Questions: After being first recognized by the Chair, Commissioners and staff members may ask questions and make appropriate comments; however, no Commissioner should argue or debate an issue with the petitioner/member of the public.

No Assignment of Time: If there are several speakers on a matter, one person may not assign their time to another in an effort to increase the allowed speaking time. Individual citizens and citizen groups may select a person to make a presentation on their behalf, but each individual's speaking time will be limited to three minutes, subject to the discretion of the Chair or a vote of the Commission.

Orderly Conduct: Citizens attending meetings shall observe rules of propriety, decorum and good conduct. Unauthorized remarks and similar demonstrations shall not be permitted by the Chair who may direct the removal of offenders from the meeting.

1. Analysis on the Merging of the Monticello City Justice Court. Mitchell Maughan, County Attorney

Time Stamp 0:00:20 (audio) & 0:02:22 (video)

Mitch Maughan presented his analysis of the prospective justice court merger with the commission. He believes the city should pay an upfront fee of \$42,000 before the 70/30 split. Kaden Kulow, Monticello City Administrator, wants the 70/30 split to remain in place. The proposal means the county will receive all the operating or net revenue and the full expense for running the courts, and then at year end, if there is any remaining revenue, the 70/30 split occurs. He feels that the county can increase their operating budget as needed. The commission will hold a public hearing later for the county attorney's compensation adjustment for the 12-14 hours required for working in the justice court.

2. Regional Housing Discussion. Una Wirkebau, Economic Recovery Corps

Una Wirkebau, Economic Recovery Corps, provided additional information regarding the housing grant which the county was awarded by the Economic Recovery Corp (ERC). The county had received an intern who was assigned to work on the project, but the grant has ended, so now, the ERC will allow South-East Regional Development Agency (SERDA) to take the lead. SERDA will continue addressing the myriad of housing issues faced by seniors, low income, and others.

On February 13, 2026, SERDA will hold a housing roundtable at USU Blanding campus to discuss county housing issues and concerns. The commissioners agreed that the housing grant award and the ongoing roundtable discussion will benefit the stakeholders and the county residents.

Jade Powell, Deputy Director for SERDA, discussed the housing toolbox and how the multi-county communication process was going to be put together.

Chris Allred (SERDA) spoke about his office and their on-going work in the housing area. He has a goal to bring in the USDA Self Help program into San Juan County for 2027. He stated that the funding is highly competitive, but unfortunately, it has been tied up on the federal level.

Una invited everyone to participate in a NACO tour to the county on March 19th-21st. She felt this would be a valuable forum to express the information regarding the significant housing needs that our county residents face continually.

3. Discussion of the Draft Policies and Procedures of the San Juan County Commission. Mitchell Maughan, County Attorney

Mitchell Maughan, County Attorney, presented the draft policies & procedures for the commission to review and discuss. He stated there are two sections: 206 (administrative) & 207 (meeting policy). He had Johnny Miller, legal counsel for UCIP provide input in the refinement of the document. The red lines indicate what Johnnie felt was the best flow for the policy. Mitch felt the commission should focus their attention on the duties and responsibilities for the Chair and Co-Chair. Mitch will consult with Johnnie and see which parts belong in one document and which parts belong in the other document.

Commission Vice-Chair Harvey encouraged all those in attendance and online to come and participate in the Sexual Assault Conference hosted by USU Blanding on January 31, 2026. He mentioned that Elizabeth Smart and other well-known presenters will be participating in the conference.

He spoke about the Utah Navajo Trust Fund and the Utah Dine' Advisory committee (representatives from the Seven Chapterhouses) meeting which was held last Friday. Marlo Oaks is the treasurer for the Navajo Trust Fund and he participated in the meeting. During the meeting, several major projects were approved: to approve several main projects. One request was for repairs on a road grader which is stationed in Navajo Mountain and another request was for housing for several Oljato Chapter residents.

The Aneth chapter house meeting was held last Sunday, and the need for more housing is their biggest concern. He also spoke about attending meetings with the Utah Navajo Health Systems and their suicide prevention program. He encouraged county residents in supporting individuals who seek mental health support.

Commissioner Stubbs spoke about attending the Navajo Mountain chapter meeting. In the meeting, maps were shared regarding the density of domestic and wild animals within the chapterhouse land area. She mentioned seeing horses near the road. She later learned that the horses were brought in from other areas and dropped into the reservation, and now the horses are depleting the water and grazing resources.

She also spoke with the NRF regarding the Hope and Healing program for the reservation. Commissioner Stubbs thanked former commissioner Rebecca Benally for her leadership in the many committees she serves on.

She stated the Seven Counties Coalition will be changed to the Eight Counties Coalition. The Red Mesa area is gaining several new houses. The CEO of Utah Navajo Health Systems is working on developing and building a grocery store in Montezuma Creek. The store will bring additional jobs to the area and will reduce the time spent traveling to other grocery stores.

Commission Chair Maughan met the new USU President at an informal luncheon. He was made very aware of the needs in SE Utah and specifically Monument Valley. She attended a meeting with the Forest Service Fire staff along with county fire staff. She also attended a meeting where the San Juan Schools Sharps Survey data was shared, and she felt that it was very beneficial. She reiterated that the surveys do not cause suicide ideation, the prevention resources are successful in reducing it.

Commission Chair Maughan presented the CDBG program for the public to make any comments regarding the prospective use of these funds.

1. San Juan County is eligible to apply to the Utah Department of Workforce Services for funding under the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Small Cities Program, a federally funded program administered by the State of Utah, Housing and Community Development Division (HCD). San Juan County is eligible to apply for CDBG funding provided that the County meets the applicable program requirements.

The purpose of this public hearing is to provide citizens with pertinent information about the Community Development Block Grant program and to allow for discussion of possible applications. This public hearing will cover eligible activities, program requirements, and expected funding allocations in the region. The CDBG program can fund a broad range of activities, including, but not limited to: construction of public works and facilities, e.g., water and sewer lines, fire stations, acquisition of real property, and provisions of public services such as food banks or homeless shelters. In the event that San Juan County chooses to apply for CDBG funding, a second public hearing will be held at a later time to discuss the project.

Further information can be obtained by contacting Mack McDonald, San Juan County Administrator at (435) 587-3225.





To Whom It May Concern:

The San Juan County Board of Commissioners unanimously supports the development of a public safety radio communications site at the Dead Horse Point State Park Visitor Center. This project has received strong and consistent support from local, County, and State stakeholders and is recognized as a critical life-safety and emergency essential infrastructure needed for Southeastern Utah.

Current radio coverage in the Canyon Lands National Park and Dead Horse Point State Park area is extremely limited and unreliable. First responders frequently struggle to communicate with dispatch during emergencies, creating unnecessary risk to responders, residents, and the millions of visitors who recreate in this region. Given that this area supports some of the busiest Search and Rescue operations in the state, reliable communications are essential.

The Dead Horse Point Visitor Center is an ideal location for this project. It is a state-owned facility with existing commercial power, backup generation, established backhaul connectivity, and infrastructure that can support discreet antenna installation. Leveraging this site avoids the environmental and permitting challenges associated with open area sites on these sensitive Park Service lands and allows for faster, more cost-effective implementation.

The Commission supports development of a site capable of supporting a trunked P25 system with space for local VHF resources, significantly improving coverage, interoperability, and responder safety for our County, State, and federal agencies operating in the region.

Support for this proposal has been expressed by our local public safety and leaders, including:

Even initial funding to formally scope and develop the project would be a meaningful step toward implementation. Improving communications in this area is a direct investment in public safety and in the protection of life.

 - b. investigating 75% of all stages of syphilis among persons who can become pregnant within 30 days of the case creation date including obtaining pregnancy status, treatment, and stage confirmation;
 - c. interviewing 65% of gonorrhea cases within 60 days of the case creation date;
 - d. providing partner services to syphilis and gonorrhea cases during disease intervention specialist interviews;
 - e. providing partner services to 75% of all stages of syphilis cases among persons who can become pregnant;
 - f. providing partner services to 95% of early syphilis cases among persons with partners who can become pregnant; and
 - g. investigating 100% of congenital syphilis cases within 14 days of birth.
2. ensure appropriate treatment is provided to 75% of early syphilis, and gonorrhea cases within 14 days of diagnosis based on the treatment guidelines specified in this Contract.
3. treat all identifying information regarding STD-infected individuals as confidential information. Disclosure of STD-related information concerning any individual is prohibited without written, informed consent from the individual.

4. ensure all STD cases comply with the requirements of each disease specific Minimum Data Set as specified in this Contract.
 - a. incidences in EpiTrax identified in the quarterly QA summary report shall be resolved no later than four weeks after receiving the report.
5. provide PrEP education and referrals to 75% of all persons who are diagnosed with early syphilis and interviewed by the Grantee.
6. ensure 85% of gonorrhea, syphilis, and syphilis reactor case investigations assigned to the Grantee's jurisdiction in Epitrap receive a workflow status of 'Approved by LHD' within 60 days of the case creation date.
7. ensure chlamydia case investigations assigned to the Grantee's jurisdiction in EpiTrax receive a workflow status of 'Approved by LHD' no later than four weeks after receiving the quarterly QA summary report.

B. Comply with the following standards, protocols, policies, procedures and guidelines or latest update:

C. For reporting, the Grantee shall:

1. submit STD PCHD budget and grant reporting information by the requested deadline;
2. provide the following information on all personnel supported by this funding no later than 30 days after hire:
 - a. staff name;
 - b. staff position, title, and job description;
 - c. annual salary (including fringe benefit percentage if applicable), and
 - d. number of FTE's supported by these funds.

D. The Grantee shall attend an annual contract monitoring meeting with DHHS.

V. OUTCOMES:

The desired outcome is to reduce the rate of STD infections and congenital syphilis cases.

A. Performance measures:

1. number of early syphilis cases interviewed within 14 days of the case creation date;

2. number of persons who can become pregnant with syphilis interviewed within 30 days of the case creation date;
3. number of gonorrhea cases interviewed within 60 days of the case creation date;
4. number of persons who can become pregnant with syphilis who were provided with partner services;
5. number of persons with early syphilis with partners who can become pregnant who were provided partner services;
6. number of congenital syphilis cases investigated within 14 days of birth;
7. number of early syphilis and gonorrhea cases treated appropriately within 14 days of diagnosis;
8. number of persons diagnosed with early syphilis who were provided PrEP education; and
9. number of gonorrhea, syphilis, and syphilis reactor investigations that received a workflow status of 'Approved by LHD' within 60 days of the case creation date.

B. Reporting: The Grantee shall submit data in EpiTrax.

POLICIES, PROCEDURES, AND RULES GOVERNING THE SAN JUAN COUNTY COMMISSION

These rules are made pursuant to Section 17-64-203 and Section 17-64-305 of the Utah Code. A certified copy of these Policies, Procedures and Rules and any subsequent amendments shall be filed with the County Clerk to be kept as a permanent public record. The County Clerk shall also cause these Rules of Order and Procedures to be posted at each meeting of the Commission held under the Open Public Meetings Act and on the San Juan County official website..

A. Definitions

- 1. Chair/Presiding Officer:** Means the person elected or appointed as Chair of the County Commission.
- 2. County Commission:** Means the persons elected and sworn to the Commission, who have not been removed from office for any reason, acting collectively in a duly called meeting of the Commission where a quorum is present.
- 3. Governing Body:** Means the current County Commission acting collectively in a duly called meeting of the Commission where a quorum is present.
- 4. Majority Vote of Governing Body:** Means two (2) Commission Members' affirmative votes.
- 5. Commissioner/ Commission Member/Commission Representative/Member:** Means the individual Commission Members acting individually.
- 6. Membership:** Means the Commission Members.
- 7. Official Action:** Means a written resolution of the Commission adopted by a majority vote in a duly called meeting of the Commission where a quorum is present. All statements of an official position of the County and all documents stating such a position must be approved through an Official Action.
- 8. Quorum:** Means the minimum number of persons required to act as a Governing Body. A quorum requires two (2) Commission Members who must be present in person at the meeting location. Additional Members may attend by phone or other real-time means so long as an Electronic Meetings Resolution is enacted stating same. A quorum may not convene in violation of the Open and Public Meetings Act (U.C.A. 52-4-103).
- 9. Vice-Chair:** Means a Commissioner elected or appointed by the Governing Body to act as Chairperson/Presiding Officer, with all the powers of the Chairperson as defined in these bylaws, in the absence or disability of the Chair. The Vice-Chair's authority exists for the period of appointment of the Commissioner as Vice-Chair, rather than for a specific time period, such as a single Commission meeting.

10. **Official County Commission Business:** Means matters that have been formally acted upon or authorized by the Commission in a duly convened meeting of the Commission where a quorum is present and for which the matter was included on the Agenda properly noticed for the meeting.

11. **Commission Officers:** Means the Commission Chair and Vice-Chair.

B. Commission Members

1. **Appointment of the Officers:** The Commission shall elect or appoint the Chair and the Vice Chair at its first meeting in January.

2. **Commission Meeting Attendance:** Commissioners are required to attend all regularly scheduled and special Commission Meetings. If an event arises that prevents attendance of a Commission Meeting, the Commission Administrator should be notified in advance of the meeting.

3. **Participation in Local, State or Federal Committees:** Commissioners are encouraged to participate in other local, tribal, state and federal committees and associations and inform the Commission accordingly.

4. **County Commission Documents:** The official San Juan County letterhead, which includes the San Juan County logo and names and titles of current officers/Commissioners, shall be used only for official County Commission business.

5. **Commission Communications:** Commissioners may state an official position of the Commission when the Commission has previously adopted that position through an official action of the matter. A Commissioner may not purport to give an official position of San Juan County in written or verbal communication without specific prior approval from the Commission through an official action of the Commission taken in a duly called meeting of the Commission where a quorum is present unless the Commission has previously taken an official position through an official action on the matter. Commissioners shall distinguish and keep separate their personal opinions from the official positions of the Commission in the course of the discharge of their duties. This does not prohibit the expression of an opinion, advocacy for a position, or expression of disagreement.

6. **Electronic Communication:** Commissioners are encouraged to be mindful in their electronic communications that any electronic communications among two or more Commissioners are subject to GRAMA, the State's Government Records Access and Management Act. GRAMA gives "every person the right to inspect a public record" (UCA 63G-2-201(1)). It defines a public record as "public unless otherwise expressly provided by statute" (UCA 63G-2-201(2)). Exceptions are, according to UCA 63G-2-202, "a record that is private, controlled, or protected" under State Code.

Furthermore, the State's Open and Public Meetings Act defines an electronic message as "a communication transmitted electronically including: electronic mail, instant messaging, electronic chat, text messaging, or any other method that conveys a message or facilitates communication electronically" (UCA 52-4-103(5)(a)).

The Open Meetings Act specifically states that the Act does not preclude "members of a public body" from transmitting "an electronic message to other members of the public body at a time when the public body is not convened in an open meeting" (UCA 52-4-210).

7. Commission E-mail and Communication Policy:

- a. Each Commission Member will be given a unique email address, and all email addressed to an individual Commissioner or the Commission will be forwarded as received.
- b. In order to reduce duplicate emails, listserv emails from the organizations listed below will not be forwarded; instead Commission staff shall check at least annually to ensure that all Commissioners are on the direct distribution lists for:
 - i. UAC (Utah Association of Counties);
 - ii. NACo (National Association of Counties);
 - iii. CCP (Canyon Country Partnership); and
 - iv. Any other organization requested by a Commissioner.
- c. Surface mail addressed to a specific Commissioner is to be placed in that Commissioner's box when received.

8. Municipal Building Authority and Board of Equalization: Commissioners shall serve as the Municipal Building Authority as required for capital projects and shall serve as the local Board of Equalization as required for property tax assessment matters.

9. County Board/Commission/Committee and Local and Special Service District Board

Representation: All County Boards, Commissions, and Committees and Local and Special Service District Boards may include one Commissioner representative either as a voting or ex-officio member according to the Board/Commission's enabling ordinance unless otherwise prohibited by law. County Committees shall include a Commissioner representative, if required, according to the Committee's enabling resolution.

