Meeting Minutes

Monday, May 16, 2022, 6:00 p.m. via Zoom

The public is invited to attend this meeting remotely only, via phone or computer. In order to maintain safe social distancing guidelines, no physical presence will be allowed at this time. The Town website will be updated on the day of the meeting with the phone and computer access instructions.

Call to Order – Roll Call – Pledge of Allegiance: Council President W. Alexopoulos called the meeting to order.

Roll Call – Council Members Present: William Alexopoulos, Richard Brewer, James Burgess, Natacha Clerger, Ryan Egan, Jesse Gordon, and Katrina Huff-Larmond

Pledge of Allegiance: Pledge of Allegiance led by Councillor Burgess.

Moments of Silent Prayer: A moment of silent prayer held in remembrance of Randolph Police Officer Michael Beal. Officer Beal was involved in a motor vehicle crash and died from the injuries sustained in the crash. He was a 35-year veteran of the Randolph Police Department, an amazing person, and a friend to all within the department.

Announcements from the President:

1. Discussion of Process for Filling Vacant Town Council Seat

Anyone interested in the vacant Town Council seat can submit a letter of interest and a resume to me by email by 4:30 PM on June 30, 2022. We will consider all applicants at the first meeting in July. Anyone who does not have access to email but would like to submit their name should contact the Town Clerk for assistance. To be eligible, you must be a registered voter in the Town of Randolph and must have lived in District One at the time of the Fall 2021 Town Election, and you must also still be a resident of that district.

Public Hearings:

1. 2022-018 Capital Plan for FY23

Council President Alexopoulos opened the Public Hearing on this Matter. This Council Order was introduced on April 11, 2024, by the Town Manager. Town Manager Howard provided additional information regarding the various projects in this Council Order.

Council President Alexopoulos opened the public comments portion of the public hearing.

Section C, Item1.

- 1. Joe Burke, 54 Hills Street, asked about the vehicles being requested by the Departm Works.
- 2. Dave Mulligan, 3 Pond Lane, asked if the repaying of Pond Lane is in this request. Town Manager Howard stated that Pond Lane is definitely on the list of Streets to be repaired in this year's plan.
- 3. Sandy Cohen, 63 Bittersweet Lane, asked which of these vehicles are hybrid or electric so they are better for the environment. Town Manager Howard indicated he would speak to the Fire and Police Chief to see what options exist for environmentally friendly vehicles.

Council President Alexopoulos closed the public comments portion of the public hearing and opened the floor to comments and questions of the Council.

Councillor Burgess asked about the Command Vehicle Replacements.

Councillor Huff-Larmond asked about the condition of the Zapustas Ice Rink and if these repairs are enough, and if a list of streets to be repaired through this Capital Plan is available. Councillor Gordon asked for clarification regarding the Capital Plan budget and the Operating Budget, as well as how operations would work regarding staffing and manning of the new vehicles. Lastly, is the option to borrow the expected additional revenue in Chapter 90 funds to pay back the loan? Town Accountant/Finance Director Janine Smith: That is not allowable.

Motion to approve the Council Order 2023-018 as presented made by Councillor Brewer, seconded by Councillor Egan.

Roll Call Vote: 7-0-0 (Absent: C. Alexopoulos)

New Business:

1. Submission of FY2023 Annual Operating Budget - Budget Presentation

Town Manager Howard presented the Fiscal Year 2023 Annual Operating Budget. Town Accountant/Finance Director Janine Smith was also present to provide additional information regarding the Town's revenues including local receipts, state aid, the tax levy, and other funding sources like indirect costs, revolving funds, etc. Town Manager Howard highlighted some of the key points of this year's Annual Operating Budget such as an increase of funding to the Randolph Public Schools, the Randolph Intergenerational Community Center will be fully open and operational this year, fixed costs such as health insurance and retirement continue to drive the budget, and the hiring of an Assistant Town Manager to focus on Human Resources and Operations.

A discussion was held concerning the hiring process for the Assistant Town Manager position and general operations of the Randolph Intergenerational Community Center.

Council President Alexopoulos: Thank you. We will be discussing the Fiscal Year 2023 Annual Operating Budget at a Special Meeting on June 6, 2024.

