Call to Order: Council President Alexopoulos called the meeting to order.

Approval of Meeting Minutes

Motion to approve the minutes of the Town Council meeting on April 28, 2025 made by Councillor Brewer, seconded by Councillor Huff-Larmond. Roll Call Vote: 7-0-1 (Abstention: O'Connell; Absent: Egan) Motion passes.

Announcements from the President

- 1. Congratulations to the Class of 2025 Randolph High School on their graduation.
- 2. I'd also like to congratulate Saint Mary's for their 175th anniversary. They had an event yesterday.
- 3. I'd like to thank Fire Chief Cassford and the Randolph Fire Department for their wonderful Firefighter Sunday that they host every year. It was well attended by the families of many of the active duty and retired firefighters.

Public Hearings:

1. Council Order 2025-015: Request for the Town Council to Initiate An Amendment to the Randolph Zoning Ordinance - Chapter 200 of the General Code of the Town of Randolph -Concerning Scientific or Research Laboratories

Council President Alexopoulos opened the public hearing for the Council Order 2025-015. This Council Order was introduced at the Town Council meeting on April 14, 2025 and referred to the Planning

Board. Town Manager Howard was accompanied by Assistant Town Manager Lamboy and Town Attorney Griffin to provide additional information regarding the purpose of this Council Order. The legal advertisements were published in the Patriot Ledger on May 23 and May 30, 2025.

Town Attorney Griffin: The Planning Board held their public hearing and sent a recommendation back to adopt this Council Order with amendments, so there is a second version of the Order here labeled Council Order 2025-015A. This is available for a vote tonight.

Assistant Town Manager Lamboy: The proposed zoning amendment allows for by-right zoning for scientific and research laboratories, and has an expedited permitting clause for clean energy, research, and design. One of the great aspects of this is being a green community which means that the Town will receive immediate grant funds upon approval, and we'll be eligible for additional competitive grant funds, moving ourselves towards energy sustainability. Assistant Town Manager Lamboy provided additional information regarding the Green Community Requirements, the specific proposed zoning amendments.

Councilor Burgess expressed concern regarding the specific districts this would impact.

Councillor O'Connell asked about appropriate timing for becoming a Green Community.

Councillor Gordon commented on short term versus long term benefits of becoming a Green Community.

Councillor Brewer commented on the districts being designated the appropriate zoning.

Council President Alexopoulos opened the public hearing on this matter.

- 1. Sandy Cohen, 63 Bittersweet Lane: On the restricted zones, do we have any in the area that is doing research and development? Why are we so tardy in starting this process when so many other communities in the State have been involved with this?
- 2. Joe Burke, 54 Hill Street: Is there any property in the Town of Randolph that can hold those huge windmills? Did anyone check with the City of Boston on the electric vehicles?

There were no more public comments. The public comments portion of the public hearing was closed.

Motion to amend Council Order 2025-015 to not change the West Corners Business District from requiring a Special Permit from the Planning Board and allowing scientific or research laboratories by right, seconded by Councillor Clerger.

A discussion of the Council was held regarding this amendment. Councillor Burgess called the question. Roll Call Vote: 6-1-1 (Nay: Thompson; Abstention: O'Connell; Absent: Egan) Motion passes.

Motion to approve Council Order 2025-015A as amended made by Councillor Burgess, seconded by Councillor Brewer. Roll Call Vote: 7-1-0 (Nay: O'Connell; Absent: Egan) Motion passes.

Public Comments:

- 1. Sandy Cohen, 63 Bittersweet Lane: I would like a written explanation as to why the second part of the budget meeting was not publicly scheduled. 2. We need a speed bump on Pearly Evans Drive. There was a car going almost 55 mph. There are young families with children and pets moving onto this street. If we don't have a speed bump, there is going to be a serious accident. 3. We also have cars parked on lawns. No one seems to know that it's not legal and no one seems to know where to find this information. There needs to be communication about this whether its on billboards, or a flyer. 4. The traffic light at McDonalds which is a four-way intersection, when you're traveling Eastbound in the morning the sun is shining in your eyes you cannot see the flashing walking sign. I would like that looked into and rectified before someone gets hurt. 5. Who fixes sidewalks and who paints the hydrants?
- 2. Representative from Igbo Organization: I'm here to talk about our event happening next month. Thanks to the Town Manager who has been working with us and the question now is how can the Councillors help us. One thing we are contending with is one of the requirements for us to have police officers and 2 fire officers at the vent. We've been doing this event for many years and this will be our first time needing officers at the event. I understand the need because the event is growing, but we've never had to budget for that and the financial implication for us is big. It is August 19th, 2025 from Noon to 7 PM.
- 3. Unknown Individual: I am a recent graduate of Ursulane Academy, an all girls school in Dedham. Igbo Day has been an important part of my upbringing, and I look forward to it every summer. I've been involved from a young age through the Igbo school with other kids in the community. I intend on continuing to connect with my community and my culture as I grow older, and I'm just here to support my dad and help and ask for your support in making this event a success this year.
- 4. Guerlince Semezier, 60 Mill Street: With everything going on in the news, and many of the residents here are from other countries, does the Town have a contingency plan to support these families?