C. Commissioners' Participation on County Boards, Commissions & Committees and Local & Special Service District Boards

1. Assignments to County Boards, Commissions & Committees and Local & Special Service

District Boards: In January of each year the Commission shall review each Commission Representative position to County Boards, Commissions and Committees, and Local and Special Service District Boards, and other agencies. Commissioners shall indicate which assignments they would prefer. For assignments selected by more than one Commissioner, the Commission shall vote on who receives the assignment. In the event that no Commissioner volunteers for an assignment, the Chair shall assign a Commissioner.

2. Commissioners' Role: Commissioners assigned to serve on County Boards, Commissions and Committees, and Local and Special Service District or other agency Boards shall serve as the liaison to the Commission, whether a voting member per enabling documents or not. Commissioners shall represent the Commission but cannot commit the County on any matter without first obtaining approval through an official action of the Commission.

3. Boards/Commissions/Committees/Agencies Reporting to the Commission: Commission Representatives to boards, commissions, committees, and agencies shall regularly report to the Commission during a Commission meeting and when action is required.⁴

4. Commissioner Participation: Commissioners who are not assigned as representatives are encouraged to attend any Board, Commission, or Committee meeting for informational purposes and shall notify the Commission Representative of their interest to attend. Commissioners not assigned as Commission Representatives attending these meetings shall participate as members of the public.

5. Special Service District Boards: In accordance with (UCA §17D, Chapter 1) the Commission may establish Special Service District ("District") Boards. These Boards are independent of the County except that the Commission shall, pursuant to UCA Section 17D-1-303, make all appointments to such Administrative Control Boards except for District Boards elected by the public and where otherwise established in the organization's bylaws or enabling documents. Each District Board shall include one Commissioner representative as appointed or assigned by the Commission to serve the term established by the District bylaws. All business conducted by the District Board shall be independent of the County with the exception of the involvement of the Commission Representative. Joint meetings of the Commission Membership and the District Boards are encouraged for the purpose of establishing common goals and objectives.

6. Attendance: Commission Members are required to attend all regularly scheduled and special Board, Commission, and Committee meetings to which they are assigned. If regular attendance at an assigned Board, Commission, or Committee meeting is not possible, the Commissioner will make arrangements for a re-appointment for that assignment.

D. Duties of the Chair and Vice-Chair

- 1. The Chair:** The Chair and the Vice-Chair acting as Chair shall have no veto power over official actions and no special substantive authority. The Chair is responsible for setting the Commission Agenda, facilitating Commission Meetings, and signing the Commission-approved documents. The Chair does not act on behalf of the Commission unless directed by the majority of the Commission Members through an official action and is subject to all of the provisions of Section B of these Rules of Order.
- 2. Presiding Officer:** The Chair shall be the Presiding Officer at all meetings and hearings of the Commission.
- 3. Vice-Chair:** In the event of absence or disability of the Chair, the Vice-Chair shall preside. Upon the Chair's request, the Vice-Chair shall assist with the discharge of any of the Chair's duties.
- 4. Study Committees:** The Chair may, at his/her discretion, oversee the membership and proper functioning of the Commission Study Committees, whether or not a designated committee member.
- 5. Control of Chambers:** The Chair shall have control of the Commission Chambers. The Chair shall maintain order and may eject any member of the public who behaves in a disorderly manner with intent to disrupt the meeting.
- 6. Points of Order:** The Chair shall decide all points of order and procedure, subject to appeal of membership.
- 7. Roll Call Vote:** actions taken require a roll call vote with the minutes showing for each member of the Commission a vote of aye, nay or absent.
- 8. Sign Documents, Contracts and Agreements:** The Chair shall sign resolutions, ordinances, and all other documents issued by the Commission. The Chair shall sign all contracts and agreements approved by Commission, including "all associated documents" included in motions. The Chair may delegate such signatory authority to the Vice-Chair as per Section D.1. The Chair, in his or her sole discretion, may consult with the Commission Administrator and the County Attorney for review of the above documents.
- 9. Training on Open and Public Meetings Act:** The Chair shall ensure that all Commissioners are provided with the opportunity for annual trainings of the Open and Public Meetings Act, UCA §52-4.
- 10. Voting Rights and Authority:** The Presiding Officer at a meeting shall have the authority of other members of the Governing Body during a meeting including making motions, seconding a motion, voting and participating in discussion and debate.. However, the Presiding Officer should only make a motion when no motion is forthcoming from another member of the Governing Body when the Presiding Officer has indicated that motion on an item is in order to move the meeting forward.

E. The Commission Administrator**F. County Clerk**

1. Meetings: The Clerk or deputy is expected to attend all Commission meetings and shall attest all instruments signed by the Chair, including resolutions and ordinances.

2. Notices: In collaboration with the Commission Administrator, the County Clerk ensures that all required notices are posted or published as required by the Open and Public Meetings Act and that all notices include the date, time and name or initials of the person posting the notice. The Commission, or their agent, is responsible for providing in a timely manner to the Clerk all information required for posting the necessary notices under the Open and Public Meetings Act.

3. Minutes: The Clerk or deputy prepares and maintains minutes and recordings of the proceedings, including closed sessions, as appropriate, and such journals and records as required. Minutes shall be posted on the County website once approved and shall include the following:

- a. the date, time and place of the meeting;
- b. the names of Commissioners present and absent;
- c. the substance of all matters proposed, discussed, or decided by the Commission which may include a summary of comments made by Commissioners;
- d. a record, by individual member, or each vote taken by the Commission; e. the name of each person who:
 - i. is not a Commissioner; and
 - ii. after being recognized by the Commission Chair, provided testimony or comments to the Commission;
- f. the substance, in brief, of the testimony or comments provided by the public; and
- g. any other information that is a record of the proceedings of the meeting that any Commissioner requests be entered in the minutes or recordings.

G. The County Attorney

1. Meeting Attendance: The County Attorney shall attend meetings and hearings of the county legislative body as necessary. (U.C.A. §17-68-601(5).

2. Legal Analysis by County Attorney: When requested, the County Attorney will provide a full and detailed written legal analysis of any action item on the Commission agenda in the manner described in these Policies and Procedures.

3. Approving as to form and legality: The County Attorney shall review and approve as to form and legality each county contract, ordinance, regulation, real estate document, conveyance, and legal document. (U.C.A. §17-68-605).

4. Legal Counsel: The County Attorney shall act as the legal advisor to the county and the County Commission in their official capacity as County Commissioners (U.C.A. §17-68-601).

5. Attorney/Client Relationship: The Commission, through official actions, may direct the County Attorney as to any legal matter where a client would ordinarily be able to direct the actions of the client's attorney. In any instance where the County Attorney fails to carry out the lawful directive of the Commission as stated in an official action, the Chair may take action to report that failure to appropriate officials or entities if so authorized by a majority vote of the Commission.

H. Commission Meetings

1. Open and Public Meetings Act: All Commission Meetings, including Special Meetings, Emergency Meetings and Workshops, shall be in compliance with the Open and Public Meetings Act, UCA Title 52 Chapter 4. All Commission Meetings will be open to the public. Any closed sessions shall be in accordance with UCA §52-4-204.

2. Approval of Annual Schedule of Meetings: The Commission shall approve its annual meeting schedule during the December scheduled meeting and publish the approved schedule in accordance with UCA §52-4-202.

3. Commission Meeting Dates and Times: The Commission shall hold regular meetings the first and third Tuesday of each month. In those months when the holidays or elections fall on the first or third Tuesday, the meeting shall be held the following day. To the extent practicable and if so required as determined by the Chair, Commission meetings will begin at 11:00 a.m MST (work meetings will begin at 9:00 a.m. MST. Public hearings to adopt or change a budget or to consider matters related to taxes or fees shall begin at 6:00 p.m. or later. Where practicable, Commission meetings shall be live-streamed and publicly broadcast.

4. Special and Emergency Meetings: The Chair or the Commission by majority vote may call a special meeting or an emergency meeting in accordance with the Utah Open and Public Meetings Act as becomes necessary.

5. Recess and Adjournment:

- a. Commission meetings shall be adjourned by a majority vote and no further business may be conducted once a motion to adjourn has been adopted. A motion to adjourn takes precedence over all other motions, including pending motions.
- b. The Commission may recess a meeting by a majority vote and this motion, if approved, has the effect of temporarily suspending the meeting. A motion to recess that extends the meeting past the current day has the effect of an adjournment.
- c. The Commission may recess a meeting in order to convene itself as another entity of the County, such as a board or commission. Once the business of the board or commission is completed, the Commission may end the recess by majority vote and reconvene to complete the business stated on the approved Commission agenda.

I. Agenda

1. Order of Business: The Commission Administrator's office shall prepare, and the Chair shall approve, a written agenda for each meeting. The order of business for Commission agendas will typically contain a section entitled "Work Meeting", during which reports are presented and items are briefed and discussed but not voted on; and a section entitled "Formal Meeting", during which the Commission deliberates and votes on various matters.

2. Agenda Management and Preparation:

- a. Elected officials and department heads may submit to the Commission Administrator, Items proposed for inclusion in the agenda in person or electronically, by not later than 5:00 pm. on the Thursday before the Commission meeting that they are to be included on the agenda. No item shall be accepted after that time, except as specifically stated in these Policies and Procedures.
- b. Requests for inclusion on an agenda and supporting documentation must be received by 5 PM on the Thursday prior to a Regular Meeting and forty-eight (48) hours prior to any Special Meeting.
- c. Proposed agenda items must be accompanied by all documents reasonably necessary for a clear understanding of the item by the Commission. For example, if a proposed resolution references a lease or a contract, the referenced documents must be included with the agenda item. The Commission Administrator shall reject all proposed agenda items that do not comply with this requirement.

3. Legal Review: All agenda items shall be submitted for legal review by the County Attorney when they are first received by the Commission Administrator unless already reviewed by the County Attorney prior to sending to the Commission Administrator.

a. The County Attorney shall provide a written legal review of each agenda item. If an agenda item raises no legal issues, the County Attorney shall provide a statement to the Commission that they have fully reviewed the item and no further legal review is needed. If the County Attorney needs additional time to review an item, he or she may have up to 14 days after the Commission has taken action on said item to submit a full legal review of the item.

b. If requested by a Commissioner, the legal review provided by the County Attorney shall include cites to all legal authority or other materials referenced in the legal review.

c. The County Attorney need not submit the legal review prior to a work session discussion of the agenda item, but must circulate the legal review to the Commissioners by not later than 5 p.m. on the Monday before the Commission meeting at which the item will be an action item on the Commission's agenda. Subject to Section 3 of this Section, failure to provide a legal review by the appropriate deadlines shall be deemed to be a determination by the County Attorney that no legal issues exist as to that agenda item.

d. In the event that the legal review requires additional time, the County Attorney shall inform the Commissioners at or before the meeting.

4. Packet preparation and dissemination.

a. The Commission Administrator shall assemble a Commission meeting packet, containing a copy of the agenda, all agenda items and all documents attached to each agenda item, except for those materials that are:

- (i) copyrighted, unless written permission by the copyright holder is provided;
- (ii) proprietary;
- (iii) confidential;
- (iv) related to a closed session; or
- (v) intended as legal communications.

Such materials shall not be included in the general packet unless otherwise allowed by these Rules or applicable law. Excluded materials shall be provided to the Commission under separate cover, marked "confidential".

b. The Commission Administrator shall deliver the agenda and packet to the Commissioners, County Attorney, County Clerk, and County Library not less than 24 hours prior to the meeting at which that agenda will be considered.

c. The Commission Administrator shall post a copy of the agenda at the meeting location and on the State Public Meeting Notice website, and shall also post a copy of the complete agenda and packet (with the exception of excluded materials) on the County website.

J. Work Session Items and Procedure

1. The purpose of the Work Session is to allow the Commissioners to make an initial review of those proposed agenda items requiring an official action, identify issues or concerns regarding those items, make amendments to proposed resolutions or ordinances, and for non-controversial items to be moved to the Consent Agenda for expedited action.
2. The Commission Administrator shall review all proposed agenda items and shall place all items requiring official action by the Commission on the Work Session agenda for the next meeting.
3. During the Work Session at the next regular meeting, the Commission shall discuss each Work Session agenda item.
4. Amendments may be made to proposed resolutions or ordinances on the Work Session agenda by motion and majority vote.
5. If all Commissioners agree, any Work Session item may be moved to the Consent Agenda of a subsequent meeting for approval without further discussion. All other items shall be placed on the General Business section of the following meeting for full discussion and vote.
6. Specific issues concerning items not placed on the Consent Agenda during the Work Session shall be identified and referred to the appropriate County officials or staff for assistance in addressing those issues before the next meeting of the Commission.

K. Consent Agenda

1. The purpose of the Consent Agenda is to quickly process and dispose of noncontroversial matters by being adopted all at once.
2. All items on the Consent Agenda shall be considered without further discussion or debate.
3. All items on the Consent Agenda shall be voted on in a single vote. The items on the Consent Agenda are approved by a simple majority vote.
4. Any item may be removed from the Consent Agenda for the Commission consideration as part of the General Business section of the agenda during the meeting by a majority vote of the Commission.

L. Meeting Location and Decorum

1. The meeting location of all Commission meetings shall be open to the public, with the exception of closed sessions.

2. All persons attending a Commission meeting shall behave in a respectful manner, shall only speak when first recognized by the Chair, shall refrain from interrupting the Commission or any other speaker who has been recognized by the Chair and shall behave in a way that does not disrupt the proceedings of the Commission. At the direction of the Chair, law enforcement may remove from the meeting any person causing disturbances or otherwise violating the law.

M. Voting

1. **To Pass Acts:** Two (2) affirmative votes shall be necessary to pass any resolution, ordinance or act (motion).
2. **Conflict of Interest:** A Commissioner shall not vote where there is a conflict of interest defined by Utah Code Section 67-16-9 and shall declare such conflict and decide if it warrants recusal from both the deliberations and the decision making process for that item. The Commissioner shall not debate the agenda matter from which she/he is recusing her/himself.
3. **Failure to Vote:** A failure to vote by a Commissioner who is present at the meeting shall be treated as a Nay vote on the motion. A failure to vote by a Commissioner who is absent from the meeting for any reason shall be treated as an absence.
4. **Leaving Seat:** When a motion is seconded, no Commissioner shall leave until their vote has been recorded except in the case of personal emergency.
5. **Change of Vote:** A Commissioner may change their vote after the call for the vote has been completed and before announcement of the result, but not thereafter.
6. **Abstentions:** Although it is the duty of every Commissioner to vote, they can abstain, as they cannot be compelled to vote. As the record of the roll call vote under statute requires each vote to be recorded as Aye, Nay or absent, failing to vote or abstaining will be recorded as a Nay vote.
7. **Questions Affecting a Commissioner:** Commissioners are permitted to vote for themselves for an office or other position to which Commissioners are generally eligible.

K. Motions

1. **Making and Withdrawing:** When a motion is made, the Chair shall call for a second. The Chair shall restate the motion upon request by any Commissioner. If the motion receives a second, the Chair has discretion to restate the motion after debate and before vote commences. If there is no second to the motion the motion shall die without further debate due to the lack of a second. A motion may not be withdrawn by the person making the motion without the consent of the majority of the Commission once it has been seconded. The Chair may request that the motion is submitted in written form prior to the motion being stated by the Chair. The Chair may second a motion by another Commissioner.
2. **Division of Motion:** If the motion contains two (2) or more divisible propositions, the Chair may, and upon request of a Commissioner shall, divide the same.

3. Motions Out of Order: The Chair may not at any time permit a member to introduce an ordinance, resolution, or motion out of the regular order as set forth in the agenda unless a motion is made to take such item out of order and that motion is approved by majority vote. A proposed ordinance or resolution may also be moved by majority vote from the Work Meeting agenda to the Formal Meeting section of the agenda for action on the same day as the item was introduced on the Work Meeting agenda, so long as any changes made to the item are not so substantial as to necessitate re-noticing.

4. Rescinding a Motion, Resolution, Order or Rule: A motion, resolution, order, or rule that has been adopted at some previous meeting may be rescinded by a subsequent official action of the Commission; however, such rescission must be made by resolution. The effect of a rescission is that the prior motion, resolution, order or rule is treated as if it was never approved.

5. Reconsidering a Motion: A motion may be reconsidered at any time during the same meeting at which it was originally acted upon if the motion to reconsider is introduced by a Commissioner who had voted with the prevailing side and the motion is passed by a majority vote. Only after the motion to reconsider has been approved by the majority can the main motion be considered.