Open Council Comments

1. Opportunity for Each Councilor to Say Something in Memory of Councilor Clifton

Town Manager Howard read a statement from Councillor C. Alexopoulos. Ken was ever present at Town Events and he spoke what he believed was best for the Town and for us residents. He was an accomplished public servant and political leader. Ken always carried himself like a true gentleman. Rest easy and may God rest his soul.

Councillor Brewer: Like all of in the Community, I have been left saddened by the sudden passing of Councillor Clifton. He was one dedicated public servant and strong supporter of the Randolph Public School and worked tirelessly for his constituents in his district, as well as the rest of Randolph for many years. It was a privilege to work with Ken on the Council and I will miss his knowledge and his presence in the Council.

Councillor Burgess: Councillor Clifton sat here when we created a new form of government. He was a tireless campaigner. He knocked on doors in his district better than most people who ran for office in any Town that I can think of. We did not always share the same viewpoint, but what we did share and would have conversations about this, is his love and respect for the role that he was elected to serve as Town Councillor. He believed that it was a position to help those in the community and to make their voice be represented at the table and he did that effectively. There were many times that we went back and forth and his comments would kind of calm me down and I will forever be grateful for that. He will be missed

Councillor Clerger: I will forever be grateful to Councillor Clifton for challenging me and I will continue to conduct myself in a way that he would not be disappointed in me. With that said, I know he would have been with us at the Haitian Flag Day parade so please come join us on Wednesday, May 18, and we will have a spot to remember him at the flag-raising ceremony.

Councillor Egan: My love, thoughts, and prayers go to Councillor Clifton's family. I think most of us were at his funeral services last week and it was certainly a moving experience. We lost a great advocate for Randolph, no matter what side of an issue you're on, at the end of the day he advocated for Randolph and he did it well. He was a dedicated community leader and is truly irreplaceable.

Councillor Gordon: I'd like to encourage everyone to read the comments on the funeral home page. I was moved by alot of the comments and gave my condolences there as well as this message. I first met Ken Clifton several years ago, he was the Town Council President, when I first started attending Town Council meetings, and ever since then he has defined for me, what a Town Council President should be. He was poised, attentive, respectful and just the way I view how Town Council Presidents should be ever since.

Councillor Huff-Larmond: Ken was a great husband, dad, friend, and mentor to not only me, but to many others that have passed through Town. He will be missed and Randolph now has a huge void I don't know could ever be filled. Ken was an inspiration to all. Let's live out Ken's legacy and the way he would want his legacy to be lived out. He was a Community man. You left a huge footprint here in Randolph and we will miss you.

Town Manager Howard: Councillor Clifton was a great leader. He made me better at what I do and that goes back to when I was a Town Clerk and the Assistant Town Manager, and now as the Town Manager, he made me better because he would challenge you to see things differently. He was passionate, thoughtful, and always prepared. He brought out the best in what local government stripes to be and that is public service. He was truly in service of others. There was one resident that I saw at the repass at Stetson Hall, Bunny Jones who is retired from working in Randolph Public Schools, and she made a comment that said how Ken was such a strong voice for social justice in this community and it wasn't just when Ken was a Town Councillor but before that when he was involved in the Community fighting for those who may not have a voice. And that comment reminded me of my first introduction to Ken about twenty years ago. He always wanted to make Randolph the best it could be. I lived in his district and I would see him driving around during snowstorms checking up on various areas and his neighbors. I will certainly miss what he brought to this Community. Presentations:

1. Digital Equity Plan

Director of Community Programs, Liz LaRosee and Julia Mintz of VHB, Inc. appeared via Zoom to provide a presentation on the Digital Equity Plan.

Ms. LaRosee: Digital equity has become a paramount focus for Randolph sparking our journey in September 2022. Following the rigorous evaluation of potential consultants, we selected VHB and in January 2023, Ms. Mintz has been an invaluable asset throughout this process, guiding us to develop one of the first digital equity plans in Massachusetts. As we embark on the next phase of our Digital Equity

initiative, with the support from the Massachusetts Broadband Institute, Julia and VHB wi on the intricacies of the plan.

Ms. Mintz: With funding from Mass Broadband Institute (MBI), the Town contracted VHN to prepare a digital equity plan for the Randolph community. The intent is to achieve: 1. guide the Town's decision-making and investments, and 2. prepare the Town to apply for funding. The process consisted of three main components: research, dialogue through public meetings and pop-ups, and synthesis (preparing and presenting the Digital Equity Plan).

