party using COUNTY/CITY-approved labor and equipment rates that include fringe and overhead for actual employee classifications, equipment rates that will recover the depreciation expenses and the maintenance and repair cost of the equipment used for the proposed work assignment and estimated material costs. If requested, the estimate of cost will be provided to the requesting party prior to the commencement of work. The non-requesting party is under no obligation to perform work tasks and the non-requesting party's representative identified in Paragraph 4.5 may decline to perform the requested work for any reason or for no reason.
- 4.2 The Effective Date of this Agreement shall be the first date on which all of the following has occurred: (1) the CITY's Council and COUNTY's Board have approved the Agreement; and (2) the authorized representative of each has signed the Agreement.

4.3 Insurance and Indemnification

COUNTY and **CITY** are authorized self-insured or partially self-insured public entities for purposes of Professional Liability, General Liability, Automobile Liability and Worker's Compensation and warrant that through their respective programs of self-insurance and insurance, they have adequate coverage or resources to protect against liabilities arising out of performance of the terms, conditions or obligations of this Agreement.

Neither CITY nor any officer, employee, agent, or volunteer of CITY shall be responsible for any damage or liability arising out of, pertaining to, or relating to any acts or omissions on the part of COUNTY or its contractors under or in connection with any work, authority or jurisdiction delegated to and performed by COUNTY or its contractors under this Agreement. It is also understood and agreed that, pursuant to Government Code section 895.4, COUNTY shall fully indemnify, defend (with counsel approved by CITY) and hold CITY and its officers, employees, agents, and volunteers harmless from any liability imposed for injury (as defined by Government Code section 810.8) arising out of, pertaining to, or relating to any acts or omissions on the part of COUNTY or

its contractors under or in connection with any work, authority or jurisdiction delegated to and performed by **COUNTY** or its contractors under this Agreement.

Neither COUNTY nor any officer, employee, agent or volunteer of COUNTY shall be responsible for any damage or liability arising out of, pertaining to, or relating to any acts or omissions on the part of CITY or its contractors under or in connection with any work, authority or jurisdiction delegated to and performed by CITY or its contractors under this Agreement. It is also understood and agreed that, pursuant to Government Code section 895.4, CITY shall fully indemnify, defend (with counsel approved by COUNTY) and hold COUNTY and its officers, employees, agents, and volunteers harmless from any liability imposed for injury (as defined by Government Code section 810.8) arising out of, pertaining to, or relating to any acts or omissions on the part of CITY or its contractors under or in connection with any work, authority or jurisdiction delegated to and performed by CITY or its contractors under this Agreement.

In the event **COUNTY** and/or **CITY** is found to be comparatively at fault for any claim, action, loss or damage which results from their respective obligations under this Agreement, **COUNTY** and/or **CITY** shall indemnify the other to the extent of its comparative fault.

CITY and COUNTY agree to waive all rights of subrogation against each other.

- 4.4 No supplement, modification, or amendment of this Agreement shall be binding unless executed in writing and signed by CITY and COUNTY.
- 4.5 All notices, approvals, consents or other documents required or permitted under this Agreement shall be in writing and, except as otherwise provided herein, shall be effective upon personal delivery or three calendar days after deposit in the United States mail, certified, with first class postage, fully prepaid, addressed as follows:


- 4.6 No waiver of any default shall constitute a waiver of any other default or breach, whether of the same or other covenant or condition. No waiver, benefit, privilege, or service voluntarily given or performed by a **PARTY** shall give the other **PARTY** any contractual rights by custom, estoppel, or otherwise.
- 4.7 This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of California. If a court of competent jurisdiction declares any portion of this Agreement invalid, illegal, or otherwise unenforceable, the remaining provisions shall continue in full force and effect, unless the purpose of this Agreement is frustrated. Any dispute or action to enforce any obligation under this Agreement shall be filed and resolved in the appropriate Superior Court in the County of San Bernardino, California. In the event of litigation arising from this Agreement, each **PARTY** to the Agreement shall bear its own costs, including attorney's fees. This provision concerning costs shall not apply to costs or attorney's fees relative to paragraphs 4.3.
- 4.8 This Agreement contains the entire Agreement of the **PARTIES** with respect to subject matter hereof, and supersedes all other prior negotiations, understandings or contracts. This Agreement may only be modified in writing, signed by authorized representatives of both **CITY** and **COUNTY**.
- 4.9 This Agreement may be terminated, with or without cause, by either CITY or COUNTY upon thirty (30) calendar days advance written notice by the party wishing to terminate, provided however, that any such cancellation shall not be effective as to any existing obligations pursuant to any FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK authorized prior to notice of cancellation. In the event of cancellation as provided herein, all FACILITIES CONTRACT WORK costs required to be paid by the PARTIES prior to the effective date of cancellation shall be paid by the PARTIES as provided in this Agreement.

- 4.10 Except with respect to the indemnification obligations contained herein which shall survive the termination of this Agreement, this Agreement shall take effect on the date it is signed by both parties, and shall terminate on June 30, 2025, unless it is terminated early as provided in Paragraph 4.9.
- 4.11 This Agreement may be signed in counterparts, each of which shall constitute an original.
- 4.12 The Recitals preceding the terms of this Agreement are incorporated into the terms hereof by this reference and constitute constructive terms of this Agreement.
- 4.13 Since the **PARTIES** or their agents have participated fully in the preparation of this Agreement, the language of this Agreement shall be construed simply, according to its fair meaning, and not strictly for any or against any party.

DATE: February 7, 2025

- 1. This week, the City Manager attended the League of California Cities City Managers Conference, a key event bringing together municipal leaders to address critical issues impacting local governance. The conference featured sessions on leadership, council transitions, economic development, homelessness solutions, and the evolving role of city managers. Discussions covered infrastructure funding, emergency preparedness, and best practices for enhancing **city operations**. This event provided an opportunity to connect with industry experts, exchange ideas with fellow city managers, and gain insights into strategies supporting Needles' long-term growth and resilience. While at the conference, the City Manager met with Tripepi Smith, the city's marketing consultant, and brainstormed for the future. With extensive experience in municipal marketing, the firm provides branding, digital outreach, and strategic communication support to enhance the city's visibility. Their presence at the conference, including a dedicated booth, highlighted their expertise and ongoing efforts to support Needles. Refer to the attached image for a glimpse of the conference and Tripepi Smith's participation.
- 2. City staff is pleased to announce the ribbon-cutting ceremony for the Well No. 11 Treatment Plant Project, scheduled for March 4, 2025, at 10:00 a.m. This \$8.9 million project is a significant milestone in strengthening Needles' water infrastructure, ensuring a reliable supply of high-quality drinking water for years. With final system calibration underway, the project is nearly complete. Representatives from key agencies will attend, and we invite the community to celebrate this significant investment in Needles' future.
- 3. The Needles Pride Program continues to thrive, encouraging community-driven activism among residents dedicated to enhancing neighborhoods, fostering pride, improving property upkeep, and ensuring compliance with city codes. A key success of the program has been multiple community clean-up efforts, with the next pop-up clean-up event scheduled for tomorrow, February 8, 2025, at 8 AM. Hosted by the Military Moms, this event invites the

community to help clean Broadway Street. Those interested are encouraged to meet at the corner of Broadway Street and G Street (The Needles Sign) and bring gloves and enthusiasm to support the beautification of our city. Fire prevention has been a top priority for the city and its residents, with numerous property owners cleaning up their properties. This week, Public Works has been actively addressing fire risks by trimming trees and removing dead vegetation in key areas, including Jack Smith Park, Duke Watkins Park, the Aquatic Center, and Nikki Bunch Park. Next week, crews will begin trimming all palm trees at the cemetery, followed by tree maintenance throughout the city and other parks. Eighty palm trees will be cut as part of these proactive fire prevention and maintenance efforts in the coming weeks.

