8. Annual Open and Public Meetings Act and Government Records Access and Management Act (GRAMA) Training. Alex Goble, San Juan County Attorney

Alex Goble, County Deputy Attorney, presented the annual Open Meetings Act & GRAMA training.

Open Meetings Act - Meetings are to be open, actions are to be recorded. A quorum exists if any two Commissioners are together, even if together in their personal lives. Alex encouraged the Commissioners to avoid any out of commission/public discussion concerning any County business. Public meetings require 24 hours' notice for a meeting to occur. Agenda has to provide reasonable information regarding the items for action. Covid-19 has changed the meeting formats from in-person to online as needed. The anchor location can be changed by the Commission Chair. Group texts and emails are discouraged because it creates an electronic meeting. They are to CC Mack in all emails and he will help keep the emails/action legal. Executive meetings can be closed for many reasons. Chair to ask for a roll call to enter into an executive meeting, and any vote is not allowed in the Executive meeting.

GRAMA - any text, emails, and records are to be stored by the Clerk. Texts or emails are to be classified by the County Clerk/Auditor. Keep all paper, digital, and audio records, do not delete any records. There are three types of records: Controlled records ((Health information) Private records (Law enforcement) & Protected records (GRAMA records). These are maintained by Clerk/Security Officers. Fees are allowed.

RECOMMENDATION: Consideration

SUMMARY

Land History:

In 2007 The Ranches at Elk Meadows Subdivision was created and subsequently amended. The original plat included 126 lots on 661.49 acres. The 2007 amendment plat reduced the number of lots to 67 but increased the acreage to 751.61 acres. (See the attached plats for both the original and amended plats from 2007). Since the creation of the subdivision, roads have been cleared, and some water infrastructure has also been installed.

Regulation History:

The Zoning Ordinance was amended in 2011 which resulted in an Agriculture District and a Rural Residential District that essentially list the same permitted and conditional land uses. (See attached Chapter 11 of the Zoning Ordinance).

The Zoning Ordinance was also amended in 2019 to allow lot sizes as small as ¼ acre for all zoning districts with water and sewer approval by the County Board of Health. (See attached 2019 amendment)

Neighboring property status:

The Elk Meadows development is a separate development of residential parcels located just to the south of The Ranches at Elk Meadows Subdivision. Elk Meadows includes several built out gravel roads and homes in a residential development. Currently much of the property in the Ranches at Elk Meadows subdivision and surrounding land to the East and North is leased for cattle grazing.

Current Request:

Monticello Development Company LLC has requested to rezone 18.69 acres in the Ranches at Elk Meadows Subdivision from the A-1 zone to the RR-1 Zone. The developer is requesting the rezone based on discussions with the Planning Commission, that the zoning reflect the residential nature of the subdivision. The Monticello Development Company has also requested an amendment to the subdivision that would create 8 lots that range in size from just under 1/3 acre lots to just over ¾ acre lots. The smaller lot size allowed because of the 2019 amendment to the zoning allowing lot sizes down to ¼ acre lots in all county zones with approval of onsite waste water systems referenced above. The proposed subdivision amendment is what led to the suggestion by the Planning Commission that the property be rezoned to reflect its actual residential use.

Bearing in mind the above history the Board of County Commissioners should consider the following:

- 1. Clustering of housing which allows for fewer wells and smaller infrastructure requirements for roads, and better protects the water table.
- 2. If his proposal proves to be economically successful it will lead to a natural progression of increased housing density in this area, and the already subdivided lots will follow suit.
- 3. Even if the rezone request is denied, the requested subdivision amendment can still be applied for under the A-1 Zone (see the above regulation history) Approval or denial of the rezone request does not necessarily stop the proposed project from proceeding.
- 4. His proposed project has health department approval which qualifies it to proceed under the 2019 amendment.
- 5. The proposal
- 6. Some neighbors to the south have expressed dissatisfaction with development taking place on the land to their north, and they may or may not have made public comment to the Board of County Commissioners with an explanation as to why they oppose the development.
- 7. Fire risk in this area is considered low to moderate under the Wildfire Risk Assessment by the Utah Department of Natural Resources.
- 8. Equal treatment of similarly situated land owners in that area.
- 9. Approvals have already been granted for subdivision to exist and they do exist in the area.

HISTORY/PAST ACTION

At their November meeting, the Planning Commission voted to recommend that the Board of County Commissioners approve the rezone request. See attached minutes from the November 18, 2021 PC Meeting.

At their December meeting, the Planning Commission conditionally approved an amendment plat for property in the boundary of the requested rezone area. The subdivision amendment is only approved with the approval of the rezone request. See attached minutes from the December 9, 2021 PC Meeting.







CHAPTER 11

MULTIPLE-USE, AGRICULTURAL, RURAL RESIDENTIAL DISTRICTS

11-1 Purpose

- (1) Multiple Use. To establish areas in mountain, hillside, canyon, mountain valley, desert and other open and generally undeveloped lands where human habitation would be limited in order to protect land and open space resources; to reduce unreasonable requirements for public utility and service expenditures through uneconomic and un-wise dispersal of population; to encourage use of the land, where appropriate, for forestry, grazing, agriculture, mining, wildlife habitat, and recreation; to avoid excessive damage to watersheds, water pollution, soil erosion, danger from brush land fires, damage to grazing, livestock raising, and to wildlife values; and, to promote the health, safety, convenience, order, prosperity, and general welfare of the inhabitants of the community.
- (2) Agricultural. To promote and preserve, in appropriate areas, conditions favorable to agriculture and to maintain greenbelt open spaces. Such districts are intended to include activities normally and necessarily related to the conduct of agricultural production and to provide protection from the intrusion of uses adverse to the continuance of agricultural activity.
- (3) Rural Residential. To promote and preserve, in appropriate areas, conditions favorable to large-lot family life, the keeping of limited numbers of animals and fowl, and reduced requirements for public utilities. These districts are intended to be primarily residential in character and protected from encroachment by commercial and industrial uses.

11-2 Use Regulations

No building, structure or land shall be used and no building or structure shall be hereafter erected, structurally altered enlarged or maintained, except as allowed in the districts as shown as "permitted uses" indicated by a "P" in the appropriate column, or as "conditional uses", indicated by a "C" in the appropriate column. If a use is not allowed in the district, it is either not named in the use list or it is indicated in the appropriate column by a dash, "-". If a regulation applies in the district, it is indicated in the appropriate column by a numeral to show the linear or square feet, or acres required, or by the letter "A". SAN JUAN COUNTY UTAH ORDINANCE NO 2021-11B

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE 2021-11A OF THE SAN JUAN COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS REDISTRICTING THE BOARD OF COMMISSION AND SCHOOL BOARD VOTING DISTRICTS AS REQUIRED BY UTAH STATUTE.

WHEREAS, pursuant to Utah Code Annotated §20A-5-303. Duties of the County and Municipal Legislative Bodies Section establishing, dividing, abolishing, and changing Voting Districts -- Common polling places -- Combined voting districts; and

WHEREAS, based upon the results of the Decennial Census, in the event that any Districts need to be redrawn, changes of which shall comply with State and Federal law meeting constitutional requirements, including the same requirements and limitations imposed upon the County by the U.S. District Court for the District of Utah when it mandated redistricting of County Commission and School Board Districts in the case of *Navajo Nation et al. v. San Juan County, Civ. No. 2:12-CV-0039-RJS*; and

WHEREAS, on or about April 26, 2021, the United States Census Bureau published the most recent Decennial Census report; and

WHEREAS, on August 17, 2021, San Juan County executed a contract with William Cooper at the request of the Board of San Juan County Commissioner to assist the County in consulting, establishing, to divide, abolish, and change voting districts if the population changes in the Decennial Census warrants that our voting districts need to be adjusted to satisfy the population, compactness, contiguity, minority representation, community of interests are still in compliance with one person one vote principles and those of the Voting Rights Act; and

WHEREAS, William Cooper has presented the map options on October 14, October 29, November 13 in Public Meetings, on November 30th during the Virtual Public Hearing specifically to present the maps along with his independent consultation regarding viability; and

WHEREAS, William Cooper has been willing to review redistricting maps recommended by the County Clerk/Auditor's Office, the Navajo Nation's Human Rights' preferences, the San Juan County School Board recommended adjustments and any other map or suggested maps; and

WHEREAS, during the COVID Pandemic, County staff has solicited comments both virtually, inperson during public comment periods of the San Juan County Commission Meetings, through a form created on the County website, through emails with the Navajo Nation Chapters, through the County Elections Navajo Speaking Liaisons who presented the comment forms and solicited comments in Navajo to the Utah Chapters of the Navajo Nation and in a presentation to the School Board and the Utah Navajo Commission; and

