Dear City Council Committee of Paradise regarding Temporary Use Permit for Anderson we request their application be denied based on the following:

- Urgency Ordinance No. 590 and Town Municipal Code Chapter 8.59

   "Removal of Fire Damaged Debris from Private Property Following the Camp Fire", is No Longer Valid and is terminated in conjunction of the emergency proclamations terminations
- Emergency Proclamation occurs only during the response phase when the facts support the declaration or proclamation and requires immediate response and action
- Town Council did not review the need for continuing the local emergency every 14 days as required by *California Government Code 8630*, to support the Urgency Ordinance 590 and continue the need for such urgency ordinance.
- Town Council declared Urgency Ordinance 590 was necessary for immediate preservation of public peace, health, and safety based on the Camp Fire Emergency and the Camp Fire Emergency is over in accordance to the definition of "Emergency" established by *California Public Resources Code, Section 201060.3*

- The circumstances that legally justified the Urgency Ordinance 590 no longer exist
- Issuance of the requested Temporary Use Permit would be an improper suspension of zoning laws, Town General Plan, regulatory statues, orders, rules, or regulations and abuse of the Town's police powers
- The Town no longer qualifies for immunities under the *Emergency* Services Act, California Government Code Section 8655, and will be liable for discretionary actions in issuance of a Temporary Use Permit
- Failure of the City Planning Commissioners to respond to any of the requirements above and denying our Civil Rights as Citizens of USA and residents of Butte County.

I sent a letter via email to CARB regarding the health hazards of diesel toxins that will be released in our community if Anderson project passes.

I explained that 285 trucks per day, 12 hours a day, 7 days a week will exit approximately 1500 feet from our community.

Eighty percent of vehicles will be heavy equipment (weighing 10k pounds)

This is equivalent to 1,995 trucks a week and within 6 months, 365,000 trucks will have stopped across from our community unloading, releasing various toxins, green gasses and particulate matter in the air we breathe in and throughout our neighborhood and outlying residences.

**Abstract**: The health effects of diesel particulates, a complex mixture of solids and liquids, are not yet well understood. Biological activity of particulate matter may be related to particle sizes and/or particle composition. A number of epidemiological studies concluded that exposure to particulate matter may cause increased morbidity and mortality, such as from cardiovascular disease. Long-term exposure to diesel exhaust is also associated with small increase in the relative risk of lung cancer.

### Introduction

### **Components of Diesel Particulates**

Diesel <u>particulate matter</u> (PM, also abbreviated DPM) is a complex mixture of solid and liquid material. The particles in diesel exhaust are of special concern because, due to their respirable size, they can penetrate deep into human lungs. The composition of DPM includes many species that are known for their adverse health effects, including several carcinogens. Health effects most often linked with particulate pollution, from diesel and other sources, include an increase in death due to respiratory and cardiovascular disease and worsening of symptoms in people with asthma.

Primary materials found in the solid phase of diesel PM include inorganic carbon and metal ashes, while the liquids include high boiling hydrocarbons, water, and sulfuric acid. According to most legal definitions of diesel particulates and the corresponding sampling and measurement methods, diesel particulates are sampled from exhaust gases that are diluted with air and cooled, typically to 52°C. These sampling procedures have been introduced in an attempt to simulate atmospheric dilution effects on diesel emissions.

Although it is known today that the products of real-life atmospheric dilutions may differ from what is sampled in a laboratory dilution tunnel, there has been a consensus in regards to the above definition among worldwide public health authorities. Accordingly, the total particulate matter traditionally includes the following fractions:

- 1. Solids (inorganic carbon, ash)
- 2. Organics (organic fraction—OF)

3. Sulfates (hydrated sulfuric acid, metal sulfates).

There is no such consensus, however, in diesel particulate exposure regulations in various occupational health environments. The *elemental carbon* (EC) definition—which excludes all organic content, sulfates, or inorganic ash—appears to become the preferred representation. Sometimes, the *total carbon* (TC) definition, which includes both the elemental and organic carbon but no sulfates, is also used.

