AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE ZONING MAP AND AMENDING TITLE 18 OF THE NOME CODE OF ORDINANCES WITH A NEW CHAPTER 18.62 DOWNTOWN MIXED USE DISTRICT, A NEW CHAPTER 18.66 DOWNTOWN CORE MIXED USE DISTRICT, AND AMENDMENTS TO SECTIONS 18.110.010 AND 18.30.010

IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED by the Nome Common Council as follows:

SECTION 1. Classification. This is a code ordinance.

SECTION 2. Amendment of 18.30.010. Section 18.30.010 Zoning Districts is hereby amended with the following revisions: [additions are <u>underlined</u>]

(a) In order to carry out the provision of this title, the city is divided into the following zoning districts:

SECTION 3. Addition of Chapter 18.62. Title 18 is hereby amended with the addition of a new Chapter 18.62 Downtown Mixed Use District to read as follows:

18.62.040	Dimensional requirements.

18.62.050 Performance standards.

18.62.010 Intent.

The downtown mixed use district is intended to encourage active commercial uses and building development, and contextually appropriate residential uses.

18.62.020 Permitted uses and structures.

The following uses and their accessory uses are permitted in the downtown mixed use district:

- (a) Retail and wholesale businesses.
- (b) Offices.
- (c) Churches.
- (d) Restaurants, taverns, and entertainment establishments.
- (e) Hospitals, medical and dental clinics.
- (f) Hotels and motels.
- (g) Public and governmental buildings and uses.
- (h) Incidental, small-scale manufacturing, processing, and storage of goods for wholesale or retail sale on the premises.
- (i) Residential use of the upper floor above a commercial use.
- (i) Funeral homes.
- (k) Service stations.
- (l) Clubs or fraternal, religious or philanthropic associations and union halls.
- (m) On-premises dwelling for owner or caretaker of commercial use.
- (n) Parks and playgrounds.
- (o) Schools.
- (p) Museums and cultural centers.
- (q) Interpretative area or visitor's center.
- (r) Recreational facilities.
- (s) Fire station and emergency medical aid station.
- (t) Outdoor storage, including junk, as an accessory use to any permitted or conditional use.
- (u) Boat marinas and docks.
- (v) Marine transportation and port facilities.
- (w) Navigation aids and facilities.
- (x) Personal service businesses.
- (y) Warehousing and storage.
- (z) Transportation facilities, including bus and taxi operations.
- (aa) Helicopter landing pad.
- (bb) Multifamily dwellings.
- (cc) Day care houses and facilities.

18.62.030 Conditional uses and structures.

The following uses are permitted with a conditional use permit in the downtown mixed use district:

- (a) Halfway houses.
- (b) Single-family and duplex dwellings.
- (c) Home occupations and businesses.
- (d) Public utility facilities or structures.
- (e) Snow dumpsites and storage sites.
- (f) Vehicle and equipment repair facilities.
- (g) Mobile homes and mobile home parks.
- (h) Residential use of the upper floor above a commercial or industrial use.
- (i) Youth correctional facility.
- (j) Private storage, including junk, or small warehouse associated with residential use/home occupations.
- (k) Crew camps, provided the following safeguards are addressed, in addition to other conditions that the planning commission finds necessary as they relate to the specific request:
 - (1) The use is tied to a specific and identified project;
 - (2) The term of the permit is limited to the earlier of completion of the project or five years following the issuance of the building permit for the crew camp; and
 - (3) A detailed schedule for deconstruction and removal is provided with the permit application, and updated on or before each anniversary date of the issuance of the conditional use permit.

18.62.040 Dimensional requirements.

The following dimensional requirements shall apply to all uses in the downtown mixed use district unless approved by variance as provided in Chapter 18.140 NCO:

- (a) Lot Size. The minimum lot area shall be five thousand square feet.
- (b) Building Setbacks.
 - (1) Buildings shall be set back at least zero feet from all dedicated rights-of-way.
 - (2) Buildings shall be set back at least five feet from all other lot boundary lines
 - (3) Buildings shall be set back at least ten feet from the top bank of any drainage ditch.
 - (4) Buildings shall be set back at least ten feet from a closed drainage system.

18.62.050 Performance standards.

All development shall be subject to the following performance standards:

(a) Drainage. The development shall provide a drainage system that is designed to deposit all runoff into either an engineered drainage system or into natural drainage in conformance with the city's drainage management plan.

- (b) Site Development Standards. All development on lands in this zoning district shall conform to the following:
 - (1) Development activities shall not adversely impact other properties by causing damaging alteration of surface water drainage, surface water ponding, slope failure, erosion, or siltation. The property owner and developer shall take such steps, including installation of culverts or buffers, or other methods, as necessary to comply with this requirement.
 - (2) Upon completion of earthwork operations, all exposed slopes, cleared, filled, and disturbed soils shall be given sufficient protection to prevent subsequent erosion.
 - (3) Drainage will be stabilized using best management practices and approved by the city.

SECTION 4. Addition of Chapter 18.66. Title 18 is hereby amended with the addition of a new Chapter 18.66 Downtown Core Mixed Use District to read as follows:

ORDINANCE OF THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NOME, ALASKA, DELAYING THE IMPOSITION OF SALES TAX RATE INCREASE IF RATIFIED BY VOTERS

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. O-25-06-09 provides that a sales tax levy increase from 5% to 6% shall become effective following the certification of election results showing that the proposition is approved by a majority vote of those qualified voters actually voting on the question at the election; and

WHEREAS, the next municipal election will be held on October 7, 2025, with certification of the election results to occur soon thereafter; and

WHEREAS, the council desires to provide sellers subject to the city's sales tax time to prepare for a change in the rate of levy should the voters ratify the change;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NOME, ALASKA:

Section 1. Classification. This is a code non-ordinance.

Section 2. Change in Rate of Levy Delayed. Notwithstanding Section 4 of Ordinance No. O-25-06-09, an increase in the city's sales tax rate of levy, if ratified by the voters at the city's October 7, 2025 municipal election, shall not go into effect until January 1, 2026. Accordingly, any change in the rate of levy resulting from Ordinance No. O-25-06-09 is hereby suspended, and the sales tax rate of levy imposed by NCO 17.10.010 shall remain at 5%, until January 1, 2026.

Section 3. **Effective Date.** This ordinance shall be effective upon adoption.

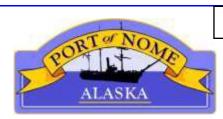

Re: Port Director/Project Manager Report – July 2025

Administration:

Vessel call activity evolves daily as cargo, fuel and equipment transshipments, and rock export barges are impacted by weather at both the loading points and delivery destinations. Ship calls have now started blending into the schedule, bringing more vehicle traffic into the mix, and requiring additional coordination for safety. Efforts continue to eliminate unnecessary clutter being left within the laydown and storage areas, with personnel committed to consolidating areas in order to maximize use of the available footprints. Although several areas still need attention, port and public works staff are committed to making improvements in each of the location to ensure the entire property is being fully utilized.

Federal agency funding opportunities continue to be received and flagged for determining eligibility to fund existing port and harbor projects. A few more P3 options have surfaced with potential partners interested in the port expansion, and are being pursued to determine if realistic.

Strategic Development Plan:

PND and Corvus have completed and submitted the final Port of Nome Strategic Development Plan. Port staff are reviewing table of contents and reference links to ensure accuracy before publishing to the website, and advising of it's availability. We sincerely appreciate the efforts of numerous individuals and organizations that attended the multiple meetings necessary to complete this plan, and look forward to using this important tool to achieve completion of projects identified as essential to the facility.

Causeway:

<u>Arctic Deep Draft Port – Nome Modifications (Construction Bid Award):</u>

The construction solicitation for Phase 1A, representing a smaller project scope from the original Phase 1 plan, closed on 28 April 2025. All proposals received on Sam.gov, are currently under review by the USACE Alaska District's Contracting Office. Providing there is an eligible bid within funding limits, award is anticipated by Aug 2025.

Local Service Facilities (LSF) Inspection Integration:

The City design team stands by to respond to questions from USACE on the Phase 1A proposals to ensure bidder conformance to requirements on the LSF components. Both teams continue with design of Phase 2 (dredging), with bid package solicitation anticipated to be released in May 2026, with award expected in the Aug 2026 timeframe.