- 4. Rivers Edge Golf Course is experiencing a remarkable year, featuring some of the best greens in the Tri-State region. We are excited to host several upcoming tournaments, offering a fantastic opportunity to enjoy the game while supporting local causes. Tomorrow, the Women's Club will host its inaugural Scholarship and Operations Fundraiser, bringing the community together for a meaningful cause. Then, on March 15, 2025, the Needles Chamber of Commerce will present its second annual Lucky Greens Golf Tournament, promising a fun and competitive day on the course. We encourage golfers to book a tee time or host their tournament at Rivers Edge. As we grow into a championship-caliber golf destination, we remain committed to making Rivers Edge Golf Course a valued asset for the community. Book your tee time today or RSVP for these tournaments by calling 760-326-3931 or visiting our website to explore upcoming events.
- 5. City staff is pleased to share that Needles has been prominently featured in the newly rebranded South Valley Media Guide, formerly the Needles Relocation and Visitors Guide. This comprehensive publication by News West Publishing, Inc. highlights Needles alongside neighboring communities, reinforcing our city's economic growth, public infrastructure improvements, and expanding recreational opportunities. This feature aligns with the City Council's goals of fostering economic development, promoting tourism, and enhancing community engagement. By showcasing in a well-regarded regional publication, Needles strengthens its visibility to prospective businesses, new residents, and visitors, positioning our city as a thriving destination along the Colorado River. We extend our gratitude to News West Publishing, Inc. for including Needles in this year's guide and their efforts to promote our community. Refer to the attached South Valley Media Guide for more details on how Needles is highlighted, or click here to view it online.
- 6. Simon Sewer mobilized this week to begin hydro-vac cleaning of 30,000 linear feet of sewer main lines across several key areas, including Desnok, Cibola Street, Bazoobuth, Acoma, Palm Way, Quivera, Downey, D, E, 4th Street, and the mainline from Bailey Avenue to E Broadway. The hydro-vac process uses pressurized water to break down and remove built-up solids in the sewer mains, helping to extend the life of the pipes, improve system

efficiency, and reduce odors. This ongoing maintenance is a critical investment in the city's sewer infrastructure, aimed at preventing blockages, minimizing future repairs, and ensuring long-term system reliability. The work is progressing efficiently, and city staff will continue to monitor the project to ensure timely completion. Refer to the attached map for a detailed view of the areas currently being cleaned and images for a glimpse of their hard work.

- 7. On January 28, 2025, the City Council allocated funds for immediate enhancements to improve ADA accessibility at the City of Needles Rodeo Grounds. These upgrades aim to provide a safe and accessible path of travel for individuals with disabilities, ensuring compliance with ADA regulations and enhancing the overall experience for attendees. The improvements include two van-accessible parking spaces and 132 linear feet of an accessible walking path leading to seating and restrooms. These upgrades are scheduled for completion next week in preparation for the 47th Colorado River Round-Up on April 4-5, 2025. Celebrated as the oldest local rodeo, this event is endorsed by the Grand Canyon Professional Rodeo Association, ensuring a showcase of skill, courage, and cowboy tradition. Last year, the event drew 4,000 attendees over two nights, reinforcing its significance as a significant community gathering. The city would like to thank Western Construction Specialists, Inc. for their efforts in mobilizing quickly to complete the project on time. Refer to the attached photos for a project status update and the flyer for more information on the event.
- 8. City staff is making steady progress on the Off-Highway Motor Vehicle (OHMV) Route Map, a key component of the OHMV Pilot Program aimed at designating city streets for off-highway vehicles to enhance recreation and tourism. In December 2024, staff submitted proposed route maps to the BLM Needles Field Office, developed in partnership with stakeholders and the city's traffic engineer to ensure safe and efficient connections. This week, BLM informed staff that, due to **new administrative priorities**, they have been aligning their work with updated directives, and their review of the maps is expected to conclude soon. Once finalized, the map will move forward for review by the BLM Lake Havasu Field Office, followed by engagement with the OHMV Subcommittee, Sheriff's Department, Planning Commission, and City Council for public hearings and community input for adoption of an Ordinance. These efforts mark an **essential step toward establishing a** well-connected OHMV network, reinforcing Needles as a destination for outdoor recreation. Staff will continue working closely with **BLM and regional** partners and provide updates as the process advances.
- 9. Last week, City staff was aware that four burros had been roaming between Jack Smith Park and the Needles Golf Course. In response, staff has communicated with the Bureau of Land Management (BLM), responsible for managing and protecting wild burro populations. A Burro Extraction Team will arrive early next week to relocate them safely. It is believed that the burros may have traveled from the Chemehuevi Herd Area or the Dead Mountain Herd