Some of the digital equity measurements include: 8% of households do not have broadband internet, 14% of public survey respondents report their current household internet does not work well enough to meet their household needs, 5% of households do not have a computer, 93% of respondents report they are concerned about cybersecurity, and 23% of respondents report it is hard to pay their monthly internet bill. The goals of the Digital Equity plan include: 1. Identify a core team of digital equity champions, 2. expand community outreach and strengthen partnerships, 3. promote access to affordable devices and broadband internet, 4. strengthen digital literacy throughout the community, 5. provide targeted support for vulnerable segments of the community, including students, adults seeking jobs, and seniors, 6. track the local broadband market to advocate for consumers and promote job opportunities locally.

Councillor Gordon: I'm wondering about a city-wide wifi plan and I've researched three other cities within the state that have city-wide wifi instead of each household paying for wifi individually. Ms. LaRossee: We do have plans for a mesh network that would be in public parks. The Turner Free Library for instance has access points on the outside of the library so that wireless internet can be accessed outside of the library and expanding on that would be great.

New Business:

1. Council Order 2024-010: Randolph Public Schools FY24 Capital Improvement Projects

Town Council Clerk read Council Order 2024-010. Town Manager Howard introduced the Council Order and provided additional information regarding the purpose of the Council Order.

Randolph Public School Superintendent Thea Stovell and School Facilities Director Paul Visconte were present to discuss the various projects to be completed through the Capital Improvement Plan. The projects include improvements to fire safety, external security, HVAC upgrades, roofs, and playgrounds.

Councillor Huff-Larmond: How long are you planning to take to complete all of these projects? Mr. Visconti: We are hoping to achieve 50% completion before the end of the summer, if possible. A lot of the projects will depend on the time it takes for us to complete the procurement process and make sure that the items needed are in stock. Councillor Huff-Larmond: While you are looking for vendors are you taking into consideration minority and women-owned businesses? Mr. Visconti: We're always open to anyone who wants to bid on that process that fits that criteria.

Councillor O'Connell: I was under the impression we already received funding for the Young Elementary School Playground. Mr. Visconti: The completion of the playground isn't done yet because some of the items were still on backorder so we'll have it installed in the springtime. Those parts were already paid for. The total cost for the three new playgrounds is \$80,000.

Council Vice President Brewer: Is there a reason we're using JCI controls? Mr. Visconti: The reason I'd like to go with JCI is because they offer a lot of incentives for green initiatives.

Councillor Gordon: I agree it is right to focus on green energy. I think it would be great to have this presentation go on on a future agenda. Town Manager Howard: We are already working with the Metropolitan Area Planning Council regarding the green community application and are going through the process as we speak.

Council Vice President Brewer: This Council Order requires two meetings and a public hearing before it can be voted on so this will be continued to the next Council Meeting on March 18, 2024.

The foliage treatments will take place between June 1st and October 18th along with cut surface treatments (CST). Fall CST, basal treatments or sensitive foliar treatments may be necessary and are scheduled between October 1st and December 31st in areas along the ROWs that might not have received a foliage treatment or to trees over 12 feet tall. The exact time is dependent upon weather conditions and field crew progress.

In compliance with 333 CMR 11.06-11.07, No herbicide applications will occur before the conclusion of the 45-day YOP review period, the 21-day treatment notice and the 48-hour newspaper notice. At the end of these review periods, which can run concurrently, no application shall commence more than ten days before nor conclude more than ten days after the treatment periods listed above.

All of the herbicides selected for this program are registered by the Federal Environmental Protection Agency, the Massachusetts Pesticide Board, and are recommended for use in and around sensitive areas jointly by the Massachusetts Pesticide Bureau and Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection (please refer to the YOP for specifics).

This Notice serves only to address the public comment period deadline extension.

Pursuant to the provisions of the Rights-of-Way Management Regulations, 333 CMR 11.00, to apply herbicides to control vegetation along rights-of-way (ROW), a five-year Vegetation Management Plan (VMP) and a Yearly Operational Plan (YOP) must be approved by the Massachusetts Department of Agricultural Resources (MDAR). Eversource Energy, Eastern MA (Central, Eastern, and Southeastern MA) holds a current VMP, therefore, notice of receipt of a YOP and procedures for public review is hereby given as required by Section 11.06 (3).