6. Postponing a Motion: Any item on the agenda may be postponed until the next meeting or a specific future date. A motion to postpone shall give best efforts to include the future time of consideration and reason for postponement. Any agenda item not postponed to a specific later date shall be automatically placed on the agenda of the next meeting of the Commission.

7. Tabling a Motion: Any item on the agenda may be tabled until later in the same meeting. A motion to table temporarily suspends further consideration or action on an agenda item until later in the meeting. A motion to bring back to the table shall be made to resume discussion on the item tabled. An item to be considered at a future meeting shall be postponed, rather than tabled.

8. Amending a Motion: Any main motion may be offered for amendment by a Commissioner after the main motion has been seconded and is under debate. The Commissioner who seconded the main motion must concur in the amendment.

9. Substituting a Motion: A motion may be made to substitute a different motion for the pending motion. If the motion to substitute fails, the Chair returns to the pending motion as originally read or made. If the motion to substitute passes, the question is now on the motion proposed for substitution and the original motion dies.

10. Chair's participation in making or seconding motions: If the Chair wishes to make an original motion, they shall first request a motion be made by another Commissioner. If no original motion is forthcoming the Chair may make their motion, and move forward with a request for second. The Chair may second motions while acting as the Chair. Nothing in this section shall be construed as restricting the Chair's ability to fully participate in the legislative process.

O. Reading and Passage of Resolutions and Ordinances. All proposed resolutions and ordinances are subject to the following requirements for approval:

- 1. Printed or Electronic Copies.** In order to be considered, printed or electronic copies of the proposed resolution or ordinance shall be in the possession of the Commission not less than 24 hours prior to the meeting. Such copies may be delivered by hand or electronically.
- 2. Read Into Record.** All resolutions and ordinances, except those on the Consent Agenda, may be fully read into the record of the Commission by the Commission Chair or another County employee if so requested by the Chair.
- 3. Available to the Public:** Copies of proposed resolutions shall be available to the public, when feasible, at the Clerk's office and the Library not less than forty eight (48) hours before the Commission convenes to take official action upon the resolution.
- 4. Effective Date of Ordinances:** No ordinance passed by the Commission shall take effect within less than fifteen (15) days of its publication in accordance with UCA 17-53-208 unless authorized otherwise by state code, such as for emergencies or temporary land use regulations.
- 5. Amending a Resolution or Ordinance:** Amendments of resolutions and ordinances shall be approved by a majority vote of the Commission and are subject to all of the provisions of this section.

P. Decorum and Debate

- 1. Being Recognized:** When a Commissioner desires to speak or make a motion, the Commissioner shall address the Chair by stating, "Mr./Madam Chair". Upon being recognized by the Chair, the Commissioner may then address the Chair. If a Commissioner wishes to ask a question or request information from staff or a members of the public, they should request the Chair direct such question or request for information.
- 2. First Person Recognized:** When more than one Commissioner addresses the Chair, the Chair shall name the person who is to speak, recognizing the person who first addressed the Chair. No other person may speak while the recognized Commissioner continues to hold the floor.
- 3. Interruptions:** No Commissioner shall interrupt another, except when permitted by parliamentary procedure.
- 4. Decorum:** No Commissioner shall indulge in personalities, attack the motives of Commissioner or use language tending to hold a Commissioner up to contempt or ridicule.
- 5. Debate with the Public:** No Commissioner shall debate with the public or employees during meetings or workshops.
- 6. Limitation of Debate:** In general, no Commissioner shall be allowed to speak more than once upon any one subject until all other Commissioners have had an opportunity to speak.

7. Electronic Devices: Use of electronic devices during a Commission meeting shall be limited to matters pertaining to the business of the meeting except in the case of personal emergency; such use is subject to the Open and Public Meetings Act (UCA 52-4) and GRAMA.

8. Leaving Chambers: No Commissioner shall leave the meeting location during a session without informing the Chair, except for short breaks.

Q. Participation by the Public

1. Employee/Public Recognized: No person shall speak unless recognized by the Chair.

2. Citizens to Be Heard: During the Citizens to Be Heard portion of the meeting, citizens desiring to speak shall address themselves to the Chair. Upon being recognized, they shall stand, state their full name, address, who they represent, and state their subject matter.

3. No Interruptions: No person shall interrupt legislative proceedings.

4. Three-Minute Rule: No person of the public shall speak more than three (3) minutes except upon waiver by the Chair or on motion of the Commission.

5. Procedure: Orderly procedure requires that each member of the public shall proceed without interruption from the audience and shall retire when their time is up; that all statements shall be addressed to the Chair, and that there be no questioning or argument between individuals.

6. Questions: After being first recognized by the Chair, Commissioners and staff members may ask questions and make appropriate comments; however, no Commissioner should argue or debate an issue with the petitioner/member of the public.

7. No Assignment of Time: If there are several speakers on a matter, one person may not assign their time to another in an effort to increase the allowed speaking time. Individual citizens and citizen groups may select a person to make a presentation on their behalf, but each individual's speaking time will be limited to three minutes, subject to the discretion of the Chair or a vote of the Commission.

8. Orderly Conduct: Citizens attending meetings shall observe rules of propriety, decorum and good conduct. Unauthorized remarks and similar demonstrations shall not be permitted by the Chair who may direct the removal of offenders from the meeting.

R. Public Hearings

1. Posting of Public Hearing: All public hearings shall be published in the local newspaper of record and posted in accordance with Utah State Code, San Juan County and local ordinances, as applicable.

2. Staff Presentation: The appropriate staff shall make a presentation to the Commission and the public on behalf of the public hearing matter.

3. Applicant Speaks: Regarding Planning and Zoning issues, the applicant shall be invited first to speak to the Commissioners after the staff has made a presentation. Applicants may appear in person or be represented by legal or other counsel. Applicant statements shall be limited to ten (10) minutes or as otherwise indicated by the Chair.

4. Questions: Commissioners may direct questions to the applicant and/or staff in order to bring out relevant facts, circumstances or conditions affecting the case and may call for questions from the staff.

5. Opening Hearings: The Chair shall open the hearing and invite the public to the podium for comment. All public participation shall be subject to the Decorum and Debate provisions of Section Q.

6. Closing Hearings: Following public comment, if any, during the public hearing the Chair announces conclusion of this portion of the public hearing, stating that the public hearing will remain open for written public comment until 5 PM on the date that is six (6) days before the next regularly scheduled meeting (or other specified date). The Chair further states that the matter will be considered at the next regularly scheduled meeting (or other specified date). A Commissioner may move to suspend these rules, by a majority vote, to take action and vote on the matter immediately. If the motion to take action is approved, the Commission can then move to consider the item.

7. Written Comments: Written comments may be submitted to the Commission Administrator's office for the record at the hearing for up to 5PM six (6) days before the next regularly scheduled Commission meeting. The Commission Administrator shall ensure that all on-time written comments are made a part of the Commission packet for the Commission meeting at which the issue is to be considered. At the close of each public hearing the Commission Administrator shall ensure that all on-time written comments have been forwarded to the Clerk's Office for public record.

8. Late Comments: Written comments are considered late any time after 5PM six (6) days before the next regularly scheduled Commission meeting that follows the public hearing, unless a different date is specified by the Chair. Late comments (whether received by Commission staff by email, mail or delivery) will be forwarded electronically by Commission staff to each Commissioner. However, late comments will not be made available by Commission staff for the Commission meeting nor made a part of the online archived public record

T. Amendment of Policies and Procedures

1. Amending the Policies and Procedures: No policy or procedure of the Commission shall be amended except by majority vote. Consideration of proposed amendments shall be held during regularly scheduled meeting(s).

2. Resolution Required: Amendment of these Policies and Procedures shall be through resolution. A redlined document shall be archived electronically by the County Clerk identifying all changes for approval.

3. Policies and Procedures Considered Amended: Policies and Procedures, including these Rules of Order and Procedures, of the Commission that are enacted or amended in a manner which creates a conflict with a prior Policy or Procedure are considered to have been amended to the extent necessary to comply with the most recently enacted or amended Policy or Procedure. Policies and Procedures containing statutory references or citations are considered amended when the statute referenced or cited is amended.

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING ADDING SEVIER COUNTY AND APPROVING THE AMENDMENT AND RESTATEMENT OF THE SEVEN COUNTY INFRASTRUCTURE COALITION INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT; AND RELATED MATTERS

WHEREAS, the Legislative Body of Carbon County, Utah (the “Legislative Body”) has determined that the public health, convenience, and necessity will be benefitted by Carbon County’s (the “County”) continued participation in the interlocal entity to be known as the SEVEN COUNTY INFRASTRUCTURE COALITION (the “Coalition”), an interlocal entity created and existing pursuant to the Utah Interlocal Cooperation Act, Title 11, Chapter 13, of the Utah Code (the “Act”); and

WHEREAS, Sevier County desires to join Carbon County, Daggett County, Duchesne County, Emery County, San Juan County, and Uintah County as a member of the Coalition; and

WHEREAS, the original interlocal agreement creating the Coalition needs to be amended to add Sevier County as a member and to address other necessary issues; and

WHEREAS, the Coalition is and shall continue to be a political subdivision and body politic and corporate subdivision of the State of Utah, separate and independent of the County and all other participating counties; and

WHEREAS, the Amended and Restated Interlocal Cooperation Agreement (the “Agreement”) re-establishing the Coalition and amending the Coalition’s original interlocal cooperation agreement was presented to the Legislative Body:

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Legislative Body of Carbon County, Utah as follows:

1. The public health, convenience, and necessity will be benefitted by the County’s continued participation in the Coalition.
2. It is the desire of the Legislative Body to create, continue in existence, and participate in an independent interlocal entity as a separate political subdivision and body politic and corporate subdivision of the State of Utah to be called the Seven County Infrastructure Coalition, formerly known as the Six County Infrastructure Coalition.

3. The Legislative Body approves of and ratifies the Agreement, including the addition of Sevier County as a member of the Coalition and other changes and amendments to the original interlocal agreement as set forth in the Agreement.

4. The boundaries and area of the Coalition shall include all portions of the participating counties, including Carbon County.

5. The effective date of the Agreement shall be December 1, 2016.

6. The purposes of the Coalition, are, as more fully set forth in the Agreement, (1) to encourage and promote multiple uses of natural resources, (2) to foster communication, coordination and planning between the members, (3) to promote and engage in the planning, financing, undertaking, ownership, acquisition, development, construction, management and operation, maintenance, repair, administration and control of projects located within and outside of the region, to utilize and enhance the region's natural resources and features in a responsible and appropriate manner with consideration for environmental concerns, and (4) to secure funding for projects

7. The Coalition shall have all powers granted by the Act and, as more fully set forth in the Agreement, is hereby authorized to do all acts necessary or helpful to accomplish its stated purposes, including, but not limited to, any or all of the following:

- A. To adopt, amend, and repeal rules, bylaws, and regulations, policies, and procedures for the regulation of its affairs and the conduct of its business, to have an official seal and power to alter that seal at will and the exercise of its powers and functions under the Act.
- B. To sue and be sued in its own name.
- C. To make and execute contracts and agreements, and all other instruments necessary or desirable for the convenient performance of its purposes, with other public agencies, the State government, the federal government, foreign powers, private entities, and other parties and entities.
- D. To own, control, acquire, construct, build, develop, operate, maintain, repair, manage, administer, control, or to cause to be constructed, built, developed, operated, maintained, repaired, managed, administered or controlled such Projects and activities as shall be necessary or desirable for the purposes of the Coalition.
- E. To acquire by gift, grant, purchase, eminent domain or otherwise and to lease as lessor or lessee any property (real or personal,

tangible or intangible), buildings, projects, infrastructure, facilities, works or improvements, or undivided or fractional interests therein, necessary or convenient for the purposes of the Coalition and sell or otherwise dispose of any such property.

- F. To borrow money or incur indebtedness, liabilities, or obligations; to issue bonds, notes, certificates of participation, warrants, etc. for the purposes for which the Coalition was created; to assign, pledge, or otherwise convey as security for the payment of any such bonds the revenues and receipts from or for the Coalition, which assignment, pledge, or other conveyance may rank prior in right to any other obligation except taxes or payments in lieu thereof payable to the State of Utah or its political subdivisions. The Coalition may not issue general obligation bonds because it has no power to tax.
- G. To employ or contract with persons or firms for personnel, including professional advisors and consultants, to accomplish its purposes and powers.
- H. To provide a common forum to identify, discuss, study, and bring into focus regional challenges and opportunities and solicit assistance and cooperation to address the same.
- I. To achieve advantages of cooperative action which cannot be achieved individually and to make the most effective use of local leadership and resources.
- J. To serve as a multi-purpose organization to engage in and carry out planning and development of projects and activities determined by the Coalition Board to be applicable to achieve benefits and advantages to the region or significant portions thereof.
- K. To provide an organization to enhance effective communication and coordination among public officials pertaining to regional interests.
- L. To maintain liaison with member counties, governmental entities, and other groups, organizations and stakeholders and to serve as regional spokesman for the region.
- M. To take such other actions, engage in such other transactions and do all other things as may be necessary, convenient or appropriate to accomplish its purposes or carry out any of its powers and perform such other functions as may be deemed by its Board to be appropriate.

- N. The Coalition does not have the power to impose or levy a tax.
- O. The Coalition does not have the power to incur any indebtedness for or on behalf of any member county. However, a member county may elect by written agreement approved by legislative action of such member county to provide security for obligations of the Coalition, or to share revenues with the Coalition or with another Member county(s), as provided in the Act.
- P. To secure funding, including loans and grants for projects and activities.

8. The Legislative Body and the governing body of each party to the Agreement agree to cooperate to ensure that the Agreement is executed and carried out as required by law, including the creation, submission, or recording of any filings, notices, plats, agreements, or other documents required under the Act or the Agreement to be so created, submitted, or created to carry out the terms and purposes of the Agreement, including the addition of Sevier County to the Coalition.

9. The Legislative Body hereby authorizes its Chair to sign the Agreement and its County Clerk to attest to such signature and to apply the seal to such Agreement, and further directs the County attorney to review the Agreement consistent with Section 202.5(3) of the Act.

10. The Legislative Body hereby acknowledges that pursuant to Section 211 of the Act, the County may appropriate funds, sell or give tangible or intangible property to, and provide personnel or services to the Coalition, as may be determined by future action of the Legislative Body.

11. The Legislative Body hereby acknowledges that pursuant to Section 212 of the Act, the Coalition may create, construct, or otherwise acquire facilities or improvements to render services or provide benefits in excess of those required to meet the needs or requirements of the member counties that are parties to the Agreement.

12. The Legislative Body hereby acknowledges that pursuant to Section 214 of the Act, the County may convey property to or acquire property from any other public agency for consideration as may be agreed upon.

13. The Legislative Body hereby acknowledges that pursuant to Section 215 of the Act, the County may, at the discretion of the Legislative Body, share its tax and other revenues with other counties, cities, towns, or local political subdivisions, the state, or a federal government agency pursuant to a future interlocal agreement that may be entered into, subject to Section 202.5 of the Act.

14. Pursuant to the Act, the Legislative Body directs the County Clerk, along with the County Clerks in the other participating counties, to cause a notice of interlocal agreement to the published (1) one time in the following newspapers: Deseret News, Mountain Press, San Juan Record, Sun Advocate, Uintah Basin Standard, and the Vernal Express, which are newspapers of general circulation in the Coalition created by the Agreement and which are designated by the Legislative Body as the official newspapers pursuant to the Act, and (2) notice of the interlocal agreement is posted on the Utah Public Notice Website. The County Clerk shall also cause a copy of this Resolution (together with all exhibits hereto) to be kept on file in the County's principal offices for public examination during the regular business hours of the County until at least 30 days from and after the last date of publication thereof. The Legislative Body directs its officers and staff to cause to be published and posted a Notice of Interlocal Agreement to be issued in substantially the form attached hereto.





- I. To achieve advantages of cooperative action which cannot be achieved individually and to make the most effective use of local leadership and resources.
- J. To serve as a multi-purpose organization to engage in and carry out planning and development of projects and activities determined by the Coalition Board to be applicable to achieve benefits and advantages to the region or significant portions thereof.
- K. To provide an organization to enhance effective communication and coordination among public officials pertaining to regional interests.
- L. To maintain liaison with member counties, governmental entities, and other groups, organizations and stakeholders and to serve as regional spokesman for the region.
- M. To take such other actions, engage in such other transactions and do all other things as may be necessary, convenient or appropriate to accomplish its purposes or carry out any of its powers and perform such other functions

The Legislative Body hereby acknowledges that pursuant to Section 212 of the Act, the Coalition may create, construct, or otherwise acquire facilities or improvements to render services or provide benefits in excess of those required to meet the needs or requirements of the member counties that are parties to the Agreement.

