Pipestone, Minnesota July 7, 2025

Pursuant to due call and notice thereof, a Special Meeting of the Pipestone City Council was duly held in the city council chambers at Pipestone City Hall at 5:30 p.m. on the 7<sup>th</sup> day of July 2025. Mayor Dan Delaney called the meeting to order. Members present: Dan Delaney, Danielle Thompson, Rodger Smidt, and Verdeen Colbeck. Others present: Robin Weis, EDA Director Justin Schroyer, City Engineer Travis Winter via Zoom, Public Access Coordinator Steve Moffitt, Assistant City Administrator-Clerk Stephanie LaBrune, and City Administrator Deb Nelson.

Mayor Delaney called the meeting to order and stated the purpose of the special meeting was to hold a work session to discuss the US EDA FY2025 Disaster Supplemental grant program. He then invited guest, Robin Weis with the Southwest Regional Development Commission (SRDC) to give a presentation on the federal grant program.

Weis explained that the SRDC serves as the Economic Development District (EDD) for the nine counties in southwest Minnesota. She stated following a notice of funding opportunity that came out for the federal grant program she met with Nelson, Winter, and LaBrune and discussed applying for the funding to develop the north Hiawatha land into an industrial park. Weis stated that Pipestone County is listed as one of the latest disaster declarations and would qualify for the funding especially with the city's current industrial park being full. Additionally, she told the council that there could be up to 80% funding available. Further details about funding and cost estimates were discussed. Engineer Winter also shared that he will be working to apply for Business Development Public Infrastructure (BDPI) funds to assist with the engineering costs and help with the required 20% match that is required with the federal grant. Weist also spoke about the scoring of the federal grant and added that Schroyer is working to obtain letters from current and possible future businesses that may be impacted by the proposed industrial park project.

Attorney Hill then explained the detachment process to the council in the event that an application is brought forth seeking detachment from the city in the near future.

Delaney stated, this resolution if approved will accept the following donations:

#### Resolution 2025-42

Delaney said this resolution if approved will allow the City Clerk to sign off on an application for authorization for exemption from lawful gambling license with no waiting period for the Pipestone Sportsmen's Club who plan to hold a raffle drawing at Dave's Guns in Pipestone on August 27, 2025. The Sportsmen's Club will be raffling off a lawn mower as a part of a fundraising event.

Motion was made by Smidt, seconded by Colbeck, and unanimously carried to approve Resolution 2025-42: Resolution Regarding an Application for Authorization for Exemption from Lawful Gambling License.

# Resolution 2025-43

Delaney explained to the council that if the resolution is approved it will order the preparation of a report on improvement from the City Engineer pertaining to a proposed 2026 Street and Utility Improvement project on 2<sup>nd</sup> Ave. S.W. from State Highway 30 to 10<sup>th</sup> St. S.W. and assess the benefited properties for a portion of the costs of improvement pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 429. Delaney shared that the City Utility Committee recently met and is recommending that the council move forward with this project as a priority project for 2026.

Swanson added that the street is one of the worst streets in town and the utilities are needed to be

upgraded as well.

Motion was made by Smidt, seconded by Swanson, and unanimously carried to approve Resolution 2025-43: Resolution Ordering Preparation of Report on Improvement.

# 1-4 Day Temporary On-Sale Liquor License

Delaney stated the Pipestone Jaycees have submitted an application for a 1-4 day on sale liquor license in order to serve alcohol at the Pipestone County Fair on the Dates of July  $30^{th}$  – August  $1^{st}$ . He said to approve the request; the council will need to authorize the City Clerk to sign the application so it can be forwarded to the state alcohol and gambling enforcement division for their final consideration.

Motion was made by Smidt, seconded by Thompson, and unanimously carried to approve having the city clerk sign the 1-4 Day Temporary On-Sale Liquor License for the Pipestone Jaycees and forward the application to the State of Minnesota for their approval.

# Set Budget Input Public Hearing Date

Delaney shared that staff is recommending the council hold a public hearing on July 21<sup>st</sup> at 6:30 p.m. during the regularly scheduled city council meeting to hear public input on the 2026 budget. He said to confirm the Public Hearing date, time, and location a motion is needed.