Town Attorney Griffin provided her opinion on this Council Order.

Motion to add Council Order regarding blasting to an upcoming agenda made by Councillor Gordon, seconded by Councillor Huff-Larmond. Roll Call Vote: 6-2-0 (Nays: Alexopoulos and Brewer) Motion passes.

 Motion to enter into executive session made by Councillor O'Connell, seconded by Councillor Burgess. Roll Call Vote: 8-0-0 (Absent: Egan) Motion passes.

Town Attorney Griffin read the following statement: The Town Council may vote to go into executive session pursuant to M.G.L. ch. 30A, section 21(a)(3) relative to potential litigation strategy concerning anticipated litigation. M.G.L. ch. 30A, section 21(a)(3) permits a public body to go into executive session to discuss strategy with respect to collective bargaining or litigation if an open meeting may have a detrimental effect on the bargaining or litigating position of the public body and the chair so declares.

Councillor Gordon: This presentation was a lot clearer, thank you for that. We have the right to vote for the water and/or sewer rates separately. Can we vote on the tiers, like changing the cutoff number from 2,500 to lower for example? Mr. Abrahams: We have seen that but I wouldn't advise doing so unless there is a study related to that. Councillor Gordon: The MWRA number- is that all sewer? Mr. Abrahams: It is solely related to the sewer assessment.

Councillor O'Connell: What is the percentage that are under 1,000?

Request for the Town Council to Amend The Town of Randolph General Ordinance, Chapter 83, Building Construction, to Adopt the Stretch Energy Code

To see if the Randolph Town Council will vote to amend Chapter 83 of the general ordinances of the Town of Randolph concerning Building Construction as follows:

1. Add Chapter 83-4 in its entirety as follows (additions are identified as *italics*):

§ 83-4 Stretch Energy Code

(A) Definitions.

INTERNATIONAL ENERGY CONSERVATION CODE (IECC) - The International Energy Conservation Code (IECC) is a building energy code created by the International Code Council. It is a model code adopted by many state and municipal governments in the United States for the establishment of minimum design and construction requirements for energy efficiency, and is updated on a three-year cycle. The baseline energy conservation requirements of the Massachusetts State Building Code are the IECC with Massachusetts amendments, as approved by the Board of Building Regulations and Standards.

STRETCH ENERGY CODE - Codified by the combination of 225 CMR 22 and 23, not including the Appendices RC and CC, the Stretch Energy Code is a comprehensive set of amendments to the International Energy Conservation Code (IECC) seeking to achieve all lifecycle cost-effective energy efficiency in accordance with the Green Communities Act of 2008, as well as to reduce the climate impacts of buildings built to this code.

(B) Purpose.

The purpose of 225 CMR 22 and 23 is to provide a more energy efficient alternative to the Base Energy Code applicable to the relevant sections of the building code for both new construction and existing buildings.

(C) Applicability.

This code applies to residential and commercial buildings.

(D) Stretch Energy Code Incorporation Into General Ordinances

The Stretch Energy Code, as codified by the entirety of 225 CMR 22 and 23, including any future editions, amendments, or modifications, is herein incorporated by reference into the General Ordinances of the Town of Randolph.

(E) Stretch Energy Code Enforcement

The Stretch Energy Code is enforceable in the Town of Randolph by the Building Commissioner or as otherwise authorized by state law.

(F) Stretch Energy Code Effective Date

This § 83-4 Stretch Energy Code is effective in the Town of Randolph as of January 1, 2026.

