COMPLAINT

NOW COME Plaintiffs Roger G. Miller, Erik A. Thelen, and Belle R. Ragins (collectively, "Plaintiffs"), by their attorneys, Rohde Dales LLP, and for their complaint against the City of Sheboygan Plan Commission and the City of Sheboygan Zoning Board of Appeals, allege as follows:

- 1. Plaintiff Roger G. Miller ("Miller") is an adult individual whose address is 202 Pioneer Road. Sheboygan, Sheboygan County, Wisconsin 53081.
- 2. Plaintiffs Erik A. Thelen ("Thelen") and Belle R. Ragins ("Ragins"), a married couple, are adult individuals whose address is 4933 Evergreen Drive, Sheboygan, Sheboygan County, Wisconsin 53081.
- 3. Plaintiff John E. Ehmann ("Ehmann") is an adult individual whose address is 231 Edgewater Road. Sheboygan. Sheboygan County, Wisconsin 53081.
- 4. Plaintiffs Kenneth J. Lisberg and Deborah A. Lisberg ("Lisbergs") are adult individuals whose address is 415 Timberlake Road. Sheboygan, Sheboygan County, Wisconsin 53081.
- 5. Plaintiffs Gregory P. Hopkins ("Hopkins") and Toni J. DeStefano ("DeStefano") are adult individuals whose address is 346 Edgewater Road. Sheboygan. Sheboygan County. Wisconsin 53081.

- Defendant City of Sheboygan Plan Commission ("Plan Commission") is a public board that is duly constituted, organized, and existing under the laws of the State of Wisconsin.

 Wis. Stat. § 62.23(1), and the City of Sheboygan Code of Ordinances, having the duties and responsibilities described therein.
- 7. Defendant City of Sheboygan Zoning Board of Appeals ("BOA") is a public board that is duly constituted, organized, and existing under the laws of the State of Wisconsin. Wis. Stat. § 62.23(7)(e), and the City of Sheboygan Code of Zoning Ordinances ("Zoning Ordinances"), having the duties and responsibilities described therein.
- 8. Miller owns a residential property with an address of 324 East Center Avenue, Unit #4. Sheboygan, Wisconsin 53081. This residential property is located in the City of Sheboygan.
- 9. On December 15, 2020, Kohler Company ("Kohler") was granted a conditional use permit ("CUP") by the Plan Commission to build a golf course just north of Kohler-Andrae State Park between the Black River and Lake Michigan.
- 10. Thelen and Ragins live approximately three quarters of one mile north of the proposed golf course.
 - 11. Miller lives approximately one third of a mile north of the proposed golf course.
 - 12. Ehman lives approximately one fourth of a mile north of the proposed golf course.
- 13. Lisbergs live directly adjacent to the northern boundary of the proposed golfcourse.
- 14. Hopkins and DeStefano live approximately one-fourth of a mile north of the proposed golf course.
- 15. The CUP, by its very terms, was ostensibly "tolled" until the time that all litigation regarding Kohler's ability to construct the golf course concluded.

- The CUP also required, again by its very terms, that any revised site plans be submitted to the Plan Commission as a new application for a new CUP and approval prior to the commencement of construction.
- 17. The CUP's terms further mandate that Kohler obtain all necessary permits, including but not limited to a wetland fill permit.
- 18. On December 5, 2023, the Wisconsin Court of Appeals issued a ruling in the final remaining legal action pending relating to Kohler's legal ability to construct the golf course.
- 19. In that case, the court of appeals upheld the denial of Kohler's application for a wetland-fill permit from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources.
- 20. By the terms of the CUP and the apparent interpretation of City of Sheboygan.

 Ordinance 105=998(i) by the Plan Commission, Kohler's CUP would expire if Kohler did not commence construction of the golf course within 365 days of December 5, 2023.
- 21. On November 12, 2024, the Plan Commission heard a petition from Kohler to extend the life of the CUP for an additional year.
- 22. The site plans submitted to the Plan Commission by Kohler with its application for the CUP in 2020 require amendments, for a variety of reasons, including but not limited to environmental changes caused by the changing water levels of Lake Michigan and the denial of a wetland fill permit.
- 23. Kohler did not submit new plans for the construction of the golf course prior to the Plan Commission's November 12, 2024, hearing to extend the 2020 CUP.
- 24. Miller spoke at the November 12, 2024, Plan Commission hearing in opposition to Kohler's application for a one-year extension of the CUP.
- 25. Ragins has a disability protected by the Americans with Disabilities Act ("ADA").

- 26. The posted agenda for the November 12, 2024, Plan Commission hearing did not list public comments; however, public comments were allowed.
- 27. The agenda instructed individuals with disabilities to contact the City Development Department for accommodations and required remote participants to request access at least 24 hours in advance.
- 28. Ragins followed these instructions, submitting an ADA request via phone and email.
- 29. Ellise Rose ("Rose"), the Associate Planner responsible for ADA compliance, confirmed in writing that she believed the Chair of the Commission would be allowing public comment in the meeting and that the public comment should be available to people attending virtually.
- 30. Ragins also left a voicemail with the City of Sheboygan Mayor's office. reiterating her request and the city's legal obligation under the ADA.
 - 31. Rose then provided Ragins with a Microsoft Teams link for the meeting.
- 32. During the November 12, 2024, Plan Commission hearing, Ragins began speaking through the Microsoft Teams application during the public-comment portion of the hearing.
- 33. The Plan Commission told Ragins that she was not allowed to speak because she was not physically present at the hearing; told Ragins that online participants may only silently watch the hearing; and muted her audio, preventing Ragins from making her oral objections to Kohler's application for a one-year extension of the CUP and claimed that Ragins needed to be in person to convey her statement to the Plan Commission.
- 34. Beyond being denied the opportunity to speak, Ragins was also unable to observe the meeting, as the Microsoft Teams cameras remained off, restricting her to audio-only access.

- 35. John Belanger ("Belanger"), a member of the Plan Commission, is an employee of Kohler.
- 36. Despite being a Kohler employee and having a conflict of interest. Belanger did not recuse himself from the vote on Kohler's application for a one-year extension of the CUP.
- 37. Belanger openly voiced strong support for and ultimately voted in favor of the Kohler's application for a one-year extension of the CUP.
- 38. On November 12, 2024, the Plan Commission granted Kohler's application for a one-year extension of the CUP.
- 39. On December 16, 2024. Miller paid the filing fee and filed with the BOA a written appeal of the Plan Commission's decision to grant Kohler's application for a one-year extension of the CUP.
- 40. Miller's written appeal is attached as Exhibit A and is hereby fully incorporated in this complaint by reference.
- 41. In response to Miller's appeal, Kevin Sampson ("Sampson"), the chairman of the BOA, wrote a letter to Miller, stating that BOA did not have authority to hear Miller's appeal,
- 42. Sampson's letter is attached as Exhibit B and is hereby fully incorporated in this complaint by reference.
- 43. Upon information and belief, City Attorney Charles Adams ("Adams") "ghost wrote" the Sampson letter.
- 44. Adams orally advised the Plan Commission during the November 12, 2024. hearing on Kohler's application for a one-year extension of the CUP.
- 45. It was inappropriate for Adams to advise both the Plan Commission and the BOA.

 Because BOA was asked to review a decision of the Plan Commission. Adams should have referred the BOA and Sampson to other legal counsel to respond to Miller's appeal.

Document 3

CLAIM FOR RELIEF: COMMON LAW WRIT OF CERTIORARI AGAINST THE PLAN COMMISSION

- Plaintiffs re-allege and incorporate all preceding paragraphs as if fully set forth herein.
- Wisconsin Statute § 62.23(7)(de)5, and City of Sheboygan Ordinance 102-998(n) only create an avenue for the applicant for a conditional use permit to appeal if its application for a conditional use permit is denied.
- 48. Plaintiffs are not applicants for a conditional use permit and are challenging the actions of the Plan Commission in granting an extension of Kohler's CUP.
- If there are no specific statutory rules or City of Shebovgan ordinances governing Plaintiffs' challenge of the Plan Commission's actions, Plaintiffs' claims are governed by the common-law writ of certiorari.
- 50. The CUP had already expired at the time that the Plan Commission ostensibly granted a one-year extension of the CUP, and thus the Plan Commission acted without authority.
- Additionally, even if the CUP had not expired prior to November 12, 2024, the 51. Plan Commission's decision to grant Kohler's one-year extension of the CUP was deficient, was erroneous, was arbitrary, was oppressive, was unreasonable, was based on incorrect theories of law, included the vote of a member who had a conflict of interest due to his employment with Kohler, was not supported by the evidence, and represented the Plan Commission's will and not its judgment.

FIRST ALTERNATIVE CLAIM FOR RELIEF: STATUTORY WRIT OF CERTIORARI AGAINST THE BOA

Plaintiffs re-allege and incorporate all preceding paragraphs as if fully set forth herein.

- 53. Wisconsin Statute § 62.23(7)(e) grants boards of appeals broad authority to review the decisions of municipal actors as those decisions apply to a municipality's zoning ordinances.
- 54. Wisconsin Statute § 62.23(7)(de)5. and City of Sheboygan Ordinance 102-998(n) only create an avenue for the applicant for a conditional use permit to appeal if its application for a conditional use permit is denied.
- 55. Plaintiff's are not applicants for a conditional use permit and are challenging the authority of granting of a conditional use permit, and thus the BOA has jurisdiction to hear Miller's appeal under the broad statutory grant of authority to BOA pursuant to Wisconsin Statute § 62.23(7)(e).
- 56. BOA's failure to hear Miller's appeal was deficient, was erroneous, was arbitrary, was oppressive, was unreasonable, was based on incorrect theories of law, was based on advice made through legal counsel who had a conflict of interest, was not supported by any evidence, and represented Sampson's (or Adams's) will and not the judgment of BOA.
- 57. Pursuant to Wisconsin Statute § 62.23(7)(e)10.a., the Court has authority to issue a writ of certiorari overturning BOA's decision.

SECOND ALTERNATIVE CLAIM FOR RELIEF: COMMON-LAW WRIT OF CERTIORARI AGAINST THE BOA

- 58. Plaintiffs re-allege and incorporate all preceding paragraphs as if fully set forth herein.
- 59. If the Court finds that Plaintiffs do not have an avenue pursuant to Wisconsin law to seek a writ of certiorari against the BOA, then the common law provides such an avenue.
- 60. And again, BOA's failure to hear Miller's appeal was deficient, was erroneous, was arbitrary, was oppressive, was unreasonable, was based on incorrect theories of law, was

based on advice made through legal counsel who had a conflict of interest, was not supported by any evidence, and represented Sampson's (or Adams's) will and not the judgment of BOA.

THIRD ALTERNATIVE CLAIM FOR RELIEF: COMMON-LAW WRIT OF MANDAMUS AGAINST THE BOA

- 61. Plaintifts re-allege and incorporate all preceding paragraphs as if fully set forth herein.
- 62. Sampson's letter ostensibly denying Miller's appeal was not an actual decision of BOA, as Miller's appeal was not considered by the whole BOA nor was it voted on by the members of BOA.
- 63. As outlined in this complaint, Miller has a clear legal right to have his appeal heard by BOA because he timely filed the written appeal and paid the mandatory filing fee.
- 64. Wisconsin state law and City of Sheboygan ordinances create a positive and plain duty on the part of BOA to hear Miller's appeal.
- d5. If the Court finds that the writ of certiorari is not a proper remedy in this matter, then Plaintiffs will have no adequate remedy, other than a writ of mandamus.
- 66. Without the granting of the writ of mandamus, Miller will be substantially damaged because he will have not had a chance to have his appeal heard by BOA, an appeal that he is legally entitled to have heard.

WHEREFORE, Plaintiffs Roger G. Miller, Erik A. Thelen, Belle R. Ragins, John E. Ehmann, Kenneth J. Lisberg, Deborah A. Lisberg, Gregory P. Hopkins and Toni J. DeStefano seek judgment against the Defendants as follows:

- A. That this Court issue a writ of certiorari against the Plan Commission declaring Kohler's CUP invalid;
 - B. In the alternative, that this Court issue a writ of certiorari invalidating BOA's decision to deny Miller's appeal and declaring Kohler's CUP invalid:

C. In the alternative, that this Court issue a writ of mandamus ordering BOA to hear Miller's appeal; and

D. For such other and further relief as the Court may deem just and proper.

Ladies and Gentlemen:

This application and petition requests that the City of Sheboygan Board of Appeals (Board) rescind the one-year time extension recently granted by the City of Sheboygan Plan Commission to the Conditional Use Permit (CUP) that had been issued to Kohler Company for the proposed golf course in Section 14, T 14 N, R 23 E in Sheboygan County. This application is made pursuant to Section 15.912 – Appeals of Zoning Interpretations of the City of Sheboygan Zoning Ordinance, and may be used jointly or severally by any other petitions regarding this issue.

The subject CUP had been issued to Kohler Company on December 15, 2020, approximately four years ago. Section 15.905(9) on page 283 – *Time Limits on Development of Conditional Use*, on page 283 of the Zoning Ordinance, states that:

The start of construction of any and all conditional uses shall be initiated within 365 days of their approval by the Plan Commission and shall be operational within 730 days. Failure to initiate development within this period shall automatically constitute a revocation of the conditional use." Any request for extension of time must be made prior to such revocation. Kohler's request for time extension is three years too late.

Because construction has not started, there was no CUP in effect for the Plan Commission to recently extend in time. The Plan Commission's recent granting of time extension was illegal.

Additional violations of Zoning Ordinance have been previously identified by petitioner Thelen's June 16, 2021, letter to Mayor Ryan Sorenson as well as verbally by the author during the November 12, 2024. Plan Commission meeting. That was preceded by the author's written comments to the Plan Commission dated December 10, 2020, that were verbally summarized at the December 15, 2020 Plan Commission meeting during which time the subject CUP was approved. Additionally, Pines Bach's December 14, 2020 twenty pages of Written Comments outlined in detail many defects in the CUP application. These documents, as well as Midwest Environmental Advocates December 12, 2020 comments, comprise Appendix A.

Kohler Company just recently requested this time extension in order to develop a new Site Plan for the proposed golf course that avoids any filling of wetlands because nearly six years ago (on March 15, 2019), the Wisconsin Division of Hearings and Appeals (DHA) REVERSED Kohler's permit with DNR to fill 3.7 acres of wetlands (refer to Appendix B) due to the extensive adverse environmental effects that would be caused by the project as a whole. And DNR's March 31, 2017. Endangered Resource Review (Appendix C) identifies some of the species at risk.

This petition also applies to the Board for adjudication regarding the numerous violations of Zoning Ordinance during review and Issue of the subject 2020 CUP that will need to be reviewed if Kohler Company applies for a new CUP, or for any other type of development that may be subsequently proposed.

The remainder of this document summarizes information necessary to make an informed decision in response to this application as well as responding to any other parties petitioning on the subject CUP.

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INTRODUCTION

In addition to identifying the specific portions of the City of Sheboygan Zoning Ordinance that are most pertinent to the proposed golf course project that have been violated, this petition offers recommendations for appropriate action by the Board. It also offers more general recommendations to the city on how to begin applying the Natural Resource Protection Regulations (Subchapter 15-5) of the Zoning Ordinance relevant to the subject land as well as future projects involving wetlands, woodland, and shorelands, and not affirm precedent for continuing to set them aside as has been consistently done throughout the city's involvement with the subject proposed development.

This may also be useful for the Planning Department now and in the future as they're required to interpret the city's Zoning Ordinances and advise the Plan Commission. Further, it briefs City of Sheboygan elected officials, commissioners, and employees on the background of this case so that similar violations of Zoning Ordinance might be avoided in the future. While many people may not realize, Wisconsin Statute Chapter 946.12 makes it clear that it's important to not ignore ordinances because that constitutes official misconduct, which is a Class 1 felony.

Proposed Golf Course Project Description

The development proposed by Kohler Company on the subject land is an 18-hole championship grade golf course. This would become the company's fifth course in the vicinity of Sheboygan which, along with The Bull at Pinehurst Farms nearby, would provide a sixth high grade course in the area. Together with five other courses around Sheboygan that are less challenging and are used by most local golfers, the proposed development would become the ninth golf course with 18 holes within 6 miles of downtown Sheboygan, and there are two additional nine-hole courses. Refer to Figure 1 – Golf Courses within 6 miles of Downtown Sheboygan. Appendix D provides additional information on these courses and how the state rates in attracting visiting golfers. All of these existing local courses were constructed in areas of formerly tilled agricultural land having predominantly clayey soils and involved few, if any, protected (by state law) wetlands.

In contrast, the proposed golf course location is comprised of mature mixed deciduous-coniferous forest, river flood fringe wetlands, and isolated wooded wetlands, all of which are Protected Natural Resources under City of Sheboygan Zoning Ordinances. Refer to Figure 2 – Proposed Golf Course Location. This project came under the jurisdiction of the City of Sheboygan Zoning Ordinances through Kohler's request for annexation of their land along with a substantial portion of the state park (refer to Figure 3).

The 2020 Site Plan for **the proposed <u>golf course covers the eastern 184 acres</u> of the approximately 247-acre sum of the area of the Tax Key Parcels that are outlined in red in** *Figure 4 – Tax Key Parcel Map* **and tabulated below:**

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This land has about 3/4's of a mile of Lake Michigan shoreline that is required by City Zoning Ordinance to remain in its "undisturbed state". The project is bounded by state park to the south and Black River and state park to the west, a large lot wooded residential subdivision to the north, and Lake Michigan shoreline to the east (refer to Figure 5 – State Property Map). Figure 6 shows the DNR mapped wetlands in the area, some of which are shown in the 2020 Site Plan to be filled, and woodlands would be clear cut adjacent to the wetlands that remain. The Site Plan also shows filling within the Flood Fringe of the Black River that is mapped in Figure 7, which is not allowable at either state or local levels of regulation:

The Site Plan for the course in the 2020 CUP is provided in Figure 8. It's described by Kohler to be a "minimalist" design that "may require more than 50% clear cut" as mentioned in the project's Environmental impact Report (EIR). However, the Site Plan indicates approximately 75% "clear cut" of the project's woodland area, which is highlighted in pink on Figure 9 – Annotated 2020 Site Plan.

Kohler advises that the proposed course location is "ideal" because it's near Riverdale Country Club, and admirably compares it to the publicly owned golf course at Peninsula State Park that was started about 100 years ago on previously deforested land. That location is perched high on top of the Niagara Escarpment in an area that contains no wetlands, and its edges are high above the rocky and erosion-resistant shoreline of Green Bay. It has little in common with the proposed course.

Although not shown in the 2020 Site Plans, the Initial Site Plans prepared by Kohler Company had shown quarry stone revelment along about 2/3's of the shoreline in segments along the area marked with dashed black line on Figure 4. Because a revetment of that scale would require an Individual Chapter 30 Permit with DNR and the Army Corps of Engineers, which would be a permitting obstacle in addition to those the golf course project already faced, that issue has been deferred by not showing revetments on subsequent plans. Photos in Appendix E show the extensive revetments along Whistling Straits. In the meantime, several portions of the 2020 Site Plan's course of play are located lakeward of the present Ordinary High Water Mark (O.H.W.M.), extending beyond Kohler's riparian property boundary and onto shoreline that is held in trust by the state:

Because Kohler's permit to fill over 40 small wetlands and some of wetland area comprising the east edge of the flood fringe of the Black River (summing to 3.7 acres) was "REVERSED" in 2019 by the State of Wisconsin Division of Hearings and Appeals (DHA), Kohler recently informed the Plan Commission they will soon provide a revised Site Plan that will avoid filling any wetlands. This plan would need to accommodate the present O.H.W.M., which is at the toe of the erosion scarp caused by the 2016 through 2022 high water level period. However, that is most for a golf course on the subject land for the reasons described in the next section.

SUMMARY OF ZONING ORDINANCE VIOLATIONS AND BASIS OF APPEAL

In addition to Plan Commission illegally recently extending the CUP for the course, the previous Planning Department staff had <u>violated the portions of the Zoning Ordinance most pertinent to the proposed use</u> and characteristics of the subject land.

Development of a <u>privately</u> owned golf course (defined as *Outdoor Institutional* for which use classifications are cited in *Table 15.204*: Land Uses in Permanently Protected Green Space, page 113 of the Zoning Ordinance) <u>is not permitted</u> either by right, Special Use, or Conditional Use. And according to the 2020 Site Plan, <u>the entirety (100%) of the planned course is Permanently Protected Green Space</u> consisting of either Wetland, Woodland, or Lakeshore, <u>none of which are allowed to be disturbed</u> according to Table 15.204 and Subchapter 15-5. Additionally, all of the land the table 15-204 and Subchapter 15-5.

As mandated by Table 15.204 as just described, a golf course on <u>privately</u> owned land is simply not allowable at the subject location. If the land was to be "publicly" owned (in this case by the city), its development could become allowable under CUP, but only if it dian't result in adverse environmental impacts. And that's not physically possible here.

In evaluation of the 2020 CUP application, the *Planning Department's Request for City Plan Commission Consideration* (refer to page 7 of Appendix F) Incorrectly treated the subject land that is <u>privately owned</u>, <u>as public</u>. Zoning Ordinance affords more latitude for any city owned golf courses that are meant to be closely accessible to residents and economical enough for much of the public to afford.

Subsection (4) Natural Resource and Green Space Regulations and Requirements of Section 15.205 – Regulations Applicable to All Land Uses (page 114) requires that: "All land use and/or development of land shall comply with the regulations and requirements of Subchapter 15-5 (refer to Appendix G), pertaining to the protection of sensitive natural resources and required green space areas. Such regulations and requirements address issues such as absolute protection, partial protection, and mitigation, which are directly related to, and a critical component of, the protection of natural resources and the protection of health, safety, and general welfare of the residents of the City of Sheboygan and its environs."

The city's Natural Resource Protection Regulations (Subchapter 15-5, pages 197 through 206) of the Zoning Ordinance are specifically regulated "overlays" as Permanently Protected Green Space. In spite of these overlay requirements being superior to all other layers of ordinance. The Plan Commission continues to set aside most of Subchapter 15-5 in the course of administering the subject CUP.

In order for the city to come into compliance with applicable zoning ordinances regarding the subject CUP, each of the following violations outlined below justify and necessitate the Board in rescinding the Plan Commission's November 12, 2024, action to extend its time limit:

- 1) Section 15.905(9) on page 283 Time Limits on the Development of Conditional Use requires that construction shall start within 365 days to start construction, and the use shall be operational within 730 days, neither of which has been met. Because it had always been anticipated by the city and applicant that the project faced a number of permitting hurdles and potential for lawsuits, in 2020 the Plan Commission should have instructed the applicant to defer application of the CUP until those were all resolved.
- 2) Section 15.008(2) on page 3 States that "no land shall be developed or used, and no structure erected or maintained in violation of any state or federal regulations". DNR Wetland Ecologist (Patricia Trochlell) during the Wisconsin Division of Hearings and Appeals (DHA) hearings that resulted in REVERSAL of Kohler's permit to fill some wetlands testifled (in Appendix B) that "the project would not be in compliance with either S. 281.36, Stats. or ch. NR 103, Adm. Code."
- Section 15.306 on pages 183 through 186 Detailed Instructions for Density and Intensity Regulations:
 - 15.306(1) For Both Residential and Nonresidential Development:
 - (a) Check Planning Recommendations for the Subject Property
 - Check Comprehensive Plan Recommendations City of Sheboygan Comprehensive Master Plans had never anticipated the subject land to be annexed.