Motion was made by Thompson, seconded by Colbeck, and unanimously carried to set the public hearing date to hear public input on the 2026 budget for July 21<sup>st</sup> at approximately 6:30 p.m. in the council chambers.

# Set Interest Rate and Term for 2023 Street & Utility Improvement Project Assessments

Delaney said as a part of the assessment process for the 2023 Street and Utility Improvements Project, the council will need to set the interest rate and term for the assessment to the property owners located within the project area. He shared that the true bond interest rate is 3.47% and the council approved assessing the project at 1.5% over the bond rate which results in an interest rate of 5%. He also added that the term of the bond repayment schedule is 10 years. He then called for a motion.

Motion was made by Colbeck, seconded by Thompson, and unanimously carried to approve the interest rate of 5% and a term of 10 years on the 2023 Street & Utility Improvements Project Assessments.

#### Resolution 2025-44

Nelson stated that historically the former County Engineer, Dave Halbersma, choose to do the bidding of Safe Routes to School (SRTS) Projects; however, it was discussed between Winter and County Engineer Nicholas Bergman and decided that it would make more sense for the city to bid the SRTS project since the city will be installing and maintaining the project. Nelson said the resolution if approved would allow the city's engineer to proceed with obtaining bids for the project with the bid opening being held at the August 4<sup>th</sup> council meeting.

Motion by Swanson, seconded by Smidt and unanimously carried to approve Resolution 2025-44: Resolution Approving Plans and Specifications and Ordering Advertisement for Bids.

- (11) Spraying of trees. Whenever the Tree Inspector determines that any tree or wood is infected or threatened with infection, he or she may spray or treat all nearby high value trees with an effective concentrate or fungicide or both. Activities authorized by this division (H) shall be conducted in accordance with technical and expert opinions and plans of the Commissioner of Agriculture and under the supervision of the Commissioner and his or her agents whenever possible. The notice and assessment provisions of division (H)(6) above apply to spraying and treatment operations conducted under this division (H)(11).
  - (I) Storage restrictions include the following.
- (1) Firewood shall be stored in compact and orderly fashion so as not to constitute a hazard to adjacent buildings or property and to endanger the public health; all firewood shall be stored or stacked up off the surface of the ground.
- (2) Stacks of wood in the open shall not exceed six feet in the height and shall not be located less than five feet from a boundary line, without consent of adjacent property owners.
- (3) There shall be no front yard or front lot storage of firewood in the city, provided that this division (I)(3) shall not prevent businesses that sell firewood from displaying firewood to the public in a manner that is deemed necessary for said business purposes, as long as said storage and display does not violate any other of the provisions of the section.
  - (J) Dense smoke, noxious fumes, gas and soot, or cinders in unreasonable quantities; and/or
- (K) Storing of hazardous materials such as gasoline, paint, oil, and other hazardous chemicals unless it is in an enclosed building. (2005 Code, § 13.02) Penalty, see § 92.99

# § 92.03 PUBLIC NUISANCE AFFECTING PEACE AND SAFETY.

The following are declared to be nuisances affecting public peace and safety:

- (A) All trees, hedges, billboards, or other obstructions which prevent people from having a clear view of all traffic approaching an intersection;
- (B) All wires and limbs of trees which are so close to the surface of the sidewalk or street as to constitute a danger to pedestrians or vehicles;
  - (C) All unnecessary noises and annoying vibrations;
- (D) Every motor vehicle shall at all times be equipped with a muffler in good working order which blends the exhaust noise into the overall vehicle noise and is in constant operation to prevent excessive

or unusual noise, and no person shall use a dynamic engine or transmission brake, muffler cutout, bypass, or similar device upon a motor vehicle on a street or highway. The exhaust system shall not emit or produce a sharp popping or crackling sound;