Once released into the atmosphere, diesel PM becomes a part of the ambient suspended particulate matter, which also includes a number of other components, such as:

- Natural PM material including mineral dust, sea salt, biologic substance (plant/animal debris, pollen, ...)
- Combustion particles from sources other than internal combustion engines: power plants, industrial plants, heating furnaces
- Secondary particles formed from gaseous precursors in the atmosphere: mostly nitrates and sulfates

Ambient particulates are measured according to a large variety of protocols, but in general they do include both solid and liquid material, just as it was the case with diesel PM.

Health effects from exposure to diesel PM and non-diesel particles are extremely difficult to separate. Since particulates from different sources are often similar, so are the health effects they may cause. In fact, health effects caused by some gaseous pollutants may be also similar to those caused by particles. Despite these challenges, research studies have always attempted to separate the toxic effects of gaseous and particle pollution from different sources. This type of knowledge is essential for the policy makers to establish control strategies that would maximize the public health benefit by targeting the most critical sources of pollution

2. IF the town of Paradise is going to continue to rebuild at the current (or faster) rate, it has in the past year, this logging operation will SLOW DOWN that progress substantially. This operation IS NOT in the best interest of anyone currently living, rebuilding or working in Paradise.

My name is Anne Hansen and my husband, Tony, and I own property on Craft Lane in Paradise. Part of our property adjoins a part of the Anderson property in question. We want to support the project which Mr. Anderson is proposing.

Like almost everyone living in Paradise right now, we are camp fire survivors. We survived the fire but lost our home and are currently rebuilding. After the fire, when we had to make a decision to build or leave, Paradise was not a very pretty place. But we had 29 years of memories of what Paradise had been - and could become again.

After the fire, burned debris was everywhere and we had to endure months of heavy traffic, congestion with debris trucks, dirt and dust and all the inconvenience that went with debris cleaning. But the job was completed and Paradise is looking much better.

Now we are faced with dead trees everywhere we turn and for Paradise to return to the beautiful town we had, the dead trees must go.

I think the camp fire has taught us some patience and the willingness to make some sacrifices on the short term for the better results in the future. It would seem that Mr. Andersons project is a project that would help many people, who might have difficulty with the tree removal, get it done.

I think we all want Paradise to become a beautiful place to live, just as it was before the fire. We are willing to sacrifice a short term inconvenience which would facilitate that happening.

Dear Dina,

I am having difficulty with my email and respectfully request that you disregard the previous version of my public comment and please use the below version.

Mr. Mayor and Council Members:

Good evening. I am Bill Hartley, a resident of Paradise for 39 years. I am opposed to the proposed log storage and wood processing yard on Skyway, but I am not opposed to the tree program. I recognize the need to remove the dead and hazardous trees, but creating another hazard to fix a hazard does not make sense.

As you know, I retired from the Paradise Police Dept after 20 years of service to our town. I know the history of the Skyway curve at the gateway to our town and know of several fatalities on that curve and numerous accidents. In police circles we called this section "Deadman's Curve," but later renamed it "Curtis Corner" after Officer John Curtis broke his leg jumping out of the path of an out-of-control car. Officer Curtis was there during daylight hours investigating an accident that happened the previous day.

I lived off Neal Road for 38 years and my property backs up to the Anderson property. From my home there were numerous times I heard car tires screeching and metal crunching as cars tumbled off the curve and filed several phone reports after hearing the accident. Although some of the hazard may be mitigated with traffic control, stopping traffic on a curve will be hazardous and cause severe delays on one the busiest roadways in Paradise, if this project is allowed. This is not necessary as there are other suitable sites available that will not cause extreme traffic control measures to alleviate hazards.

This is a residential zone and allowing an industrial business in this zone sets a precedent for future industrial projects in residential neighborhoods. Safety should be the town's top priority and other sites can process trees without jeopardizing the health and safety of the residents you, the council, represent.

I realize this is scheduled to be a 6-month temporary project, common sense tells me that it is nearly impossible to process thousands of trees in such a short time. Most likely there will be a request to extend the permit duration, and realistically the operation will continue for 12 to 18 months. I believe that is the estimate by tree experts. All this can be avoided by locating this wood processing operation to a different site.

Again, does it make sense to create a hazard to reduce a hazard? Please don't put your constituents' health in jeopardy and make safety your top priority.