Area, both located near Needles. A team from Ridgecrest will conduct the relocation process to return them to their herd. BLM is actively addressing the situation and working quickly to ensure a safe and humane resolution per federal protections for wild burros. In the meantime, drivers in the area are advised to use caution. Staff will continue to monitor the situation and provide updates as needed. Refer to the attached images for a glimpse of the burros.



COMMITS TO ENHANCING INFRASTRUCTURE AND PUBLIC SPACES

Public works have also focused on maintaining parks and





MUSIC **ACADEMY**

AIMS TO REINVIGORATE INTEREST IN ARTS



Bullhead City, AZ - Junior high school students have the opportunity to explore musical education at the high school level through a new program offered by the Colorado River Union High School District.

Dubbed the Music Academy, Fox Creek Junior High School and Mohave Valley Junior High School seventh and eighth graders are able to participate in music electives connected to either Mohave High School or River Valley High School respectively.

In Bullhead City, students are able to attend classes at MHS in either a choir or band track, with the possibility of earning high school credits. The classes are held in addition to existing musical offerings at FCJHS.

"We're very excited to work with Fox Creek administration and music teacher Jodi Crowley to build music in our community and make music seen, hopefully, as more important and one of the essential course studies for the students." band director Michelle Ribelin said.

Transportation and "everything the students require" is provided by the high school district. Ribelin said.

MHS music director Cameron Pruitt said the Music Academy aimed to generate interest in the fine arts, which has been lagging locally since the COVID-19 pandemic hit.

"We've seen a little bit of a decline in the kids' ability and in the overall fine arts. We wanted, as a professional learning

community between the high school and the junior high, find a way to enrich them so that when they get to the high school, they're ready for the level that is expected of them," Pruitt said.

MHS currently has a marching band and multiple choir programs, many of which participate in competitions throughout the year.

"Ultimately, the goal is to have a sixyear 'program,' where the first two years are at the Music Academy in seventh and eighth grade. Once they get to the high school, they're ready to go and can compete in regional competitions and maybe even at state," Pruitt said.

For students at MVJHS, the Music Academy is coming to them - which may be their first exposure to music in an educational setting, as the school has been without a musical program for many years.

Mohave Valley Elementary School District Superintendent Cole Young said he was excited to bring back music to his students.

"Band is a huge component when it comes to kids and the left brain thinkers that are out there. We want to be able to offer that piece," Young said. "By working with (CRUHSD superintendent) Dr. Richard, we were able to come up with an idea where he had some sections that were available at River Valley with his music teacher. They cooperatively came (to) talk to me in relation to how could we do some sharing when it

comes to some of the talents that we have within the area. "

Music teacher Jackie Woodson came to MVJHS to teach two music sections at the junior high school, Ribelin said. "Jackie is really excited about it, because she can build what she needs for the high school at the junior high level," Ribelin said.

"At one time long ago, before me, there was a band program. We're going and digging out instruments that we do have available ... Working with (CRUHSD) will give us an idea of what the baseline is and then we'll kind of build from there," Young said.

Regardless of whether it's at RVHS or MHS, musical programs are beneficial for students in many ways, Pruitt and Ribelin agreed.