- (E) Obstructions and excavations affecting the ordinary public use of streets, alleys, sidewalks, or public grounds except under such conditions as are permitted by this code or other applicable law;
  - (F) Radio aerials or television antennas erected and maintained in a dangerous manner;
- (G) Any use of property abutting on a public street or sidewalk which causes large crowds of people to gather, obstructing traffic and the free use of the street or sidewalk;
- (H) All hanging signs, awnings, and other similar structures over streets and sidewalks, or so situated as to endanger public safety; or not constructed and maintained as provided by ordinance;
- (I) The allowing of rain water, ice, or snow to fall from any building or structure upon any street or sidewalk or to flow across any sidewalk;
- (K) All dangerous, unguarded machinery in any public place, or so situated or operated on private property as to attract the public;
  - (L) Waste water cast upon or permitted to flow upon streets or other public properties;
- (M) Accumulation of discarded or disused machinery, household appliances, automobile bodies, or other material in a mariner creating fire, health, or safety hazards from such accumulation;
- (N) All materials not intended for or a part of landscaping or functionability of the property shall be stored inside a structure suitable for storage or concealed from public view;
- (O) Any well, hole, or similar excavation which is left uncovered or in such other condition as to constitute a hazard to any child or other person coming on the premises where it is located;
- (P) Obstruction to the free flow of water in a natural waterway or a public street drain, gutter, or ditch with trash or other materials;
- (Q) The placing or throwing on any street, sidewalk, or other public property of any glass, tacks, nails, bottles, or other substance which may injure any person or animal or damage any pneumatic tire when passing over such substance;
  - (R) The depositing of garbage, refuse, or debris on public or private property; and
- (S) All other conditions or things which are likely to cause injury to the person or property of anyone.

#### Miscellaneous Misdemeanors

- (B) The conditions or limitations set forth in said permit have been violated;
- (C) Violations set forth in any written notice served upon a permittee by the Fire Marshal/Fire Chief have not been corrected within the time required by the notice; or
- (D) The permit is being used for any premises or location other than that for which it was issued. (2005 Code, § 10.42)

### § 93.26 REPORTING FIRES.

It is unlawful for the occupant of any property upon which any unauthorized fire is burning, whether the fire was started by the occupant or otherwise, to fail to promptly report the fire to the nearest forestry office, fire department, or other proper authority. The occupant of the premises shall be deemed prima facie guilty of negligence if the unreported fire spreads from the property or causes damage, loss, or injury to another person, that person's property, or the state. # § 93.99 PENALTY.

- (A) (1) Any person, firm, or corporation who violates any provision of this code for which another penalty is not specifically provided shall, upon conviction, be guilty of a misdemeanor. The penalty which may be imposed for any crime which is a misdemeanor under this code, including state statutes specifically adopted by reference, shall be a sentence of not more than 90 days or a fine of not more than \$1,000, or both.
- (2) Any person, firm, or corporation who violates any provision of this code, including state statutes specifically adopted by reference, which is designated to be a petty misdemeanor shall, upon conviction, be guilty of a petty misdemeanor. The penalty which may be imposed for any petty offense which is a petty misdemeanor shall be a fine of not more than \$300.
- (3) In either the case of a misdemeanor or a petty misdemeanor, the costs of prosecution may be added. A separate offense shall be deemed committed upon each day during which a violation occurs or continues.
- (4) The failure of any officer or employee of the city to perform any official duty imposed by this code shall not subject the officer or employee to the penalty imposed for violation. (2005 Code, § 10.99)
- (B) (1) Any person, firm, or corporation who violates any provision of § 93.20 for which another penalty is not specifically provided shall, upon conviction, be guilty of a misdemeanor. The penalty

which may be imposed for any crime which is a misdemeanor under this code, including state statutes specifically adopted by reference, shall be a sentence of not more than 90 days or a fine of not more than \$1,000, or both.

- (2) Any person, firm, or corporation who violates any provision of this code, including state statutes specifically adopted by reference, which is designated to be a petty misdemeanor shall, upon conviction, be guilty of a petty misdemeanor. The penalty which may be imposed for any petty offense which is a petty misdemeanor shall be a fine of not more than \$300.
- (3) In either the case of a misdemeanor or a petty misdemeanor, the costs of prosecution may be added. A separate offense shall be deemed committed upon each day during which a violation occurs or continues.
- (4) The failure of any officer or employee of the city to perform any official duty imposed by this code shall not subject the officer or employee to the penalty imposed for violation. (2005 Code, § 10.40)
