#### Call to Order

- Mayor Pro tem Peggy Gutjahr called to order the special workshop at 2:06.
- Present: Mayor Pro tem Peggy Gutjahr, Councilor Bill Brown, Councilor Winters, Economic Development Chair Kuan Tikkun, EDC Secretary Fran Rossberg, and Mr. Frank Logan.

Present: City Manager Dr. Martin Moore and Deputy Clerk Amy L. Lopez

#### **Business Outreach Forum**

- Mayor Pro tem Peggy Gutjahr began the discussion with saying the City Manager has been tasked with meeting with all business leaders to have a conversation regarding the issues they have.
- Chair Tikkun said it was helpful to meet this morning as a Commission to discuss what we would speak to Council about today. She then explained EDC is planning a lunch meeting with the businesses in Rio Communities on October 21, 2021 from 12:00 to 1:30.
- Mr. Logan said we are planning on sending out an invitation to the businesses in early September to see how many of the businesses would be interested in attending so that we can plan on how many we would have to feed and began a discussion.
- Mayor Pro tem Gutjahr said we were looking to having a forum to let the businesses tell us what they are needing, and she is not sure how what EDC is doing fits into what the City Manager has in mind.
- Manager Dr. Moore said it could go very well hand-in-hand.
- Chair Tikkun said after getting the questionnaires back was realizing that businesses want to advertise on social media and was not sure if they meant that they do not know how to and maybe we can help them with that and continued the discussion.
- Secretary Rossberg said we might ask for feedback when we send out the RSVP on what they want to discuss.
- Mayor Pro tem Gutjahr said sharing the results of the survey with the businesses might be a positive thing and felt there might be a list of things they come to the meeting with, and we might be able to address or point them into the right direction. She continued to say we are getting quotes for the electronic sign and we might be able to use that as a tool. She explained they might be able to teach each other as peers. The discussion continued.
- Manager Dr. Moore said there might be an opportunity for us as a City for the businesses to see that the City is trying to market and improve the City.
- Chair Tikkun said that if we find at the meeting that they want training on Social Media, then, when the library is finished, we can host some training there. She then asked if it was possible to establish a Chamber of Commerce. The discussion continued.

- Manager Dr. Moore said he has seen a Chamber of Commerce in a small City of 3,000. He then explained that there are a lot of businesses being conducted in the residential areas and there might be a chance of having a Chamber of Commerce. The discussion continued.
- Mayor Pro tem Gutjahr asked City Manager Dr. Moore if he sees the forum and the meet and greet as being separate.
- Manager Dr. Moore suggesting have a separate on but working hand-in-hand with EDC and began a discussion.
- Chair Tikkun said she was thinking that it would be a joint effort.
- Mayor Pro Tem said they will be talking to the businesses about how the City can help, parking, and other issues. She continued to say another issue the City is dealing with currently is the Marijuana ordinance and we have to have that in place by September and that will also impact our businesses.
- Secretary Rossberg said we have a conversation this morning about having the City Manager or Mayor Pro tem being a speaker at our meet and greet.
- Mayor Pro Tem said there will be two separate events, a meet and greet luncheon between businesses with one of us as a speaker, and the other would be a City forum with the businesses. She then said it might be helpful to have our own Chamber and Sue Moran has mentioned there are a lot of businesses in Tierra Grande that might want to be part of the Chamber as well. The discussion continued.

#### **Future Direction of EDC**

- Mayor Pro tem Gutjahr said there is a non-profit, RCAN, that you are involved in as well.
- Chair Tikkun said she is resigning as Chair of RCAN and is not sure what the fate of it is.
- Mr. Logan said there are many things we can do as a non-profit, but we are waiting to see what the City needs and get some more members.
- Mayor Pro tem Gutjahr said the more you can get businesses looking for options and the more they understand how a non-profit can help them, the more people might want to sit on the board. The discussion continued.
- Mr. Logan said we also need more people interested in EDC.
- Councilor Brown said he is surprised that people are pulling out of RCAN and the difference of the focus between what the City Manager is doing and what EDC is doing is clear. He recommended holding a forum in the multi-purpose room because it can hold a lot of people.
- Chair Tikkun said she has been interested in a new logo and branding for over a year and we were told to do it and then were chastised by procurement and the branding and logo were handed over to the City Manager and procurement. She then explained the brand and logo would be discussed after the strategic goals and then we will be responsible for the branding and logo after it was decided what the goals were.
- Mayor Pro tem Gutjahr said the last thing that was said was strategic planning would be done first, then the City will work on it, and we will be working with EDC, but it will not be solely EDC's responsibility; our last conversation with the Council and the City Manager would be to look at branding and maybe EDC would be able to help with a logo and a logo for EDC and began a discussion.
- Mayor Pro tem said this does not hold up anything that EDC does while you are waiting for a new logo.

Chair Tikkun said she feels that an outside marketer is important. She then explained Garth Tallman with Pecos Homes is advertising Rio Communities as a retirement community and with the ABQsites.com we are getting more and more retirees, and until we can get more jobs, we won't get the younger people. She then said highlighting the areas on the map for manufactured homes might be a good idea because they are slightly less expensive. She said Garth Tallman will be at the Becker Street Fair and the Embassy Suites. The discussion continued.