12. The Legislative Body hereby acknowledges that pursuant to Section 214 of the Act, the County may convey property to or acquire property from any other public agency for consideration as may be agreed upon.

13. The Legislative Body hereby acknowledges that pursuant to Section 215 of the Act, the County may, at the discretion of the Legislative Body, share its tax and other revenues with other counties, cities, towns, or local political subdivisions, the state, or a federal government agency pursuant to a future interlocal agreement that may be entered into, subject to Section 202.5 of the Act.

14. Pursuant to the Act, the Legislative Body directs the County Clerk, along with the County Clerks in the other participating counties, to cause a notice of interlocal agreement to be published (1) one time in the following newspapers: Deseret News, Mountain Press, San Juan Record, Sun Advocate, Uintah Basin Standard, and the Vernal Express, which are newspapers of general circulation in the Coalition created by the Agreement and which are designated by the Legislative Body as the official newspapers pursuant to the Act, and (2) notice of the interlocal agreement is posted on the Utah Public Notice Website. The County Clerk shall also cause a copy of this Resolution (together with all exhibits hereto) to be kept on file in the County's principal offices for public examination during the regular business hours of the County until at least 30 days from and after the last date of publication thereof. The Legislative Body directs its officers and staff to cause to be published and posted a Notice of Interlocal Agreement to be issued in substantially the form attached hereto.

15. The Legislative Body further directs the County Clerk to also complete the record of proceedings attached hereto.



WHEREAS, the Amended and Restated Interlocal Cooperation Agreement (the "Agreement") re-establishing the Coalition and amending the Coalition's original interlocal cooperation agreement was presented to the Legislative Body:

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Legislative Body of San Juan County, Utah as follows:

1. The public health, convenience, and necessity will be benefitted by the County's continued participation in the Coalition.
2. It is the desire of the Legislative Body to create, continue in existence, and participate in an independent interlocal entity as a separate political subdivision and body politic and corporate subdivision of the State of Utah to be called the Seven County Infrastructure Coalition, formerly known as the Six County Infrastructure Coalition.

3. The Legislative Body approves of and ratifies the Agreement, including the addition of Sevier County as a member of the Coalition and other changes and amendments to the original interlocal agreement as set forth in the Agreement.

4. The boundaries and area of the Coalition shall include all portions of the participating counties, including San Juan County.

5. The effective date of the Agreement shall be December 1, 2016.

6. The purposes of the Coalition, are, as more fully set forth in the Agreement, (1) to encourage and promote multiple uses of natural resources, (2) to foster communication, coordination and planning between the members, (3) to promote and engage in the planning, financing, undertaking, ownership, acquisition, development, construction, management and operation, maintenance, repair, administration and control of projects located within and outside of the region, to utilize and enhance the region's natural resources and features in a responsible and appropriate manner with consideration for environmental concerns, and (4) to secure funding for projects

7. The Coalition shall have all powers granted by the Act and, as more fully set forth in the Agreement, is hereby authorized to do all acts necessary or helpful to accomplish its stated purposes, including, but not limited to, any or all of the following:

- A. To adopt, amend, and repeal rules, bylaws, and regulations, policies, and procedures for the regulation of its affairs and the conduct of its business, to have an official seal and power to alter that seal at will and the exercise of its powers and functions under the Act.
- B. To sue and be sued in its own name.
- C. To make and execute contracts and agreements, and all other instruments necessary or desirable for the convenient performance of its purposes, with other public agencies, the State government, the federal government, foreign powers, private entities, and other parties and entities.
- D. To own, control, acquire, construct, build, develop, operate, maintain, repair, manage, administer, control, or to cause to be constructed, built, developed, operated, maintained, repaired, managed, administered or controlled such Projects and activities as shall be necessary or desirable for the purposes of the Coalition.
- E. To acquire by gift, grant, purchase, eminent domain or otherwise and to

lease as lessor or lessee any property (real or personal, tangible or intangible), buildings, projects, infrastructure, facilities, works or improvements, or undivided or fractional interests therein, necessary or convenient for the purposes of the Coalition and sell or otherwise dispose of any such property.

- F. To borrow money or incur indebtedness, liabilities, or obligations; to issue bonds, notes, certificates of participation, warrants, etc. for the purposes for which the Coalition was created; to assign, pledge, or otherwise convey as security for the payment of any such bonds the revenues and receipts from or for the Coalition, which assignment, pledge, or other conveyance may rank prior in right to any other obligation except taxes or payments in lieu thereof payable to the State of Utah or its political subdivisions. The Coalition may not issue general obligation bonds because it has no power to tax.
- G. To employ or contract with persons or firms for personnel, including professional advisors and consultants, to accomplish its purposes and powers.
- H. To provide a common forum to identify, discuss, study, and bring into focus regional challenges and opportunities and solicit assistance and cooperation to address the same.
- I. To achieve advantages of cooperative action which cannot be achieved individually and to make the most effective use of local leadership and resources.
- J. To serve as a multi-purpose organization to engage in and carry out planning and development of projects and activities determined by the Coalition Board to be applicable to achieve benefits and advantages to the region or significant portions thereof.
- K. To provide an organization to enhance effective communication and coordination among public officials pertaining to regional interests.
- L. To maintain liaison with member counties, governmental entities, and other groups, organizations and stakeholders and to serve as regional spokesman for the region.
- M. To take such other actions, engage in such other transactions and do all other things as may be necessary, convenient or appropriate to

accomplish its purposes or carry out any of its powers and perform such other functions as may be deemed by its Board to be appropriate.

- N. The Coalition does not have the power to impose or levy a tax.
- O. The Coalition does not have the power to incur any indebtedness for or on behalf of any member county. However, a member county may elect by written agreement approved by legislative action of such member county to provide security for obligations of the Coalition, or to share revenues with the Coalition or with another Member county(s), as provided in the Act.
- P. To secure funding, including loans and grants for projects and activities.

8. The Legislative Body and the governing body of each party to the Agreement agree to cooperate to ensure that the Agreement is executed and carried out as required by law, including the creation, submission, or recording of any filings, notices, plats, agreements, or other documents required under the Act or the Agreement to be so created, submitted, or created to carry out the terms and purposes of the Agreement, including the addition of Sevier County to the Coalition.

9. The Legislative Body hereby authorizes its Chair to sign the Agreement and its County Clerk to attest to such signature and to apply the seal to such Agreement, and further directs the County attorney to review the Agreement consistent with Section 202.5(3) of the Act.

10. The Legislative Body hereby acknowledges that pursuant to Section 211 of the Act, the County may appropriate funds, sell or give tangible or intangible property to, and provide personnel or services to the Coalition, as may be determined by future action of the Legislative Body.

11. The Legislative Body hereby acknowledges that pursuant to Section 212 of the Act, the Coalition may create, construct, or otherwise acquire facilities or improvements to render services or provide benefits in excess of those required to meet the needs or requirements of the member counties that are parties to the Agreement.

12. The Legislative Body hereby acknowledges that pursuant to Section 214 of the Act, the County may convey property to or acquire property from any other public agency for consideration as may be agreed upon.

13. The Legislative Body hereby acknowledges that pursuant to Section 215 of the Act, the County may, at the discretion of the Legislative Body, share its tax and other revenues with other counties, cities, towns, or local political subdivisions, the state, or a federal government agency pursuant to a future interlocal agreement that may be entered into, subject to Section 202.5 of the Act.

14. Pursuant to the Act, the Legislative Body directs the County Clerk, along with the County Clerks in the other participating counties, to cause a notice of interlocal agreement to the published (1) one time in the following newspapers: Deseret News, Mountain Press, San Juan Record, Sun Advocate, Uintah Basin Standard, and the Vernal Express, which are newspapers of general circulation in the Coalition created by the Agreement and which are designated by the Legislative Body as the official newspapers pursuant to the Act, and (2) notice of the interlocal agreement is posted on the Utah Public Notice Website. The County Clerk shall also cause a copy of this Resolution (together with all exhibits hereto) to be kept on file in the County's principal offices for public examination during the regular business hours of the County until at least 30 days from and after the last date of publication thereof. The Legislative Body directs its officers and staff to cause to be published and posted a Notice of Interlocal Agreement to be issued in substantially the form attached hereto.

15. The Legislative Body further directs the County Clerk to also complete the record of proceedings attached hereto.

16. All resolutions or parts thereof in conflict herewith are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby repealed and this Resolution shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its approval and adoption.







Pursuant to the Act, the Legislative Body directs the County Clerk, along with the County Clerks in the other participating counties, to cause a notice of interlocal agreement to the published (1) one time in the following newspapers: Deseret News, Moab Times, Mountain Press, San Juan Record, Sun Advocate, Uintah Basin Standard, and the Vernal Express, which are newspapers of general circulation in the Coalition created by the Agreement and which are designated by the Legislative Body as the official newspapers pursuant to the Act, and (2) notice of the interlocal agreement is posted on the Utah Public Notice Website. The County Clerk shall also cause a copy of this Resolution (together with all exhibits hereto) to be kept on file in the County's principal offices for public examination during the regular business hours of the County until at least 30 days from and after the last date of publication thereof. The Legislative Body directs its officers and staff to cause to be published and posted a Notice of Interlocal Agreement to be issued in substantially the form attached hereto.

15. The Legislative Body further directs the County Clerk to also complete the record of proceedings attached hereto.

16. All resolutions or parts thereof in conflict herewith are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby repealed and this Resolution shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its approval and adoption.

AMENDED AND RESTATE^D INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT

ADDENDUM TO AND RESTATEMENT OF
INTERLOCAL COOPERATION AGREEMENT
ESTABLISHING THE
SEVEN COUNTY INFRASTRUCTURE
COALITION

THIS INTERLOCAL COOPERATION AGREEMENT (hereinafter "Agreement") is made and entered into as of December 1, 2016, by and between the signatories to this Agreement. The signatories to this Agreement are "public agencies" as defined in the Utah Interlocal Cooperation Act, and are hereinafter referred to collectively as "Members" or "Parties" and individually as "Member" or "Party." The signatories are as follows:

**Carbon County, Daggett County, Duchesne County, Emery
 County, San Juan County, Sevier County, and Uintah County**

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, pursuant to an Interlocal Cooperation Agreement dated as of July 25, 2014, Carbon, Daggett, Duchesne, Emery, San Juan, and Uintah Counties established the Six County Infrastructure Coalition; and

WHEREAS, Sevier County, Utah has petitioned the Coalition to be admitted as a full member; and

WHEREAS, Section 5.2 of the July 25, 2014 Interlocal Agreement provided for changes in membership pursuant to an addendum, such as this, which addition of Sevier County is desired; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the provisions of the Utah Interlocal Cooperation Act (the "Interlocal Cooperation Act"), Title 11, Chapter 13, Utah Code Annotated (the "Utah Code"), a Utah public agency is authorized to exercise and enjoy jointly any power, privilege, or authority it possesses with any other Utah public agency having such power, privilege, or authority, and jointly with any out-of-state public agency to the extent that the laws governing the out-of-state public agency permit such joint exercise or enjoyment; and

WHEREAS, the Members to this Agreement desire to enter into this Agreement for joint or cooperative planning, development, ownership, management, and operation of projects, infrastructure, improvements, etc. to benefit the Members and the citizens represented by the Members and for other actions to benefit such citizens and Members; and

WHEREAS, the Members to this Agreement believe that their joint and cooperative action to expand a Utah interlocal entity will benefit and enhance the public health, welfare, and prosperity of the region they encompass to address the unique, if not sensitive, geographic challenges and advantages of the region, which include: (1) National Parks and Monuments, (2) deep canyons, (3) wide streams, lakes and other wetlands, (4) steep grades, (5) archeological sections and artifacts, (6) protected wildlife access, (7) impassable mountain ranges, (8) exceptionally high rock walls and other difficult terrain, and (9) other features found within the region; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to legislative action by the respective County legislative bodies of each Member, each Member has taken all actions appropriate and necessary to authorize their respective County's participation in this Agreement to establish and create a new Utah interlocal entity to be known as the **SEVEN COUNTY INFRASTRUCTURE COALITION** (the "Coalition"); and

WHEREAS, the Coalition will be an effective and shared entity for on-going planning, development, management, ownership, operation and administration of infrastructure and activities for the region that will have political, legal and financial viability; and

WHEREAS, by focusing on the opportunities of the region in its entirety, the Coalition will coordinate with the cities, the counties, the state of Utah, the federal government, and other stakeholders in arriving at a comprehensive vision and infrastructure plan designed to benefit all portions of the region; and

WHEREAS, the Coalition can identify and help solve issues related to the geographic features and natural challenges and opportunities of the region, thus enhancing infrastructure and improvement options for a variety of areas benefitting the region; and

WHEREAS, the Coalition will be responsible for planning and building broad-based support for projects and fostering the involvement of federal, state and local officials, representatives of private and non-governmental organizations, and the public in the implementation of projects that the Governing Board of the Coalition undertakes; and

WHEREAS, the Coalition can identify "best practices" with respect to planning, management, operation and oversight of projects for the region and can use that work to assist the Members and private entities with professional and technical expertise and coordinate the exchange of information and expertise between the Members; and

WHEREAS, the Coalition, through the broad participation of the Members and the communities can enjoy increased capability to secure governmental, foundation and other financial support for projects, and other activities benefitting the region; and

WHEREAS, the Coalition can act cooperatively, while preserving an individual jurisdiction's ability to govern its own area, and assist in the formulation and implementation of comprehensive plans for the protection and benefit of the region, as well as plans for the advancement, development, construction, operation, management and oversight of infrastructure, facilities, improvements, works and activities that have not been advanced in the absence of mutual cooperation;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements of the Members contained herein, and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, the Members hereto agree as follows:

ARTICLE 1

Definitions

As used herein, the following terms and words shall have the following meanings:

- 1.1 "Board" or "Governing Board" means the legislative body of the Coalition.
- 1.2 "Bonding" means the issuance of "Bonds" and "Bonds" means bonds, notes, certificates of participation, warrants, or other evidences of indebtedness of the Coalition.
- 1.3 "Coalition" means the **SEVEN COUNTY INFRASTRUCTURE COALITION**, a separate political subdivision of the State of Utah, and a body politic and corporate created by this Interlocal Cooperation Agreement.
- 1.4 "Effective Date" means the date the Parties to this Interlocal Cooperation Agreement intend for this Agreement to become effective, and is the date first written above.
- 1.5 "Legislative Body" means, unless otherwise noted, the board, commission, council or executive body of a Member to whom a particular decision or governmental action is entrusted by law.
- 1.6 "Members" or "Parties" means the signatory counties hereto.
- 1.7 "Operation and Maintenance Expenses" means all expenses reasonably incurred by the Coalition or paid to any other entity pursuant to contract or otherwise, necessary to fulfill the purposes of this Agreement, including cost of audits hereinafter required, payment of insurance premiums, and, generally all expenses, exclusive of depreciation and other non-cash items which under generally accepted accounting practices are properly allocable to operation and maintenance; however, only such expenses as are ordinary and necessary to the proper and efficient operation of the Coalition shall be included.
- 1.8 "Project" means an undertaking by the Coalition to develop, acquire, construct, build, own or control, in whole or in part, an infrastructure, facility, work, improvement, or

enterprise as agreed to be undertaken by the Governing Board of the Coalition.

1.9 “Supplemental Contract” means a contract entered into with respect to a particular project to be undertaken by the Coalition, which sets forth the participation of Members in the Project and their respective obligations and levels of participation.

ARTICLE 2

Purposes

The purposes of the Coalition are as follows:

2.1 Encourage and Promote Multiple Uses of Natural Resources.

The Coalition shall balance environmental value and sensitive natural features with access, use, and development of natural resources, and geographic features, including their economic benefits in accordance with applicable laws, rules and regulations.