WHEREAS, the San Juan County Board of Commissioners, after soliciting input from affected school districts in San Juan County, input from the general public, including political representatives from Cities and Towns within San Juan County, the Navajo Nation and all citizens wishing to provide input, has provided recommendations for redistricted voting precinct maps for its consideration; and

WHEREAS, the San Juan County Board of Commissioners, acting in its capacity as county legislative body for San Juan County, now intends to adopt plans redistricting Commission Districts 1, 2 and 3 as well as local School Districts 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 located within San Juan County whose boundaries encompass more than a single municipality as required by and in a manner consistent with the applicable legal requirements of Federal and State law; and

WHEREAS, San Juan County acknowledges the participation of Grand County and the redistricting of the Grand School District portions within the portion of San Juan County which is divided along Spanish Valley Drive and the La Sal Mountain Loop Road, with the eastern part belonging to Grand School Board District 1 and the western part belonging to Grand School Board District 5 of which Grand County is responsible for redistricting; and

WHEREAS, within 30 days after the establishment, division, abolition, or change of a voting precinct, the San Juan County Board of Commissioners shall file with the Utah Geospatial Resource Center, created under Section 63A-16-505, a notice describing the action taken and specifying the resulting boundaries of each voting precinct affected by the action.

WHEREAS, the Board of San Juan County Commissioners Passed, Adopted and Approved the San Juan County Commission Districts as indicated in "Attachment A" by adopting Ordinance 2021-11; and

WHEREAS, the Board of San Juan County Commissioners Passed, Adopted and Approved the San Juan School Board District Map, "San Juan County School Board Districts Option B Modified" on January 4, 2021 by adopting Ordinance 2021-11A; and

WHEREAS, the Navajo Nation Human Rights Commission has since provided a newly proposed San Juan School Board District Map, "NNHRC Plan San Juan County School Board Eastland Adjustment January 7, 2022"; and

WHEREAS, the adjustments to the aforementioned map keeps the intent of January 4th's Ordinance 2021-11A allowing for a district shift of District 1 in to District 4 to encompass more of Eastland aligning the Monticello School Boundaries; and

WHEREAS, the adjustments also include a more balanced population deviation of no more than 2.5% deviation closer to the intent in the finalized judgement issued by the Court, *Case No.* 2:12-CV-00039-RJS-DBP; and

WHEREAS, this ordinance shall become effective fifteen (15) days after its passage and upon at least one publication of the ordinance or a summary thereof in a newspaper published and having general circulation in San Juan County.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY ORDAINED BY THE COUNTY LEGISLATIVE BODY OF SAN JUAN COUNTY, UTAH, THAT: the Board of San Juan County Commissioners

PASSED, ADOPTED, AND APPROVED the amendment and Redistricted Map incorporated within as "Attachment B, NNHRC Plan San Juan County School Board Eastland Adjustment





NOTICE OF VOID ACTION

The following email has come to the attention of the County. (See attached). The content of the email has made it apparent that a violation of the Utah Open Meetings Act has taken place. Specifically, the email constitutes an electronic meeting between a quorum of the County Commission, a lobbyist for the Navajo Nation, a government official with the Navajo Nation, and a paralegal for the lobbyist.

No notice of any meeting was provided to the public as county staff was unaware you intended to hold such a meeting. Further, the content of the email indicates there was a meeting and quorum agreement to put the matter on the January 18, 2022 agenda. A decision to take action is evident in the content of the email and county staff was directed to take the action.

By way of reminder of the training you received: "Meeting" means the convening of a public body or a specified body, with a quorum present, including a workshop or an executive session, whether in person or by means of electronic communications, for the purpose of discussing, receiving comments from the public about, or acting upon a matter over which the public body or specific body has jurisdiction or advisory power.

"Quorum" means a **simple majority** of the membership of a public body, unless otherwise defined by applicable law. "Quorum" does not include a meeting of two elected officials by themselves **when no action, either formal or informal**, is taken.

Unfortunately the attached electronic communication, which is a follow up to a currently unknown discussion, does constitute both a meeting and action. A quorum met (either in person or by other electronic means) with representatives of the public or other entities, agreed to action, and directed the county staff to take the said action. All of this occurred without proper notice or opportunity for the

public at large to attend the decision making process of their elected officials. This is in violation of both Utah Code Ann. 52-4-201 and San Juan County Ordinance 2020-06.

You may recall that corrective action had to be taken several years ago regarding the appointment of the interim county administrator for a similar violation. Likewise, such corrective action must be taken in this situation to correct the OPMA violation. As such, the County Commission should not vote on the requested item on January 18, 2022, and it must be brought back at the next County Commission meeting. This will give the public time to be aware of the OPMA mistake and have opportunity to properly comment **prior** to any action being taken.

It is with great frustration this letter must be sent. That this very important matter is unnecessarily delayed is an even greater frustration. However, by statute I am obligated to enforce OPMA, and instruct the proper way to correct this problem. I again reemphasize that any drafting of ordinances or similar items can be directed to county staff or my office to avoid these types of errors. The use of outside parties for such drafting has already financially damaged the county multiple times over the past few years and it must stop. Likewise, there should never be a quorum present with a lobbyist or the lobbyist's client without proper public notice of the meeting.

If you choose to vote on this item on January 18, 2022, please be advised that Utah Code Ann. §53-4-302 already dictates the matter is void. Delaying the action and providing proper notice will result in the county being able to address the proposed ordinance in a timelier manner. Again, please review the training you received so important matters like this proposed ordinance are not unnecessarily delayed in the future.



RESOLUTION OF THE NAVAJO NATION HUMAN RIGHTS COMMISSION

Opposing the San Juan County Utah Commission Ordinance that Replaced the San Juan County School District's Redistricting Plan with the Substitute "Plan B Modified"

WHEREAS:

- 1. Pursuant to 2 N.N.C. §§ 920 and 921, the Navajo Nation Human Rights Commission (herein referred to as "Commission") is established in the Legislative Branch as an entity of the Navajo Nation government and organized to operate as a clearinghouse entity to administratively address discriminatory actions against citizens of the Navajo Nation; and to interface with the local, state, federal governments, and with national and international human rights organizations in accordance with the Commission's plan of operation (Navajo Nation Council Resolution CJN-15-08) and applicable laws and regulations of the Navajo Nation; and
- 2. By Resolution NABIJN-15-21, the Naabik'iyat'i Committee of the Navajo Nation Council designated the Commission and its Office to take the lead in participating in redistricting activities in Arizona, New Mexico and Utah; and
- 3. By Resolution NNHRCNOV-16-21, the Commission recommended that the 2021 school board and commission election districts be based upon the 2017 United States Federal District Court case, in the matter of *Navajo Nation vs. San Juan County*, Case No. 2:12-CV-00039-RJS. On November 16, 2021, the Commission submitted to the San Juan County Utah Commission (herein referred to as the "County") proposed school board and commission proposed election districts; and
- 4. The Commission's school board election district plan addressed several points that conform with the Voting Rights Act of 1965:
 - a. Unpacked Districts 4 and 5. The County's mapper consistently packed Native American Voting Age Population (NAVAP) into District 4 and 5 so that the potential for the 4th school board district to increase NAVAP was reduced. The plan unpacked Districts 4 and 5 by lowering the NAVAP percentages for District 4 and 5 to 78.25% and 79.79% respectively;
 - b. Increased the NAVAP for District 2. There are five school board districts in the county; three of the districts have significant NAVAP. The redistricting plan provided the opportunity to share NAVAP from Districts 3, 4 and 5 with District 2 in order to increase the NAVAP percentage in District 2 to 27%; and
- 5. While the County commission did not adopt the redistricting district plan for the county commission that was submitted by the Commission, the County commission adopted the Commission's school board election districts on December 21, 2021. However, the County commission reconsidered the school board election district on January 4, 2022, by adopting a plan identified as "Plan B Modified" election districts. "Plan B Modified" plan was never

- put out for public comments while the Commission's plan was posted on the County's website and was presented during public meetings for comments from the public for approximately a month long; and
- 6. The Commission finds that the County commission adopting the "Plan B Modified" not only disregards the public's participation in the County redistricting activities but also packs Districts 4 and 5 election districts by having more than 80% NAVAP in each district. In addition, the newly adopted school board redistricting plan maintains a status quo for District 2 by repressing Native American voters in the district.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT:


- 1. The Navajo Nation Human Rights Commission hereby opposes the "Plan B Modified" for the San Juan County School Board and recommends that San Juan County Utah commission withdraw the county school board redistricting plan (identified as Plan B Modified) it adopted on January 4, 2022. This plan did not receive adequate public input. Additionally, the school board redistricting plan adopted on December 21, 2021 received adequate public review and input.
- 2. The Navajo Nation Human Rights Commission further hereby directs the Office of Navajo Nation Human Rights Commission to communicate this resolution to the Navajo Nation Council, Office of the President & Vice President, Navajo chapters in San Juan County Utah and Utah San Juan County Commission.





