FY 2021 Oelwein Budget at a Glance

- 1. The city's levy decreased as the city takes on less debt obligations. The levy went from 17.718585 to 17.72994. The city is raising the levy to make room for more bonding capacity in 2022.
- 2. Property tax revenues total \$2,883,557
- 3. The city's valuation increased from FY2021 \$156,169,512 to \$158,308,172 in FY2022.
- 4. Expenditures for the general fund decreased to \$2,487,350.04 in FY2022 from \$2,433,919 in FY2021. The increase comes as the city adds a code enforcement officer and police officer. The City Administrator has worked to ensure the general fund is solvent and has a healthy reserve.
- 5. The city is estimated to bring in \$545,000 from local option sales tax (LOST). LOST is split 70/30 with 70 percent going to Economic Development and 30 percent going to Property Tax Relief. Economic Development allows the city to work with commercial and residential properties. The city uses economic development on commercial and residential property clean up. LOST also pays for the agreement with the school on the Regional Tech Complex.
 - a. The City is using \$125,000 in reserves to put into the local revolving loan fund for home improvements.
- 6. The city is estimated to bring in \$730,000 in franchise fees. Franchise fees comes from electric and gas charges. The franchise fee pays for the Police Station loan at the rate of \$250,000 annually. The remaining funding is to fund the City's Capital Improvement Program (CIP). The CIP will replace much needed equipment across many departments in the general fund.
 - a. \$298,000 will go toward the Capital Improvement Program
- 7. The Road User Tax will bring in an estimated \$845,000. This revenue is generated from the state gas tax with allocation based on population. All money from the Road User Tax must be spent on road maintenance, improvements, and personnel. The City will be rehabilitating 12th Ave SE near the middle school and will do chip seal project in spring of 2022.
- 8. The city operates and water and wastewater utility. The water revenues are estimated to be \$1,138,840 with sewer revenues estimated at \$1,542,000. The infrastructure fee is expected to bring in \$198,000. Should rates be approved in spring of 2021 City Council will make decisions on serval projects during the winter of 2022.

WHEREAS, heretofore and in strict compliance with Chapter 384 of the Code of Iowa, the City Council of the City of Oelwein, Iowa, did, pursuant to a Resolution of Necessity duly adopted on February 10, 2020, order the construction of the Outer Road & 6th Street NE HMA Improvements Project (the "Project"), such improvement having been duly completed, the work accepted and the Project Engineers having filed the final assessment schedule, which has been fully considered by this Council;

NOW, THEREFORE, It Is Resolved by the City Council of the City of Oelwein, Iowa, as follows:

Section 1. The final assessment schedule filed by the Project Engineers covering the Project is hereby amended as follows:

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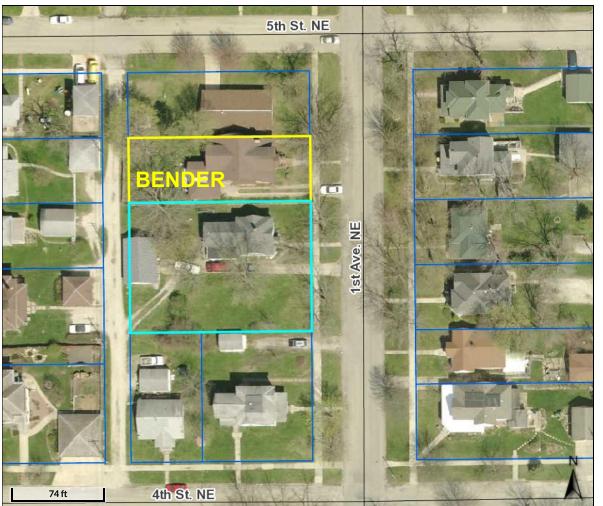

City of Oelwein Intermediary Relending Program Work Plan Update February 2021

A. Ability to administer IRP, complete listing of all personnel responsible for administering this program, their qualifications, and experience.