There are several funding strategies underway to address LSF cost-share needs for future phases of the project.

U.S. DOT Maritime Administration (MARAD) - Port Infrastructure Development Program (PIDP) Grant Pre-Av

Discussions continue with program staff on the remaining pre-award requirements for this grant. This will then allow the \$11.25M grant agreement to be executed, along with a separate funding agreement for the \$1.025M that Rep Peltola successfully placed into the FY2025 USDOT budget to supplement the PIDP award to Nome. (Pre-award requirements for this project are similar to those that will now be tied to the USDOT Build award.)

Harbor:

Inner Harbor CAP 107 Study (Deepen/Widen the Inner Basin):

The Alaska District continues to recommend a General Investigation (GI) Study. We continue working with the project team on next steps, including the estimated local cost-share and proposed schedule (as well as remedies through the CODEL). Information has been submitted directly to USACE Headquarters regarding the failure to adequately address the concerns of this project in a timely manner, before the feasibility budget was fully expended, and 3-year timeline was exhausted.

Snake River Moorage Facility:

USDOT finally reached out to the City on 9 July 2025 to begin the pre-award process for the USDOT/BUILD award the City received in Jan 2025. These requirements must be completed prior to executing a grant agreement for the \$13.2M award. A meeting will be scheduled with the agency to discuss building the necessary checklist and prepare submittals.

Port Industrial Pad:

West Nome Tank Farm (WNTF) - Property Conveyance:

The conveyance package, as signed by the Mayor, was transmitted on 5 May 2025 for signatures by USACE and ADEC. Although all parties agreed the documents were in a final state and ready for signature, one of the USAF attorneys is evaluating whether an additional change is needed to the Environmental Covenant document, which now has the process on hold again. Last week, the City and State attorney's both expressed a position that no further changes are needed, but the issue is not yet resolved. More to come...

On a separate note, a contractor for the USAF (AF) was in town on 9 July 2025, and did a site visit with NJUS, Public Works and Port staff regarding boring locations for the ongoing sampling the AF is required to perform. The large quantity of locations was reduced to ensure they did not conflict with buried utility infrastructure. Also, the proposed boring sites for City-owned lots 2 and 3 were put on temporary hold, until the AF can share the long-term plan these sites as there is potential conflict with shore-side development associated with the Snake River Moorage Project. A meeting is planned for the week of 21 July 2025 to discuss in more detail.

<u>Thornbush Laydown Site Development (TBS):</u>

A Rough-Order-of-Magnitude (ROM) cost estimate is still in investigated, with alternatives to perform incremental work being considered throughout the summer season. Funding opportunities continue to be evaluated in an effort to complete development of the remaining acreage in a cost-effective manner. The pad remains in a constant evolving state, as individual user and contractor storage needs are considered and efforts made to maximize the usable surface.

Port Rd. Improvements (ADOT Project cost-shared with City):

This state STIP project has been postponed to approximately 2030 to avoid conflicting with the heavier truck traffic during the port expansion, and to facilitate a more productive repair following the project.

FEMA DR4672 Merbok Recover Projects:

Cape Nome Jetty Repair:

Contractor has been actively working on the project since the construction template and pre-construction survey were approved on 10/11 June 2025. The project schedule has achieved substantial progress since that time, with completion anticipated by the end of July 2025 – barring any significant weather impacts to the in-water work. Site inspections will follow as soon as construction is complete, with project closeout expected by end of Aug 2025.

Seawall Repairs:

Storm repairs to the east end of the Nome Seawall have been budgeted by FEMA, with Public Works & Port staff currently working to determine the level of assistance that will be required from local contractors to excavate the affected area, along with to haul/place rock to fill voids identified by engineers/surveyors. This work is expected to be completed no later than 30 Sep 2025.

Causeway Road/3 Docks Repairs:

Additional road/dock repairs are anticipated to be performed before freeze-up to replace lost material along the road and all 3 Causeway docks. This will meet the scope of work identified from storm damage, reduce future loss, and improve both the subsurface and surfacing in the busiest traffic areas on the Causeway.

Causeway Utilities (under bridge) Repairs:

Repairs to the under-side bridge infrastructure belonging to the Corps, City, and NJUS are complete, with the federal personnel completing their inspections just before the holiday weekend. Although all utility services were operational while waiting for the repair work, permanent infrastructure is now back in place. We expect FEMA personnel will be performing inspections later in 2025, to ensure all storm repairs have been completed.

A huge thanks to City of Nome staff Angie Nguyen, Dan Grimmer, Cole Cushman, JJ Alvanna, NJUS Thomas Simonsson, Tom Nguyen, Cynthia Gray and Jovan Dull for their help in hosting, driving, setting up, managing the IT connection, and the zoom participation, and the mics to help make this event successful. Cheryl Thompson helped host an evening reception at the City Museum. Many thanks to the drummers and dancers from Teller, Wales, and King Island who volunteers their energy and time to help welcome guests and share in the excitement of Inuit culture of the region.
- April 19, 2025, Stephanie Queen, Economic Development Consultant for the City of Nome hosted a public open house on the City of Nome Economic Development Strategic Plan. Stephanie focused on citizen engagement on issues such as housing, youth, tourism and quality of life.
- May 5, 2025 Assistant City Manager Megan Onders, Human Resources Director Cynthia Gray, and Accounts Payable Tech II Jovan Dull attended the Native Village of Solomon's Missing Murdered Indigenous Peoples Day Event at the Nome Rec Center. Members of the public commented on NPDs Missing Person Protocol. Please find attached for the Nome Common Council leadership and the public, the Missing Person Protocol of the NPD.
- May 12, 2025 Megan Onders gave an empowerment speech to the high school government class at the invitation of government teacher Ryan Wharry.
- May 13, 2025 Stephanie Queen conducted a youth survey on vision and values with Mr. Ryan Wharry's government class.
- May 19, 2025 CM Lee Smith and Megan Onders met with the Sitnasuak Elders Committee to hear concerns as well as vision for economic development.
- May 28, 2025 City of Nome managers meeting with Tourism officials for 2025 cruise ship plans and city support coordination meeting. A huge thanks to Cole at Public Works for moving bus stops for local fundraising.
- May 30, 2025, the PIO issued a budget survey at the request of City Council Member Cameron Piscoya.



- Nome Eskimo Community, City of Nome Meeting on the East End Roads Upgrade Project. Nome Eskimo Community shared with City officials their 50% design plans to upgrade the culverts and storm drains, as well as other roads upgrades.
- June 8-11, 2025, Megan participated in an oil spill response drill hosted by the U.S. Coast Guard, the Alaska Chadux Network, and the State of Alaska's Department of Environmental Conservation. Representing the City of Nome in the exercise as Incident Command were Charlie Lean and Tom Vaden. City of Nome staff were embedded across the Coast Guard response teams to witness the organization of a large-scale multi-agency response.
- Megan completed of two training courses provided by FEMA to certify the City of Nome in utilizing FEMA's Integrated Public Alert & Warning System
- Crisis Communication Plan Lee and Megan continue to review, and update language for the establishment of Nome's Crisis Communications Plan provided by the PR Firm Thompson and Company.
- Missing person events occurred in Nome on June 2 and June 8. Megan issued notifications to the press and the public, as well as outreach to State agencies in coordination with Danielle Slingsby and Kallie Paniataaq, the Nome Volunteer Fire Department Public Information officials.
- May 29, 2025, PR published on Building Inspector services at the City of Nome. The public is encouraged to visit nomealaska.org/building for required permits including
 - 1. All New Construction;
 - 2. Demolition of Existing Structures;
 - 3. Mechanical/Electrical Work;
 - 4. Moving Structures;
 - 5. Remodeling Structures; and
 - 6. Excavation/Fill
- June 3, 2025, developed curriculum in partnership for a 1 hour employee briefing on the history of Nome, Nome's federally recognized tribes, tribal organizations, Native corporations, and languages and communication protocols for Nome and the Bering Strait region.
- June 13, 2025, City of Nome, Nome Tribes meeting to advance government to government cooperation.
- May 30 -June 30, 2025 conducted a City of Nome Economic Development Strategy plan survey to hear from the public on economic and community priorities. Results will be incorporated into Nome's Economic Development Strategic Plan.
- Q4 Press Releases attached are press releases for 2025 Q4 announcing the hiring of new City Manager Lee Smith, the City of Nome Arctic Investment Summit, on NPD's police accreditation, and missing person events in Nome.

