RE: City of Snoqualmie Strategic Plan Draft 10-08-2025

Together with this memo, we are sharing two documents:

- City of Snoqualmie Strategic Plan Draft 10-08-2025. This document incorporates changes based on Council input during the worksession held on September 29. We have begun layout of the strategic plan content and welcome Council input on either content or layout during our discussion on October 13, 2025.
- City of Snoqualmie 2026 Implementation Plan WORKING DRAFT 10-08-2025. This is an initial draft of an internal document that will be used to guide the City's implementation of the priorities identified in the Strategic Plan, particularly those noted as early areas of focus. This is intended as an editable management tool and would not be formally adopted by Council. While Council should have a general understanding of implementation priority, tactical implementation details will be administered by staff. Staff will advance additional implementation planning for 2026 on all Strategic Initiatives, adding Implementation Steps and prioritizing achievable progress given capacity and other commitments.

Following the Council session on October 13, 2025, we would like to incorporate changes and share the Draft Strategic Plan (not the 2026 Implementation Plan) with stakeholders we engaged early in the planning process and interested members of the public. We would reach out to stakeholders directly and work with City staff to promote the opportunity to review the draft plan via the City's typical communications channels. We would gather feedback from both groups via a simple online survey, asking two open-ended questions:

- 1. What are your overall impressions of the draft Strategic Plan?
- 2. What should the City focus on first as it begins implementation?

We will share a summary of feedback during the November 10 Council meeting, at which time Council will have the opportunity to make final changes to the Strategic Plan before adopting it. The 2026 Implementation Plan will not be adopted formally by Council, as it is a living implementation tool.

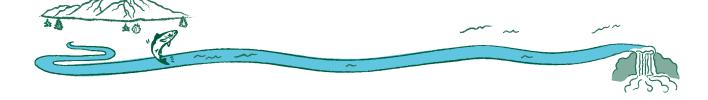

This Strategic Plan is a five-year guide for the City of Snoqualmie. This plan was developed with community input and analytic work with the goal of guiding and aligning Council and staff decision-making. It is a flexible tool intended to clarify the vision of the Council and serve as a roadmap to achieving those goals, rather than a rigid list of instructions.

This Plan as structured as follows:

- Role of the City of Snoqualmie. Describes the role of the City and the values that guide how we operate.
- Vision for Snoqualmie's Future. Narrates our aspirations for the future of the Snoqualmie community.
- Context. Outlines Snoqualmie's recent history and the context for this Strategic Plan.
- **Strategic Focus.** Establishes three Strategic Initiatives designed to address the challenges and constraints, opportunities, choices, and tradeoffs, described in the Context section.
- **Implementation Framework.** Describes how the City will tie this Strategic Plan to ongoing decision making and reporting.



ROLE OF THE CITY OF SNOQUALMIE

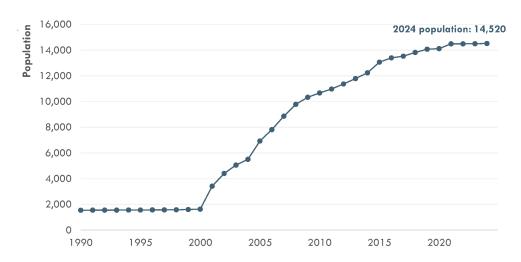
CONTEXT AND STRATEGIC FOCUS

This Strategic Plan has been developed to advance the aspirational Vision described on the previous page by addressing constraints and challenges, advancing key opportunities, and identifying important choices and tradeoffs that will need to be made.

Once the fastest-growing city in Washington, Snoqualmie experienced rapid expansion during the 1990s and 2000s, transforming from a small town to a thriving community. That period of growth has since slowed, with limited undeveloped land remaining for additional single-family housing or commercial development. Given this constraint, the City is focusing on infill and redevelopment; strengthening existing neighborhoods; efficient land use strategies that balance growth with community character, and potential opportunities to augment our land supply and leverage City- and partner-owned properties.

These strategies will contribute to a varied housing mix with opportunities for people from many different walks of life; increased services, amenities, and employment opportunities for local residents; and a more robust tax base to support the delivery of quality city services.

- **Housing.** Communities across the country and throughout Washington are struggling to facilitate access to housing options for a wide range of current and potential residents. Snoqualmie shares this challenge, which is likely to increase given our constrained developable land supply. High housing costs and limited product types create barriers for people who work in the local economy, young families, seniors, and others, reducing the City's ability to achieve our vision of a welcoming community.
- by its small population size, limited commercial property inventory, and location on the eastern edge of the Puget Sound. These constraints leave the community reliant on traveling to regional retailers and employers located elsewhere. The City is working to support commercial redevelopment and the success of local-serving businesses. Anchored by Snoqualmie Falls and attractions like the Northwest Railway Museum and nearby outdoor recreation, tourism offers another economic development opportunity and could play a larger role in supporting local businesses and diversifying the tax base.
- **Sustainable city services.** Residents, business owners, and visitors value the outcomes produced by City services, including access to a stunning natural environment, high-quality parks, public safety, family-friendly character, and support for regional human services. Fiscal pressures from Washington's tax structure, unfunded mandates, and inflation create ongoing budget challenges. City of Snoqualmie expenditures are projected to exceed revenues starting in 2029. While the City will continue to focus on efficient, responsive services and pursue economic development opportunities, long-term planning for infrastructure improvements over the coming decades will be essential, and future tradeoffs between service levels or new revenue sources may be necessary.

- Enhance events and programming that drive community connection and foot traffic.
- Support private investment on the Snoqualmie Mill Site.
- Work with regional partners to promote investment in the region and raise awareness of infill development opportunities.





IMPLEMENTING THE STRATEGIC PLAN

This Strategic Plan will guide how the City sets priorities, makes budget decisions, and measures progress. It will be used consistently over time, with City leaders reviewing it, tracking outcomes, and sharing updates with the community.

Because the City operates on a two-year budget cycle, the plan's priorities will directly shape the budget and workplans every biennium, with refinements made in between to reflect current needs. Each year, the City will publish a report showing how the Strategic Plan is being carried out and what results it is achieving, ensuring that the Snoqualmie community can see how the plan is turning vision into action.

Clear Roles

- The City Administrator is responsible for maintenance of and reporting on the Strategic Plan.
- The City's **Leadership Team** will collectively review progress and manage implementation.
- **Leads** or **co-leads** will be established for each major area of focus, along with supporting roles, resource needs, and target milestones or outcomes. This information will be captured in an internal Implementation Plan.

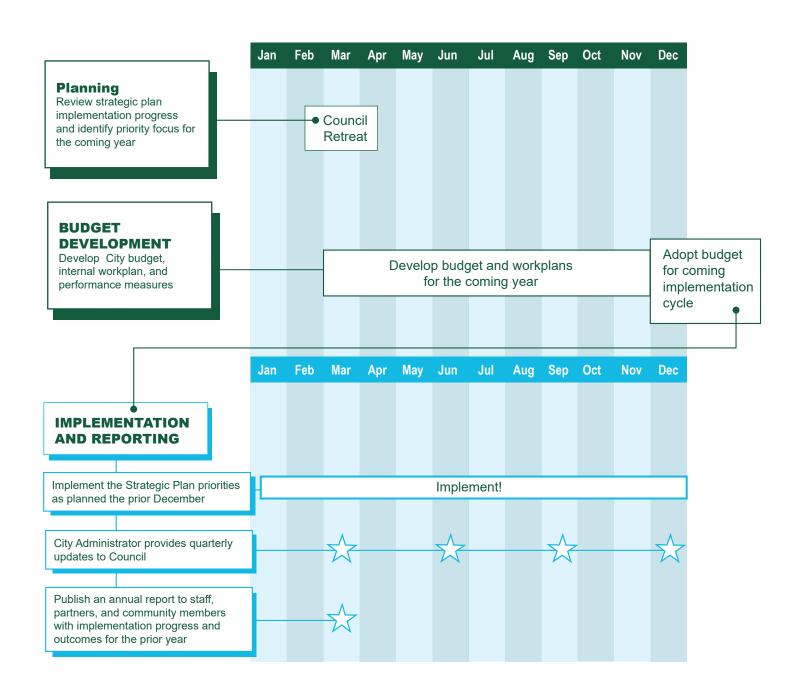

Approval of payments for the period: August 22, 2025 through September 30, 2025

BACKGROUND

Per RCW 42.24.080, all claims presented against the city by persons furnishing materials, rendering services, or performing labor must be certified by the appropriate official to ensure that the materials have been furnished, the services rendered, or the labor performed as described, and that the claims are just, due, and unpaid obligations against the city, before payment can be made. Expedited processing of the payment of claims when certain conditions have been met allows for the payment of claims before the legislative body has acted to approve the claims when: (1) the appropriate officers have furnished official bonds; (2) the legislative body has adopted policies that implement effective internal control; (3) the legislative body has provided for review of the documentation supporting the claims within a month of issuance; and (4) that if claims are disapproved, they shall be recognized as receivables and diligently pursued. The City of Snoqualmie meets all requirements of this state law.

Pursuant to Snoqualmie Municipal Code (SMC) Chapter 3.85, all Claims, Demands and Vouchers against the city, provides that the Finance Director or her designee will examine all claims prior to payment and provide periodic reporting of the payments to the City Council for final approval. Per SMC 3.85.040, to meet these requirements, the Finance Director schedules payment of claims and payroll for monthly Finance & Administration Committee review followed by full City Council approval on the consent agenda. Per SMC 3.85.050, documentation supporting claims paid and the Finance Director's written report are made available to all city council members at City Hall for 48 hours prior to the Finance & Administration Committee meeting. Following the 48-hour review period, the Finance & Administration Committee considers the claims as part of its regular agenda and recommends to the full city council whether to approve or disapprove the claims. Consistent with these requirements, this report seeks City Council approval of payment of claims and payroll batches summarized in the table below.

ANALYSIS

All payments made during these periods were found to be valid claims against the city. The City's internal controls include certification of the validity of all expenditures by the appropriate department and an internal audit conducted by designated finance department staff who review all claims and payroll payments. Staff performs system validation and exception reviews to validate payroll records. The Finance Director performs a random sampling review of supporting documentation for claims payments to ensure validity, as well as regularly reviews its processes to ensure appropriate internal controls are in place. The City issues disbursements for claims and payroll via the following methods:

- Warrant: paper negotiable instruments, very much like, although legally distinct from, checks
- Commercial Credit Card: as authorized by Financial Management Policy
- Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT). EFTs are electronic banking transactions (no paper instrument) of two basic types: (1) Automated Clearing House (ACH) for Electronic Fund Transfer (EFT) and (2) Wire Transfers a direct transfer between bank accounts

Summary

Introduction*

Brief summary.

The North East King County Regional Public Safety Communications Agency (NORCOM) Interlocal Agreement, to which the City is a party, requires the City Council to approve the City's allocation for NORCOM's budget each year by resolution. The City's allocation for 2026 is proposed at \$75,468. This amount is a \$4,875 or 6.9% increase from the 2025 assessment of \$70,594.

Proposed Motion

Move to adopt Resolution xxx approving the City of Snoqualmie's allocation for the 2026 NORCOM budget.

Background/Overview*

What was done (legislative history, previous actions, ability to hyperlink)

The NORCOM Interlocal Agreement was formed on November 1, 2007. Pursuant to Section 12 (c) of the agreement, each participating agency must approve their allocation for the following year. The NORCOM budget is authorized and approved by the NORCOM Governing Board, to which a City representative, currently the fire chief, holds a vote. The 2026 budget was approved by the Governing Board on July 11, 2025. This budget reflects changes in NORCOM's services, revenue sources and expenditures in 2026, particularly negotiated benefits, personnel COLAs and funding for three capital projects. The Governing Board approved a total increase of 4.3% to fees in 2026, to include the approved usage of \$400,000 from the beginning fund balance to offset an additional increase to user fee calculations.

Analysis*

NORCOM provides excellent service to the Snoqualmie Fire Department in the way of emergency radio communications, and it is currently not in the fire department's best interest to seek alternatives for service. As the City holds a seat on the Governing Board for NORCOM, this allows the City the opportunity to monitor costs and service levels going forward. NORCOM also funds a Fire Liaison position which works with the zone fire chiefs on operational issues, giving member agencies another voice with NORCOM to effect change and foster cooperation.

Budgetary Status*

Funds have already been authorized in the current biennial budget.

Budget Summary

Administration recommends approving the City's allocation of NORCOM's budget, totalling \$75,468. The City incorporated this expenditure within the 2025-26 Biennial Budget as a part of the Fire Department's (#001) services, totaling \$2,862,384. Currently, \$920,841 has been spent, with \$1,941,543 remaining for other service expenditures. After the 2026 NORCOM allocation of \$75,468, the City still has \$1,866,075 remaining for other service expenditures. See the table below or on the following page. Therefore, sufficient appropriation remains to fund the NORCOM ILA for 2026.

Pursuant to Section 12(c) of the NORCOM Inter-local Agreement, this notice advises Participating Agencies on the programs and objectives contained in the proposed budget, of any changes in the User Fee formula, and of the required financial participation for each Principal and Subscriber for the following year.

This budget reflects changes in NORCOM's services, revenue sources and expenditures in 2026. Particularly, negotiated benefits, personnel COLAs and funding for three capital projects.

The Governing Body approved a total increase of 4.3% to fees in 2026. This increase includes the approved usage of \$400,000 from the beginning fund balance to offset an additional increase to user fee calculations.

This is in accordance with the summary budget document transmitted to the approved by the Governing Board on July 11, 2025.

There are no changes in the Calls for Service calculation. Impact to User Fees is primarily due to individual agency changes based on allocation of calls in the Functional Distribution Model.

In 2026, Snoqualmie Fire's fee assessment will be \$75,468. This amount is a \$4,875 or 6.9% increase from the 2025 assessment.

37	has resulted in the Principals agreeing to locate the initial NORCOM operation in
38	Bellevue City Hall, subject to reaching final agreement between NORCOM and the City

41	WHEREAS, substantial investigation of alternative approaches to calculation of user fees
42	has resulted in a fee formula which the parties agree is fair and equitable;
43	NOW THE DEPOSE I I I I I I I I I I I I I I I I I I I
44	NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the promises and agreements contained in this
45 46	agreement and subject to the terms and conditions set forth, it is mutually understood and
TU	agreed by the parties as follows:

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SECTION 1. CREATION OF NORTH EAST KING COUNTY REGIONAL PUBLIC SAFETY COMMUNICATIONS AGENCY. There is hereby created a consolidated public safety communications agency, hereinafter called "North East King County Regional Public Safety Communications Agency" ("NORCOM"). The parties hereto each hereby assign to NORCOM the responsibility for developing, owning, operating and managing a regional emergency service communications operation as authorized by the Interlocal Cooperation Act (Chapter 39.34 RCW). NORCOM shall be formed pursuant to RCW 39.34.030 and shall be organized as a nonprofit corporation under chapter 24.06 RCW.