The City of Oelwein has elected to contract with the Upper Explorerland Regional Planning Commission to administer the IRP revolving loan fund.

Upper Explorerland Regional Planning Commission

Economic Development Coordinator – The Economic Development Coordinator will provide direct administration of the Oelwein IRP. Activities will include taking in applications, reviewing for eligibility, completing loan review and due diligence, monitoring of loans, closing for approved loans, taking of minutes and general reporting.

Finance Manager – The Finance Manager posts all deposits and checks to the general ledger; reconciles monthly bank statements to book of accounts; maintains loan records and pay authorizations; notifies the administrator of past due payments; prepares and submits semi-annual online reporting as required by USDA Rural Development; prepares annual budget as required by USDA Rural Development; provides reports as requested by city and/or loan committee; assists City's auditing firm with fiscal year-end reporting questions.

Executive Director – The Executive Director provides oversight of the Economic Development Coordinator and Finance Manager and will provide technical assistance and guidance for the Oelwein IRP.

The City of Oelwein

City Official – One city official will serve on the IRP lending board to review applications or authorize another city official to represent him/her on the lending board as needed.

Business Leader – A business leader will serve on the IRP lending board who represents the Oelwein community.

Two Area Lenders –Two area leaders, each with years of banking/lending experience will serve on the IRP lending board.

Director of Oelwein Chamber and Economic Development – The Director will be the contact person for Oelwein businesses interested in the IRP program. This person will serve on the IRP lending board or a person represented by the Oelwein Chamber and Economic Development.

B. Ability to commit financial resources and Statement of non-Agency funds for administration of the intermediary's operations and financial assistance for projects.

The City of Oelwein has a signed resolution committing \$125,000 to supplement this fund. See attached copy of the resolution with this application.

C. Demonstrate a need for the loan funds. Proposed and known ultimate recipients or Targeting criteria for ultimate recipients and supporting statistical or narrative evidence that such prospective recipients exist in sufficient numbers to justify Agency funding of the loan request.

The City of Oelwein has a need to improve the economic conditions in the community. The US Census shows the median household income in Oelwein at \$37,277, or \$13,174 less than the state of lowa median household income and \$15,485 less than the US median household income. The percentage of students receiving free and reduced-price lunch is at 54% for grades K-S. Part of the overall plan for economic improvement includes the Intermediary Relending Program to support business expansion.

The City of Oelwein will establish the IRP for business expansion within the corporate city limits. The funds will be utilized for creation of and retention of jobs.

Demonstrated Record of Providing Assistance to Members of Underrepresented Groups:

The City of Oelwein is currently working collaboratively with business owners, including the underrepresented groups, in a facade and awning improvement project. The city allocates its subsidy for the Williams Wellness Center into coupons that are given through the Husky Hub (the school district student services) to allow day passes to the Williams Center to low- and moderate-income families that include underrepresented groups, etc. That amounts to about \$20,000 annually. We are also working with housing rehab with low- and moderate-income families to improve buildings -that is a local-federal funding program.

Plan for targeting loans to underrepresented groups:

30% or more of loan funds will be made available to entities owned by underrepresented groups. Direct one-on-one marketing will be used by the banks to ensure the underrepresented groups are aware of the loans for business expansion.

D. Proposed fees and other charges that will be assessed to the ultimate recipient

- 1. Loan application fee (non-refundable): \$100
- 2. Loan closing fee: 1% of IRP loan amount, up to a maximum of \$500
- 3. Other closing fees: \$10 per closing document (Mortgage, promissory, security agreements).
- 4. Borrower pays for all closing related costs as required per the conditions of the loan such as title search, appraisal costs, and legal fees.