Economic Development Strategic Plan – In February, 2025 the City of Nome commenced the development an Economic Development Strategic Plan with project consultant Stephanie Queen and Assistant City Manager Megan Onders. The Plan will guide





municipal resources and programs in ways that help shape the community's future and drive economic growth. Two events were convened in April, the City of Nome Investment Summit on April 18, and a Public Open House on April 19. A community-wide 'Vision' survey was conducted through the month of June. More than 60 community members participated, and results are being analyzed.

Stephanie Queen is organizing task forces of Nome stakeholders on tourism, education and workforce development, as well as entrepreneurship and small business support. Megan Onders is organizing an Infrastructure Coordination Committee, with housing, transportation, and water/sewer subcommittees to spur federal, state, and tribal investment into Nome's core infrastructure. Each task force will convene in the late summer/early fall of 2025 to review existing data, define key issues, conduct a SWOT, develop goals, objectives, and strategies, identify partners and resources for implementation and help prioritize next steps.

The **City of Nome Investment Summit** convened thought leaders on the geopolitical future of Nome including the Resources Development Council, Graphite One, the Marine Exchange of Alaska, Huna Totem (Southeast village corp. with large scale tourism operations), Johns Hopkins University, UIC Science, the North Pacific Research Board, the University of Alaska, PT Capital, the Alaska Bond Bank, the Denali Commission, and U.S. Senator Lisa Murkowski. Local and regional representation included the Bering Straits Native Corporation, Kawerak Inc., the King Island Native Corporation, the Nome Visitor Center and Chamber of Commerce, Nome Eskimo Community, Bering Straits Regional Housing Authority and Norton Sound Health Corporation.

Bering Strait Development Council – on behalf of the City of Nome, Megan was selected as Chair of the Bering Strait Development Council on April 1, 2025. The BSDC is the Alaska Regional Development Organization (ARDOR) for the region and serves as the planning body for federal Economic Development Administration programs. The ARDOR is staffed by Kawerak's Program Director for Community Planning and Development, Amanda Toerdal. The BSDC is a 16-member board representing interests such as transportation, minerals, communication, tourism, banking, fishing, labor, education, utilities, natural resources, workforce development, tribal councils, Bering Strait Native Corporation, and Kawerak. The BSDC serves as a liaison for local government, businesses and economic interest with the State and Federal government; as well as coordinates public and private efforts to advance economic and social opportunities for the region. Attached is the recently adopted 2025-2030 Bering Strait Community Economic Development Strategy (CEDS). **The next meeting of the ARDOR will be 7/24.** Megan has established an agenda focused on increasing access to housing finance within Nome and the region by convening HUD and financial institutions.

CHAPTER 506 MISSING PERSONS AND RUNAWAY MINORS

506.010 DEFINITIONS

Definitions as used in this chapter:

Adult Missing Person - a person 18 years of age or older who is reported missing under mysterious circumstances, a failure to reach a destination in a reasonable amount of time, or an inexplicable separation from a traveling companion.

Juvenile Missing Person - a person under the age of 18 who is missing and is not classed as a runaway due to their past history and/or stability.

Juvenile Runaway - a person under the age of 18 reported missing by a family member or legal guardian and who is known to have a history of running away or has shown indications of avoiding their legal guardian.

Missing Person/Search and Rescue - A person unaccounted for at the conclusion of a search and rescue operation. (Until the person is found, either alive or deceased, their record will be retained in the missing persons database.)

506.020 MISSING PERSONS REPORT AND INVESTIGATION PROCEDURES

- **A.** Missing persons report required. Every case of a missing person/runaway juvenile requires the immediate completion of a missing person report.
- **B.** APSIN/NCIC entry required within 24 hours. An APSIN/NCIC missing person entry must be made as soon as practical, but in no case later than 24 hours after report. [Ref. AS 47.10.141]
- C. Clearinghouse notice required within 48 hours. Department personnel are required to notify the Missing Persons Information Clearinghouse of all runaway or missing persons at the earliest opportunity and in all cases within 48 hours of initial report of disappearance. For a person under 21 years of age, a local or state law enforcement agency shall transmit a missing person report for entry into the Alaska Public Safety Information Network and the National Crime Information Center computer system as soon as practicable, but not later than two hours after receiving the report [Ref. AS 18.65.620]

Information will be submitted to the clearinghouse by mail, telephone, fax, email, or TWIX as follows:

1. as soon as practical, copies of the CFS and missing person data shall be faxed to the Clearinghouse

- (FAX [(907)269-7032)], however, if this is not possible, or if no report is available, notification may be made by phone to (907)269-5497; and
- 2. mail a copy of the missing person report or search and rescue report, photographs, Photograph Release Form, and Medical or Dental records to:

Missing Persons Information Clearinghouse 5700 E. Tudor Road Anchorage, Alaska 99507.

- **D.** Actions upon locating missing person. Department personnel who become aware of a found missing person will immediately notify the Clearinghouse and arrange to remove all APSIN/NCIC missing persons locates.
- **E.** Investigation of missing persons cases. Appropriate investigative steps will be taken in all cases of reported missing persons and will follow the **MISSING PERSON CHECKLIST**. These efforts will include the gathering of information and records that can be used as aids in immediately locating the missing person or identifying the missing person at a later date. Investigating officers will:
 - 1. attempt to locate a photograph of the missing person and immediately circulate missing person information via media and social media sources such as radio, Nome Announce and Facebook. Prior to use of traditional or social media, officers must receive authorization from a supervisor prior to release to ensure that investigative objectives are not unintentionally compromised.
 - 2. attempt to locate copies of medical and dental records of the missing person. This is accomplished by delivering a Medical/Dental Records Release form to the medical facility having records who will then release records relevant to the identity of the missing person. These records should be sent to the Clearinghouse if the case is not resolved within 48 hours. Officers can obtain Medical/Dental Records Release forms in two ways; either:
 - (a) have the family complete Medical/Dental Records Release; or
 - (b) if the family, next of kin, or legal guardian cannot be located or does not exist, complete Medical/Dental Records Release and contact the local providers in the event a search warrant is needed.
- **F.** Copies of reports to be sent to Clearinghouse. A copy of completed police reports on missing persons, runaway minors, or search and rescues where persons remain missing will be sent to the Clearinghouse regardless of previous notifications.
- G. On-going investigation. The investigation of a missing person is considered closed or "cold" only if the individual in question has been found either deceased or alive and the Chief of Police approves the case to be set as that status. Otherwise the case is considered OPEN and all leads will be investigated and a case point person will be the contact, normally the Investigator. The Chief of Police in efforts with local Search and Rescue (SAR) members are the only individuals allowed to stop a search or cease search efforts.

506,030 MISSING PERSONS INFORMATION CLEARINGHOUSE

- A. Purpose of Missing Persons Information Clearinghouse. AST/ABI is mandated under AS 18.65.600 to operate a clearinghouse for information concerning missing persons, and to establish appropriate procedures for the reporting of missing persons by all law enforcement agencies. The Clearinghouse, established within the Alaska Bureau of Investigation, maintains a database of missing persons and provides forms to collect, maintain, and disseminate accurate and complete information on missing persons.
- **B.** Missing Persons Information Clearinghouse responsibilities. The responsibilities of the Clearinghouse are established as in: AS 18.65.610.

- *C. Information in the Clearinghouse database.* The clearinghouse computer may be queried for information using any of the following data elements: name, AKA (nickname), age range, physical description, clothing description (when provided), or location of disappearance.
- **D.** AMBER (America's Missing: Broadcast Emergency Response). The Alaska AMBER Alert System is a cooperative public service alert to aid in the safe recovery of abducted children. It is a voluntary partnership between law enforcement agencies, broadcasters, media, and the public to provide an urgent bulletin in the most serious child-abduction cases. The television and radio broadcast Emergency Alert System (EAS), email, social media, and the State's transportation 511 system is used to distribute a description of the abducted child and suspected abductor. The goal of the Alaska AMBER Alert system is to provide rapid, widespread information to the public on endangered, abducted children to aid in their safe return.

