WHAT IS A COMMUNITY GARDEN?

- Community gardens are plots of land in public areas where people gather to collectively manage and care for a garden. These areas often serve as a way for urban residents to grow their own fruits, vegetables, herbs and flowers.
- When located in public parks, they are in safe, recreational green spaces in urban areas.
- These gardens can also offer educational opportunities for children and families, promote healthy eating, improve mental health, and strengthen community bonds.
- Not as common in less densely urbanized settings where people are able to garden “at home”.

What is Wild Foraging?

- Wild foraging is the act of identifying, gathering, and harvesting edible or medicinal plants, fungi, and other natural resources from the wild, such as forests, fields, or urban environments.
- The City of Norman does not officially recommend consuming found edible or medicinal plants in the parks but does not prohibit it.
- Naturally occurring- not managed like a garden.

- A community wildflower garden and art exhibition site which features Oklahoman artists and poets whose works center topics of place, including artisanship, culture, and pollination.



ALTERNATIVE APPROACH IN OTHER OKLAHOMA COMMUNITIES

- Parks & Recreation Departments provide garden beds, soil, and water. Residents rent the plots yearly and are responsible for planting and maintaining them.
- Parks and Recreation Departments secures the garden and outlines rules and regulations for the garden.

- City of Muskogee Parks & Recreation provides raised beds with planting medium, and a water source. Residents are responsible for planting and harvesting of their plots. Plots are rented yearly.
- There are six sites located around the city.



EDIBLE TREES, SHRUBS, AND FORBS GROWING IN OUR PARKS

- Many are native species to Oklahoma and provide important habitat for mammals, birds, and insects.
- Wild foraging is an important historical and cultural part of indigenous cultures. Traditional methods of foraging have been shown to positively impact seed dispersal and germination, soil health, and plant productivity.