WHEREAS, within 30 days after the establishment, division, abolition, or change of a voting precinct, the San Juan County Board of Commissioners shall file with the Utah Geospatial Resource Center, created under Section 63A-16-505, a notice describing the action taken and specifying the resulting boundaries of each voting precinct affected by the action.

WHEREAS, the Board of San Juan County Commissioners Passed, Adopted and Approved the San Juan County Commission Districts as indicated in "Attachment A" by adopting Ordinance 2021-11; and

WHEREAS, this ordinance shall become effective fifteen (15) days after its passage and upon at least one publication of the ordinance or a summary thereof in a newspaper published and having general circulation in San Juan County.





SUMMARY

In October, we released an RFP seeking an engineering firm who can assist the County in applying for the Hazard Mitigation Program Grant for the Pack Creek Fire after realizing there will always continue to be a problem with flooding, debris and a witnessed need to slow down the water energy in that area. The County had two companies submit their proposals, one by Wood Environmental & Infrastructure Solutions, Inc and the other by Jones & DeMille Engineering. A Selection Committee was formed to evaluate the proposals; Jones & DeMille was ranked as the most responsive proposal.

In December, the San Juan County Board of Commissioners approved the exclusive right to negotiate a contract with Jones & DeMille

San Juan County desires to obtain the services of a professional and competent service provider to provide the contractual services under this contract.

San Juan County issued a Request for Proposal on October 29, 2021, for the San Juan County Hazard Mitigation Program Grant-Pack Creek Fire assistance, and

Jones & DeMille submitted a responsive proposal for these services on December 3, 2021, meeting the due date requirements of the request; and

San Juan County Board of Commissioners approved the Notice of Award and Intent to Negotiate a Contract with Jones & DeMille to perform these services as the Service Provider on December 21; and

Jones & DeMille accepted the Notice of Award on December 27, 2021; and

The Service Provider, who has represented to San Juan County that it is a competent and experienced service provider and a licensed engineer in the State of Utah in accordance with Utah Code Title 58 Chapter 22, Professional Engineers and Professional Land Surveyors Licensing Act, desires to provide the contractual services under this contract.

The parties therefore agree as follows:

1. Scope of Services. The Service Provider agrees as follows:

- A. Service Provider will assist San Juan County in developing the San Juan County Hazard Mitigation Program-Pack Creek Fire Grant Packet; working in conjunction with the Utah Division of Emergency Management (DEM) Liaison, the San Juan County Emergency Manager, Watershed Management; Floodplain Administrator; Planner; and Chief Administrative Officer.
- B. Service Provider will be responsible for completing the FEMA Benefit-Cost Analysis.
- C. Design and development of full specifications, project manual and construction documents for a debris catch basin at the junction of the Cut-off Road in the Spanish Valley-San Juan County. This debris basin will be located on SITLA land. Permissions and easements will need to be obtained for the project.
- D. Create bid documents and construction documents for the Project in electronic versions of PDF once approved for distribution to potential bidders, including assisting the County in conducting pre-bid conferences, appraising proposals, and preparing contracts for construction. Including preparing a conformed set of Construction Documents including all addenda at the conclusion of the Bidding Phase.
- E. Assist with awarding a contractor.
- F. Assist in final development of a project grant application and packet will need to be complete and submitted to the State of Utah Department of Emergency Management.
- G. A second phase will be negotiated at a later date to include project management and construction administration as the Project commences and funding becomes available.

2. Compensation.

- C. San Juan County shall mail its payment to the Service Provider within 30 days after the Service Provider completes its duties under section 1 of this contract, unless the parties agree, in writing, to alternative payment arrangements.

- D. Service Provider shall disclose its tax identification or Social Security number to San Juan County before a cl payment will be made by San Juan County to Service Provider.
- E. If this contract is terminated early, San Juan County will pay the Service Provider for the duties completed under section 1 of this contract through the date of early termination.
- F. The Service Provider is responsible for any taxes, contributions, assessments, or fees, which arise from payments made by San Juan County to the Service Provider.
- G. The Service Provider is responsible for paying all subcontractors, material providers, jobbers, or any other person who or entity that provides materials, services, equipment, utilities or otherwise at the request of Service Provider and in connection with or relating to this contract.
- 3. Effectiveness, Date, and Termination. This contract will become effective when all parties have signed it. The date of this agreement will be the date this agreement is signed by the last party to sign it (as indicated by the date associated with that party's signature). This contract will terminate on December 31, 2022, at 11:59 p.m unless extended by amendment to the Agreement.

4. Early Termination.

- A. San Juan County may terminate this contract if annual appropriations, as part of San Juan County's annual public budgeting process, are not made or are insufficient to pay the Service Provider. Record drawings and specifications shall be submitted to County on a CD/DVD in CAD and PDF format; and

- F. Provide a digital copy of CAD files and all construction documentation to County, including, but not limit submittals, meeting minutes, warranties, and operation and maintenance manuals.
- G. The Service Provider shall assign and deliver to San Juan County all manufacturers' warranties relating to the materials and equipment furnished under this contract as soon as reasonably possible, but in no event later than 10 days after this contract terminates.
- H. The Service Provider acknowledges the relationship of trust and confidence established between the Service Provider and the County by this Agreement. Accordingly, the Service Provider's acts shall be consistent with this relationship. The Service Provider shall further the interest of the County through efficient business administration and management and design.
- **6. Insurance**. The Service Provider shall maintain for the duration of this contract and for six years after the termination of this contract, the following types of insurance:
 - A. A valid occurrence form commercial general liability insurance policy, which covers contractual liability and contractual agreements, with minimum limits as follows:
 - (1) Each occurrence \$1,000,000.00;
 - (2) Damage to Rented Premises \$300,000.00;
 - (3) Medical Exp. (Any one person) \$5,000.00;
 - (4) Personal and Adv. Injury \$2,000,000.00;
 - (5) General aggregate \$2,000,000.00; and
 - (6) Products Comp/Op aggregate \$2,000,000.00;
 - B. A valid automobile liability insurance policy that satisfies the minimum amounts required by Utah law; and
 - C. A valid Workers Compensation and Employers' Liability insurance policy with minimum limits as required by Utah law. If any proprietor, partner, executive, officer, member, or other person is excluded from the Workers Compensation and Employers' Liability insurance policy, the Service Provider shall provide San Juan County with the applicable state issued waiver.

For the duration of this contract and for six years after the termination of this contract, San Juan County may request the Service Provider to provide San Juan County with certificates or other records that demonstrate that the Service Provider is in compliance with the insurance requirements set forth in this section (the "Certificates/Records"). If the Service Provider fails to provide San Juan County with the requested Certificates/Records within three business days of San Juan County's request, San Juan County may immediately terminate this contract. If the Service Provider fails to have the insurances required by this contract, San Juan County may immediately terminate this contract.

- 7. Indemnification. With respect to any judicial, administrative, or arbitration action, suit, claim, investigation, or proceeding ("Proceeding") against San Juan County, San Juan County's officers, employees, agents, consultants, advisors, and other representatives, and each of their heirs, executors, successors, and assignees ("San Juan County Indemnitees") that arises out of this contract or the acts or omissions of Service Provider (each, a "Claim"), Service Provider shall, for the duration of this contract and for a period of six years after the termination of this contract, indemnify those San Juan County Indemnitees against any amount awarded in, or paid in settlement of any Proceeding, including interest ("Loss") and any out-of-pocket expense incurred in defending a Proceeding or in any related investigation or negotiation, including court filing fees, court costs, arbitration fees, witness fees, and attorneys' and other professionals' fees and disbursements ("Litigation Expense") (Loss and Litigation Expense means "Indemnifiable Losses") arising out of that Proceeding, except to the extent that San Juan County negligently or intentionally caused those Indemnifiable Losses.
- 8. Notices. All notices must be in writing and must be delivered personally, by a nationally recognized overnight courier, or by United States mail, postage prepaid and addressed to the parties at their respective addresses set forth below, and the same shall be effective upon receipt if delivered personally, on the next business day if sent by overnight courier, or three business days after deposit in the United States mail, if mailed. - 9. Independent Contractor. The Service Provider shall perform this contract as an independent contractor. The Provider acknowledges that it and its representatives are not employees of San Juan County, and, thus, have no right to and shall not be provided with any San Juan County benefits.
- 10. Conflict of Terms. In the event of any conflict between the terms of this contract and any documents referenced in this contract or incorporated into this contract by reference, including exhibits or attachments to this contract, this contract shall control.
- 11. Assignment Restricted. Except with the prior written consent of the other party, each party shall not transfer, including by merger (whether that party is the surviving or disappearing entity), consolidation, dissolution, or operation of law:
 - A. Any discretion granted under this contract;
 - B. Any right to satisfy a condition under this contract;
 - C. Any remedy under this contract; or
 - D. Any obligation imposed under this contract.