AMBER Alert Hotline: 866-AKAMBER - (866-252-6237)

Activation requires:

- 1. Nome Police Department believes a child is an imminent danger of serious bodily injury or death and reasonable belief an abduction of a child under the age of 18 has occurred. The abduction is a child 17 years or younger. Nome Police Department must believe that the immediate broadcast to the public will enhance the efforts of law enforcement to locate the child and apprehend the suspect and have as much information available to describe the event. All information must have been entered into NCIC.
- *E. SILVER Alert.* State of Alaska Silver Alert System Silver Alert is a voluntary partnership between law enforcement agencies, state and local government, and Alaska's media and broadcasters to alert the public when a vulnerable adult is missing and believed to be in serious danger. The system uses media and broadcast releases, email, social media, and the State's transportation 511 system to distribute a description of the missing adult. Silver Alert Hotline: 855-SILVR99 (855-745-8799)
 - 1. Nome Police Department Officers must have had training either through Alaska Department of Public Safety Training Academy or previous training and experience either before employment through Nome Police Department or during that provides help with interacting with individuals with cognitive impairment, not limited to dementia, intellectual and developmental disabilities and brain injuries.

506.040 HANDLING RUNAWAY MINORS

- **A. Disposition of runaway minors.** If a runaway minor is contacted by a department member and is not subject to arrest or detention, the member will take the minor into protective custody and the member shall:
 - 1. return the minor to the legal custodian at the legal custodian's residence if the residence is in the same community where the minor was found and if the legal custodian consents to the return, except that the member may not use this option if the member has reasonable cause to believe that the minor has experienced physical or sexual abuse in the legal custodian's household;
 - 2. take the minor to a nearby location agreed to by the legal custodian if the legal custodian does not consent to return of the minor under (1), except that the member may not use this option if the member has reasonable cause to believe that the minor has experienced physical or sexual abuse in the legal custodian's household; or
 - 3. if disposition of the minor is not made under (1) or (2), take the minor to an office specified by the Department of Health and Social Services (OCS), a program for runaway minors licensed by the Department of Health and Social Services under AS 47.10.310, a shelter for runaways that has a permit from the Department of Health and Social Services under AS 47. 32 that agrees to shelter the minor, or a facility or contract agency of the Department of Health and Social Services.
 - (a) If the member plans to take the minor to an office, program, shelter, or facility under (3), the

member shall give the highest priority to taking the minor to an office, program, shelter, or facility that is semi- secure.

- (b) If an office specified by the Department of Health and Social Services (OCS), a licensed program for runaway minors, a shelter for runaways that will accept the minor, or a facility or contract agency of the Department of Health and Social Services does not exist in the community, the member shall take the minor to another suitable location and promptly notify the Department of Health and Social Services.
- (c) Without a court order a minor in protective custody may not be housed in a jail or other detention facility but may be housed in a semi-secure portion of an office, program, shelter, or other facility.
- **B. Runaway minors to receive written and verbal advisement of rights.** A department member shall immediately, upon taking a minor into protective custody, advise the minor of available mediation services and of the right to social services under 47.10.142(b). The member will complete the Advisement of Rights of Runaway Minor form and provide a copy to the minor. The member shall also advise the legal custodian, if known, that the minor has been taken into protective custody and that counseling services for the custodian and the minor's household may be available.
- *C. Health and Social Services responsible for care of runaway minors.* Contact the Department of Health and Social Services (OCS) for offices or facilities where minors can be taken.
- **D. Third party custody of runaway minors.** The Chief of Police will establish procedures for recording the date and time that members of the department receive notification made under AS 11.51.130(a)(4)(B), Contributing to the Delinquency of a Minor. That sub-section requires a person to notify a peace officer, a law enforcement agency, or the Office of Children's Services of the name of a minor and the minor's location. The notification is required if the person is keeping a minor from the minor's guardian because the person reasonably believes that the minor is in danger of physical injury or in need of temporary shelter. The procedures required under this section will include advising the Office of Children's Services that the department has received such notification and the details of that notification.

On April 29, 2025 the Nome Police Department (NPD) received accreditation from the Oregon Alliance Standard/Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies. This achievement represents years of hard work to not only earn and build trust with the community, but also improve operations, training and response.

On June, 7, 2021, the City of Nome's Public Safety Advisory Commission (PSAC) passed a motion recommending NPD pursue accreditation through the Oregon Alliance Standard. The PSAC plays an important role in guiding the City of Nome and the NPD.

The purpose of accreditation is to ensure the policies and operations of NPD fosters accountability, transparency, and training of officers. The accreditation process included a systemic internal review of operating standards against best practices in community policing, personnel management, and the handling of evidence.

"I would like to express my thanks to Nome's police officers, dispatch, evidence, victim services and administrative staff for their commitment to the public safety of Nome. We understand that accreditation is not an end all, be all, but that it will take the ongoing work of our staff in service to the community of Nome. We have made advances investigating crimes of domestic violence and sexual assault and we will not stop," said Chief William Crockett of the Nome Police Department.

An annual average of 120-150 sexual assaults previously reported was reduced to 29 in 2024. NPD now has advocates on staff to work in partnership with investigative officers to examine every case. They continue to review and investigate prior cases as well to bring justice to victims.

Mayor John Handeland commented, "On behalf of the City Council, I express our appreciation of the hard work and the dedication of the NPD employees. They not only listened to the public's concerns and those of the Public Safety Advisory Commission, they took action. Accreditation was achieved through long hours and hard work of all NPD staff. We are very fortunate to have such a dedicated team working to assure public safety in our community. I am hopeful the rates continue to decline, but we will investigate every report. Our victim's advocates stand ready to assist any person in reporting an assault. I am confident we can build a better history."

NOME, ALASKA — With the Arctic region growing in global importance, the City of Nome is convening a major investment summit on April 18, 2025, followed by a public engagement open house on April 19. 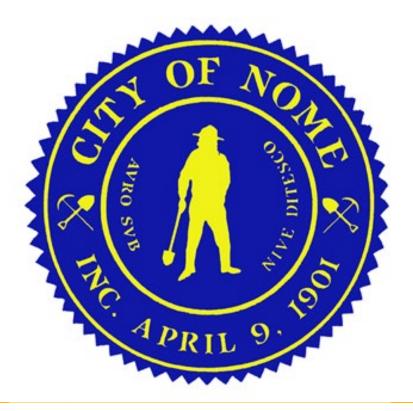

Bering Sea Lions Club Youth Book Donation for Giveaway Books (\$3,000):

The Bering Sea Lions Club donated \$3,000 to the library during the fourth quarter of FY25. This enabled the library to purchase youth books and giveaway books for our summer reading program and additional youth programming throughout the year. We are so very thankful for this donation, as this in an important opportunity to get more books into Nome youth home libraries. Research has shown that having a home library of books benefits youth in many ways. This includes increasing literacy and academic growth for youth in Nome.

FY2025 Library Programming Success:

During the fourth quarter of FY2025, the library welcomed over 1,030 patron visits to its youth and adult programming. This includes preschool story hour, summer youth programming, time capsule family movie mornings, Library Teen Advisory events, Nactec Class visits, Summercise story week, class visits to learn about our summer reading program (includes a record number of 18 class visits) and the Bird Migration Event with scientist Roxy Bathrick. We were very happy to partner with Norton Sound Health Corporation's CAMP department during their summercise camp to offer a drama program that incorporates library story books. The program finished with very happy and proud families being invited to a Jack and the Beanstock play.

2025 Summer Reading Program:

The themes for our summer reading program this year are "Level Up at Your Library" and "Color Your World". Registration for the summer reading program began in June this year. We have welcomed class visits during the Spring to tour the library and learn about the summer reading program. We had a record number of class visits this year totally 18 classes from Kindergarten

to High School during the fourth quarter of 2025. During the summer we have offered youth programming which includes a story hour recommended for ages 3 to 7 every week and a youth craft and library activity program every week recommended for youth ages 8 to 13. We have also offered time capsule family movie mornings representing a movie from every decade since the time capsule was created in the summer of 1990.