- (b) Check the Zoning of the Subject Property Upon annexation, the Planning Department assigned SR-5 (single family dwellings on lots of at least 6,000 square feet) zoning to the subject land. Although the proposed land use being a golf course on privately owned land, which is an Outdoor Institutional Use (15.206(3)(d) on page 126), is an allowable Conditional Use in SR-5 zoning, see (c) below.
- Complete a Natural Resources Site Evaluation for the Site (pages 177 through 179): While recognizing 241 acres of the 247 acres of "proposed golf course property" is comprised of floodplain (58 acres), wetlands (6 acres), lakeshore (7 acres), woodlands (170 acres), the Worksheet (Exhibit 8 of the Planning Department's report "Request for City Plan Commission Consideration", In Appendix F. "subtracts portions of natural resources made developable by using approved environmental mitigation techniques" to provide a conclusion that the Net Developable Area (NDA) for the golf course is 172 acres. However, the only provision provided by Kohler Company is a proposed payment into DNR's wetland miligation fund for proposed filling of filling of just 3.7 acres of wetland. Correspondingly, the arithmetic on this Worksheet should have shown somewhere between 8 and 10 acres of NDA. However, the entire area of the 2020 Site Plan is Permanently Protected Green Space, providing an actual NDA of 3.7 acres by a proposed payment into a mitigation fund. But that doesn't make up for elimination of the globally rare interdunal wetlands being filled by this Site Plan. A "Corrected" Site Evaluation Worksheet tabulating conditions before any mitigation provisions are attributed is included in Appendix G, Indicating zero NDA.
- 4) Section 15.204 (pages 112 and 113, refer to Appendix H) <u>Table of Land Uses Permitted in Permanently Protected Green Space Areas</u> (page 113) <u>does not allow Conditional Uses</u> for Outdoor Institutional land use, as <u>a golf course on privately owned land</u> is classified, in wellands, woodlands, or lakeshore. Because these comprise entirety of the subject land, the proposed development was and is <u>not even eligible for any consideration</u> under a CUP, much less meeting the criteria for granting a CUP.
- 5) Section 15.205 Regulations Applicable to All Land Uses, Subsection (4) Natural Resources and Green Space Requirements (page 114. included in Appendix H): "All land use and/or development of land shall comply with all the regulations and requirements under Subchapter 15-5, pertaining to the protection of sensitive natural resources and required green space area. Such regulations and requirements address issues such as absolute protection, partial protection, and mitigation, which are directly related to, and a critical component of, the protection of natural resources and the protection of the health, safety, and general welfare of the residents of the City of Sheboygan and its evirons." The Planning Department's report to the Plan Commission for their consideration in issuing the subject CUP in 2020 functionally set these aside by misrepresenting how the regulations are to be applied.
- 6) Subchapter 15-5: Natural Resource Protection Regulations (pages 197 through 206, Appendix G): "The purpose of this Subchapter is to set forth the requirements for the mandatory protection of natural resources and permanently protected green space area within the jurisdiction of this Subchapter to ensure the implementation of the City of Sheboygan Comprehensive Master Plan and State of Wisconsin Statutes 62.231 and 87,30." Refer to Section 15.504 Wetland Overlay Zoning District, 15.505 Lakeshore Overlay Zoning District, 15.507 Woodland Overlay Zoning District, 15.508 Steep Slope Overlay Zoning District, and Section 15.509 Detailed Site Analysis, all of which were set aside by Issuing the subject CUP in 2020. The topography and pattern of wetlands, woodlands, and shoreline of the subject parcel is a globally rare and of regional significance and the woods have

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been left undisturbed long enough to have acquired a substantial degree of "old growth" ecologic functionality. <u>These characteristics fully warrant the degree of specific protection provided by the City of Sheboygan Subsection 15-5 Natural Resource Protection Overlay requirements</u>. And if not, no land that exists in Sheboygan County, or even the state, does.

- Section 15.905 Conditional Use Review and Approval (pages 279 through 284, Appendix I): "The purpose of this Section is to provide regulations which govern the procedure and requirements for the review and approval, or denial, of proposed conditional uses." 15,905(d) on page 280: "Under this Chapter, a proposed Conditional Use shall be denied unless the applicant can demonstrate, to the satisfaction of the City Plan Commission, that the proposed Conditional Use <u>will not create major undestrable impacts</u> on nearby properties, the environment, nor the community as a whole." The applicant has not demonstrated this. In fact, ecologist testimony in the DHA Reversal documents in detail myriad adverse impacts the proposed construction would have on the site's wetlands as well as the state park lands. To the neglect of this, Kohler's Environmental impact Report (EIR) for the Site Plan of the proposed golf course that was submitted to the Planning Department (under staff that are no longer present) for their review and recommendation to the Plan Commission admitted there would the "some" adverse impact. Based on the environmental attributes of the subject land as documented in the extensive appendix of the EIR, and my review of the Site Plan and familiarity of the land, it is my opinion as a Professional Environmental Engineer with extensive experience in site and community planning and environmental resource preservation, enhancement, and restoration design that the adverse impacts on the wetlands, woodlands, and shoreland of the subject property would be major. And Section 15.905(1)(d) on page 280 states that "a proposed Conditional Use shall be denied unless the applicant can demonstrate, to the satisfaction of the Plan Commission, that the proposed Conditional Use will not create major undestrable impacts on nearby properties, the environment, nor the community as a whole". The Division of Hearings and Appeals March 15, 2019, record (Appendix B) that Reversed Kohler's permit to fill some wetlands describes in detail the manner and degree of adverse environmental impact that clear cutting the woodlands adjacent to the wetlands would have. Further, "clear cutting" (see page 123) is only allowable under Section 15.206(2) - Agricultural Land Uses (not Outdoor Institutional), and only if it "will improve the level of environmental protection on the subject property". As documented in Appendices A and B, the proposed clear cutting will not improve the level of environmental protection.
- Section 15:905(11) on pages 283 and 284 require that "Modification, alteration, of expansion of any conditional use in violation as approved per (5)", which is Review by the Plan Commission and Public Hearing, "without approval by the Plan Commission, shall be arounds for revocation of said conditional use approval per (8)" (below) - Termination of an approved Conditional Use. During the November 12, 2024, Plan Commission meeting, Kohler Company reported that within several months they would be submitting to the Plan Commission a Site Plan that avoids filling any wetlands. Admirable as this may seem, the purpose is to avoid being held up any longer by the state. That's why they requested a time extension of one year of the CUP that had been granted in 2020. The scattered pattern of the Isolated wetlands that the new plan will be intended to avoid filling will require major modification and alteration of the Site Plan that had been approved by the Plan Commission in 2020. The Plan Commission's recent granting of time extension in effect approved Carte Blanche that a new Site Plan (which has yet to be seen) meets applicable ordinances, with the City Attorney instructing the Plan Commission that they must provide Kohler's requested extension. This circumvents the required certification by the Zoning Administrator affesting that a Site Plan meets all applicable requirements. Because the Plan Commission cannot legitimately approve something that doesn't yet exist, this by itself is firm basis to revoke the time extension granted by the Plan Commission.

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Section 15.905(8) on page 283 - Termination of an approved Conditional Use: states that "Any conditional use found not to be in compliance with the terms of this Chapter shall be considered in violation of this Chapter and shall be subject to all applicable procedures and penalties." Violations 1 through 8 above, in combination with Appendices A and B. clearly describe how the subject CUP is not in compliance.

Appealing to the Board and How the Appellants and Others Are Aggrieved

The subject appeal is being brought to the Board primarily by those living closest to the subject land that would be most directly affected by a development that violates applicable zoning ordinances. And from familiarity with the area, the appellants may be more environmentally aware of the adverse effects of habitat destruction and lakeshore encroachment than some urban residents. However, the proposed project would have broad effects on all of our community and well beyond, more so than any other case I expect this Board has previously been presented with. Just legally, the decision of this Board in response to this appeal will either:

- Affirm precedence for the future for continuation of setting aside (violating) Subchapter 15-5: Natural Resource Protection Regulations of the City of Sheboygan Zoning Ordinances, as has persistently been done to date for the subject proposed golf course project, or conversely,
- B) Require that city administration consistently and correctly apply resource protection "overlay" land use regulations of the Zoning Ordinance, as mandated by City Common Council legislation.

While the land subject to this appeal has the greatest degree and area of environmental significance of any other tract I've seen over 40 years of environmental engineering practice in this state, the generic subject at hand (of either following zoning ordinances or violating them) is also pertinent to future developments which at some time will include the wooded land the city has for decades owned in Section 10 just south of the city. More importantly, the pending Board decision on the Kohler-owned land subject to this appeal will affect the community and the state park for many generations to come in the manner described in more detail in subsequent sections of this report.

The Wisconsin Division of Hearings and Appeals REVERSAL of Kohler's wetland fill permit (Appendix B) summarizes the many ways in which the Site Plan for the proposed golf course will have very substantial adverse environmental impacts on the subject land, adjacent lands, and also the region. This includes testimony from DNR wetland ecologist Patricia Trochlell, UW Madison Lecturer Emeritus ecologist Quentin Carpenter, and ornithologist William Mueller. Mueller describes how the 243 bird species known to be present, many of which are Conservation Priority Species, will be adversely affected. Appendix B is essential reading to understand the magnitude and degree of how the proposed golf course is a wholly unsuitable use, which is consistent with City of Sheboygan Zoning Ordinances as previously itemized.

The simple question this appeal brings to the Board comes down to: Did the Plan Commission (PC) recently apply applicable ordinances in their duties, procedures, and requirements under Sections 15.905 through Sections 15.933 in administering the subject project's Conditional Use Permit (CUP)? Before getting into explanation of that, it's reasonable to first examine a question of; what matter is it to the City of Sheboygan Board of Appeals to listen to local residents that can't vote in the city?

City of Sheboygan Zoning Ordinance, Section 15.934(4) answers: "Appeals to the Board of Appeals may be taken by <u>any person</u> aggrieved or by any officer, department, board, or bureau of the city of Sheboygan affected by any decision of the administrative officers." Allowing "any

person" to appeal is much broader "standing" than a civil court action requires. This is liberally appropriate for the Board's quasi-judicial role and process that most efficiently resolves zoning issues. The following is a summary of my professional opinion as an environmental engineer of some of the ways that the appellants, as well as other people in this area, are <u>actually agarieved</u>.

The nature and basis of how the appellants and others are aggrieved, is best described by the legislated basis of the city's regulations that are paramount to the physical characteristics of the land on which the subject golf course is proposed; Subchapter 15-5: Natural Resource Protection Regulations of the Zoning Ordinances. Under Section 15.502 – How to Use this Subchapter; "This Subchapter recognizes the important and diverse benefits which natural resource features provide in terms of protection of the health, safety, and general welfare of the community".

The consequences of the extent and degree of natural resource and habitat destruction that's inherent in clear cutting much of the mature forest covering the subject land will range from substantial to major. And the adverse effect on the ecology of adjacent wetlands on the subject land and adjacent state park land will vary by specific location from major to devastating. The adverse effects of <u>massive clear cutting of woodlands adjacent to wetlands</u> that have not been planned to be filled is a major reason why DOA had REVERSED Kohler Company's permit with DNR to fill over forty rare and ecologically valuable small; isolated wetlands totaling 3.7 acres.

Wetlands and Woodlands Work Together

Wetlands lose much of their ecologic function if the adjacent woodlands are disturbed because the species that depend on wetlands at the beginning of their life cycle depend on the woodlands during the adult phase. Extensive clear cutting of the woodlands along the entirety of the extensive wetland perimeters exposes the wetlands to very different physical conditions; including amount of sunlight, micro-climate, and predation of amphibians, which are all adverse impacts.

The adverse environmental impact of clear cutting along both sides of the remaining rare swale wetlands that aren't shown to be filled in the 2020 Site Plan will be ecologically devasting. So even though they can no longer be legally filled, clear cutting adjacent to them will be just as bad. Appendix J includes some information on some of the species that require woodlands adjacent to wetlands for survival. Life span for many of the salamanders range from as long as 10 to 25 years.

These ridge and swale wellands are "areas of special natural resource Interest" that warrant rigorous protection from both direct and indirect adverse Impacts as provided by enforcement of the City of Sheboyan Natural Resource Protection Regulations. Wetland ecologist Patricia Trochlell in her testimony to DHA summarized "floristic integrity is rate high to exceptional", and "the wetlands on the site that would be impacted by the project include hardwood swamp, Great Lakes ridge and swale, southern sedge meadow, alder thicket and interdunal wetlands." Further, "The wetland and upland plant communities on this site are extremely rare and require the specific environment and geographical location the Kohler site provides in order to survive. The extremely rare infact wetland complex is irreplaceable. The wetlands rank high to exceptional for functional values and the direct, secondary and cumulative loss of these functional values would be significant."

The record (Appendix B) of DHA's REVERSAL of Kohler's wetland fill permit contains information that is essential reading for the Board members and any other officials in making any decisions regarding the subject CUP or any other proposed development on this land. Decision without that will constitute an action not based on adequate information, similar to the reason DHA revoked the wetland permit that had been issued under political pressure in contrast to very strong recommendation by DNR staff to not issue.

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Looking south into the northern edge of the woodlands that would be clear cut to accommodate the proposed golf course.



The proposed golf course site plan shows clear cutting of the woods directly adjacent to both edges (left and right) of the elongated interdunal wetland in the photo center. This would expose the wetland to full sunlight, which would have devastating adverse effects on its ecologic functions.

Woodlands and Air Quality

The effects of extensive clear cutting aren't just ecological. Forests everywhere on the planet are the primary scrubbers of almospheric carbon dioxide from the almosphere as photosynthesis harvests carbon and discharges oxygen. That's why you feel more energized walking through a forest mid-day to mid-afternoon on a calm summer day. While taking in carbon dioxide, trees also sequester air pollutants. This is critically important along our lakeshore.

The reason Sheboygan County is an ozone "non-attainment" zone has little to do with the relatively limited local emissions. It's primarily from auto exhaust from the large metro area from Chicago and through Milwaukee channeling along the lakeshore by a "shore breeze" from the southeast (as it appears to us at land elevation) underneath vertical confinement of the gentle westerlies that are common during summer. While sailing far out in the lake on days like that you can often see a tan smudge at low elevation along the entire visible shoreline. Clear cutting thousands of trees for the proposed golf course at this location is not trivial in terms of local air quality.

Another attribute of woodlands is the topsoil that develops over time in temperate climates is a net carbon "sink". A golf course that attracts players from around the county and globe, which shifts a substantial amount of tossil carbon to the atmosphere to get them here, in combination with reduction of carbon sequestration on the site they play due to deforestation, is not "carbon friendly". The U.S and China have caused 2/3's of the anthropogenic increase in atmospheric carbon to date. Both continue to do so. And the U.S. expels about 2/3's of that. While we live in relative luxury climate and food security-wise even though we're nearly half the cause of carbon dioxide increase, the adverse effects of this are most exerted on the geographic regions elsewhere that are naturally more climate stressed.

Lakeshore

The sandy shores of Lake Michigan naturally respond dramatically to the large range (six feet vertically) of water level variations (refer to Historic Lake Michigan-Huron Water Levels and the ACOE schematic cross sections in Appendix K), resulting in the position of the calm water level changing as much as 100 yards. Private riparian land ownership ends at Ordinary High Water Mark (O.H.W.M.). The O.H.W.M. "is the point on the bank or shore up to which the presence and action of the water is so continuous as to leave a distinct mark either by erosion, destruction of terrestrial vegetation or other easily recognized characteristic". Appendix K includes the method required by DNR to determine the O.H.W.M at any location.

The 2020 Site Plan that had been approved by the Plan Commission used an O.H.W.M. that was surveyed in 2012 when the water level was at an historic low, with the O.H.W.M. correspondingly being at an easterly extreme. This is why that Site Plan showed some eastern edges of the course of play extending eastward beyond the present O.H.W.M. that developed during the 2016 through 2022 high water period. This defect in the 2020 Site Plan, as well as some of the other violations of Zoning Ordinance, are summarized in the author's December 10, 2020, Written Public Comment – Conditional Use Permit Application provided to the Plan Commission included in Appendix A. The correct present position of the O.H.W.M. along the subject shoreline is mapped on Figures 8 and 9.

Beginning in about 1980, DNR's guidance for minimum setback of development from the O.H.W.M. of Lake Michigan was 100 feet to provide a nominal service life of 50 years in consideration of average long term natural shore erosion rates. Soon thereafter all lakeshore counties adopted this in their Shoreland Ordinances, including Sheboygan County. And statutory minima are not optima. In general, capital improvements should be located as far inland from the O.H.W.M. as feasible to avoid having to construct a revelment in the future.

More recently, the 100 feet setback was unadvisedly reduced by the state legislature to 75 feet to match that of inland lakes, which aren't subject to the natural recession of Lake Michigan shores. Accordingly, Section 15.505 - Lakeshore Overlay Zoning District parts (1) and (4) on pages 200 and 201 of the city's Zoning Ordinance requires that "all areas within 75 feet of the ordinary high water mark" "shall remain in an undisturbed state". And the 50 feet setback that applies to the urban areas of the city, as cited by the Planning Department's review of the 2020 Site Plan, is not applicable.

Where revetments become needed to protect structures that have been built too close to the lakeshore, they must be tucked into the toe of the most recent wave erosion scarp so they only go to work during onshore storms during high water levels. The rest of the time, they become buried by dune development.

A better alternative to revetments is "beach nourishment", which is the only method of erosion protection that is sustainable along sandy shorelines of this magnitude. It is substantially less cost than revetments, and can maintain the shoreline in an "undisturbed state" by allowing dune formation. In addition to beach nourishment enhancing the functionality and desirability of any property, the adjacent reaches of shoreline both north and south likewise benefit.

An example of similar scale of beach nourishment is the area where sand dredged from the entrance of Sheboygan's Outer Harbor was deposited along the shoreline to the south which has maintained a wide beach since then. Prior to that, during the 1985-1987 high water period, there was little to no beach, and storm waves washed into the east end of Indiana Avenue. Aerial photos of this area in 1971 through 2022 in Appendix L show how effective beach nourishment can be.

RECOMMENDED BOARD OF APPEALS ACTION

Without the state's wetland fill permit, Kohler's 2020 project Site Plan became obsolete. Consequently, the present tactic to further pursue construction of the proposed golf course is to avoid filling any wetlands so the project can no longer be held up by the state. The state NR regulations can only disallow the filling of wetlands, and they don't regulate woodlands. However, the City of Sheboygan Zoning Ordinances do, as previously outlined.

In any case, not filling any wetlands necessitates development of a new Site Plan, which Kohler company has said they expect to submit to the Plan Commission in several months. However, that endeavor is most because the proposed use of the land as a privately owned golf course is specifically disallowed by municipal ordinance in Permanently Protected Green Space (Wetlands, Woodlands, Shoreline) that comprise all of the subject land, as previously described.

That's where things presently stand regarding the subject CUP. This places the issue of whether or not the city will continue to violate its Natural Resource Protection Regulations entirely in the hands of the Board, and nobody else. This appeal is justified for any one of the reasons outlined in the previous section of this report. These document how city administration has thoroughly and persistently violated mandatory minimum requirements of the City of Sheboygan Zoning Ordinance in relation to the subject CUP.

To conform with Zoning Ordinances applicable to the CUP issued to Kohler Company for construction of a proposed golf course, this petition recommends that the Board of Appeals consider the following actions which amount to no more than requiring the Planning Department and Plan Commission to not violate applicable ordinances:

- a) Pursuant to Section 15.905(9); affirm that the subject CUP had <u>automatically become</u> revoked on <u>December 15, 2022</u>, thus rendering the Plan Commission's action on November 12, 2024, null, vold, and moot.
- Affirm that Subchapter 15-5 Natural Resource Protection Regulations are, due to the natural characteristics of the subject and the adjacent land and shoreline, applicable mandatory minimum requirements for any type of land use or development that must go through planning procedures required by applicable provisions of the Zoning Ordinance. Administration of zoning ordinance for any type of development on it requires evaluation by qualified ecologists to determine the necessary habitat protective distances that any land disturbance must be kept away from wetlands, as well as any additional habitat considerations. In this case, this should be retained by the Planning Department in collaboration with the Town of Wison Plan Commission (because the subject land is entirely surrounded by Town land) but reimbursed by the landowner in accordance with ordinance). This is warranted because the applicant has proven that direct retention by them does not result in an Environmental impact Report providing objective and actionable quantitation of potential adverse environmental impacts of a proposed development.
- c) Pursuant to Section 15.505(4); affirm that the Lake Michigan shoreline shall remain in its "undisturbed state," except for uses permitted is Section 15.204 per the requirements of Subsection 15.206(10)". And for this intent and purpose, no revetments should be constructed. Revetments can interfere with natural beach and near shore sand bar dynamics throughout the large range (six feet in elevation) of Lake Michigan water levels. If protection from wave erosion is desired or needed in the future, it should consist only of "beach naurishment" designed and permitted in accordance with DNR and Army Corps of Engineers standards.

Why These Violations Occurred

Most instances of violation of law occur due to competing values, in this case golf and some income vs the environment and the law. However, the monetary benefits anticipated from a project are not an aspect of consideration in zoning administration. That's why there is no mention of it in zoning ordinances. If that was a criterion, there would be no traction for zoning law and therefore no need for zoning ordinances because no owner applies for a permit for a project they expect to be an economic disadvantage. And examination of Kohler's emphasis on the economic impacts of the proposed course reveals if to be a miniscule increase in Sheboygan County's healthily growing \$7 billion gross annual economy, while exerting about a 0.1% increase in demand for labor in an already labor short market. So not only are these factors irrelevant with respect to zoning ordinance administration, they're unsubstantial to slightly negative.

In contrast, the city's Natural Resource Protection Regulations are mandatory. This is particularly germane to the subject land that may be the most unique and important tract of relatively undisturbed natural environment that exists in the county, if not the state.

The applicant touts the unobstructed view of the lake for the course's golfers provided by the project's necessary massive clear cutting of the forest. That view can more easily and economically be enjoyed by anyone visiting Kohler-Andrae State Park, or walking along the subject land's shoreline. It doesn't necessitate clear cutting of trees or destruction of natural habitat. Earliest origins of golf date back to the late 1200's on open grounds in Holland, with further development of the game along the east coast of Scotland in the 1500's on grassy dunes that aren't agriculturally productive and were considered "wastelands". Golf is not suited to woodlands, thus the proposed 75% clear cut.

Upon Pete Dye seeing the location of the subject proposed golf course some years ago, he had been quoted as saying something to the effect that this location is a "sandbox to play in"; that is provided you get most of the trees out of the way. Kohler comforts that clear cutting much of the forest will get rid of the profusion of barberry (an invasive ornamental shrub) they've avoided controlling. Young barberry shoots are easily pulled up by gloved hand. Mature bushes require more handwork.

Examination of golf publications and websites reveals little-interest beyond just the game and scenic views from courses. However, beauty is in the eye of the beholder. It was reported that some of the young DNR staff that were on site to verify its natural conditions had tears in their eyes upon seeing what would be destroyed. Those were not tears of joy. From an environmental engineering perspective, clear cutting mature forest to build a golf course is a very poor use of woodland natural resources, not to mention the adverse effects on the wetlands.