#### **EDC Update**

- Chair Tikkun said we are working on the digital brochure, taking Henry Rau's long presentation, making it a shorter digital brochure, and with the help of the City Manager, obtaining a city map from MRCOG. She then said once we get a current map of Rio Communities, we will have it added to ABQsites.com. A discussion began regarding the incorrectness of the boundary map of Rio Communities.
- Chair Tikkun said once we get that map and submit this to ABQsites.com, we will be ready to share the brochure at the events in October.
- Councilor Winters said there are three areas Garth Tallman is looking to build and we are working behind the scenes to help him get homes built here; there are also two other smaller builders building here as well. The discussion continued.
- Chair Tikkun said one thing EDC is doing to promote businesses is to spotlight businesses on social media and began a discussion.
- Chair Tikkun said the churches that we have are not required do not have to have business licenses and asked if we can include them in the event for businesses.
- Mayor Pro tem Gutjahr said yes and continued the discussion.
- Chair Tikkun said Loedi Silva has been promoting the City on social media and it is driving people to our website.
- Manager Dr. Moore said it is good to see the Council and EDC working together and moving in the right direction.
- Councilor Winters said the biggest untapped businesses in the City are the homebased businesses that we don't know about.

#### **General/open Discussion**

- Mayor Pro tem Gutjahr said the American Rescue Act has deposited the first installment to the City and the Council is looking how to best use that money and continued the discussion.
- Mayor Pro tem Gutjahr said the American Rescue Act will cover things that you had to do, people you had to hire because of the pandemic, items that include health, and the City Manager has been looking into what we can use it for because we want to make sure we spend it correctly, but we won't know how to use it until the treasury lets us know.
- Mayor Pro tem gave an update on the library. She then said we have just approved phase one and phase two for the remodel and we will be moving Lisa and Amy to a temporary office that adjoins the office to the library until we get a librarian. The discussion continued.

#### **Call to Order**

• Mayor Pro tem Peggy Gutjahr called the special workshop to order at 5:30 pm.

#### Present:

 Present: Mayor Pro-Tem Peggy Gutjahr, (virtual) Councilor Bill Brown, Councilor Joshua Ramsell and Councilor Jim Winters.
 Planning and Zoning Commission: Chair Thomas Scroggins, Vice Chair John Thompson, Secretary Scott Adair, Members: Lawrence Gordon and L. E. Rubin
 Present: City Manager Dr. Martin Moore, Municipal Clerk Lisa Adair, and City Attorney Chris DeFillippo.

#### **Cannabis Ordinances(s)**

- Mayor Pro tem Gutjahr requested that there be a committee to go over the ordinance and have the Ordinance ready by August 5<sup>th</sup> and would like to have 2 meetings before the P&Z Meeting on August 9<sup>th</sup>. The committee includes Jim Winters, Joshua Ramsell, Marty Moore, Lawrence Gordon and Scott Adair and City Attorney DeFillippo.
- Attorney DeFillippo began a discussion regarding the working draft: Time, place and manner restrictions; 2 items in the State Statue are schools and daycares; Taos County is trying to create a law to prevent Cannabis distribution within 200' within a school or daycares; we have to comply State law, specifically what the RLD requires; Deadlines that are approaching September 1, 2021 these growing permits will start being issued, if the municipality does not have the ordinance in place, it is fair game, local growers can begin growing activities including vertical options, meaning they can sell where they grow; We cannot come in afterwards, so we would need to have our Ordinance in before they can get permits from the State or they would be grandfathered in.
- Mr. Gordon asked with Toas as a placeholder, if things are already starting to be put in place September 1<sup>st</sup>, will anything they do will be late when it goes into effect.
- Attorney DeFillippo explained with Taos' placeholder, once the Ordinance become
  effective, restriction become effective; they are using it as an emergency ordinance
  stating that they do not have to go through the same length of time; it is butting up to
  that deadline, there may be a gap between the permit issued and the ordinance taking
  effect, and the shorter we can make that they better assurance we have of not having
  the grandfathering issue.
- Chair Scroggins said if RC doesn't come up with an ordinance before September 1, but Valencia County comes up would we be under Valencia County Ordinance.
- Attorney DeFillippo explained no county or municipality can supersede state law and not municipality can supersede county law, however the municipality can add additional restriction to the county.

- Councilor Brown said Belen passed Ordinance 2021-10 and they have a couple of interesting features was 600' between retail establishments and limiting how many retail establishments there could be and those might be a couple of considerations for our working committee.
- Attorney DeFillippo said if you start restricting marijuana in a way that alcohol is not restricted, it would be considered unfair to the substance; we need to write an ordinance that reflects time, place, and manner restriction in a similar fashion to alcohol and began a discussion.
- Secretary Adair asked how you can restrict on the number of dispensaries we can have.
- Attorney DeFillippo said it will be through the State like alcohol regulations.
- Mayor Pro tem Gutjahr asked do we restrict the smoking outside of public buildings.
- Manager Moore said we could restrict them to smoking within 25' from the building.
- Attorney DeFillippo said it would be similar restriction to alcohol areas, you cannot drink in public places, however there are proposed indoor properties; there would need to be adequate restrictions on odors and continued the discussion.
- Councilor Winters asked about having restrictions of cigarette smokers outside of the building.
- Attorney DeFillippo explained yes, we can do that, and we can restrict where cannabis can be consumed.
- Vice Chair Thompson asked about driving from smoking places to their homes.
- Attorney DeFillippo explained it would be the same as a DWI and Colorado has developed an effective way for testing.
- Vice Chair Thompson said a couple of thoughts and said do we anticipate that the primary people that would be interested in these licenses, such as students, consumer company, or tobacco companies; regarding vertical growing, process, and have retail at one location, are there any municipalities that have separated that.
- Attorney DeFillippo said the vertical creation is by State statute, a municipality cannot restrict State statutes, a requirement can be put in place regarding the vertical implementation, has to meet all 3 requirements but cannot restrict the ability to be a vertical creation.
- Vice Chair Thompson asked regarding if some of these companies are backed by big companies, they will look for the municipalities with the easiest restrictions and asked what kind of restrictions would be putting in place.
- Attorney DeFillippo said that is the competing issue that every municipality is looking at, revenue vs. the difficulties it will bring, and the discussion continued.
- Mr. Rubin said have we considered Dollar General or other stores selling tobacco products to be allowed to sell vaping products with THC in them.
- Attorney DeFillippo said there is something in place that would require a state permit and an ordinance to be able to sell that. The discussion continued.
- Chair Scroggins asked if this is also age 21 for the purchase of marijuana.
- Attorney DeFillippo said yes.
- Manager Moore asked if this was mixed with other illegal substance, is there a differentiation between cannabis and illegal substances.
- Attorney DeFillippo said you would have to regulate cannabis against the illegal substance and the discussion continued.