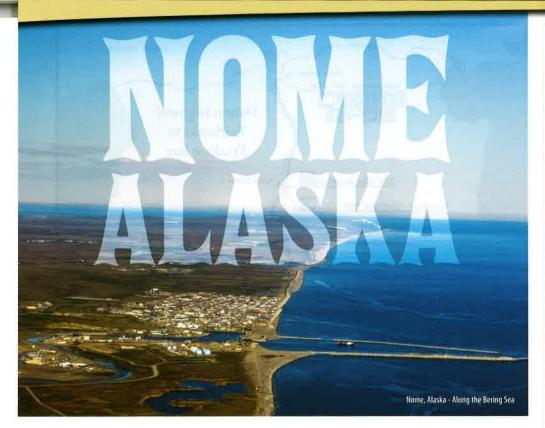
April was a less busy month visitor-wise. We received several calls from people seeking information on past relatives and on interest in donating items from Nome. Staff and I attached all photos that were taken by Michael Burnett to the appropriate Pastperfect accessions. I attended the Economic Summit that was organized by Megan Onders. There were some good ideas and questions. We had two visits by NACTEC kids. Tom Vaden donated to the Museum a large seal oil lamp from Wales. April 30th was the last day of work for Hannah Anderson.

May brought on Dustin Koehler as Collections Assistant. He comes from an aerospace background so he is really helping the Museum to upgrade technology. He changed out two non-working ipads and put new video material on the new replacements. He is also going through our collection of old VHS tapes and digitizing them. These include lots of Hello Central with Richard Beneville. The Museum had four class visits for the end of the school year.

The start of June brought the scanning equipment and one technician in to rescan some pages and confirm blank pages in the Recorders Books which were scanned last fall. When these are processed, the project will be complete and we will have searchable files. Ryan Wharry, Beltz History teacher who worked Saturdays most of the winter is working 25 hours per week most of the summer. He greets visitors, leads tours and is also helping digitize our VHS and films. He and Dustin brought more of the smoke damaged items out of the conex and into the storage area to be cleaned as well as possible. The Westerdam visit on June 19th was a very busy day. Lots of very interested guests including Nome's previous City Clerk Leslie Wessel came in. The next day I helped Jennifer Dean Johnson plant flower seeds with the kids on Children's Day sponsored by Kawerak's Child Advocacy Center. The next week brought Audubon Society members from Hawaii. They came in 2 groups to tour the Museum. We had good discussions about similarities of ancient tool use and design between Alaska and Hawaii. They come to see a specific Plover that winters in their backyards and summers here in Alaska. They also give generous donations. The last of the month I planted 'dredge bucket daisies' as Nancy Maguire called them, in all the dredge buckets at the Foster Building. They should fill in and come back next year. We are making plans to take down the felt exhibit and put up a local art show at the end of July-first of August.

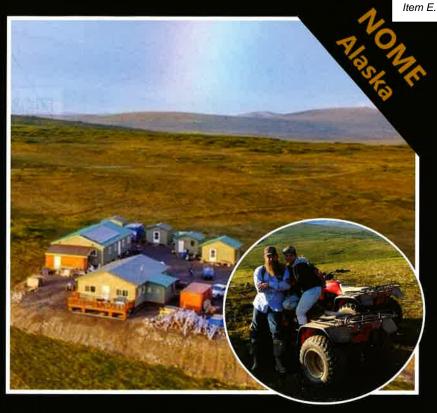

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photographing the remnants of 100 years of gold exploration. Nome's gold rush history is legendary and gold still plays a large part here. Numerous small mining companies operate in the hills and every summer people camp on the beach to search for gold in the garnet-laced "ruby sands of Nome,"

For two weeks, Nome hosts the "Mardi Gras of the North" during the world famous Iditarod Race, which finishes on Front Street every year in March. Nome is also the halfway point for the world's longest, toughest snowmachine race, the Iron Dog.

Scenic Drives out of Nome

The three roads that originate in Nome lead in different directions, winding through a variety of dramatic wilderness landscapes of tundra, seacoast, and mountain valleys carved by sparkling clear rivers.

Abundant wildlife can often be seen from (or on) the road, including prehistoric muskox, reindeer, moose, bear, fox, and many of the approximately 180 species of birds that frequent or accidentally drop by the area. Hillsides are carpeted with 200 kinds of wildflowers in the warm months, and exceptional berry picking is at its zenith in mid-August, Fishing, camping, and biking are all extraordinary along these routes. Nome saw the last great Gold Rush, evidenced by old mining towns, abandoned gold dredges, railroad cars, historic wooden trestles, and "The Last Train to Nowhere."

The Nome-Council Road is optimally a 2-hour and 72-mile drive to the east with sweeping coastal views, ending at the small community of Council The 85-mile Nome-Taylor Road (also called Beam or Kougarok Road) winds north past old mining

claims, popular Salmon Lake, and a side road to historic Pilgrim Hot Springs. The N Item F. ends at the namesake Inupiat village northwest of Nome and a mere 108 1111

The roads are gravel, only passable in summer, and seriously prone to rugged potholes. Make arrangements in advance to rent a 4-wheel drive vehicle, or guided tours are also available. You can take a closer look at these routes and their many dozens of designated points of interest on the following comprehensive website and see for yourself what adventures await: alaska.org/destination/nome/ scenic-drives.

A Birder's Paradise

Nome and the surrounding countryside have become known as one of the best places in the world to easily see a huge array of birds, both domestic and wind-blown Asian exotics rarely spotted in North America. The best time for birding is late May and early June, after the Bering Sea ice spring breakup ushers in the annual migration. Vast swaths of pristine nesting areas, long days, and abundant food allow for great viewing into mid-August when migration is in full swing.

The Nome road system provides access to different species along each of the three routes, and you don't even have to get out of your car to add dozens of new sightings to your life list! You'll even find quality birding on ponds, wetlands and beaches right in town. If you're visiting without a car, try the mouth of the Nome River, Cemetery Pond, and East End Park. Even through the winter buntings and other species are plentiful at Nome feeding stations.

The Northwest Campus of University of Alaska Fairbanks in Nome offers extremely affordable, daylong birding field trips for a much lower fee than dedicated birding tours. Usually held on the



last weekend in May and first weekend in June, destinations typically include the coast road to Safety Sound and the Kougarok Road over two days. Less than twenty miles from Nome on the Council Road, Safety Sound is an immense migrant trap before breakup, while Council is the only place to see forest dwelling birds. It's typical to spot between 65 and 80 species on each of these field trips. There are also affordable local guides for hire.

If you're planning a trip to Nome at the height of birding season, be sure to book lodging well in advance. Visitors can check the Birding Board at the Nome Visitors Center to see what species have been spotted lately, download area guides and checklists, and find social media updates on current sightings.

Museum and Cultural Center

The Richard Foster Building, located at 7th and Steadman, houses the Carrie M. McLain Memorial Museum, Kawerak's Katirvik Cultural Center and Kegoayah Kozga Library.

Carrie McLain came to Nome as a young girl in the early 1900s and spent her adult life collecting oral histories, ivory artwork, and historical photos from the surrounding area. Opening in 1967, the museum collection was greatly expanded through generous donations of photographs, artifacts, and archives. Interactive exhibits feature the landscape, Alaska Native artwork, and the town of Nome from Tent City beginnings to its present-day role as a regional hub. Step inside a miner's tent, listen to audio recordings in one of Nome's old telephone booths, and imagine mushing across the tundra as you check out a sled from the 1st Iditarod sled dog race. Relax in the minitheatre for even more tales from Nome's early days, and browse the museum's gift shop for related books, photos, and clothing items.

The Katirvik Cultural Center was established



in 2016 to realize the vision of regional elders to celebrate, educate and share the rich culture and heritage of the Bering Strait. The center hosts displays that represent themes embodying aspects of the culture of Inupiaq, Central Yupik, and St. Lawrence Island peoples.