Any purported transfer in violation of this section will be void.



In June of 2021 the Pack Creek Fire burned approximately 9,000 acres in the mountains 14 miles southeast of Moab in both San Juan and Grand Counties. Following the fire the Burned Area Emergency Response (BAER) Team sampled sites to evaluate soil changes caused by the fire. They collected information on ground cover, canopy consumption, intact roots, and water repellency to better understand soil burn severity. The analysis showed that 49% of the burned area was at a moderate level and 2% at a high level. Areas located downstream from moderate and high soil burn severity may experience increased rates of erosion, debris flows, and surface run-off following short-duration, high-intensity rainfall events.

As a result the County is seeking funding from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), working with the State Division of Emergency Management (DEM) through their Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP). We understand that Utah DEM has set aside Fire Management Assistance Grants (FMAG) funding specifically to address potential community hazards and threats related to this fire.

Having completed a similar project for a community that was impacted by a large wildfire, we have developed key objectives that will be applied in our approach to this project.

- 1. The Strength of the application can reduce the application review time.
- 2. Leveraging funding can balance affordability with maximum mitigation efforts.
- 3. Budget control needs to be applied during the project considering the entire project costs and contributions.
- 4. Documentation is important for a fluid project.
- 5. Understanding the environmental process is an important part of the funding application
- Quality engineering design and construction builds confidence with FEMA.

7. Proposed Schedule

Our proposed schedule is an option to accelerate the project in hopes of completing construction in the late fall of 2022. GRANT/FUNDING EXPERIENCE

JDE has successfully procured over \$600M in funding for hundreds of projects during our 39-year history. The NRCS PL-566 program facilitates a broad public planning process that is ideal for bringing state and federal agencies, project stakeholders, land owners, as well as special interest groups, together on all aspects of a project - including funding. Each funding source has its own goals, restraints, and specific application. Based on our understanding of the project, the County's needs, and the opportunities with applicable funding sources, we propose the following be considered:

- FEMA The County is submitting an application through FEMA's Hazard Mitigation Grant Program working with Utah DEM. FMAG funds have been set aside for the County as a result of the Pack Creek Fire. Our project experience will show that in the past few years we have submitted several applications and successfully worked on projects for FEMA's HMGP and BRIC programs and are very familiar with the program requirements. The funding is basically a two part process; completing and submitting the application, then final engineering and construction. The Utah DEM should be considered a project partner and be included in regular project updates, in order to receive feedback on proposed alternatives and how best to position for FEMA funding.
- NRCS The PL-566 process consists of three phases: Planning (Plan-EA), Design, and Construction. The planning phase of the project has been funded at 100% by the NRCS; the NRCS will also fund 100% of design upon successful completion of the Plan-EA. Construction costs are cost-shared at rates depending on the purpose of the improvements. For example, flood control measures are funded by NRCS at 100%, while public fish and wildlife measures are cost-shared at up to 50%. NRCS funds cannot be used for "real property rights," which includes land acquisition and water rights, while other funding sources can be used for these costs. The Watershed Plan-EA will include a detailed funding breakdown of the preferred alternative final design and construction costs. It is important to note that several funding sources were suggested in the PL-566 funding application, including those listed below. The NRCS awarded funding of this application in part because of the opportunity for cost sharing between these sources, which shows broad benefits, support, and participation.
- Other State Funding Agencies There are many layers and related issues and benefits to the County's needs that could open doors to other optimal funding sources that should be considered. One example is recreational related project components or spin-off projects may be funded through Utah Outdoor Recreation Grant (UORG) or Recreation Trails Program grants. This can be another creative means for the County to come up with matching funds to match federal input dollars. Other examples are spin-off projects in which water quality benefits could be realized and the County could involve the State DEQ Water Quality fund board. These are examples of how we strive to increase our value to the County and find deep satisfaction in investing ourselves in County needs "beyond the project".

Timing is critical when utilizing federal funding sources with specific requirements and eligibility criteria. During the initial stages of the project, a funding timeline and responsibility breakdown should be developed to help guide future efforts in securing funding. This would include a timeline that identifies critical decisions and milestones focused on the funding deadline.

Working with the County, Government and other Agencies

Understanding how to engage regulatory agencies such as FEMA on a project is key to gaining support, receiving feedback, and avoiding delays. JDE has developed a great reputation with FEMA, (through the Utah Department of Emergency Management [DEM]), while working with them on several projects, including the early stages of this project.

JDE has experience with several projects that require collaboration and permitting with the Utah DEM and FEMA. Our experience has taught us to facilitate frequent communication with these agencies. In FEMA compliance cases (such as Monroe City and Sevier County where there have been FEMA violations due to structures not being built to FEMA standards), JDE has documented the compliance issues, performed modeling and studies, and prepared meeting agendas, which efforts have enabled the Utah DEM and FEMA to provide critical feedback. Our goal has been to make the communication productive, to focus on the solutions, and explain the situations in a way that everyone can understand.

It is important to engage early with critical agencies (e.g., Utah DEM and FEMA) which have a special interest or could significantly impact the project. Perhaps more important though, is having an existing understanding and relationship with these agencies to build from. As demonstrated in other sections of the proposal, IDE has strong experience in completing projects and environmental assessments which required a high level of collaboration with agencies such as the FEMA, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (UFSWS), Utah Division of Wildlife Resources (UDWR), the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE), the Utah Division of Water Rights, etc.

FEMA specifically, collaboration will be crucial where this project includes mitigating the impact post fire hazard events. Understanding the FEMA requirements for levees and the process for certification will be critical as the project is planned, designed, and constructed. In the Woodland Hills project completed by JDE, we contacted FEMA Region 8 out of Denver to discuss and confirm our proposed approach for this project. We met with the Director and the Utah DEM at the site to confirm our approach to the project and review the project requirements and precess.

We propose to engage with FEMA then local and Federal funding agencies in two ways: (1) Regular updates with the Utah DEM, who represents FEMA at the state level and oversees the FEMA funding program (HMGP). These updates would include discussions on the project alternatives and how best to position the project for a successful funding application. The Utah DEM awareness of the project will also help in collaborating on the design of a debris basin, but most of that coordination will come from the regional level from FEMA. (2) Communicate the design criteria as the project progresses. Our experience with FEMA on other projects similar to this one is that there is not specific design guidelines published by FEMA. So it's important to review and thoroughly communicate the design approach with FEMA early and regularly through the application phase so there is buy in to the design criteria. Previously they have accepted the design criteria established by the Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) and Utah Dam Safety for debris basin. We will propose this criteria early in the design and modify the criteria or get acceptance as directed by FEMA.

Project included rehabilitation and replacement of flood conveyance infrastructure along Meads Wash, a major drainageway through the heart of Price City. Channel work included major grading, bank protection, grade control structures, headwalls and wingwalls, an replacing a major culvert (diameter = 12'). These improvements were implemented within a Zone AE floodplain with a Floodway, and therefore permitting was required per Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) guidelines. This required accommodating the FEMA permitting requirements in the design such as excessively raising the Based Flood Elevation (BFE), to ensure the design would be accepted before construction as part of the Conditional Letter of Map Revision (CLOMR). The current effective HEC-RAS model was updated to include current conditions with collected survey data and proposed conditions, and the process was automated using HEC-GeoRAS within ESRI's ArcGIS program. After the project was constructed, a Letter of Map Revision (LOMR) was submitted based on an as-built survey. The CLOMR and LOMR submittals included a summary of the Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) and the associated hydraulics and hydrology, an updated hydraulic study, detailed GIS mapping, landowner notification letters, etc. JDE worked together with the local floodplain administrator and the FEMA Region 8 reviewers to successfully design and permit the project. (LOMR case 18-08-1056P, approved April 1, 2019) Key Features: CLOMR/LOMR Permitting, major channel restoration, hydrologic modeling, GIS analysis, crossing replacement, working with local floodplain administrator and FEMA region.