E. Commitments of financial support from public agencies and private organizations.

F. Proven record of obtaining private or philanthropic funds for the operation of similar programs.

- 2008 Regional Academy for Math and Sciences (RAMS) \$1.8 mil project with collaboration from City of Oelwein, OCAD, local and state foundation grants and USDA rural development loan
- 2. 2006 Library expansion The city raised \$550,000 in local funds for the \$2.8 million facility
- 3. 2005 Downtown renovations The city will utilized \$3.5 million in TIF for downtown revitalization

- 4. 2002 The Williams Center including Fitness Center and Performing Arts Center The city raised over \$2.0 million in private local funding for a total project of \$8.5 million.
- 5. 2001 Oelwein Sports Complex \$500,000 project with collaboration from City of Oelwein, Oelwein School District, local foundation grants and citizen in-kind labor and materials.

G. Plan for re-lending the loan funds

- 1. What will be accomplished? The goal of the loan fund will be to create economic development and jobs.
- 2. How the funds will get from the intermediary to the ultimate recipient? The Oelwein IRP Board will approve or deny the loan applicant. Upper Explorerland and/or qualified board members will serve as the closing agent with the borrower.
- 3. Service area: Corporate city limits of Oelwein
- 4. *Eligibility criteria:* All businesses in or locating in Oelwein are eligible. Community development projects will also be eligible for IRP loans. Borrowers must create or retain jobs. Borrowers must be denied full financing from a commercial lender. The borrower must have a minimum of 10% equity.
- 5. Loan purposes: Economic development and community development
- 6. Fees: \$100 non-refundable application fee, 1% closing fee, not to exceed \$500, and other related closing fees.

- 14. Reporting requirement by the ultimate recipient: The borrower will be required to provide financial updates at least annually and will provide employee information annually. The borrower will allow the IRP representatives to make regular visits and inspections as necessary.
- 15. Lending Requirements: as per Rural Development Instructions

Ineligible loan purposes, RD Instruction 4274-D, § 4274.319

IRP loan funds may not be used for payment of the intermediary's administrative costs or expenses. The IRP revolving fund may not be used for:

- Assistance in excess of what is needed to accomplish the purpose of the ultimate recipient's project.

The Northeast Iowa Business Network (NIBN): Oelwein is part of this six-county marketing group. NIBN works together to attract new businesses and provides support for existing business growth. This group consists of numerous economic development professionals that are on-call for any necessary technical assistance. The NIBN group has also hired a free confidential business counselor, who comes to Fayette County twice a year. There is no cost for this technical assistance.

Attached is Change Order Number 2 with the proposed changes to the substantial and final completion dates for your review and consideration. The Wings East Pavement Improvements Project was unable to be seeded during the fall seeding dates of 2020. There were multiple situations that delayed the contractor during the project. At the beginning of the project, the contractor, Lodge Construction, unfortunately suffered a loss of life on the site which resulted in a two week delay for the OSHSA investigation and employee counseling. Later their staff contacted COVID-19 which delayed the project. When the derecho hit lowa, Lodge Construction lost internet for approximately one week which impacted workflow.

In September of 2020, Council directed Lodge Construction to complete Change Order Number 1, which included an additional 627 SY of HMA Paving on 13th AVE NE. Lodge Construction successfully paved and opened the roadway to traffic prior to the winter season.

The project was substantially completed on December 8, 2020. Due to the project delays, the site was not able to be seeded during the fall 2020 seeding dates. FOX and City staff discussed multiple timeline options for closing out the project and seeding the site. Considering these discussions, FOX recommends leaving the project open until April 16, 2021, which will give Lodge time to seed the site and remove existing erosion control measures. FOX has spoken to Lodge Construction about their seeding schedule, and they plan to seed as soon as the weather allows.

FOX recommends approving Change Order No. 2 which moves the substantial completion date to December 8, 2020, and the Final Completion date to April 16, 2021.