Mankind is perpetrating the greatest rate of mass extinction of plants and animals since a sizable meteor struck the planet just north of the Yucatan peninsula about 65 million years ago. It is the increments of habitat destruction that we are conducting individually and cumulatively that are the cause. The purpose of the Natural Resource Protection Regulations of the City of Sheboygan Zoning Ordinance is to avoid contributing to that here.

In addition to all of the preceding content of this application, the next section provides some general perspective on habitat destruction for consideration by the Zoning Administrator as required by Section 15.912(5) on pages 296 through 297 to provide a report to the Board summarizing if the appeal is "in conflict with the provisions of the City's Comprehensive Master Plan or Zoning Ordinance" as relating to the Board's pending consideration of the appeal regarding the Plan Commission's recently granted time extension to the subject CUP.

COMPLEX INTERACTIONS OF HABITAT DESTRUCTION

The Wisconsin Division of Hearings and Appeals' reversal of Kohler's permit to fill some wetlands was based more on the adverse effects of the project's planned clear cutting and bulldozing of mature forest along the extensive edges of the wetlands that remain rather than just the filling of 3.7 acres of rare wetland type. This is because wetlands lose much of their ecologic function if the adjacent uplands are disturbed because the life cycle of many amphibian species depends on undisturbed woodlands adjacent to wetlands.

Small wetlands that are shown on the 2020 Site Plan have, by virtue of diminutive size and isolation, unusually high and unique ecologic function. They provide amphibian spawn, egg, and larvae stage habitat free from larger amphibian and fish predation. The small salamanders that inhabit this area live from 5 to 25 years, depending on the species. By day they hide and stay moist under undisturbed forest floor leaf detritus, rotting logs, and rocks, most emerging at night to feed on insects, worms, spiders, and slugs.

Replacing woodlands adjacent to the wetlands with moved turt has almost as much adverse impact as filling the wetlands. Due to their mostly unseen existence, there's little public awareness of our local salamanders. Appendix J includes excerpts from a book available for purchase in the state park's office that provides some more information on these secretive little critters, as well as a surprising number of different woodland frog species. Some of these are nocturnal and seldom seen.

While small, isolated wetlands surrounded by undisturbed woodlands can have enhanced habitat value, forest fragmentation by clear cutting wide swaths and leaving small, isolated patches generally has a negative effect on woodland habitat value. Information on other mammals native to this area is provided by books available for purchase at the state park office or by loan from

Mead Library. Individuals of each species have their own territories, and habitat range and wildlife corridors are important.

Bird species are much more varied than the mammals, amphibians, and reptiles here, considering both year-round residents and migratory species along the lakeshore. Moving on down the food chain, the variety of native habitats provided by the subject land hosts a wide variety of insects, spiders, slugs, warms, and a few types of snails, not to mention many types of plants and fungi comprising the ground floor of the ecosystem. Mostly unseen below are the many sub-microscopic species of "animals" and thousands of microscopic flora and fauna that occupy woodlands. All of these work together, and each part is interdependent, to form the fabric of natural life. And these woodlands, which have been left undisturbed for approximately 150 years, have developed a substantial portion of "old growth" ecologic value.

In contrast, mowed monoculture lawns provide relatively little natural habitat value. This is why the city has Subsection 15-5 in its Zoning Ordinance. Further, golf course maintenance requires closer cut and more fertilizer and pesticide application than common lawns. This additionally diminishes habitat value. In contrast to clayey soils elsewhere, it not possible to prevent leaching of fertilizer and pesticides into the sandy soils comprising all land east of the Black River, so some contamination of the shallow ground water table would be inevitable. There are many reasons why golf courses are required to be under the control of Conditional Use Permits.

THIS PROJECT'S BROADER ISSUES OF LAND USE ADMINISTRATION

I had personally advised the Planning Director at that time of the non-feasibility of a golf course at the subject location some years ago, upon first hearing of public notice of Kohler's impending annexation request. His response was, "It's premature for me to evaluate that because the land is not yet in my jurisdiction." I next asked: "Why assign SR-5 dense residential zoning when the proposed use is a golf course?", to which he responded, "That will give them the greatest flexibility in developing the land." It's not plausible to be unaware of the ordinances that one's department is responsible for administering any more than it's plausible to be unaware that the land is all heavily and contiguously forested. The aerial photos comprising Figures 2 through 7 clearly show that.

Violation of City of Sheboygan's Natural Resource Protection Regulations have occurred on each occasion that any issue relating to the Conditional Use Permit (CUP) for the proposed golf course has come before city administration since the application for the proposed golf course project was submitted by Kohler Company to the city in 2020. This bias of seeing fit to violate ordinances was predisposed by the annexation initiative and agreement between Kohler Company and the city in 2017.

Kohler's purpose for annexation was to bring the golf course into the zoning administration jurisdiction of the city even though the city's very thorough, thoughtful, and detailed specific Natural Resource Protection Regulations functionally preclude any feasibility of the proposed project as has been explained herein. These ordinances set much greater restriction on the subject land than it was subject to while in the Town of Wilson. So the basis for Kohler Company's request for annexation was confidence in the city setting aside applicable ordinances. While this has been a reliable assumption to date, it has been in violation of law.

The Mayor and Planning Director at the time Kohler Company approached the city responded by concertedly promoting what they perceived as very expansive potential for additional annexations. This, and Kohler's project, were apparently considered to be more important than local land use law, particularly the Natural Resource Protection Regulations which are most germane to municipal expansions onto undeveloped land.

It will be in the public Interest for the present remaining and any new Planning Department staff, the Plan Commission, as well as the present and any future mayors, to chart a course for lawful administration of Zoning Ordinance.

CLOSURE

From having analyzed and designed many dozens of projects, both large and small, throughout and around the City of Sheboygan and hundreds throughout the eastern half of the state, I advise that there has not been in the past, and there will not be in the future, a more important need for due diligence administration of the City of Sheboygan Natural Resource Protection Regulations than the issue herein presented to the Board.

Dear Mr. Miller:

I serve as the chair of the City of Sheboygan's zoning board of appeals. As such, I work with shiff to set meetings of the Board and create the agendas for those meetings. The Board's authority, set forth in \S 105-1011(a), Sheboygan Municipal Code ("Code"), is to review and determine all matters relating to requested variances from the provisions of the city's zoning ordinance or appeals regarding an interpretation of the zoning administrator of the zoning ordinance.

On December 16, 2024, the City received an appeal from you of the November 12, 2024, decision by the Sheboygan Plan Commission to grant an extension of a Conditional Use Permit to the Kohler Property for its property located on the south side of Sheboygan near Lake Michigan and Kohler-Andrae State Park. Thave consulted with legal counsel for the City in determining the appropriate procedural response to your appeal.

You describe your appeal as being pursuant to Section 15.912 of the City of Shehoygan Zoning Ordinance. No such ordinance presently exists, but I suspect you are referring to § 105-1003. Code, which descends from the former 15.912.

The code section to which you refer relates to appeals of zoning interpretations by the zoning administrator, who is the person the City authorizes to make administrative decisions under its zoning ordinance.

The matter to which your appeal refers was not decided by the zoning administrator or any other administrative official. Conditional use permits are governed by Wis Stat. § 6.2.23(7)(de) and § 105-998, Code. The provisions of those laws do not authorize a zoning board of appeals to hear appeals related to conditional use permits. Rather, they provide that such appeals are made to the circuit court by certiorari. (See Wis Stat. § 62.23(7)(de)(5) and § 105-998(n); Code.) The appeal process parallels the appeal process for matters heard by the zoning board of appeals.

As such the zoning board of appeals does not have the authority to hear your appeal and I will not be placing it on the agenda for hearing. Your proper appeal should have been to file a certionary petition with the circuit court.

A RESOLUTION adopting certain changes to the City's Medical Benefit Plan and Dental Benefit Plan effective for calendar year 2026 coverage and establishing the monthly premium equivalent rates effective for January 2026 coverage and thereafter.

RESOLVED: That the following changes to the City of Sheboygan's Medical Benefit Plan and Dental Benefit Plan effective for calendar year 2026 are hereby adopted:

- 1) <u>2026 Health Insurance Monthly Premium Rates</u>
 - a) The monthly premium for health insurance in 2026 shall be as follows:

^{*} Nothing in this Resolution shall be interpreted as contradicting any approved collective bargaining agreement. Part-time employees will generally pay 50% of the total monthly premium. However, for example, the City's collective bargaining agreement with Amalgamated Transit Union Local 998 provides that certain part-time employees will pay a lower amount of the total monthly premium.

d) The monthly employee premium equivalent rates for part-time, eligible employees shall be:

Single \$ 529.51 Employee with spouse \$1,007.37 Employee with children \$ 913.16 Family \$1,392.02

- e) New employees, those not previously eligible for health insurance, and those not previously participating in the City of Sheboygan Health Insurance Plan will receive the rates listed in subsection (a) above for the 2026 plan year (and the associated rates for the 2027 plan year) in order to allow the employee the necessary time to participate in the Wellness Plan Year, which runs from November 1 to October 31.
- In 2026, the City will partially fund a Health Savings Account (HSA) for employees and/or family members (eligibility follows IRS guidelines) on the City's Health Insurance Plan as of January 1, 2026. Except in the case of a collective bargaining agreement that states otherwise, the maximum City funding amounts will total \$750 for those with single coverage and \$1,500 for those with employee plus spouse, employee plus child(ren), and full family coverage. Additionally:
 - a) Employees who are on the Plan on January 1, 2026 shall have their HSA funded in January 2026.
 - b) No contributions will be made for those new to the plan after January 1, 2026.
 - c) HSA contributions are issued to an employee and/or family member based on eligibility of the employee on January 1. Mid-year changes for an active plan participant after January 1 are not eligible for HSA contributions. In addition, COBRA-only participants are not eligible for the City contribution to the HSA.
 - d) Employees are responsible for notifying the Human Resources Department if the employee is or will be an active participant of a secondary government-issued health insurance, such as Medicare or Tricare, as of January 1 of the Plan year. Following IRS guidelines, neither the City nor the employee may contribute to a HSA account if the employee is also participating in the government plan.

- e) Employees who elect the family plan, employee plus child(ren) plan, and employee plus spouse plan remain eligible for the applicable HSA contribution, even if their dependent is on a government issued plan so long as their spouse is not listed on the employee's HSA account. Once an employee is not eligible for the HSA contribution, no HSA contribution will be provided to spouse and/or dependents on the plan.
- 3) The City will not charge employees a spousal surcharge.
- 4) Eligible full-time employees (for plan year 2026 "full-time employees" are employees who work 30 or more hours per week) who waive or drop coverage will be eligible for an opt-out incentive, with a maximum yearly benefit of \$1,200. This amount would be paid at a rate of \$50 bi-monthly to the employee through payroll for any month the full-time eligible employee is not on the Medical Benefit Plan.
- 5) In all cases, employees are eligible for either the opt-out incentive or the HSA contribution as of the employee's January 1 election; not both.
- 6) All qualified employees will have a Dental Benefit Plan available. Effective for January 2026 coverage and thereafter the monthly premium equivalent rates for the City of Sheboygan Dental Plan for active employees are hereby adopted:
 - a) The monthly premium for dental insurance in 2026 shall be as follows:

ADDENDUM A TO WB-13 VACANT LAND OFFER TO PURCHASE

This Addendum A is made a part of the WB-13 Vacant Land Offer to Purchase, and is made by and between DEBORAH GAGIN ("Seller"), and City of Sheboygan and/or Assigns (as "Buyer"), for the real property identified as APNs 59030459152, 59030459310 and 59030459282, Sheboygan, WI (collectively, the "Property").

This Addendum A together with the WB-13 Vacant Land Offer to Purchase shall be referred to collectively as the "Offer." To the extent the terms of the WB-13 Vacant Land Offer to Purchase and this Addendum A conflict, the terms of this Addendum A shall control. For purposes of this Offer, the Effective Date shall be the date on which this Offer is executed by and delivered to both Buyer and Seller.

- 1. CLOSING CONTINGENCIES. Buyer's obligation to close this transaction is contingent upon satisfaction, as determined by Buyer in its sole and absolute discretion, of the following contingencies on or before the date which is ninety (90) days after the Effective Date (the "Feasibility Period"):
 - (a) Existing Agreements. Buyer determining that the Existing Agreements (as defined below) are satisfactory to Buyer in Buyer's sole and absolute discretion. Within Ten (10) days after the Effective Date, Seller shall deliver to Buyer true, correct and complete copies of all environmental reports and filings, test results, engineering data, soil or geotechnical tests, Seller's Vacant Land Condition Report, appraisals, all existing boundary and/or ALTA surveys, architectural and engineering plans and drawings, all tests, reports and assessments relating to the physical condition of the Property, copies of all federal, state, county and local conservation, farmland, environmental or other land use programs, agreements, restrictions, or conservation easements which apply to any part of the Property, title evidence including any prior owner's policy of title insurance, leases (if any), easement agreements, contracts, covenants, tax bills and assessments, permits, evidence of entitlements, licenses, all correspondence and contracts materially affecting the Property, and any other agreements or documentation relating to the Property and which are available to Seller or in Seller's possession or control (herein collectively referred to as the "Existing Agreements"). At any time prior to Closing, Seller shall provide any additional or supplemental documents or information becoming available to Seller or at Buyer's reasonable request.

Seller shall provide Buyer with a copy of any existing farm lease as part of the Existing Agreements delivered pursuant to Section 1 above. Additionally, at Closing, Seller shall assign such lease to Buyer (if existing Lease has not expired). Furthermore, Buyer shall enter into a written lease agreement with Tenant prior to Closing that provides that said lease is terminable upon three hundred sixty-five (365) days written notice to Tenant by Buyer.
- ADDITIONAL SELLER DOCUMENTS. Seller shall deliver the following documents to Buyer at or prior to Closing:
 - (a) FIRPTA Affidavit. An Affidavit warranting that Seller is not a "foreign person" as defined in Section 1445 of the Internal Revenue Code, and that Buyer has no obligation under Internal Revenue Code Section 1445 to withhold and pay over to the Internal Revenue Service any part of the "amount realized" by Seller in the transaction contemplated hereby (as such term is defined in the Regulations issued under Internal Revenue Code Section 1445).
 - (b) **Seller Certificate.** Seller shall deliver to Buyer at Closing a certificate that all representations and warranties set forth in this Offer are true and accurate as of the date of Closing; which warranties and representations shall survive Closing.
 - (c) Other Documents. The parties shall deliver to each other any and all assignments, documents, certifications, affidavits, etc. that are customarily delivered by a seller and buyer in a transaction of this nature.
- 4. **TITLE.** Seller will deliver to Buyer, at Buyer's sole cost and expense, and within fifteen (15) days after the Effective Date, a commitment to issue an owner's title insurance policy insuring Buyer's title to the Property in the amount of the Purchase Price. The title commitment and policy shall be on a current ALTA form issued by Chicago Title Company (the "Title Company"). Seller shall provide the Title Company with such affidavits and indemnities as are required by the Title Company to insure over liens and possession and required for Seller to convey fee simple title to the Property to Buyer in accordance with this Offer and provide Buyer, at Buyer's cost, with a GAP endorsement. In addition, the Seller shall secure from the Title Company a marked-up commitment at Closing, showing title vested in the Buyer, dated through the date of recording the documents, removing all requirements, with full extended coverage, and removing all exceptions but for such encumbrances as are expressly approved in writing by Buyer (the "Permitted Encumbrances") as provided below.

Buyer will provide to Seller, no later than ten (10) days prior to the expiration of the Feasibility Period, written notice of Buyer's objections to encumbrances or other matters shown in the title commitment, and Seller shall, within Five (5) days after receiving such objection, agree in writing to remove such encumbrances or objectionable matters prior to or at Closing, or may designate that it will not remove such encumbrances. If Buyer is not satisfied with the encumbrances and/or matters Seller is proposing that Buyer accept, then Buyer may, at Buyer's sole discretion, terminate this Offer on or before expiration of the Feasibility Period. Upon such termination of this Offer by Buyer, and the parties shall have no further obligation or liability under this Offer except for any which survive the closing or early termination of this Offer. If Seller does not remove the encumbrances and matters at Closing which Seller agreed to remove, then Buyer may, at Buyer's option, and Seller shall be deemed to be in default of the Offer. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Seller shall be unconditionally obligated, at its sole cost and expense, to satisfy at or prior to Closing all monetary encumbrances evidenced by mortgages,

- deeds of trust, tax liens, judgments, mechanic's liens or other liens or charges in a fixed sum or capable of computation as a fixed sum ("Liquidated Liens").
- 5. **CLOSING**. This transaction shall be closed no later than the expiration of the Feasibility Period, subject to the waiver or satisfaction of Buyer's contingencies contained within this Offer.
- 6. ASSIGNMENT. Buyer may, without consent of Seller and at any time prior to the Closing of this transaction, assign this Offer by one or more successive assignments, provided assignee assumes all of the obligations of the Buyer hereunder. Upon any such assignment, the assignee shall automatically and without the execution of further instruments or documents, have all the rights and obligations of Buyer hereunder as if assignee were the original Buyer under this Offer, and the assigning entity shall be released from all of the obligations of the Buyer hereunder.
- 7. BROKER COMMISSION. Buyer and Seller each hereby represent and warrant to the other that they have not dealt with any real estate broker, agent or salesman, in a manner that could create any legal right or claim in any such broker, agent or salesman for a real estate commission or similar fee or compensation with respect to the negotiation and/or the consummation or closing of the transaction or the conveyance of the Property by the Seller to Buyer. Seller hereby indemnifies Buyer against, and agrees to hold Buyer harmless from any liability or claim (and all reasonable expenses, including attorney's fees incurred in defending any such claim or in enforcing this indemnity) for a real estate brokerage commission or similar fee or compensation arising out of, or in any way connected with, any claimed dealings with indemnitor and relating to this Offer or the purchase and sale of the Property. Notwithstanding anything contained in this Offer to the contrary, the obligation arising under this Section shall survive the rescission, cancellation or termination of this Offer and the closing of the transaction contemplated by this Offer.
- ENVIRONMENTAL REPRESENTATIONS AND WARRANTIES. Seller warrants and represents, to Seller's knowledge, that on the date hereof, and as of the date of Closing, the Property will be in compliance with all federal, state and local laws, rules, regulations, ordinances, codes and orders governing, establishing, limiting or otherwise affecting the discharge or disposal of air pollutants, water pollutants, processed waste water, or solid and hazardous waste, including, but not limited to, all regulations and standards of the Environmental Protection Agency and the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. To Seller's knowledge, there are no pending or threatened actions or proceedings by the local municipality, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, United States Environmental Protection Agency or any other government entity, and to Seller's knowledge there is no basis for any such action or proceeding. Seller has never disposed of any solid or hazardous waste on the Property, and Seller has no notice or knowledge of any solid or hazardous waste having ever been disposed of on the Property. To the best of Seller's knowledge, there are no landfills, hazardous substances, underground storage tanks, PCBs, subterranean tunnels, cavities, wells, mines, sinkholes, springs or concealed fill-ins on or under the Property, and, to Seller's knowledge, neither the Property nor any part thereof has been used, and prior to Closing will not be used, for the manufacture, storage or disposal of any hazardous substance, solid waste or hazardous waste as the same be identified as hazardous by any federal, state, county or municipal law, statute, ordinance, order or regulation related to protection of the environment and applicable to the Property (including without limitation, any regulations promulgated by the Federal Environmental Protection Agency and the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources).
- 9. SELLER REPRESENTATIONS AND WARRANTIES. Seller further represents and warrants (which such representations and warranties are relied upon and induced Buyer to enter this Offer) that: (i) the individuals singing on behalf of Seller, and have full power, authority and legal right to deliver, engage in the transactions contemplated thereby, and perform and observe the terms and conditions of this Offer on behalf of Seller, (ii) Sellers have sole title to the

Property; (iii) to Seller's knowledge, there are no encroachments of fences, buildings or other improvements to the Property on any easement or on an adjoining property and no encroachments of any fences, buildings, other improvements of adjoining premises are on the Property, (iv) to Seller's knowledge, there are no unrecorded easements, party walls, agreements, or rights-of-way which affect the Property, (v) no work has been done and no materials have been furnished in connection with the improvement of the Property during the last six months, (vi) there is no person or entity that is entitled to a finder's fee or any type of brokerage commission in relation to or in connection with the transactions contemplated by this Offer, (vii) no lease or rental agreement exists relating to the Property, (viii) no condemnation proceeding is pending, or threatened with respect to any part of the Property, (ix) Sellers have no notice or knowledge of any governmental agency or court order requiring repairs, alterations or corrections of any existing conditions on the Property and that the Property shall comply with all federal, state and municipal laws, ordinances, orders, regulations or requirements as of the Closing, (x) no suit, action, arbitration, or legal, administration, or other proceedings are pending or have been threatened against the Property or against the Seller with respect to the Property, (xi) no bankruptcy, insolvency, rearrangement or similar action or proceedings, whether voluntary or involuntary, is pending or threatened against the Seller and Seller has no intention of filing or commencing any such action or proceeding, (xii) to Seller's knowledge, there are no subsoil conditions which adversely affect the value of the Property, and (xiii) to Sellers knowledge, there are no special assessments levied or contemplated against the Property.

- 10. CLOSING COSTS. Seller acknowledges and agrees to pay for the applicable proration of real estate taxes for the year of Closing, and all special assessments as well as special taxes assessed, levied, or contemplated against the Property prior to Closing. Buyer shall be responsible for the real estate transfer tax, all title insurance costs for an owner's title insurance policy, the recording costs and costs of any lender title insurance policy (if applicable), and all escrow and closing fees associated with the transaction charged by the Title Company.
- 11. **SELLER INDEMNIFICATION**. Seller agrees to indemnify, protect, defend and hold harmless Buyer from all losses, claims, demands, suits, actions, judgments, awards, settlements, costs, and expenses including reasonable attorneys' fees that Buyer, and as applicable, its officers, directors, shareholders, employees, representatives, successors, and assigns may incur, suffer, or become subject to, that arise out of, result from or relate, directly or indirectly, to: (i) claims asserted by any third party relating to liens, encumbrances, charges, claims, restrictions, pledges, security interests and impositions against the Property, (ii) the use, management, operation, rental, maintenance and ownership of the Property based upon acts, conduct or omissions occurring before the date of Closing, or (iii) a breach by Seller of the terms, covenants, representations, or warranties of the Offer.
- 12. ATTORNEY'S FEES. In the event that any action is filed in relation to the Offer, the unsuccessful party in the action shall pay to the successful party, in addition to all of the sums that either party may be called upon to pay, a reasonable sum for the successful party's costs and attorneys' fees.
- 13. **LEGAL EFFECT**. Seller and Buyer acknowledge and agree that this Offer is intended to be binding and enforceable and each party waives any right to challenge the enforceability of this Offer based on the broad discretion afforded Buyer in evaluating the fulfillment of certain conditions precedent to Buyer's performance. Seller acknowledges that such efforts by Buyer will require Buyer's expenditure of time and resources in investigating the Property and that such expenditures along with the one hundred Dollars (\$100) to be paid to Seller from the Earnest Money (if any) in the event of Buyer's termination of the Offer prior to the expiration of the Feasibility Period, constitute good and sufficient consideration to Seller for Seller's acceptance hereof.