Duchesne County | Dollar Ridge Emergency Watershed Protection

The purpose and scope of this project is to protect infrastructure and property along the Strawberry River and Timber Creek in Western Duchesne County. Damage due to flooding after the Dollar Ridge Fire was the primary focus of repair efforts. Work is beginning at the Pinnacles and Promised Land Resort area and extends past Timber Canyon (overlapping the Wasatch County portion) and includes stabilization measures, sediment removal, channel cleaning, debris cleanup, and miscellaneous related work in accordance with NRCS EWP guidelines. JDE has been able to design the project to utilize materials and in-kind value to provide the 25% match required by the County, eliminating any out of pocket expenses. Permitting scope included obtaining Stream Alteration Permits for early steps of construction, US Army Corps of Engineers Nationwide Permit



to work within the floodplain and Ordinary High Water Mark (even when there wasn't anything ordinary about it), license agreement from the Bureau of Reclamation, NRCS approvals, US Fish and Wildlife clearances, and Utah Division of Wildlife Resources coordination. In total, there are six municipalities including Santaquin, Payson, Salem, Elk Ridge, Woodland Hills, and Spanish Fork, as well as Utah County facilities. Annabella Town | Storm Water Master Plan/Flood Protection System and **Drainage Improvements**

This project included funding procurement, storm water master planning, an environmental assessment (EA), dam safety analysis and approvals, dam breach analysis, design, construction engineering, permitting, right-of-way, and easements. Improvements included two moderate hazard earthen flood detention basins with controlled flow concrete outlet structures, embankment, bank armor, riprap, multiple reinforced concrete cross gutters, surface ditch, shoulder grading and armor, and a concrete emergency canal spillway structure. The analysis for the debris basins included hydrology and hydraulics to meet Utah Dam Safety criteria, which includes Hydrometeorological Report No. 49 (HMR 49) and state specific precipitation studies. Hydrologic modeling was completed using HEC-HMS for the hydrology. The dam breach analysis was completed which include development of the breach hydrograph using HEC-HMS and routing the flood downstream using Flo-2D. Dam breach inundation mapping was prepared which was used in the Emergency Action Plan (EAP). The design reports, final design construction documents, and construction oversight was completed in close coordination and

with reviews and approvals by Utah Dam Safety; as well as other agencies including the CIB, NRCS, BLM, Utah Division of Water Rights, USACE, Annabella Town, and property owners. Upon completion of the debris basins an Operation and Maintenance (O&M) manual and an Emergency Action Plan (EAP) was developed and provided to Utah Dam Safety and Annabella Town.

JDE will work with Springville City and the NRCS to develop an accepted and approved Plan-EA within the proposed schedule and fee.



APPROACH

Understanding of the Project and Project Approach

In June of 2021, the Pack Creek Fire burned approximately 9,000 acres in the mountains 14 miles southeast of Moab in San Juan and Grand counties. Following the fire, the Burned Area Emergency Response (BAER) Team sampled sites to evaluate soil changes caused by the fire. They collected information on ground cover, canopy consumption, intact roots, and water repellency to better understand soil burn severity. The analysis showed that 49% of the burned area was at a moderate level and 2% at a high level. Areas located downstream from moderate and high soil burn severity may experience increased rates of erosion, debris flows, and surface run-off following short-duration, high-intensity rainfall events.

As a result, the County is seeking funding from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), working with the State Division of Emergency Management (DEM) through their Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP). We understand that Utah DEM has set aside Fire Management Assistance Grants (FMAG) funding specifically to address potential community hazards and threats related to this fire.



The application process for FEMA's HMGP funds is generally a two-part process:

- 1. Funding application: The funding application requires an environmental assessment, approximately a 30% engineering design to determine the hazards and threats as a result of the changed environmental conditions, and a benefit-cost analysis (BCA) to determine if the cost associated with the risk of doing nothing is greater than the cost of the proposed mitigation.
- 2. Engineering and Construction: Once the funding application is authorized, design is carried through completion and the mitigation improvements are constructed.


Having completed several FEMA funded projects, including a debris basin through the HMGP with FMAG funds in 2019-2020 that was impacted by a large wildfire, we have developed key objectives that will be applied in our approach to this project.


- 1. Strength of the Application. The FEMA authorization process can be time consuming. After the application is submitted, FEMA will review the application and prepare a Request for Information (RFI) to clarify questions about the application or ask for additional information. Preparing a strong application on the first submittal will decrease the information exchange process. Our past experience has given us an insight into the information they look for.
- 2. Leverage Funding. We understand that most public agencies haven't financially planned for an emergency event, so balancing affordability with maximizing the funding for the necessary mitigation efforts is key to a successful project.
 - The application requires a sufficient level of design and environmental review to develop the costs of the proposed measures and
 determine their viability; the expense for this work is reimbursable if the application is approved. Our approach is to complete
 enough design and environmental analysis to have a quality application but not go further than is necessary until funding is received.
 - During the design, we will look for opportunities to use in-kind contributions from the county to offset the 25% match requirement.
 This not only makes the project more affordable to the county, but also shows investment in the project and strengthens the overall funding application.
 - We will investigate other funding sources that could be used as 25% match. This could include local funds, or funding from other agencies such as the NRCS.
- 3. Budget Control. We understand that there is a set amount of funding available, so our goal is to manage the overall project budget through sound mitigation development and engineering. The total project budget also needs to fit the county's affordability criteria for the 25% local match. Through our design and bidding, we will proactively look for ways for the County to provide in-kind material and/or labor costs to count toward the match requirement. We have come up with creative measures to do this on many projects, including the Montezuma Canyon EWP that was completed in 2016 for San Juan County.

- 4. Documentation. We use in-house staff to help track project documents including in-kind work, project progress updates to FEMA, and funding reimbursements to relieve this burden from the county. Our previous experience with FEMA funding applications will help streamline the process and reduce risk to budget and schedule.
- 5. Environmental Assessment. Our team includes in-house environmental staff with extensive experience in federal funding applications and requirements. We will use publicly available data as much as possible to complete the required environmental assessment.
 - A cultural resource survey will be required to comply with the National Historic Preservation Act requirements of the application.
 - A preliminary review of listed species in the area suggests that field surveys will not be required for compliance with the Endangered Species Act.





The FEMA process can be time consuming and cumbersome to negotiate. However, through our relationship with the Utah DEM and experience with FEMA funded projects, our project goal will be:


Partner with the county and Utah DEM to traverse, guide and mentor through the process so that the county is comfortable with the outcome and confident in communicating with all stakeholders.

To accomplish the outlined project approach and achieve the project goal, we propose the following specific scope of services:

Scope of Services

Funding Phase - Pre-Design and Planning Services

- Vendor who will assist the County in developing the San Juan County Hazard Mitigation Program-Pack Creek Fire Grant Packet. Working in conjunction with the Utah Division of Emergency Management (DEM) Liaison, the San Juan County Emergency Manager, Watershed Management; Floodplain Administrator; Planner; and Chief Administrative Officer.
- Vendor will be responsible for completing the FEMA Benefit-Cost Analysis.
- Assist in final development of a project grant application and packet will need to be complete and submitted to the State of Utah Department of Emergency Management

Specific tasks for the application scope include:

Task 1. Kickoff Meeting and Data Collection.

JDE will begin the project by holding a kickoff meeting. The project goals and priorities will be established related to mitigating flood risk due to the fire with the county. Information collected will include requirements from the funding application as well as information related to the site and design. JDE will also collect data for the analysis and design such as land ownership, hydrology and hydraulics, environmental, and geotechnical.

Task 2: Review Funding Application and Assignments.

JDE will work with the County, the Utah Division of Emergency Management, and FEMA to complete the HMGP Wildfire application to secure the funding needed for design of the proposed debris catch basin on Pack Creek. JDE has successfully submitted several applications for FEMA BRIC funding through FEMA GO in the past couple of years. JDE's familiarity with FEMA GO and

relationships with the Utah DEM will enable us to complete the application efficiently.

Task 3: Field Survey.

We will complete a topographic survey of the project area to supplement the elevation data collected during the Spanish Valley Water and Sewer project. The survey will include the topography of the site as well as utilities and other features which could impact the project.

Task 4: Hydrologic and Hydraulics Analysis.

A hydrologic study will be conducted to determine the peak flow rate and runoff volumes resulting from the post-fire condition of the Pack Creek watershed. The flood hydrographs will be developed and modeled in HEC-HMS. The debris basin will be sized by routing the resulting hydrograph through the debris basin. Additionally, this information will be used to develop a hydraulic model that will be used to model the breach of the debris basin dam. This will help determine the dam hazard classification and what level of design will be required. The sizing and design of the debris basin will be based on reducing the peak flows from the watershed to an acceptable level that can be handled downstream.