Dear Mayor and City Council:

The City of Oelwein received bids on March 2, 2021 for the Oelwein 2021 Water Main Improvements. This project includes 5,200-ft of 8-inch water main installation under existing sealcoat streets in residential neighborhoods. Work includes trenchless construction to reconnect 84 1-inch water services to residential properties, HMA patches, PCC curb and gutter replacement, traffic control, storm sewer replacement, sanitary sewer replacement, and seeding. Oelwein has received a Community Development Block Grant in the amount of \$600,000 for this project. Upper Explorerland, Diana Johnson, is administrating the grant funds. The City will utilize State Resolving Funds (SRF) to fund their portion of the project.

The City received five (5) bids on the project. The Engineer's opinion of probable construction cost was \$1,145,000. The bids ranged from a high bid of \$1,677,759.50 to a low bid of \$1,057,488.83. A Bid Tabulation Summary is enclosed for your reference. The following is a summary of the bids:

Summers Enterprise Inc. of Masonville, Iowa submitted the low base bid of \$1,057,488.83. The low base bid is \$87,511.17 below the Engineer's opinion (7.6% below). FOX contacted Summers to discuss their bid, schedule, subcontractors, and workload. They have found no errors with their bid and are excited to start construction right away in the spring. Currently they are finishing a utility project in Charles City. Their schedule is open to complete this work and anticipate approximately three months working time. The project needs to be substantially completed by October 17, 2021.

Summers plans to complete the project primary by trenchless construction (directional drilling) versus open cut trench reducing overall pavement replacement quantities and reducing the project schedule. Summers plans to utilize Kluesner Construction for the asphalt work.

Summers Enterprise has performed several projects for Oelwein. Previous water main projects include the Two Pressure Zones Water Main and the Charles Street Water Main (viaduct) project. Additionally, Summers was the trenchless water main sub-contractor for the Oelwein Industrial Park 3rd Addition (14th St SE extension). These projects were all constructed well and according to the plans and specifications. Summers has also completed the 1st Avenue Lift Station Improvements and the 20th Street Lift Station Improvements. Their workmanship has generally been acceptable, especially water and sewer main work. However, timeliness and project closeout have sometimes been an issue. The most recent project, the 20th Street Lift Station Improvements, was operational within a reasonable time, but project closeout took an extended time. The City of Oelwein assessed liquidated damages on that project.

In our experience, this project represents the type of construction that Summers specializes in. Summers has the ability to construct a well-built project per the plans and specifications. We anticipate that all parties' previous experiences, along with close management of the construction, will allow this project to be executed in a timely fashion. Additional on-site project representative time by FOX may be required as discussed with City Staff.

FOX has successfully worked with Summers on projects in other cities. Summers recently completed a trenchless sanitary sewer project under the Iowa River for the City of Iowa Falls. Additionally, Summer's has worked for several communities in northeastern Iowa performing similar construction projects.

Based on these investigations, we believe Summers Enterprise, Inc. has a practical knowledge of the work, adequate equipment and personnel, sufficient schedule, and financial resources to complete the work. Therefore, FOX recommends that the 2021 Oelwein Water Main Improvements be awarded to Summers Enterprise Inc. for their bid of **\$1,057,488.83**. We believe this represents the lowest responsive, responsible bid for the project and is in the best interests of the project.

Prior to the City of Oelwein approving the contract, the City's insurance counsel should review the contractor's insurance certificates and performance and maintenance bonds for conformance with the City of Oelwein requirements.



According to bidding documents, the Council has the following options:

Option 1: Award the project to Summers Enterprise, Inc. for \$1,057,488.83

Option 2: Reject all bids

This project is designed to help in the continued process of reopening Williams Center for the Arts. The Center is hoping to reopen for the presentation of shows in the fall of 2021. The funds being requested are needed to help pay for the operational expenses that include retainers for the five projected shows. The projected shows to be presented in the 2021-2022 season include The Boy Band (retainer has been paid), Shades of Bublé, Abbamania, Simply Queen, and <a href="the Highway Men-a tribute to Willie, Waylon and Cash. Each of these requires an upfront retainer of \$1,000. Other operating expenses include salaries, payments to Oelwein Community School District toward utilities and custodial services, printing, advertising, artist's fee, lighting, and other expenses.