Festivals in Nome

Nome is a lively, friendly town hosting a wealth of community events nearly every month. Of course Nome celebrates with a July 4th spectacular, community Thanksgiving dinner, Christmas

Extravaganza, and the Midnight Sun Festival complete with a staged bank robbery. Sports and competition feature in the wintertime Bering Sea Ice Classic Golf Tournament and summer-long softball games, the wacky Great Bathtub Race down Front Street and Labor Day Rubber Duck Race, Nome River Raft Race, Polar Bear Swim, the backcountry walk-run-or-bike Wyatt Earp Dexter Challenge, and the Cannonball and Nome-Golovin Snowmachine Races. The 2300-mile Iron Dog Snowmachine Race is the world's longest and toughest, so racers and the



Nome community enjoy a festive banquet halfway through the race.

Then, there's the Iditarod Trail Invitational in March when a select group of (fool)hardy souls test themselves against Alaska's winter elements, traversing the famed trail by mountain bike, skis, or on foot. The 5K shoreline Gold Dust Dash offers up a gold nugget to the winner, while the Poor Man's Beach Gold Panning Contest pits participants against each other to see who can find gold first in their bag of pay dirt.

Summerfest joyfully celebrates youth and art, while shopping for unique, hand-made items is a breeze at Nome's arts and crafts fairs, the largest of which is held during Iditarod Week in mid-March. The Nome Arts Council hosts the two-day Alappaa Film Festival, and biannual Open Mic events showcasing music, dance, poetry and storytelling. The Salmonberry Jam Folk Fest is three fun-filled days of local and guest music artists, workshops, dancing, crafts, and community cookout. The Blueberry Festival features arts and crafts, music and delightful blueberry concoctions. Check the Alaska.org website for more information or contact the Nome Visitors Center to determine what's happening during your visit.

Pilgrim Hot Springs

Located 60 road miles from Nome off Kougarok Road, Pilgrim Hot Springs is a lush, treed oasis with a unique past. On the National Register of Historic Places, the 320-acre property is positioned in the tundra between Hen and Chickens Hill and the Kigluaik Mountain range. Pilgrim Hot Springs was purchased in late 2009 from the Catholic Bishop of Northern Alaska by a consortium of seven indigenous organizations in the Bering Strait region who formed Unaatuq, LLC.

Uunaqtuq (it is warm or hot) was an important site recognized within the Qawiaraqmiut traditional territory with a long history of use that continues to the present. Honored as a very special place where animals and edible plants were available for subsistence even in winter, the Native people respectfully used the springs in times of need, enjoying healing hot water soaks surrounded by the

Admired Craftsmanship

In 2016, a chance encounter with a group of cruise ship passengers changed the course of Alice's life. Alice's job was greeting tourists disembarking in Nome, Alaska, from the Crystal Serenity's maiden voyage—the first luxury cruise ship to transit the Northwest Passage. Wearing a traditional native garment called a Kuspuk/ Qaspaq, Alice warmly welcomed passengers to the land her ancestors had called home for time immemorial. The guests commented on her coat and asked if it was waterproof, as they were looking for a jacket that would keep them dry in the rain. Unfortunately, the tourists were out of luck, but the idea of designing and selling waterproof Kuspuk/ Qaspaqs was planted in Alice's imagination. Today, through an abundance of creativity and determination, Naataq Gear was born, and everyone can wear a modern take on a piece of clothing that honors Alice's heritage and shares with the world the rich culture of ancestral craftsmanship, ensuring a historical link to a long line of Native women who sewed for their family and community.

Stitched in Tradition

The word Kuspuk/Qaspaq is the phonetic translation, which means "cloth over parka." Originally made from seal guts or skin, the Kuspuk/Qaspaq was a tunic length overcoat with a large front pocket. A very special tight stitching made the garment essentially waterproof. A summer Kuspuk/Qaspaq was made using cloth and would protect the wearer from mosquitoes in the lush tundra. Each region had their own unique take on the Kuspuk/Qaspaq, which would identify not only the gender but the region and specific tribe. "I was very mindful to design a general Kuspuk/Qaspaq," says Alice. "The Kuspuk/Qaspaq is not a design I own. This belongs to our culture in Alaska and I wanted to make sure I did it right and was respectful."

Alice spent a year designing prototypes and researching how to create a garment inspired by the traditional Kuspuk/Qaspaq. Thanks to the internet, she found a U.S. women-owned manufacturer that specializes in cold-weather gear. "We keep the same innovative design, cherished and used for hundreds of years, but incorporate today's modern fabrics." Using a polyester fabric that's wind-resistant and waterproof, they also added a zipper pocket,

making it a very functional outdoor garment.

Before producing her Kuspuk/Qaspaq, Alice consulted with tribal Elders and her family. "It was very important to me to have input from my community because this is not just a garment, it is a shared history." Alice remembers growing up watching her mom and aunts sew parkas, mittens, and Kuspuk/ Qaspaqs. "I learned what needed to go into a garment by watching family members sew. When you share art—how things have been done in the past-how stitches are madeand why the pattern is the way it is—it becomes instilled in you. There are years of history being passed down from generation to generation when a garment is sewed," explains Alice.

Honoring Her Family and Community

Alice credits her family with giving her the confidence to go down this path, and it is her family that continues to support Naataq Gear. "My children help in the shop, fulfill online orders and pick up freight. My husband, who is an attorney, helps with paperwork. From the beginning, with designing, sketching, and opening the shop, it has been my family and my community supporting me."

Today, Naataq Gear has an expanded selection of styles and colors. Initially, Alice expected tourists to be her main customers, but surprisingly, local Alaskans have embraced her clothing. "I am so grateful for their acceptance and approval," said Alice. "I'm offering a beautiful, innovative garment that is not only meaningful but puts our culture on the forefront. This shows that we are a thriving Alaskan Inuit community."

beauty and spirituality of the area.

During the Nome Gold Rush in the early 1900s, miners were attracted to the site but disregarded the traditional use rules. Claimed in 1905 under the Homestead Act, the area changed ownership twice. A saloon, dance hall and roadhouse were built at the site that burned in 1908. Subsequently, the property was deeded to Judge George Schofield, who in turn deeded it in 1917 to the Provincial of the Jesuit Province of California as a gift for a Catholic mission. The Catholic Diocese of Nome acquired the Pilgrim homestead, and Our Lady of Lourdes Orphanage and 14 other structures were built. A staff of around 20 priests, nuns, and other workers ran the facility, which housed about 100 children annually, the first of which primarily orphaned by the 1918 flu epidemic, followed by diphtheria and tuberculosis outbreaks.

Catholic priest Father Bellarmine LaFortune had begun relocating the mission at the village of Mary's Igloo to Pilgrim Hot Springs when the global Spanish Flu pandemic hit the Nome region. Over half the population of Mary's Igloo passed away as a result. Numbering between 60 and 70, the deceased were transported by dog team for mass burial in a sandy area near the hot springs that was not frozen ground.

Geothermal heat was used for the buildings and gardens were developed. Combined with the natural abundance of fish, wild plants, and game, the mission was largely self-supporting. After more than 20 years of operation and the decline of orphans in need, the mission closed down in 1941. A series of caretakers looked after the Pilgrim Hot Springs property until it was purchased by Unaatuq.

Many of the original orphanage structures and large two-story church are still standing although in a state of deterioration, and work has begun to restore the buildings.

The Carrie McLain Memorial Museum



Arriving in Nome in 1905, 10-year-old Carrie McLain was fascinated with this frontier gold rush town. Over her lifetime she collected bits and pieces of Nome history: photographs, miners' clothing, household items, such as opera glasses and doilies and items made for tourists, such as an ivory carved cribbage board with reindeer and dogs. This eclectic collection became the backbone of Carrie's traveling museum. Today, the museum is housed in the beautiful Richard Foster Building, which also houses the Kegoayah Kozga Library, and the Katirvik Cultural Center. Two galleries, archival storage, a conservation lab for its thousands of artifacts, and a visiting research room make up the museum space

The 3,200 square foot main gallery space displays the exhibit, "Nome: Hub of Cultures and Communities Across the Bering Strait."

This long-term exhibit collaborated with over 50 community members who shared stories, artifacts and photographs around five major themes: subsistence in the Arctic environment, mining, the built landscape, transportation, and sustainability. Immersive exhibits connect the past with contemporary narratives as visitors can step inside a miner's tent, operate a gold dredge, see an Inupiat skin boat, listen to audio recordings in Nome's first phone booth, and watch a film on tales of Nome's early days.