2.2 Foster Communication, Coordination and Planning.

The Coalition shall coordinate communication among Members, local communities, state and federal agencies, private and non-governmental organizations, regarding all aspects of planning for projects.

a. INITIAL PLANNING. The initial planning shall including but not be limited to, studies to catalogue existing infrastructure elements with descriptions and mapping, county by county, for the region as a whole. Such initial planning shall include the following:

- i. Catalogue both the existing public and private infrastructure, and also all plans for additional infrastructure that has been planned by public or private entities, with descriptions, mapping, and sizing characteristics.
- ii. The initial planning shall study and catalogue the potential and key corridors that are and can be used in the future to cross the region with infrastructure elements, transport needed components into and out of the region, and connect communities and commodities both within the region and beyond its boundaries where it will benefit all or a portion of the region. Initial planning shall also prioritize capacity constraints and identify critical corridors for

careful protection, coordination, and management, both county by county, and region wide.

- iii. It is anticipated that the initial planning will result in recommendations and determinations with respect to key existing corridors, as well as key potential corridors regarding existing uses with infrastructure and their remaining capacity, as well as potential capacity of possible corridors.
- iv. Forecast levels of cost for adding capacity in key segments or between key sub-regions, should natural corridors be filled to capacity at some point.
- v. Suggest management elements that could be adopted by the Coalition and the individual Member counties to protect or set aside key corridors.
- vi. Identify potential future costs for key infrastructural elements that will be needed, both county by county, and for the region.
- vii. Covered Infrastructure elements shall include:
 - a. Road Transportation
 - i. Major Highways
 - ii. County Arterials
 - iii. Streets
 - iv. Other access roads
 - b. Pipelines
 - i. Oil transmission
 - ii. Natural Gas
 - 1. Transmission
 - 2. Distribution
 - iii. Water
 - 1. Transmission
 - 2. Distribution
 - c. Electrical
 - i. Transmission
 - ii. Distribution
 - d. Water Storage
 - e. Railroad (Freight and Passenger/Tourism)
 - i. Access
 - ii. Lines
 - iii. Ramps
 - iv. Passenger/tourism
 - f. Airports
 - g. Wastewater
 - i. Collection
 - ii. Treatment
 - h. Tourism Infrastructure Assets and recreation

B. ADDITIONAL PLANNING. In addition to the initial planning, the Coalition shall engage in additional planning related to public infrastructure, facilities, and improvements, including planning and management that affect the Members and cooperate with state, federal, local governments, as well as private landowners and organizations to implement the purposes and goals of the Coalition as determined by its Governing Board and the "best management practices" developed by the Board, professional advisors to the Coalition, and staff to the Board. The Coalition shall coordinate with agencies and entities

having jurisdiction over infrastructure, facilities, improvements or activities so that the overall prosperity, welfare, and benefit to the region is considered in the activities of the Agency.

2.3 Promote Resource Utilization and Protection.

The Coalition shall promote and engage in the planning, financing, undertaking, ownership, acquisition, development, construction, management and operation, maintenance, repair, administration and control of projects located within and outside of the region, to utilize and enhance the region's natural resources and features in a responsible and appropriate manner with consideration for environmental concerns. It is expected that when projects are undertaken, that for each project a Supplemental Contract will be entered to define and direct the participation of the Member counties with respect to that project. Projects are hereby authorized pursuant to such Supplemental Contracts. Each project undertaken by the Coalition shall be authorized by a Supplemental Contract, which shall state the purpose or purposes for each Project.

2.4 Identify and Secure Funding for and ownership and control of Projects, Infrastructure, Facilities and Improvements.

The Coalition will actively seek public and private funding to be used to acquire, develop, construct, build, manage, operate and maintain projects within the region and outside of the region, so long as such projects outside of the region provide a benefit to the region. To that end it may partner with public entities, foundations and other private sources to secure grants and funding on the best terms available. The Coalition shall be authorized to bond and otherwise incur debt and to spend Coalition and other private and public funding for projects to benefit the region. In addition to projects and activities to be owned or controlled, in whole or in part, by the Coalition, the Coalition may also provide assistance to local communities to provide for funding for local projects and facilities, as invited or accepted by local communities.

It is hereby determined by each of the Members to this Agreement that the planning and potential projects contemplated herein are desirable or necessary to make the most efficient use of their powers by enabling them to co-operate with each other and with other governmental and private interests pursuant to a form of governmental organization, as a separate interlocal entity, that will accord best with geographic, economic, population and other factors influencing the needs and development of the Members hereto and to provide the benefit of economy of scale, economic development and utilization of natural resources for the overall promotion of the general welfare of the region or significant portions of the region.

ARTICLE 3
Term of the Interlocal Cooperation Agreement

The term of this Agreement shall be, and the political subdivision of the State of Utah created hereunder shall remain in existence for, a period commencing on December 1, 2016, and ending on the last to occur of: (a) fifty years from the commencement; (b) the date that is five

years after the Coalition has fully paid or otherwise discharged all of its indebtedness; (c) the date that is five years after the Coalition has abandoned, decommissioned, or conveyed or transferred all of its interest in any and all projects, infrastructure, and improvements; and (d) the date that is five years after any and all projects, infrastructure, facilities or improvements of the Coalition are no longer useful in providing the service, output, product, or other benefit therefrom, as determined under the agreements related thereto.

ARTICLE 4

Creation of the Coalition

4.1 Independent Legal Entity.

The Members to this Agreement hereby expand the Six County Infrastructure Coalition to add Sevier County, Utah as a member therein, and amend the name of the independent legal entity to be the **SEVEN COUNTY INFRASTRUCTURE COALITION** pursuant to the terms of this Agreement and the Interlocal Cooperation Act, which Coalition shall be a separate political subdivision of the State of Utah, and a body politic and corporate as of the Effective Date hereof.

ARTICLE 5

Parties to this Agreement

5.1 Initial Membership.

Each signatory to this Agreement hereby contracts with the other signatories of this Agreement to amend and expand the membership of the Coalition to accomplish the purposes set forth in Article 2 herein.

5.2 Changes in Membership.

- A. Other public agencies in Utah or outside of Utah may become parties to this Agreement by executing an Addendum hereto. The Addendum shall be reviewed and approved as to form and compatibility with the laws of the State of Utah, by the attorney for the public agencies to be added. Prior to an additional public agency being added as a Member, the Governing Board of the Coalition must approve the addition of such public entity, by a five-sevenths majority vote of the Boardmembers of the Governing Board. And five-sevenths majority of the legislative bodies of the Members must approve the addition of a Member.
- B. Each Party to this Agreement acknowledges and agrees that the withdrawal of any Member from this Agreement shall not, of itself, adversely affect this Agreement nor such party's contractual relationship with the Coalition or with any other Member to this Agreement, or as related to a Project. Withdrawal of a Member does not relieve the Member's obligation to pay any contractual obligation that such Member may enter into with the Coalition, including its share of obligations, indebtedness, and liabilities incurred prior to withdrawal, if any.

C. A Member may withdraw upon six months prior written notice if the Legislative Body of the Member gives written notice of its intent to withdraw from the Coalition and from the Governing Board of the Coalition. Such withdrawal shall take effect on the last day of the current fiscal year. Any such notice shall not affect the obligation of the Member to pay its financial obligations to the Coalition. A withdrawal may not materially adversely affect any project, enterprise, or bonds previously approved by the Governing Board of the Coalition. A Member who withdraws its membership shall have no further obligations to the Coalition and the Coalition shall have no further obligations to the withdrawn Member, except as otherwise expressly provided for in contracts, such as Supplemental Contracts, that may be entered into by the Coalition, or a Member, hereafter. The fact that a public agency has previously withdrawn its membership or its membership has been cancelled shall not prohibit said public agency from rejoining the Coalition.

5.3 Amendments to Agreement

This Agreement may be amended from time to time in any particular which does not jeopardize or adversely affect any existing contracts, notes, bonds or other evidence of indebtedness, provided that such amendment shall not subject any Member hereto to any dues, assessments or liability without its consent thereto. Proper amendments may be adopted by the submission of the proposed amendment to the duly convened Governing Board for approval of the Board by resolution passed by the affirmative vote of at least five-sevenths of the Boardmembers present and voting and thereafter by submission to the Legislative Bodies of the Member counties hereto for written approval thereof by at least five-sevenths of the Members hereto. Such amendment shall become effective upon the execution by the party whose signing accomplishes approval by at least five-sevenths of the Members hereto; and the filing of the amendment with the keeper of public records of each of the Parties hereto, and proper noticing to the Lt. Governor's office. In addition to the foregoing types of amendment, Supplemental Contracts with respect to particular projects may be entered into with the approval of a simple majority of the Boardmembers. For Supplemental Contracts, approval by a simple majority of the Boardmembers of the Coalition Board is sufficient for the Coalition to participate in a Supplemental Contract and no authorization shall be necessary for Supplemental Contracts from the Legislative Bodies of Member counties, except for the participation of the Member counties in the Supplemental Contract.

5.4 Governance of the Coalition

A. The Coalition shall be governed and controlled by a Governing Board, which shall consist of seven individuals, with each Member county selecting one elected public official from within the County to be its representative on the Governing Board. Only someone duly elected to public office within a County may be appointed to represent a member County, during the term of such public official's elected office. Member counties may change their appointed representative at any time. Each Boardmember shall have an equal vote on the Board. Except as otherwise provided herein, all actions of the Board shall require majority approval of the Board, with a minimum of four approving, such that if one or more Boardmembers are absent when

a vote is taken, a minimum of four approving votes are still required to approve any action, except as otherwise provided herein.

- B. The Boardmembers from Member counties shall serve until replaced by the respective Member counties or until no longer qualified to serve by virtue of no longer serving as an elected official.
- C. A vacancy on the Governing Board caused by the resignation, removal, death or incapacity of a Boardmember shall be filled by the appointment of a new Boardmember by such Member county's Legislative Body.
- D. No Boardmember shall be liable to the Members to this Agreement for any monetary damages for breach of any fiduciary duty owed by such Boardmember, except monetary damages arising out of: (a) a breach of the representative Boardmember's duty of loyalty to the Member who appointed him or her; (b) any act or omission not in good faith or which involves intentional misconduct or a knowing violation of law; (c) any transaction from which the Boardmember derived an improper personal benefit; or (d) any other circumstance or occurrence with respect to which, under applicable law as in effect from time to time. The limitation of a Boardmember's liability as provided in this paragraph is impermissible.
- E. No Boardmember nor Member county to this Agreement shall be liable for any agreement, bond, note, indebtedness or other obligation incurred by the Coalition, nor liable for the indebtedness of any other Party to this Agreement, nor liable for any indebtedness or other obligation with respect to any project or activity of the Coalition, unless subsequently and otherwise agreed to by such Member county in writing, such as a Supplemental Contract.
- F. It is anticipated that consistent with the initial planning to be done, that the Coalition will pursue, acquire, develop, construct, build, own or control one or more Projects for infrastructure, facilities, works or improvements. Such Projects will likely extend from one county jurisdiction into another, or otherwise involve an enterprise operated in multiple counties, and some facilities may be located outside the boundaries of all Member counties. For Projects crossing county boundaries, or enterprises operating in multiple counties, or Projects and enterprises outside Member county boundaries, the Governing Board of the Coalition shall have authority to approve the acquisition, development, construction, ownership or control of such Projects by a majority vote of a simple majority of Boardmembers. The Members agree that for Projects extending beyond or outside of a single Member's boundaries, that such Projects shall be brought to the Coalition and the Coalition shall be offered the opportunity to manage and advance such Projects and a Member county will not advance such inter-county Project itself, unless the Coalition declines to manage or advance the Project. Each Project shall be approved pursuant to a Supplemental Contract. For Projects that lie entirely within a single Member county, in addition to a majority vote of a simple majority of Boardmembers, the Coalition must also obtain approval from a majority of the Legislative Body of the subject Member county. In other words, for

Projects that lie entirely within a single Member county, no Project may be pursued or undertaken without the approval of the Legislative Body of such Member county.

- G. Members of the Governing Board may not receive compensation for their service but may have their expenses paid by the Coalition.
- H. The Governing Board shall have a Chair and a Vice-Chair elected by and from their members, whose term shall expire every four years. The chair and vice-chair may serve no more than two successive terms. A Secretary shall be appointed.
- I. The Board representative from a Member county may send an alternate to act in his or her place at a Board meeting, except if the Board representative is the Chair, then that Board representative's responsibilities for conducting the meeting or signing documents shall fall to the Vice-Chair.
- J. The Governing Board shall comply with the Utah Open and Public Meetings Act and its records shall be maintained as required by the Utah Government Records Access Management Act.
- K. The Governing Board shall have an ongoing duty to see that all of its Members are informed regarding all activities of the Coalition and, accordingly, shall cause a copy of all Board proceedings to be delivered in the manner it deems appropriate to Boardmembers for meetings of the Board, including meeting agendas and minutes of past meetings, and to such other persons as the Member may request in writing, including each Member's legal counsel.
- L. The Governing Board may employ an Executive Director and other appropriate staff to carry out the day-to-day operations and administrations of the Coalition. The Governing Board may retain professionals and consultants for various matters as deemed appropriate by the Board.

ARTICLE 6

Powers of the Coalition

6.1 General Powers.

The Coalition shall have all powers granted by the Interlocal Cooperation Act and is hereby authorized to do all acts necessary or helpful to accomplish its stated purposes, including, but not limited to, any or all of the following:

- A. To adopt, amend, and repeal rules, bylaws, and regulations, policies, and procedures for the regulation of its affairs and the conduct of its business, to have an official seal and power to alter that seal at will and the exercise of its powers

and functions under the Interlocal Cooperation Act.

- B. To sue and be sued in its own name.
- C. To make and execute contracts and agreements, and all other instruments necessary or desirable for the convenient performance of its purposes, with other public agencies, the State government, the federal government, foreign powers, private entities, and other parties and entities.
- D. To own, control, acquire, construct, build, develop, operate, maintain, repair, manage, administer, control, or to cause to be constructed, built, developed, operated, maintained, repaired, managed, administered or controlled such Projects and activities as shall be necessary or desirable for the purposes of the Coalition.
- E. To acquire by gift, grant, purchase, eminent domain or otherwise and to lease as lessor or lessee any property (real or personal, tangible or intangible), buildings, projects, infrastructure, facilities, works or improvements, or undivided or fractional interests therein, necessary or convenient for the purposes of the Coalition and sell or otherwise dispose of any such property.
- F. To borrow money or incur indebtedness, liabilities, or obligations; to issue bonds, notes, certificates of participation, warrants, etc. for the purposes for which the Coalition was created; to assign, pledge, or otherwise convey as security for the payment of any such bonds the revenues and receipts from or for the Coalition, which assignment, pledge, or other conveyance may rank prior in right to any other obligation except taxes or payments in lieu thereof payable to the State of Utah or its political subdivisions. The Coalition may not issue general obligation bonds because it has no power to tax.
- G. To employ or contract with persons or firms for personnel, including professional advisors and consultants, to accomplish its purposes and powers.
- H. To provide a common forum to identify, discuss, study, and bring into focus regional challenges and opportunities and solicit assistance and cooperation to address the same.
- I. To achieve advantages of cooperative action which cannot be achieved individually and to make the most effective use of local leadership and resources.
- J. To serve as a multi-purpose organization to engage in and carry out planning and development of projects and activities determined by the Coalition Board to be applicable to achieve benefits and advantages to the region or significant portions thereof.
- K. To provide an organization to enhance effective communication and coordination

among public officials pertaining to regional interests.

- L. To maintain liaison with Members, governmental entities, and other groups, organizations and stakeholders and to serve as regional spokesman for the region.
- M. To take such other actions, engage in such other transactions and do all other things as may be necessary, convenient or appropriate to accomplish its purposes or carry out any of its powers and perform such other functions as may be deemed by its Board to be appropriate.
- N. The Coalition does not have the power to impose or levy a tax.
- O. The Coalition does not have the power to incur any indebtedness for or on behalf of any Member county. However, a Member county may elect by written agreement approved by legislative action of such Member county to provide security for obligations of the Coalition, or to share revenues with the Coalition or with another Member county(s), as provided in the Interlocal Cooperation Act.

6.2 Receive Federal and State Grants and Private Funds.

The Coalition is hereby authorized to act as an agency to receive federal and state grants; other grants; or loans on behalf of itself or the member governments, or funds from private organizations for all planning and development programs and projects which are specifically intended to accomplish the purposes under the Interlocal Cooperation Act and the goals or purposes of the Coalition.