- 14. **COUNTERPARTS**. This Offer may be executed simultaneously or in one or more counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, but all of which together shall constitute one and the same instrument. There is no requirement that each party sign the same counterpart. This Offer may be signed by electronic signatures, as defined under Wisconsin Statutes Section 137.11(8) or the U.S. federal ESIGN Act of 2000 and any subsequent corresponding statute, including without limitation facsimile, portable document format (PDF), e-mail, or other means of electronic transmission. Any such signature shall be given the same effect as if it were an original signature on an original Offer or counterpart. Immediately upon one or more counterparts hereof, individually or taken together, bearing the signatures, electronic or otherwise, of each of the parties reflected hereon as signatories, this Addendum will become legally binding, and may be introduced or submitted in any action or proceeding as competent evidence of such Addendum notwithstanding the failure or inability of either party to produce or tender an original executed counterpart.
- 15. **DATES AND DEADLINES**. Time is of the essence under this Offer as to acceptance, possession, occupancy, the Closing and other dates set forth herein; provided, however, that if the time within which any action, consent, approval or other activity herein contemplated, expires on a Saturday, Sunday or national holiday, such time period shall automatically be deemed extended to the first day after the scheduled termination of such time period which is not a Saturday, Sunday or national holiday.
- 16. **SEVERABILITY**. In the event any term or provision of this Offer shall be held illegal, invalid, unenforceable or in operative as a matter of law, the remaining terms and provisions of this Offer shall not be affected thereby, but each such term or provision shall be valid and shall remain in full force and effect.
- 17. **AMENDMENTS**. This Offer may not be modified or changed except by an instrument or instruments in writing signed by the Parties or their respective successors in interest.
- 18. **GOVERNING LAW/VENUE**. This Offer shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the internal laws of the State of Wisconsin and without reference to any rules of construction regarding the Party responsible for the drafting hereof. The Federal Eastern District Court of Wisconsin shall have exclusive jurisdiction relating to any of the terms of this Offer or dispute between the Parties relating to the sale and purchase of the Property.
- 19. **SURVIVAL**. The respective representations, warranties, covenants, indemnities and agreements of the Parties, including, without limitation, those made in or resulting from any certificates, instruments or documents delivered pursuant to this Offer or in connection herewith, shall survive closing under this Offer and continue in full force and effect as permitted by law.
- 20. **ENTIRE AGREEMENT**. This Offer constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties as it relates to the sale of the Property.

WHEREAS, the City of Sheboygan issued Request for Bids #2080-25 for the work and received a total of eight (8) bids for the project; and

WHEREAS, City staff has reviewed the bids and has determined that the low bid meets specifications and standards and that the Contractor has the necessary expertise and ability to complete the work in a safe and efficient manner.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: That the appropriate City officials are hereby authorized to enter into the attached contract with Spielvogel & Sons Excavating Inc. of Sheboygan, Wisconsin for the project in the amount of \$97,950.00.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That the Finance Director is hereby authorized and directed to draw funds from Acct. No. 421660-531100 (TID 21 - Contracted Services) in payment of same.

AGREEMENT FOR THE DEMOLITION OF STRUCTURES AND ASSOCIATED SITE RESTORATION LOCATED AT 428 WISCONSIN AVENUE, SHEBOYGAN, WI 53081

WITNESSETH:

- WHEREAS, the City owns the buildings and real property located at 428 Wisconsin Avenue (formerly known as The City of Sheboygan Senior Activity Center; and
- WHEREAS, the City desires to raze the main structure and detached two-car garage in order to clear and prepare the site for new development; and
- WHEREAS, the City issued Request for Bids # 2080-25 to obtain bids from qualified providers of demolition and site restoration services ("Services"); and
- WHEREAS, upon review, the City has determined that Contractor's bid is the lowest responsive and responsible bid for the Services; and
- WHEREAS, Contractor desires to provide the City with the necessary services under the terms set forth in this Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants herein contained, the parties hereto agree as follows:

Article 1. Scope of Services

Contractor shall provide all labor, machinery, equipment, licensure, permits, bonds, and travel expenses to safely and skillfully complete the Services as set forth in Exhibit 1, and shall dispose of all materials generated in the provision of Services in a lawful manner (the "Disposal"). Contractor shall be responsible for obtaining any and all applicable City permits and paying any and all applicable permit fees prior to beginning work. The City of Sheboygan does not waive permitting fees for City of Sheboygan projects.

Contractor shall be responsible for furnishing, erecting, and maintaining suitable barricades, warning signs, flashers, fencing, and other protective equipment to properly protect and safeguard its personnel and the public during all phases of the Services.

Contractor will need to plan the work in advance of mobilization and coordinate with the City's Representative. The public right-of-way impacted by the project shall remain open to traffic during the project with possible temporary closures of a portion of the East-West Alley and parking lane closures, as well as sidewalk closures to accommodate replacement of concrete curb and gutter and ensure safety of the general public.

For the avoidance of doubt, the scope of services to be provided includes:

- Provision of all permits, licensing, insurance and bonding necessary for the project.
- Complete demolition and disposal of the Main Building and Garage structures including all foundations, basement walls and floors, and any remaining property, furnishings, equipment, and machinery.
- Disconnection and capping of all Storm Sewer Inlets.
- Disconnection and capping of the sanitary sewer laterals at or near the property line.
- Fencing of the worksite to protect the public from accidental injury while the work is underway and during non-work hours.
- Complete demolition and disposal of the detached two-car garage including slab and any remaining property, furnishings, equipment and machinery.
- The proper placement of erosion controls and inlet protections to ensure that stray materials do not impact the proper flow or drainage of stormwater in City-owned catch basins.
- The placement and subsequent removal of a "tracking pad" if determined to be necessary.
- The proper handling of all materials generated during the demolition process, which may include
 on-site crushing of cementitious materials in accordance with all existing regulations as detailed
 in the Request for Bids.
- If onsite crushing of materials is undertaken, adequate dust and noise controls shall be provided.
- The removal and lawful disposal of all materials identified to contain asbestos and/or lead in a licensed landfill. The regulations governing this handling can be found in the Request for Proposals.
- The removal and lawful disposal of all concrete paving, asphaltic paving, and various concrete structures in the entire one-third block north of Wisconsin Avenue and between North 4th Street and North 5th Street including but not limited to concrete foundations, abutments, barrier walls, pipe bollards, curbing and both asphaltic and concrete pavement.
- Replacement of all City sidewalks and alley pavement damaged or removed during the demolition and or restoration phases in accordance with City of Sheboygan Specifications.
- The removal and lawful disposal of all materials and equipment such as fluorescent tubes, thermostats, oils, lubricants, and chemicals as called out in the Northstar Environmental Testing Report that was included with the Request for Bids and is attached for reference to this document.
- The removal and disposal of various trees, shrubs and plantings on the property including stumps, roots, and the associated restoration following removal.

- The proper disconnection of storm sewers, sanitary sewers, and water service laterals as identified in the Request for Bids as well as restoration of the street pavement disturbed to the satisfaction of the Department of Public Works.
- For avoidance of doubt, there is a total of (1) Water Service Laterals which will need to be disconnected at the curb stop. The curb stop riser is currently bent so as to not allow the water utility to turn off the water. The valve will need to be closed by the Contractor at the time of excavation.
- There are at least two Storm sewer inlets to be properly capped with one in the East Parking Lot and the other in the turnout driveway along North 5th St Street. Contractor shall cap these to the satisfaction of the City Plumbing Inspector.
- Furnishing and proper compaction of materials necessary to infill basements and depressions from their base to the level of existing grades on the site to assure that future structures may be constructed on sound soils.
- Final grading or smoothing of the **entire one-third block site** to prevent standing water.
- The complete removal of five (3) large driveway approaches and two sidewalk related curb cuts and replacement of concrete curb and gutter to the satisfaction of the City Engineer.
- Upon completion of the work, the City expects to have a site devoid of any and all
 improvements and graded smooth to assure no undue runoff onto contiguous parcels or
 ponding of water.
- As of the contract date, the City has not received interest in the parcel by a Developer.
- Final Grading, topsoil, seed and mulch will be applied by the Contractor in the Spring of 2026...

Article 2. Standard of Care

Contractor shall be responsible for completing the Services in a manner consistent with that degree of care and skill ordinarily exercised by members of the same profession currently practicing under similar circumstances ("Standard of Care"). The City's Representative shall be the sole judge of the adequacy of Contractor's work in meeting the Standard of Care; however, the City's Representative shall not unreasonably withhold its approval as to the adequacy of Contractor's performance. Upon notice to Contractor, Contractor will, without additional compensation, correct or replace any and all Services not meeting the Standard of Care which appear within a period of one year from the date of final payment of the Contract.

Contractor shall be solely responsible for all construction means, methods, techniques, sequences, and procedures, and for coordinating all portions of the Work under this Agreement.

Article 3. City's Representative

The City designates Bernard Rammer, Purchasing Agent, as the City's Representative for purposes of this Agreement. If the City's Representative deems it appropriate, the City's Representative may consult with other employees of the City, or may retain an appropriate outside expert to assist with the management of this Project.

If the City's Representative or Engineer observes any work performed by the Contractor to not be in conformity with the Agreement, the City's Representative(s) will report that to the Contractor. The City's Representative(s) will have authority to stop any portion of the work not in conformity with the Agreement until the City has investigated and decided upon an appropriate procedure.

Article 4. Compensation

The City shall pay Contractor for the Services an amount not to exceed \$ 97,950.00("Contract Amount").

The cost of final restoration of the site to include screened topsoil, grass seed and mulch is to be included in the bid amount. The Contractor will withhold the value of these services (\$27,750.00) from invoicing until the work is satisfactorily completed in the Spring of 2026.

Invoices shall be sent via first class mail postage prepaid or via email. Payment will be remitted to Contractor within sixty (60) days of invoice receipt. Contractor shall submit an invoice to the City on a monthly basis that is based on the percentage of each quadrant completed. The invoice shall be sent to:

Contractor shall be required to file lien waivers from all suppliers and subcontractors with the City prior to receiving payment. The submission of any Request for Payment shall be deemed a waiverand release by Contractor of all liens and claims with respect to the work and period to which such payment request pertains except as specifically reserved and noted on such request.

Contractor shall deliver to the City a complete release of all liens arising out of this Agreement before the retained percentage or the Final Payment is paid. If any lien remains unsatisfied after the retained percentage or the Final Payment is paid, Contractor shall refund to the City such amounts as the City may have been compelled to pay in discharging such liens (including any costs and reasonable legal fees).

Additional or modified services not set forth in Article 1 must be authorized in writing by the City or its Representative prior to such work being performed, or expenses incurred. The City shall not make payment for any unauthorized work or expenses.

The City may withhold payment, in whole or in part, to the extent necessary to protect itself from a loss on account of any of the following:

- Payments that may be earned or due for just claims for labor or materials furnished in and about the work.
- Defective work.
- Failure of Contractor to make payments due to subcontractors, material suppliers, or employees.
- Damage to the City or a third party.
- The probable filing of claims by other parties against Contractor which may adversely affect the City.
- Reasonable doubt that the Agreement can be completed for the balance then unpaid.
- Liquidated damages due to the City.

The City will disburse, and shall have the right to act as agent for Contractor in disbursing the Withheld Amounts to the party or parties who are entitled to payment. The City will provide the Contractor with a proper accounting of all such funds disbursed on behalf of the Contractor.

The City also reserves the right to refuse payment of the final 10% due to Contractor until the City's Representative is satisfied that all subcontractors, material suppliers, and employees of the Contractor have been paid in full.

Partial payment made under this Agreement is not evidence of the proper performance by Contractor either in whole or in part, and no payment made by the City shall be construed to be an acceptance of defective or improper work. Acceptance of the work by the City shall occur only upon Final Payment by the City which will occur after Final Acceptance. The Parties recognize that more than 45 days may elapse between the submission of the last invoice and Final Acceptance or Final Payment. The City agrees to make reasonable efforts to schedule its Final Inspection in a timely manner and to process the Final Payment in a timely manner upon Final Acceptance. (For the avoidance of doubt, the warranties and guarantees in this Agreement shall continue to apply even after Final Payment by the City.)

Article 5. Appropriation of Funds

Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, if funds for the continued fulfillment of this Agreement by the City are at any time not forthcoming or are insufficient, through failure of any entity, including the City itself, to appropriate funds or otherwise, then the City shall have the right to terminate this Agreement without penalty. The City agrees that it will make its best effort to obtain sufficient funds for the Agreement to meet its obligations hereunder in full.

Article 6. Performance and Payment Bond

Contractor shall, within ten (10) days of the execution of this Agreement by the Common Council of the City of Sheboygan, provide the City with a Performance Bond and a Payment Bond in the amount of one hundred percent (100%) of the contract amount.

Failure by Contractor to perform the work in a timely or satisfactory fashion may result in forfeiture of Contractor's Performance Bond. Failure by Contractor to make necessary payments to suppliers or subcontractors may result in forfeiture of Contractor's Payment Bond.

If the Surety on any bond furnished by Contractor becomes a party to supervision or liquidation, or its right to do business in the State of Wisconsin is terminated, Contractor shall, within thilty (30) calendar days thereafter, substitute another bond or surety, both of which must be acceptable to the City.

Article 7. Schedule

Contractor shall commence work after receiving a Notice to Proceed from the City. All work shall be coordinated with the City's Representative. No work may occur on weekends or holidays without prior approval from the City's Representative.

Contractor shall complete the first phase of services within 120 calendar days of commencement, or within such extra time as may have been allowed by a mutually agreed extension (the "Deadline"). Due primarily to weather conditions which may limit the ability to properly and safely perform the work, the City's Representative shall have the authority to consent to an extension of the Deadline on behalf

of the City and waive any associated penalties with liquidated damages.

Article 8. Liquidated Damages

In the event that Contractor does not complete the Services by the Deadline or the alternative final agreed upon completion date, there shall be deducted from any monies due or that may become due to Contractor, for each and every calendar day that the work remains uncompleted, a sum of One Hundred and 00/100 Dollars (\$100.00) per calendar day.

This sum shall be considered and treated not as a penalty but as fixed, agreed, and liquidated damages due the City from Contractor by reason of inconvenience to the public, added cost of supervision, and other items which have caused an expenditure of public funds resulting from his failure to complete the work.

Article 9. Quality of Materials

All materials used shall be clean and appropriate for such use. Fill materials shall not include hazardous materials or materials that reasonably could be expected to negatively impact construction activities at the Property. Equipment used in the performance of Services shall be appropriate for the activities undertaken therewith. Topsoil shall be screened and free from clumps greater than 1" in diameter and also free from rocks, stones, tree roots or other foreign matter

Article 10. Safety Requirements

All materials, equipment, and supplies provided to the City must comply fully with all safety requirements set forth under state and federal law.

Contractor shall be responsible for the safety of its employees at all times and shall provide all equipment necessary to insure their safety. Contractor shall ensure the enforcement of all applicable safety rules, regulations, ordinances and laws, whether federal, state, or local.

Contractor shall provide the necessary safeguards including, but not limited to, warning signs and barricades, to avoid all necessary hazards and protect the public, the work, and the property at all times, including on days when no work is being done. The City shall not be responsible for any loss or damage to the project materials prior to their installation or to Contractor's tools and equipment from any cause whatsoever. Further, the City shall not be responsible to any damage to the work in process or any materials or equipment associated with the work.

Article 11. Open Records

Both parties understand that the City is bound by the Wisconsin Public Records Law and, as such, this contract is subject to that law. Contractor acknowledges that it is obligated to assist the City in retaining and producing records that are subject to Wisconsin Public Records Law, and that the failure to do so shall constitute a material breach of the contract, and that Contractor must defend and hold the City harmless from liability under that law. Except as otherwise authorized, those records shall be maintained for a period of seven (7) years after receipt of Final Payment under the Agreement.

Article 12. Termination

The City may terminate or suspend performance of this Agreement at the City's prerogative at any time upon written notice to Contractor. The City's Representative shall have the authority to provide

this written notice. Contractor shall terminate or suspend performance of the Services on a schedule acceptable to the City and the City shall pay Contractor for all the Services performed up to the date that written notice is received, plus reasonable termination or suspension expenses. Upon restart, an equitable adjustment shall be made to Contractor's compensation and the schedule of services.

If the City fails to make payment through no fault of the Contractor for a period of 30 days after such payment is due in accordance with the Contract Documents, the Contractor may, upon 7 days written notice to the City, terminate the Agreement and recover from the City payment for all work executed and for any proven loss sustained upon any materials, equipment, tools, and construction equipment and machinery, including reasonable profit and damages.

If Contractor defaults or fails to fulfill in a timely and proper manner its obligations pursuant to this Agreement, the City may, seven (7) days after written notice has been delivered to Contractor, and without prejudice to any other remedy it may have, make good such deficiencies and may deduct the cost thereof from the payment then or thereafter due to Contractor. In the alternative the City may, at its option, terminate this Agreement and take possession of the site and of all materials, equipment, tools, and construction equipment and machinery thereon owned by Contractor, and may finish the project by whatever method it may deem expedient. In case the expenses incurred by the City (including payments previously made to Contractor) shall be less than the sum which would have been payable under the Agreement if it had been completed by Contractor, Contractor shall be entitled to receive the difference. However, in case such expense shall exceed the sum which would have been payable under the Agreement, Contractor will be liable and shall pay to the City the amount of said excess. By taking over prosecution of the work, the City does not forfeit the right to recover damages from Contractor or its surety for failure to complete the work in the time specified.

For the avoidance of doubt, the specific remedies identified in this Article 11 are not exclusive. In other words, the City may pursue any remedy in law or equity in the event that Contractor defaults under this Agreement.

Article 13. Default

If Contractor breaches this Agreement or fails to perform the work in an acceptable manner, it shall be considered in default. Any one or more of the following will be considered a default:

- Failure to begin the work under this Agreement within the time specified.
- Failure to perform the work with sufficient supervision, workers, equipment and materials to ensure prompt completion of said work within the time limits allowed.
- Unsuitable performance of the work as determined by City.
- Neglecting or refusing to remove defective materials or failure to perform anew such work as shall have been rejected.
- Discontinuing the prosecution of the work or any part of it.
- Inability to finance the work adequately.
- If, for any other reason, Contractor breaches this Agreement or fails to carry out the work in an acceptable manner.

The City shall send Contractor a written notice of default. If Contractor, within a period of seven (7) days after such notice, fails to remedy the default, then the City shall have full power and authority, without

violation of the Agreement, to take the prosecution of the work out of the hands of Contractor, as set folth in this Agreement.

Article 14. Identity of Contractor

Contractor acknowledges that one of the primary reasons for its selection by the City to perform the Services is the qualifications and experience of Contractor. Contractor thus agrees that the Services to be perfom1ed pursuant to this Agreement shall be performed by Contractor. Contractor shall not subcontract any part of the Services without the prior written permission of the City. The City's Representative shall have the ability to provide this written permission. The City reserves the right to reject any of the Contractor 's personnel or proposed outside professional sub-consultants, and the City reserves the right to request that acceptable replacement personnel be assigned to the project.

Article 15. Independent Contractor Status

During the entire term of this Agreement, Contractor shall be an independent contractor, and in no event shall any of its personnel, agents or sub-contractors be construed to be, or represent themselves to be, employees of the City. Contractor shall be solely responsible for the payment and reporting of all employee and employer taxes, including social security, unemployment, and any other federal, state, or local taxes required to be withheld from employees or payable on behalf of its employees.

Article 16. Indemnification

Contractor is responsible to the City for the acts and omissions of its employees, subcontractors, and any other persons performing any of the work under a contract with Contractor.

As such, to the extent permitted by law, Contractor shall defend and hold the City, including its officials, agents, and employees, harmless from all liability, including, but not limited to, losses, damages, costs, attorney's fees, expenses, causes of action, claims, or judgments resulting from claimed injury, death, damage to propelty, or loss of use of property or any person or legal entity arising out of or in any way connected with the perf01mance of work or work to be performed under this Agreement.

Contractor shall reimburse the City for any costs, expenses, judgments, and attorney's fees paid or incurred, by or on behalf of the City, its officials, agents, or employees, or paid for on behalf of the City, its officials, agents, or employees by insurance purchased or self-insurance provided by the City.

For the avoidance of doubt, Contractor shall further hold the City, its officials, agents, and employees harmless from liability or claims for any injuries to or death of Contractor's employees (or the employees of any authorized subcontractor) arising out of or in any way connected with the work or work to be performed under this Agreement, including protection against any claim of the contractor or subcontractor for any payments under any worker's compensation law or any expenses of or any payments made by any worker's compensation insurance carrier on behalf of said contractor or subcontractor, and the contractor shall hold the City harmless from any costs, expenses, judgments, and attorney's fees with respect to any above referenced workers' compensation claims made or paid by the City or paid on its behalf or on behalf of its Officials, Agents, or Employees by insurance purchased or self-insurance provided by the City.

Article 17. Insurance

Contractor shall not commence work under this Agreement until it has obtained all insurance required under this Article. Additionally, Contractor shall not allow any approved subcontractor to commence work on its subcontract until the subcontractor has obtained all insurance required under this Alticle.

During the performance of any and all Services under this Agreement, Contractor shall maintain the following insurance in full force and effect, and shall provide proof of insurance to the City's Representative listing the City of Sheboygan as an additional insured:

- a. Workers' Compensation Insurance Contractor shall acquire and maintain, for the duration of the Agreement, Workers' Compensation Insurance that meets all statutory requirements. In the event this Agreement authorizes any work to be subcontracted, Contractor shall require
 - any subcontractor to similarly provide Workers' Compensation Insurance in accordance with all statutory requirements.
- b. Commercial General Liability Insurance Contractor shall acquire and maintain, for the duration of this Agreement, Commercial General Liability Insurance with a policy limit of at least \$2,000,000 per occurrence and \$2,000,000 in the aggregate.

The proof of insurance referenced above shall require the insurance company to notify the City at least thirty (30) days prior to the expiration, cancellation, non-renewal, or material change in the coverage. The Certificate Holder on the proof of insurance should be listed as:

The proof of insurance must contain an original signature.

Approval of the insurance by the City shall not relieve or decrease the extent to which Contractor may be held responsible for payment of damages resulting from Contractor's provision of the Services or its operations under this Agreement. If Contractor fails or refuses to procure or maintain the insurance required by these provisions, or fails or refuses to furnish the City the required proof that the insurance has been procured and is in force and paid for, the City shall have the right at its election to terminate the Agreement.

Article 18. Conflict of Interest

Contractor declares that it has no present interest, nor shall it acquire any interest, direct or indirect, which would conflict with the performance of Services under this Agreement. Contractor agrees that no person having any such interest shall be employed in the performance of this Agreement.

Article 19. Waiver

No failure of either party to enforce a term of this Agreement against the other shall be construed as a waiver of that term, nor shall it in any way affect the party's right to enforce that term. No waiver by any party of any term of this Agreement shall be considered to be a waiver of any other term or breach thereof.

Article 20. Severability

The invalidity, illegality or unenforceability of any provision of this Agreement or the occurrence of any event rendering any portion or provision of this Agreement void shall in no way affect the validity or enforceability of any other portion or provision of this Agreement. Any void provision shall be deemed severed from this Agreement , and the balance of the Agreement shall be construed and enforced as if it did not contain the particular provision held to be void. The parties further agree to amend this Agreement to replace any stricken provision with a valid provision that comes as close as possible to the intent of the stricken provision. The provisions of this Article shall not prevent this entire Agreement from being void should a provision which is of the essence of this Agreement be determined void .