The closure of the Center due to the Covid 19 pandemic resulted in the Williams Center for the Arts canceling the remainder of the 2019-2020 and the entire 2020-2021 concert seasons. The loss of revenue for this period of time was over \$100,000. Funding sources such as ticket sales and sponsorships dried up.

3. Hotel and Motel Tax Funds must be used to fund projects that promote and/or expand tourism activity in Oelwein. How will your project help to realize this goal?

The Williams Center for the Arts has been one of the top destinations of choice for the arts in the five county areas of northeast lowa, consisting of Fayette, Allamakee, Clayton Winneshiek, and Buchanan Counties. Almost 1/3 of our audiences have come from communities other than Oelwein. We have had concert attendees from over 40 area communities, including patrons from include: Spencer, IA, Des Moines, IA, Minneapolis, MN, Rochester, MN, Galena, IL, Dubuque, IA, as well as the Oelwein area.

Without the continued help of start up funds to help reopen the Center there is the possibility of reduction of availability.

This entire proposal is based on the future situation in which the Covid 19 virus can be contained, and reopening slated for August of 2021 is still dependent on the safety of all participants.

To reopen the Williams Center for the Arts, funds will be needed regardless of the time frame of the actual opening.

People coming to Oelwein for programs at the Williams Center for the Arts not only come to the programs but also spend money with our local businesses such as eating establishments, convenience stores and motel/hotels.

During a normal concert year, the Williams Center for the Arts has spent almost \$10,000 in hotel costs at the Oelwein Cornerstone Inn and Suites. An additional \$1350 was spent for artist meals and hospitality. Sound for all nine events would total \$7,500, professional lighting \$2500 and advertisement for the season is about \$5,900,

An itemized listing of expenses is found at the end of this grant application.

In years prior to this projected reopening, the number of guests generated by this project is over100 persons. This includes the performers as well as members of the audience needing housing.

the number of rooms used and how many guests were
housed in those rooms per evening.

2.) Number of adults this project will reach.

As a result of this reopening project, the projected number of visitors to the Williams Center will be dictated by the extent of the protocols. Those protocols include:

*Wearing of masks at all times by members of the audience *Social distancing

*No more than 300 persons in the auditorium at a time. (The hope is that this number may be raised.)

It could be as high as 775 per event depending on how Covid 19 affects our community and surrounding area.

Total number of persons using the Williams Center for the Arts has been 75,000 in past years. It is realized that this number will probably not be achieved immediately. Groups that have used the center have included the Williams Center for the Arts Artist Series, City of Oelwein, Mercy One Hospital, NICC use, school use, district and state music associations, the State of Iowa, and the Federal Government. The usage of the Center by outside groups will depend on Covid 19.

The Williams Center for the Arts has provided residents with special needs the opportunity to attend the events at the center. Groups with special needs using the Williams Center for the Arts include: Mercy One Living Plus, the two Alternative Living Homes in Oelwein, Full Circle Services, Grandview Nursing Home, Oelwein Care Nursing Home, and the ABCM facilities in Independence, IA. These residents are admitted to the Artist Series event at a greatly reduced ticket price. Because of Covid 19, these entities may not be able to return coming to the Center immediately.

The final report for this grant will be filed soon as all bills have been submitted and paid.

It should be noted that the center has not had any usual income since March of 2020. Normal sources of income have included, Season Memberships, Event Ticket Sales and Sponsorships. Although the City Hotel/Motel Tax. Approved a \$1500 grant for "The Boy Band Night," the concert will be rescheduled in the upcoming concert series.