6.3 No Superseding Authority.

The Coalition has no authority to nor does it supplant any powers of individual Members as set forth in the Utah Constitution, state law, county ordinance, or other powers specifically given to them; nor does the Coalition have superseding authority over other government entities and jurisdictions. The Coalition shall not have the authority to require alterations of duly adopted plans or decisions of any agency or jurisdiction.

6.4 Contracts.

- A. The Coalition may contract generally and, as approved by its Governing Board, enter into contracts or agreements with private organizations, foundations, the federal government, states, counties, municipal corporations, and/or any other governmental agency for any purpose necessary or desirable for dealing with affairs of mutual concern, and/or contract for the provision of services with states, counties, cities, private entities, etc., including foreign powers, and to accept all funds resulting therefrom.
- B. The Coalition will, prior to the commencement of construction or development of a project enter into a contract, known as a Supplemental Contract, with the Members, which contract shall set forth the respective contributions of the Members, the percentage of responsibility or benefit from such project for each Member, and how

the assets of such project shall be disbursed among the Members upon termination or dissolution of the project or contract related to such project. The Coalition may also contract with such other public or private entities that may qualify or benefit as participants in a project on such terms as will produce sufficient revenue to meet and pay all operating and maintenance expenses, debt service, and reserve requirements, and all other charges or liens whatsoever payable from the revenues of the project.

- C. Unless otherwise agreed upon by the Members, the excess revenues of a Project, meaning the revenues remaining after the payment of operations and maintenance expenses, and all administrative expenses, and the payment of any and all debt service payments and debt reserves, shall be apportioned such that Member counties in which the Project lies shall receive Seventy (70%) percent of the excess revenues to be apportioned based on the relation of the Project to their respective counties in which the Project lies, and Member counties for a Project that is not within such Member county, shall receive twenty (20%) percent of the excess revenues to be apportioned pro rata between them, and the remaining ten (10%) percent of excess revenues shall reside within and remain as funds of the Coalition for investment in potential future Projects and activities of the Coalition.

6.5 Exercise of Powers.

All powers of the Coalition shall be exercised pursuant to the terms of this Agreement, its bylaws, and any governing laws.

ARTICLE 7 Liabilities and Obligations of Members

7.1 Governmental Immunity.

In entering into this Agreement, the Members do not waive, and are not waiving, any immunity provided to the Members or their officials, employees, or agents by the Governmental Immunity Act of Utah, Title 63G, Chapter 7, Utah Code (the "Immunity Act"), or by other law. Pursuant to the provisions of the Immunity Act, each of the Members acknowledges and agrees that provisions of the Immunity Act shall apply and extend to the Coalition, its representatives, the Boardmembers, the officers and employees of the Coalition and, to the extent permitted by law and authorized by the Board, any personnel supplied to the Coalition by the Members. The Coalition shall indemnify and defend the Boardmembers and the officers and employees of the Coalition and, if authorized by the Board, any personnel supplied to the Coalition by Members, all as provided in the Immunity Act.

7.2 Waiver of Obligations.

This Agreement shall not relieve any Member of any obligation or responsibility imposed upon it by law. However, to the extent of actual and timely performance thereof by the Coalition, such performance may be offered in satisfaction of such obligation or responsibility.

7.3 Obligations Special and Limited.

The obligations entered into by each Member pursuant to this Agreement are special limited obligations of each such Member, and nothing herein shall be construed or give rise to a general obligation or liability of any Member or a charge against its general credit or taxing powers. Members may enter into agreements to pledge revenues to secure the bonds issued by the Coalition to finance Projects undertaken by the Coalition. Such pledges shall constitute ongoing financial obligations of the pledging Members only to the extent expressly authorized by the Legislative Body of each Member and as provided for in the contract authorizing the issuance of the bonds and pledging the revenues of the pledging member.

7.4 Bonding.

Any Bonds issued or incurred by the Coalition shall not constitute a debt of any individual Member, but shall be secured only in the manner set forth herein and pursuant to the terms of the separate agreement entered into by the Coalition authorizing the issuance of the Bonds. There shall be no additional liability or obligation of a Member except as provided by additional agreements such Member may agree upon.

7.5 Indemnification.

The Coalition shall defend, indemnify, save harmless, and exempt the Members, their officers, agents, and employees from and against all claims, suits, legal proceedings, demands, damages, costs, expenses, and attorneys' fees incident to any willful or negligent acts or omissions by the Coalition, its officers, agents, or employees. The Governing Board shall, prior to the commencement of construction of any Project undertaken by the Coalition provide for risk and liability coverage and payment and performance bonds in such amounts as the Coalition deems necessary to insure against risks arising from the undertaking the Project.

ARTICLE 8

Funding, Budget, Accounts and Financial Records

8.1 Funding; Investment and Disbursement of Funds.

Funding may include fees and contributions from other agencies, including Federal agencies, State agencies, local governments, grants from private individuals or organizations, developers, and businesses. Funds may also be raised from Projects and enterprises undertaken by the Coalition. The Governing Board shall approve guidelines for the expenditure of any and all funds and shall also provide for the investment and disbursement of funds and their periodic review.

8.2 Annual Budget.

The Governing Board shall annually adopt an operating budget pursuant to the provisions of this Agreement, and applicable law. The annual budget shall be approved by the Governing Board not less than twenty days prior to the end of the fiscal year. The fiscal year shall begin on

January 1st and end on December 31st.

8.3 Funds and Accounts.

The Executive Director (or Board Chair if no Executive Director is appointed) shall establish and maintain such funds and accounts as may be required by governmental accounting practices and the State's fiscal procedures act. Financial records of the Coalition shall be open to inspection at all reasonable times by Members' representatives and shall be public records if so required by Utah State law.

8.4 Certified Annual Audit.

The Governing Board shall provide for a certified annual audit of the accounts and records of the Coalition, which audit shall conform to generally accepted auditing standards. Such annual audit shall be open for inspection by each Member representative at all reasonable times.

8.5 Executive Director's Responsibility for Funds.

The Executive Director shall have custody of and shall disburse the Coalition's funds. The Executive Director shall have the authority to delegate the signatory function to such persons as are authorized by the Governing Board.

8.6 Fidelity Bonds.

Unless otherwise provided for by the Governing Board, a fidelity and/or treasurer's bond may be required of all officers, agents, and personnel authorized to disburse funds of the Coalition. The cost of such bond shall be paid by the Coalition.

8.7 Financial Records.

The Executive Director shall keep and maintain, or cause to be kept and maintained, adequate and correct financial records, including accounts of its assets, liabilities, receipts, and disbursements, and shall have such other duties as are provided for in the bylaws.

8.8 Selling of Services.

The Executive Director may authorize the sale of the Coalition's services, output or products to other entities upon approval of the Board.

ARTICLE 9

Dissolution of the Coalition

9.1 Outstanding Indebtedness.

So long as there are any outstanding Bonds or other indebtedness of the Coalition, the

Coalition shall remain a separate legal entity with all of the powers and duties set forth in this Agreement and all of the responsibilities, covenants, and obligations required in any Bond documents.

9.2 Dissolution of the Coalition by Vote.

If there are no outstanding Bonds or other indebtedness that cannot be covered by current funds, the Coalition may be dissolved upon approval of five-sevenths (5 of 7) of the Members at any time.

9.3 Powers of Governing Board Upon Dissolution.

The Governing Board is vested with all powers necessary for the purpose of winding up and dissolving the business affairs of the Coalition consistent with and subject to the limits of this Agreement.

9.4 Division of Assets.

Upon dissolution and after payment in full of all outstanding Bonds and other Coalition obligations, the Governing Board shall equitably disburse the assets of the Coalition to the then current Members based on the value of assets residing within each Member or for assets outside the Coalition based on the benefit to respective Members. After deducting costs, any cash or other assets jointly shared shall be disbursed, or interests deeded, pro rata.

**ARTICLE 10
Filing of this Interlocal Cooperation Agreement**

A copy of this Interlocal Cooperation Agreement shall be placed on file in the office of the Official Record Keeper of each public agency that is a Member hereto and shall remain on file for public inspection during the term of this Agreement.

**ARTICLE 11
Miscellaneous Provisions**

11.1 Confidentiality.

The Governing Board shall take such steps as they deem necessary to protect and keep confidential appropriate information received or kept by it in accordance with the Government Records Access and Management Act. The Members shall protect and keep confidential information kept or received by the Coalition during the term of this Agreement and after the termination of their membership in the Coalition pursuant to the bylaws or other policies adopted by the Board and consistent with law. Nothing in this section shall be construed to allow the Board, the Officers or employees from withholding information from any Coalition Member, so long as the Member agrees to maintain the confidentiality of such information.

11.2 Status of Members' Employees.

When members of the Governing Board and the employees and agents of the Coalition

are acting on behalf of the Coalition within the scope of their authority, office or employment, they shall be considered to be acting on behalf of their respective public agency employer within the meaning of the Governmental Immunity Act and Section 63G-7-101, et seq., and thus, shall be entitled to indemnification and representation so long as they meet the requirements of said Act.

11.3 Prohibition Against Assignment.

No Member may assign any right, claim, or interest it may have under this Agreement; and no creditor, assignee, or third party beneficiary of any Member shall have any right, claim, or title to any asset of the Coalition.

11.4 Severability Clause.

In the event that any article, provision, clause, or other part of this Agreement should be held invalid or unenforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction, such invalidity or unenforceability will not affect the validity or enforceability with respect to other articles, clauses, applications, or occurrences, and this Agreement is expressly declared to be severable.

11.5 Complete Agreement.

The foregoing constitutes the full and complete Agreement of the parties. There are no oral understandings or agreements not set forth in writing herein.

11.6 Governing Law.

This Agreement shall be governed according to the laws of the State of Utah.

11.7 Binding Effect.

This Agreement shall bind the parties, their successors and assigns.

11.8 Captions.

The captions to the various Sections of this Agreement are for convenience and ease of reference only and do not define, limit, augment, or describe the scope, content, or intent of this Agreement or any part or parts of this Agreement.

11.9 Time.

Time is of the essence of each term, provision, and covenant of this Agreement.

11.10 Counterparts.

This Agreement may be executed in counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, but all of which shall constitute one and the same instrument.

11.11 Breach of Agreement.

This Agreement may be executed in counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, but all of which shall constitute one and the same instrument.

11.11 Breach of Agreement.

The failure of a Member to substantially comply with the material terms and conditions of this Agreement shall constitute a breach of this Agreement. A Member shall have thirty (30) days after receipt of written notice to correct the conditions specified in the notice, or if the corrections cannot be made within the thirty (30) day period, within a reasonable time if corrective action is commenced within ten (10) days after receipt of the notice. After notice, if corrective action is not taken, the Board may take appropriate action including revocation of the breaching party's membership.









Re: Eligibility for Participation of a Newly Created Entity in the Utah State Retirement Systems

Dear Seven County Infrastructure Coalition:

When a governmental entity is being incorporated or created, Utah law requires the Utah State Retirement Office (“Office” or “URS”) to provide a letter to that entity identifying the potential provisions under Utah Code Title 49, Utah State Retirement and Insurance Benefit Act (“Retirement Act”), with which it shall comply. *See Utah Code Ann. § 67-1a-6.5(3)(d).* Such a letter has been previously sent to the Six County Infrastructure Coalition. This letter serves as the official notice of eligibility for participation in the Utah State Retirement Systems for the Seven County Infrastructure Coalition, a renamed and reorganized interlocal entity, previously known as the Six County Infrastructure Coalition.

The Office has previously determined that the Six County Infrastructure Coalition is an “employer” under the Retirement Act as a political subdivision of the state by virtue of its status as a interlocal entity created under Utah Code Title 11. Accordingly, the Six County Infrastructure Coalition, now known as the Seven County Infrastructure Coalition, must comply with the participation requirements of the Retirement Act.

The Six County Infrastructure Coalition is already participating with the Office and providing retirement benefits to its only employee. As such, it is subject to all provisions applicable to participating employers found in the Retirement Act. The same provisions apply to the Seven County Infrastructure Coalition, now and throughout the future. **Under the Act, once an employer elects to participate with URS, it may not withdraw from participation.**

Since the Six County Infrastructure Coalition has already begun participation with URS, its public employees are and will be covered under either the Tier I or Tier II public employee retirement systems, as described in the Retirement Act. If the Seven County Infrastructure Coalition employs public safety or firefighter service employees, those employees will be covered under the separate Tier I or Tier II systems for public safety and/or firefighter service employees described in the Retirement Act.

In addition, Participating Employers of URS are required by section 49-11-606 to “cover all

employees eligible for service credit under this title." As such, should the Seven County Infrastructure Coalition hire any additional employees in the future, it will be required to cover all eligible employees, subject to a few statutory exceptions, pursuant to the eligibility rules found in the Retirement Act.

Please note that participating employers are required to "inform themselves of their rights and obligations" under the Retirement Act and should become familiar with all provisions of the Retirement Act. Statutory obligations include, among other things, certain reporting and certification requirements on behalf of employees, as well as the payment of contributions. The Retirement Office offers many opportunities and resources for education, and participating employers are invited and encouraged to take full opportunity of these resources.

Additionally, please be aware that should the Seven County Infrastructure Coalition fail to cover any of its eligible employees, or otherwise fail to comply with its statutory obligations, its employees and/or the Office may have a claim against it under the Retirement Act, which the Office is required to enforce. Under the Retirement Act, such a claim may include all past employer contributions, interest, and in some cases, penalties. See Utah Code Ann. § 49-11-601(3).

This Statement of Work (“SOW”) is entered into as of _____, 20 (the “SOW Effective Date”) under and pursuant to the Software as a Service Agreement dated _____ (the “Agreement”) between Medici Land Governance (“MLG”) and San Juan County, Utah (“Customer” or “County”).

This SOW is incorporated into and made a part of the Agreement. Capitalized terms used but not defined in this SOW have the meanings given in the Agreement.

Anticipated Start Date: _____

1. SERVICES DESCRIPTION

DocAI is Medici’s hosted, AI-enabled document processing and indexing platform. It ingests electronic and scanned documents, applies advanced OCR and machine-learning models to extract and normalize key data fields, and supports configurable business rules for recordability checks, indexing, fee calculation, redaction, and workflow routing. DocAI exposes this information through secure integrations and an internal search and viewing interface so authorized County staff can efficiently review, correct, approve, and research records.

1.1 Overview

Under this SOW, MLG will configure and operate DocAI as an **integrated component** of the County’s recording, historical records, and court-record workflows, including integration with:

- The County’s system of record for land (currently COINS) (the “System of Record” or “SOR”); and
- The County’s **e-recording systems** (the “e-Recorders”).

The Services will support, for eligible transactions and records:

- Processing of **new land recordings** received electronically and/or over the counter;
- Support for **historical records** that have been, or will be, processed by DocAI and/or loaded into the SOR, including making such historical records searchable and viewable through the Search Portal and integrated workflows described herein;
- **Recordability checks, indexing, fee calculation, and redactions** for new recordings;
- **Auto-rejection** of certain resubmitted documents where required corrections have not been made;
- Use of an internal Search Portal by authorized County personnel to search and view both new and historical records, to the extent such records have been processed or loaded; and

- Use of a public-facing Search Portal for citizens and other permitted users to research, view, download and/or purchase recorded property records (the "Public Search Portal"), as described in Section 1.6;

Unless otherwise agreed, any separate agreements or SOWs governing historical indexing projects remain in effect, and this SOW is intended to interoperate with and support those historical records once they are ingested into DocAI and/or the SOR.

1.2 Integrated New Recording Workflow (Property Records)

MLG will configure DocAI and related integrations so that new property record submissions flow through the following process:

1. Intake from e-Recorders and Other Sources

- New land record instruments (and associated electronic data) received via the County's e-Recorders and/or other agreed intake systems will be transmitted to DocAI through a mutually agreed interface.
- DocAI will ingest document images and available metadata and create a transaction record for each submission.

2. Recordability Checks

- DocAI will apply **County-defined recordability rules** to each submission, which may include, without limitation:
 - Required fields, signatures, acknowledgments, and notary elements;
 - Required attachments and pages;
 - Formatting and page requirements;
 - Document-type-specific and jurisdiction-specific criteria.

- DocAI will flag exceptions and present them to County staff for review and possible override within the integrated workflow.