Task 5: Identify Project Mitigation Improvements.

In addition to a debris basin, other mitigation measures may be recommended. These could include improvements in the watershed to aid in watershed recovery, reduce sediment/debris loads from the watershed, or to improve conveyance

through the natural channels. Downstream improvements could include channel and crossing improvements. The overall flood control system will be considered, and improvements will be balanced to provide overall protection considering the long-term goals of the county and the overall cost and impact of the project.

Task 6: Environmental Assessment.

We will complete the environmental requirements outlined in the FEMA application items A-J. The cultural resource survey will be completed by local archaeological subconsultants.

Task 7: Opinion of Probable Project Costs.

The opinion of probable cost will consider design and construction of all proposed improvements, including permitting. In addition, JDE will investigate and strategize with the county on how best to develop the match for the project. This could include contributing in-kind match (donating land, riprap, etc.) or assisting in part of the construction. Other funding sources will also be investigated.

Task 8: Benefit-Cost Analysis.

Experienced JDE staff will complete a BCA that evaluates flood conditions with and without the proposed project in order to demonstrate the reduction in flood damage. Flood inundation models will be developed for recurrence interval storms to evaluate the flood damage. To be efficient in the analysis, the same model used for the dam breach analysis will be used. Flood depths will be estimated at each structure and used to estimate flood damages in the economics analysis. Other potential economic impacts could include utilities, agricultural areas, and recreation. The BCA is one of the main reasons funding applications are rejected, which is why our experience completing BCAs for this specific funding opportunity is critical to the success of the project.

Task 9: Permissions and Easements.

JDE will work with the county to establish and coordinate permissions and easements related to the construction and long-term management of the proposed measures. Land costs are paid for by FEMA through the HMGP program. One requirement for the funding application is that all land requirements are agreed upon before the application is submitted. Generally, this is accomplished by providing letters from landowners stating that they are willing to work with the county on easements and purchases of land.

Task 10: Finalize and Submit Application.

The funding application will be finalized and submitted through FEMA GO. In our experience, Utah DEM is very helpful in answering questions and making suggestions to strengthen funding applications. Utah DEM typically provides at least one round of comments and suggestions before the application is finalized and submitted for funding consideration. The documentation for the application will include a description of the project, an engineering report, an environmental report, cost estimates, a project implementation schedule, and a BCA report.

Preconstruction Engineering

- •Design and development of full specifications, project manual and construction documents for a debris catch basin at the junction of the Cut-off Road in the Spanish Valley-San Juan County. This debris basin will be located on SITLA land. Permissions and easements will need to be obtained for the project.
- Assist with project management.
- Create bid documents
- Assist with awarding a contractor.

Task 1: Geotechnical Investigation.

JDE will conduct a geotechnical investigation of the site and provide testing results and recommendations in a geotechnical report. The geotechnical investigation will focus on the feasibility and design of the debris basin embankments and related infrastructure.

Task 2: Complete Design.

Design drawings will be developed and provided at 30%, 60%, and 90% design levels and shared with the county for review and approval. Permits with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and Utah Division of Water Rights will be acquired. Upon final approval of the proposed design, contract documents including construction drawings, specifications, and a bid schedule and engineers estimate at the 90% review will be prepared.

Task 3: Submit and Approval with Utah Dam Safety

The results of the hydrologic and hydraulic analysis and preliminary design drawings will be documented and shared with Utah Dam Safety to determine the dam hazard class for the debris basin. Depending on the resulting dam hazard classification, either a small dam application will be submitted or a formal dam plan review will be submitted to Utah Dam Safety for review and approval.

Task 4: Final FEMA and Utah DEM Approvals.

Engineering design reports and the construction documents will be provided to FEMA and Utah DEM for review and approval. To aid in the review and approval process, JDE will submit these items as they are completed for review to expedite the process and reduce the risk of changes later in the project. Our experience in working closely with FEMA and Utah DEM on similar projects will help us to provide the right information and quickly move through the review and approval process.

Task 5: Contractor Procurement. (Include contractor prequalification)

JDE will assist the County with contractor procurement. We will advertise and assist with the process to select a contractor that is familiar with this type of project. We recommend a contractor prequalification process to select a pool of qualified contractors to bid on the project. Conduct pre-bid meeting and answer questions during bidding process. Review bids prepare a bid tab and make a contractor recommendation.





PROPOSED SCHEDULE

The following proposed schedule is an option to accelerate the project in hopes of completing construction in the late fall of 2022. We will work with FEMA and Utah DEM early on to establish the design criteria and approach in an attempt to reduce the review time or give us an opportunity to continue the design during the application review by FEMA. This schedule is dependent on FEMA allowing design during their anticipated 6-month review period. This puts some risk on the designer and County since typically the funds are not reimbursed until the application is approved. We believe that coordinating up front with FEMA on the proposed design criteria for the debris basin during the application process could help make this possible.



However, should that schedule not be an option, the Final Design and Construction Documents Phase would be pushed back until the application was approved - pushing the construction into early 2023. The overall duration of this phase would not change but would be shifted to accommodate for the FEMA funding application review process.



FEE SCHEDULE

The fee schedule is split into two phases: Funding & Analysis; and Final Design & Construction Documents. The proposed fee for each phase is shown below. Any adjustments to the scope of work would be handled on an hourly basis according to the attached hourly rates. Note that per the requirements in the RFP, the standard hourly rates are attached and include all personnel that could perform services on the project.

SUMMARY

As development continues to increase in the La Sal area of San Juan County, staff desires and finds a need to begin working with engineering firms who can assist in exploring the possibility of a public water system, not only for conservation efforts but also to get ahead of the development of more and more unregulated wells all utilizing the same water system. J-U-B Engineering has been selected to assist in this process of establishing a feasibility and alternatives for the County, including opportunities to assist in funding the study.

HISTORY/PAST ACTION

In September 2021, we solicited for Statements of Qualifications from interested engineering firms who can accomplish a feasibility study for the Community of La Sal, here in San Juan County.

Using the State of Utah Design Professional Services of Pre-Qualified/Approved Vendors process pursuant to Administrative Rule R33-5-105, I solicited three engineering firms and asked for a Statement of Qualifications along with an example of a feasibility study they had performed.

Once I had the statements and the example, I had multiple employees review the proposals and select the qualifications and example that they felt was the most responsive and of good quality for the study. J-U-B Engineering was the firm selected to continue in the negotiations of this process.

San Juan County desires to obtain the services of a professional and competent service provider to provide the contractual services under this contract.

San Juan County solicited qualifications from three certified and pre-approved licensed engineering firms using the State of Utah Design professional Services of Pre-Qualified/Approved Vendors pursuant to Administrative Rule R33-5-105,

San Juan County's Evaluation Committee selected the proposal and qualifications of J-U-B Engineering to propose a price to provide the feasibility assistance to the County and to act as the Service Provider if that fee met the requirements of R33-5-105; and

The Service Provider, who has represented to San Juan County that it is a competent and experienced service provider, the fee is below the threshold, and they desire to provide the contractual services under this contract.

The Service Provider, who has represented to San Juan County that it is a competent and experienced service provider and a licensed engineer in the State of Utah in accordance with Utah Code Title 58 Chapter 22, Professional Engineers and Professional Land Surveyors Licensing Act, desires to provide the contractual services under this contract.

The parties therefore agree as follows:

1. Scope of Services. The Service Provider agrees in summary as follows and detailed as Exhibit A:

- A. The scope of this study would be to consider the feasibility of a public drinking water system to serve the potable water needs of the residents of La Sal.
- B. The study will consider population projections, water source, distribution infrastructure, capital costs, operation and maintenance costs, system ownership and operation as well as potential funding options.
- C. The Service Provider and San Juan County staff will evaluate potential funding sources for the feasibility study. Resources include State, Federal and County funding possibilities.
- D. Participation and assistance in holding a minimum of two (2) public hearing meetings to disseminate information and receive public input.
- E. Evaluate current water sources at La Sal for feasibility of incorporating a public water system in the area.
- F. Research and propose viable options and alternatives for a water system including water shares/rights, ownership, capacity, water quality, source protection and locations for distribution points.
- G. Evaluate the potential for fire suppression and water storage.
- H. Provide up to 3 separate alternatives and viable options of systems, drainages and storage.
- I. Complete all modeling in a digital format with alternatives and mapping in GIS including pipe distributions sources, flows and sizing.
- J. Research existing water sources for feasibility of incorporation into a public system. Consider existing spring and wells. Surface water treatment considerations is not part of this scope.
- K. A hydraulic model will be created based on the proposed service area established. Modeling will include the existing demand and residents as well as a future scenario based on the 50-year projected population. Utah Division of Drinking Water standards will be used when evaluation minimum pressures, etc.
- L. Provide options for System Ownership and Management
- M. Proposed connection fees and water rates will be part of the funding plan.