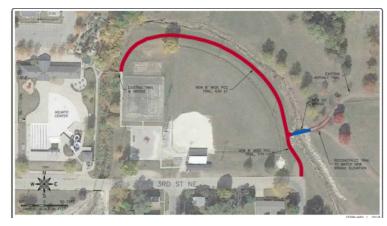

PROJECT DESCRIPTION: The trails committee and I took \$25,000 in the trails fund and multiplied it by a factor of 6 to complete this trails project. We removed an older bridge and replaced it with a safe and visually stunning bridge that will stand for generations. The trail just stopped randomly at the end of the bridge in the middle of the park before this project. The City completed the trail to connect it to the aquatic center and created a trailhead at 3rd St. NE. Thus, creating safe passage for summer school kids to the aquatic center for swim lessons and creating excitement in this community about building trails.

This month in the park department, we have been completing our daily disinfecting of areas and cleaning the downtown every morning. The new tables for the aquatic center arrived this month, as Jay will assemble them and take to the facility. I talked with Jennifer Dillon who has taken over the FFA program this past year about the hanging flowers for downtown. Jay and I will take the baskets up to the school when they are ready so they can go through them and replace some of the older baskets. We came in on Sunday after the snow was finished and did our sidewalks, trails and cemetery responsibilities. The guys completed 10 more sidewalks for homeowners that neglected to take care of their sidewalks after this past snow. I have been ordering our CIP items this year so that they will be here ready to go for installation when the employees come back. I contacted Blake Gamm with the county to see when they can assist the City with their seed drill, putting in another prairie planting at Platt Park this season. The trails committee met the second Tuesday as we are finishing the Wellmark grant and have been receiving letters of support to go along with our proposal.

Jay is prepping the new doors for paint that are going on the campground shower house and at Wings storage. Delinquent sidewalks were completed for community development people. Trail Segment 1 is out for bid and have had several contractors download the plans for this project, which will hopefully result in many competitive bids. The bidding concludes on February 19th and we will present results to council for contractor approval. At Woodlawn, we had a full burial for Geilenfeld funeral home on Tuesday. We are looking at trade with the street department skid loader and selling the 09' S130 cemetery skid loader with 2124 hours on it which we could roughly get around 7k for trade in. The snow and cold weather continues as Friday we had blizzard conditions all day, which drifted in the north end of Woodlawn that we finished clearing out on Monday. I have been in contact with Buchanan County Health Center and they are planning to make a sizeable donation towards our trail project for the next five years.

Jay painted the shower house doors for the campground this past week. I submitted a grant intent letter to Alliant Energy for possible trail money. On Tuesday, I submitted our trails grant to the Wellmark Foundation in which we received over 20 letters of support from community members. I accepted a thousand dollar check from Dave Sondrol this week for a trail donation. This Friday will be the final day for taking bids on Segment one trail. I received a call from Andrea Bolton with the Iowa Natural Heritage Foundation. Andrea was inquiring/excited about our bill we have in Des Moines to change state law for trails that will help many communities with future trail systems. We prepared at full burial on Monday morning in subzero temperatures for a Tuesday burial. I had a call from Upper Iowa University, as they are looking for projects for their Day of Caring that they had to forego last spring. We have painting projects in City Park and Platt Park for them to paint, tables, shelters, signs and benches. Jay and I have been assembling the new tables for the aquatic center that will go in the concession area and in the new shelter this spring.

Jay and I finished assembling the new tables for the aquatic center, which is a bond project. This month we received the brush for the 730 tractor so we can brush the trails, which is a CIP item. Jay made a run to Janesville to pick up two memorial benches that were donated to the City. One bench is for Bob Henderson that will go to the complex and the other is for Roger Schulz that will be placed in Plaza Park. Jay is working on fabricating new rings for the elevated guard chairs at the pool to accept the new umbrellas that we received \$5,000 through a grant from the RJ McElroy Trust. Jay swung by Scheels and picked up the anchors for the new basketball hoops we will be putting in at Wings Park that is a CIP item. Jay did some snow removal for