Article 21. Assignment

Neither the City nor Contractor shall assign any rights or duties under this Agreement without the prior written consent of the other party. Such written approval by the City shall not relieve the Contractor of the obligations incurred by the Contractor under the terms of this Agreement.

Article 22. Third Party Rights

Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to give any rights or benefits to anyone other than the City and Contractor.

Nothing in this Agreement shall create any contractual relationship between any subcontractor and the City. Contractor agrees to bind every approved subcontractor (and every subcontractor of a subcontractor) by the terms of this Agreement as far as applicable to that subcontractor's work, unless specifically noted to the contrary in a subcontract approved in writing as adequate by the City. The City's Representative shall have the authority to consent to a subcontract as being adequate.

Article 23. Governing Law and Venue

This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Wisconsin. Venue of any disputes arising under this Agreement shall be in the Sheboygan County Circuit Court, Wisconsin.

Article 24. Non-Discrimination

In connection with the performance of work under this Agreement, Contractor agrees not to discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of age, race, religion, color, handicap, sex, physical condition, developmental disability (as defined in Wis. Stat. § 51.0 l (5)), sexual orientation (as defined in Wis. Stat. § 1 11.32(13m)), or national origin. This provision shall include, but not be limited to, the following: employment, upgrading, demotion or transfer, recruitment or recruitment advertising, layoff or termination, rates of pay or other forms of compensation, and selection for training, including apprenticeship. Contractor further agrees to take affirmative action to ensure equal employment opportunities.

Article 25. Compliance with Laws

In performing the Services under this Agreement, Contractor shall comply with any and all applicable federal, state and local statutes, ordinances, plans, and regulations. This includes all safety requirements as set forth by the Wisconsin Administrative Code and all applicable OSHA Standards.

The City reserves the right to cancel this Agreement if Contractor fails to follow the requirements of Wis.

Stat. § 77.66 and related statutes regarding certification for collection of sales and use tax . The City also reserves the right to cancel this Agreement with any state or federally debarred contractor.

Contractor shall have any and all licenses and permits required to perform the work specified, and shall furnish proof of such licensing authorization and permits upon request.

Article 26. Notices

Any notice required by this Agreement shall be made in writing to the individuals/addresses specified below:

Nothing contained in this Article shall be construed to restrict the transmission of routine communications between representatives of the City and Contractor.

Article 27. Intent to be Bound

The City and Contractor each binds itself and its successors, executors, administrators, permitted assigns, legal representatives and, in the case of a partnership, its partners to the other party to this Agreement, and to the successors, executors, administrators, permitted assigns, legal representatives and partners of such other party in respect to all provisions of this Agreement.

Article 28. Force Majeure

Neither party shall be in default by reason of any failure in performance of this Agreement in accordance with reasonable control and without fault or negligence on their part. Such causes may include, but are not restricted to, acts of nature or the public enemy, acts of the government in either its sovereign or contractual capacity, fires, floods, epidemics, quarantine restrictions, strikes, freight embargoes, and unusually severe weather. In every case, the failure to perform must be beyond the reasonable control and without the fault or negligence of the party.

Article 29. Integration and Modification

This Agreement may be modified only by a written amendment signed by both parties hereto.

This Agreement consists of the following parts, each of which is as fully a part of this Agreement as if fully set out herein:

- 1. This Agreement and its Attachments and Exhibits
- 2. Any Written Amendment to the Agreement which may be delivered or issued after the Effective Date of the Agreement (including Change Orders)
- 3. The Request for Bids (including all attachments and exhibits)
- 4. All Addenda to the Request for Bids
- 5. All Other Submittals by Contractor
- 6. The Performance and Payment Bonds

(collectively "the Contract"). This Contract is the entire and integrated agreement between the City and Contractor regarding the subject matter of this Contract. It supersedes all prior and contemporaneous communications, representations and agreements that are not part of this Contract.

In resolving conflicts, errors, discrepancies and disputes concerning the Scope of Work to be performed by Contractor, the document expressing the greater quantity, quality, or other scope of work in question, or imposing the greater obligation upon Contractor and affording the greater right or remedy to the City shall govern. Otherwise, the documents shall be given precedence in the order set forth above.

Article 30. Non-Collusion

Contractor is certifying, under penalty of perjury, that to the best of its knowledge and belief:

- 1. The prices in its bid were arrived at independently, without collusion, consultation, communication, or agreement for the purpose of restricting competition as to any other matter relating to such prices with any other bidder, or with any other competitor.
- 2. The prices quoted in its bid were not knowingly disclosed-directly or indirectly-by the bidder prior to bid opening.
- 3. No attempt was made to induce any other person, partnership, or corporation to submit or not submit a bid for the purpose of restricting competition.

Article 31. Other Provisions

- 1. Material Safety Data Sheet. If any item(s) on an order(s) resulting from this Agreement is a hazardous chemical, as defined under 29 C.F.R. 1910.1200, Contractor shall provide one (1) copy of a Material Safety Data Sheet for each item with the shipped container(s) and one (1) copy with the invoice(s).
- 2. Advertising and News Releases. Reference to or use of the City, or any of its departments, officials, or employees, for commercial promotion is prohibited. News releases peltaining to this procurement shall not be made without prior approval of the City's Representative. Release of broadcast e-mails pellaining to this procurement shall not be made without prior written authorization of the City's Representative.
- 3. Foreign Corporation . A foreign corporation (any corporation other than a Wisconsin corporation) which becomes a party to this Agreement is required to confo1m to all the requirements of Wis. Stat. Ch. 180 relating to a foreign corporation, and must possess a certificate of authority from the Wisconsin Department of Financial Institutions, unless the corporation is transacting business in interstate commerce or is otherwise exempt from the requirement of obtaining a certificate of authority.
 - 4. Guaranteed Delivery. Failure of the Contractor to adhere to delivery schedules as specified or to promptly replace rejected materials shall render the Contractor liable for all costs in excess of the Agreement price when alternate procurement is necessary. Excess costs shall include the administrative costs and other costs attributable to the delay.
- 5. Authority. Each person executing this Agreement on behalf of a patty hereto represents and

warrants to the other party: That the execution and delivery of this Agreement has been duly authorized, that the person or persons executing this Agreement have the full power, authority, and right to do so, and that such execution is sufficient and legally binding on such party to enable this Agreement to be enforceable in accordance with its terms.

6. Intent of Contract Documents.

- a. The intent of this Agreement is to include in the contract price the cost of all labor and materials, water, fuel, tools, plants, equipment, light, transportation, and any other expenses that may be necessary for the proper execution and completion of the work included in the Agreement.
- b. In interpreting the Agreement, words describing materials that have a well-known technical or trade meaning shall be construed m accordance with such well known meanings unless otherwise specifically defined

CITY OF SHEBOYGAN REQUEST FOR BIDS BID #2080-25 Building Razing Former Senior Activity Center

1.0 BACKGROUND

The City of Sheboygan is soliciting sealed bids for the Demolition, Removal, Disposal and site restoration of the former Senior Activity Center located at 428 Wisconsin Avenue, Sheboygan WI. The Single story approximately 17,000 square foot structure was built in 1969 comprised of steel and Masonry. Following removal and restoration, it is the intention of the City to offer the site for future development.

The Building has one level with approximately 17,250 sq. ft. There is no basement. There is also a 780 sq. ft. two car detached garage of wood frame construction.

The City has contracted with Northstar Environmental Testing to perform a detailed inspection of the property to quantify the need for abatement of asbestos and Lead-Based Paint prior to standard machine demolition. **A full report is included in these bid documents.**

Further, The City has contracted with a licensed firm to remove the majority of asbestos containing materials that are required to be removed prior to be removed preceding standard machine demolition. Certain asbestos containing materials will become the responsibility of the demolition Contractor to handle in accordance with existing laws. These are identified later in this document.

There are a number of non-regulated items identified below which will become the responsibility of the demolition contractor. Many of these items cannot be recycled or re-used and must be disposed of using proper methods. (see below)

1.1 GENERAL

The work entailed under the **Base Bid** contract consists of all permits, labor, machinery, materials to completely remove and lawfully dispose of the approximate 17,000 sq. ft main structure plus garage including basements, foundations, floors, remaining fumishings and equipment and all site pavement. The Contractor shall be responsible for the proper disconnection and capping of water lines at the curb stop as well as sanitary and storm sewer in the terrace or property line to the satisfaction of the City of Sheboygan Plumbing Inspector. Also slated for demolition is a freestanding 780 square foot

two car garage.

The City of Sheboygan owns the entire one-third +/- City Block between North fourth street to the East, Wisconsin Avenue to the South and North Fifth Street to the West. The Contract will include other restorative work on the entire parcel in addition to demolition of the Buildings. This work will include pavement removals and Curb removal, Grading, Levelling, infill and restoration of Three Driveway approaches and two sidewalk Approaches.

As of this writing, development of the cleared site is not scheduled and the timing for future redevelopment of the cleared site cannot be determined. The City is of the opinion that the cleared and levelled site will require grass seed and mulch along with any necessary storm sewer inlet protection and erosion control measures until the turf is established.

Disposal of razed materials, including possible placement of clean, crushed on site concrete (if applicable) shall be done in accordance with the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources(WDNR) regulations, Wisconsin Administrative Code NR500 and City of Sheboygan Ordinances. Any and all materials to be disposed of off-site that cannot be recycled shall be disposed of at an EPA/WDNR approved and licensed disposal Facility. Receipt of the disposal transaction with the approval of the disposal site shall be retained and presented to the City of Sheboygan before final payment will be made.

Attention is called for the need of the Contractor to review and fully understand all regulations related to the proper handling, crushing and disposal of all materials from the site in accordance with State and Federal Regulations. These Guidelines can be found within and attached to this document.

Under no circumstances will the City of Sheboygan assume any liability for the improper handling, disposal or re-use of any demolition materials generated during the work. The Demolition Contractor is solely responsible to assure that all materials are disposed of in a manner consistent with existing State and Federal Regulations including those containing **Asbestos and/or Lead which cannot be recycled.**

1.2 PERMITS

The contractor shall be required to obtain all applicable City permits and pay for Permit fees <u>prior</u> to beginning demolition. Contractors doing work in the City of Sheboygan are required to be **licensed** by the Building Inspection Department. This requirement includes any sub-contractors. Contact the Building Inspection Dept at (920) 459-4064 for information and costs. Please note that the City of Sheboygan does not "waive" permit fees for City projects.

1.3 BIDDER'S PROOF OF RESPONSIBILITY

Each bidder shall be required to furnish or have on file a valid Bidder's Proof of Responsibility form with the Engineering Division, Department of Public Works, City of Sheboygan, <u>not less than five</u> (5) days prior to the time of opening of these bids. Forms for filing of such Proof of Responsibility

are enclosed with the bid Documents for use by all interested bidders. Said form shall fully demonstrate the bidder's financial ability, adequacy of plant, equipment, and organization, prior experience or competency to perform the work contemplated and other pertinent and material facts. (Forms are included with the bid documents)

1.4 AWARD OF CONTRACT/REJECTION OF BIDS

- A. The City of Sheboygan will select a single contractor submitting the lowest responsible "Total Demolition Cost" bid indicated on the "Bidder's Proposal Form."
- B. The City reserves the right to consider as unqualified any bidder that does not habitually perform, with his own forces, the major portions of the work under this contract and/or has performed unacceptable or substandard work for the City under previous City Contracts.
 - C. The Agreement between the parties will be in the form of a City Purchase Order and City of Sheboygan standard agreement referencing the terms and conditions of the bid documents.
 - D. The City of Sheboygan reserves the right to reject any bids, cancel this Solicitation, waive any informality with the bid process and award the bid deemed to be in the best interest of the City of Sheboygan.

1.5 BONDING/INSURANCE

. <u>BID GUARANTY</u>

No bid will be considered unless it is accompanied by a Bid Guaranty. At the option of the bidder, the guaranty may be a certified check, bank draft or bid Bond, which shall not be less than five (5%) percent of the amount of the bid Certified check or bank draft shall be made payable to the "City of Sheboygan." Cash deposits will not be accepted. The Bid Guaranty shall insure the Acceptance of the Contract and the furnishing of insurance coverage. If the successful bidder fails to follow through to the execution of a contract the bond will be forfeited.

Please include a **photocopy** of the check or bid bond with your electronic bid submission.

B. PERFORMANCE AND PAYMENT BOND

Shall be in a sum not less than 100% of the amount of contract as awarded as security for the faithful performance of the contract, and for the payment of all persons, firms or corporations to whom the contractor may become legally indebted for labor, materials, tools, equipment or services of any nature, including utility and transportation services, employed or used by him in performing this contract work.

The failure of the successful bidder to supply the required Surety Bond within ten (10) days after receipt of contract award or within such extended period as the Purchasing Agent may grant, based upon reasons determined sufficient, the Purchasing Agent may either Award the contract to the next lowest responsible bidder or reject all bids and re-advertise for bids.

C. CONTRACTOR INSURANCE COVERAGE

The successful bidder shall not commence work under this contract until he has obtained all insurance required under this paragraph, nor shall the successful bidder allow any subcontractor to commence work on his subcontract until all similar proof of insurance required of the subcontractor has been obtained.

1.6 <u>INDEMNIFICATION</u>

The contractor agrees to save and keep the City of Sheboygan including its
Officials, Agents, and Employees, free and harmless from all liability, including but not limited to losses,
damages, costs, attorney's fees, expenses, causes of action, claims or judgments resulting from claimed
injury, death, damage to property or loss of use of property or any person or legal entity arising out of or in
any way connected with the performance of work or work to be performed under this contract, except as to
the negligence of the City of Sheboygan or its employees as to which this Hold Harmless and indemnity
Agreement, shall not apply. The contractor shall indemnify the City of Sheboygan for any costs, expenses,
judgments and attorney's fees paid or incurred, by or on behalf of the City of Sheboygan, its
Officials, Agents or Employees or paid for on behalf of the City of Sheboygan, its Officials, Agents, or
Employees by insurance purchased or self-insurance provided by the City of Sheboygan as this Hold
Harmless and Indemnity Agreement.

The contractor shall further hold harmless the City of Sheboygan, its Officials, Agents and Employees from liability or claims for any injuries to or death of the contractor's employees or subcontractor's employees, arising out of or in any way connected with the work or work to be performed under this contract, including protection against any claim of the contractor or subcontractor for any payments under any worker's compensation law or any expenses of or any payments made by any worker's compensation insurance carrier on behalf of said contractor or sub-contractor and the contractor shall indemnify the City of Sheboygan for any costs, expenses, judgments and attorney's fees with respect to any above referenced workers' compensation claim incurred or paid by the City of Sheboygan or paid on its behalf or behalf of its Officials, Agents or Employees by insurance purchased or self-insurance provided by the City Of Sheboygan.

1.7 <u>SAFETY REQUIREMENTS</u>

The contractor shall be responsible for furnishing, erecting, and maintaining suitable Barricades, warning signs, flashers, fencing etc. to properly protect and safe-guard his personnel and the general public during all phases of this contract.

1.8 PROTECTION OF EXISTING FACILITIES

The contractor shall give notice to the proper authorities in charge of streets, gas and water pipes, electric and other conduits, railroad, poles, catch basins, sewers, and all other property that may be affected by the contractor's operations, at least three days, excluding Saturday, Sunday and legal holidays, before breaking ground. The contractor shall not hinder or interfere with any persons in the protection of such property or with the operations or utilities at any time. The contractor must obtain all necessary information in regard to existing utilities. He shall protect such utilities from damage and unnecessary exposure. The cost of repairing any damage to utilities shall be the responsibility of the contractor causing said damage.

The replacement of City Sidewalks or curbing pavement that are inadvertently damaged during demolition are the sole responsibility of the Demolition Contractor.

FENCING:

Fencing of the portion of the site to be demolished is highly recommended while demolition is underway due to the close proximity of the sidewalks and curb lines.. The Demolition Contractor will need to contact the City of Sheboygan Department of Public Works for information regarding temporary closures of sidewalks if required.

PRESENT DAY

As of August 2025, the following Utility preparations have been completed.

- Gas service will be removed back to the Natural Gas Main.
- An order to disconnect phone lines and Fiber Optic has been initiated with AT&T
- The City will arrange for removal of all electrical power from the site following the completion of ACM and LBP Abatement estimated to conclude in September.
- The Water Meter will be removed. Sanitary and storm sewers are still connected and proper disconnections and capping of same will be the responsibility of the demolition contractor at the property lines.
- The water lateral is copper and the Contractor will be responsible for disconnection and capping of same at the curb stop.
- Central Air Conditioning systems by way of several rooftop units will be purged of all Freon by a Licensed Contractor.
- There is one(1) Water Lateral serving the Property. It is of copper construction and can be disconnected at the curb stop.
- Abatement of Asbestos containing materials to be removed prior to demolition is scheduled and expected to conclude in mid- September

A: Asbestos/Lead Based Paint

All asbestos containing materials, which are required by the State of WI to be removed prior to standard machine demolition will be removed prior to demolition by a State Certified and licensed Contractor. This is expected to be completed by the end of September 2025

The following Materials will be the responsibility of the **DEMOLITION CONTRACTOR** to properly handle and dispose of in a lawful manner

ASBESTOS:

- 230 Square feet of wall panel adhesive-see Northstar Environmental Testing Report
- 18,500 square feet of roofing materials-See Northstar Environmental Testing Report.
- Exterior Concrete Block Walls: (IMPORTANT)
 The exterior Concrete Block walls are insulated with a vermiculite insulation product.
 While the Vermiculite was tested by Northstar Environmental and found to contain less than 1% Asbestos, the Wisconsin Dept. of Natural Resources mandates that this block cannot be crushed and recycled and therefore MUST be disposed of in a Licensed landfill.

LEAD BASED PAINT:

- The yellow lead based paint on the South and West Exterior of the building (curbing and parking lot lettering) will be removed from the pavement by the abatement Contractor. See Northstar Environmental report. You do not need to include any special handling of this concrete/asphalt in your bid.
- The yellow parking lot striping has been tested and is negative for Lead. This is because The building started out as an elementary school and the paved parking lot was not used for parking until the City acquired the building in the early 1990's.
- The Inside of the north wall of Room # 25 has Lead Based Paint (Light Blue). Since this
 is an exterior wall which contains vermiculite insulation, the wall cannot be recycled or
 crushed and therefore will need to be transported to a certified landfill for disposal.
 See Northstar Environmental Report.

The Contractor is solely responsible to carefully remove and segregate these materials from other demolition debris and transport them to a licensed landfill manifested as Asbestos. Whenever possible the materials should be wet down during removal.

Additionally, the Contractor should provide an OSHA Competent supervisor on site during demolition who is familiar with the proper handling of asbestos containing materials and also to watch for and recognize materials uncovered during demolition that were not previously identified which may be concealed.

Should suspicious materials manifest themselves during the demolition process the Contractor is required to immediately notify the City so that a licensed firm can investigate and determine composition of the materials and if required, have the materials properly abated and removed.

1.9 SITE INSPECTION-MANDATORY

It is the responsibility of each bidder and bidder's subcontractor to visit the site of proposed work and fully acquaint him or herself with the existing conditions and should fully inform himself as to the difficulties and restrictions in performing this contract.

A MANDATORY inspection of the building is scheduled for 9:00 A.M. CST, on Thursday September 18, 2025 commencing in the main parking lot east of the building.

1.10 ANTICIPATED PROJECT SCHEDULE

- MANDATORY PRE-Bid Conference, Friday September 19, 2025 9:00 am
- Bidder's Proof of Responsibility Due Monday September 22, 2025 via email
- Bids Due Via Email Thursday September 30, 2025 1:00 pm
- Contract Award As soon as possible following approvals
- Start of Demolition Tentatively scheduled for October 2025
- Project completion February 2026 except for topsoil, seed, mulch which will be postponed until Spring

1.11 LIQUIDATED DAMAGES

Should the contractor fail to complete the work by the agreed upon date **or by an alternate date mutually agreeable to both parties at time of contract,** or within such extra time as may have been allowed by extension, there shall be deducted from any monies due or that may become due the contractor, for each and every calendar day that the work remains uncompleted, <u>a sum of \$ 100.00 per calendar day</u>

This sum shall be considered and treated not as a penalty but as fixed, agreed and liquidated damages due the City from the contractor by reason of inconvenience to the public, added cost of engineering and supervision, maintenance of detours and other items which have caused an expenditure of public funds resulting from his failure to complete the work.

Permitting the contractor to continue and finish the work or any part of same after the time fixed for its completion, or after the date to which the time for completion may have been extended, shall in no way be construed as a waiver on the part of the City of Sheboygan of any of its rights under the contract.

1.12 BASIS OF PAYMENT

The work included in the **base bid** as specified, will be paid at a lump sum price, which shall be payment in full for razing, breaking down, and removals; abandonment and disconnection of utilities; for obtaining permits; for off-site disposal of razed materials site restoration and for providing all labor, bonding, tools, materials and equipment necessary to complete the work in accordance with this request for bid.

1.13 SERVICE DISCONNECT

The Contractor, with assistance from the owner will be responsible for disconnecting electricity, natural gas, water, storm sewer, and sanitary sewer services to the building. The City of Sheboygan will assist as needed. Disconnection and permanent capping of the Water and Storm sewer laterals shall be done to the satisfaction of the City of Sheboygan Plumbing Inspector.

1.15 WAGE RATES Not Required.

1.16 HAZARDOUS MATERIALS

(See attached report from Northstar Environmental Testing for reference)

Contractor in accordance with Wisconsin Administrative Code Chapter NR447 and DHSS regulations and guidelines under separate contract.

See Below for Asbestos Containing materials that are the responsibility of the <u>Demolition Contractor</u> to dispose of in a licensed landfill. These materials <u>cannot be recycled and must be transported to a licensed landfill</u>

1.17 CRUSHING OF CONCRETE ON-SITE:

Crushing of clean concrete on-site is allowed under the following conditions:

NOTE: Exterior Block walls containing Vermiculite Insulation and cannot be Crushed /Recycled

- 1. Site is properly fenced for both safety and security
- 2. Crushing should occur in the central portion of the site.
- 3. Proper Dust Control measures (Water) must be followed at all times
- 4. Only concrete that meets the WDNR's definition of "clean concrete" can be considered for recycling(crushing). The demo contractor is responsible to understand what is considered clean concrete. Concrete coated with paint that is not lead-bearing paint may be used as fill, aggregate or concrete to concrete recycling in accordance with the following rule exemptions:
- 5. Crushing may occur between the hours of 8:00 am and 4:00 pm Monday through Friday (no holidays)

Reuse of clean concrete is exempt under s. NR 500.08(2)(a), Wis. Adm. Code. Certain environmental performance, location and operational requirements apply. Please review these requirements [s. NR 504.04(3)(c) and s.NR 504.04(4)] before placing used concrete on the land. For more information about this disposal exemption, refer to a separate frequently asked question, what is defined as "clean fill" that does not have to be taken to a landfill, on the DNR website at http://dnr.wi.gov/topic/Waste/SolidFAQ.html

2.0 SALVABLE MATERIALS

There is no guarantee of salvable materials or property involved in this Contract. No responsibility shall be assumed by any party for loss of salvable materials due to damage, theft or condition at time of contract etc.