- Councilor Winters said regarding the Taos setup they are mixing usages of land.
- Attorney DeFillippo said their ordinance has a land regulation and zoning built in and continued the discussion.
- Mr. Gordon asked where we would consider setting up an area for adult zones.
- Attorney DeFillippo said we can consider an adult area with a dispensary and consumption lounges, that would restrict times and odors and other aspects.
- Secretary Adair asked regarding an odor coming from a dispensary, what would be the difference from a restaurant.
- Attorney DeFillippo said that can be difficult to regulate to regulate odors.
- Councilor Brown asked what about vending machine restrictions.
- Attorney DeFillippo said that is something to address but does not know if we can address that right now. The discussion continued.
- Mayor Pro tem Gutjahr explained about a situation a couple of years ago regarding the odor.
- Attorney DeFillippo said you cannot restrict a person to smoke in their home, but you can make restrictions on smoking outside of your house or having proper ventilation, although it would be very hard to enforce.
- Secretary Adair asked if Colorado has a requirement for security.
- Attorney DeFillippo said he does not think it is a requirement, but the reason for that is banking issues. The discussion continued.
- Mr. Gordon asked would credit card purchases be allowed.
- Attorney DeFillippo said yes you can use a credit card but does not know what the regulations on the company for making a deposit for those purchases into a federal bank.
- Mr. Gordon said he would be a person that would like to see the ordinance very restrictive as a former police officer.
- The group decided to have a place holder to satisfy the requirement and then decide what is needed. The discussion continued.
- Chair Scroggins asked if Valencia County has passed an ordinance.
- Mayor Pro tem Gutjahr said yes it has been passed and it looks very extensive.
- Vice Chair Thompson asked about 90 days out we may look at modifying the nuisance ordinance to add some sign ordinance restrictions. The discussion continued.
- Manager Moore said he would like to establish the working dates, of August 2nd & 4th at 5:30, the 1st read at the City Council meeting on the 9th, final reading and public hearing on the 23rd to pass ordinance.

#### Accounts payable report

- Finance Clerk Angela Valadez went over the amounts over \$500.00: Ralph T. Barnes for work on the library in the amount of \$887.50; Tyler Technology for Incode training in the amount of \$710.80; PNM for City Hall electricity in the amount t of \$1,014.78; Paul Davis Restoration of New Mexico for water extraction from City Hall after flooding in the amount of 13,995.47; Universal Constructors, Inc for the removal of concrete bumpers in the amount of \$576.00; PNM for street lights in the amount of \$652.47; WEX Bank for Fire Department fuel in the amount of \$736.74; PNM for the fire department in the amount of \$1,429.73; FBT Architects for Existing Facility Assessment, Conceptual Design and tax in the amount of \$27,832.18 and coming out of the State Legislative Appropriation Projects.
- Mayor Pro tem Gutjahr asked about the electric bill and asked if we will be getting any reimbursements on the water retraction.
- Manager explained the adjuster did take pictures of the areas that flooded and right now we are waiting from the adjuster.

# Selection of dates for next public & businesses forums

- Manager Dr. Moore said he will be getting with the businesses and ask them what type of help they would like to see, such as a Chamber of Commerce and made a recommendation to have the meetings either the 26th, 30th or 31st.
- Council began a discussion on the other forums: ATVs, flooding issues, parks, and streetlights.
- Council began a discussion regarding having a forum with the mobile home parks, such as Vista Grande, Chamesa, Vista del Rio, Rivers Edge towards the end of September.
- Council then began a discussion about having a forum for the area of De Fuego, Riley, Damon, Goodman, Hillman end of September and change the mobile home parks to the 3rd week October. The discussion continued.

# ICIP (Infrastructure Capital Improvement Plan) & set public hearing date 8/23/2021

- Manager Moore read the ranking of the ICIP: Multi-purpose Complex, Storm water and drainage infrastructure; parks and open space; public safety equipment; pavement reconstruction; roadway beautification; roadways, trails, paths, and sidewalks; streetlights; fire department complex; public works complex; Valencia county wide public safety 700 MHZ radios.
- Council began a discussion on every rank:

Garth will be advertising his Rio Communities homes as retirement locations in the Prime Time Magazine available in ABQ in July; Loedi Silva reports that viewing (clicks) to the EDC website, www.riocommunitiesedc.net, is up thanks to her work promoting local businesses grand openings and Rio Communities events on social media; Fran Rossberg reports that one business owner requested to be reviewed by Spotlight so, the Spotlight ad in the Rio Communities newsletter works; July meetings: July 14<sup>th</sup> had no quorum but Frank Logan, Kuan Tikkun, and Dr. Moore were present. We reviewed the agenda for EDC/City council and decided to hold the business forum in October. Initially we looked at a Thursday either October 14 or 21. Chair Thomas Scroggins gave the report for P&Z: On July 15, 2021, Ms. Jaylynn Ruel, a resident at 304 Brugg Dr., petitioned the Commission for a variance to her property, specifically, to waive setback requirements between property lines and a horse shelter. Over the course of two hearings (the first, on July 1, was tabled as the Commission did not have the necessary quorum), the Commission heard testimony from Ms. Ruel and her neighbors. In the end, Ms. Ruel failed to demonstrate that the property on which the horse shelter was located (and thus, the illegal setbacks) was the result of physical irregularities in the property (e.g., too narrow, shallow, or steep or other limiting physical conditions). The Commission unanimously disapproved her petition for variance; The Commission reviewed latest version of Abatement ordinance (Draft 5) and the stand-alone Cannabis ordinance and voted to forward with recommendations to City Council for their review; On-going "action item" is the thorough review of the City's Comprehensive (Master) Plan; Discussion continues on sectioning City into distinct neighborhoods. Commissioner Thompson is POC for this project.