3. Auto-Rejection of Uncorrected Resubmissions

- The County will define, and MLG will configure, rules to identify **resubmitted documents** that were previously returned for correction and then resubmitted **without the required corrections having been made**.
- Where DocAI detects that a resubmission still fails the same recordability rule(s) (for example, missing signature, missing required page, incorrect fees, or other County-defined conditions):
 - DocAI may **automatically reject** the resubmission in accordance with the County's rules; and
 - DocAI will record the rejection reason(s) and return that information to the e-Recorder or other intake channel so the submitter may be notified under the County's standard process.
- The County may specify conditions where auto-rejection should **not** occur (e.g., specific document types or scenarios that always require human review).
- The County retains ultimate authority to override, modify, or disable auto-rejection rules.

4. Indexing

- DocAI will perform AI/OCR extraction and indexing for each eligible new recording, including without limitation:
 - Party and name information (e.g., grantor, grantee, other listed parties);
 - Legal descriptions;
 - Block/ Lot;
 - Addresses;
 - Date stamps;
 - Notary information (e.g., notary name, commission, expiry where present)
- Index data will be returned to or synchronized with the SOR through a mutually agreed integration.

5. Fee Calculation

- DocAI will apply **County-provided fee schedules and rules** to calculate recording fees, surcharges, and other applicable charges for each new recording.
- Calculated fees will be surfaced to the e-Recording and/or cashiering environment as mutually agreed (e.g., via API or message exchange).
- MLG will not act as a payment processor and will not hold or transmit funds on behalf of the County.

6. Redactions

- DocAI will apply **County-defined redaction rules** (for example, for social security numbers, account numbers, contact information, or other protected data elements) to documents as part of the processing pipeline.
- Redacted versions and, where appropriate, unredacted originals will be handled and stored in accordance with County policy and the Agreement.

7. Posting to System of Record

- After County staff confirm recordability, fees, indexing, redactions, and any auto-rejection outcomes, DocAI will transmit the finalized record and index data to the SOR _____ COINS _____ via the agreed integration.

1.3 Court Records Processing Integration

1.4 Historical Records Support

In addition to new recordings and court filings, the Services under this SOW will support **historical records** as follows:

1. Historical Records Availability

- Historical records that have been processed by DocAI under this or any other agreement, or that have been otherwise loaded into the SOR, may be made available in the Search Portal and integrated workflows, subject to County configuration and access controls.

2. Search and Research

- Authorized County personnel will be able to search, review and view historical records alongside new recordings, to the extent such records have been indexed and/or made available in the SOR and Search Portal.

1.5 Rules Configuration and County Recording Rules

1. Rule Definition by County or State Statute

- The County will provide MLG with all **business rules, criteria, fee schedules, redaction policies, auto-rejection criteria, and other parameters** necessary for DocAI to perform:
 - Recordability checks;
 - Auto-rejection of uncorrected resubmissions;
 - Indexing conventions;
 - Fee calculations;
 - Redactions; and
 - Any other automated decisioning or workflow steps.

2. Configuration by MLG

- MLG will configure DocAI to implement these rules and will document the implemented logic for County review.

- The County will review, test, and approve the configured rules (including auto-rejection behavior) before production use.

3. Ultimate Responsibility

- The County retains ultimate responsibility for the **content, correctness, and legal sufficiency** of all rules, policies, and configurations and for determining when automated outputs require human review or override.
- MLG will not provide legal advice and is not responsible for determining the legal recordability or legal sufficiency of any instrument or filing.

4. Rule Changes

- The County may request updates to rules (for example, fee changes, new recordability criteria, statutory changes, redaction changes, or changes to auto-rejection logic), and MLG will implement such changes in a mutually agreed time frame.
- Materially complex or large-scale rule changes may require a change order if they exceed the implementation effort contemplated by this SOW.

1.6 Search Portal (Internal and Public Use)

The Smart Search Portal is Medici's secure, web-based search and viewing application for County records. It allows authorized staff to search across both new and historical records using indexed fields (such as names, legal descriptions, dates, document types) as well as full-text search of OCR'd content, and then quickly open the underlying document image and key extracted data. The portal supports filters, result refinement, and role-based access so staff can efficiently research, verify, and respond to internal and public inquiries while maintaining appropriate control over sensitive information.

1. Internal Search Portal

- MLG will provide a secure, web-based **Search Portal** for internal use by authorized County personnel.
- The Search Portal will, as configured and agreed by the parties, enable users to:
 - Search across records using indexed fields (e.g., names, legal descriptions, addresses, dates, document types, etc.);
 - Perform full-text search of AI/OCR content, where available;
 - View document images and associated extracted fields for internal research and inquiry.
- To the extent historical records have been processed or loaded into the SOR and Search Portal, they may be searched and viewed alongside new recordings and court records, subject to County-defined access controls.
- User account management and internal access control (e.g., which County users may access which record sets) will be the responsibility of the County, while technical operation and hosting of the Search Portal will be the responsibility of MLG, subject to the Agreement.

2. Public-Facing Search Portal

- MLG will provide a public-facing, web-based Search Portal (the "Public Search Portal") that enables members of the public to search recorded property records and, where permitted, view, download, and purchase copies, subject to County-approved redaction policies, access controls, and applicable law.

MLG provides the public advanced search tools to easily research, and download/purchase recorded property records.

Platform Fee Charged to the Public. In addition to the County's existing "per page" copy fees, a portal service fee charged to the public at the time of payment is calculated as follows:

- **Up to 10 pages purchased: \$2.00 flat fee**
- **Beyond 10 pages: 4.99% of “per page” rate** (calculated before taxes and payment processing fees)

2. IMPLEMENTATION, INTEGRATION, AND ACCEPTANCE

2.1 Technical Integration

MLG will perform commercially reasonable implementation and integration work necessary to:

- Integrate DocAI with the County’s e-Recorder(s) and related intake systems;
- Integrate DocAI with the SOR for land, historical, and court records;
- Configure the internal Search Portal to surface records (including historical records, where applicable) processed or loaded under this SOW, as appropriate.

Specific technical interfaces, data formats, authentication methods, and security mechanisms will be documented in a **Technical Integration Specification** mutually agreed by the parties and attached to or referenced by this SOW.

2.2 Testing and Acceptance

1. Pilot / Testing Phase

- The parties will conduct integration and user-acceptance testing, including test transactions for:
 - New land recordings;
 - Recordability logic and auto-rejection;
 - Fee calculations;
 - Redactions;
 - Data synchronization with the SOR; and
 - Search Portal behavior for new and, as applicable, historical records.

2. Acceptance Criteria

- The integrated Services under this SOW will be deemed accepted upon the earlier of:
 - (a) The County’s use of the integrated DocAI workflows in production for new recordings or court records; or
 - (b) Ten (10) business days after MLG notifies the County that:
 - The agreed test cases have been successfully processed; and
 - The integration endpoints with the e-Recorders, SOR, and court systems (as applicable) are operational.
- Identified material issues will be addressed by MLG in a commercially reasonable manner, and acceptance will not be unreasonably withheld or delayed.

2.3 Implementation, Onboarding, and Training

MLG will provide implementation, onboarding, and training services to support the County's successful adoption of DocAI, the integrated workflows described in this SOW, and the Smart Search Portal (and, if enabled, Property Wallet). These services are intended to ensure that both technical integrations and day-to-day user workflows are well understood and aligned with County business rules.

Project Kickoff and Planning

- Conduct a project kickoff meeting to review scope, roles, timelines, and communication protocols.
- Confirm technical points of contact, project managers, and key subject-matter experts from both MLG and the County.
- Review the County's high-level recording, historical records, and court processing workflows to finalize the implementation approach.

Configuration and Rule Validation Sessions

- Work with designated County staff to walk through:
 - Recordability rules and auto-rejection criteria;
 - Fee schedules and fee-calculation logic;
 - Redaction rules;
 - Indexing conventions (including any special formatting or cross-indexing requirements); and
- Configure DocAI using these rules and conduct joint review sessions so County staff can validate that system behavior matches the County's expectations prior to production use.

User Onboarding and Training

MLG will provide structured training for County personnel responsible for using DocAI, the integrated workflows, and the Smart Search Portal, which will include:

- **DocAI Workflow Training**
 - Navigating the DocAI interface (as applicable);
 - Reviewing and resolving recordability flags and exceptions;
 - Understanding and managing auto-rejection of uncorrected resubmissions;
 - Reviewing and correcting extracted index fields;
 - Verifying fee calculations;
 - Reviewing and confirming redactions; and
 - Approving transactions for posting to the SOR.
- **Smart Search Portal Training**
 - Searching across new and historical records using indexed fields and full-text search;
 - Filtering, sorting, and refining search results;
 - Opening and reviewing document images and extracted data; and
 - Understanding role-based access and internal use expectations.

Training Schedule

- MLG will provide up to **one (1) training session per week, of approximately one (1) hour in duration, for a period of three (4) to six (8) weeks**, as mutually scheduled with the County.
- Training sessions may be conducted remotely (e.g., via web conference).
- The parties may mutually agree in writing to adjust the number, duration, or format of training sessions based on project needs, provided such adjustments do not materially increase the overall level of effort without a corresponding change order.

Documentation and Handover

- Summarize key configuration decisions (e.g., rule sets, auto-rejection conditions, fee logic, and redaction policies) in a form that can be used by County staff for internal training and future reference.

2.4 Public Search Portal

MLG will configure and deploy the Public Search Portal described in Section 1.6, including payment processing, role-based administration for County-designated users, and reporting. Public access configuration (including what records are available, redaction rules, and any public-facing messaging) will be jointly reviewed and approved by the County prior to launch.

2.5 Revenue Sharing Model

Customer retains the exclusive right to sell access to its public records in accordance with its existing fee schedule. MLG may assist in enabling new forms of access, improved user experiences, or new distribution channels, provided that all such access is jointly approved by Customer.

Copies Sales from the Public Search Portal (Customer Fee Schedule)

Customer Portion: 80%

MLG Portion: 20%

Advanced Search Access / Platform Fees (MLG Portal Service Fee)

Customer Portion: 20%

Nothing herein is intended to guarantee the revenue stated herein, and the revenue stated herein is not a commitment or a minimum revenue. This advanced search access sharing shall apply only to **new** revenue streams enabled by MLG's platform enhancements.

2.6 Revenue Share Terms

Each year shall be calculated as a calendar year. Any partial year will be prorated. MLG shall maintain all payment processing systems and shall be entitled to determine pricing for portal services, provided that the Customer shall be able to provide recommendations and input to MLG so that MLG may make informed decisions. Revenue calculations shall be made monthly and payments distributed quarterly. MLG shall provide detailed revenue reports monthly to Customer. MLG shall perform an annual reconciliation within 90 days of the end of the initial contract term and each renewal term. All revenue share calculations exclude taxes and fees. Any pricing changes or feature launches must be communicated to and approved by the Customer in advance. The revenue share structure may be revisited annually.

3. PRICING AND PAYMENT TERMS

3.1 Fees

For the Services provided under this SOW, the County shall pay the following fees:

1. Per-Page Fee for New Recordings

- The County will pay **\$0.15 (fifteen cents) per page** for pages processed as part of **new recordings** through the integrated DocAI workflow described in this SOW.
- The County will pay **\$0.10 (ten cents) per page** for pages processed as part of historical recordings through the DocAI workflow described in this SOW.
- A "processed page" is any page of a recording that is successfully ingested into the DocAI pipeline and made available for recordability checks, indexing, fee calculation, redaction, and/or posting to the SOR, regardless of whether the document is ultimately accepted or rejected for recording.

2. Annual Platform Fee

- The County will pay an annual platform fee of \$5,000 (five thousand dollars), which covers:
 - Ongoing access to and use of the integrated DocAI environment described herein;
 - Operation and hosting of the internal Search Portal and the Public Search Portal under this SOW;
 - Maintenance of integrations with the SOR, e-Recorders, and court systems as configured under this SOW; and
 - Routine configuration updates (excluding major change orders) necessary to keep the Services functioning in line with County-provided rules.

3. Additional Services and Features

- Any additional services not expressly covered by the per-page fee and annual platform fee (for example, major new integrations, large-scale new historical processing projects, or activation of Property Wallet if subject to separate pricing) will be subject to mutually agreed fees set forth in a written amendment, change order, or pricing addendum.

4. Optional Storage and Backup

At the County's option, MLG can provide hosted storage and backup for images and associated data processed under this SOW ("Hosted Storage"). If the County elects to use Hosted Storage, the annual subscription will include all DocAI processing, storage, and backup costs for County data, subject to the following:

Included Storage

- Up to **800 GB** of Hosted Storage for images and associated data processed under this SOW is included in the yearly subscription at no additional charge beyond the base annual fee.

Additional Storage

- If the County's total Hosted Storage usage exceeds 800 GB, each additional **100 GB (or any portion thereof)** of storage will add **\$25.00** to the yearly subscription fee.

Measurement of Storage

- Storage usage will be measured based on the total volume of data stored by MLG for the County under this SOW (including production data and associated backups), as reasonably determined by MLG's system logs and reporting.

County-Managed Storage (If Hosted Storage Not Used)

- Hosted Storage is **optional**. If the County elects not to use Hosted Storage, the County will be responsible for arranging and managing its own storage and backup for images and data exported from DocAI in accordance with this SOW.

3.2 Invoicing and Payment

- **Per-Page Fees:** Unless otherwise agreed in writing, MLG will invoice monthly in arrears for per-page fees based on the number of new-recording pages processed during the prior month, as measured by DocAI and integration logs.
- **Annual Platform Fee:** The annual platform fee of \$5,000 will be invoiced once per contract year, in advance of each year of service (with the first year invoiced on or shortly after the SOW Effective Date or Anticipated Start Date, as agreed). If the first year is shorter than twelve (12) months, the annual platform fee may be prorated by mutual agreement.
- Payment terms will follow those set forth in the Agreement.

4. COUNTY RESPONSIBILITIES

In addition to any responsibilities described in the Agreement, the County shall:

1. Provide and maintain documentation of all **recordability rules, fee schedules, redaction policies, auto-rejection criteria, and other business rules** used by DocAI under this SOW.
2. Provide access to technical personnel and systems necessary for integration with e-Recorders, the SOR, and court systems.
3. Review and approve configuration and rule implementations (including auto-rejection logic) prior to production use.
4. Ensure that appropriate **human review and oversight** are in place, particularly for exceptions, overrides, redactions, and any outputs used in legally significant determinations.
5. Manage internal user accounts, roles, and access permissions for the integrated workflows, Search Portal, and, if enabled, Property Wallet administration.
6. If Property Wallet is enabled, handle property-owner communications and enrollment policies, and coordinate with MLG on any citizen-facing messaging that references the County.

5. TERM

- The Services under this SOW will commence on or after the **Anticipated Start Date**, subject to completion of required integrations and configuration.
- The term of this SOW will be **co-terminous with the Agreement**, unless otherwise specified herein or terminated earlier in accordance with the Agreement.

RECOMMENDATION: Approval

SUMMARY

San Juan County Credit Card Policy has been reviewed by the heads of the departments, it has been updated and is needing to be approved by the Commissioners, so that San Juan County can adopt the changes.



CREDIT CARD USE POLICY

All transactions charged to San Juan County-issued credit cards shall be made in compliance with adopted San Juan County policies and procedures. County-issued credit cards shall not be used to avoid or bypass adopted purchasing or procurement rules. Employees should exercise good judgement and act responsibly when using a County-issued Credit Card. Credit cards are to be used only by authorized San Juan County employees.

Credit cards should be used as often as possible when making approved purchases. Employees are discouraged from using personal funds to pay for County expenses. The County will only reimburse employees who use personal funds to pay for legitimate County expenses. The employee's Department Head must provide written approval of the purchase.