<u>Approval of Lease of up to Ten (10) Years With A</u> <u>Telecommunications Company for Placement and Maintenance of</u> <u>Wireless Equipment at Stetson Hall</u>

To see if the Randolph Town Council will vote to authorize the Town Manager to enter into a lease agreement with a term of up to ten (10) years for the placement and maintenance of wireless equipment at Stetson Hall by a telecommunications company, and further authorize the Town Manager to execute said agreement, and any related documents, on behalf of the Town and to take any other actions necessary to implement that agreement, including amending or terminating the agreement, in the best interests of the Town of Randolph. The lease agreement will be entered into in compliance with all procurement requirements and will contain a term of (3) initial lease years and seven (7) optional additional lease years.

Background

In October of 2000, the Stetson Hall trustees entered into a 25-year agreement with Omnipoint Holdings, Inc. (DBA, T-Mobile) that authorized the company to utilize space at Stetson Hall for the installation of telecommunications equipment. This included, "Building interior and space in the Cupola for attachment of antennas: Building interior space of approximately one hundred (10x 10) square feet for placement of base station equipment: and, space required for cable runs to connect PCS equipment and antennas..., together with a non-exclusive easement for access 24 hours a day 7 days a week thereto and grant of easement to OHI and New England Telephone and Telegraph Co., its successors and assigns."

The 25-year period of this agreement is now rapidly coming to an end and the Stetson Trustees, through the Town Manager, would like to pursue another similar agreement. They will go through a procurement process seeking the best price and terms. The Trustees voted at their meeting on June 4, 2025, to recommend a 10-year term for consideration by the Town Council. The Trustees indicated that they anticipate that any company selected would be able to amortize its capital costs over a longer time period and would thus be able to provide greater revenue to the Town as the result of a lease period that is longer than the traditional three-year term allowed under Massachusetts State Law.

Staff will work with the Town Manager and Trustees to draft and advertise this opportunity to any new possible telecommunications tenant.

Pursuant to State law, Town Council approval is needed to authorize any contract in excess of three (3) years in length.

Transfer of General Fund Free Cash for HVAC System

To see if the Randolph Town Council will vote to transfer an additional \$40,428 from the certified General Fund free cash to purchase, repair or maintain the Town Hall HVAC system previously approved in Order #2025-029 and Order #2025-042.

Explanation: The Town Council has voted two previous Council Orders. It was anticipated that the rebates could be deducted from the price before the final invoice. Explanation: As was discussed during the FY 26 Budget Presentation, we conservatively estimated trash revenues in FY 25 at \$3,000,000 and would need a transfer to close out the trash budget. Currently, we have received \$3,771,944 in trash revenues. Basically, this transfer is a wash as the \$700,000 transferred from Free Cash will be returned once the additional revenues are added to Free Cash that will be certified in the Fall.

Transfer of General Fund Free Cash For invoices Related to the North Randolph Elementary School Project

To see if the Randolph Town Council will vote to transfer \$250,000 from General Fund free cash to cover costs of the new elementary school not covered by borrowing or reimbursed by the MSBA.

Explanation: There are items that were approved by the School Building Committee that have since been determined not to be capital in nature and cannot be paid through the project funds. For example, technology can sometimes be capital but in this case the laptops are not. We purchased laptops and laptop carts for use in the school. A number of janitorial supplies such as barrels, rolling carts and mops are operational in nature. Additional work needs to be done in some Special Ed classrooms to increase durability of the walls and wall height. The finance department will be reviewing to ensure items are properly classified. Any funds not used will be returned to Free Cash.

Council Order Concerning List Of Inspectors and Adjusters Relating to Blasting

WHEREAS, blasting is an activity that is regulated by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to state law and regulations, prior to blasting, a permit must be received from the local Fire Department and various precautions must be undertaken; and

WHEREAS, as part of that process, blasting is monitored for dust, noise and vibrations; and

WHEREAS, that monitoring is limited to the immediate effects of the blasting, and does not encompass the long-term effects of underground vibrations; and

WHEREAS, the Town Council supports property owners who wish to have their property inspected prior to blasting to ensure that any damage caused by the blasting can be documented;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE TOWN COUNCIL that the Town shall maintain, and make available to the public, a list of inspectors, adjustors and other professionals who offer pre-blasting inspection services. Any person who wishes to be included on the list shall be included upon their request. The Town shall not undertake any vetting of the listed inspectors, adjustors and other professionals and shall make no warranty or representation as to the quality of their work, but will maintain the list as a convenience to the public, so that the public may undertake whatever actions they deem necessary to ameliorate any long-term negative effects of the blasting on their property.
