**Facilities Maintenance and Repair** 

**Position:** Facilities Maintenance and Repair

**Department:** Village Public Property

**Reports to:** Clerk/Treasurer and Board of Trustees **Employment Category**: On Call, Part-time, Non-exempt

Schedule: Part-time - An average of 25 hours a week with possibly more in the summer and less in the winter

#### Job brief:

A skilled maintenance worker that performs upkeep tasks such as repairs and cleaning. Responsible for applying basic fixes to equipment and building systems and ensure facilities are tidy and functional. Performs a variety of unskilled or semi-skilled maintenance work, and operates a variety of small equipment in the construction, repair, maintenance, and replacement of commercial building systems and infrastructure of the village.

#### **Essential Skills, Knowledge, and Abilities:**

Maintenance experience and solid technical knowledge with the ability to read and interpret manuals and technical specifications. Duties require manual dexterity and physical stamina. Reliability, self-direction, initiative, and a keen eye for detail are important for success in this position.

#### **Essential Duties and Responsibilities:**

- Assist in the maintenance and smooth operation of all village public property
- Perform cleaning activities such as dusting, mopping etc.
- Perform minor fixes such as repairing broken locks, filling gaps in walls, water pipe leaks etc.
- Check control panels and electrical wiring to identify issues
- Install appliances and equipment
- Do garden/yard upkeep by mowing lawn, collecting trash etc.
- Conduct maintenance tasks such as replacing light bulbs
- Inspect and troubleshoot equipment and systems (e.g. ventilation)
- Check functionality of safety systems (e.g. fire alarm)
- Collaborate with workers and other professionals during renovations, repairs, or other work
- Ensure the proper maintenance of equipment and tools by cleaning and checking equipment and tools after use
- Drive trucks of various sizes and weights along with loading, hauling, and unloading of various equipment and sand, gravel, dirt, etc.
- Drive trucks and equipment during snow plowing and snow removal
- Available On-Call 24/7 (i.e.: Winter Emergencies, Severe Weather, Water Main Breaks, etc.)
- Works independently after receiving tasks and is expected to make reasonable on-the-job practical decisions.
- Keep log of work completed, seasonal tasks completed, and provide monthly work reports for the village board

- High School Diploma or Equivalent
- Proven experience or other similar position
- Experience using hand and electrical tools

- Effective communication and interpersonal skills
- Physical stamina and dexterity

#### **Special Requirements:**

Possesses or ability to obtain a Commercial Drivers License

#### **Physical Requirements:**

- Must be able to lift 50 pounds and operate heavy machinery in day and night conditions
- Must be able to twist, bend, turn, and stretch repeatedly
- Manual dexterity and ability to operate hand tools safely

#### **Additional Expectations**

- Participates in cleaning storm drains and inlets.
- Participates in installing, removing, and replacing traffic signs; street parking stall and crosswalk striping.
- Operates truck with snow plow or salt spreader; operates pickup, dump truck, backhoe and other motorized equipment.
- Professionally assist Village residents, concerned citizens, or contractor with any complaints. Report problems to the Clerk/Treasurer. Follows directions from Village Board.
- Performs other work as assigned.
- Provide detailed monthly reports of work performed and areas of concern for village board review
- Public Relations highly visible work activity (i.e. Snow Plowing, performing street maintenance, etc.)

### From MSA Original CIP dated 2006-2012:

#### I. INTRODUCTION

Communities today are faced with the difficult task of allocating limited resources among a seemingly unlimited number of demands and needs for public services. In many instances, local officials must determine the merits of one project over another without the benefit of comparison, which may result in misjudgment and further limit the community's ability to act precisely on major budget allocation decisions. One method available to local units of government to help manage and systematize the budget allocation process is a Capital Improvement Program.

Capital Improvement Programming (CIP) is simply an ongoing, systematic approach to identify, schedule, and efficiently allocate public dollars to needed capital projects. Typically, a CIP schedules needed municipal projects over a period of five years. Projects, including cost estimates and funding sources, are assigned a date for completion based on community needs and revenues. Each year the program is updated and extended one year to stay responsible to the community's changing needs. CIP will eliminate "crises" or reactive financial management.

A carefully developed CIP allows a community to anticipate its facility needs and to schedule improvements according to project needs and its local financial capabilities. The CIP process offers several additional benefits to a community.

- 1. Aid in the task of effectively allocating limited resources among a seemingly unlimited number of demands and needs for public service;
- 2. Improve communications and cooperation among various interests in the community;
- 3. Provide continuity in financial decisions by linking long-term planning to the programming and budgeting of major projects;
- 4. Stabilize local tax rates by more effectively relating expenditures to financial capacity in a given time frame; and
- 5. Improve local ability to use state and federal grant-in-aid programs.

#### II. THE CIP PROCESS

While the process may vary from community to community, a typical CIP procedure will include the following steps:

- A. Analyze Community Facility Needs
- B. Prepare Project Descriptions
- C. Analyze Fiscal Capacity
- D. Set Project Priorities
- E. Develop and Adopt CIP
- F. Update CIP Annually
- 1. <u>Analyze Community Facility Needs</u> A community begins by analyzing its community facilities and the services it provides with an emphasis on its adequacy to serve the people and identify future capital improvement needs. The analysis will typically include municipal facilities such as public water and sewer systems, streets and sidewalks, municipal protection facilities, recreational facilities, and certain economic development related interests of the community.
- 2. <u>Prepare Project Descriptions</u> After determining the need for capital improvements, it is necessary to collect details on the project so that its implementation priority can be accurately and equitably assigned. Cost estimates, project schedule, locations, and potential funding sources are listed for each project.
- 3. <u>Analyze Fiscal Capacity</u> The next step is to analyze the community's financial capacity to fund capital improvements. The financial analyses examines projected operating revenues and expenses for each year of the programming period. The amount of financing available for capital projects equals the surplus of projected operating revenues over expenditures. The analysis must also consider debt servicing as an alternate form of financing.
- 4. <u>Set Project Priorities</u> Since a community will often identify more projects than can be funded, priorities must be established. By doing so, priorities can be established so that limited financial resources are allocated efficiently. To accomplish this task, criteria is set to provide some objective standards in establishing priorities.
- 5. <u>Develop and Adopt CIP</u> The final CIP combines the individual project descriptions, priorities, and financial analyses into a recommended schedule of capital projects. Upon general consensus of local officials, the CIP should be adopted by resolution supporting the recommended program.

6. <u>Implementation and Updating</u> - It should be emphasized that the CIP is a flexible and dynamic document that is updated annually to reflect changing needs and new priorities. Each year the community will identify new projects, monitor fiscal capacity and set new priorities for the upcoming year. Through annual review and updating, the CIP will reflect the most current goals and priorities of the community.

#### III. 2021-2026:

Inventory of local Government Infrastructure Assets were roughly compiled and is an ongoing process. In 2022, the village will implement an asset management, tagging, and preventative maintenance system. Delta 3 met with Village of Ridgeway Public Works to determine priority projects relating to Streets, Sidewalks, and other Public Works projects. Streets are rated yearly and logged biannually under the PASER and WISLR systems. Equipment information was obtained by the manufacturer or retailer.

It is recommended to incorporate a list of all asset information with a value of \$5,000 or more that:

- Describes the current condition
- Estimates the useful life expectancy
- Estimates full replacement costs
- Estimates maintenance costs