Eversource Energy, Eastern MA has submitted a YOP to MDAR in February 2024.

In 2024 Eversource Energy, Eastern MA will conduct an Integrated Vegetation Management (IVM) program on their transmission and distribution lines. The intended vegetation control program will be consistent with Eversource Energy, Eastern MA's VMP (approved by MDAR in 2023). In accordance with the guidelines set forth in Eversource Energy, Eastern MA's VMP for Central, Eastern, and Southeastern, MA and YOP, herbicides will be selectively applied to target vegetation by licensed/certified applicators carrying backpack or handheld application equipment for the IVM program.

Eversource Energy, Eastern MA's YOP identifies the following 32 municipalities as locations where they intend to use herbicides to treat their electric Rights-of-Way in 2024:

Eversource Energy, Eastern MA will only use herbicides recommended by MDAR for use in regulated sensitive areas for their IVM program. Pursuant to 333 CMR 11.04, no herbicides will be sprayed within any designated "no spray sensitive area" instead mechanical only methods will be used to control vegetation.

Public notification, by certified mail, will be provided to each "affected" municipality at least twenty-one days prior to any herbicide application.

In accordance with 333 CMR 11.06 (2), Eversource Energy, Eastern MA's YOP for Central, Eastern, and Southeastern, MA includes the identification of target vegetation; methods of identifying, marking and protecting regulated sensitive areas; application techniques; the herbicides, application rates, carriers and adjuvants proposed for use; alternative control measures, a list of the application companies and YOP supervisor; procedures for handling, mixing and loading herbicides; emergency resources including local, state and federal emergency telephone numbers; maps of the ROWs which included regulated sensitive areas, and herbicide fact sheets and labels.

PUBLIC REVIEW

The MDAR seeks to verify the location of regulated Sensitive Areas defined in Section 11.02 reported in the YOP. MDAR itself has a limited ability to survey the geography, land use and water supplies in all the communities through which ROWs pass. Municipalities have most of this information readily available, and the particular knowledge with which to better certify the regulated Sensitive Areas in their communities. MDAR, therefore, requests, and urges the assistance of the "affected" municipalities in reviewing the completeness and accuracy of the maps contained in the submitted YOP.

MDAR has established the following procedures for this review:

Copies of the YOP and this *Notice* will be sent by the applicant to the Conservation Commission, Board of Health (or designated health agent), and the Head of Government (Mayor, City Manager, Chair of the Board of Selectman) of each municipality where herbicides are to be applied during the 2024 calendar year; and if applicable to the Natural Heritage Endangered Species Program of the Massachusetts Department of Fisheries and Wildlife, the Massachusetts Water Resource Authority and the Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation. Municipal agencies and officials will have forty-five days, following receipt of the YOP, to review its map for inaccuracies and omissions in the location of "regulated sensitive areas not readily identifiable in the field."

Municipal agencies and officials are requested to forward the YOP to the appropriate official(s) in their municipality qualified to certify the accuracy of the regulated sensitive areas indicated on the maps. The maps should then be "corrected" and returned to the applicant and a copy should be sent to MDAR at the address listed below within the forty-five day review period.

If a city or town needs more time to carry out this review, it should send a written request for an extension to MDAR and cite why there is a "good cause" for requesting additional time.

The applicant is required to make all corrections and the corrected maps will be sent back to the city/town that requested the disputed changes within fifteen days of receipt of the request. MDAR will decide whether or not the YOP should be approved without the requested changes. MDAR will consider the "final approval" of a YOP individually for each municipality.

The twenty-one day public review period of the Municipal ROW Notification Letter may serve concurrently with the forty-five day YOP review period in order to provide public notifications as required by 333 CMR 11.07, if the applicant has an approved VMP and if all the requisite city-town offices that received copies of the YOP completed their review and all corrections were duly made by the applicant and approved by MDAR.

A failure by the city/town to respond to the applicant's submission of the YOP within the forty-five day period will be automatically considered by MDAR to indicate agreement by the municipal officials with the regulated Sensitive Area demarcations provided by the applicant in their YOP.