SECTION 2. TERM OF AGREEMENT. This Agreement shall have an initial term of six (6) years (the "Initial Term"), and shall thereafter be of infinite duration, subject to termination provisions contained herein. During the Initial Term no Principal may withdraw from the Agreement, provided that a Principal may convert or be converted to Subscriber status as provided in Sections 12, 13 and 15, may annex to or join with another Principal as described in Section 6.p, or may upon action of the Governing Board be terminated from participation in the Agreement as provided in Section 12.

SECTION 3. DEFINITIONS.

- a. <u>Agreement</u>. The "Agreement" is this interlocal agreement, as it may hereafter be amended or modified, together with all exhibits and appendices hereto, as they may hereafter be amended or modified.
- b. <u>Directly Served</u>. The term "directly served" refers to those public safety service departments or agencies receiving Emergency Service Communications and other services from NORCOM and paying User Fees to NORCOM for such services, and which have executed either this Agreement or an approved Subscriber contract. A Principal or Subscriber may operate both Fire/EMS service and Police services but elect to have only one or the other service directly served by NORCOM.
- c. <u>EMS</u>. "EMS" means Emergency Medical Services as described in RCW 84.52.069(5), as now or later amended, including the provision by the Participating Agencies of emergency medical care or emergency medical services, including related personnel costs, training for such personnel, and related equipment, supplies, vehicles and structures needed for the provision of emergency medical care or emergency medical services.
- d. <u>Executive Director</u>. The "Executive Director" is the chief operating officer for NORCOM appointed by and serving at the pleasure of the Governing Board.
- e. <u>Emergency Service Communications</u>. "Emergency Service Communications" mean those services described in Section 4.
- f. <u>Fire/EMS Service Board</u>. The "Fire/EMS Service Board" is the advisory board composed of Representatives from Principal and Subscriber fire and emergency medical services departments or agencies as described in Section 7.
- g. Governing Board. The "Governing Board" is the body described in Section 6 and shall be the governing body of NORCOM.
- h. <u>Initial Term</u>. The "Initial Term" refers to the first six (6) years in which this Agreement shall be in effect.

- i. <u>Joint Operating Board</u>. The "Joint Operating Board" is the advisory body described in Section 7, which consists of the combined membership of the Fire/EMS Service Board and Police Service Board.
- j. <u>Member</u>. A "Member" or "Governing Board Member" is the individual representing a Principal on the Governing Board, whether the Chief Executive Officer of such Principal or his/her designated alternate
- k. <u>NORCOM</u> refers to the "North East King County Regional Public Safety Communications Agency."
- 1. <u>Participating Agencies</u>. All Principals, and all Subscribers, as they may be so constituted from time to time, are collectively referred to as the "Participating Agencies" or "Participants," and individually referred to as a "Participating Agency" or "Participant."
- m. <u>Police Service Board</u>. The "Police Service Board" is the advisory board composed of representatives from Principal and Subscriber police, sheriff or similar departments or agencies as described in Section 7.
- n. <u>Principal</u>. A "Principal" is a general purpose municipal corporation or government agency, a fire district, a Public Safety Interlocal Operation, or a state agency created under the laws of Washington, which has accepted the terms of and is a party to this Agreement. A Principal may cease to be a Principal upon annexing to or joining another Principal as described in Section 6.p.
- o. <u>Principals Assembly</u>. The "Principals Assembly" is the annual meeting of representatives from the legislative bodies of each Principal as described in Section 8.
- p. <u>Public Safety Interlocal Operation</u>. A public safety interlocal operation includes a joint operation of fire districts and cities for provision of public fire and EMS services entered into and operating pursuant to Chapter 39.34 RCW, and may also include a public development authority created pursuant to RCW 35.21.730 et. seq. or a regional fire protection service authority created pursuant to Chapter 52.26 RCW, or a nonprofit corporation created for the purpose of facilitating a joint operation between fire districts and cities pursuant to RCW 39.34.030(3).
- q. <u>Representative</u>. The term "Representative" refers to the individual representing a Principal or a Subscriber on the Police Service Board, Fire/EMS Service Board or Joint Operating Board, or his/her designated alternate.
- r. <u>Service Boards</u>. The "Service Boards" are the Police Services Board and the Fire/EMS Service Board established by Section 7.
- s. <u>Simple-Majority Vote</u>. A "Simple-Majority Vote" of the Governing Board means a majority of the votes of the Members present constituting a quorum and voting, with each Member present and voting having one vote.
- t. <u>Subscriber</u>. A "Subscriber" is a general purpose municipal corporation or government agency, or a fire district, a Public Safety Interlocal Operation, or a state agency created under the laws of Washington which has agreed to pay NORCOM for emergency communications services or other services as offered at a rate or rates according to such terms and conditions as may be established by NORCOM as evidenced by separate contract between NORCOM and such entity. A "Subscriber" may also be a Principal that is converted to Subscriber status as provided in Sections 12, 13 and 15.
- u. <u>Supermajority Vote</u>. A "Supermajority Vote" means Governing Board approval of an item accomplished by securing affirmative votes of both: (1) not less than

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two-thirds of all Members of the Governing Board in number; and (2) not less than two-thirds of the Weighted Vote of all Members of the Governing Board.

- v. "Two-Prong Simple Majority Vote." A Two-Prong Simple Majority Vote means Governing Board approval of an item accomplished by securing affirmative votes of both: (1) a majority of all Members of the Governing Board present constituting a quorum and voting, with each Member present and voting having one vote; and (2) a majority by Weighted Vote of all Members of the Governing Board present constituting a quorum and voting.
- w. <u>User Fees</u>. User Fees are those fees charged to Participating Agencies for services provided by NORCOM.
- x. <u>Weighted Vote</u>. A "Weighted Vote" means a vote in which each Member's vote is counted according to the proportion its respective Principal's User Fees due and payable for the then current budget year bears to the total User Fees payable for such year by all Principals. A Weighted Vote may not be split.
- y. <u>800 MHz System</u>. The 800 MHz System is the eastside public safety communication system developed in common by the Eastside Public Safety Agency (EPSCA) and other governmental agencies, including base stations and towers for an 800 MHz system and microwave backbone.
- z. <u>9-1-1-Calls</u>. 9-1-1- calls are those calls received or dispatched via the statewide emergency communication network of telephone or telecommunications service as described in Chapter 38.52 RCW.
- SECTION 4. NORCOM SERVICES. NORCOM has the responsibility and authority for providing emergency service communications and all related incidental functions for communicating and dispatching services between the public and the Participating Agencies' directly served public safety departments in the furtherance of improved public safety and emergency response, including but not limited to the following more specifically described services:
- a. Receiving 9-1-1 Calls and routine calls for police, fire and medical services;
- b. Directing a response to said calls by either dispatching the appropriate emergency police, fire or medical unit or forwarding the call to the appropriate agency for response;
 - c. Providing on-going communication support to personnel in the field;
- d. Updating, maintaining and managing the radio communications systems (excluding, unless specifically approved by Governing Board, the 800 MHz system), computer systems, support files and resource materials necessary to accomplish the above;
- e. Initiating public safety records for all dispatched calls and providing such records services, including the updating, maintaining and managing of records systems as may be determined by the Governing Board; and
- f. Establishing and updating from time to time standard protocols for communications to and from personnel in the field.
- SECTION 5. NORCOM POWERS. NORCOM, through its Governing Board, shall have all powers allowed by law for interlocal agencies created under RCW 39.34.030, as

SECTION 6. GOVERNING BOARD: COMPOSITION AND OPERATION.

- a. <u>Composition</u>. NORCOM shall be governed by a Governing Board composed of one (1) representative from each Principal, which representative shall be the Chief Executive Officer of each such Principal or his/her alternate as provided in Section 6.f. Such representatives are referred to as Members or Members of the Governing Board.
- Representation. Each Principal shall determine which of its respective public service departments, or operations ("agencies") will be directly served by NORCOM. The initial election by each Principal as to which of their respective agencies will receive Agency service will be recorded by the submittal by each Principal of a completed service election form, a blank version of which is set forth at Exhibit A. Regardless of how many of Principal's operations are directly served, a Principal shall have only one seat on the Governing Board, however, the number of that Principal's agencies or operations served by NORCOM will affect the Weighted Vote of the Principal.
- c. <u>Ex Officio Representative</u>. The Chair (or the Vice Chair in his or her absence) of the Joint Operating Board shall serve as an ex officio, non-voting member of the Governing Board.
- d. <u>Conditions for Serving on Governing Board</u>. All Members and their alternates shall serve without compensation from NORCOM. Members may only serve for such time as they are the duly appointed, acting or elected Chief Executive Officer of their respective Principal agency.
- e. <u>Powers</u>. The Governing Board shall have final decision making authority upon all policy issues and shall exercise the powers described in Section 5. The Governing Board may delegate responsibility for execution of Governing Board policies and directives and for day-to-day operational decision-making to the Executive Director, including the hiring and supervision of additional staff positions authorized by the Governing Board.
- f. <u>Alternates</u>. Each Member of the Governing Board may designate one alternate to serve on the Governing Board when such Member is absent or unable to serve, provided that each such alternate must be previously designated and must have operational responsibilities within his or her respective agency.
- g. <u>Quorum</u>. A simple majority of the Members (or their alternates) in number (excluding any Member which per Section 19 has given notice of withdrawal or has which been terminated by vote of the Governing Board) shall constitute a quorum of the Governing Board for purposes of doing business on any issue.
- h. <u>Voting</u>. The Board shall strive to operate by consensus. All Board decisions on items not listed in Section 6.i require a Simple Majority Vote for approval; provided that any Governing Board Member present and voting has the right, in advance of a vote, to require a Two-Prong Simple Majority Vote on any item that would otherwise require a Simple Majority Vote.
 - a. A Member representing a Principal that has given notice of withdrawal or which has been terminated by vote of the Governing Board shall be authorized to cast votes at the Governing Board only on those matters defined in Section 19.g.

- i. <u>Items Requiring Supermajority Vote for Approval</u>. A Supermajority Vote of the Governing Board shall be required in order to approve the following items or actions:
 - i. Approval or amendment of NORCOM budget, including the User Fee formula;
 - ii. A decision to request Principals issue debt for or on behalf of NORCOM;
 - iii. A decision to acquire assets, equipment, real or personal property valued at over \$500,000 per Section 14;
 - iv. Admission of a new Principal;
 - v. Appointing the Executive Director (a Simple Majority Vote is required for removal of the Executive Director).;
 - vi. Amendment of this Agreement (except for those amendments requiring unanimous consent of Principals under section 20 of this Agreement).
 - vii. Expansion of the scope of services provided by NORCOM; and viii. Adoption or amendment of the NORCOM Bylaws, or amendment of the NORCOM Articles of Incorporation subject to other applicable requirements of Chapter 24.06 RCW.

- Officers. The Governing Board shall have two officers, a Chair and Vice-Chair. It will be the function of the Chair to preside at the meetings of the Governing Board. The Vice-Chair shall assume this role in absence of the Chair. At the first meeting of the Governing Board, the officers shall be elected by Simple Majority Vote of the Members, and shall serve until the date of the first Principals Assembly. Annually thereafter, at the Principals Assembly the Vice Chair shall assume the role of Chair and the Governing Board shall elect a new Vice-Chair by Simple Majority Vote. In the event of a vacancy in the Chair position, the Vice-Chair shall assume the Chair for the balance of the term of the departed Chair. In the event of a vacancy in the Vice-Chair position, the Governing Board shall by Simple Majority Vote elect a new Vice-Chair to serve to the balance of the term of the departed Vice-Chair. An officer elected to fill the unexpired term of his or her predecessor shall not be precluded from serving a full annual term of office following the end of such unexpired term. Any officer appointed by the Board may be removed by Simple Majority Vote of the Board upon 30 days' written notice, with or without cause, in which event the Board shall promptly elect a new officer who shall serve until the next Principals Assembly. The Board may appoint persons to serve as Secretary and Treasurer of NORCOM, provided that such persons shall not be Members of the Governing Board.
- k. <u>Staffing</u>. The Executive Director shall assign agency staff to support the Governing Board as he or she deems appropriate.
- 1. Meetings. The Governing Board shall meet not less than four (4) times per year, at least once each calendar quarter, at a time and place designated by the Chair of the Governing Board or by a majority of its Members. Not less than fourteen (14) days advance notice of regular meetings shall be given. Special meetings may be called by the Chair or any two (2) Members upon giving all other Members not less than seven (7) days prior notice. In an emergency, the Governing Board may dispense with written

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notice requirements for special meetings, but must, in good faith, implement best efforts to provide fair and reasonable notice to all Governing Board Members. Members (or alternates) may participate in meetings by telephone conference or other comparable means.

- m. <u>Articles and Bylaws</u>. Unless otherwise approved by Supermajority Vote of the Governing Board, upon the request of any Member of the Governing Board, Robert's Revised Rules of Order shall govern any proceeding of the Governing Board.
- n. <u>Consultation with Joint Operating Board</u>. It is the intent of this Agreement to seek the active participation and advice of Participating Agencies in the determination of NORCOM policies and management. To the extent practicable, all items to come before the Governing Board shall have been previously subject to the review, comment and recommendation of the Joint Operating Board and the Governing Board shall consider such input from the Joint Operating Board in its deliberations.
- o. <u>Boundary Changes or Service Territory Changes.</u> It is the responsibility of each Participating Agency to provide reasonable advance notice to NORCOM of any boundary changes, or service territory changes that may occur due to annexation, merger, or other reason, so that NORCOM may accurately dispatch calls, accurately track calls for service data and accurately assess User Fees to the Principal and may accurately determine the weighting of votes of all Principals.
- p. Merger of a Principal with another Principal Directly Served by NORCOM. In the event a Principal annexes to another Principal, or becomes a member agency of a Public Safety Interlocal Operation that is a Principal, and as a result of such annexation or contractual action (collectively herein, "merger"), a public safety operation (e.g. fire/EMS operation or police operation) of the "merged" Principal is no longer Directly Served by NORCOM, then the "merged" Principal's rights and obligations under this Agreement (including its seat and voting rights on the Governing Board) with respect to the merged public safety operation shall be assumed in full by the Principal into which it has merged, including without limitation any amounts owed NORCOM for services rendered or with respect to any borrowing program per Section 13. *Provided, however*, that if a "merged" Principal retains a separate public safety operation that is Directly Served by NORCOM, that Principal shall remain a Principal and shall retain all its rights and obligations under this Agreement with respect to its Directly Served public safety operation.

SECTION 7. JOINT OPERATING BOARD AND SERVICE BOARDS.

