GENERAL SUMMARY/BACKGROUND:

Early Learning Coalition of Palm Beach County has awarded the City of Pahokee Parks & Recreation Program with the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Childcare Stabilization Subgrant funding for the afterschool program.

This ELC ARPA Childcare Stabilization Subgrant Round 1 Installment 2 in the amount of \$22,619.52 will be used for the Parks & Recreation Afterschool program. Parks & Recreation was awarded this grant funding in January 2023.

<u>BUDGET IMPACT</u>: A TOTAL of \$22,619.52 increase will be added to the Parks & Recreation Afterschool Program budget.

The City of Pahokee has received an allocation of \$3,162,890. The funds were received in two transactions of \$1,581,445. We will start with the first year, FY2022-23, allocating: \$125,455.00 to fund the following program initiatives:

- ✓ Job Workforce Program (\$15,152.00)
- ✓ Education Program (\$15,152.00)
- ✓ Training Program (\$15,141.00)
- ✓ Business Development Program (\$80,000.00)

The City of Pahokee (the "City") embraced the importance of public input, transparency, and

accountability for the implementation of the Fiscal Recovery Funds. In alignment with the City's strategic plan, the City is inviting community partners to request ARPA funding for programs, projects, and interventions that will address community challenges in one or more of the following Community.

Assessment Priorities:

Economic Stability and Resilience

In response to the economic challenges for City residents and businesses magnified by the COVID-19 public health emergency, the City is seeking proposals that will identify and address current vulnerabilities, support short and long-term recovery efforts, and mitigate the effects of future economic disruptions. Proposed projects should demonstrate how they will reduce economic disparities and provide pathways to prosperity to economically is advantaged populations, small and minority businesses. Some examples of initiatives include small business grants and loans, supporting businesses that did not qualify for federal programs, technical assistance support, job training assistance, direct payments to households, food assistance to low-to-moderate income households, etc.

Pahokee aims to create neighborhoods in which parents are free to raise their children without having to worry about crime, businesses can thrive and expand, and residents are comfortable to connect with each other - all extremely important to building a strong sense of community. Proposed programs should focus on community-based approaches for violence reduction. Some examples

APPENDIX B - Evidenced-Based Intervention Additional Information

What is evidence-based?

For the purposes of the SLFRF, evidence-based refers to interventions with strong or moderate evidence as defined below:

Strong evidence means the evidence base that can support causal conclusions for the specific program proposed by the applicant with the highest level of confidence. This consists of one or more well-designed and well-implemented experimental studies conducted on the proposed program with positive findings on one or more intended outcomes.

<u>Moderate evidence</u> means that there is a reasonably developed evidence base that can support causal conclusions. The evidence base consists of one or more quasi-experimental studies with positive findings on one or more intended outcomes OR two or more nonexperimental studies with positive findings on one or more intended outcomes. Examples of research that meets the standards include well-designed and well-implemented quasi-experimental studies that compare outcomes between the group receiving the intervention and a matched comparison group (i.e., a similar population that does not receive the intervention).

<u>Preliminary evidence</u> means that the evidence base can support conclusions about the program's contribution to observed outcomes. The evidence base consists of at least one nonexperimental study. A study that demonstrates improvement in program beneficiaries over time on one or more intended outcomes OR an implementation (process evaluation) study used to learn and improve program operations would constitute preliminary evidence.

Examples of research that meet the standards include: (1) outcome studies that track program beneficiaries through a service pipeline and measure beneficiaries' responses at the end of the program; and (2) pre- and post-test research that determines whether beneficiaries have improved on an intended outcome.