2. Compensation.

- A. Upon the Service Provider's completion of its duties under section 1 of this contract, San Juan County will pay the Service Provider \$60,000.00.
- B. San Juan County shall mail its payment to the Service Provider within 30 days after the Service Provider completes its duties under section 1 of this contract, unless the parties agree, in writing, to alternative payment arrangements.

Item 10.

- C. Service Provider shall disclose its tax identification or Social Security number to San Juan County before a payment will be made by San Juan County to Service Provider.
- D. If this contract is terminated early, San Juan County will pay the Service Provider for the duties completed under section 1 of this contract through the date of early termination.
- E. The Service Provider is responsible for any taxes, contributions, assessments, or fees, which arise from payments made by San Juan County to the Service Provider.
- F. The Service Provider is responsible for paying all subcontractors, material providers, jobbers, or any other person who or entity that provides materials, services, equipment, utilities or otherwise at the request of Service Provider and in connection with or relating to this contract.
- 3. Effectiveness, Date, and Termination. This contract will become effective when all parties have signed it. The date of this agreement will be the date this agreement is signed by the last party to sign it (as indicated by the date associated with that party's signature). This contract will terminate on December 30, 2022 at 11:59 p.m.

4. Early Termination.

- A. San Juan County may terminate this contract if annual appropriations, as part of San Juan County's annual public budgeting process, are not made or are insufficient to pay the Service Provider. This termination will be effective at the time that San Juan County's notice is effective under section 8.
- B. San Juan County may terminate this contract due to its dissatisfaction with the Service Provider's services, which termination will be effective at midnight on the fifth day after San Juan County's notice is effective under section 8.
- C. San Juan County may terminate this contract for any reason, which termination will be effective at midnight on the 30th day after San Juan County's notice is effective under section 8.
- D. San Juan County may terminate this contact, which termination will be effective at the time San Juan County's notice is effective under section 8, if:
 - (1) The Service Provider engages in or permits any unlawful or disruptive conduct or any activity not permitted by law, regulation, ordinance, this contract, and/or the policies of San Juan County; and
 - (2) The Service Provider fails to immediately cease such conduct or activity after notification by law enforcement, San Juan County, or otherwise.
- E. Either party may terminate this contract after a material breach of this contract by the other party, which termination will be effective after the notice is effective under section 8.

5. Warranties.

- A. The Service Provider warrants to San Juan County that:
 - (1) All materials and equipment furnished under this contract shall be:
 - (a) New;
 - (b) Under manufacturer's warranty;
 - (c) Of reasonable quality; and
 - (d) Free from faults and defects; and
 - (2) All services performed under this contract shall:
 - (a) Be of reasonable quality;
 - (b) Conform with reasonable professional standards; and
 - (c) Conform to codes, regulations, and laws.
 - (d) Materials, Plans, Artwork, Drawings, Brochures, Maps, and Documents produced under this contract will be owned by San Juan County upon completion. San Juan County may use these items in future projects or opportunities as the County needs arise without written consent or authorization from any other party. Use or reuse of these items for any purpose other than intended by this Agreement shall be at San Juan County's sole risk.
- B. Service Provider shall correct or replace any materials or equipment that do not satisfy subsections 5.A.(1)(a)-(d) within 30 days after San Juan County's notice is effective under section 8.
- C. Service Provider shall correct any services performed that do not satisfy subsections 5.A.(2)(a)-(c) within 30 days after San Juan County's notice is effective under section 8.
- D. The parties acknowledge that the warranties set forth in Title 70A, Chapter 2, Part 3, Utah Code Annotated, apply to this contract.
- E. The Service Provider shall assign and deliver to San Juan County all manufacturers' warranties relating to the materials and equipment furnished under this contract as soon as reasonably possible, but in no event later than 10 days after this contract terminates.

- **6. Insurance**. The Service Provider shall maintain for the duration of this contract and for six years after the termin this contract, the following types of insurance:
 - A. A valid occurrence form commercial general liability insurance policy, which covers contractual liability and contractual agreements, with minimum limits as follows:
 - (1) Each occurrence \$1,000,000.00;
 - (2) Damage to Rented Premises \$300,000.00;
 - (3) Medical Exp. (Any one person) \$5,000.00;
 - (4) Personal and Adv. Injury \$2,000,000.00;
 - (5) General aggregate \$2,000,000.00; and
 - (6) Products Comp/Op aggregate \$2,000,000.00;
 - B. A valid automobile liability insurance policy that satisfies the minimum amounts required by Utah law; and
 - C. A valid Workers Compensation and Employers' Liability insurance policy with minimum limits as required by Utah law. If any proprietor, partner, executive, officer, member, or other person is excluded from the Workers Compensation and Employers' Liability insurance policy, the Service Provider shall provide San Juan County with the applicable state issued waiver.

For the duration of this contract and for six years after the termination of this contract, San Juan County may request the Service Provider to provide San Juan County with certificates or other records that demonstrate that the Service Provider is in compliance with the insurance requirements set forth in this section (the "Certificates/Records"). If the Service Provider fails to provide San Juan County with the requested Certificates/Records within three business days of San Juan County's request, San Juan County may immediately terminate this contract. If the Service Provider fails to have the insurances required by this contract, San Juan County may immediately terminate this contract.

- 7. Indemnification. With respect to any judicial, administrative, or arbitration action, suit, claim, investigation, or proceeding ("Proceeding") against San Juan County, San Juan County's officers, employees, agents, consultants, advisors, and other representatives, and each of their heirs, executors, successors, and assignees ("San Juan County Indemnitees") that arises out of this contract or the acts or omissions of Service Provider (each, a "Claim"), Service Provider shall, for the duration of this contract and for a period of six years after the termination of this contract, indemnify those San Juan County Indemnitees against any amount awarded in, or paid in settlement of any Proceeding, including interest ("Loss") and any out-of-pocket expense incurred in defending a Proceeding or in any related investigation or negotiation, including court filing fees, court costs, arbitration fees, witness fees, and attorneys' and other professionals' fees and disbursements ("Litigation Expense") (Loss and Litigation Expense means "Indemnifiable Losses") arising out of that Proceeding, except to the extent that San Juan County negligently or intentionally caused those Indemnifiable Losses.
- 8. Notices. All notices must be in writing and must be delivered personally, by a nationally recognized overnight courier, or by United States mail, postage prepaid and addressed to the parties at their respective addresses set forth below, and the same shall be effective upon receipt if delivered personally, on the next business day if sent by overnight courier, or three business days after deposit in the United States mail, if mailed. - 9. Independent Contractor. The Service Provider shall perform this contract as an independent contractor. The Service Provider acknowledges that it and its representatives are not employees of San Juan County, and, thus, have no right to and shall not be provided with any San Juan County benefits.
- 10. Conflict of Terms. In the event of any conflict between the terms of this contract and any documents referenced in this contract or incorporated into this contract by reference, including exhibits or attachments to this contract, this contract shall control.
- 11. Assignment Restricted. Except with the prior written consent of the other party, each party shall not transfer, including by merger (whether that party is the surviving or disappearing entity), consolidation, dissolution, or operation of law:
 - A. Any discretion granted under this contract;
 - B. Any right to satisfy a condition under this contract;

- C. Any remedy under this contract; or
- D. Any obligation imposed under this contract.

Any purported transfer in violation of this section will be void.

- **12. Waiver**. No waiver of satisfaction of a condition or nonperformance of an obligation under this contract will be effective unless it is in writing and signed by the party granting the waiver.
- 13. Entire Contract; Amendment. This contract, including all attachments, if any, constitutes the entire understanding between the parties with respect to the subject matter in this contract. Unless otherwise set forth in this contract, this contract supersedes all other agreements, whether written or oral, between the parties with respect to the subject matter in this contract. No amendment to this contract will be effective unless it is in writing and signed by both parties.
- **14. Governing Law; Exclusive Jurisdiction**. Utah law governs any Proceeding brought by one party against the other party arising out of this contract. If either party brings any Proceedings against the other party arising out of this contract, that party may bring that Proceeding only in a state court located in San Juan County, Utah (for claims that may only be resolved through the federal courts, only in a federal court located in Salt Lake City, Utah), and each party hereby submits to the exclusive jurisdiction of such courts for purposes of any such proceeding.
- **15. Severability.** The parties acknowledge that if a dispute between the parties arises out of this contract or the subject matter of this contract, the parties desire the court to interpret this contract as follows:
 - A. With respect to any provision that it holds to be unenforceable, by modifying that provision to the minimum extent necessary to make it enforceable or, if that modification is not permitted by law, by disregarding that provision; and

Public Drinking Water System Feasibility Study

Town of La Sal, Utah

Scope & Fee for Engineering Services

The scope of this study is to consider the feasibility of a public drinking water system to serve the potable water needs of the residents of La Sal. The study will consider population projections, water source, distribution infrastructure, capital costs, operation and maintenance costs, system ownership and operation as well as potential funding options. The following is a summary of the scope proposed by JUB for this study.