- a. <u>Creation and Membership</u>. A Joint Operating Board is created to serve in an advisory capacity to the Governing Board. The Joint Operating Board shall be composed of the combined membership of the Police Service Board and Fire/EMS Service Board.
 - Police Service Board. The Police Service Board shall consist of the chief or his/her designee from each Principal and Subscriber police department or equivalent agency or operation directly receiving services from NORCOM
 - ii. <u>Fire/EMS Service Board</u>. The Fire/EMS Service Board shall consist of the chief or his/her designee from each Principal and

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Subscriber with a Fire/EMS department or equivalent agency or operation directly receiving services from NORCOM.

Directly Served Agencies. To be eligible to have a Representative on either the Police Service Board or Fire/EMS Service Board, a Principal or Subscriber must be directly served by NORCOM. For example, if a city directly operates a police department but maintains a separate police dispatch operation, it would not have a seat on the Police Service Board; however, if such city's fire department were dispatched by NORCOM, the fire department would have a seat on the Fire/EMS Service Board. A city receiving police service under contract with another entity would not have seat on the Police Service Board. A city or fire district receiving fire service under contract with another entity would not have a seat on the Fire/EMS Service Board. If a city or fire district is part of a Public Safety Interlocal Operation providing fire/EMS service to its member agencies and said Operation is a Principal, then the city or district would not have a seat on the Fire/EMS Service Board as a result of such arrangement but the Public Safety Interlocal Operation would have a seat on the Fire/EMS Service Board, provided, however, that if such city's police department is directly served by NORCOM, the city would have a representative on the Police Service Board.

- b. <u>Board Representatives.</u> Persons serving on either Service Board and as a result also serving on the Joint Operating Board are referred to as Representatives and shall serve without compensation from NORCOM.
- c. <u>Alternates</u>. Representatives to the Boards may designate one alternate to serve when such Representative is absent or unable to serve provided that such alternates must have operational responsibilities within their respective agencies.
- d. <u>Powers</u>. The Service Boards and the Joint Operating Board shall meet individually and together for the purpose of promoting interagency collaboration and cooperation, information sharing, development of proposed Agency operating policy and such other matters as the Governing Board may direct. The Joint Operating Board shall provide advice, information, and recommendations to either the Governing Board or the Executive Director.
- e. <u>Quorum</u>. A majority of the members of each Service Board and the Joint Operating Board (or their alternates) shall constitute a quorum. Representatives may participate in meetings by telephone conference or other comparable means.
- f. <u>Voting</u>. All actions and recommendations of the Service Boards and Joint Operating Board shall by approved by majority vote of those present and voting. Each person serving on such Boards shall have one vote. There will be no Weighted Voting.
- g. Officers. The Joint Operating Board shall have two officers, a Chair and Vice-Chair. At all times one of these two officers must be a Fire/EMS Service Board Representative and the other must be a Police Service Board Representative. It will be the function of the Chair to preside at the meetings of the Joint Operating Board, and the Vice-Chair shall assume this role in absence of the Chair. The officers shall be initially elected at the first meeting of the Joint Operating Board by majority vote of the

Representatives on the Joint Operating Board and shall serve for a one-year term. Annually thereafter the Vice Chair shall assume the role of Chair and the Joint Operating Board shall elect a new Vice-Chair. In the event of a vacancy in the Chair position, the Vice-Chair shall assume the Chair for the balance of the term of the departed Chair. In the event of a vacancy in the Vice-Chair position, the Joint Operating Board shall elect a new Vice-Chair to serve to the balance of the term of the departed Vice-Chair. An officer of the Joint Operating Board elected to fill the unexpired term of his or her predecessor shall not be precluded from serving a full annual term of office following the end of such unexpired term The Service Boards shall each annually elect a chair who may or may not be an officer of the Joint Operating Board.

- h. <u>Staffing</u>. The Joint Operating Board and Service Boards shall be staffed by the Executive Director and such additional agency staffing as the Executive Director may deem appropriate.
- i. Meetings. The Joint Operating Board and each Service Board shall meet not less than six (6) times per year, once every two (2) months, at a time and place designated by the Chair of the Joint Operating Board or by a majority of its Representatives. It is the intent of this provision that on each such meeting date the two Service Boards shall each meet separately and then shall combine to meet as the Joint Operating Board. Not less than fourteen (14) days advance notice of regular meetings shall be given. Special meetings may be called by the Chair of the Joint Operating Board or Representatives representing at least ten percent (10%) in number of the total seats on the Joint Operating Board and upon giving all other Representatives not less than seven (7) days prior notice of such meeting. In an emergency, the Joint Operating Board may dispense written notice requirements for special meetings, but must, in good faith, implement best efforts to provide fair and reasonable notice to all Representatives.

SECTION 8. PRINCIPALS ASSEMBLY. The legislative body of each Principal shall annually appoint one of its members to represent the legislative body at the Principals Assembly. The Principals Assembly shall be convened by the Governing Board for one meeting each April. At the joint meeting of the Assembly and the Governing Board the Executive Director shall present an annual report which report shall: (1) review the activities of NORCOM for the previous calendar year; (2) present the work program and significant events for the upcoming calendar year; (3) present a financial management report for NORCOM; and (4) report on performance benchmarks of NORCOM activities. Also at the Assembly, the Chair and Vice Chair of the Joint Operating Board shall present the Joint Operating Board proposed budget policy for the upcoming budget. The Principals' legislative representatives at the Assembly may vote to recommend changes to the proposed budget policy, work program and performance measures program, and may provide additional comment and question to the Governing Board. Voting by Principals' legislative representatives shall be based on one-vote per Principal with a simple majority vote of Principals represented at the meeting required to approve any recommendation to be forwarded to the Governing Board. At the joint meeting of the Principals Assembly and the Governing Board, the Governing Board shall conduct the annual meeting for NORCOM as required by the bylaws and shall elect the Vice-Chair of the Governing Board for the next year as provided in Section 6.j. The action and deliberations of the Assembly shall be reported to the Governing Board no later than May

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1 by written report prepared by or at the direction of the Executive Director. The actions
 2 and recommendations of the Principals Assembly shall be advisory to the Governing
 3 Board.

SECTION 9. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR. The Governing Board shall be responsible for the appointment and termination of the Executive Director, and shall request a recommendation from the Joint Operating Board regarding any proposed hiring. The Executive Director shall be responsible to the Governing Board and shall advise it from time to time on a proposed budget and other appropriate matters in order to fully implement the purposes of this Agreement. The Executive Director shall administer NORCOM in its day-to-day operations consistent with the policies adopted by the Governing Board. The Executive Director shall appoint persons to fill other staff positions, subject to confirmation by the Governing Board as the Board may require. Only the Governing Board shall be authorized to hire or retain legal counsel and independent accountants and auditors. Other consultants may be designated in such

The Executive Director shall have experience in technical, financial and administrative fields and his or her appointment shall be on the basis of merit only. The Executive Director is an "at will" employee and may be terminated upon the Simple Majority Vote of the Governing Board.

manner as the Governing Board may determine subject to Sections 5 and 6.

SECTION 10. PERSONNEL POLICY. The Joint Operating Board or the Executive Director shall, as necessary from time to time, submit to the Governing Board a proposed Agency personnel policy for the Governing Board's approval, rejection or modification; provided that the Executive Director shall first submit any such proposed policies to the Joint Operating Board for its review and comment. All modifications or revisions to personnel policies must have the final approval of the Governing Board.

SECTION 11. OPERATIONAL POLICY AND SYSTEM EVALUATION. The Executive Director shall actively and continuously consider and evaluate all means and opportunities toward the enhancement of operational effectiveness of emergency services so as to provide maximum and ultimate benefits to the members of the general public. The Executive Director shall present his or her recommendations to the Joint Operating Board and Governing Board from time to time.

SECTION 12. BUDGET; USER FEE FORMULA; PAYMENT OF USER FEES; DELINQUENCIES; RESERVE FUNDS.

a. <u>Budget Fiscal Year</u>. NORCOM budget fiscal year shall be either the
 calendar year, or two calendar years as the Governing Board may determine.
 b. <u>Budget Policy Direction</u>. The Executive Director shall present a property.

b. <u>Budget Policy Direction</u>. The Executive Director shall present a proposed outline of the policy approach to the budget for the upcoming budget to the Joint Operating Board by February 1 for its review and recommendation. By March 15, the Joint Operating Board shall transmit its proposed budget policy to all Principals. As provided in Section 8, the representatives at the Principals Assembly shall provide review and comment on the Joint Operating Board proposed budget policy, and the Assembly's

input shall be reported to the Governing Board by May 1. The Governing Board shall adopt a budget policy for the upcoming budget by June 1.

- Budget Approval. The Executive Director shall develop the proposed operating budget based on the Governing Board's approved budget policy direction. The Executive Director shall present a proposed budget to the Joint Operating Board on or before July 1 for its review and recommendation. The proposed budget, together with all comments from the Joint Operating Board regarding the budget, shall be transmitted to the Governing Board by the Executive Director on or before August 1 and approved by the Governing Board no later than August 30. Thereafter and in no event later than September 5, Participating Agencies shall be advised on the programs and objectives as contained in the proposed budget, of any changes in the User Fee formula, and of the required financial participation for each Principal and Subscriber for the following year. Upon approval by the legislative authorities of each Principal and Subscriber of their respective allocation for NORCOM's budget and upon verification of such approval to NORCOM, the Governing Board shall, after a public hearing, adopt its final budget for the following year. Any Principal not approving its full budget allocation shall be automatically converted to Subscriber status effective the first day of the next budget year (whether biennial or annual) and subject to penalty as described in Section 15.
- d. <u>User Fee Formula</u>. As part of the budget deliberations the Joint Operating Board shall make recommendations regarding User Fee formula(e) to the Governing Board, and the Governing Board shall either continue the existing User Fee formula(e) or adopt new User Fee formula(e). Although initially set forth as an Appendix to this Agreement, it is anticipated that the User Fee formula(e) may be changed from time to time as part of the budget process, and that any such changes must be approved by Supermajority Vote of the Governing Board in accordance with Section 6.i. The User Fee formula(e) for Principals may be different from that for Subscribers. Unless otherwise provided in the final adopted budget, any revenue attributable to a premium paid by Subscribers as compared to Principal as a result of the use of different User Fee Formulas for Subscribers shall be deposited upon receipt to NORCOM reserve funds, with the specific allocation to each reserve fund designated by the Board as part of the budget process. It is expressly contemplated that Participants may become subject to differential user fees over time based upon the benefit conferred to such agencies.
- e. <u>Payment of User Fees</u>. User Fees shall be payable by Principals quarterly no later than January 15, April 15, July 15 and October 15 of each year. Contracts with Subscribers for services will provide for quarterly payment of User Fees on the same dates each year.
- f. <u>Delinquencies</u>. Interest on User Fees not paid when due shall begin accruing interest immediately at the Federal Prime Rate as of the date the payment was originally due, plus 3% per year. NORCOM shall, within seven (7) days of the due date, send notice to any delinquent Principal and provide a 60-day cure period from the original due date of the payment. If such User Fees and interest penalties are not paid in full within 60 days of the original due date, then the Principal delinquent in payment of User Fees shall upon such 60th day be deemed immediately converted to the status of a Subscriber and subject to penalty as described in Section 15. In the event a Principal converted to Subscriber status by non-payment of fees shall not have paid in full all User Fees and interest owing by six (6) months after the original due date, then the Governing

Board may terminate provision of NORCOM services to said former Principal, but the termination of services shall not absolve the Subscriber of its obligation to pay all User Fees past due, together with interest.

- g. Terms of Subscriber Contracts. Subscriber contracts shall include terms consistent with these delinquency provisions, that is, interest shall accrue on delinquent payments at the same rate as provided herein, and service may be terminated if fees and interest are not paid in full within six months.
- h. Reserve Funds. The Governing Board shall establish both an Operating Contingency Reserve Fund and a Capital Equipment Replacement Fund and shall call for funding of such reserves in each budget at a level the Governing Board determines appropriate. The goal of the Operating Contingency Reserve Fund is to ensure operating funds are on hand to reasonably address unforeseen operating contingencies. The purpose of the Capital Equipment Replacement Fund is to minimize large increases in User Fees from year to year resulting from acquisition or replacement of capital, and to fund the timely replacement of aging technology, equipment and systems.
- i. NORCOM 2007 and 2008 Budgets and User Fees. Notwithstanding the requirements in this Agreement regarding approval of Budgets and User Fees to the contrary, the following terms and conditions will apply with respect to the budgets and User Fees for NORCOM in 2007 and 2008:
 - i. 2007 Budget and User Fees. The budget for NORCOM for calendar year 2007 shall be adopted substantially as set forth in **Exhibit B**, subject to amendment as a result of any grants or other funding awarded to NORCOM. The Governing Board shall calculate the User Fees for 2007 based on this Exhibit B and applying the User Fee Formula Set forth in **Appendix A-1** (User Fees during the Transition Period). The Governing Board shall issue notice to all Participants on or before November 15, 2007, of the User Fees payable in 2007 by Participants. Such User Fees shall be payable on or before December 1, 2007, and shall be subject to such delinquency and other penalties as otherwise provided in Sections 12 and 15.
 - ii. 2008 Budget and User Fees. The budget for NORCOM for calendar year 2008 shall be adopted substantially as set forth in Exhibit C, subject to amendment as a result of any grants or other funding awards to NORCOM. The Governing Board shall calculate the User Fees for 2008 based on this Exhibit C and applying the User Fee Formula Set forth in Appendix A-1 (User Fees during the Transition Period), shall issue notice to all Participants on or before November 15, 2007, of the User Fees payable in 2008 by Participants. Such User Fees shall be payable quarterly and subject to such delinquency and other penalties as otherwise provided in Sections 12 and 15.
 - j. The City of Kirkland shall serve as fiscal agent for NORCOM until such time as the Governing Board appoints a successor fiscal agent. The City

shall be entitled to reasonable compensation from NORCOM for provision of this service.

SECTION 13. ISSUANCE OF OBLIGATIONS IN SUPPORT OF NORCOM.

a. NORCOM shall not have the power to issue obligations or to incur debt. However, it is anticipated that NORCOM may require capital funding from time to time to support facilities, technology and equipment needs. One or more Principals may issue obligations to provide for NORCOM's capital funding needs and all Principals shall be required to participate equitably in providing for the repayment of those obligations when requested to do so by a Supermajority Vote of the Governing Board in accordance with Section 6.i. It is expressly contemplated that Participants may become subject to differential user fees over time based upon the benefit conferred to such agencies. requests for participation in a borrowing program shall be conveyed in writing to each Principal, together with the proposal allocation of responsibility as between Principals. If a Principal elects not to participate as requested by the Governing Board, it may within 45 days of receiving the request propose in writing to the Governing Board an alternative means of supporting the proposed debt program. The Board may accept, reject or modify the proposal and shall re-issue notice to all Principals of its decision. If a Principal does not participate as requested by the Governing Board in the borrowing program (either through the initial proposed participation or through an alternative means of support that is accepted by the Governing Board), then such Principal shall be converted to the status of a Subscriber effective as of the last date on which all other participating Principals have taken final action to approve their participation in the borrowing program, and subject to penalty as described in Section 14, or such later date as the Board may determine.