Even if a student doesn't want to pursue a career in music, those involved in the fine arts are statistically more likely to succeed academically both in high school and college.

"High schools with really good music programs can boast 95% graduation rates," Pruitt said. "People who participate in middle school and high school music are 30% more likely to get into college ... It does so much for school culture, it does a lot for students and I think to get our area on track academically and culturally, we need to have a stronger music program."





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












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VALLEY VIEW MEDICAL CENTER AND FORT MOJAVE MESA FIRE

HOST FLAG CEREMONY FOR NOAH WELCH

"He will be greatly missed," said Fort Mojave Mesa Fire Chief Chris Pardi

The 23-year-old man, known for his broad smile and passion for teaching others lifesaving skills, died Sept. 1, after a lifetime of health challenges.

"He had a very positive attitude and the fighting spirit of a warrior," said his mother, Maureen Welch. "When he was born, they said he would never survive, let alone grow â€" he became an amazing young man, everyone loved him."

Noah was born on Nov. 13, 2000, with many health conditions that required lifelong intervention from healthcare providers.

"He came into our care as a foster child and was our adopted son for 23 years," Maureen Welch said. "He experienced surgeries of his brain, his abdomen, his spinal cord and more."

When it became obvious Noah wasn't coming home this time, Fort Mojave Mesa Fire Department dispatched an honor crew to stand watch in his room at Saint Rose Dominican Hospital in Las Vegas.

"Noah and his mother are part of our firefighting family, they've been an integral part of our annual CPR and Basic Life Support/Advanced Life Support annual certification and other specialized training," said John Clark, FMMFD Fire Marshal. "He'll be missed; our folks enjoyed his being a part of our training and having him present."

The Welch family worked together in their own company, Specialty Life Support, an American heart training center.

Noah became an instructor and also graduated from an emergency medical technician program. A student at Mohave Community College, Welch carried a 4.0 GPA and was three classes away from earning his associates degree in IT technology.

"Noah had to work harder to get satisfactory grades and he was never satisfied with a grade that was just okay," Maureen Welch said. "We planned on traveling the country and teaching people CPR in the under-served communities of Arizona."

Noah's spirit lives on through his decision to be an organ donor, his mother said. The family was informed nearly immediately that his decision had already given the gifts of a lung, two kidneys and a liver.

"At Saint Rose, organ donors are announced hospital-wide before disconnecting life support," Clark said. "FMMFD, hospital staff and volunteers, Air Methods crews and others lined the hallways to pay their respects as Noah was taken on an honor walk through the hospital. It was very solemn, but very neat that they did that."

Afterward, Noah and his family were escorted home to Valley View Medical Center, where Maureen Welch has worked for many years. They were greeted by Welch's Valley View family and their firefighting family.

"He was the loveliest thing I had in my life," Maureen Welch said after the ceremony. "My heart is so full; we appreciate that our lives were touched by him and now without him here, we'll try to figure out how to go on."

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DEVILS YOUTH PROGRAM

MAKES 2024 HOME DEBUT AGAINST WICKENBURG

Mohave Valley, AZ - The River Valley Devils made the first of four home appearances in September, hosting the Wickenburg Wranglers in a youth football tripleheader at River Valley High School's stadium.

Playing for the third time of the new season, the Mighty Mites, Minors and Majors all saw the home field for the first time on what turned into a long, hot day of football.

"We have 125 kids this year," said River Valley Devils board vice president Heather D'Amico. "We have 45 in cheerleading and the rest (80) in football."

The program is for grades K-8, essentially ages 5 to 14, with the program split into three age groups. The Mighty Mites is for grades K-2, the Minors for grades 3-5 and the Majors for grades 6-8. Participation in the Devils program is open to grade school and middle school/junior high students in Mohave County.

"There's no residency requirement; they can live anywhere in Mohave County," she said.

The Devils program was launched in 2017. Prior to that, D'Amico said, the Vipers program existed for "15 or more years" in Mohave Valley.