Planning

- Use state planning resources, the US census and local real estate data to create population projections for a 50-year planning window.
- Evaluate potential service area for a new system. Cost will be a primary consideration when establishing the extent of a future system.
- Use Utah Division of Drinking Water guidelines for estimating water demand requirements.
- Public involvement will be part of the planning process. The assumption is that 2 public meetings will be held. Other options for disseminating information and receiving public input will be provided.

Source

- Research existing water sources for feasibility of incorporation into a public system. Consider
 existing spring and wells. Surface water treatment considerations is not part of this scope. The

Distribution System

- A hydraulic model will be created based on the proposed service area established. Modeling will
 include the existing demand and residents as well as a future scenario based on the 50-year
 projected population. Utah Division of Drinking Water standards will be used when evaluation
 minimum pressures, etc. Modeling will include:
 - Peak instantaneous demand
 - o Fire flow

Storage

- Equalization, fire suppression and emergency storage will all be considered. Equalization and fire suppression will be based on Utah Division of Drinking Water guidelines. Emergency storage will be based on engineering judgement and local input.
- Location will be based on elevation and location relative to proposed distribution. The assumption will be ground level storage.

Alternatives

- Up to 3 separate alternatives will be brought forward.
- Alternatives will include water source, distribution system and storage. Mapping will be

- Cost estimates in current dollars will be prepared for each alternative.

System Ownership and Management



Oakley Secondary Water System Feasibility Study Oakley City, Utah

Background. Oakley City has had a major influx of growth, which has put substantial stress on their culinary system. Residents are using drinking water on their lawns and gardens even when they have available irrigation shares.

Solutions. J-U-B was able to assist the city in obtaining a System Optimization Grant from the US Bureau of Reclamation along with a planning grant from the Utah Board of Water Resources to perform a secondary water system feasibility study. The feasibility study allowed the City to assess their culinary system and review available secondary water sources that could provide relief to the culinary system. Henefer Town Secondary Water Master Plan & Feasibility Study - Henefer Town, Utah

Background. Henefer is a small rural town in Summit County. The population is estimated to be 871, with about 300 residential units. There has been significant population change for this little town, with the population having increased by 37% in the past 10 years. In spring 2018, the Town put a moratorium on any new connections to the Town's culinary water system and that moratorium is still in place. Within just a few weeks of passing the moratorium in 2018, the Town had over eight subdivision proposals submitted for consideration, which means multiple new residential homes will want to use culinary water for outdoor use. The additional demands put strain on a system already affected by drought.

Solutions. To study the demand, supply, sources, and needs of the system, J-U-B obtained \$55,000 from the US Bureau of Reclamation to conduct a System Optimization Review. The study also analyzed the feasibility of implementing a secondary water system in the Town to protect its drinking water supply. A funding plan was developed to help the Town design and construct solutions.

Benefits. J-U-B helped the Town receive \$1,500,000 from the USBR WaterSMART: Water and Energy Efficiency Grant program to install a pressurized irrigation system with piping and a storage pond. Secondary Water System Feasibility Study South Willard Water Company

Background. The South Willard Water Company (SWWC) provides drinking water to their agricultural community in southern Box Elder County. High-quality drinking water was being used for irrigation purposes and residents operated their own individual wells, inefficient pumps, and unmanaged open ditches. Growth in the area intensified these issues and there is no municipality to govern water use or system ownership.


Solutions. SWWC asked J-U-B to help them obtain a \$25K grant from the US Bureau of Reclamation to fund a feasibility study to evaluate the potential of a pressurized secondary water irrigation system. Meeting USBR requirements, J-U-B conducted a feasibility study reviewing water rights, sources, demands, energy efficiency, and water conservation potential.

Benefits. The study determined that a pressurized irrigation system would more efficiently use water and power. J-U-B also helped facilitate governance and management under the Weber-Box Elder Conservation District. With those questions resolved, J-U-B designed a pressure irrigation system which included nearly 14,000 feet of PVC pipe ranging from 4" to 14". Being in a heavily-used existing utility corridor along the UDOT right-of-way, construction required 100 linear feet of crossing under UDOT roads with a 20" steel casing and HDPE carrier pipe. J-U-B also sited and designed a new well and chlorination improvements for the drinking water system.

Water Study and System Improvements Coalville City, Utah

Background. J-U-B completed a water system master plan and USDA-RD Preliminary Engineering Report (PER) for Coalville City to address deficiencies in their water system and provide alternatives and recommendations to address their needs for the next 20+ years.

A key need of this study was to diversify their water sources and capitalize on their water rights in the Weber River Basin. This effort included a detailed analysis of the City's water resources and associated water rights. The selected recommendation includes the addition of storage capacity, construction of a membrane treatment facility to handle both shallow groundwater and surface water, and a series of distribution system improvements with an associated cost estimate of \$8.7M.

Solutions. Coalville's ability to fund the project was considered during the selection of alternatives proportional to the life cycle cost of the project. Alternatives with a lower life cycle cost (capital cost and operation and maintenance costs) were preferred and ultimately recommended. J-U-B helped the City secure \$8M in grant and loan from USDA- Rural Development to implement solutions including added storage capacity, a membrane treatment facility to handle both shallow groundwater and surface water, and distribution system improvements.

Benefits. J-U-B designed and is overseeing construction of a 600,000 gallon water storage tank and 30,000 feet of distribution system, a new well, river pump station, and membrane water treatment plant.

Liberty Pipeline Company Water Master Plan Liberty, Utah

Background. Rapid growth in Liberty prompted the need for the Liberty Water Master Plan. The Liberty Pipeline board members were concerned that the existing water sources couldn't keep up with the current and future needs.

Solutions. J-U-B analyzed the overall system and determined that the system was deficient for source, because their largest source was physically located near the lowest pressure zone and was unable to supply the upper zones. One of the projects identified was to install a booster pump station to move water from the lowest pressure zone to the highest pressure zone, thus providing the ability to provide source to the entire system. J-U-B collected water use data from source records, as well as individual water meters. We built a hydraulic model in InfoWater and the data was used to determine the amount of supply needed for the system, and also identifies the demands used in the model.

Benefits. J-U-B identified 15 projects totaling just over \$10,000,000 in the master plan. This data is already collected in GIS and is being used to implement improvements. J-U-B was also able to include a section in the Master Plan on Drought Resiliency which allows Liberty to apply for a Drought Resiliency Grant through the Bureau of Reclamation.

West Corinne Water Company Box Elder County, Utah

Background. The West Corinne Water Company is a privately held culinary water company serving a larger area than any other system in Box Elder County but with only 1,100 connections. Several aspects of the system needed upgrades and improvements due to deterioration.

- » The system was unable to provide adequate fire suppression due to an insufficient number of hydrants and inadequate fire flow.
- » Because of saltwater intrusion into the aquifer, only the extreme northern end of the system is in an adequate location to provide drinkable water from an existing well. Flow rates from that well had declined over the years.
- » The system storage was insufficient to meet the needs of the system.

Solutions. J-U-B prepared a hydraulic model, master plan, and funding study to evaluate the capacity and needs of the West Corinne Water Companies system. The study addressed system capacity, fire flow, storage, and source. A Preliminary Evaluation Report (PER) and Environmental Report were prepared to meet USDA Rural Development standards.

Benefits. With the plan in place, J-U-B assisted West Corinne in securing \$3.6M in a low interest loan from USDA Rural Development. Construction included multiple components to address each need:

- » Over 50,000 feet of 8-inch and 12-inch distribution line was installed in existing roadways to improve flow rates and replace deteriorating lines throughout the system. Over 100 fire hydrants were added to the system with this project.
- » The existing well without saltwater intrusion was rehabilitated to double production.
- » A new 1,000,000 gallon reinforced concrete water storage tank was constructed adjacent to the existing well to provide much needed storage for equalization, fire protection and emergency situations.