- Municipal Clerk Adair gave a report on Universal Waste Systems: Collection of \$3,908.97 in franchise fees; 1,999 Residential Sites with 1,848 active accounts, 95 accounts on credit hold, 51 vacant, and 40 residential sites, 480 or 25% of active residential accounts have discounts; 110 recycling subscriptions, 363 households with additional cart services and 80 bulk items collected.
- Municipal Clerk Adair read the Secretary of the State Proclamation regarding elections and explained what positions are up for election in Rio Communities.

- Public Works Director Reeves gave his report: We are looking to be having interviews for the two public works positions, we are working on potholes, Country Club Lane is being repaired and we are waiting for the asphalt curbing to be put in; public works has recorded new potholes due to flooding and we can charge those differently; took pictures of flood damage within the City; assessed City Hall roof and have made a few corrections and have tried to minimize the loss with the insurance company; we have scheduled storm cleanup with the contractors; installed temporary fencing in a couple of the alley ways near the 9 hole golf course; hired a contractor for weed control, shoveling pruning and the work is being monitored; we are getting a new contractor to do some tractor work and we are ready to go; getting a cost to put up a new fence for the fire department property; took on some janitorial work; TLC is evaluating an HVAC unit on the roof that went our and giving us a price. Project Management: Library is almost done, relocating offices of the public works and City Manager, working on compliance officer vehicle, putting decals on the vehicle as well as getting it tuned up; consistent communication with the Deputy to look into some trouble hotspots; there is emergency training with the water department.
- Councilor Winters said a little rain creates a lot of work.

#### **Fire Department**

 Manager Dr. Moore gave the report for the Fire Department: Fire Chief -Engine 1-4 went to 411 to get some upgrades to maintain National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) compliance

standards. It is back and in service; Station 1 has been making sure all units are up to NFPA standards and equipment on Fire Apparatus is up to date; the station met with our new medical director and have a very pleasant conversation she is looking forward to doing some trainings with us; we are preparing for the winter months ahead by being pro-active in apparatus, equipment upkeep and planning and placement of winter tools; we are have made conditional offers of employment to two (2) EMT candidates and are awaiting the background check reports; we have provided backup assistance to the Code Compliance Officer in the weeks before and after the 4th of July holiday; we have provided cleanup services on city streets and cleared major culverts that were clogged up by the flood of July 6<sup>th</sup>; lastly we want to thank the Council and the city manager and all the city staff for their continued support.

#### **Municipal Court Department**

Court Clerk Adair gave her report for the Courts: The month of July had one filed traffic violation; amounts collected are \$40 in correction fees, \$12 in court automation fees, \$6 in Judicial education fees, and \$25 in Court fees, for the total amount of \$85.

#### Discussion, Consideration, and Decision – Approval of Accounts Payable

- Mayor Pro tem Gutjahr explained that \$16,000 was approved for phase 1 for the building, carpenter that is doing the work for the library, electrical and animal control.

He then explained if there is a Public Works complex, we need equipment and are asking for \$350,000 and expressed the need for a plan creating a program for public works and began a discussion.
- Motion made by Councilor Ramsell to approve the Infrastructure Capital Improvement Plan and set public hearing date for August 23, 2021. Seconded by Councilor Winters. # CITY OF RIO COMMUNITIES ORDINANCE NO. 2021 - XX

# AN ORDINANCE REGULATING CANNABIS PRODUCTION, CANNABIS MANUFACTURING, CANNABIS RETAILING AND OTHER CANNABIS RELATED ACTIVITIES

- WHEREAS, the Cannabis Regulation Act (NMSA 1978 §§ 26-2C-1 26-2C-42) has authorized a variety of uses related to the legalization of medical and recreational commercial cannabis activities, which legalization has the potential to greatly expand the legal cannabis market; and
- WHEREAS, Cannabis cultivation, production, manufacturing, and consumption creates strong odors, can involve the use of significant amounts of energy and water; and require security and other measures to reduce the risk of theft or other diversion to the illegal cannabis market, including possession and use by persons under the age of twenty-one; and
- WHEREAS, Cannabis is an intoxicating drug, making it appropriate to regulate the hours during which cannabis products may be sold and the areas in which cannabis products may be consumed; and
- **WHEREAS,** the smoking of cannabis products may create health risks due to exposure to secondhand smoke and vaporized cannabis concentrates; and
- WHEREAS, N. M. S. A. 1978, § 3-17-1. The governing body of a municipality may adopt ordinances or resolutions not inconsistent with the laws of New Mexico for the purpose of providing for the safety, preserving the health, promoting the prosperity and improving the morals, order, comfort and convenience of the municipality and its inhabitants.
- WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Rio Communities, New Mexico finds that it will promote the public health, safety, and welfare to enact provisions regulating the use of Cannabis.

# BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED AND ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF RIO COMMUNITIES, AS FOLLOWS:

The CITY OF RIO COMMUNITIES (City) ORDINANCE, titled "Commercial Cannabis Activity Application Requirements and Performance Standards" shall read as follows:

# ARTICLE 1 COMMERCIAL CANNABIS ACTIVITY APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS AND PERFORMANCE STANDARDS

- SECTION 1 DEFINITIONS
- SECTION 2 CANNABIS PRODUCTION
- SECTION 3 CANNABIS MANUFACTURING
- SECTION 4 CANNABIS RETAILERS
- SECTION 5 HOURS OF OPERATION
- SECTION 6 CANNABIS CONSUMPTION AREAS
- SECTION 7 BUSINESS REGISTRATION
- SECTION 8 SECURITY/FENCING
- SECTION 9 MOBILE UNITS
- SECTION 10 SMOKING OF CANNABIS IN PUBLIC PLACE
- SECTION 11 EXISTING MEDICAL CANNABIS ESTABLISHMENTS
- SECTION 12 ENFORCEMENT
- SECTION 13 PENALTIES

#### SECTION 14 SEVERABILITY CLAUSE

- **1.1. Definitions**. All terms defined in the State of New Mexico Cannabis Regulation Act, as amended, are hereby adopted, and incorporated herein.
- 1.2. Cannabis Production. This subsection shall apply to all applicants seeking a permit to allow for the growth of cannabis plants in quantities greater than six (6) mature and six (6) immature cannabis plants. The applicant shall provide:
  - a. a certified survey plat depicting the proposed location for the growth of cannabis, including outdoor and indoor growing, which identifies the total area to be covered.
  - b. a map which identifies the nearest school or daycare and evidence that the nearest school or daycare is greater than three hundred feet (300') from the perimeter of the property proposed for cannabis production.
  - c. the document(s) provided to the Regulation and Licensing Division (RLD) which applicant(s) utilized to apply for a producer's license pursuant to the Cannabis Regulation Act, or a copy of the actual license issued to the applicant by the RLD.
    - If the applicant fails to provide documentation or provides incomplete or otherwise insufficient documentation regarding the status of their license application through RLD, the Planning Director shall inform the applicant of the deficiencies in writing and shall take no further action on the application until the deficiencies are remedied. If the applicant fails to correct the deficiencies indicated in the letter deeming the application incomplete within sixty (60) calendar days of receipt of notice of deficiencies, the application shall be considered withdrawn, and it will be returned to the applicant.
    - The City Council may issue a Special Use Permit only upon receipt of the applicant(s) license from RLD or a certified copy of such license, and completion of the applicable CITY OF RIO COMMUNITIES permitting process.
  - d. the production of cannabis for commercial manufacturing, sale, or consumption shall be limited to those areas of the City of Rio Communities zoned C-2

(Community Commercial and Retail Use) and C-3 (Heavy Community Commercial and Retail Use).

- e. the granting of a Special Use Permit by the City Council shall follow the process outlined in Article 7 (Section 4.7.4) of the Zoning Code (Ordinance 2021-76, 2021).
- **1.3. Cannabis Manufacturing.** This subsection shall apply to all applicants seeking a permit to allow for the manufacture of cannabis products, packaging of cannabis products, and the purchase, acquisition, sale, or transport of wholesale cannabis products to other cannabis establishments. The applicant shall provide:
  - a. a map which identifies the nearest school or daycare and evidence that the nearest school or daycare is greater than three hundred feet (300') from the perimeter of the property proposed for cannabis manufacturing activity.
  - b. the document(s) provided to the Regulation and Licensing Division (RLD) which applicant(s) utilized to apply for a manufacturing license pursuant to the Cannabis Regulation Act, or a copy of the actual license issued to the applicant by the RLD.
    - If the applicant fails to provide documentation or provides incomplete or otherwise insufficient documentation regarding the status of their license application through RLD, the Planning Director shall inform the applicant of the deficiencies in writing and shall take no further action on the application until the deficiencies are remedied. If the applicant fails to correct the deficiencies indicated in the letter deeming the application incomplete within sixty (60) calendar days of receipt of notice of deficiencies, the application shall be considered withdrawn, and it will be returned to the applicant.
    - The Planning Director may issue a permit only upon receipt of the applicant(s) license from RLD or a certified copy of such license, and completion of the applicable CITY OF RIO COMMUNITIES permitting process.
  - c. the manufacturing of cannabis for retail sale or consumption shall be limited to those areas of the City of Rio Communities zoned C-2 (Community Commercial and Retail Use) and C-3 (Heavy Community Commercial and Retail Use).
  - d. the granting of a Special Use Permit by the City Council shall follow the process outlined in Article 7 (Section 4.7.4) of the Zoning Code (Ordinance 2021-76, 2021).
- **1.4. Cannabis Retailers.** This subsection shall apply to all applicants seeking a permit to allow for the sale of cannabis and cannabis products to qualified patients, primary caregivers, reciprocal participants or directly to consumers. Cannabis consumption room or area shall be allowed commercially only in a designated co-located area of a Cannabis Retailer.
  - a. The applicant shall provide:
    - 1. a map which identifies the nearest school or daycare and evidence that the nearest school or daycare is greater than three hundred feet (300') from the perimeter of the property proposed for cannabis retail.
    - the document(s) provided to the Regulation and Licensing Division (RLD) which applicant(s) utilized to apply for a cannabis retail license pursuant to the Cannabis Regulation Act, or a copy of the actual license issued to the applicant by the RLD.
      - i. If the applicant fails to provide documentation or provides incomplete or otherwise insufficient documentation regarding the status of their

license application through RLD, the Planning Director shall inform the applicant of the deficiencies in writing and shall take no further action on the application until the deficiencies are remedied. If the applicant fails to correct the deficiencies indicated in the letter deeming the application incomplete within sixty (60) calendar days of receipt of notice of deficiencies, the application shall be considered withdrawn, and it will be returned to the applicant.