The program competes in the Northern Arizona Youth Foot-

ball League, part of the nationwide USA Football program. The Devils are the lone Mohave County member of the league.

D'Amico said the program fills several needs for the community. First, it is an organized, competitive program. "It teaches kids discipline, honesty, accountability, teamwork, trust in each other," she said.

And it provides a supervised activity 10 months of the year.

"It gives them something to do," she said. "It teaches them skills they can use in other things as they get older."

The Devils program offers flag football and tackle football for boys and cheerleading for girls. The flag football season runs from late winter to spring, then the tackle football season occupies late summer through fall.

D'Amico said signups for the 2025 Devils program will begin in January.

Another component of the program is "20 to 25" volunteers, D'Amico said, serving in capacities as board members, coaches for football and cheerleading and "team moms" who play a key role at each level giving the coaches and players additional support.



TOROS, WARRIORS USHER IN NEW ERA OF YOUTH FOOTBALL

Mohave Valley, AZ - The Tri-State Toros and Tri-State Warriors ushered in a new era of youth football in the area in August during a quadruple-header at River Valley High School.

The Bullhead City-based Toros and the Fort Mohave/Mohave Valley-based Warriors battled in games for 9-and-under, 11-and-under and 13-and-under before the Toros took on the Phoenix Wildcats in a 7-and-under game. The Warriors aren't fielding a 7-and-under

It was the inaugural tackle football action for both the Toros and Warriors, members of a newly formed six-team River Cities Conference. They are joined by programs from Yuma, Parker, Lake Havasu City and Kingman.

"I thought it was pretty successful," said Corey Fawcett of the Warriors. "It was a learning experience, especially for our younger players who hadn't played a real game before. But I think it went well. We brought all the (Warriors) teams together and the kids got to see what it's like to play football. Now, it's back to work on Tuesday."

Fawcett said the team - and league formed because of the many changes going on in the community.

"It's going better than we thought it would," said Natalie Tynda, president of the Tri-State Toros board. "We thought there would be more hiccups. There have been a few, but for the most part it's gone pretty smoothly."

The Toros have 92 players on four

age-defined teams and there are 49 cheerleaders involved in three squads. The Warriors had 63 players and 21 cheerleaders for its three age-specific teams.

Tynda said the organizers of the Toros are trying to make sure that they are running the program to not only promote football and cheerleading but also to advance and advocate academic success.

"We're serious about it," Tynda said. "If you don't make the grades, you don't play. It's that simple."

And for participants struggling academically, tutoring help is available at every practice. She said several area high school students are tutoring the youngsters.

"It's a win-win," she said of the arrangement that helps the young students while giving the high school mentors an opportunity to earn credits for performing community service.

"The parents want it to be about the kids," Tynda said. "Not the adults; the kids. Everything we try to do is kids first."

Safety is also paramount. Teams have full equipment and, Tynda said, "they don't practice if they don't have all their equipment."

There also are certified medics, many with professional experience.

"We want it to be safe for our kids," said Tynda, who has a son on the 7U team.





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
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
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

1. The City of Needles remains committed to enhancing our community's cleanliness, safety, and overall appeal. The City Council has prioritized cleanup and beautification efforts, ensuring Needles remains a welcoming place for residents and visitors. Through coordinated efforts with city staff, volunteers, and partner agencies, we continue to improve public spaces and maintain a high quality of life. Recently, Public Works, Parks, Electric, Water, and Wastewater teams worked together on citywide maintenance, including removing dead vegetation at the cemetery, trimming trees downtown, and maintaining palm trees as part of proactive fire prevention and beautification efforts. These initiatives help keep our city clean, safe, and visually appealing.

Community involvement plays a crucial role in these efforts. The **Needles Pride Program** inspires residents to take an active role in keeping their neighborhoods clean. The most recent **Pop-Up Clean-Up Event**, hosted by **Military Moms**, was a great success. Volunteers gathered at **Broadway Street and G Street (The Needles Sign)** to clean Broadway Street, removing **over 20 bags of trash, brush, and debris**. This collective effort demonstrates the power of community engagement and civic pride. **Refer to the attached images for a glimpse of their transformative efforts**.