3.0 DEMOLITION REQUIREMENTS

The entire building and its foundations, basements, sub-basements footings and other improvements, including walkways, parking lots and patios inside the City owned sidewalks and commencing from North 5th Street to North 4th Street and North of Wisconsin Avenue to the north property line. Site is to be entirely cleared of all improvements inside of the City Sidewalk.

In addition to the entire building, its foundations, footings, floors, loading docks, sump pits, stone retaining walls and footings, planters, drainage swales and building contents, the contractor shall include in the demolition cost the removal and proper disposal of the following:

- 1. All oil containing ballasts, electrical transformers, elevator cars and hydraulic machinery, HID lamps, fluorescent lamps, emergency lighting batteries, fire extinguishers, and mercury switches, EXIT signs containing possible nuclear materials etc.
- 2. Any and all roofing materials assumed to contain asbestos which is considered by the WDNR to be acceptable by the licensed landfill as non-regulated demolition waste.
- 3. Equipment with CFC (Freon) or HCFC materials.
- 4. Other materials, such as certain light bulbs, mercury switches, batteries, door closures, water coolers, personal property, vault door, safe deposit box cabinetry and AC units, etc. will need to be removed/managed prior to demolition by the Demolition
 Contractor.

- 6. Curb cuts to remove Three existing driveway aprons and two sidewalk ramps(midblock) will need to be replaced with concrete curb and gutter by the Demolition contractor in accordance with City of Sheboygan specifications and backfilled with topsoil, seed and mulch...
- 7. All Parking lots, curbing, drainage swales, lighting, signage, lamp post bases, footings foundations, parking stops are to be removed.

The following items shall not be razed under the base bid:

- 1. Street pavements, public sidewalks and Curbing along City Streets.
- 2. Chain Link Fencing on North Property Line east of North 5th Street ending near the garage. The short section of chain link fencing to the south is to be removed.

4.0 BACKFILLING & SITE RESTORATION

A. The Contractor will be responsible for back filling and site restoration including suitable compaction of the clean fill materials so as to provide for future excavation for construction of new improvements to the site in the near future. The site is the entire 1/3 Block East Of North

Fifth Street, West of North 4th Street and North of Wisconsin Avenue.

- B. If Necessary, The City will contract separately with a Civil Engineering Firm to provide compaction testing during the backfill process. This data will be shared with Future parties interested in the development of the parcel. The Demolition Contractor is expected to work with the City's Third-Party Engineering firm to allow for scheduling and proper testing during backfill operations.
- C. Site restoration shall include proper compaction (as determined by engineering Firm), rough grading and finish grading, topsoil, seed and mulch.
- D. Should weather conditions not be suitable to complete restoration including spreading of topsoil, application of grass seed and mulch The Contractor will work with the City to establish a mutually agreeable schedule. As security, the City will withhold not less than 10% of the total bid payable upon completion.
- D. All sidewalks, pavement and driveways inside the City owned sidewalk around the perimeter and the curb line shall be removed and the grade restored.
- E. Contractor will be responsible for the removal and disposal of Three driveway aprons (3), Two (2) Sidewalk ramps and restoration of the concrete curb and gutter in a manner consistent with City of Sheboygan Engineering Department procedures.
 - F. Finish grading of the site shall be performed in such a manner as to assure that grade is level with existing City of Sheboygan Sidewalks and surrounding parcels and that no ponding of storm water on the parcel will occur.
- 5.0 PARTIAL INVENTORY OF BUILDING COMPONENTS that will become the sole property and responsibility of the Demolition Contractor as a part of this **BASE** contract:
 - Electrical power transformers not owned by the Utility.
 - Electrical Distribution panels, conduits, raceways, wiring etc.(non ACM)
 - All lighting fixtures including fluorescent tubes
 - All permanent furnishings and fixtures
 - Ceiling tiles and associated grid work.
 - HVAC Equipment
 - Water heating equipment and circulation pumps
 - Plumbing fixtures
 - Heating Thermostats
 - Sump Pumps
 - Carpeting and Floor coverings
 - Hollow metal entranceways, steel doors, wood doors, overhead doors.
 - Exit lighting including those fixtures possibly containing radioactive materials requiring controlled and regulated disposition.
 - Emergency lighting fixtures that may contain lead acid batteries.

- External lighting fixtures connected to the structure and those within the confines of the City sidewalks.
- Other property, building components and fixtures
- Flag Pole
- Outdoor concrete including walkways, steps, ramps, curbs and driveways.
- Building Foundations, concrete planters, concrete exterior lighting bases and abutments.
- Assorted paints, chemical, coatings.
- Other personal Property.
- Any Unregulated hazardous materials as identified in the Northstar Environmental Report attached.

SEE COMPLETE LIST OF THESE MATERIALS INCLUDED IN THE NORTHSTAR ENVIRONMENTAL REPORT

Note Regarding Electrical Panels:

The building was originally constructed in the 1960's. Many electrical panels and disconnects from that era were known to contain asbestos insulation. Unfortunately, these cannot be properly inspected until electrical power has been permanently shut off from the building. Once that occurs, the City intends to have an inspection performed and further have those panels found to <u>contain asbestos</u> removed and disposed of in a lawful manner. Bidders are cautioned to take this into account when preparing their bids and calculating salvage values associated with electrical distribution panels and equipment.

Alternatively, the contractor may assume possession of the electrical panels with the knowledge that he/she then becomes responsible for the Asbestos(if Present).

6.0 SCOPE OF WORK

The City of Sheboygan Common Council has directed that bids should be obtained for the complete demolition of the structure including off-site disposal of all materials not used for backfill/restoration. This includes complete restoration of the site to a dust free condition including proper compaction of backfill material. The Scope of Work is as follows:

 Furnish City of Sheboygan with Performance and Payment bonds equivalent to 100% of the total cost of the work, a minimum of seven days prior to the start of demolition or preparations preceding demolition.

Provide Certificate of Insurance with separate endorsement naming the City of Sheboygan as additionally insured.

- Purchase and obtain a Demolition Permit from the City of Sheboygan Building Inspection Department. (Note: City does NOT waive any permit fees).
- Contractor and all Sub-Contractors must be licensed in the City of Sheboygan with the Building Inspection Department. The cost of any and all licensure, either temporary or permanent, is the total responsibility of the Contractor and Sub-Contractors and will not be "waived" for any reason.
- Prior to obtaining a demolition permit, it will be the responsibility of the demolition
 Contractor, acting as General Contractor, to arrange for and assure for the proper disconnection and termination, in accordance with all codes and ordinances in effect at the time, of all utilities and

provide suitable certification of such disconnection.

- Provide and install all erosion curtains and inlet protection on storm sewer inlets located in the street or right of way as may be required by the Wisconsin DNR during the demolition process and an extended period of time until the turf is established
- Temporarily protect all storm sewer inlets around the site to protect against the entry of soils or other materials during and immediately following the demolition and site restoration.
 These shall remain in place until the site has been rendered safe from runoff.
- Mobilization and suitable preparation of the building and the job site to allow for the work to be done in a safe manner. This will include fencing of the site. Contractor may use the yard for staging with the understanding that the lot will be removed and restored to a dust free condition at the end of the project at the contractor's expense.
- Machine demolition of the entire structure including basements, sub-basements, footings, pilings, sump pits and removal of all concrete and or asphaltic pavement from the site.
- Backfilling of all areas below grade including clean materials which will provide suitable compaction readings as determined by the City's third- party Civil Engineering firm.
- Jobsite Fencing as required
- If required, de-watering of any sub-grade excavations during the back-fill process to allow for suitable compaction readings to be obtained.
- Removal and disposal in a licensed landfill of all materials from the building and site.
- When completed, the area inside the city sidewalk shall be completely leveled to a grade equal to the surrounding properties and the City Sidewalks present on three sides.
- Replacement of City owned concrete curb and gutter at (3) driveway openings and(2) two sidewalk ramps in accordance with City of Sheboygan Engineering Dept. specifications.
- Grading and levelling of the **entire one-third block parcel** (SEE ATTACHED MAP)
- Placement of screened topsoil free of clumps and foreign matter is required.
- Entire site is to be seeded with high quality grass seed and covered with mulch materials such as Hydro Mulch. Inlet protection and or anti-erosion "socks" to remain in place until the threat of soil erosion and entry of soils into the storm sewer system has passed.
- Site is to be prepared in such a way so as to allow for "fine" mowing of the grass once the turf is established.

7.0 TIME FRAME

The City of Sheboygan Common Council will need to vote in order to award the demolition contract. This process can take up to three weeks following submission to the Council of a recommendation for award.

It is hereby agreed and understood that the insurance required by the City of Sheboygan is <u>primary and non-contributing coverage</u> and that any insurance or self- insurance maintained by the City of Sheboygan, its officers, council members, agents, employees or authorized volunteers will not contribute to coverage of any loss. All insurance shall be in full force prior to commencing work and remain in force until the entire job is completed and the length of time that is specified, if any, in the contract or listed below whichever is longer.

1. COMMERCIAL GENERAL LIABILITY COVERAGE

A. <u>Commercial General Liability</u> coverage at least as broad as Insurance Services Office Commercial General Liability Form CG 00 01, including coverage for Products Liability, Completed Operations, Contractual Liability, and Explosion, Collapse, Underground coverage with the following minimum limits and coverage:

- 8. Products Completed Operations coverage must be carried for a minimum of three years after acceptance of completed work.

2. BUSINESS AUTOMOBILE COVERAGE

- A. <u>Automobile Liability</u> coverage at least as broad as Insurance Services Office Business Automobile Form, with minimum limits of \$1,000,000 combined single limit per accident for Bodily Injury and Property Damage, provided on a Symbol #1– "Any Auto" basis.

- 7. PROPERTY INSURANCE COVERAGE (BUILDERS RISK INSURANCE) to be provided by the contractor, if the exposure exists.
 - A. The "property" insurance amount must be at least equal to the total value of the structure(s), plus or minus any change orders. It must also include value of Engineering or Architect fees, claims preparation costs, and owner furnished equipment.
 - B. Covered property must include property on the project work sites, property in transit, property stored off the project work sites, and any equipment furnished by City of Sheboygan.
 - C. Coverage must be on a **Replacement Cost basis**, with no co-insurance penalties.
 - D. The City of Sheboygan, Consultants, architects, architect consultants, engineers, engineer consultants, contractors, and subcontractors must be added as named insureds to the policy.
 - E. Coverage must be written on a "special form" or "all risk" perils basis. Coverage to include collapse.
 - F. Coverage must include coverage for Water Damage (including but not limited to flood, surface water, hydrostatic pressure) and Earth movement.
 - G. Coverage must be included for Testing and Start up.
 - H. If the exposure exists, coverage must include Boiler & Machinery including mechanical or electrical breakdown coverage.
 - I. Coverage must include Building Ordinance or Law coverage with a limit of at least 5% of the contract amount.
 - J. The policy must cover/allow Partial Utilization by owner.
 - K. Coverage must include a "waiver of subrogation" against any named insureds or additional insureds.
 - Contractor will be responsible for all deductibles and coinsurance penalties.
- 8. <u>INSTALLATION FLOATER / CONTRACTOR'S EQUIPMENT</u> The contractor is responsible for loss and coverage for these exposures. City of Sheboygan will <u>not</u> assume responsibility for loss, including loss of use, for damage to property, materials, tools, equipment, and items of a similar nature which are being either used in the work being performed by the contractor or its subcontractors or are to be built, installed, or erected by

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the contractor or its subcontractors. This includes but not limited to property owned, leased, rented, borrowed, or otherwise in the care, custody or control of the contractor or subcontractor of any tier. See additional requirements for subcontractors below.

- **PROFESSIONAL LIABILITY COVERAGE**-if project includes the use of engineers, architects, or other professionals the below coverage and limits apply.
 - A. Limits
 - (1) \$1,000,000 each claim
 - (2) \$1,000,000 annual aggregate
 - B. Must comply with claims-made requirements listed below

10. BOND REQUIREMENTS

- A. <u>Bid Bond.</u> The contractor will provide to the owner a Bid Bond, which will accompany the bid for the project. The Bid Bond shall be equal to 5 percent of the contract bid.
- B. <u>Payment and Performance Bond.</u> If awarded the contract, the contractor will provide to the owner a Payment and Performance Bond in the amount of the contract price, covering faithful performance of the contract and payment of obligations arising thereunder, as stipulated in bidding requirements, or specifically required in the contract documents on the date of the contract's execution.
- C. <u>Acceptability of Bonding Company.</u> The Bid, Payment and Performance Bonds shall be placed with a bonding company with an *A.M. Best* rating of no less than A- and a Financial Size Category of no less than Class VI.

INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL SUBCONTRACTOR(S)

All subcontractors shall be required to obtain the above coverages as applicable. This insurance shall be as broad and with the same limits and coverages (including waivers of subrogation) as those required per Contractor requirements.

APPLICABLE REQUIREMENTS AND PROVISIONS FOR LIABILITY INSURANCE OF CONTRACTORS / SUBCONTRACTORS

On the Commercial General Liability Policy, the additional insured coverage must be as broad as ISO form CG 20 10 07 04 and also include Products Completed Operations additional insured coverage as broad as ISO form CG 20 37 07 04 or their equivalents for a minimum of 3 years after acceptance of work. This does not apply to Workers Compensation or Professional Liability Policies.
- D. <u>Waivers of Subrogation</u> All contractor and subcontractor liability, workers compensation, and property policies, as required herein, must be endorsed with a waiver of subrogation in favor of the City of Sheboygan, its officers, council members, agents, employees, and authorized volunteers.
- E. <u>Deductibles and Self-Insured Retentions</u> Any deductible or self-insured retention in the contractor's policy must be declared to the City of Sheboygan and satisfied by the contractor.
- F. <u>Evidences of Insurance</u> Prior to execution of the agreement, the Contractor shall file with the City of Sheboygan a certificate of insurance (Acord Form or equivalent for all coverages) signed by the insurer's representative evidencing the coverage required by this agreement. In addition form <u>CG 20 10 07 04 for ongoing work exposure</u> and form <u>CG 20 37 07 04 for products-completed operations exposure</u>

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- must also be provided or its equivalent on the Commercial General Liability coverage.
- G. <u>Limits and Coverage-</u> The insurance requirements under this Agreement shall be the greater of the minimum limits and coverage specified herein, or (2) the broader coverage and maximum limits of coverage of any insurance policy or proceeds available to the Named Insured. It is agreed that these insurance requirements shall not in any way act to reduce coverage that is broader or that includes higher limits. No representation is made that the minimum insurance requirements stated hereinabove are sufficient to cover the obligations of Contractor under this Agreement.
- H. <u>Claims Made Coverage</u> If any coverage is maintained on a claims-made basis, the following shall apply:
 - I. The retroactive date must be shown, and must be before the date of the contract or the beginning of the contract services.
 - II. Insurance must be maintained and evidence of insurance must be provided for a minimum of three years after completion of the contract services.
 - III. If coverage is cancelled or non-renewed, and not replaced with another claims-made policy form with a retroactive date prior to the effective date of the contract, Contractor must purchase an extended reporting period for a minimum of three years after completion of the contracted services.
- I. <u>Cancellation/Non-Renewal</u> No policy of insurance required to be maintained hereunder shall be cancelled, non-renewed, or voided without 30 days prior written notice to City of Sheboygan, except where cancelation is due to the non-payment of premiums, in which event, 10-days prior written notice shall be provided.

Additional assumed ACM or LBP that may have been located in spaces not accessible during our investigation, hidden from view, or not sampled at the client's request, may require additional sampling prior to disturbance by renovation or demolition activity (see notes if applicable).

Areas that were inaccessible and not tested or inventoried during the investigation may have included: certain wall or ceiling cavities; electrical components/wiring; gasket material; fire door interiors; boiler, tank, and vessel interiors; equipment components and interiors; chimneys/flues/stacks; spaces requiring confined space entry procedures; structurally unsafe areas; isolated or inaccessible building areas; underground or buried components; and mechanical spaces or equipment that would require extensive demolition or dismantling to provide adequate access for material identification or sampling.

Roofing materials including built-up and membrane roofs, and associated flashings and coatings may have been assumed to be ACM (see applicable inspection notes).

Building materials or substrates that were exempt from sampling may have included metal, glass, wood, or fiberglass (exempt by WI DHS 159.04 (50)). Additional materials not accessible or not sampled during the survey may have included items such as miscellaneous caulks, sealants and construction adhesives that were not readily accessible to sample (may be located between layers of building components); concrete, concrete block, brick, stone, foam insulation, and carpet. These materials are typically non-friable in nature but may require further sampling to confirm or deny the presence of asbestos.

Additional suspect materials encountered during renovation or demolition activity that differ from materials sampled or described during this survey must be assumed to contain asbestos and be managed as ACM, abated or sampled to determine asbestos content prior to disturbance.

Material quantities are listed according to visible estimates at the time of the survey. It is recommended that all quantities be further verified by the building owner or abatement contractor prior to project design, bidding, budgeting and/or WDNR notification purposes. Material quantification was not performed for any sampled material found to be asbestos free or containing 1% or less asbestos.

ANALYTICAL DISCUSSION:

Bulk sample analysis for asbestos was performed by polarized light microscopy (PLM); method Bulk EPA 600. Samples showing the result of "None Detected" were found to contain no asbestos in any analyzed portion of the sample.

EPA defines an ACM as a material that contains asbestos unless the asbestos concentration is found to be 1% or less asbestos by PLM. Materials confirmed by a point count result of 1% or less asbestos may be treated as non-ACM. The building owner or client should be aware that exposure to asbestos is still possible when disturbing materials with 1% or less asbestos (trace amount) present and that OSHA worker protection procedures may be necessary.

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REGULATORY RECOMMENDATIONS: (ASBESTOS)

Item 24.

Wisconsin Department of Health Services (WI DHS); Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR); Environmental Protection Agency (EPA); Occupational Safety & Health Administration (OSHA)

All friable ACM as well as non-friable ACM that would likely be made friable by intended demolition processes are required to be abated prior to disturbance.

Non-friable ACM (confirmed or assumed) remaining during demolition must be disposed of properly as demolition debris at an approved landfill (landfill requirements vary). Non-friable ACM typically require abatement prior to any material recycling procedure. For any building that will be subject to burning, all confirmed and assumed ACM must be removed. Materials containing any amount of asbestos including materials with 1% or less (trace amount), may still result in an exposure regulated by OSHA. Protective equipment or a negative exposure assessment for personal exposure may be required.

Abatement shall be performed by an abatement company utilizing trained and certified workers/supervisor and further licensed as an asbestos company by WI DHS, Asbestos Regulation 159.

Refer to WDNR 447 and WI DHS 159 for complete information on requirements for asbestos abatement and asbestos material disposal. REGULATORY RECOMMENDATIONS: (LEAD-BASED PAINT)

Wisconsin Department of Health Services (WI DHS); Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR) Environmental Protection Agency (EPA); Occupational Safety & Health Administration (OSHA); Housing and Urban Development (HUD)

The EPA and HUD defines LBP as equal to or greater than 1.0 mg/cm² measured by X-ray fluorescence (XRF) analysis, or 0.5% (5,000 ppm) measured by weight through laboratory analysis. The State of Wisconsin has adopted the same definition of lead-based paint (primarily for residential HUD applications and for building demolition/disposal).

For worker exposure applications, lead in any quantifiable amount, and disturbance of the material creating dust and/or fumes and subsequent potential worker exposure would be regulated by the OSHA Lead in Construction Standard (29 CFR 1926.62).

Building materials coated with LBP that would likely be impacted or disturbed by intended renovation processes require special handling prior to or during disturbance (controlled work area, wet methods, hepa assisted tools or vacuums, avoiding prohibited methods – see OSHA or WI DHS regulations). If LBP is removed from the underlying substrate resulting in accumulated lead waste, additional work practices, disposal methods or testing of the waste by TCLP method may be required.

Our non-destructive testing by XRF has been performed to screen for areas with quantifiable lead above regulatory limits on painted substrates. The reportable limit of detection is essentially 1.0 mg/cm² by XRF analysis and therefore paint chip analysis would be recommended for a more accurate determination of lead in paint below this level or to rule out lead in any quantifiable amount.

REGULATORY RECOMMENDATIONS: (LEAD-BASED PAINT) continued:

Item 24.

The testing was limited in scope and did not constitute a full lead paint inspection. Testing for lead in paint was conducted to assist with planning in regard to lead-safe construction practices and/or disposal or recycling activities. A surface-by-surface visual assessment of painted components was conducted at the property to determine which surfaces to test. Renovation activity beyond the anticipated work scope specified at the time of our site visit may require additional testing prior to disturbance.

Inaccessible areas hidden from view or contained within or behind other building materials may contain additional areas of suspect LBP. Any additional surfaces not specifically identified should be assumed to contain LBP unless tested and proven otherwise.

The calibration of the XRF analyzer was verified before and after testing by taking three readings from a source known to contain 1.02 mg/cm² lead (NIST Standard Reference Material). The three positive calibration readings were followed by a sample on bare wood containing no LBP.

Concrete, brick, or stone coated with LBP requires disposal in a WDNR approved landfill and may require additional Toxicity Characteristic Leaching Procedure (TCLP) testing to further evaluate the waste. Concrete, brick, or stone that is not coated with LBP may be considered clean for recycling purposes if other requirements are met. Please refer to the WDNR Publication WA 605, Concrete Recycling and Disposal Fact Sheet. 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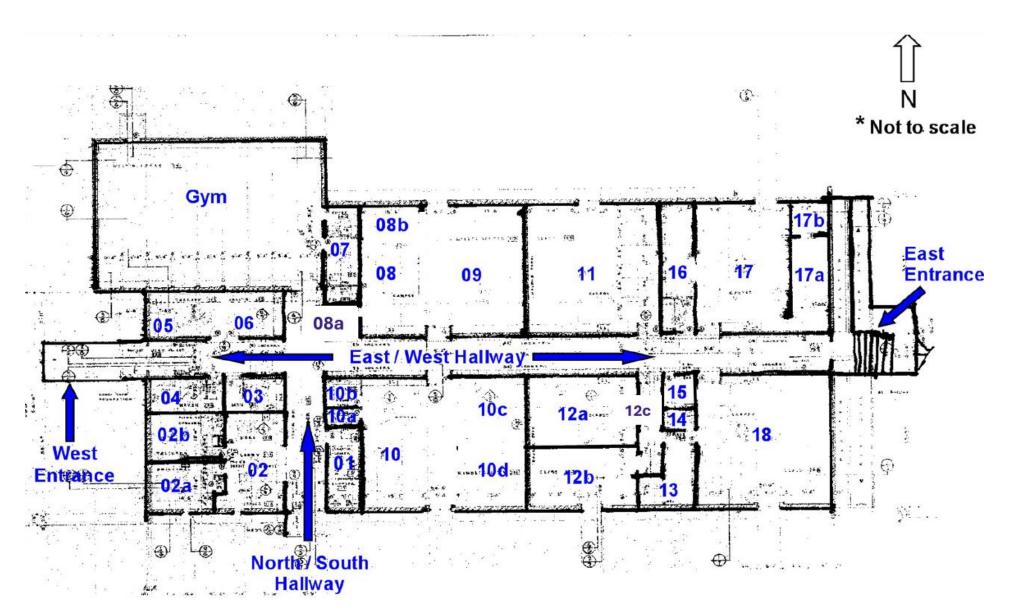

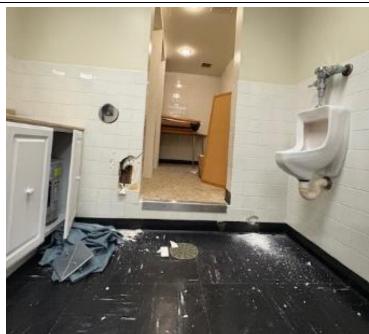

PLANNING YOUR PROJECT

- Conduct a walk-through of the project building(s) and grounds to identify items that contain harmful materials and other siterelated concerns.
- ✓ Identify and quantify harmful materials at your job site with specialized inspectors or contractors, if necessary
- ✓ Notify the DNR of demolition or renovation activities prior to starting any demolition or renovation work.
- ✓ Hire specialized consultants, contractors or transporters to remove and properly manage harmful materials prior to starting your project.
- ✓ Request and file all receipts for the disposal of harmful and non-harmful materials related to the project to avoid potential enforcement action.

efore beginning any demolition or renovation project, it is important to know about harmful materials that may be present on your project site.