1. Requesting a Credit Card: Department Head must request the Credit Card for the employee. Before a card is issued an employee must sign the Credit Card San Juan County Credit Card Authorization Form.
 - a. Distribution of Credit Cards should be limited to those employees who have a compelling business need. Credit Cards should not be provided for employees and officers who have only an occasional or infrequent use. The sharing of Credit Cards is discouraged as it further weakens oversight.
2. Responsibility for Credit cards:
 - a. Department Heads are ultimately accountable for use of any County-issued credit cards assigned to their department.
3. Custody of Credit Card:
 - a. The Credit Card is the property of San Juan County and must be kept secure at all times.
 - b. If a Credit Card is lost or stolen, the employee shall immediately notify the County Administrator to cancel the Credit Card, then shall notify their Department head.
4. Sales tax: As a government agency, San Juan County is exempt from paying Utah state sales tax on everything except hotel reservations.
 - a. When a Utah payment is made using a County-issued credit card sales, tax shall not be included. The exemption may not apply to purchases made with vendors in other states.
 - b. In those cases where sales tax is unavoidable, approval of the payment of the tax must be obtained from the County Clerk/Auditor.
5. Limits and Restrictions:

- a. Each County-issued credit card is assigned a monthly, daily, and per-transaction limit as determined by San Juan County Administrator.
- b. A single purchase cannot be split into multiple transactions to bypass card limits.
- c. If authorized limits become insufficient to meet Department needs, an increase may be requested by the Department head.
- d. If a purchase exceeds the existing limit, follow the Authorization Requirements for Purchases (Section H of the Purchasing Policy) with a Purchase Order (Exhibit B).
- e. County-issued credit cards have been set up to block some transactions based on supplier's merchant category code.

- i. If the Department Head believes a transaction should not have been declined, they can request that the category is added to the cardholder's profile.

6. Card Payments:

- a. Purchases made over \$1,000 must have an approved purchase order prior to purchase being made.

7. Credit Card Reconciliation:

- a. All Credit Card users will submit the San Juan Credit Card Reconciliation Form

 - iv. The County-issued credit card will be suspended first thing the business day following the due date if the Clerk/Auditor Office did not receive it before or prior to the due date.

 - iii. Quantity purchased
 - iv. Unit cost
 - v. Description of product
 - vi. Total
- c. Purchase of food
 - i. What was the reason behind the purchase (i.e., Staff meeting, Public Hearing, training, etc.)?
 - ii. Who attended the meeting (names of all in attendance)?
 - iii. Note: Tips are not work expenses.
- d. If no itemized receipt is submitted, a missing receipt form, "Verification of Lost Receipt or Inadvertent Use of County Credit Card," must be completed by the cardholder and signed by both cardholder and Department Head. Excessive use

of the missing receipt form (the fourth of a calendar year) will result in loss of credit card privileges and/or reimbursement by the cardholder.

8. Unauthorized Uses:

- a. Any employee found using a County-issued credit card for an unauthorized use may be subject to the employment disciplinary process, in accordance with the San Juan County Personnel Policy. The following are examples of unauthorized charges:

ORDINANCE No. 2021-06A

AN ORDINANCE AMMENDING ORDINANCE 2021-06 ESTABLISHING THE CREDIT CARD USE POLICY WITHIN SAN JUAN COUNTY

WHEREAS, the Board of San Juan County Commissioners adopted ordinance 2021-06 on August 17, 2021 adopting rules and regulations for the use of County managed credit cards; and

WHEREAS, the Clerk/Auditor's Office has determined a need to amend the adopted rules and regulations for better efficiency in the use of County managed credit cards; and

WHEREAS, Utah Code Annotated § 17-75-602 formulates the process for Counties to establish a personnel and policy system administered in a manner that will provide for the effective implementation of the following principles: (1)(d) develop and implement programs to improve employee effectiveness; and

WHEREAS, amending the Credit Card Use Policy will aid in compliance with adopted San Juan County purchasing and procurement rules as well as State Law.

NOW THEREFORE, THE COUNTY LEGISLATIVE BODY OF SAN JUAN COUNTY ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1: SEVERABILITY: If any provision or clause of this ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstances is held to be unconstitutional or otherwise invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such invalidity shall not affect other sections, provisions, clauses or applications hereof which can be implemented without the invalid provision, clause or application hereof. To this end the provision and sections of this ordinance are declared to be severable.

Section 2: EFFECTIVE DATE: This amended ordinance shall take effect, fifteen (15) days after the enactment, and after depositing a copy in the Clerk/Auditor's Office and publication in a newspaper having general circulation in the County, as required by Utah Code Annotated § 17-64-501.

RESOLUTION NO. 2026-**A RESOLUTION TO AMEND THE 2018 COUNTY GENERAL PLAN, LAND USE SECTION, IN ACCORDANCE WITH UTAH CODE 17-79-404 FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE UNINCORPORATED LANDS IN SAN JUAN COUNTY, UTAH.**

WHEREAS, San Juan County has a General Plan amended and adopted by the Board of County Commissioners on December 18, 2018 which includes a Resource Management Plan for public lands pursuant to Utah Code 17-79-401 containing recommendations for the appropriate use of private and public land within the County; and

WHEREAS, in 2021, the Utah Legislature mandated certain amendments to County Resource Management Plans which was amended and adopted on August 16, 2022; and

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners desired to update the Land Use Section of the General Plan in accordance with Utah Code 17-79-401; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Utah Code 17-79-401, a Board of County Commissioners shall prepare and adopt a comprehensive, long-range general plan: (a) for present and future needs of the county; (b) (i) for growth and development of all or any part of the land within the unincorporated portions of the county; or (ii) if a county has designated a mountainous planning district, for growth and development of all or any part of the land within the mountainous planning district; and (c) as a basis for communicating and coordinating with the federal government on land and resource management issues, etc.; and

WHEREAS, the San Juan County Planning Commission has met to discuss changes to the Land Use Section after holding a Public Hearing on December 23, 2025 and made a positive recommendation with amended changes to the Board of County Commissioners to adopt; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF SAN JUAN COUNTY, UTAH THAT AFTER HAVING HELD A PUBLIC HEARING ON FEBRUARY 3, 2026, THAT THE AMENDED CHANGES TO THE LAND USE SECTION BE ADOPTED.

LAND USE

Introduction

County plans in Utah have two land use sections: The first, located in the Resource Management Plan, covers in detail the issues surrounding public lands. Since a majority of the county is under the jurisdiction and ownership of either a Federal agency or the Navajo Nation, it is essential to have that section of policy and planning separate due to its unique situation. This section, Land Use, deals with the land the county does have jurisdiction over: around 404,000 acres, just under 8% of the total acreage in the county. Land use planning is less focused on resource management and more on development patterns and what shape development will take in the future. The purpose of a land use section of a general plan is to ensure that development does not occur in a piecemeal fashion without consideration of future impacts. This section ensures that land use has been sufficiently studied and conforms to the overall future vision of the county.

Currently, the county is under significant growth pressure due to the tourism industry. We see this pressure as positive, as it supports local tourism-related industries, but it also creates a concern with lucrative overnight accommodation being developed for a transient vacationing population at the expense of affordable housing being available for residents. Typical housing stock, which would be used for long-term rentals, is no longer available. In addition, the need for affordable workforce housing will only

continue to increase due to the expansion of extractive industries.

Areas such as Spanish Valley will most likely incorporate as they continue to experience growth. In anticipation of the growth, an area-specific special plan has been created for Spanish Valley -- the San Juan County Spanish Valley Area Plan which was adopted by the County Commission in April 2018 as an amendment to the county's General Plan. The area plan was developed to make sure that growth occurs in a deliberate manner and incorporates the approved Utah Trust Lands Administration's Community Structure Plan. The Spanish Valley Area Plan and any other future area plans are components of this General Plan.

The location of public infrastructure will most likely influence the location of development elsewhere in the county. Some unincorporated areas are already serviced by special service districts. If services are not expanded to remote areas, development will most likely be focused in areas that can reasonably provide citizens with services in the future.

Unincorporated county land outside of Blanding and Monticello is expected to show slow- to-moderate growth since people will want the amenities of a nearby town and the rural lifestyle of living in unincorporated territory. A large portion of this development will be either focused toward resource development, workforce housing, or vacation amenities for tourists. A future annexation plan has been created with Blanding and

Monticello in anticipation of this future transition opportunity.

Public Survey

An informal survey* in 2025 of San Juan County residents who primarily live in unincorporated areas suggests the following:

- Agricultural lands should be protected from encroachment.
- The integrity of agricultural lands should be protected.
- Residential neighborhoods should not be intermixed with agricultural land.

Land Use Designations

These separate land use designations will be used on the future land use map. Each designation has its own purpose and limitations. These designations are not necessarily zoning districts but are the basis for zoning districts. Many different zoning districts can exist within a single general plan land use designation. The designations to be shown on the Future Land Use Map are as follows:

Residential - In San Juan County, residential densities range from high density, such as in Spanish Valley, to low density. The purpose of low density is to promote and preserve single family large lot patterns. This is normally accompanied by limiting keeping of animals and some agricultural practices. Lot sizes in this designation are normally at a minimum of 43,560 square feet. Anything below this lot

size should be encouraged to be located closer to other municipalities in transition areas. Since uses in this designation are rural in nature and tend to be isolated, services from public utilities are limited or are not available. Depending on the location, sometimes flexibility can be explored if neighborhood commercial and other opportunities are kept in mind.

Agriculture - This designation is for the maintenance and protection of food production and related uses. This also includes agricultural protection areas. Incidental uses to agriculture are allowed as well, such as living quarters, sheds, storage or any other use that is normally related to agriculture. Uses other than agriculture are allowed provided they do not adversely impact agricultural uses.

Transition Area - The purpose of this designation is to ensure that development near existing municipalities can transition and annex into the municipality without complication. These areas closely coincide with municipality annexation policy plans. As part of a county development review in these areas, municipalities should be involved in the process, whether through actual review or by the reviewing of existing city plans and ensuring that development conforms to those plans. Some areas within these transition areas are already serviced with municipal utilities and may be able to develop at a higher density than elsewhere in the county.

Industrial - This designation is for the manufacturing, assembly, storage, and

shipping of raw materials and other activities that support the economic base. Uses should be subject to approval and have no vested rights to develop in an industrial manner. Industrial uses should be regulated in a manner that adequately mitigates any negative externalities caused by the use. Industrial uses can be located in places that do not conflict with public lands and recreation opportunities. Industrial uses should locate near existing utilities or pay the way to extend needed services.

Commercial - The purpose of this designation is to provide for economic development, shopping needs, and entertainment for residents. Commercial uses should be separated into different like types. (For example, types that work within a neighborhood and those that work better along a highway).

Commercial uses should be clustered together to form commercial nodes and districts that can support each other. Commercial uses should not be allowed to encroach upon residential development. **Sensitive Lands** - This designation is specifically for lands that cannot be developed for any use due to any natural hazard such as flood plains, erosion, tectonic, or other hazards.

Multiple Use - This designation is for land where residential and other uses will be limited. Also to protect land and open space resources; to reduce unreasonable requirements for public utility and service expenditures through uneconomic and

unwise dispersal of population; to encourage use of the land, where appropriate, for forestry, grazing, agriculture, mining, wildlife habitat, and recreation; to avoid excessive damage to watersheds, water pollution, soil erosion, danger from brush land fires, damage to grazing, livestock raising, and to wildlife values; and, to promote the health, safety, convenience, order, prosperity, and general welfare of the inhabitants of the community.

Public Lands - The prevalence and location of public lands in San Juan County necessitates a working relationship with Federal and State land management agencies in order to promote the county's land use goals.

Tribal Lands - This designation is for land that is owned and controlled by the Navajo Nation and other groups. This land is not regulated by the county but can have a direct impact on the county as a whole.

Future Land Use Map

The main tool provided in the general plan to guide policy decisions is the Future Land Use Map. It is the legal basis for zoning and reflects the vision for the county in the future. It also takes into account restraints such as road access, available water/sewer services, topography, significant habitats, groundwater resources, hazards, and accessibility to emergency services. Within these constraints, the core concept for the county's development directs future growth to areas where existing or planned infrastructure and services can support growth and to locations within or adjacent to existing communities.

The end goal is to produce a sustainable, well-balanced development pattern for the future.

Anticipated Changes

The single most important factor in growth will most likely be the availability of services. Since the county does not provide services, infill will be encouraged. Demand for workforce housing for individuals is expected to increase, and there will most likely be a desire to locate it in San Juan County. The rural character of the county can be preserved through infill development and the dedication of open space. This will be accomplished by working with municipalities to annex urbanized, unincorporated territory. It is also essential to make sure that residents of the county have more employment opportunities in professional fields and not just the tourism industry.

Public lands and multiple use designated lands will change as development continues to evolve. This currently is being experienced as expansion of tourism accommodations to include glamping and different forms of overnight rentals or primitive camping industries.

Agricultural and Industrial Protection Areas

State statute requires county general plans to “identify and consider each agriculture protection area” (17-79-403(2)(b)). As of 2025, the county does not have any registered protection areas; however, citizens have requested that processes and ordinances be established to add this element into our land use ordinance.

An agriculture protection area is a section of land that has a protected, vested use of an agricultural, mining, or industrial nature for a period of 20 years. By state statute, a county must appoint an advisory board that reviews requests from private property owners who want to establish a protection area. A final decision is then made by the legislative body, and the Utah Division of Agriculture and Food is notified. The county may establish their own review process and application fees by ordinance. During the 20-year period the land and use are protected from rezoning, eminent domain, nuisance claims, and state development. There are parcels within the county that could qualify as protection areas, and a way to establish and regulate them should be explored, enacted and encouraged.

Economic Considerations

The effect of a land use regulation on property values can be positive or negative. Historic land use regulation by the county has not been a hindrance to property values or local economic development opportunities.

Without a working relationship with Federal and State land management agencies, the prevalence and location of public lands in San Juan could negatively impact the county’s future land use goals.

Affordable Housing

According to a 2024 report by Points Consulting, titled *Dwelling on the Future: Housing Needs & Strategies for the Preservation of San Juan’s Communities*, Utah voters selected “housing affordability” as their

top concern in 2024. In San Juan County, housing concerns include not only affordability but also availability. Supply is limited, and the region has not experienced any notable housing “booms.” Utah developers do not perceive an incentive to build in the county if they can construct more profitable developments in other areas of the state. On paper, the county is less attractive than other areas in Utah due to its lack of growth, stagnant economy, high poverty rate, and lack of suitable transportation corridors. Only 40% of households can afford to buy an average-priced home in the county, and in specific areas, this percentage is even lower. Short-term rentals, while encouraged, have reduced the availability of long-term residential homes. For example, in Spanish Valley, 63% of homes are short-term rentals while in Blanding and La Sal, short-term housing stock is much lower at 3.3% and 5.6% respectively.

Without government involvement, the Points study concludes that the county’s population could decline to around 12,600 by 2040 (a 14% drop from about 14,600 residents in 2024). Overall, the study recommends that the county address issues related to zoning and housing density, eligibility to access state funds, additional resources for development, repurposing existing structures, and coordinating with the local tribes for additional housing.

Water Use and Preservation

In accordance with Utah Code 17-79-403 The county must develop a water use and preservation element that is integrated into

this general plan. This element should include the following:

- The effects of permitted development on water demand and infrastructure;
- Methods for reducing water demand and per capita consumption for future development;
- Methods for reducing water demand and per capita consumption for existing development; and
- Opportunities to modify operations to eliminate or reduce conditions that waste water.


San Juan County has limited water availability, including infrastructure limitations. The county continues to work with special service districts and, as this General Plan emphasizes, is encouraging development to take place closer to communities that have available infrastructure.

Land Use Goals & Policies


San Juan County will seek to facilitate orderly and fiscally responsible growth by:

- Supporting the creation of agricultural and industrial protection areas by defining in county ordinances a process for how a private property owner may establish one.
- Using multiple use lands wisely.
- Not permitting development in hazardous areas, such as floodplains and hill sides.
- Encouraging cluster developments to preserve open space and connect to public infrastructure systems.

- Exploring the option of transfers of development rights to protect multiple use lands.
- Working with landowners to obtain conservation easements.
- Requiring residential developments to locate within existing communities or within areas where services are provided at a level that will meet demand.
- Working with other governmental agencies to implement the resource management section of this plan.
- Ensuring that commercial developments are located near existing communities and are part of a planned use development or traditional neighborhood.
- Ensuring that commercial and industrial developments locate near existing utilities or themselves pay for the extension of services needed. Tools to make this more achievable are impact fees and development agreements.
- Restricting industrial uses to locations where incompatible uses are unlikely to encroach upon the industrial use and make it a nuisance.
- Considering the future land use map when approving zone changes and development applications.
- Supporting the creation of area plans, such as the Spanish Valley plan, when growth pressure begins to mount -- especially if the area intends to incorporate in the future.
- Participating with entities such as the Inland Port and other State and Federal resources to encourage and implement affordable housing projects within the county.
- Creating a trails master plan.