The City of Needles also recognizes and appreciates the ongoing support from Caltrans in keeping our roadways clean and safe. Last week, Caltrans conducted landscaping and vegetation removal along Interstate 40, including clearing trees and enhancing roadside aesthetics. Their work, which extended from O Street Market to Bush Street, supports regional beautification and ensures a well-maintained I-40 corridor. The next community clean-up event is scheduled for Saturday, February 22, 2025, at 9:00 AM, focusing on J Street Hill, near Dollar General (1500 Hospitality Lane, Needles, CA 92363). We encourage all residents to participate and help beautify our city while addressing littering concerns. Residents are also encouraged to report

maintenance concerns or issues through the appropriate channels. Reports related to California State Highway System concerns can be submitted directly to Caltrans at https://csr.dot.ca.gov/. For matters within the City of Needles, please contact (760) 326-2115 or use the Needles Connect app, on the Apple App Store and Google Play Store. Thank you to our residents, volunteers, and city staff for their dedication and hard work. Together, we can ensure Needles remains a clean, safe, and vibrant community for all.

2. City staff is pleased to share a recent code enforcement success story regarding 404 D Street. Nearly a year ago, the City Attorney's Office, in collaboration with the courts, successfully appointed a receiver to address longstanding code violations at the property. Through this process, the property transitioned into responsible ownership, and the new owner has since been actively rehabilitating the home. This achievement not only resolves a significant code enforcement issue but also aligns with the City Council's goal of enhancing infrastructure, improving neighborhood conditions, and addressing the housing shortage. By bringing a revitalized home back onto the market, this effort directly contributes to Needles' ongoing commitment to community development and responsible property management.

These successes require time, persistence, and collaboration, but they demonstrate the positive outcomes achieved when the City, legal resources, and property owners work together. Special appreciation is extended to city staff, the City Attorney's Office, and all involved partners for their dedication to ensuring properties are maintained to a high standard and neighborhoods continue to thrive. The City remains committed to proactively addressing code violations, improving livability, and supporting responsible property ownership to enhance all residents' overall quality of life.

- 3. The City of Needles and the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department Colorado River Station are pleased to invite the community to attend Coffee with a Cop on Wednesday, February 19, 2025, at 11:00 AM at The 19th Hole, 144 Marina Drive, Needles, CA. This event allows residents to engage in informal conversations with local deputies, fostering positive relationships, promoting transparency, and encouraging open dialogue. This initiative aligns with the City Council's goal of strengthening community engagement by creating meaningful connections between law enforcement and the public. There is no set agenda—just an opportunity for residents to meet, ask questions, and discuss community concerns in a welcoming environment. Events like these build trust, enhance public safety, and ensure a well-informed and engaged community. We encourage all community members to attend. - 4. This past week, Assistant Chief Bill Villarino, Division 4 of the San Bernardino County Fire District (SBCFD), updated the City Council on fire safety efforts in Needles. His presentation emphasized the importance of proactive fire prevention, emergency preparedness, and maintaining fire response resources. The Residential Assessment Program (RAP) was a

key topic that offers free home wildfire risk assessments for properties in high-risk areas. SBCFD conducts these evaluations to help homeowners identify hazards, improve defensible space, and enhance fire resilience. Residents are encouraged to participate by visiting www.sbcfire.org or calling (909) 386-8400. The City of Needles has also taken proactive steps in collaboration with SBCFD to enhance fire preparedness, ensure hydrant functionality, and mitigate fire risks. As part of these efforts, residents are urged to take responsibility for fire prevention by removing dry vegetation, clearing access routes for emergency responders, and maintaining defensible space around their homes. These fire safety initiatives align with the City Council's goals of improving infrastructure, fostering community engagement, and ensuring a safe and resilient city. We appreciate Assistant Chief Villarino and SBCFD's continued partnership and encourage the community to utilize available fire prevention resources.