- ii. The Planning Director may issue a permit only upon receipt of the applicant(s) license from RLD or a certified copy of such license, and completion of the applicable CITY OF RIO COMMUNITIES permitting process.
- 3. an affidavit that the proposed cannabis retail location is not within six hundred (600) feet of any other cannabis retail location that was in operation at the time of the application submission to the City.
- b. A vertically integrated cannabis establishment or an integrated cannabis microbusiness must apply for a permit pursuant to the provisions of this subsection, provided the establishment or microbusiness intends to sell cannabis or cannabis products to qualified patients, caregivers, reciprocal patients, or consumers, regardless of an existing permit for cannabis production or cannabis manufacture.
- c. the sale of cannabis and cannabis products shall be limited to those areas of the City of Rio Communities zoned C-2 (Community Commercial and Retail Use) and C-3 (Heavy Community Commercial and Retail Use).
- d. the granting of a Special Use Permit by the City Council shall follow the process outlined in Article 7 (Section 4.7.4) of the Zoning Code (Ordinance 2021-76, 2021).
- 1.5 Hours of Operation. Provided that a license has been issued by the New Mexico Regulation and Licensing Division, and a Special Use Permit has been issued by the City Council, the licenses of retailers of cannabis products shall allow them to sell and deliver cannabis products, and the licenses of dispensers of cannabis products and club cannabis licenses shall allow them to sell, serve, deliver and permit the consumption of cannabis products on their licensed premises on Mondays from 7:00 a.m. until midnight, on other weekdays from after midnight of the previous day until 2:00 a.m., then from 7:00 a.m. until midnight, and on Sundays after midnight of the previous day until 2:00 a.m., then from noon until midnight. Dispenser, retail, and club licenses shall close their places of business during voting hours on the days of the biennial primary election of each even numbered year and the biennial general election held upon the first Tuesday in November of each even numbered year, and on the days of City elections for City officers, and on the days of such other elections as may be prescribed by rules and regulations promulgated by the State of New Mexico.

It is unlawful for any licensed retailer of cannabis products to sell or deliver cannabis products, or for any licensed dispenser or club to sell, deliver, serve or permit the consumption of cannabis products, on their licensed premises during hours other than those prescribed by this section.

#### 1.6 Cannabis consumption areas.

- a. A cannabis consumption area in which consumption is limited to consumption by qualified patients or reciprocal participants may be located inside any cannabis retailer; provided, however, that smoking of cannabis products in such consumption areas is only allowed if the cannabis consumption area occupies a standalone building from which smoke does not infiltrate other indoor workplaces or other indoor public places where smoking is otherwise prohibited pursuant to the Dee Johnson Clean Indoor Air Act, NMSA 1978, Chapter 24, Article 16.
- b. Cannabis consumption areas that are open to consumers are also subject to the following:
  - the smoking of cannabis products is only allowed within a licensed cannabis consumption area that occupies a standalone building from which smoke does not infiltrate other indoor workplaces or other indoor public places where smoking is otherwise prohibited pursuant to the Dee Johnson Clean Indoor Air Act, NMSA 1978, Chapter 24, Article 16; and
  - 2. access to cannabis consumption areas open to consumers is restricted to persons twenty-one years of age and older.
- **1.7 Business Registration.** Any person engaged in commercial cannabis activities must comply with the City of Rio Communities business registration process as outlined in City of Rio Communities Ordinance 2013-09.

#### 1.8 Security/Fencing

- a. Each commercial <u>and non-commercial</u> cannabis producer, cannabis research laboratory, and cannabis testing laboratory is required to erect and maintain a lockable fence of sturdy construction measuring at least six feet (6') in height enclosing and screening from view the area where cannabis is located. The enclosure <u>at commercial locations</u> shall remain securely locked during nonbusiness hours.
- b. Cannabis cultivation and production for personal use in quantities and as permitted by the New Mexico Cannabis Regulation Act and the Lynn and Erin Compassionate Use Act is allowed anywhere in the City, subject to the following: Cannabis cultivation and production for personal use must be conducted inside an enclosed and locked dwelling unit or an appropriate accessory structure (e.g., a controlled-environment agricultural structure).
- **1.9 Mobile Units**. Cannabis sales from mobile, portable, or temporary units or drive-through locations are prohibited.
- **1.10** Smoking of Cannabis in Public Place. Smoking of cannabis products in a public place, except as permitted by state law, is prohibited.
- **1.11 Existing Medical Cannabis Establishments**. Any medical cannabis establishment existing as of the date of the passage of this Ordinance shall not be required to comply with the location requirements of Section 2.

- **1.12 Enforcement**. A Code Compliance Officer as designated by the City, or a certified Valencia County Sheriff's deputy per agreement between the City of Rio Communities and Valencia County, New Mexico may issue citations for violation of this Ordinance.
- **1.13 Penalties**. With the exception of violations punishable by State law, any violation of this Ordinance may be enforced in any court of competent jurisdiction. The maximum penalty per violation shall be five hundred dollars (\$500). Each day during the time in which a violation occurs shall be deemed a separate violation. Nothing herein shall prevent the City of Rio Communities from seeking injunctive relief, if appropriate.
- **1.14** Severability Clause. Should any portion of this Ordinance be declared unenforceable after a final, non- appeal decision of a court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining provisions of this Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

#### 11-6-1 NUISANCE

- A. For the purposes of this chapter the word "nuisance" is defined as any person within the City doing an unlawful act, or omitting to perform a duty, or suffering or permitting any condition or thing to be or exist, where such act, omission, condition, or thing either:
  - 1. Injures or endangers the comfort, repose, health, or safety of others; or
  - 2. Offends decency; or
  - 3. Is offensive to the senses; or
  - 4. Unlawfully interferes with, obstructs, or tends to obstruct or renders dangerous for passage, any public or private street, highway, sidewalk, stream, ditch, or drainage; or
  - 5. In any way renders other persons insecure in life or the use of property; or
  - 6. Essentially interferes with the comfortable enjoyment of life and property or tends to depreciate the value of the property of others.
- B. A public nuisance consists of knowingly creating, performing, or maintaining anything affecting any number of citizens without lawful authority that is either:

- 1. Injurious to public health, safety, morals, or welfare; or
- 2. Interferes with the exercise and enjoyment of public rights, including the right to use public property.