- b. Each Principal's participation in a borrowing program shall be integrated into User Fees consistent with Section 12.(d) and Appendix A to ensure that amounts are collected each year from Principals and Subscribers sufficient to repay each Principal's obligations in support of a NORCOM borrowing program on a timely basis.
- c. For as long as any obligations issued by a Participant or other entity pursuant to an approved NORCOM borrowing program are payable from NORCOM's pledge of the debt service portion of User Fees, NORCOM irrevocably pledges to impose and take all reasonable action to collect all Participants' User Fees and amounts due from former Participants in amounts sufficient to make timely payments to the issuer of those obligations, together with coverage and other amounts pledged to be collected with respect to the obligations.
- d. Each Principal irrevocably covenants that it shall establish, maintain and collect taxes, rates, fees or other charges at levels adequate to provide revenues sufficient to enable the Principal to make the payments of User Fees required to be made under this Agreement, and that if the Principal converts to a Subscriber status under Section 15 or withdraws its membership or is terminated under Section 19, that Principal shall nevertheless continue to be obligated to pay its allocable share of the debt service portion of User Fees with respect to the NORCOM Obligations issued prior to the date that the Principal so converts or withdraws or is terminated from the Agreement. Each Principal hereby acknowledges that this covenant may be relied upon by owners of obligations issued for on or behalf of NORCOM, and that these covenants represent an irrevocable pledge to pay such User Fees as NORCOM may impose in amounts sufficient to pay its share of the debt service on those obligations.

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- e. To meet the requirements of United States Securities and Exchange Commission ("SEC") Rule 15c2-12(b)(5) (the "Rule") as applicable to a participating underwriter for obligations issued for or on behalf of NORCOM, each Principal that may be deemed to be an "Obligated Person" under the Rule shall make a written disclosure undertaking for the benefit of holders of the obligations and provide certificates or verifications all as may be reasonably requested by an issuer of obligations for or on behalf of NORCOM.
- f. Each Principal further covenants that it will take all actions necessary to prevent interest on obligations issued for or on behalf of NORCOM from being included in gross income for federal income tax purposes, and it will neither take any action nor make or permit any use of proceeds of those obligations or other funds treated as proceeds of those obligations at any time during the term of those obligations that will cause interest on those obligations to be included in gross income for federal income tax purposes.
- g. NORCOM shall ensure that Subscriber service contracts include covenants substantially equivalent to those contained in subparagraphs (d) through (f), as applicable, provided that a Subscriber's obligation to pay through User Fees its allocable share of debt service on NORCOM Obligations shall not extend past the termination or expiration of its applicable service contracts.
- h. The provisions of this section shall survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement.

SECTION 14. TRANSFER OF ASSETS TO NORCOM; FUTURE ASSET ACQUISITIONS.

- a. In order to reduce the cost of starting up a new consolidated emergency communications services dispatch operation, NORCOM will acquire from Bellevue and Kirkland certain assets currently used by these cities in their respective dispatch operations. These assets will be acquired by NORCOM at prices based on a straight-line depreciation of the value of the assets at the time of acquisition. The timing of acquisition of the equipment will be such as will facilitate both the timely start-up of NORCOM services and transition of dispatch service provision from these city dispatch operations to NORCOM. Bellevue and Kirkland shall be repaid for their contribution of assets by NORCOM over a period of not to exceed seven (7) years. Bellevue and Kirkland through payment of NORCOM User Fees shall be subject to payment of their respective portions of these contributed asset costs as are all other Participants under the then applicable User Fee Formula. The Governing Board may approve such other asset transfer or acquisitions, to be repaid by NORCOM over time, with such terms of repayment as the Board may determine.
- b. Acquisition of assets, equipment, real or personal property valued at over \$500,000 shall require approval of a Supermajority Vote of the Governing Board.
- c. It is expressly contemplated that Participants may pay differential User Fees depending upon the benefit conferred to such agencies from the assets to be acquired.

SECTION 15. CONVERSION OF STATUS OF PARTICIPATING AGENCIES, ADDITION OF NEW PRINCIPALS OR SUBSCRIBERS; PROVISION OF ADDITIONAL SERVICE TO PRINCIPALS.

a. As described in Sections 12.c, 12.f and 13 hereof, a Principal may be converted to Subscriber for: failure to approve its share of the budget; for nonpayment or

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delinquency in payment of User Fees; or for failure to participate in a manner approved by the Governing Board in an approved borrowing obligation program. On the date of such conversion, said former Principal shall:

- i. lose its representation on the Governing Board;
- ii. lose its right to receive a share of NORCOM assets upon dissolution of NORCOM;
- iii. become subject to payment of User Fees in accordance with the then applicable User Fee formula for Subscribers; and
- iv. be bound by the terms of the then current Subscriber service contract. The conversion of a Principal to Subscriber shall not discharge or relieve any Principal of its obligations to NORCOM.
- b. A Principal may alternately elect to convert to Subscriber status effective the first day of the next budget year (whether NORCOM is operating under an annual or biennial budget) by giving notice of its intent to the Governing Board not less than nine (9) months in advance of such effective date. Such conversion shall be effective as proposed without further action of the Governing Board, barring any basis for terminating the Principal and action thereon by the Governing Board.
- c. A governmental entity otherwise meeting the qualifications of a Principal in Section 3.n hereof may be admitted to NORCOM upon Supermajority Vote of the Governing Board as required under Section 6.i. Similarly, a Subscriber may apply to the Governing Board to be converted to Principal status. As a condition of becoming a Principal, whether by conversion or new admission, the Governing Board may require payment or other contributions or actions by the new Principal as the Governing Board may deem appropriate, and may set such start date for service as it deems appropriate, it being the intention of this provision that the addition of new Principals shall not cause pre-existing Participants to incur additional cost.
- d. The determination of whether to accept new Subscribers shall be made by the Governing Board in a manner similar, and subject to such terms and conditions, as that for accepting new Principals, it being the intention that the addition of new Subscribers shall not cause pre-existing Participants to incur additional cost.
- e. A Principal wishing to receive service from NORCOM for an operating department in addition to a department already served by NORCOM may make application to the Governing Board in the same manner as, and be subject to such conditions and approvals as the Governing Board may deem appropriate for, an entity seeking admission as a new Principal.

SECTION 16. CONTRACTS AND SUPPORT SERVICES. The Governing Board or the Executive Director with advice of the Joint Operating Board shall as necessary contract with appropriate local governments or other third parties for the use of space for its operations, and for staff and auxiliary services including, but not limited to, records, payroll, accounting, purchasing and data processing.

SECTION 17. RETAINED POWERS OF PARTICIPATING AGENCIES. Each
Participating Agency shall retain the responsibility and authority for its operational
departments and for such equipment and services as are required at its place of operation

to interconnect to NORCOM's operations. Interconnecting equipment and services

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necessary to the provision of authorized NORCOM services may be funded through NORCOM's budget and operational programs.

SECTION 18. INVENTORY AND PROPERTY. Equipment and furnishings for NORCOM's operation shall be acquired as provided by law. If any Participating Agency provides equipment or furnishings for NORCOM's use, title to the same shall rest with the respective local entity unless that equipment or furnishing is acquired by NORCOM. The Executive Director shall maintain and annually update an inventory of equipment and furnishings owned by, leased or temporarily assigned to NORCOM, and the values thereof. In event of dissolution or termination of NORCOM, assigned or loaned items shall be returned to the lending entity and all other items or funds derived from the sale thereof shall be distributed to Principals as described in Section 20.

SECTION 19. WITHDRAWAL BY OR TERMINATION OF PRINCIPAL.

a. Any Principal may withdraw its membership and terminate its participation in this Agreement after the Initial Term by providing written notice and serving that notice on the NORCOM Governing Board on or before December 31 in any year. After providing appropriate notice as provided in this section, that Principal's membership withdrawal shall become effective on the last day of the calendar year following delivery and service of appropriate notice to all other Principals.

b. Notwithstanding the foregoing, a Principal may be terminated at any time by action of the Governing Board for delinquencies of at least six (6) months in payment of User Fees and interest per Section 12.f.

- c. Time is of the essence in giving notice of termination and/or withdrawal.
- d. A terminating and/or withdrawing Principal is deemed to forfeit any and all rights it may have to NORCOM's personal or real property, or any other ownership in NORCOM, unless otherwise provided by the Governing Board; provided further that this forfeit of rights shall not apply to personal property on loan to NORCOM from the terminating or withdrawing Principal.
- e. The termination and/or withdrawal of a Principal shall not discharge or relieve any Principal of its obligations to NORCOM.
- f. Subscriber service contracts entered into by NORCOM shall provide for similar notice and conditions for termination and withdrawal as for Principals.
- g. A Governing Board Member representing a Principal that (1) has given notice of withdrawal, or (2) has been terminated by vote of the Governing Board which termination is effective at a future date, shall be authorized to cast votes at the Governing Board only on budgets items to be implemented prior to the withdrawal or termination date. A withdrawing or terminating Principal will be excused from participating in a borrowing program approved per Section 13 where the debt instruments in support of that program will not be issued until after the Principal is withdrawn or terminated, provided that the withdrawing or terminating Principal is not authorized to vote on such borrowing program.

SECTION20. AMENDMENT OF AGREEMENT. This Agreement may be amended upon approval of a Supermajority Vote of the Governing Board in accordance with Section 6.i, except that any amendment affecting the terms and conditions of membership

on the Governing Board or voting rights of Governing Board members shall require consent of the legislative authorities of all Principals. This section shall not be construed to require unanimous consent for the addition of a new Principal or agreement to serve an additional agency or department of a Principal.

SECTION 21. TERMINATION OF AGREEMENT; DISSOLUTION OF AGENCY.

- a. After the Initial Term and upon the Simple Majority Vote of a majority of the then remaining Principals, this Agreement may be terminated by direction of the Governing Board to wind up business by a specified date which date shall be at least one (1) year from the date of the vote to terminate. Upon the final termination date, this Agreement shall be fully terminated.
- b. Upon termination of this Agreement, all property acquired during the life of the Agreement remaining in ownership of NORCOM shall be disposed of in the following manner:
 - i. All real and personal property purchased pursuant to this agreement and all unexpended funds or reserve funds, net of all outstanding Agency liabilities, shall be distributed to those Principals still participating in NORCOM on the day prior to the termination date and shall be apportioned between Principals based on the ratio that the average of each Principals' paid User Fees over the preceding five years bears to the total of all then remaining Principals' user fees paid during such five-year period.
 - ii. In the event outstanding liabilities of NORCOM exceed the value of personal and real property and funds on hand, all Principals shall contribute to such liabilities in the same manner as which they would share in the distribution of properties and funds.
- c. Notwithstanding the foregoing, in the event of withdrawal or termination of Principals such that not more than three (3) Principals remain party to this Agreement, then the Agreement shall terminate one (1) year from the first date that only three (3) Principals remain.

SECTION 22. DISPUTE RESOLUTION

- a. Whenever any dispute arises between the Principals or between the Principals and NORCOM (referred to collectively in this section as the "parties") under this Agreement which is not resolved by routine meetings or communications, the parties agree to seek resolution of such dispute by the process described in this section, which shall also be binding on Subscribers.
- b. The parties shall seek in good faith to resolve any such dispute or concern by meeting, as soon as feasible. The meeting shall include the Chair of the Governing Board, the Executive Director, and the representative(s) of the Principal(s), if a Principal(s) is involved in the dispute, and/or a person designated by the Subscriber(s), if a Subscriber(s) is involved in the dispute.
- c. If the parties do not come to an agreement on the dispute or concern, any party may demand mediation through a process to be mutually agreed to in good faith

between the parties within 30 days, which may include binding or nonbinding decisions or recommendations. The mediator(s) shall be individuals skilled in the legal and business aspects of the subject matter of this Agreement. The parties shall share equally the costs of mediation and assume their own costs.

d. If the mediation process cannot be agreed upon with 30 days, or if all parties subject to the dispute agree within 30 days to proceed immediately to arbitration, then the dispute or concern shall be settled by binding arbitration in accordance with Rules of the American Arbitration Association and Mediation Service, or other agreed upon arbitration rules. The location of the arbitration shall be mutually agreed, and its proceedings will be governed by the laws of Washington. The arbitrator(s) shall be individual(s) skilled in the legal and business aspects of the subject matter of this Agreement. The cost of the arbitration shall be in the discretion of the arbitrator(s), provided, however, that no party shall be obliged to pay more than its own costs and the cost of the arbitrator, if there is one arbitrator, or the costs of its own appointed arbitrator and the third arbitrator, if there are three arbitrators. Judgment upon award rendered by the arbitrator(s) shall be entered in King County Superior Court.

SECTION 23. INTERGOVERNMENTAL COOPERATION. NORCOM shall cooperate with local, state and federal governmental agencies in order to maximize the utilization of grant funds for equipment and operations and to enhance the effectiveness of public safety dispatch and public safety records operations and to minimize costs of said public service delivery.

SECTION 24. INDEMNIFICATION AND HOLD HARMLESS.

a. Each Principal shall defend, indemnify and hold other Principals, their officers, officials, employees, agents and volunteers harmless from any and all claims, injuries, damages, losses or suits including attorney fees, arising out of that Principal's acts or omissions in connection with the performance of its obligations under this Agreement, except to the extent the injuries or damages are caused by another Principal,

b. Each Principal shall defend, indemnify and hold NORCOM and its officers, officials, employees and volunteers harmless from any and all claims, injuries, damages, losses or suits including attorney fees, arising out of that Principal's acts or omissions in connection with the performance of its obligations under this Agreement, except to the extent the injuries and damages are caused by NORCOM.

c. Should a court of competent jurisdiction determine that this Agreement is subject to RCW 4.24.115, then, in the event of liability for damages arising out of bodily injury to persons or damages to property caused by or resulting from the concurrent negligence of a party hereto and NORCOM, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers, the party's liability hereunder shall be only to the extent of the party's negligence. It is further specifically and expressly understood that the indemnification provided herein constitutes the party's waiver of immunity under Industrial Insurance Title 51 RCW, solely for the purpose of this indemnification. This waiver has been mutually negotiated by the parties. The provisions of this section shall survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement.

d. Each party shall give the other parties proper notice of any claim or suit coming within the purview of these indemnities. The indemnitor will assume the defense

of any claim, demand or action against such indemnitees and will, upon the request of the indemnitees, allow the indemnitees to participate in the defense thereof, such participation to be at the expense of the indemnitees. The indemnitees will in any case cooperate fully with the indemnitor in the defense and will, at their expense, provide all relevant documents, witnesses and other assistance within their possession or control upon the reasonable request of the indemnitor. Settlement by the indemnitees without the indemnitor's prior written consent shall release the indemnitor from the indemnity as to the claim, demand or action so settled. Termination of this Agreement, a Principal's withdrawal from NORCOM, or a Principal's conversion to Subscriber status, shall not affect the continuing obligations of each of the parties as indemnitors hereunder with respect to those indemnities and which shall have occurred prior to such termination.