- 5. The Rivers Edge Golf Course continues to be the **go-to destination for** competitive tournaments, community events, and top-tier golf experiences. With a challenging yet player-friendly layout, the course attracts golfers of all skill levels looking for a great time on the links. Last weekend, the Women's Club of Needles kicked off its inaugural tournament, drawing 30 competitors for a successful day of golf, camaraderie, and competition. Next is the Wilson Birthday Bash Tournament on February 22, 2025, followed by the Needles Area Chamber of Commerce & Visitor's Center Second Annual Lucky Greens Tournament on March 15, 2025. Twilight League play returns in March, giving players another shot at the weekly competition. For those looking to sharpen their game, golf lessons resume tomorrow, February 15, 2025, providing an opportunity to refine skills and gain an edge on the course. Rivers Edge Golf Course also offers event hosting for tournaments and group outings, complete with professional coordination to ensure an unforgettable experience. - 6. The Well No. 11 Treatment Plant Project ribbon-cutting ceremony, originally scheduled for March 4, 2025, will be rescheduled to accommodate representatives from key agencies who funded the project. This \$8.9 million project is a major step in strengthening Needles' water infrastructure, ensuring a long-term, reliable supply of high-quality drinking water. Final system calibration is underway, marking the near completion of this critical investment in our community. Once a new date is confirmed, we will share updated details.
- 7. This week, city staff met with representatives from the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) to develop a coordinated plan for the safe relocation of the four burros roaming on the Rivers Edge Golf Course. The Burro Extraction Team worked closely with staff to establish a designated feeding area, a critical first step in preparing a humane trapping method for their safe relocation. The burros have not been observed in the area recently, possibly due to recent

rainfall, which may have influenced their mobility patterns. While their absence suggests they may have moved on naturally, the city remains vigilant and prepared to proceed with relocation efforts if they return. Public safety remains a top priority, particularly as we approach the start of **boating season and the opening of the Jack Smith Boat Launch next month with weekend use**. The city will continue monitoring the situation to mitigate any potential hazards for drivers and visitors. **Refer to the attached images for a visual update on the extraction efforts.** We appreciate the collaboration with BLM and will provide further updates as needed.

8. City officials attended the 2025 Laughlin Economic Development Corporation (LEDC) Annual Meeting on February 13, 2025, at the Laughlin Bay Marina. This event provided valuable insights into regional economic development, infrastructure improvements, and collaborative opportunities that align with the City Council's goals for **business growth, infrastructure** investment, and community engagement. Key discussions focused on regional economic collaboration, infrastructure funding, and tourism expansion, reinforcing the importance of partnerships between Needles and neighboring communities like Laughlin. Strengthening these relationships supports the City's efforts to enhance economic opportunities, attract businesses, and improve public spaces. The meeting also highlighted state and federal funding opportunities for infrastructure projects, which aligns with Needles' commitment to securing grants and investments for road improvements, public amenities, and essential services. Participation in the **LEDC Annual Meeting** ensures Needles remains engaged in regional economic discussions and strengthens its position in California-Nevada border commerce and tourism development. The City looks forward to continuing collaboration with regional partners to drive economic growth, expand business opportunities, and enhance community development.

In an effort to ensure the maximum level of wildfire preparedness, San Bernardino County Fire Department conducts **FREE** engine company residential assessments in rural areas that have high risk for wildfire.

Step 1 Fire Safe Checklist

Address clearly visible from street (4" tall min. on contrasting background). Weeds and grasses need to be cut to 4" or less, 100 ft around structures and 10 feet from roadsides. Within 100 ft (or property border) all trees over 12 ft have all foliage and limbs removed 6 ft above ground. Tree trimmings and brush (in piles) on the ground, branches less than 4" in diameter, and leaves or shrub trimmings must be removed. Combustible (flammable) debris must be completely removed from all areas of your property. Pine needles over 2" in depth must be removed from all areas of the property.