#### 11-6-2 ENUMERATION OF NUISANCE ITEMS

The maintaining, using, placing, depositing, leaving, or permitting to be or remain on any public or private property in the City of any of the following items, conditions or actions are defined and declared to be and found to constitute a nuisance; provided however, this enumeration shall not be deemed or construed to be conclusive, limiting, or restrictive.

- A. Weeds and other vegetation that are rank, noxious, poisonous, harmful, unhealthful, or any growth whatsoever over 12 inches of an offensive nature or which is deleterious to health and safety; or
- B. Any accumulation of rubbish, trash, refuse, junk and other abandoned materials, metals, lumber, or other things; or
- C. Any accumulation of motor vehicles not in operating condition; or
- D. Any condition which provides harborage for rats, mice, snakes, and other vermin, or provides a vector for the transmission of infectious disease between humans or from animals to humans; or
- E. Any building or other structure in such a dilapidated condition that it is unfit for human habitation or kept in such an unsanitary condition that it is a menace to the health of people residing in the vicinity thereof or presents a dangerous fire hazard in the vicinity where it is located; or
- F. All unnecessary or unauthorized noises and annoying vibrations, including animal noises; or
- G. All disagreeable or obnoxious odors and stenches, as well as the conditions, substances or other causes that give rise to the emission or generation of such odors and stenches; or
- H. The carcasses of animals or fowl not disposed of after death; or
- I. The pollution of any public well or cistern, stream, lake, canal, or body of water by sewage, dead animals, creamery or other industrial wastes or other substances; or

- J. Any building, structure or other place or location where any activity that is in violation of local, state, or federal law is conducted, performed or maintained; or
- K. Any accumulation of stagnant water permitted or maintained on any lot or piece of ground.

#### 11-6-3 NUISANCE PROHIBITED

It is unlawful for any person to cause, permit, maintain or allow the creation or maintenance of a nuisance. Any violation of this section shall be deemed a misdemeanor and subject to the penalties set forth in Section 7 of this Ordinance or, in the alternative, remedied by the City with a lien placed on the property for all costs assumed by the City pursuant to Section 9 of this Ordinance.

#### 11-6-4 RESPONSIBILITY OF PROPERTY OWNER

Each property owner within the City, whether a natural person or other legal entity, shall be responsible, under the provisions of this chapter, for each individual tract of property owned and the owner's responsibility established herein will extend to abutment of other adjoining property lines. When any portion of the property abuts on a public road or alley, the property owner's responsibility shall extend to the center of the road or alley; provided however, that this section shall not restrict in any manner the maintenance of the full alley and street by the City of Rio Communities.

#### 11-6-5 NOTICE TO ABATE

Whenever a nuisance is found to exist within the City or within the City's extraterritorial jurisdiction, a sworn officer of the City shall give written notice to the owner or occupant of the property upon which such nuisance exists or upon the person causing or maintaining the nuisance.

#### 11-6-6 CONTENTS OF NOTICE

The notice to abate a nuisance issued under the provisions of this chapter shall contain:

- A. An order to abate the nuisance or to request a hearing within a stated time, which shall be reasonable under the circumstances; and
- B. The location of the nuisance, if the same is stationary; and
- C. A description of the alleged nuisance; and
- D. A statement of acts necessary to abate the nuisance; and

E. A statement that if the nuisance is not abated as directed and no request for hearing is made within the prescribed time, the City will abate such nuisance and assess the cost thereof against such person and any applicable property.

#### 11-6-7 COMPLAINT AND PENALTIES

- A. In the event the owner or occupant of the property where the nuisance violation of this chapter exists, has failed within the prescribed time, to abate the nuisance in accordance with the Notice described in Section 7 of this Ordinance, then any sworn Law Enforcement officer, building inspector/code enforcement officer or fire marshal may file a complaint charging violation of this chapter with the municipal court demanding that the owner of the property, or the occupant thereof, or both, be held to answer to the court for the violation of this chapter.
- B. Upon conviction thereof, the owner shall be subject to penalty as provided in Title 1, Chapter 4 of this code, and each day on which such violation continues shall constitute a separate offense. These penalties shall be in addition to payment of any city costs for cutting or removal, or both.
- C. When judgment is against the defendant in an action to abate a public nuisance, he shall be adjudged to pay all court costs and a reasonable fee for the complainant's attorney, when the suit is not prosecuted exclusively by the City attorney.
- D. In the alternative to a complaint filed in municipal court, pursuant to NMSA 1978, Section 30-8-8(B), A civil action to abate a public nuisance may be brought, by verified complaint in the name of the state without cost, by any public officer or private citizen, in the district court of the county where the public nuisance exists, against any person, corporation or association of persons who shall create, perform, or maintain a public nuisance.

# 11-6-8 GENERAL PENALTY FOR VIOLATIONS OF CHAPTER/CONTINUING VIOLATIONS

- A. Whenever in this chapter an act is prohibited or is made or declared to be unlawful or an offense or a misdemeanor or a petty misdemeanor, or whenever in this chapter the doing of any act is required or the failure to do any act is declared to be unlawful, and no specific penalty is provided therefor, the violation of any such provision or the failure to perform any such act shall be punishable by a fine not exceeding hundred dollars (\$300.00) or by imprisonment not to exceed ninety (90) days or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.
- B. Each day any such violation or failure to perform such act shall continue shall constitute a separate offense and a separate violation of an ordinance of this City, unless otherwise specifically provided.