I understand that the tree removal needs to happen and they need property to to use for this purpose but I have to say there are many better suited areas for this in Paradise. This is the literal entrance to our town, it would be the "Welcome to Paradise". To ever say that the traffic in this location wouldn't be a problem, you would have never had traveled the Skyway into Paradise...

### Dear Council Members and Mayor,

Please consider moving in the direction of the Planning Comissions decision to have use the Anderson Brothers lot on Skyway as a location to take brush and trees. Traffic can be directed and slowed with the use of flaggers and cones, just as it was when the golf course property was used to house the debris removal workers. And we all know there is far less traffic than ever be cause of far less people living in the ridge. Is the golf course a good location? Sure it is, but what is the cost to lease that property and who covers that cost? Dave's project is to help those who may not a means to pay for hauling, dumping, etc. Time is money. The location is great because it is in close proximity to Paradise. Some lots have 15 or more trees to be removed. We have received bids to clean up our property from \$14,000 - \$22,500. At \$3500 per day, do you want to pay for drive time for trucks to go to who knows where to take the debris.

It is imperitave the trees and brush get cleared. Fire season is approaching fast as well as the timing for possible bark beetle infestation on dead trees. And we all know how dangerous that is.

Hello,

My name is Mike Cosentino. I live in the Blue Oaks Subdivision adjacent to the proposed Anderson Logging yard. I wanted to express my concerns on the site that has been picked for this particular yard. A little history on me, I have driven trucks for more that 35 years, I have managed drivers for more than 25 years and I am currently a Logistics Manager over semi's here in northern Ca.

Having a fully loaded logging truck heading down the Skyway in the fast lane and trying to slow down enough to make the turn onto the Crossroads is an extremely dangerous maneuver. It takes over 2 football fields to stop a truck traveling 50 miles an hour. Then to make the turn, which is sharper than 90 degrees, will be extremely hard for any driver. If there were to be another vehicle turning down the Skyway from the Crossroad it is certain to be hit. That corner is hard enough in a regular sized vehicle. I have heard that there is talk about putting in another crossover road just above that, but without a proper turning lane in place you will have the same result. There will undoubtedly be many inexperienced drivers hired on to help with the volume of trees that they are talking about hauling, this will compound the issue and potentially hurt someone.

Then you now have the issue of crossing the Skyway against oncoming traffic heading into Paradise. There is just too much potential for accidents coming down and then going up the Skyway. I know that you've heard this many times over. But, this is just not the right location for this logging yard. Everyone knows that there are plenty of vacant lots throughout Paradise more suitable for this endeavor.

Please consider the safety of the truck drivers and other drivers on the road. This is just a bad decision and a very dangerous area to have this kind of traffic.

### Re: Appeal of Temporary Use Permit PL19-00383, Anderson Brothers Corp

As Camp Fire Survivors living beside Skyway at the Crossroad, **we appeal to you to <u>oppose</u>** <u>this location</u> (zoned RR 2/3) for industrial chipping, grinding, processing, and log storage.

Valid concerns about the proposed *location* were ignored once Mr. Anderson said "nonprofit":

- 1. **Traffic Safety**: Several memorials near our neighborhood attest to the danger of this blind curve heading into Paradise where cars travel 50+ mph.
  - Mr. Anderson's 40-home plan does not account for 285 trucks daily. One truck every three minutes for 12 hours creates a hazard, a bottleneck, and hinders evacuation.
  - Paradise Traffic-plan Review "after the log yard is in place" is too late.
  - Bill Hartley, Retired Police Officer & Paradise Resident, has investigated many wrecks at this curve, "... in police circles, we call this Deadman's Curve." I heard someone blame "drunk drivers". True or not, no one deserves to die. This curve is already dangerous.
- 2. **Fire Danger**: Dead trees stacked 20 x 30 x 500 feet pose an ENORMOUS FIRE DANGER to nearby families evacuated in 2017 and 2018.

A 12,000 gallon portable tank & trucks seem <u>inadequate</u>, based on our recent experiences.

