

**Describe the status of the project:** Active—on revised schedule

Project only became active in late March, and has progressed little until meetings can be held, primarily with elders. Covid cases continue to rise in Nome.

#### Accomplishments for the reporting period.

I have located a book written by Little Sister Alice Sullivan, one of the Little Sisters of Jesus who lived with the King Islanders at Nome's East End. The book, with a few photos, describes some of life in the King Island Community at East End, and how it was destroyed.

#### Identify any problems or obstacles encountered and how they were or will be resolved.

In addition to the research described above, the primary suggestion/request I continue to receive is to wait until it is possible to meet with the KI Elders Committee in person. They are the group most vulnerable to COVID-19, and not available by email, so it may be awhile before these meetings can take place – and Covid cases in Nome have continued to rise.

#### Describe plans for the next reporting period.

Much of the project will be on hiatus for the next quarter, as I will be gone from Nome most of that time. Some work can still be accomplished by email. Hopefully Covid will be on the wane by midwinter/early spring, so that I can meet with the elders I've been directed to contact.

- Work with King Island Council to decide who will function as a Review Committee
- Refine & finalize interpretive panel design and layout, with reviews, edits, and revisions as needed

- Refine & finalize sign design, with reviews and authorization from the City, Rotary and King Island Council/Review Committee
  - o Sign fabrication put out to bid by City

# Attachment A to Contract for Professional Services City of Nome, Alaska Phase 2 – Historic Preservation Plan

#### SCOPE OF WORK

Phase 2 of the Historic Preservation Plan will:

- Prepare a developmental history and existing conditions review.
- Develop the historic contexts, using the public input, to organize relationship of historic and cultural sites and resources, to each other for example cultural, geographic, chronological period, and historic themes.
- Create an actionable plan with goals and strategies to protect, preserve and promote
  historic and cultural sites and resources, including integrating historic preservation into
  City of Nome decision making, to include:
  - o Increasing public awareness of historic preservation, including educational and informational material.
  - o Establishing partnerships, particularly with local tribes and under-represented groups, to strengthen their local historic preservation programs.
  - o Identifying steps to create a local register and tax incentives.
  - o Developing a plan to survey and evaluate properties and archeological sites.
  - o Developing a method to prioritize the rehabilitation of city owned historic properties.
- Identify how the historic preservation will coordinate with other local and state planning efforts.
- Recommend mechanism for resolving conflicts about historic preservation issues.
- Update the list of historic and cultural sites and resources, along with addresses, and map locations (substantial progress has been made on this list as part of the Phase 1 Public Outreach work).
- Site visit to Nome, Alaska shall be made provided travel within the State of Alaska is deemed safe in consideration of the COVID-19 virus pandemic. If Consultant is not comfortable with travelling to Nome, this requirement will be waived and any work anticipated for the site visit will be completed via alternative communication efforts (teleconferencing; e-mail; written correspondence; or other methods).

# Vacant Structure Registration and Maintenance Regulations Chapter 5.40 Nome Code of Ordinances

#### 5.40.020 Definitions. SHARE

- (a) "Certificate of occupancy" as defined under the State of Alaska Construction Code Act.
- (b) "Record owner" means any person who has the right to possess, convey or occupy a specific building or structure.
- (c) "Vacant structure" means a building or structure that is not legally or currently occupied. "Vacant structure" does not mean property that is temporarily unoccupied while the record owners or residents are away on vacation, personal matters, or business and is not intended by the record owner to be left vacant more than nine consecutive months, except for structures located in the resource development zoning district.
- (d) "Junk" means old or scrap copper, brass, iron, steel or other metals, or materials including but not limited to tires, household appliances, furniture, rope, rags, batteries, glass, rubber debris, waste, trash, construction debris, plumbing fixtures, or any discarded, dismantled, wrecked, scrapped, or mined motor vehicle or parts thereof.
- (e) "Junk motor vehicle" means a discarded, dismantled, wrecked, scrapped or mined passenger motor vehicle or parts thereof, an unregistered motor home not connected to water and/or sewer, or a passenger motor vehicle other than an on-premises utility vehicle which is allowed to remain unregistered and uninsured for a period of thirty days from the date of discovery. (Ord. O-17-09-02A § 1, 2017; Ord. O-16-04-01A § 3 (part), 2016)