SECTION 25. INSURANCE. NORCOM shall obtain and provide insurance, to the extent practicable, against loss or liability for the actions of NORCOM's Governing Board, Joint Operating Board, Police Service Board, Fire/EMS Service Board, Executive Director and staff. To the extent practicable, all Participating Agencies shall be named as additional insureds on any policy, including pool insurance.

SECTION 26. NOTICE. Notices required to be given to NORCOM under the terms of this Agreement shall be directed to the following unless all parties are otherwise notified in writing:

Chair, NORCOM Governing Board c/o his/her Principal agency's address

Notices to Principals or Subscribers, Members or Representatives required hereunder may be given by mail, overnight delivery, facsimile, telegram, email (with confirmation of transmission) or personal delivery. Any Principal wishing to change its mail or email address shall promptly notify the Chair of the Governing Board. Notice or other written communication shall be deemed to be delivered at the time when the same is postmarked in the mail or overnight delivery services, sent by facsimile with confirmation of transmission, sent by telegram, or received by personal delivery.

SECTION 27. VENUE. The venue for any action related to this Agreement shall be in the Superior Court in and for King County, Washington at Seattle.

SECTION 28. FILING: As provided by RCW 39.34.040, this Agreement shall be filed prior to its entry in force with the clerks of each Principal, the King County Department of Records and Elections, the Secretary of State, and such other governmental agencies as may be provided by law.

SECTION 29. NO THIRD PARTY BENEFICIARIES. There are no third-party beneficiaries to this agreement. No person or entity other than a party to this agreement shall have any rights hereunder or any authority to enforce its provisions, and any such rights or enforcement must be consistent with and subject to the terms of this agreement.

Upon issuance by a Principal(s) or other entities of any obligations pursuant to an approved Borrowing Program per Section 13 of the Agreement, or approving the acquisition of assets per Section 14 of the Agreement, the Governing Board shall publish the *estimated charges* to be paid either (a) over time, or (b) up front, by each Participant as a component of User Fees. Estimated charges will be allocated to each Participant Charged Operation based on the relative Calls for Service of that Operation in the current Fee Period as compared to the total Calls for Service for all similarly Charged Operations. The Governing Board may determine to allocate a greater percentage of total costs to either police or fire/EMS Charged Operations group based on the benefit received to those agencies from the investment/asset. The Governing Board will also publish any terms related to paying estimated charges up front or over time (e.g., discounts or interest rates applicable).

The actual amount of "D" in any Fee Period will be determined by adding the total Borrowing Obligation Repayment Program amounts due in the Fee Period together with any amounts due in the Fee Period for repayment of Acquired Assets Charges, and allocating these costs between Charged Operations (police and fire/EMS) as approved by the Governing Board. Each Participant's share of "D" shall be based upon the relative Calls for Service for the Fee Period of a Participant's Charged Operation as compared to the total Calls for Service of other similar Charged Operations.

A Participant may elect to pay down all or a portion of its total estimated "D" obligation rather than pay over time. A Participant electing to pay down its estimated "D" obligation, however, may owe additional amounts in the future (or be entitled to credit against User Fees otherwise payable) associated with a Borrowing Obligation Repayment Program or Acquired Asset Charges depending on changes over time in: (1) the number of NORCOM Participants participating in repayment of the Borrowing Program or Acquired Asset Charges; (2) offsetting contributions toward "D" paid by Subscribers; and (3) changes in the relative number of Calls for Service of Participants. The Governing Board shall determine when to impose or credit such under or overpayments to Participants who have paid down their obligation.

Net Adopted Budget means the budget approved by the Governing Board after action by individual Principals and Subscribers, and applicable in the time period for which the User Fee is calculated, less (1) Outside Revenues, (2) the Borrowing Program Obligation Repayment, and (3) Acquired Assets Charges repayable in the Adopted Budget Term.

Adopted Budget Term means the period of time for which the Net Adopted Budget is applicable, typically one or two calendar years depending on whether NORCOM has an annual or biennial budget.

Fee Period means the period of time for which a User Fee is calculated, typically for a complete Adopted Budget Term. However, different User Fee formulas apply during the Transition Period, and Full Operations Period. Therefore, the Fee Period will be the time in which a specific User Fee formula is applicable within an Adopted Budget Term. For example, if NORCOM has an annual calendar year budget, and goes from the Transitional Period to the Full Operations Period on May 1 of that year, the Fee Period for the Transitional Period is 4 months, and the Fee Period for the Full Operations Period is 8 months (the balance of the budget period).

Call for Service means any request for service or unit initiated activity resulting in creation of a Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) incident report and interaction with dispatch agency personnel. *Provided*, that if a Participant annexes territory (or otherwise assumes fire/EMS or police service responsibilities for a larger geographic area) resulting in at least a 10% increase in its service population for a Charged Operation, then for each complete calendar quarter from and after the effective date of the annexation C(i) (and, correspondingly as appropriate C(f) and C(p)) shall be increased to include the Calls for Service in the annexed area as reported by the former service provider to the area during the most recent year for which such data is available.

 Charged Operation refers to an individual Principal's or Subscriber's fire or police agency/operation being charged under a **User Fee** formula. Charged Fire/EMS Operations or Charged Police Operations refers to the combined total of all fire/EMS or police agencies, respectively, that have elected to receive service from NORCOM.

Borrowing Program Obligation Repayment is the amount, if any, of principal and interest due and owing by NORCOM for the timely repayment during the period of borrowing obligations entered into by any and all Principals or other entities for or on behalf of NORCOM pursuant to Section 13 of the Agreement. A Participant may elect to pay down some or all of its current and future year Borrowing Program Obligation Repayment charges rather than pay over time.

Acquired Assets Charges means the amount, if any, owing by NORCOM for the repayment of NORCOM's acquisition of any assets per Section 14 of the Agreement. A Participant may elect to pay down some or all of its current and future year **Acquired Assets Charges** rather than pay over time.

Outside Revenues means revenues received by NORCOM from sources other than User Fees that may be available from time to time to offset the operating and capital costs of NORCOM in an Adopted Budget Term. Outside Revenues include by way of example and without limitation monies allocated to NORCOM from a countywide "medic one" levy and grants.

- The Governing Board will determine at the end of each budget term how to apply any under- or over-expenditure of budgeted revenues received.

Appendix A-2 User Fee Formula: From and After Point of Initiating Service Delivery to All Principals and Subscribers (Full Operations Period) User Fees for each Principal and Subscriber are based on different formulas during the Full Operations Period; additionally, there is a distinction between User Fees paid by those initial Principals and Subscribers (see definition of "S" below) and other Principals and Subscribers. Subscribers User Fees are calculated at 106% of the User Fee that an agency (Police or Fire/EMS) would pay if it were a Principal. The User Fee formula during each year of the Full Operations Period (or portion of a year, in the event the Full Operations Period starts during a calendar year) shall be as set forth below (See Example 4): For Fire/EMS agencies that are **Principals**: $U = [(C(i) \div C(f)) \times (50\% \times B)] + S + E + D$ For Fire/EMS agencies that are **Subscribers**: $U = \{[(C(i) \div C(f)) \times (50\% \times B)] \times 106\%\} + S + E + D$ For Police agencies that are **Principals**: $U = [(C(i) \div C(p)) \times (50\% \times B)] + S + E + D$ For Police agencies that are Subscribers: $U = \{ [(C(i) \div C(p)) \times (50\% \times B)] \times 106\% \} + S + E + D$ Where: U is the User Fee payable by an individual Principal's or Subscriber's (as applicable) Police or Fire/EMS agency for Emergency Communications Services provided during the Fee Period. C(i) is the annual average number of Calls for Service of the individual Principal's or Subscriber's Charged Operation (Fire/EMS or Police), determined based on the number of Calls for Service by the Principal's Charged Operation (Fire/EMS or Police) over the two-year historical Call Calculation Period. See Example 3.

C(f) is the annual average of the total number of Calls for Service of all Charged Fire/EMS Operations for all Principals and Subscribers over the two-year Call Calculation Period.

C(p) is the annual average of the total number of Calls for Service of all Charged Police Operations for all Principals and Subscribers over the two-year Call Calculation Period.

B is the Net Adopted Budget for the Fee Period. In cases where the Fee Period is less than the Adopted Budget Term, unless otherwise specified by the Governing Board in its adopted budget legislation, budgeted costs and revenues for the entire term of the Net Adopted Budget shall be pro-rated equally per day in order to determine the size of the Adopted Budget for the Fee Period.

S is the "Smoothing Rebate" as calculated in Exhibit 2 and is a fixed sum allocated between Initial Participants based on their relative Calls for Service over the first seven years of the Full Operations Period (the "Smoothing Term"). Initial Participants include: (1) all Principals who are initial signatories of the Agreement; and (2) any Subscriber entering into a service contract with NORCOM within 4 (four) months of the effective date of the Agreement. A Principal or Subscriber who is not an Initial Principal or Subscriber shall have a Smoothing Rebate of \$0. An Initial Principal or Subscriber whose status is converted (i.e., a Principal that becomes a Subscriber or vice versa) during the Smoothing Term shall retain its right/obligation to receive/pay the remaining Smoothing Rebate amounts as originally scheduled. An Initial Principal or a Subscriber which receives a reduction in its User Fees from the Smoothing Rebate calculation (i.e., any Initial Participant other than the City of Bellevue) and which withdraws from the Agreement (or has its receipt of NORCOM services terminated by action of the Governing Board) during the Smoothing Term is responsible for the repayment to NORCOM of the sum of all Smoothing Rebate amounts credited to that Participant under the User Fee formula through the date of termination or withdrawal, such repayment to be made in full within sixty days of the date of termination or withdrawal. See Examples 2 and 4.

E is the charge applicable to a Principal or Subscriber which has requested (and for which the Governing Board has agreed to provide) dedicated staffing and / or equipment exceeding the standard operating policy allocation. "E" shall be calculated to include the costs (including all direct costs and an appropriate percentage of reasonably attributable indirect costs incurred by NORCOM) of such extra staffing and/or equipment, together with a surcharge of 20% on such costs. "E" shall be calculated to ensure that all other Participants are held harmless from any impact on their **User Fees** as a result of such additional staffing and/or equipment. The Governing Board shall determine the application of revenues from the 20% surcharge.

"D" is the amount, if any, owed by each individual Participant in the Fee Period for payment of its allocated share of all approved Borrowing Program Obligation Repayments and Acquired Assets Charges.

1 2

Upon issuance by a Principal(s) or other entities of any obligations pursuant to an approved Borrowing Program per Section 13 of the Agreement, or approving the acquisition of assets per Section 14 of the Agreement, the Governing Board shall publish the *estimated charges* to be paid either (a) over time, or (b) up front, by each Participant as a component of User Fees. Estimated charges will be allocated to each Participant Charged Operation based on the relative Calls for Service of that Operation in the current Fee Period as compared to the total Calls for Service for all similarly Charged Operations. The Governing Board may determine to allocate a greater percentage of total costs to either police or fire/EMS Charged Operations group based on the benefit received to those agencies from the investment/asset. The Governing Board will also publish any terms related to paying estimated charges up front or over time (e.g., discounts or interest rates applicable).

The actual amount of "D" in any Fee Period will be determined by adding the total Borrowing Obligation Repayment Program amounts due in the Fee Period together with any amounts due in the Fee Period for repayment of Acquired Assets Charges, and allocating these costs between Charged Operations (police and fire/EMS) as approved by the Governing Board. Each Participant's share of "D" shall be based upon the relative Calls for Service for the Fee Period of a Participant's Charged Operation as compared to the total Calls for Service of other similar Charged Operations.

A Participant may elect to pay down all or a portion of its total estimated "D" obligation rather than pay over time. A Participant electing to pay down its estimated "D" obligation, however, may owe additional amounts in the future (or be entitled to credit against User Fees otherwise payable) associated with a **Borrowing Obligation Repayment Program** or **Acquired Asset Charges** depending on changes over time in: (1) the number of NORCOM Participants participating in repayment of the Borrowing Program or Acquired Asset Charges; (2) offsetting contributions toward "D" paid by Subscribers; and (3) changes in the relative number of **Calls for Service** of Participants. The Governing Board shall determine when to impose or credit such under or overpayments to Participants who have paid down their obligation.

Net Adopted Budget means the budget approved by the Governing Board after action by all individual Principals and Subscribers, and applicable in the time period for which the User Fee is calculated, less (1) Outside Revenues, (2) the Borrowing Repayment Obligation, and (3) Acquired Assets Charges repayable in the Adopted Budget Term.

Adopted Budget Term means the period of time for which the Net Adopted Budget is applicable, typically one or two calendar years depending on whether NORCOM has an annual or biennial budget.

Fee Period means the period of time for which a User Fee is calculated, typically for a complete Adopted Budget Term of one or two years. However, different User Fee formulas apply during the Transition Period and Full Operations Period. Therefore, the Fee Period will be the time in which a specific User Fee formula is applicable within an Adopted Budget Term. For example, if NORCOM has an annual calendar year budget and goes from the Transitional Period to the Full Operations Period on May 1 of that year, the Fee Period for the Transitional Period is 4 months, and the Fee Period for the Full Operations Period is 8 months (the balance of the budget period).

Charged Operation refers to an individual Principal's or Subscriber's fire/EMS agency/operation, being charged under a User Fee formula. Charged Fire/EMS Operations or Charged Police Operations refers to the combined total of all fire/EMS or all police agencies, respectively, that have elected to receive service from NORCOM.

The Call Calculation Period is defined as the first calendar quarter of the preceding budget year, and the 7 calendar quarters preceding that. (For example, in 2007, the calls for service would be based on calls from the first quarter of 2006, plus the preceding 7 calendar quarters—all of 2005, and the last three quarters of 2004).

Calls for Service shall be defined as per Exhibit 1, provided that until NORCOM has been in operation for more than three years, the calculation of the number of Calls for Service shall be determined in whole or in part (to the extent necessary to determine the two-year average number of calls for service) based on the number of Calls for Service by each Charged Operation as reported by the records of the dispatch agency previously serving each Charged Operation consistent with the definition of Calls for Service in Appendix A-1. Provided further, that if a Participant annexes territory (or otherwise assumes fire/EMS or police service responsibilities for a larger geographic area) resulting in at least a 10% increase in its service population for a Charged Operation, then for each complete calendar quarter from and after the effective date of the annexation C(i) (and, correspondingly as appropriate C(f) and C(p)) shall be increased to include the Calls for Service in the annexed area as reported by the former service provider to the area during the Call Calculation Period. Calls for Service experienced by the Participant in the annexed area shall be incorporated in the User Fee calculation as that information becomes available; that is, C(i) (and C(f) and C(p) as appropriate) for the annexed area will at first be based entirely on the former service provider's experience, but as the Participant provides service within the Call Calculation Period, the Participant's Calls for Service in

the annexed area will be used (in part and eventually in whole) for calculating C(i) (and correspondingly as appropriate C(f) and C(p)).