- 3. **Residential Zone**: Camp Fire Survivors rebuilding homes and lives after an event that devastated Us All surround the proposed site, Zoned: RR2/3 on the town's map.
  - Paradise, with 2,500 people/homes distributed, must have safer sites to use.
  - Clark and Pence have industrial sites—though I heard someone say one neighborhood would be too close at a half mile away. What makes the proposed site <u>a few hundred feet</u> from homes and families the better choice?
- 4. Environmental Degradation
  - Air Quality: Daily wind poses health issues dispersing debris from chipping, grinding, processing Seven days/week, 7 am to 7 pm per the permit.
  - Contamination: Our neighborhood has two uncovered 20,000 gallon water

tanks a few hundred feet from the proposed site--provided to Cal Fire as needed.

- **A second Cal Fire resource**, Nance pond directly behind my home, is below grade and could be compromised by runoff from the proposed site.
- 5. Project Duration: Extensions affect all neighbors. Is 7 months genuinely realistic to finish and clean? Mr Anderson said this is a "very short term project"--to be operational will "take a month, <u>at best</u>"). What happens if ROE forms are not received on time? What about CEQA requirements after the end of the year?

This is a list of my concerns:

1. Traffic congestion and dangerous road conditions as well as the excess noise involved in the operation.

For the operation itself large trucks will generate much slow traffic as the trucks navigate in an out of the facility. Skyway is congested at the Neal Juncture so this is a salient issue for all entering and leaving Paradise on a daily basis.

2. Health hazards of the dust emitted -Govt regulations recommend that operations like this be father than 2 miles in any direction from residential areas.

If there is actual sawing going on at the site- Exposure to Cobalt -Stellite tipped saw blades generate a fine dust containing cobalt when sharpened. Cobalt is a silvery, bluish-white, odorless, and magnetic metal. The fume and dust of cobalt metal is odorless and black. Cobalt also is combustible

and burns brilliantly in air at room temperature. Dusts of cobalt metal or cobalt compounds may form explosive mixtures in air.

Inhalation of cobalt metal fume and dust may cause interstitial fibrosis, interstitial pneumonitis, myocardial and thyroid disorders, and sensitization of the respiratory tract and skin. Chronic cobalt poisoning may also produce polycythemia and hyperplasia of the bone marrow. Among 12 workers engaged in the manufacture or grinding of tungsten carbide tools (cobalt is used as a binder for tungsten carbide crystals), who developed interstitial lung disease, there were eight fatalities.

Chronic exposure: Chronic exposure to cobalt metal, dust, or fume may cause respiratory or dermatologic signs and symptoms. Following skin sensitization, contact with cobalt causes eruptions of dermatitis in creases and on frictional surfaces of the arms, legs, and neck. Following sensitization of the respiratory system, cobalt exposure causes an obstructive lung disease with wheezing, cough, and shortness of breath. Chronic respiratory exposure results in reduced lung function, increased fibrotic changes on chest X-ray, production of scanty mucoid sputum, and shortness of breath. Chronic cobalt poisoning may cause polycythemia, hyperplasia of the bone marrow and thyroid gland, pericardial effusion, and damage to the alpha cells of the pancreas.

3. Fire Hazards-Flammability The National Fire Protection Association has not assigned a flammability rating to cobalt metal, dust, and fume; however, powdered cobalt (pyrophoric cobalt) is combustible and burns brilliantly in air at room temperature. Dusts of cobalt metal or cobalt compounds may form explosive mixtures in air.

4. Exposure to wood dust- long been associated with a variety of adverse health effects, including dermatitis, allergic respiratory effects, mucosal and nonallergic respiratory effects, and cancer. Contact with the irritant compounds in wood sap can cause dermatitis and other allergic reactions. The respiratory effects of wood dust exposure include asthma, hypersensitivity pneumonitis, and chronic bronchitis. Aerosol distribution of large amounts of pesticides used for the protection of the stored wood may also pose a health hazard hazard.

5. Diesel exhaust - a combination mixture of gases, vapors and liquid aerosols. The main component of chain saw exhaust emissions are hydrocarbons. Breathing in these diesel fumes can cause adverse health effects.-Irritation of eyes, nose and throat, Dizziness (lightheadedness), Nausea (feeling sick to stomach), Wheezing, Headache, Drowsiness (feeling sleepy)Long-term (Chronic) Effects Increased susceptibility to bacterial or viral respiratory infections, Asthma, Persistent cough, Lung cancer, Lack of coordination, Blood disorders

I've attached information that has been verified by experts to call attention to risks that must be addressed before allowing this operation to proceed.