One of the more popular exhibits is "Fritz", the preserved Siberian husky dog who was musher Leonhard Seppala's lead dog during the 1925 Serum Run. The Serum Run transported diphtheria medicine by dog sled across 674 miles in just five and a half days, saving Nome and surrounding villages from the outbreak. People commemorate the Serum Run every year with the Iditarod, a dogsled race from Anchorage to Nome through some of the harshest, most spectacular landscape mother nature offers.

Whether you are in Nome for the gold, the Iditarod or even their world class birding, this first class museum should be on your list to see as it preserves the past, educates the present, and inspires the future for everyone.

Gold has always been humanity's obsession. The ancient Egyptians saw it as the flesh of the sun god Ra. In the 1600s, legends of El Dorado drove explorers on fruitless global quests and just over a century ago, the Nome gold rush lured thousands to Alaska. Across time and continents, gold has tempted people to risk everything in pursuit of its glittering promise.

For the residents who call modern day Nome their home, gold can come in many forms, not just the tangible flakes and nuggets. To some, the gold of Nome lies in the rich history of the indigenous tribes who lived there from time immemorial. For others, it is the sense of community-the shared experience of living in such a remote place. Some people count the Iditarod, the "last great race" as their "El Dorado," and there are those who value Nome's unique geographical position that makes it a critical migration route for a wide variety of birds, guaranteeing it as a place for those whose passion is in photography.

For the people of Nome, their gold comes in many forms, such as the connections with their community, the beauty of the tundra, and the endless possibilities that bring together a people making life on the edge of the Bering Sea.

The People

Long before settlers landed on the beaches of Nome, the Inupiat thrived in the vast tundra and on the icy shores of the Seward Peninsula. The rhythm of the seasons flowed through their existence, and they lived, hunted, and fished according to the offerings of nature's bounty. During the height of the salmon run, fish camps became vibrant hubs, where tribes came together to harvest and preserve their catch, but also share stories and pass down ancestral knowledge and traditions.

To many outsiders, the region of Nome might seem a hostile and uninhabitable environment, but to the Inupiat, this area was their land, from which they cultivated a vibrant and rich culture that sustained them for thousands of years.

Whale ships in the 1700s and fur trappers in the 1800s disturbed the social fabric of the Inupiat, as these commercial hunting practices did not align with the communal and resource sharing that was a part of the community. These outside profiteers not only brought disease but decimation of the Inupiat's valuable resources, as the hunting went beyond the limit of sustainability.

In 1898, two Inupiat boys, Constantine Uparazuck and Gabriel Adams, showed three Scandinavian prospectors the location of gold deposits in Anvil Creek outside of Nome. This would set-off the Nome gold rush. These men became known as "Three Lucky Swedes" and by 1920 they had extracted over twenty million in gold from the creek. In several years, Nome exploded with a population of over 20,000 people, who were either looking for gold, or looking to make money off of the people looking for gold. Since Alaska Natives were not recognized as U.S. citizens, they were barred from staking gold claims or benefiting from any discoveries. By the time they were finally granted citizenship in 1924, the large gold deposits had long since vanished.

Yet despite generations of inequity and injustice, the Inupiat culture not only survived but endures. Today they create some of the most exceptional ivory carvings in the world and produce dazzling native dancing and music. The Inupiat are a part of a long continuation of a people who drew breath from this land. Their culture is woven in their songs, stories, and traditions and the strength of their ancestors carries them into the future. Item E.

Nome, a remote port city in west. on the Bering Sea, 140 miles south of the Arctic Circle and near the Russian border. Accessible only by plane or ship, it's served daily by Alaska Airlines from Anchorage. Over 300 miles of roads connect Nome to nearby communities across tundra, mountains, and coastal plains. Winters are long and cold; summers, short and cool. Muskox, known as uminmak, "animal with a beard" in Inupiag, roam the tundra and shed a prized underwool each spring—softer than cashmere and the world's most expensive fiber.

Nome's diverse topography, including tundra, wetlands, rivers, lagoons, and alder thickets, supports a wide variety of bird life. As soon as the ice thaws in late spring, migration takes flight, transforming the area into a sprawling treasure trove. Thanks to its closeness to Siberia, this proximity offers sightings not found in the U.S. or even Alaska. For many birders, a trip to Nome is a paradise, enabling dozens of new entries into a birding journal.

Alaska lies on the Ring of Fire, a horseshoe shaped area around the Pacific Ocean that experiences most of the world's volcanic events. Near Nome, geothermal energy creates hot springs like those at Pilgrim Hot Springs, 60 miles away. Once used by Inupiat hunters and later by gold miners, the site became a Catholic mission and orphanage after the 1918 flu pandemic.







Today, it features lush vegetation, warm pools, and historic ruins. Visitors can rent cabins or campsites, and a fee is required for entry. The Mary's Igloo Native Corporation considers much of the surrounding land sacred, and they require permits to explore beyond marked areas.

The discovery of gold in the creeks around Nome has been a defining feature of the land. Years after the Klondike gold rush, prospectors found large gold nuggets in Anvil Creek. Eroded from rock veins, gold collects in slow-moving waters like riverbeds and floodplains. The discovery of gold on Nome's beaches sparked a second rush, as locals flocked to dig up this "poor man's paradise". Today, companies like AKAU Resort offer gold prospecting experiences from June to September, with all-inclusive packages featuring lodging, meals, and activities like panning, metal detecting, and high-banking.

Nome's unique eco-system supports several fishing opportunities, including road side, backcountry, and helicopter fly-out fishing provided by companies such as Twin Peaks Adventures who offer weeklong, world class, fly-fishing tours. Spawning salmon thrive in the rivers' healthy, pollution-free waterways. Other variety of fish include large Arctic grayling, trout and pike, making Nome an angler's dream. For a unique take on sustainability there are companies such as Alaska NW Adventures who specialize in eco-culture tours that combine fishing and hunting with history, culture, along with Native



subsistence living.

Visitors to Nome can capture stunning photos of birds, fish in pristine waters, hike across wild tundra landscapes, or pan for gold in historic streams. The land transforms with the changing seasons, from spring's wildflowers scattered across the rolling hills, to summer's mid-night sun warmth, autumn's fiery foliage, and the blanket of snow covering the land in a frozen, icy stillness. Each season bears the hand of the creator as it provides, sustains and captures the essence of life below the Arctic Circle.

The Experience

Nome is very community minded and there are festivals and events throughout the year that celebrate this close-knit town.

The Iditarod

Over a thousand people descend on Nome for the finish line of the Iditarod dogsled race. The Iditarod is the world's greatest race and there is nothing like cheering on the musher and their team as they pass under the fabled Burled Arch finish line. Accommodations fill up early and bookings need to be done a year in advance.

The Midnight Sun Festival

This takes place on the closest weekend to the summer solstice (June 21st). This festival celebrates Nome with parades, a 5K gold dust fun run, a polar bear swim, and the Nome River raft race

Nome Salmonberry Jam Folk Fest

This three-day music festivals has something for everyone including workshops, guest artists, local musicians, dancers, handmade crafts and a cookout and a community jam.

Nome Today

For thousands of years, people have been



drawn to Nome—from the Inupiat, who forged a relationship with the land and built communities, to the gold rush era, when prospectors came ashore hoping to strike it rich.

Here, neighbors measure value not by glittering nuggets but by their bonds, community strength, and enduring relationship with the land that gives back and sustains generations. The heartbeat of Nome can be found in the songs and music of the Inupiat who voices echo across the tundra and through the stories of the residents who know that the seasons shape life and bring both hardship and abundance.

The people who call Nome home have discovered a wealth that goes beyond gold. In this remote corner of Alaska, those who choose to stay find a city rich in spirit, meaning and promise. For those that make their home on the edge of the Bering Sea, Nome is their city of gold.