Borrowing Program Obligation Repayment is the amount, if any, of principal and interest due and owing by NORCOM for the repayment of borrowing obligations entered into by any and all Principals for or on behalf of NORCOM pursuant to Section 13 of the Agreement. A Participant may elect to pay down some or all of its allocation of current and future year Borrowing Program Obligation Repayments charges rather than pay over time

Acquired Assets Charges means the amount, if any, owing by NORCOM for the repayment of NORCOM's acquisition of any assets per Section 14 of the Agreement. A Participant may elect to pay down some or all of its current and future year **Acquired Assets Charges** rather than pay over time.

Outside Revenues means revenues received by NORCOM from sources other than User Fees that may be available from time to time to offset the operating and capital costs of NORCOM. **Outside Revenues** include by way of example and without limitation monies allocated to NORCOM from a countywide "medic one" levy and grants.

The Governing Board will determine at the end of each budget term how to apply any under- or over-expenditure of budgeted revenues received.

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Definition of "Calls for Service"

Exhibit 1

The purpose of this Exhibit 1 is to define Calls for Service for purposes of billing/funding calculations and to provide statistical data to user agencies. Per Appendix A-2, NORCOM will bill each Principal and Subscriber based on the User Fee formula, which incorporates consideration of Calls for Service as defined in this Exhibit 1.

NORCOM defines a Call for Service for workload analysis and user fee calculation as any request for service or unit initiated activity resulting in creation of a Computer Aided Dispatch System (CAD) incident and interaction with NORCOM personnel, with the exception of the following:

a. Any mutual aid incident where another NORCOM Participant within the same classification (police/fire/medic) is dispatched as the primary responding agency. For example, a police department that responds into another police department's jurisdiction to provide assistance does not constitute a Call for Service. However, an incident involving police, fire and medic units would result in a Call for Service for all three classifications. In addition, any mutual aid request dispatched to a location outside the NORCOM service area constitutes a Call for Service unless the agency has a contractual agreement with the communications center making the request.

b. Any incident that is a duplicate of another Call for Service.

c. Any incident that is cancelled by NORCOM personnel due to an error or similar internal reasons. This does not include incidents that are cancelled when the requesting party calls back to cancel the response after the incident has been entered into CAD.

d. Routine traffic stops initiated by officers using a mobile data device will not result in any portion of a Call for Service, unless the circumstances change requiring dispatcher involvement (ie. warrant arrest, criminal activity, pursuit, etc.), which would then be categorized as officer initiated police activity and counted as a full Call for Service.

e. Any informational broadcast such as an Attempt To Locate (ATL) or Be On The Look Out (BOLO).

f. Any informational incident created solely for the purpose of assisting the dispatcher in tracking unit activity.

If there are significant anomalies in the manner calls have been measured by different dispatch agencies, those anomalies shall be adjusted in a manner determined reasonable by the Governing Board in order to develop a fair means for determining the number of calls across all agencies

Bellevue will provide a Smoothing Rebate equal to a total fixed amount of \$5,500,000 over the first seven full years of operations of NORCOM. This rebate will be a reduction to the User Fees of Initial Participants other than Bellevue. Correspondingly, Bellevue's total user fees will be increased in each of these seven years by the total annual Smoothing Rebate amount.

For each of the first seven years of the Full Operations Period, the fixed total Smoothing amount is set forth in Table 1. The Year 1 Smoothing Rebate (S (Y1)) is fixed at \$1,150,000. The Smoothing Rebate in Years 2 through 7 is reduced by the percentages shown in Table 1 below in order to allocate the \$5.5 million on a roughly equal declining basis over seven years.

In **Table 1**, Y1 through Y7 correspond generally to the initial, and then six succeeding 12-month periods of the Full Operations Period. Smoothing Rebate amounts applied in any Fee Period shall be adjusted to account for any partial year Fee Periods (for example, if the Full Operation Period begins in the middle of an Adopted Budget Term) to ensure that each annual Smoothing Rebate amount is allocated over 12 months (thus, a Fee Period may include a portion of the rebate from each of two successive years). See Example 2.

In 2022, the state legislature enacted legislation requiring that cities that provide organic material collection services under

Chapter 70A.205 RCW or that have residential populations greater than 25,000 adopt a compost procurement ordinance

(RCW 43.19A.150).

Any city required to adopt such an ordinance must also develop strategies to inform residents about the

value of compost

and how the city uses compost for its own project. Such cities must also submit annual reports to the Department of

Ecology by March 31 of each year on the previous year's compost procurement activities.

These compost procurement requirements are intended to strengthen the market for the increasing amount of compost

generated statewide by requiring local governments to plan for the use of compost in landscaping projects, construction

and postconstruction soil amendments, and other projects

Analysis*

The proposed ordinance would adopt compost use and procurement policies for the City that are consistent with the requirements set forth in state law.

Exhibit A

8.50.010 Purpose.

This chapter is adopted for the following purposes:

- A. To substantially increase the procurement of recycled content products by the City of Snoqualmie by diverting methane-producing organic materials from landfills to productive uses of organic material wastes, including compost and finished product materials,
- B. To provide for local preference in procurement of compost to support the economic viability of compost diversion programs,
- C. To support the use of compost in landscaping and as a soil amendment for the benefits of moisture retention, weed suppression, natural nutrients, prevention of soil erosion, and stormwater filtration.

8.50.020 Definitions.

- A. "Compost Products" shall have the meaning defined in RCW 43.19A.010, as now or hereinafter amended.
- B. "Finished Compost Product" or "finished product" means a product created with "composted material" as defined in RCW 70A.205.015(3) as now or hereafter amended. Finished Compost Products include, but are not limited to, 100% finished compost or blends that include compost as a primary ingredient. Mulch is considered a Finished Compost Product if it contains a minimum of sixty percent composted material. Bark is not a Finished Compost Product.

8.50.030 City use of Compost.

- A. The City shall plan for the use of compost where practicable and feasible in its City maintained landscaping areas, construction project soil amendments; and postconstruction soil amendments.
- B. The City shall plan for the use of compost where practicable and feasible to prevent erosion and promote vegetation growth.
- C. The City shall plan for use of compost where practicable and feasible to improve the stability and longevity of City rights-of-way.
- D. Consistent with the currently adopted and future adoptions and amendments of the King County Surface Water Design Manual and National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Phase II Permit, the City shall plan for use of compost to filter stormwater runoff, and in low-impact development and green infrastructure to filter pollutants and keep water on-site.

8.50.40 Local Purchasing.

- A. City Departments shall consider purchasing finished compost products from companies that:
 - 1. Procure compost products locally within King County;
 - Are certified by nationally recognized organizations like the US Composting Council;
 - 3. Are permitted by the local health jurisdiction; and
 - 4. Produce compost products that are derived from municipal solid waste compost programs and meet quality standards comparable to standards adopted by the Department of Transportation or adopted by rule by the Department of Ecology.
- B. Notwithstanding subsection (A, B, and C) of this Section, the City of Snoqualmie shall not be required to procure, use, or require the use of compost, and may use an alternative material if:
 - 1. Compost products are not available to purchase;
 - 2. Compost products are not available within a reasonable time or distance to the location where the work is being performed;
 - 3. Available compost products do not comply with existing purchasing standards in Title 2 of the Snoqualmie Municipal Code,
 - 4. Available compost products do not comply with federal, state, or local health, quality, and safety standards; or
 - 5. Compost purchase prices are not reasonable or competitive.
- C. If compost meeting the criteria in 2.80.040(A) is not available, preference for compost procurement must be given to products sourced as close as possible to the City of Snoqualmie. Proof that locally produced compost was not available at the time of purchase or was cost-prohibitive must be documented.
- D. The local preference requirement in this chapter must be incorporated, whenever relevant, into any contracts entered into by the City of Snoqualmie.
- E. The local preference authorized in this chapter controls over any conflicting City purchasing policies.
- F. The Parks and Public Works Department, or its successor Department, is delegated with authority to provide any reporting to the State of Washington required by RCW 43.19A.150(5), as now or hereinafter amended.

ORDINANCE NO. 1307

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF SNOQUALMIE, WASHINGTON, AMENDING SNOQUALMIE MUNICIPAL CODE TITLE 8, RELATED TO COMPOST PROCUREMENT, PROVIDING SEVERABILITY, AND ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE

WHEREAS, the State of Washington found that landfills are a significant source of emissions of methane, and to reduce methane emissions associated with organic materials, there is a benefit to diverting organic materials from landfills to productive uses of organic material wastes; and

WHEREAS, as more organic materials are diverted and recycled, it is critical that compost be procured by local jurisdictions and other local entities to support the economic viability of these processes and programs; and

WHEREAS, it is well established that the use of compost in landscaping and soil amendment has many benefits such as moisture retention, weed suppression, natural forms of nutrients, stopping soil erosion, and

WHEREAS, as a result of these findings, the Washington State Legislature enacted Engrossed Second Substitute House Bill (ESSHB) 1799 in March of 2022; and

WHEREAS, the goal of ESSHB 1799 is to increase the diversion of organic materials going to landfills by "encouraging cities and counties to procure more of the compost and finished compost products created from their organic material" in order to reduce emissions; and

WHEREAS, ESSHB 1799 added a new section to Chapter 43.19A of the Revised Code of Washington (RCW), now codified as RCW 41.19A.150, which requires all cities, towns and counties with populations of 25,000 or more or smaller jurisdictions where organic materials collection services are provided at least 26 weeks of the year to adopt a compost procurement ordinance to implement provisions of RCW 43.19A.120; and

WHEREAS, House Bill 2301 modified the ESSHB 1799 reporting requirements; and WHEREAS, the City of Snoqualmie's organic materials collection services are provided at least 26 weeks of the year and is therefore required to implement such an ordinance.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Snoqualmie, Washington, as follows:

Section One. Addition of Chapter 8.50. A new Chapter 8.50 entitled "Compost Procurement" is hereby added to Title 8 "Health and Safety" of the City of Snoqualmie Municipal Code, as set forth in Exhibit A.

Section Two. Severability. If any provision of this Ordinance or its application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of the Ordinance or the application of the provision to other persons or circumstances is not affected.

Section Three. Authority to Make Corrections. The City Clerk and the codifiers of this Ordinance are authorized to make necessary corrections to this Ordinance including, but not limited to, the correction of scrivener's clerical errors, references, ordinance numbers, section/subsection numbers, and any references thereto.

Section Four. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect five days after publication.

Background/Overview*

What was done (legislative history, previous actions, ability to hyperlink)

The City of Snoqualmie and the Snoqualmie Police Department (SPD) have an Interlocal Agreement for Jail Services. Per the agreement, King County Jail has provided 2026 detention rates. The fee increases for 2026 are in line with Exhibit

III, section 5 of the Interlocal Agreement for Jail Services with King County. Attached are the new King County 2026 detention rates, along with a copy of the Interlocal Agreement, highlighting the 2026 fee increases are authorized per the agreement.

Analysis*

The King County 2026 detention fee rates, effective January 1, 2026, are consistent with the current Interlocal Agreement between King County and the City of Snoqualmie for jail services.

Budgetary Status*

Funds have already been authorized in this year's budget.

Budget Summary

The City uses King County as a "last resort" booking facility, as it requires higher fees than other jail service providers in the region. The increase to King County jail services, which averages 5% across all fees and charges, was enacted in accordance with the 2025 ILA and was budgeted for within the 2025-26 Biennial Budget. However, as the City has made use of other jail service providers in the region, the amount spent for King County Jail Services has dwindled. Currently, nothing has been spent on this ILA in 2025, and \$4,740 was spent during 2024. As such, the fee increase is expected to have a very minimal effect on the budget.

Interlocal Agreement Between King County and The City of Snoqualmie for Jail Services

THIS AGREEMENT is effective as of January 1, 2025 ("Effective Date"). The Parties to this Agreement are King County, a Washington municipal corporation and legal subdivision of the State of Washington (the "County") and The City of Snoqualmie, a Washington municipal corporation (the "City").

WHEREAS, this Agreement is made in accordance with the Interlocal Cooperation Act (RCW Chapter 39.34) and the City and County Jails Act (RCW Chapter 70.48);

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the promises, payments, covenants and agreements contained in this Agreement, the parties agree as follows:

- 1. <u>Definitions</u>: Unless the context clearly shows another usage is intended, the following terms shall have these meanings in this Agreement:
 - 1.1 "Agreement" means this Interlocal Agreement by and between King County and the City for Jail Services and any amendments to this Agreement.
 - "Booking" means registering, screening and examining persons for confinement in the Jail or assignment to a King County Community Corrections Division (CCD) program; inventorying and safekeeping personal property of such persons; maintaining all computerized records of arrest; performing warrant checks; Jail Health Services (JHS) health screening; and all other activities associated with processing a person for confinement in Jail or assignment to a CCD program.
 - 1.3 "Booking Fee" means the fee incurred for booking City Jail Residents, as further described in Section 4 and Exhibit III, Section 2.
 - 1.4 "Business Day" means Monday through Friday, 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m., except holidays and County-designated furlough days.
 - 1.5 "City Detainee" means a person booked into or housed in a Secure Detention facility such as the Jail but also including any other Secure Detention facility not operated by or on behalf of the County, which individual would, if housed in the Jail, qualify as a City Jail Resident.
 - 1.6 "City Jail Resident" means a person booked into or housed in the Jail when a City charge is the principal basis for booking or confining that person.
 - A. A City charge is the principal basis for booking or confining a person where one or more of the following applies, whether pre-trial or post-trial. (See Exhibit I for further billable charge rules.):

- 1.6.1 The person is booked or confined by reason of committing or allegedly committing a misdemeanor or gross misdemeanor offense within the City's jurisdiction, and:
 - 1.6.1.1 The case is referred to the City, through its City Attorney or contracted attorney, for a filing decision; or
 - 1.6.1.2 The case is referred to the City, through its City Attorney or contracted attorney, who then refers the case to the County Prosecutor for a filing decision per section 1.6.2; or
 - 1.6.1.3 The case is filed by the City, through its City Attorney or contracted attorney, whether filed under state law or city ordinance.
- 1.6.2 The person is booked or confined by reason of committing or allegedly committing a misdemeanor or gross misdemeanor offense, whether filed under state law or city ordinance, within the City's jurisdiction and the case is referred by the City, through its City attorney or contracted attorney, to the County prosecutor and filed by the County prosecutor as a misdemeanor in district court due to a conflict or other reason but excluding a case filed in a regionally-funded mental health court as described in Section 1.6.10.
- 1.6.3 The person is booked or confined by reason of a Court warrant issued either by the City's Municipal Court or other court when acting as the City's Municipal Court;
- 1.6.4 The person is booked or confined by reason of a Court order issued either by the City's Municipal Court or other court when acting as the City's Municipal Court; or,
- 1.6.5 The person is booked or confined by reason of subsections 1.6.1 through 1.6.4 above in combination with charges, investigation of charges, and/or warrants of other governments, and the booking or confinement by reason of subsections 1.6.1 through 1.6.4 above is determined to be the most serious charge in accordance with Exhibit I.
- 1.6.6 The person has been booked or confined for reasons other than subsections 1.6.1 through 1.6.5 and would be released or transferred but for the City having requested that the County continue to confine the person.
- B. A City charge is not the principal basis for confining a person where:
- 1.6.7 The person is booked or confined exclusively or in combination with other charges by reason of a felony charge or felony investigation.
- 1.6.8 The person is confined exclusively or in combination with other charges by reason of a felony charge or felony investigation that has been reduced to a State misdemeanor or gross misdemeanor.
- 1.6.9 The City has requested the transfer of the person to another jail facility not operated by King County and the County denies the request, unless one or more of the transfer exception criteria listed in Attachment I-2 are met, in which case the person remains a City Jail Resident. The billing status of the person will change to no longer be the City's responsibility effective the calendar day following the day that the County denies the transfer request. If the County thereafter determines that it no longer needs to detain the person and the person would as a result become a City Jail Resident, then the County will provide notice to the City that it will become billable for the Jail Resident. For details on notice and billing, see Attachment I-2.