This guide walks contractors and building owners through the steps to identify harmful materials commonly found at project sites and to handle and dispose of them safely. It also offers proper ways to manage recyclable and reusable materials and other wastes that are common in demolition and renovation projects.

The Resources section on the last page has links to websites with more information.

Note: This document is not intended as a substitute for reading the rules, regulations, and statues related to handling demolition and renovation debris. It is simply a guide to assist you in determining how they apply to your demolition or renovation project.

COMMON HARMFUL MATERIALS

uildings can contain a number of harmful materials that may expose workers and the public to serious health risks and pollute the air, land and water if handled or disposed of in an unsafe way. Five of these harmful materials are common on project sites and need special care in identification and handling:

- Asbestos
- CFCs (chlorofluorocarbons) and halons
- Lead
- Mercury
- PCBs (polychlorinated biphenyls)

FIVE STEPS TO A SUCCESSFUL DEMOLITION OR RENOVATION PROJECT

STEP 1. Conduct a walk-through of the project building(s) and grounds to identify items that contain harmful materials and other site-related concerns.

Identifying hazardous materials before starting work on a project site protects worker health and safety, building occupants, and the financial viability of the project. Doing this up front can help you choose the appropriate inspectors, consultants and contractors and avoid costly change orders or project delays.

Before you begin any demolition or renovation project, thoroughly inspect and inventory the project site for the following items:

- Appliances: Appliances may contain CFCs, mercury or PCBs. Appliances that contain CFCs or PCBs must be processed by an appliance demanufacturer registered with the DNR.
- Building materials and fixtures that may contain asbestos: All layers of materials, behind walls, ceiling spaces, etc., should be inspected and sampled unless they are assumed to contain asbestos. The following building components may contain asbestos, but this list is by no means allinclusive:
 - Caulking: Used around windows, doors, corrugated roofing and other places where two materials are joined. PCBs have also been found in caulking materials. Schools and industrial buildings constructed or renovated between 1950 and 1979 are suspected to contain PCB-containing caulk.
 - Ceilings: Including acoustical tiles and adhesives, and the materials listed under "Interior and exterior walls" below. All ceiling layers and any spaces above the ceiling where drop ceilings are present should be checked. Insulation debris may also be lying on top of ceiling tiles.
 - Electrical systems: Insulators; spark arrestors and transite panels in electrical boxes; wiring insulation; ducts/conduits (transite pipe); and light
 - Flooring: All sizes of vinyl floor tile, sheet flooring, and linoleum, and felt paper used under hardwood floors.
 - HVAC systems: Duct, pipe, and joint insulation because elbows/joints are often coated with

- asbestos; fiberglass insulation on the straight runs; forced air dampers; wall, floor and chimney penetrations; lining and mortar; fire brick; fireproofing materials such as transite sheets or heavy paper: boiler insulation: flexible fabric connectors; packing/gaskets and adhesives; paper backing; mastic/adhesives (floor tile, carpet, etc.); and grout and felt paper under hardwood floors.
- Insulation in ceilings and walls: Blown-in, spray-applied, and block.
- Interior and exterior walls: Wall plaster; joint compound; patches; transite wallboard and siding; fire doors; window putty/glazing/caulking; mortar; asphalt shingles/siding; felt under siding, stucco, textured paint, and other spray-applied materials. Paint containing asbestos is rare except in commercial applications, where it was usually applied as a very thick, often silvercolored coating or added to textured paints.
- Miscellaneous: Appliances with a heating element, especially older models; fire curtains and blankets; laboratory tabletops; fume hood linings; blackboards; and fire-resistant clothing like gloves, hoods, aprons, etc.
- **Plumbing:** Pipe wrap, pipe joints, transite counter tops in bathrooms, faucets, packing gaskets, and adhesives.
- Roofing: Asphalt shingles; tar-type coatings which are often around vents, chimneys, etc.; transite shingles; roofing felts that are often under a layer of other material; flashings; and mag-block type material found under other material. Check all roof areas and roofing layers.
- Lighting fixtures/ballasts and bulbs/lamps: Switches for lighting may use mercury relays. Look for any control associated with exterior or automated lighting systems, such as "silent" wall switches. Several types of light bulbs or lamps contain mercury and must be properly legitimately recycled or disposed of as hazardous waste. These include:
 - Fluorescent lights: Even the newer lamps with green-colored ends contain mercury.
 - High intensity discharge: metal halide, high pressure sodium, mercury vapor.
 - Neon
- Meters and switches: Mercury may be found in thermometers, barometers, thermostats, bloodpressure devices, and fluorescent and other types of light bulbs. Any equipment used for measurement of vacuum, pressure, fluid level, temperature, or flow rate could contain mercury. These devices are

most commonly associated with commercial and industrial equipment systems, including tanks, boilers, furnaces, heaters, electrical systems, water cleaning systems, and systems for the movement or pumping of gas (air) or liquids (water). In addition, mercury containing devices are also common in certain agricultural operations such as dairy, and may be present in older model consumer appliances and residential properties, especially larger multi-unit properties.

- Oil: Used oil in containers or tanks, hydraulic oils in machinery, electrical transformers and capacitors, and elevator shafts. These oils may contain PCBs and may need to be tested to determine if the oil can be recycled or must be properly disposed of.
- Paint: Residential and industrial paints may contain lead, solvents or asbestos. Some industrial paints may contain PCBs.

In addition to the items listed above, be aware of these other site-related concerns:

- Abandoned wells: Unused and improperly abandoned wells are a significant threat to groundwater quality. If not properly filled, abandoned wells can directly channel contaminated surface water into the groundwater. State law requires that all wells and drill holes be properly filled prior to any demolition or construction work on the property.
- Batteries (non-lead-containing): Batteries may be found in smoke detectors, emergency lighting systems, elevator control panels, exit signs, security systems and alarms. Batteries should be separated from other wastes and taken to a recycling facility or a business that accepts batteries for recycling.
- Computers and other electronics: Most electronics are banned from Wisconsin landfills and must be recycled. These can contain hazardous materials such as lead, cadmium, chromium, and mercury and, if not recycled, may be regulated as hazardous waste.
- Exit signs: Many self-luminous exit signs contain tritium, a radioactive material. All selfluminous exit signs must have a permanent label that identifies it as containing radioactive material. The label will also include the name of the manufacturer, the product model number, the serial number, and the quantity of tritium contained. It is illegal to abandon or dispose of these signs except by sending them to the manufacturer or to others licensed by the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission.

► HAZARDOUS AND UNIVERSAL WASTES

Some wastes, such as used or unused solvents, sanitizers, paint wastes, chemical wastes, pharmaceuticals, gas cylinders, aerosol cans and pesticides, may be hazardous waste and regulated by the EPA and DNR. Hazardous wastes must be removed from a project site prior to demolition or renovation and be disposed of according to specific rules. Read the DNR publication "Is Your Waste Hazardous?" (WA-1152) at http://dnr.wi.gov/files/pdf/pubs/wa/ wa1152.pdf to determine if a waste is hazardous. See Handling and Disposal Choices on page 7 for information on how to dispose of hazardous wastes on a project site.

Universal wastes are hazardous wastes that can be collected and transported with fewer regulations. Universal wastes include hazardous waste batteries, certain pesticides, mercury thermostats and other mercury-containing equipment and some lamps (light bulbs). In Wisconsin, antifreeze can also be managed as a universal waste if it is recycled. See chapter NR 673 of Wisconsin Administrative Code for more details on recycling and reusing universal waste.

- Painted concrete: Walls and foundations often contain painted concrete. With prior DNR approval, contractors can grind the concrete and use it on-site or nearby under a new building or road.
- Smoke detectors: The smoke detectors that contain a small amount of radioactive material will be labeled and should be returned to the manufacturer for disposal. Otherwise, smoke detectors may go in the trash.
- Soil contamination: A qualified environmental consultant can conduct environmental property assessments including identification of contaminated soil.
- Spills: In Wisconsin, all spills of hazardous substances that negatively affect or threaten to negatively affect public health, welfare or the

► REUSE AND RECYCLING OF MATERIALS

Many materials, fixtures and components can be donated or sold for reuse or recycled prior to demolition. As you inventory the project site for harmful materials, take note of materials that can be reused or recycled and remove them from the project site before demolition work begins.

- •The Wisconsin Business Materials Exchange is a web service that facilitates the reuse of surplus or unwanted items or materials among businesses, institutions, and organizations. You can use this tool to post items that are available and request an item you may need.
- Consider holding an auction as a way to reuse building materials, fixtures and components once all the harmful materials have been removed.
- Clean brick, building stone, concrete and asphalt can be stockpiled for crushing and reusing in future building projects.
- Clean, untreated wood can be recycled or chipped for mulch or ground cover.
- ·Many items such as appliances, electronics, paper and cardboard, glass containers and vehicle items are banned from Wisconsin landfills and must be recycled. For a complete list of these items, go to dnr.wi.gov and search "what to recycle."
- •The online Wisconsin Recycling Markets Directory contains a list of self-identifying businesses accepting recyclable materials. Make sure your chosen recycler meets local, state and federal regulatory requirements.
- •Demolition debris may be taken to a construction and demolition recycling facility if all harmful materials, including all types of asbestos, are removed prior to demolition or renovation.

► OPEN BURNING

It is illegal to burn painted, treated or unclean wood, asphalt, plastics of any kind, oily substances, tires and other rubber products, garbage, recyclables, wet rubbish, and other materials. Demolition materials that cannot be burned include: roofing materials, all kinds of flooring materials, insulation, plywood and other composition board, electrical wiring, cabinetry and countertops, and plastic plumbing.

Burning of clean, unpainted and untreated wood is allowed with a DNR burning permit using DNR-approved methods. When burning this type of wood from demolition waste, you must separate out all of the illegal materials, including painted or treated wood, before any burning occurs. The DNR encourages chipping clean, untreated wood for mulch or ground cover.

If you do decide to burn clean, unpainted and untreated wood, it is your responsibility to know what restrictions apply in the area where you are burning. Remember, you must also follow local burning ordinances that may be more restrictive than state law. Contact your local fire department, town chairperson, or local municipal official for more information on local burning rules.

It is illegal to burn unwanted buildings in Wisconsin. The only exception is for a fire department training exercise. For more information on how to prepare a building for a fire department training exercise, contact the DNR asbestos program coordinator at (608) 266-3658.

- environment must be immediately reported to the DNR via the Spills Hotline, 800-934-0003.
- Tanks: Chemical tanks (underground and aboveground) and septic tanks should be assessed, emptied and decommissioned.
- Tires: Tires should be reused or recycled. Your local landfill may collect them for recycling or you can check WisconsinRecyclingDirectory.com and search for "motor vehicle items" and then "tires."

STEP 2. Identify and quantify harmful materials at your job site with specialized inspectors or contractors, if necessary

Asbestos and lead have specific requirements from the Department of Natural Resources and the Department of Health Services for their identification and testing on a project site. See the sections on asbestos and lead in this step for those requirements.

You can identify other harmful materials on a project site, such as CFCs and halons, mercury, and PCBs, by doing an inventory of the building systems and fixtures for the items listed here and in Step 1. You may need some testing to confirm the presence of these materials. The DNR recommends hiring an inspector or consultant who has sufficient experience identifying these materials and can collect samples, if necessary, that will help in identification.

If you have a large or complex project, it may make sense to hire a consultant to oversee the coordination of all waste identification and disposal activities.

Asbestos

Health risks: Asbestos is a known human carcinogen that can cause serious health problems when disturbed and inhaled. Historically, asbestos was commonly used in industrial, commercial, and residential structures. Asbestos is still used today but to a lesser extent.

Location and/or materials: Asbestos is used in more than 3,000 building materials. Asbestos is commonly found in HVAC systems, electrical systems, interior and exterior walls, roofing materials, ceilings, plumbing, and flooring insulation. It is also found in appliances with a heating element, fire curtains and blankets, laboratory tabletops, fume hood lining, blackboards and fire resistant clothing. Refer to Step 1 for a detailed list of building materials and locations that may contain asbestos.

Identification and testing: The Department of Health Services requires licensed inspectors to identify asbestos. Inspectors can assume asbestos to be present, or they can identify it through testing. The DNR requires an asbestos inspection for certain projects and recommends it for others.

Required projects:

- · Two or more contiguous single family homes
- · Homes that are part of a larger demolition project
- Multi-family housing with five or more units
- · Industrial, manufacturing or commercial buildings including bridges, farm buildings, and churches
- · Any structure being prepped for a fire training exercise

Recommended projects:

- · Single family homes
- · Multi-family housing with 2-4 units

Inspection must be completed and asbestos materials must be removed before beginning any demolition or renovation activities.

CFCs (chlorofluorocarbons) and halons

Health risks: CFCs and halons damage the earth's protective ozone layer high in the atmosphere, allowing greater exposure to the sun's dangerous ultraviolet rays. Some of the harmful effects of increased UV exposure include increased risk of skin cancer, eye cataracts, immune system deficiencies, and crop damage.

Location and/or materials: CFCs can be found in refrigerants in rooftop, room and central air conditioners, refrigerators, freezers, and chillers, dehumidifiers, heat pumps, water fountains and drinking coolers, walk-in coolers (refrigeration or cold storage areas), vending machines and food display cases. Halons are found in fire extinguishers and other fire control equipment.

Lead

Health risks: Inhaling or swallowing lead dust can cause serious health effects, including kidney disease, neuropathy, infertility, heart and cardiovascular disease, stroke, memory problems, and Alzheimer's disease.

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Location and/or materials: Lead plumbing and lead-based paint are commonly found in many older buildings. Lead may be found in paint on woodwork and metal equipment, leaded glass, lead window-sash weights, lead flashing molds, roof vents, lead pipes and solder. Lead is found in both indoor and outdoor applications. Lead is also found in lead-acid batteries associated with older lighting, exit signs, and security systems.

Identification and testing: The Department of Health Services requires licensed inspectors and risk assessors to identify lead paint. When building surfaces or components are being renovated in any residential and child-occupied buildings built before 1978 (such as private homes, rental units, day care centers, and schools), lead paint must be assumed to be present or identified through testing.

Lead paint sampling is recommended on commercial and industrial projects. The US discontinued manufacturing lead paint for residential use by 1978, but lead is still used in specialty paints in commercial and industrial applications. Most buildings have multiple layers of paint, and all layers should be considered.

Mercury

Health risks: Liquid mercury evaporates slowly at room temperature and gives off harmful vapors that are invisible and odorless. Breathing these vapors causes the most harm to people, but mercury can also be harmful when it comes in contact with broken skin. or when it is swallowed. Women and children are most at risk from mercury poisoning, which can cause brain and nerve damage, resulting in impaired coordination, blurred vision, tremors, irritability and memory loss. Mercury poisoning also causes birth defects.

Location and/or materials: Mercury may be found in thermometers, barometers, thermostats, dental offices, blood-pressure devices, and fluorescent and other types of light bulbs. Any equipment used for measurement of pressure, fluid level, temperature, or flow rate could contain mercury. These devices are most commonly associated with commercial and industrial equipment systems, including tanks, boilers, furnaces, heaters, electrical systems, water cleaning systems, and systems for the movement or pumping of gas (air) or liquid (water). In addition, mercury containing devices are common in certain agricultural operations such as dairy, and may be present in older model consumer appliances, vehicle light switches and residential properties, especially larger multi-unit

properties. Dental offices use mercury-containing amalgam that may be found in sink drain traps. Mercury can also be found as part of older wastewater treatment plant trickling filters.

PCBs (polychlorinated biphenyls)

Health risks: PCBs may cause cancer in humans and can disrupt hormone and nervous system function. PCBs are persistent in the environment and stay in animals' and humans' systems. PCBs are a source of contamination in fish and have caused fish consumption advisories for humans.

Location and/or materials: PCBs can be found in electrical oils (e.g. transformers and capacitors in appliances) electronic equipment, heat transfer equipment, hydraulic fluids, light ballasts, industrial paints, specialty paints (e.g. swimming pools) and caulking materials. Sumps, oil traps and concrete flooring in facilities that used or manufactured PCBs may be contaminated with PCBs as well. Electrical devices manufactured prior to 1978 should be assumed to contain PCBs.

Identification and testing: You may be able to determine PCB concentrations in electrical equipment oil using identification labels, documents from the manufacturer indicating the PCB concentration at the time of manufacture, or service records showing the PCB concentration measured when the equipment was serviced. If a manufactured date and PCB content label are not found on a transformer or capacitor, the oil should be tested to determine the PCB content prior to dismantling and disposal. Oil-filled electrical equipment labeled "No PCBs" may still contain PCBs, but at a concentration lower than what the EPA regulates. The oils in this equipment should still be tested to see if they contain PCBs and then handled appropriately.

Testing of specialty paint, epoxies and caulks in buildings built or renovated between 1950 and 1979 is recommended. High levels of PCBs are being found in these materials across the country. Once testing is complete, boldly label all surfaces and items that were found to contain PCBs so they are handled appropriately during renovation or demolition.

STEP 3. Notify the DNR of demolition or renovation activities prior to starting any demolition or renovation work.

Notification to the DNR is required for all demolition projects meeting any of these categories:.

- Two or more contiguous single-family homes
- Homes that are part of a larger demolition project
- Multi-family housing with five or more units
- Industrial, manufacturing or commercial buildings including bridges, farm buildings, and churches
- · Any structure being prepped for a fire training exercise

DNR notification is also required for renovation projects meeting any of these criteria, if asbestos removal is involved.

For demolition projects

All demolition projects meeting the previously listed criteria require DNR notification 10 working days before the project work begins.

For renovation projects involving asbestos

All renovation projects meeting the previously listed criteria that involve asbestos require DNR notification 10 working days before the project begins.

Note: While plans to demolish or renovate a singlefamily home do NOT require DNR notification, it is recommended you take the precautionary steps outlined in this publication.

► HANDLING AND DISPOSAL CHOICES

You have a few options for handling and disposing of lead, mercury, PCBs and other wastes from your project site that qualify as hazardous waste. Identifying these options prior to beginning the project can help you schedule transportation and disposal and maintain the overall project schedule.

•Hire a waste management contractor to pick up and dispose of hazardous wastes. This takes the guess work out of handling these types of wastes. Contractors have properly trained personnel that will determine appropriate packaging, shipping and vehicle licensing and have established relationships with disposal facilities.

Other choices provide you with reduced regulation and may change depending on the amount of hazardous waste generated in a month. As a contractor, you may manage hazardous wastes you generate at temporary job sites only according to the following options. For more details on these options, see the DNR publication "Pilot Project for Management of Contractor Generated Hazardous Waste" (WA-654) at http://dnr.wi.gov/files/ pdf/pubs/wa/wa654.pdf.

- · Hire a licensed hazardous waste transporter to transport the hazardous waste to a licensed or permitted hazardous waste treatment, storage and disposal facility. In this case, you must follow the applicable generator requirements in chapters NR 660-679 of Wisconsin Administrative Code.
- Leave containerized hazardous waste for the site owner to properly manage. In this case, the site owner must follow the applicable generator requirements in chapters NR 660-679 of Wisconsin Administrative Code. If you choose this option, be sure to include this in your contract with the site owner.
- Transport the containerized hazardous waste yourself directly from the temporary job site to a Household and Very Small Quantity Generator (VSQG) Hazardous Waste Collection Facility. This includes county or municipal Clean Sweep locations. If the total quantity of hazardous waste generated by your company in one month is less than 220 lbs. (about half of a 55-gallon drum), you would be a VSQG and your hazardous waste may be taken to a Clean Sweep location for handling and disposal. Contact your local Clean Sweep coordinator for information on possible fees, accepted materials, and other details.
- •Transport the containerized hazardous waste yourself to your central business location. This option is currently available under a pilot project. Waste handled in this manner is subject to the pilot project conditions. See the publication referenced above for more information.

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STEP 4. Hire specialized consultants, contractors or transporters to remove and properly manage harmful materials prior to starting your project.

Hiring the right consultant, contractor or transporter is important to ensure safe handling practices and disposal options. This section will help you determine who to hire. Links to lists of licensed consultants, contractors and transporters are on the last page under Resources.

Asbestos

Handling practices: Asbestos professionals trained and certified by DHS are required to perform asbestos removal in most multi-unit residential and all commercial, industrial, manufacturing and government buildings. Most types of asbestos-containing materials must be removed from the building prior to demolition or renovation.

Disposal: The asbestos removal contractor is responsible for disposing of the asbestos materials at a licensed landfill approved to accept asbestos waste. Not all landfills accept asbestos materials, so contractors should call the landfill to find out what materials are accepted and the hours of operation.

In some situations, non-friable asbestos materials (materials that are resistant to crushing), such as floor tile and roofing, may remain in place during the demolition activities. When this is done, the debris must be taken to a municipal or construction and demolition landfill. Debris containing non-friable asbestos materials may not be taken to a construction and demolition recycling facility.

CFCs (chlorofluorocarbons) and halons

Handling practices: Keep units that contain refrigerants in place for a certified transporter to remove them. Moving them may cause an accidental release of refrigerants. Certified transporters include waste haulers, community recycling programs, and appliance salvage businesses. State law requires that anyone transporting salvaged refrigeration units must certify to the DNR that they will transport items in a way that prevents refrigerant releases. Technicians who remove refrigerants from units must be registered with the DNR and use approved equipment.

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Check both portable and installed fire suppression systems for labels indicating halons. Trained technicians are also needed to remove halons. Contact local fire suppression equipment companies or the Halon Recovery Corporation for more information. Do not discharge halon fire extinguishers; intentionally releasing these substances is prohibited under federal regulations.

Disposal: Once the refrigerants are recovered, the unit may be taken to a metal scrap recycling facility. If you send halon-containing equipment offsite for disposal, it must be sent to a manufacturer, fire equipment dealer or recycler operating in accordance with National Fire Protection Association standards.

Lead

Handling practices: DHS-certified lead-safe contractors are required for any renovations, repairs, painting or other paint-disturbing services on or in the regulated buildings that contain lead paint. These contractors must use leadsafe practices at these properties.

State law prohibits the sale or transfer of any fixture or other object that contains lead-bearing paint if children would have ready access to the fixture or object in its new location.

Disposal: Dispose of in a landfill any painted wood or building components that contain lead paint. Do not burn or chip wood that contains lead paint or use it for landscaping.