## 5.40.040 Evidence of vacant structure. SHARE

Evidence of **vacant** structures may include any condition that on its own, or combined with other conditions present, would lead a reasonable person to believe that the structure is **vacant**. Such conditions include, but are not limited to: overgrown and/or dead vegetation; past due utility notices and/or disconnected utilities; accumulation of trash, junk and/or debris; boarded up windows; abandoned vehicles, auto parts or materials; the absence of or continually drawn window coverings such as curtains, blinds and/or shutters; the absence of furnishings and/or personal items consistent with habitation or occupancy; written or oral statements that the structure is **vacant** based on personal observation and belief by neighbors, passersby, delivery agents or utility agents, the city manager, building inspector, department of public works or police and fire department employees. (Ord. O-16-04-01A § 3 (part), 2016)

## 5.40.060 Vacant structures to be registered. SHARE

Record owners of **vacant** structures are required to register all such structures within ninety days of the first day of vacancy. Structures that are **vacant** as of July 1, 2016, must register no later than October 1, 2016. (Ord. O-16-04-01A § 3 (part), 2016)

## 5.40.070 Registration form—Content. SHARE

**Vacant** structures shall be documented using a **vacant** structure registration form, as prepared by the city building inspector, containing the following information:

- (a) The name of the record owner of the structure.
- (b) A mailing address where mail may be sent that will be acknowledged as received by the record owner. If certified mail/return receipt requested is sent to the address and the mail is returned marked "refused" or "unclaimed," or if ordinary mail sent to the address is returned for whatever reason, then such occurrence shall be prima facie proof that the record owner has failed to comply with this requirement.
- (c) If known, the name of an individual responsible for the care and control of the structure. Such individual may be the record owner, if the record owner is an individual, or may be someone other than the owner with whom he/she has contracted.
- (d) The current street address of the structure.
- (e) A current phone number, fax, and email address (if fax and email addresses are available) where communications may be sent that will be acknowledged as received by the record owner or individual responsible for the care and control of the structure. (Ord. O-16-04-01A § 3 (part), 2016)

#### CITY MANAGER REPORT:

Airport arrivals and Tribal Village Conference call: The airport arrival numbers are around 280+/- per week. The NSHC is rolling out electronic forms at Ted Stevens for both the city and the hospital. The goal is to reduce city staffing to two city staff at Nome's airport per day.

The village call at 11am continues every day.

**Governor Dunleavy:** Mayor Handeland, Bryant and I were invited to a last minute teleconference call with Governor Dunleavy to discuss the COVID-19 response by the City of Nome. He asked what help could be provided by state. As you may have seen in news reports, Governor Dunleavy believes the boroughs and cities are empowered to battle this virus under local rules.

**Public Safety Advisory Commission:** The Commission was scheduled to meet but failed to muster a quorum. I am trying to schedule another meeting before I leave for vacation.

**Police Staffing:** The City has begun an aggressive process for recruitment. Advertising on local media, to statewide and national sites such as indeed.com. Staff is developing an advertisement and asking tribal organizations to advertise it amongst their members.

**General Vanherck:** Instead of the proposed visit by General Vanherck of NorCom to Nome, the General teleconferenced with the Mayor, Joy, the General's staff and the Corp of Engineers to discuss the Port of Nome. Joy provided information and a power point on what the proposed expansion project would mean for economic development and the needs of the Navy and the Coast Guard.

Public Works: The hitch for the new snow blower has finally arrived and has been installed.

**CARES Act funding Phase 4:** The applications are out with a due date of November 13<sup>th</sup> at 5pm. As of this date the city has one application.

**Bids due:** The city received two bids for the Anodes replacement for the port. The city will be opening one bid for the sale of property.

**Staff meeting with Police:** Mike Heintzelman invited me to a "roll call"/ staff meeting to discuss issues and concerns in the NPD and how to address them. The officers are very appreciative about the equipment they have received over the past year. Many of the officer concerns were about the lack of community support in some segments of the community and how it could be addressed. This has been a tough year for the NPD and the PC and I will be addressing some of these issues the council.