- 1.6.10 The person is booked or confined by reason of committing a misdemeanor or gross misdemeanor offense, whether filed under state law or city ordinance, within the City's jurisdiction and the case is referred by the City attorney or contracted attorney to the County prosecutor and filed by the County prosecutor as a misdemeanor in the mental health court (or successor) for so long as the operations of such court are substantially funded by special regional funds (for example, Mental Illness and Drug Dependency sales tax levy) or other regional funding as the County may determine. The County shall provide the City thirty (30) days Notification before changing the status of a regionally-funded mental health court to local funding status. The City is not billed for cases filed by the County prosecutor into mental health court prior to changing to local funding status.
- 1.7 "Community Corrections Programs" means programs designed as alternatives to, or as rehabilitation or treatment in lieu of, Secure Detention, operated by or on behalf of the King County Department of Adult and Juvenile Detention (DAJD) Community Corrections Division, or its successor. Upon the date of the execution of this Agreement, Community Corrections Programs include Electronic Home Detention and Community Center for Alternative Programs (CCAP).
- 1.8 "Continuity of Care Records" means a Jail Resident's diagnosis, list of current medications, treatments, PPD (tuberculosis screening test) results and scheduled appointments or follow-ups.
- 1.9 "Contract Cities" mean cities that are signatory to an agreement in substantially similar form to this Agreement. Contract Cities do not include cities who are a party to the 2012-2030 Agreement.
- 1.10 "Contract Cities Jail Residents" means all Contract Cities' City Jail Residents.
- 1.11 "County Jail Resident" means any Jail Resident that is not a City Jail Resident.
- 1.12 "DAJD" means the King County Department of Adult and Juvenile Detention or its successor agency.
- 1.13 "Fees and Charges" are the Fees and Charges imposed as described in Section 4 and Exhibit III.
- 1.14 "Force Majeure" means war, civil unrest, and any natural event outside of the party's reasonable control, including pandemic, fire, storm, flood, earthquake, or other act of nature.
- 1.15 "Jail Resident" means a person booked into or housed in the Jail.
- 1.16 The first "Jail Resident Day" means confinement for more than six (6) hours measured from the time such Jail Resident is first presented to and accepted by the Jail for housing in the Jail until the person is released, provided that an arrival on or after six (6) o'clock p.m. and continuing into the succeeding day shall be considered one day. The second and each subsequent Jail Resident Day means confinement for any portion of a calendar day after the first Jail Resident Day. For persons confined to the Jail for the purpose of mandatory Driving Under the Influence (DUI) sentences, "Jail Resident Day" means confinement in accordance with Exhibit II.

- "Jail" means a place owned or operated by or under contract to the County primarily designed, staffed, and used for the housing, in full confinement, of adults charged or convicted of a criminal offense; for the punishment, correction, and rehabilitation of offenders charged or convicted of a criminal offense; for confinement during a criminal investigation or for civil detention to enforce a court order, all where such place is structured and operated to ensure such individuals remain on the premises 24-hours a day (excluding time for court appearances, court approved off-premises trips, or medical treatment). Jail Residents housed in the Jail are considered to be in Secure Detention as defined in Section 1.26. Upon the date of the execution of the Agreement, Jail includes the King County Correctional Facility and the detention facility at the Maleng Regional Justice Center.
- 1.18 "Maintenance Charge" is the daily housing charge incurred for City Jail Residents housed in Jail as further described in Section 4 and Exhibit III, Section 1.
- 1.19 "Medical Jail Resident" means a Jail Resident clinically determined by the Seattle-King County Department of Public Health, or its successor charged with the same duties, as needing the level of services provided in the Jail's infirmary. If a Jail Resident is moved to the general population, then the Jail Resident is no longer considered a Medical Jail Resident.
- 1.20 "Notification" means provision of written alert, confirmation of information or request meeting the requirements of Section 11.11. In contrast, a "notice" means providing alert or confirmation of information or request in writing to the individuals identified in Section 11.11, or their designee (as may be specified through a formal Notification) through means less formal than required by Section 11.11, including but not limited to electronic mail or facsimile.
- 1.21 "Official Daily Population Count" is an official count of Jail Residents in the custody of the Jail made at a point in time in a 24-hour period for, among other purposes, security and population management. It is not used for billing purposes.
- 1.22 "Offsite Medical Care Charges" means those pass-through charges for treatment of a City Jail Resident where that Jail Resident is clinically determined by the Seattle-King County Department of Public Health, or its successor charged with the same duties, as needing services provided from offsite medical institutions, as further defined in Exhibit III Section 4. A Jail Resident may receive Offsite Medical Care that triggers an Offsite Medical Care Charge without being otherwise classified as a Medical Jail Resident or Psychiatric Jail Resident (e.g., some Jail Residents held in the general population receive offsite medical care that will result in Offsite Medical Care Charges being incurred).
- 1.23 "Psychiatric Jail Resident" means either an Acute Psychiatric Jail Resident or a Non-Acute Psychiatric Jail Resident, as defined below.
 - 1.23.1 A "Non-Acute Psychiatric Jail Resident" is a Jail Resident clinically determined by the Seattle-King County Department of Public Health, or its successor charged with the same duties, as needing Psychiatric Care Services (as further described in Exhibit III and Attachment III-1) and housed outside the Jail's acute psychiatric housing units.

- 1.23.2 An "Acute Psychiatric Jail Resident" is a Jail Resident clinically determined by the Seattle-King County Department of Public Health, or its successor charged with the same duties, as needing the level of services provided in the Jail's acute psychiatric housing units (as further described in Exhibit III and Attachment III-1). If a Jail Resident is moved to housing outside the Jail's acute psychiatric housing units, then the Jail Resident is no longer considered an Acute Psychiatric Jail Resident.
- 1.24 "Parties" mean the City and County, as parties to this Agreement.
- 1.25 "Secure Bed Cap for Contract Cities" means the maximum total number of beds in Secure Detention in the Jail available on a daily basis to house Contract Cities Jail Residents in the aggregate. The Secure Bed Cap for Contract Cities is based on the Official Daily Population Count and is established in Section 6.
- 1.26 "Secure Detention" refers to a facility structured and operated for the full confinement of City Detainees to ensure such individuals remain on the premises 24-hours a day (excluding time for court appearances, court approved off-premises trips, or medical treatment), such as the Jail but also including other similar facilities that the City may elect to house City Detainees. Secure Detention excludes City Jail Residents enrolled in Community Corrections Programs.
- 1.27 "Surcharge" means any of the following special charges, defined in Exhibit III, Section 3 and further described in Attachment III-1: Infirmary Care Surcharge; Psychiatric Care Surcharge; Acute Psychiatric Care Surcharge; and 1:1 Guarding Surcharge.
- 1.28 "2012-2030 Agreement" means the agreement executed by the County and the City of Seattle effective on January 1, 2012 together with any other interlocal agreement in substantially the same form of said agreement executed by the County and another city.
- 1.29 "Base Year" refers to the year in which the base fees, charges and surcharges are set.
- 2. <u>Term.</u> This Agreement shall commence on the Effective Date and shall extend through December 31, 2029. This Agreement shall supersede all previous contracts and agreements among the Parties relating to the Jail and any other jail services, except that any obligations contained in these previous contracts or agreements which expressly survived termination or expiration of these previous contracts or agreements shall remain in effect.
- 3. Jail and Health Services. The County shall accept City Jail Residents for confinement in the Jail, except as provided in Sections 5.4, and 6 of this Agreement. Additionally, the County is not obligated to accept a City Jail Resident for confinement in the Jail if the County has booking restrictions in place on the charge for which the City Jail Resident is proposed to be held. The County shall also furnish the City with Jail facilities; booking; transportation among facilities, as determined necessary in the County's sole discretion, including the various Jail facilities, Harborview Medical Center and Western State Hospital; custodial services; and personnel for the confinement of City Jail Residents at least equal to those the County provides for confinement of County Jail Residents. However, the County reserves the right to operate specific programs and/or facilities exclusively for County Jail Residents or persons sentenced or assigned to Community Corrections Programs. The County shall furnish to City Jail Residents in Secure Detention all medical, dental, and other health care services required to be provided pursuant to federal or state law. Also, the County shall make every reasonable effort to release a City Jail Resident as expeditiously as possible after the County has received notice of a court order to

release. Nothing in this section shall be deemed to limit the County's right to refuse to accept City Detainees for confinement in Jail when they are deemed by the County to be in need of urgent medical or psychological care, nor to return custody of such Jail Residents back to the City if the City Detainee is admitted to the hospital or psychiatric facility.

- 4. <u>City Compensation</u>. The City will pay the County a Booking Fee, Maintenance Charge, Surcharges, and Offsite Medical Charges as follows (together with such other charges as may be applicable in accordance with this Agreement):
 - 4.1 <u>Booking Fee.</u> The Booking Fee shall be assessed for the booking of City Jail Residents by or on behalf of the City into the Jail as further described in Exhibit III, Section 2. The Booking Fee will be inflated annually effective January 1, 2026 and each January 1 thereafter through the term of the agreement.
 - 4.2 <u>Maintenance Charge</u>. The Maintenance Charge shall be assessed for a City Jail Resident for each Jail Resident Day as provided in Exhibit III, Subsection 1. The Maintenance Charge will be inflated effective January 1, 2026 and each January 1 thereafter through the term of the agreement.
 - 4.2.1 The County will provide notice to the City after booking a City Jail Resident in order to give notice that the City Jail Resident has been booked and to provide the opportunity for release to the City if the City so desires. Such action will take place as soon as reasonably possible but no later than the next business day after booking. A City Jail Resident released within six hours of booking will result in no Maintenance Charges.
 - 4.2.2 The County will provide notice to the City of the billing status of its Jail Residents for the prior calendar day in cases where confinement is the result of multiple warrants or sentences from two or more jurisdictions. As of the date of this Agreement, this notice is provided to the City once each business day when applicable. The intent of this program is to allow the City to take custody of a City Jail Resident if they so desire after the other jurisdictional warrants are resolved and thereby prevent unnecessary Maintenance Charges.
 - 4.2.3 The Parties may amend the notice requirements of Sections 4.2.1 and 4.2.2 by administrative agreement signed by both the Chief Executive Officer of the City and the King County Executive.
 - 4.3 Access to and Charges for City Jail Resident Use of Community Corrections Programs.

 The Parties agree to discuss in good faith the ability for the City to access Community

 Corrections Programs, and to negotiate charges for such access. Any agreement between
 the Parties with respect to access and charges for Community Corrections Programs shall
 be enacted through an amendment to this Agreement.
 - 4.4 <u>Surcharges and Offsite Medical Charges</u>. In addition to the Booking Fee, Maintenance Charge, and any other charges agreed to per Section 4.3, the City will be charged for Offsite Medical Charges and Surcharges as detailed in Exhibit III, Section 3 and 4.

<u>Proposed Notice of Certain Surcharges</u>. The County intends to provide or make available to the City timely notice of occurrences when a City Jail Resident is admitted to Harborview Medical Center or other offsite medical institution or is receiving infirmary care or psychiatric care that will subject a City to Surcharges. Notice provided or made available will be based on information known to DAJD at the time (since billing status of a Jail

Resident may be changed retroactively based on new information or other factors). The County intends to provide or make available this notice within two (2) business days following the day in which the chargeable event occurs and will make good faith efforts to provide notice sooner if practicable. The County will make good faith efforts to try to institute a means to provide notice to the City within twenty-four (24) hours of the admittance of a City Jail Resident to Harborview Medical Center or other offsite medical institution. The County's failure to provide or make available notice or develop quicker means to provide notice to the City as detailed above shall not excuse the City from financial responsibility for related Offsite Medical Charges or Surcharges and shall not be a basis for imposing financial responsibility for related Offsite Medical Charges or Surcharges on the County.

- 5. Billing and Billing Dispute Resolution Procedures.
 - The County shall transmit billings to the City monthly. Within forty-five (45) days after receipt, the City shall pay the full amount billed or withhold a portion thereof and provide the County written notice meeting the requirements of Section 5.2.1, specifying the total amount withheld and the grounds for withholding such amount, together with payment of the remainder of the amount billed (if any amount remains). Notwithstanding the foregoing, the County shall bill the City for Offsite Medical Charges as such charges are periodically received by the County from third party medical institutions or other offsite medical providers. Offsite Medical Charges shall be due within such time and subject to such withholding and dispute resolution procedures as otherwise provided in this Section 5.
 - 5.2 Withholding of any amount billed or alleging a violation related to billing provisions of this Agreement shall constitute a dispute, which shall be resolved as follows:
 - 5.2.1 The County shall respond in writing to billing disputes within sixty (60) days of receipt of such disputes by the DAJD billing offices. To ensure the soonest start to the sixty (60)-day timeline, the City should electronically mail scanned billing disputes directly to the DAJD billing office, or by fax, or U.S. mail rather than to any other County office or officer. The DAJD billing office contact information as of the date of this Amendment is:

- 5.2.2 In the event the parties are unable to resolve the dispute, either Party may pursue the dispute resolution mechanisms outlined in Section 9.
- 5.3 Any amount withheld from a billing, which is determined to be owed to the County pursuant to the dispute resolution procedure described herein, shall be paid by the City within thirty (30) days of the date of the resolution.
- 5.4 If the City fails to pay a billing within forty-five (45) days of receipt, the County will provide the City with a notice of its failure to pay and the City shall have ten (10) days from receipt of such notice to cure nonpayment. Any undisputed billing amount not paid by the City within sixty (60) days of receipt of the billing, and any amounts found to be owing to the County as a result of the billing dispute resolution procedure that are not paid

within thirty (30) days of resolution, shall be conclusively established as a lawful debt owed to the County by the City, shall be binding on the Parties, and shall not be subject to legal question either directly or collaterally. In the event the City fails to cure its nonpayment, the City shall be deemed to have voluntarily waived its right to house City Jail Residents in the Jail and, at the County's request, will remove City Jail Residents already housed in the Jail within thirty (30) days. Thereafter, the County, at its sole discretion, may accept no further City Jail Residents until all outstanding bills are paid. This provision shall not limit the City's ability to challenge or dispute any billings that have been paid by the City.