Road Crew

April is a busy month for the road crew as we deal with the remnants of snow and try to get through break up. This year, we managed with only a handful of problem areas. The crew had some maintenance issues with the equipment but have managed to keep making headway with our assorted projects. The crew has had a focus on getting the monofill covered this quarter. A big part of the trash from last summer had been left uncovered due to equipment issues. The road crew also raised a big portion of AML's yard at the upper industrial pad. With the growing traffic, particularly with haul trucks, the AML offices had to be relocated. It will probably require adding a stop sign to the east end of Okleasik St. The road crew did U-Call We-Haul again this June and hauled off 60 truckloads of trash from the city with another 118 loads brought out by residents. 13 vehicles were also disposed of.

Building Maintenance

Building Maintenance has had a few issues to fix and a couple projects to work on this quarter. At the Foster building, we had to replace a motor in an air handler, repair the front door latch assembly, and repair one of the boilers. In the Rec. Center, we've started work to replace the single HRV for the locker rooms with two new units and had to replace the heating unit in the men's sauna. The sauna project was dragged out a bit as the new heater had different power and control requirements. At the Pool, we had to repair the new Miox machine. Building Maintenance is in the process of replacing the hot water heater at XYZ with a much bigger on-demand water heater. We have gotten started with the repairs on 504 Warrens. We've gotten underway with the T-Ball field. Building Maintenance also replaced broken windows at the Icy View Firehall, VFW Apartment, Visitor Center and on the Port's Security Shack. Our summer laborers finished painting the bus stops in time for Midnight Sun, and have repaired the driftwood fence at the Cemetery. They also painted the T-Ball dugouts and Field house.

Landfill/Monofill

The lack of snow this past winter meant a lot of trash was blown out of the landfill. As soon as it was possible, the summer laborers and landfill operator went out on the Tundra to get it picked up. We've had some trouble with landfill loader and have had to down it a few times this quarter. We currently have one of the road crew loaders on site to maintain. We are working to replace the culvert between the second and third cell and will be putting a filter rock "burrito" over the end. We were able to get

the winter trash moved up top and get it covered. We are also working to repair the bulls which seem to fall apart every year.

3D Housing

The crews have been pitching in to assist the 3D Housing crew. We excavated the base of 37 truck loads of muck and bad fill. We brought back 58 loads of our "road repair material", and 11 loads of some bigger rock. And the crews have worked about 160 hours total on this project. The crew had to rent an excavator from Q-Trucking and a skid steer from JB Rentals to get this done.

Moving Forward

Every summer is a race to prepare for the next winter. We have repairs to make on both snow blowers, one loader, one dozer and one truck. Assuming nothing else breaks in the meantime. The road crew is looking to improve our ability to thaw the culvert between Crowley and the low dock. This has been our nemesis for the past few years. We have some other areas to improve drainage, including Division & 4th, East 1st near Mettler, and Carstens & 1st.

Nome Recreation Center

The quarter started off with a Free Kid's Day on Saturday, April 5th. Sponsored by Kawerak's Child Advocacy Center the special event allowed any local youth free entrance in the facility in honor of April being National Child Abuse Prevention Month.

Early May saw another community gathering as the Village of Solomon hosted their annual Murdered and Missing Indigenous Women and Girls event. Attendees started things off by making posters bringing attention to the alarming number of disappearances of Native Women and Girls. The posters and signs were then paraded around Nome to bring awareness of this ongoing problem.

June brought the first of several events. On June 5th, Norton Sound Health Corporation hosted a Pride Night with a community potluck geared toward the celebration of local residents of the LGBQT+ communities and their families and supporters.

The following week on June 13th, NSHC's CAMP Department hosted a Bike Rodeo in the multipurpose room. Booths were set-up to provide information on bikes and bike safety and helmets were given out to attendees.

Lastly on June 16th, Kawerak hosted a Foster Family recruitment extravaganza that was focused on finding new families interested in fostering local youth.

April also saw the return of our co-ed adult volleyball league. In all, six teams registered in the Competitive League with Sailor Bois taking home first place. There wasn't enough interest in a Recreational League this session.

Registration for our co-ed youth softball league began in mid-May. Despite the early start registration was slow and at the deadline was sufficient enough to select teams and begin practicing.





Because of that the registration period was extended and additional players began trickling in and as of this writing there were finally enough kids to have 2 teams in each of the leagues.

We would like to give a shout-out to the Bering Sea Lion's Club for their support of the league. Additionally, we would like to also thank Charlie Weiss from Grizzly Building who is generously providing a \$10 scholarship for each player.

Nome Swimming Pool

With the ending of the Nome Northstar Swim Team in early April the first two months of the quarter were fairly slow. Aside from a two-week session of Migrant Education Swim Lessons and a couple of school field trips there wasn't a ton of activity.

That changed a bit once June rolled around and Summercise began. The first session had a 3-week session (Monday-Thursdays) before going on a two-week break.

Overall this past season was a disappointment as lack of staff again hindered us offering many of our usual programs. Without senior lifeguards (Aged 21+) willing to work shifts the facility cannot reach is maximum potential.

Lead lifeguard and certified American Red Cross Lifeguard Instructor Melissa Ford hosted several classes and certified a lot of new adult guards but none of them are taking shifts.

After expressing my frustration to the City Manager, he asked me to do an audit of the pool schedule from FY 2025 to determine the amount of offered program hours. The results (found on the next page) were pretty glaring.

All said and done the pool was opened an average of 2.41 hours a day and the lion's share of those times were logged by programs not open to the public. Most disappointing was Open/Family and Lap Swims- the only programs open to youth was only available on average .46 hours a day.

The one program that was offered regularly were lap swims which only serve a very minor part of our community.

Moving forward we will again attempt to lure more senior lifeguards onto our staff but if we fail to add any meaningful numbers it will be tough to add any extra programs and make it difficult for me to recommend continuing to fund the facility.

Office/Accounting:

Port staff continue to work on collection efforts for customers that have returned for the ice-free season, as well as those no longer using the facility. This follow up activity occurs in and around daily operations with customers in the normal course of business.

Staff have been busy planning, budgeting and dealing with compliance issues along with reconciling items in the field with account records. Updates to stats are underway with fiscal year closing to incorporate into fiscal planning and health.

Caitlin LeClair is in the Port Office for the summer season assisting with accounting and office management as well as helping with the Finance department with various tasks. Alex Thomson has returned and continues to perform well with the City in the summer full-time position of Deputy Harbormaster. Nellie lyapana was hired in the seasonal position of Dock Watch assisting with field operations and security duties.

Operations:

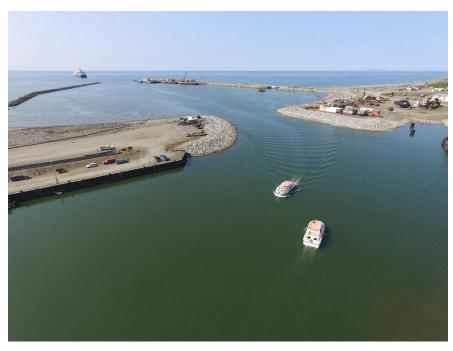
The Port of Nome summer shipping season typically begins in the last weeks of May and we are in full-swing by the first week of July. The winter seasonal ice traditionally breaks up offshore and in the Outer Harbor in the last two weeks of May, and in the Small Boat Harbor the last week of May.

Cargo Operations started very busy at both the Causeway and Small Boat Harbor facilities, with Alaska Marine Lines using the majority of the port uplands space for cargo ops. Nome serves as the regional hub for the shipment of cargo, gravel and equipment throughout the region. Brice Marine has large rock haul projects in Shishmaref and Barrow which are underway, with vessels utilizing the facility several times each week. That traffic will continue to increase as the Barrow project becomes fully online and continue until freeze up. This is a multi-year project and Brice has signed a contract with the Port of Nome for storage land. We also have various other smaller rock/gravel projects the PON is supporting this summer season.

(2025 Cruise Ship Schedule)

11 total cruise port calls are schedule for Nome in the 2025 season. The first cruise the WESTERDAM broke our record for most passengers off one vessel with 1710 guests being lightered to shore to enjoy Nome in a single day. 7 of the cruise stops will be a full-turn, or have passengers both being loaded and unloaded from the vessel and flying in/out of Nome with luggage. We have not yet received word on how many of the trips include local city tours, gold panning, etc. We continue to see the trend of cruises holding more passengers and being larger in length.