#### 11-6-9 ALTERNATIVE METHOD OF ABATEMENT

- A. As an alternative to filing a Complaint pursuant to Section 8 of this Ordinance, or in the event that a person is convicted of violating this article and still refuses to remove the nuisance, an officer of the City may proceed to abate such nuisance and shall prepare a statement of costs incurred in the abatement thereof.
- B. Any and all costs incurred by the City in the abatement of a nuisance under the provisions of this chapter shall constitute a lien against the property upon which such nuisance existed, which lien shall be filed, proven and collected as provided for by law. Such lien shall be notice to all persons from the time of its recording and shall bear interest at the legal rate thereafter until satisfied.

#### 11-6-10 EMERGENCY ABATEMENT

- A. Notwithstanding any other provision in this code if, in the opinion of the inspector, the conditions at a property constitute an imminent hazard, the inspector may order immediate abatement of the hazard without notice. Such abatement of an imminent hazard shall be limited to the work necessary to remove the hazard, and may include disconnection of utilities, securing of the structures or emergency cleaning of the property to abate any violations found.
- B. The city shall pay the cost and expense of such abatement from any appropriation made available for that purpose.
- C. A lien shall be recorded with the Valencia County Clerk's Office for all the costs incurred by the city as a result of abating the property.
- D. Whenever the inspector finds that any structure contains an imminent hazard or health hazard, the inspector may declare such structure unfit for human occupancy and order it to be vacated or to remain vacant. A structure declared unfit for occupancy and ordered vacated or to remain vacant under the provisions of this section shall not be leased, rented, or occupied, until it has been inspected and deemed fit for occupancy by the city. The city shall reinspect, for the purpose of re-occupancy, within three business days of the receipt of a written request by the owner, their agent or responsible party.

#### 11-6-11 CONFLICTING PROVISIONS

Any city ordinance or part of ordinance which is in conflict with the provisions of this article is hereby superseded to the extent that this article provides more specific standards or stricter standards of compliance.

#### CHAPTER 11 HEALTH AND SAFETY

ARTICLE 7 DANGEROUS BUILDINGS

#### SECTION 1 DANGEROUS BUILDING OR DEBRIS

SECTION 2 CONFLICTING PROVISIONS

#### 11-7-1 DANGEROUS BUILDING OR DEBRIS

- A. Whenever any building or structure is ruined, damaged and dilapidated, or any premise is covered with ruins, rubbish, wreckage or debris, the governing body of the City of Rio Communities may, by resolution find that the ruined, damaged and dilapidated building, structure or premise is a menace to the public comfort, health, peace or safety and requires the removal of the building, structure, ruins, rubbish, wreckage or debris from the municipality.
- B. A copy of the resolution shall be served on the owner, occupant, or agent in charge of the building, structure or premise. If the owner, as shown by the real estate records of the county clerk, occupant, or agent in charge of the building, structure or premise cannot be served within the municipality, a copy of the resolution shall be posted on the building, structure or premise and a copy of the resolution shall be published one time in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Rio Communities pursuant to NMSA 1798, Section 14-11-2. [Requirements for publication of legal notice or advertisement]
- C. Within ten (10) days of the receipt of a copy of the resolution or the posting and publishing of a copy of the resolution, the owner, occupant or agent in charge of the building, structure or premise shall commence removing the building, structure, ruin, rubbish, wreckage or debris, or file a written objection with the municipal clerk asking for a hearing before the governing body of the municipality.
- D. If a written objection is filed as required in this section, the governing body shall:
  - 1. Fix a date for a hearing on the resolution and the objection; and
  - 2. Consider all evidence for and against the removal resolution at the hearing; and

- 3. Determine if the resolution should be enforced or rescinded.
- E. Any person aggrieved by the determination of the governing body may appeal to the district court by:
  - 1. Giving notice of appeal to the governing body within five (5) days after the determination is made by the governing body; and
  - 2. Filing a petition in the district court within twenty (20) days after the determination made by the governing body. The district court shall hear the matter de novo and enter judgment in accordance with its findings.
- F. If the owner, occupant, or agent in charge of the building, structure or premise fails to commence removing the building, structure, ruins, rubbish, wreckage or debris:
  - 1. Within thirty (30) days of being served a copy of the resolution and the posting and publishing of the resolution as required in section 11-7-1B of this Ordinance; or
  - 2. Within five (5) days of the determination by the governing body that the resolution shall be enforced; or
  - 3. After the district court enters judgment sustaining the determination of the governing body, the City of Rio Communities may remove the building, structure, ruins, rubbish, wreckage or debris at the cost and expense of the owner. The reasonable cost of the removal shall constitute a lien against the building, structure, ruin, rubbish, wreckage or debris so removed and against the lot or parcel of land from which it was removed. The lien shall be foreclosed in the manner provided in NMSA 1978, Sections 3-36-1 through 3-36-6.
- G. The municipality may pay for the costs of removal of any condemned building, structure, wreckage, rubbish, or debris by granting to the person removing such materials, the legal title to all salvageable materials in lieu of other compensation.
- H. Any person or firm removing any condemned building, structure, wreckage, rubbish or debris shall leave the premises from which the material has been removed in a clean, level and safe condition, suitable for further occupancy or construction and with all excavations filled.

# 11-7-2 CONFLICTING PROVISIONS

Any city ordinance or part of ordinance which is in conflict with the provisions of this article is hereby superseded to the extent that this article provides more specific standards or stricter standards of compliance.