Lead paint waste, such as lead paint chips or lead paint removed from commercial or industrial buildings, must be tested to determine if it is a hazardous waste for disposal purposes.

See Handling and Disposal Choices on page 7 for handling and disposal options.

Mercury

Handling practices: You may collect intact mercurycontaining devices and bring them back to your primary business location or bring them directly to an off-site mercury recovery facility. Do not remove mercury ampoules or free liquids from the device. Store devices in a covered plastic container to prevent them from breaking. Label the container to assist proper handling and disposal.

If any mercury is spilled or released during handling, report the spill immediately by calling the DNR 24-hour Spills Hotline: (800) 934-0003. Mercury spreads quickly, and even a small spill can cause big cleanup costs in a short period of time.

Disposal: Trained professionals and specific equipment are needed for safe removal of mercury from ampoules and devices. Mercury must be transported by a licensed hazardous waste transporter to a mercury facility to be recycled or reclaimed.

See Handling and Disposal Choices on page 7 for handling and disposal options.

PCBs (polychlorinated biphenyls)

Handling practices: The EPA recommends that caulk containing PCBs be removed during planned renovations and repairs (when replacing windows, doors, roofs, ventilation, etc.). It is important to ensure that PCBs are not released into the air during renovation or repair of affected buildings.

Oils with PCB content greater than 50 ppm are prohibited from being mixed with other materials to reduce the PCB content.

Disposal: PCBs must be transported either by your company, a licensed hazardous waste transporter or a full-service contractor. PCBs and PCB-containing wastes must be taken to a licensed disposal facility or directly to a licensed incineration facility. Arrangements for accepting PCBs must be made with these facilities ahead of time.

See Handling and Disposal Choices on page 7 for handling and disposal options.

STEP 5. Request and file all receipts for the disposal of harmful and non-harmful materials related to the project to avoid potential enforcement action.

As materials are removed from the project site, ask your contractors for disposal receipts to document the disposal or recycling of your wastes. This is an important step in protecting your company. If materials are illegally dumped, the DNR will investigate to determine where the materials came from. Part of the investigation process would be to identify projects in the area that may have been the source of the illegally dumped materials. Receipts show that your project wastes were disposed of appropriately and protect you from liability issues and fines and/or forfeitures.

▶ DEMOLITION AND RENOVATION WASTE

Disposal options for demolition and renovation wastes depend on the type of waste and, in some cases, the amount generated. Solid wastes such as trash, painted wood, and fiberglass insulation can be disposed of at solid waste transfer stations and landfills, including construction and demolition landfills.

If demolition wastes are going to a construction and demolition landfill, all non-building components, such as books, furniture and trash must be removed before you begin demolition (note that most of these non-building components can be reused or recycled). Non-building components may stay in the building if the demolition waste is going to a municipal solid waste landfill. Check with local landfills prior to demolition to determine how to manage your wastes.

Demolition debris may be taken to a construction and demolition recycling facility if all asbestos materials and other harmful materials have been removed prior to demolition or renovation.

To find a list of these facilities licensed in Wisconsin, go to dnr.wi.gov and search "licensed waste haulers and facilities."

Once the harmful materials have been removed from the project site and the notification to DNR is submitted with the appropriate dates of demolition, demolition may begin. This includes first removing materials for reuse or recycling. If all harmful materials, including all types of asbestos, have been removed from the building or structure before demolition, the resulting debris may be taken to a construction and demolition recycling facility.

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STANDARD TERMS AND CONDITIONS

(Request for Bids/Proposals/Contracts)
City of Sheboygan Purchasing

APPLICABILITY: The terms and conditions set forth in this document apply to Requests for Proposals (RFP), Bids and all other transactions whereby the City of Sheboygan acquires goods or services, or both.

ENTIRE AGREEMENT: These Standard Terms and Conditions shall apply to any contract, including any purchase order, awarded as a result of this request. Special requirements of a resulting contract may also apply. Said written contract with referenced parts and attachments shall constitute the entire agreement, and no other terms and conditions in any document, acceptance, or acknowledgment shall be effective or binding unless expressly agreed to in writing by the City.

DEFINITIONS: As used herein, "vendor" includes a provider of goods or services, or both, who is responding to an RFP or a bid, and "bid" includes a response to either an RFP or a bid.

SPECIFICATIONS: The specifications in this request are the minimum acceptable. When specific manufacturer and model numbers are used, they are to establish a design, type of construction, quality, functional capability or performance level, or any combination thereof, desired. When alternates are proposed, they must be identified by manufacturer, stock number, and such other information necessary to establish equivalency. City of Sheboygan shall be the sole judge of equivalency. Vendors are cautioned to avoid proposing alternates to the specifications which may result in rejection of their bid.

DEVIATIONS AND EXCEPTIONS: Deviations and exceptions from terms, conditions, or specifications shall be described fully, on the vendor's letterhead, signed, and attached to the bid. In the absence of such statement, the bid shall be accepted as in strict compliance with all terms, conditions, and specifications and vendor shall be held liable for injury resulting from any deviation

QUALITY: Unless otherwise indicated in the request, all material shall be first quality. No pre-owned, obsolete, discontinued or defective materials may be used.

QUANTITIES: The quantities shown on this request are based on estimated needs. The City reserves the right to increase or decrease quantities to meet actual needs.

DELIVERY: Deliveries shall be FOB destination freight prepaid and included unless otherwise specified. City will reject shipments sent C.O.D. or freight collect.

PRICING: Unit prices shown on the bid shall be the price per unit of sale, e.g., gal., cs., doz., ea. etc., as stated on the request or contract. For any given item, the quantity multiplied by the unit price shall establish the extended price; the unit price shall govern in the bid evaluation and contract administration.

Prices established in continuing agreements and term contracts may be lowered due to market conditions, but prices shall not be subject to increase for the term specified in the award. Vendor shall submit proposed increases to the contracting department thirty (30) calendar days before the proposed effective date of the price increase. Proposed increases shall be limited to fully documented cost increases to the vendor that are demonstrated to be industry wide. Price increases may not be granted unless they are expressed in bid documents and contracts or agreements.

CONFLICT OF INTEREST Submission of a bid constitutes bidder's certification that no financial or personal relationship exists between the bidder and any city official or employee except as specially set forth in writing attached to and made a part of the bid. The successful bidder shall disclose any such relationship which develops during the term of the contract.

ACCEPTANCE-REJECTION: City of Sheboygan reserves the right to accept or reject any or all bids, to waive any Technicality in any bid submitted and to accept any part of a bid as deemed to be in the best interests of the City. Submission of a proposal or a bid constitutes the making of an offer to contract and gives the City an option valid for 60 days after the date of submission to the City.

BID SUBMISSION: Bids **MUST** be dated and time stamped by the Sheboygan City Purchasing Agent's Office on or before the date and time that the bid is due. Bids deposited or time stamped in another office will be rejected. Actual

receipt in the office of the purchasing Agent is necessary; timely deposit in the mail system is not sufficient. THERE WILL BE NO EXCEPTIONS TO THIS POLICY.

METHOD OF AWARD: Award shall be made to the lowest responsible, responsive vendor conforming to specifications, terms, and conditions, or to the most advantageous bid submitted to the City on a quality versus price basis. Among other things, quantities, time of delivery, purpose for which required, competency of vendor, the ability to render satisfactory service and past performance will be considered in determining responsibility.

ORDERING/ACCEPTANCE: Written notice of award to a vendor in the form of a purchase order or other document, mailed or delivered to the address shown on the bid will be considered sufficient notice of acceptance of bid. A formal contract containing all provisions of the contract signed by both parties shall be used when required by the Sheboygan City Purchasing Division.

PAYMENT TERMS AND INVOICING: Unless otherwise agreed, City of Sheboygan County will pay properly submitted vendor invoices within thirty (30) days of receipt of goods or services, or combination of both. Payment will not be made until goods or services are delivered, installed (if required), and accepted as specified. Invoices presented for payment must be submitted in accordance with instructions contained on the purchase order.

NO WAIVER OF DEFAULT: In no event shall the making of any payment or acceptance of any service or product required by this Agreement constitute or be construed as a waiver by City of any breach of the covenants of the Agreement or a waiver of any default of the successful vendor, and the making of any such payment or acceptance of any such service or product by City while any such default or breach shall exist shall in no way impair or prejudice the right of City with respect to recovery of damages or other remedy as a result of such breach or default.

TAXES: The City and its departments are exempt from payment of all federal tax and Wisconsin state and local taxes on its purchases except Wisconsin excise taxes as described below. The State of Wisconsin Department of Revenue has issued a tax exempt number to the City of Sheboygan.

RE: 2026 Proposed Budget (Update 10/13/2025)

As previously discussed during the first Committee of the Whole meeting on September 15th, there were quite a few items still outstanding for budget compilation. The following list details the major items that have been adjusted from the preliminary budget to the proposed budget.

Health/Dental Insurance Rates

The insurance rates have been finalized based on guidance from the City's insurance broker, USI, for 2026. The final 2026 rate increase for health insurance is 9.20% and dental insurance is 13.87%. All budgets with health insurance or dental insurance lines have been adjusted accordingly.

General Fund

Property Tax Levy Budget Impact: \$42,493

Account #: 101-411100

The tax levy that was previously allocated to the Transit Fund in place of CDBG grant funding has been reallocated to the General Fund budget for balancing purposes.

Interfund Transfers In Budget Impact: \$25,000

Account #: 101-492000

The Wastewater Utility is charged an internal transfer fee for the support that is received from the General Fund on an annual basis. This amount has remained the same since 2010. This adjustment matches the facility cost that is currently being charged to the Motor Vehicle Department of \$125,000 in consideration for the overhead amounts for staffing and vehicle storage.

<u>Department of Transportation - Highway/Road Aids</u> <u>Budget Impact: -\$345,410</u>

Account #: 101-435310 & 101-435360

The notices from the Department of Transportation were received shortly after the preliminary budget was published. There was a decrease in the anticipated amount of Connecting Highway and State Transportation Aids.

CVMIC Grant Budget Impact: -\$3,000

Account #: 101-437005

Due to population fluctuating below 50,000 residents, the City has been changed from a large municipality to medium-sized municipality at CVMIC. This results in a decrease in the safety grant from \$10,000 to \$7,000.

Parks – Utilities Budget Impact: -\$26,425

Account #: 101520-555100

Adjustment made due to the historical trends that have been recognized of the actual usage of utilities within the Parks facilities.

<u>Streets Maintenance - Street Maintenance & Repair Budget Impact: - \$194,000</u>

Account #: 101331-553100

To better account for projects meeting the capital asset definition, the costs associated with resurfacing projects meeting the capitalization threshold have been moved to the Capital Fund. This had resulted in a duplicate amount in the General Fund. These projects remain budgeted within the Capital plan and are anticipated to be completed during 2026.

During the September Committee of the Whole meeting, the list of projects was discussed. For clarity, the following projects are anticipated to be completed in-house during next year's road program:

- Mehrtens Avenue (N 15th to End)
- Prospect Avenue (N 2nd to N 3rd)
- Lake Court (2nd to Barrett)
- North Point Drive / North Point Court
- 15 various pavement repair projects

Public Works Staffing Adjustment Budget Impact: Dept Specific

Various Salary/Benefit Lines (Org Codes 101310, 101331, 101520 & 101695)

Adjustments to positions primarily based on Bold Path study.

<u>Ambulance Revenue</u> <u>Budget Impact: \$82,474</u>

Account #: 101-462300

The City will be receiving an annual amount from the Federal government to offset some of the costs associated with Medicare trips. This is an estimate of the additional revenue that will be recognized, not previously accounted for in the budget.

Transit Fund

Move Revenue from Tax Levy to CDBG Grant

Budget Impact: \$0

Account #: 651-411100 & 651-433300

This is a net neutral change on the expense side of the Transit Fund. When the budget was originally being prepared, there was a cut to the Federal CBDG spending. This change decreased the Property Tax Levy line and increased the HUD Subsidy line by the same amount of \$42,493. The available property tax levy was reallocated to the General Fund for balancing.

TID Funds

TID Tax Increment

Budget Impact: TID Specific

Account #: Object Code 411200

All TID funds were updated to reflect the anticipated increment collected with the estimated assessed tax rate and assessment valuations.

Removal of Land Purchase (TID 18) Budget Impact: \$4,000,000

Account #: 418660-621100

The City does not anticipate the need for the land purchase in TID 18 in 2026. The expense and associated debt proceeds have been removed.

Removal of Site Clean-Up Costs (TID 21) Budget Impact: \$2,500,000

Account # 421660-531100

The City anticipates finishing the Mayline site clean-up during 2025 and the line item was previously carried forward to 2026 budget.

Outstanding Budget Items

The following items are still outstanding as of the finalization of this memo:

- 1) Finalization of Wastewater User Fees and budget
- State- Department of Revenue release of Manufacturing assessed values

Estimated Tax Rate

The tax levy for 2026 increases by \$747,937 or 2.55% compared to 2025. The estimated tax rate is expected to decrease by 5.62% to \$6.2507 per \$1,000 of value. Of this amount, the net new construction attributes to 1.07% of the allowable increase (DOR 2025 Net New Construction).

CITY OF SHEBOYGAN ORDINANCE 18-25-26

BY ALDERPERSONS RUST AND LA FAVE.

OCTOBER 13, 2025.

AN ORDINANCE amending section 2-3(a)(4) of the Sheboygan Municipal Code so as to add an additional ADA Coordinator.

THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SHEBOYGAN DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: <u>AMENDMENT</u> "Sec 2-3 Nondiscrimination" of the Sheboygan Municipal Code is hereby *amended* as follows:

AMENDMENT

Sec 2-3 Nondiscrimination

- (a) Nondiscrimination Based on Disability in City Facilities and City-Assisted Programs and Activities.
 - (1) *Policy*. It is the policy of the City of Sheboygan that no qualified person with a disability shall, on the basis of such disability, be excluded from participation in or be denied the benefits of any program or activity receiving financial assistance from or being operated by the City of Sheboygan. It is the intention of the City of Sheboygan to impose upon City facilities and upon recipients of City financial assistance, nondiscrimination requirements that are consistent with the applicable nondiscrimination requirements imposed upon the City by the Americans With Disabilities Act ("ADA") of 1990, ADA Amendments Act of 2008, and Rehabilitation Act of 1973, and other applicable federal laws, and by applicable state regulations including Wis. Stat. §§ 106.50, 106.52, and 111.31, and any successor provisions of state and federal law.
 - (2) *Definitions*. The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this article, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

City facilities means all property owned or leased by the City, all operations of City departments and divisions, and all services rendered by the City for the welfare of its inhabitants, except that it does not include City employment.

City financial assistance means any grant, cooperative agreement, loan, contract (other than a public works contract, a supply procurement contract, a contract of insurance or guaranty or a collective bargaining agreement) or any

other arrangement by which the City provides or otherwise makes available assistance in the form of City funds and/or personnel services.

Disability means, with respect to a person, a physical or mental impairment which substantially limits one or more of the person's major life activities, a record of impairment, or being perceived as having an impairment.

Grantee means any public or private agency, institution, organization, or other entity or any person to which financial assistance is extended directly or indirectly by the City.

Protected person means any individual intended to be protected from violations of prohibited discrimination under this section.

Public place of accommodation or amusement shall be defined as set forth in Wis. Stat. § 106.52.

Qualified person with a disability means an individual with a disability who, with or without reasonable modifications to rules, policies, or practices, the removal of architectural, communication, or transportation barriers, or the provision of auxiliary aids and services, meets the essential eligibility requirements for the receipt of services or the participation in programs or activities provided by a public entity.

(3) Prohibitions.

- a. No qualified person with a disability shall be denied the benefits of, be excluded from participation in, or be otherwise discriminated against by any program or activity receiving financial assistance or operated by the City, solely because of disability.
- b. No qualified person with a disability shall be subject to discrimination in employment by the City or any Grantee solely on the basis of disability.
- Grantees shall not participate in contractual or other relationships that have the effect of subjecting qualified disabled applicants or employees to discrimination.
- (4) Designation of ADA Coordinator. The following positions shall serve as the City's ADA Coordinators. Individuals holding such positions shall possess demonstrated experience in the promotion of civil rights and equal opportunities for all persons; shall perform duties and exercise authority in accordance with City ordinances and State and Federal statutes; and shall coordinate the City's efforts to comply with anti-discrimination regulations with the appropriate City personnel. Individuals holding such positions shall confer with the City's human resources department, legal counsel, and/or the City Administrator in the execution of their duties.
 - a. The City Clerk shall serve as ADA Coordinator for public meetings

- and hearings.
- b. The Facilities Director shall serve as ADA Coordinator for all City buildings.
- c. The City Engineer shall serve as ADA Coordinator for City infrastructure within the rights-of-way, parks, and trails.
- d. The Transit Director shall serve as ADA Coordinator for Sheboygan Metro Transit.
- e. The Library Director shall serve as ADA Coordinator for Mead Public Library.
- f. The Human Resources Director shall serve as ADA Coordinator for employment.
- g. In all other cases, the City Administrator and/or City Attorney shall serve as ADA Coordinator.

(5) Grievance Procedures.

- a. Complaint. Any person who believes that they have been discriminated against in violation of this ordinance may file a complaint with the appropriate ADA Coordinator as set forth in this section. Alternatively, such complaint may be filed with the City Administrator or City Attorney. The complaint should be submitted by the grievant and/or his/her designee as soon as possible following the alleged violation but no later than sixty (60) calendar days after the alleged violation. The complaint shall be in writing and provide as much information as possible about the alleged discrimination including, but not limited to, the name, address, and contact information of the complainant, the location, date and description of the problem, and any relevant facts or witnesses. Upon the complainant providing notice to the ADA Coordinator, alternative means of filing a complaint will be made available to individuals with disabilities who require such an alternative.
- b. *Investigation*. The ADA Coordinator will timely review the grievance and investigate or cause to be investigated the claims made in the grievance. Such investigation may involve obtaining additional information from the complainant and other identified witnesses. After the investigation, the ADA Coordinator will provide written notice to the complainant detailing the outcome of the grievance, explaining the findings and any actions taken as a result.
- c. *Appeals*. If the complainant or designees believe that the response by the ADA Coordinator or designee does not satisfactorily resolve the issue, the complainant or designee may appeal the decision to the City Administrator or his designee, within fifteen (15) calendar days after receipt of the decisions.
- d. *Retention of grievance*. All written complaints made under this policy, appeals of the same, and responses from the City, will be retained by the City of Sheboygan for a period of three (3) years.

SECTION 2: REPEALER CLAUSE All ordinances or resolutions or parts thereof in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

SECTION 3: EFFECTIVE DATE This Ordinance shall be in effect from and after its passage and publication according to law.

CITY OF SHEBOYGAN ORDINANCE 19-25-26

AN ORDINANCE amending section 54-338 of the Sheboygan Municipal Code with regard to the insurance requirement for disposal of hauled wastewater.

THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SHEBOYGAN DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: <u>AMENDMENT</u> "Sec 54-338 Disposal Of Hauled Wastewater" of the Sheboygan Municipal Code is hereby *amended* as follows:

AMENDMENT

Sec 54-338 Disposal Of Hauled Wastewater

- (a) *Permit*. No person in the business of gathering and disposing of hauled wastewater shall transfer such material into any disposal area unless a permit for disposal has first been obtained from the city approving authority. Permits shall be nontransferable. A permit may be obtained upon payment of a fee of \$100.00 per calendar year. The time and place of disposal will be designated by the city approving authority. The city approving authority may impose such conditions as it deems necessary on any permit granted.
- (b) *Definitions*. The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this section, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this subsection, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:
 - Hauled wastewater means and includes, but is not limited to, septic tank sludge and holding tank sewage.
- (c) *Insurance; indemnification of city*. Any person or party disposing of hauled wastewater shall agree to carry public liability insurance in an amount not less than \$1,000,000.00\$100,000.00 per occurrence to protect any and all persons or property from injury and damage caused in any way or manner by an act or the failure to act by any of their employees. The person shall furnish a certificate certifying such insurance will be in full force and effect. Any person disposing of such waste shall agree to indemnify and hold harmless the city from any and all liability and claims for damages arising out of or resulting from work and labor performed.
- (d) Restrictions on materials discharged to treatment system. All materials disposed of into the treatment system shall be of domestic origin or compatible pollutants only, and such person shall agree that they will comply with the provisions of any and all

- applicable ordinances of the city and shall not deposit or drain any gasoline, oil, acid, alkali, grease, rags, waste, volatile or inflammable liquids or other deleterious substances into any manhole or allow any earth, sand or other solid material to pass into any part of the wastewater collection and treatment facilities.
- (e) *Disposal of materials at sewage treatment plant*. Prior to the disposal of nondomestic wastes to the wastewater collection and treatment facilities by any person holding a permit for disposal of hauled wastewater, such industrial waste shall be tested as determined by the wastewater treatment plant superintendent.
- (f) Acceptance of hauled wastewater. Acceptance of hauled wastewater under this article shall be subject to existing treatment capacity. If sludge storage is unavailable or operational treatment problems prevent handling of hauled wastewater, the superintendent of the wastewater treatment plant may refuse acceptance of such waste.

SECTION 2: REPEALER CLAUSE All ordinances or resolutions or parts thereof in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

AN ORDINANCE amending section 2-839 of the Sheboygan Municipal Code so as to reflect current procedures and to allow the issuance of permits to support lead service lateral replacement projects.

THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SHEBOYGAN DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: <u>AMENDMENT</u> "Sec 2-839 Payments For Licenses, Permits; Appeal; Interpretive Rules" of the Sheboygan Municipal Code is hereby *amended* as follows:

AMENDMENT

Sec 2-839 Payments For Licenses, Permits; Appeal; Interpretive Rules

- (a) The applicant shall make all payments for licenses and permits issued by the city clerk's office directly to the city clerk's office director/treasurer.
- (b) The payment of all personal property taxes, special assessments, special charges, taxes imposed pursuant to chapter 50, all forfeitures or judgments resulting from conviction for violation of any provision of this Code and all other judgments due and owing from the applicant to the city at the time of the application for any license or permit provided for in this Code and any of such relating to the property or business previously licensed if the new license is granted consequent or conditionally upon the sale or transfer of the business or stock in trade or furnishings or equipment of the premises or of the ownership or control of a corporation is a condition precedent to the granting of such license or permit, except as provided in this section.
- (c) A person denied a license or permit by the operation of this section may request a review of the denial to the city attorney by filing, in writing, a request for a review setting forth the grounds for the review. The city clerk shall grant the permit, notwithstanding the terms of this section, if the city attorney determines that:
 - (1) The license or permit applied for is required by the city in order to perform a task that the applicant has been lawfully ordered to perform by the city or another governmental unit, or which failure to perform is a violation of an ordinance or statute;
 - (2) The applicant shows financial inability to pay the full amount owed to the city;
 - (3) The applicant acknowledges the debt owed to the city and enters into a payment plan agreeable to both parties; and
 - (4) The granting of the license or permit would be in the best interests of the city.

- (d) Except as otherwise provided in this section, the clerk shall issue no license or permit until the finance director/treasurerit has been certified on the application that all required payments have been made. Any license or permit issued improperly is null and void.
- (e) Notwithstanding the foregoing, permits to support lead service lateral replacement projects may be issued despite moneys owed upon petition to the Building Inspection Division by the Sheboygan Water Utility.