- 5.5 The County may charge an interest rate equal to the interest rate on the monthly County investment earnings on any undisputed billing amount not paid by the City within forty-five (45) days of receipt of the billing, and any amounts found to be owing to the County as a result of the billing dispute resolution procedure. Interest on amounts owed begin accruing on the forty-sixth (46) day after payment was due.
- Each Party may examine the other's financial records to verify charges. If an examination reveals an improper charge, the next billing statement will be adjusted appropriately. Disputes on matters related to this Agreement which are revealed by an audit shall be resolved pursuant to Section 5.2.

6. <u>Jail Capacity</u>.

- 6.1 The Contract Cities may house Contract Cities Jail Residents in the Jail at an aggregate number, calculated based on the Jail's Official Daily Population Count, equal to or less than the Secure Bed Cap for Contract Cities established in Sections 6.1.1.
 - 6.1.1 The Secure Bed Cap for Contract Cities in the aggregate is fifty (50) beds. These fifty (50) beds shall be available on a first-come, first-served basis measured at the time of the Jail's Official Daily Population Count.
- 6.2 In the event the number of Contract Cities Jail Residents exceeds the Secure Bed Cap for Contract Cities described in Section 6.1, the County will notify the Contract Cities by phone or electronic mail. The County may then decide to continue to house Contract Cities Jail Residents in excess of the Secure Bed Cap for Contract Cities. Alternatively, the County may refuse to accept bookings from the City until such time as the aggregate number of Contract Cities Jail Residents is reduced below the Secure Bed Cap for Contract Cities. If the aggregate number of Contract Cities Jail Residents is reduced below the Secure Bed Cap for Contract Cities through removal of Contract Cities Jail Residents from the Jail, then the County will be obligated to accept new City bookings. The notice required by the first sentence of this Section 6.2, will be made to the person designated in Section 11.11 of this Agreement, and will inform the City whether the County intends to continue to house Contract Cities Jail Residents in excess of the Secure Bed Cap for Contract Cities described in Section 6.1, or whether the County will refuse to accept bookings from the City until such time as the aggregate number of Contract Cities Jail Residents is reduced below the Secure Bed Cap for Contract Cities described in Section 6.1.
- At the end of the last day of this Agreement, the Contract City agrees to reduce the number of Contract City Jail Residents in the Jail to zero (0), with the exception that Jail Residents whose status has changed to Contract City Jail Resident, will not be included in the

calculation of the number of Contract City Jail Residents, if such individuals are removed from the Jail within seventy-two (72) hours of such change in status.

For the purpose of determining the number of Contract Cities Jail Residents only, and not for billing purposes, Jail Residents held on multiple warrants or sentences by the County which include one or more city warrants or sentences in addition to a County and/or state warrant or sentence, and Contract Cities Jail Residents that have been booked into the Jail and the Contract City has not been notified of such booking shall not be considered a Contract Cities Jail Resident. Also, Contract Cities Jail Residents housed in the Jail will not be considered Contract Cities Jail Residents for the purpose of determining the number of City Jail Residents.

- 6.4 The Jail's capacity limit for Medical Jail Residents is thirty (30). The Jail's capacity limit for Psychiatric Jail Residents is one-hundred-fifty-one (151). For the purpose of this Section the Medical and Psychiatric Jail Resident population will be determined following the definitions in Sections 1.21 and 1.25 at the time of the Jail's Official Daily Population Count.
- 6.5 When the Jail has reached its capacity limit for either Medical or Psychiatric Jail Residents as set forth in Section 6.4, the County will provide notice to the City by phone or electronic mail. Such notification will be made to the person designated in Section 11.11 of this Agreement. At the time this notification is made the County may request that the City take custody of a sufficient number of its Medical or Psychiatric Jail Residents to reduce the number of Medical or Psychiatric Jail Residents to the capacity limits detailed in Section 6.4, or the County may inform the City that the County is willing to continue to house these Jail Residents.
- 6.6 County requests under Section 6.5 will be made as follows. The billable city (under this Agreement or other jail service agreements between the County and cities that have identical provisions as this Section) with the Jail Resident most recently admitted as Medical or Psychiatric Jail Resident will be asked to take custody of that Jail Resident. This process will be repeated until such time as the Medical and Psychiatric populations are reduced below capacity limits, or the Jail is willing to house these Jail Residents.
- 6.7 If the County, pursuant to Sections 6.5 and 6.6, requests that the City take custody of Medical or Psychiatric Jail Residents, the City shall comply with the County's request. The City shall take custody of its¹ Medical or Psychiatric Jail Residents by picking them up no later than twenty-four (24) hours after the County's request. If the City has not picked-up the Medical or Psychiatric Jail Resident within twenty-four (24) hours of the County's request, the County shall deliver the Medical or Psychiatric Jail Resident to the City's designated drop-off location or backup location. In either case, the City's designee

¹ Within eight (8)-hours of the County's request notification, the City may provide the County with the names of other Medical Jail Residents to substitute for the Medical Jail Residents identified by the County for pick-up. In the event the City identifies substitute Medical Jail Residents that are City Jail Residents, the provisions of Section 6 will continue to apply. In the event the City identifies substitute Medical Jail Residents that are the responsibility of a different city (Substitute City) that is party to this Agreement or a jail services agreement with the King County containing these same provisions, and the Substitute City agrees to remove its Medical Jail Residents, then the Substitute City will be responsible for picking-up the substitute Medical Jail Residents within 24-hours of the County's initial request notification for pick-up. In the event the Substitute City fails to pick-up its Medical Jail Residents within 24-hours of the County's initial request notification to the City, the County may deliver the Medical Jail Residents named in the original request notification to the City's designated drop-off location or backup location. The procedures outlined in this footnote will also apply to Psychiatric Jail Residents.

must accept the Medical or Psychiatric Jail Resident from the County and must be available to do so seven (7) days a week, twenty-four (24) hours a day. In all cases, the County shall provide the receiving entity with Continuity of Care Records, in a sealed envelope, at the time custody is transferred. The City will ensure that the City and the receiving entity comply with all applicable confidentiality laws and rules. Similarly, the City will ensure that Continuity of Care Records are provided to the County at the time custody of a City Jail Resident receiving the level of care consistent with a Medical or Psychiatric Jail Resident is transferred to the County.

6.8 If the County, in its sole discretion, decides to transport Medical or Psychiatric Jail Residents to the City's designated drop-off location or backup location within King County, Washington, the County will do so without charge. Should the County agree to a drop-off location or backup location outside of King County, Washington, the City will pay all transportation costs for Medical or Psychiatric Jail Residents taken to the designated drop off location or backup location. In no case will the County be obligated to transport a Medical or Psychiatric Jail Resident out-of-state.

7. Jail Planning.

Jail Planning. The County and the City recognize the value of sharing information about their respective Jail Resident populations and anticipated use of Secure Detention and alternative means of detention. The Parties agree to make good-faith efforts to share this information regularly. Furthermore, should the County begin planning for potential changes in jail space or models, the County will make good-faith efforts to provide notice to the City that such planning is underway, so that the City has an opportunity to participate in planning efforts.

8. Indemnification.

- 8.1 The County shall indemnify and hold harmless the City and its officers, agents, and employees, or any of them, from any, and all claims, actions, suits, liability, loss, costs, expenses, and damages of any nature whatsoever, by reason of or arising out of any negligent action or omission of the County, its officers, agents, and employees, or any of them. In the event that any suit based upon such a claim, action, loss, or damage is brought against the City, the County shall defend the same at its sole cost and expense; provided, that, the City retains the right to participate in said suit if any principle of governmental or public law is involved; and if final judgment be rendered against the City and its officers, agents, and employees, or any of them, or jointly against the City and the County and their respective officers, agents, and employees, or any of them, the County shall satisfy the same.
- 8.2 The City shall indemnify and hold harmless the County and its officers, agents, and employees, or any of them, from any, and all claims, actions, suits, liability, loss, costs, expenses, and damages of any nature whatsoever, by reason of or arising out of any negligent act or omission of the City, its officers, agents, and employees, or any of them. In the event that any suit based upon such a claim, action, loss, or damage is brought against the County, the City shall defend the same at its sole cost and expense; provided that the County retains the right to participate in said suit if any principle of governmental or public laws is involved; and if final judgment be rendered against the County, and its officers, agents, and employees, or any of them, or jointly against the County and the City and their respective officers, agents, and employees, or any of them, the City shall satisfy the same.
- 8.3 In executing this agreement, the County does not assume liability or responsibility for or

in any way release the City from any liability or responsibility, which arises in whole or in part from the existence or effect of City ordinances, rules, or regulations. If any cause, claim, suit, action or administrative proceeding is commenced in which the enforceability and/or validity of any such City ordinance, rule or regulation is at issue, the City shall defend the same at its sole expense and if judgment is entered or damages are awarded against the City, the County, or both, the City shall satisfy the same, including all chargeable costs and attorney's fees.

- 8.4 The terms of this Section 8 "Indemnification" shall survive the termination or expiration of this Agreement.
- 9. <u>Dispute Resolution</u>. In the event the Parties are unable to resolve a dispute, then either Party may pursue the dispute resolution provisions of this Section 9.
 - 9.1 Either Party may give Notification to the other in writing of a dispute involving the interpretation or execution of the Agreement. Within thirty (30) days of this Notification, the King County Executive and the Chief Executive Officer of the City, or their designees, shall meet to resolve the dispute. If the dispute is not resolved, then at the request of either Party it shall be referred to non-binding mediation. The mediator will be selected in the following manner: The City shall propose a mediator and the County shall propose a mediator; in the event the mediators are not the same person, the two proposed mediators shall select a third mediator who shall mediate the dispute. Alternately, the Parties may agree to select a mediator through a mediation service mutually acceptable to both Parties. The Parties shall share equally in the costs charged by the mediator or mediation service.
 - 9.2 Each party reserves the right to litigate any disputed issue in court, *de novo*.
- 10. Termination. Either Party may initiate a process to terminate this Agreement as follows:
 - 10.1 Ten (10)-Day Notification of Intent to Terminate. Any Party wishing to terminate this Agreement shall issue a written Notification of intent to terminate, not less than ten (10) days prior to issuing a ninety (90) day termination Notification under Section 10.2 of this Agreement. Upon receipt of the written Notification of intent to terminate, the parties will meet to confer on whether there are steps that the non-terminating party can take, in order to, avoid a ninety (90) day termination Notification notice under Section 10.2 of this Agreement.
 - 10.2 Ninety (90)-Day Termination Notification. After the ten (10) day period has run under Section 10.1 of this Agreement, the party desiring to terminate this Agreement may provide the other party ninety (90) days written termination Notification, as provided in RCW 70.48.090.

11. General Provisions.

11.1 Other Facilities. This Agreement reserves in each party the power to establish a temporary holding facility during a pandemic, riot, civil disobedience or natural disaster, to establish group homes or other care or rehabilitation facilities in furtherance of a social service program, to temporarily transfer Jail Residents to alternative detention facilities in order to respond to Jail overcrowding, a public health directive, or to comply with a final order of a federal court or a state court of record for the care and treatment of Jail Residents.

- 11.2 <u>Grants.</u> Both Parties shall cooperate and assist each other toward procuring grants or financial assistance from the United States, the State of Washington, and private benefactors for the Jail, the care and rehabilitation of Jail Residents, and the reduction of costs of operating and maintaining Jail facilities.
- 11.3 <u>Law Enforcement Intake Portal.</u> The County offers the use of a web-based Subject Intake Portal via its LEA Jail Management System Portal. The tool allows law enforcement officers to log onto the system and enter all arrest, case/charge, victim, probable cause, and drug crime certificate information. This method is the County's preferred method of intake and booking. LEO User Access to the JMS Portal is managed by the LEA who must designate one, or more, Group Administrator(s) who will be responsible for creating, managing, and deleting its users via the County's Login.KC system.
- 11.4 <u>Severability.</u> If any provision of this Agreement shall be held invalid, the remainder of this Agreement shall not be affected thereby.
- 11.5 <u>Remedies.</u> No waiver of any right under this Agreement shall be effective unless made in writing by the authorized representative of the party to be bound thereby. Failure to insist upon full performance on any one or several occasions does not constitute consent to or waiver of any later non-performance nor does payment of a billing or continued performance after Notification of a deficiency in performance constitute an acquiescence thereto. The Parties are entitled to all remedies in law or equity.
- 11.6 <u>Exhibits.</u> This Agreement consists of several pages plus the following attached exhibits, which are incorporated herein by reference as fully set forth:

Exhibit I Method of Determining Billable Charge and Agency

Exhibit II Exception to Billing Procedure

Exhibit III Calculation of Fees, Charges and Surcharges

- 11.7 <u>Not Binding on Future Agreements.</u> This Agreement does not bind the Parties as to the terms, fees, or rate formulas to be included in any future jail services agreements.
- 11.8 <u>Entire Agreement.</u> This Agreement, including all exhibits and attachments hereto, represents the entire understanding of the Parties and supersedes any oral representations that are inconsistent with or modify its terms and conditions.
- 11.9 <u>Modifications.</u> The provisions of this Agreement may only be modified and amended with the mutual written consent of the King County Executive and the Chief Executive Officer of the City and the approval of their respective legislative bodies, excepting that, certain modifications to the notice requirements in Sections 4.2.1 and 4.2.2 as reflected in 4.2.3, and Attachment I-2 may be approved administratively by signature of both the Chief Executive Officer of the City and King County Executive as specified herein.
- 11.10 <u>Force Majeure.</u> In the event either party's performance of any of the provisions of this Agreement become impossible due to Force Majeure, that party will be excused from performing such obligations until such time as the Force Majeure event has ended and all facilities and operations have been repaired and/or restored.

11.11 <u>Notifications.</u> Except as otherwise provided in this Agreement, any Notification required to be provided under the terms of this Agreement, shall be delivered by certified mail, return receipt requested or by personal service to the following person:

- 11.12 <u>Council Approval.</u> The Parties' obligations under this Agreement are subject to official City and County Council approval.
- 11.13 <u>Filing.</u> As provided by RCW 39.34.040, this Agreement shall be filed with the King County Department of Records and Elections.
- 11.14 <u>Assignment/Subcontracting.</u> The City may not assign or subcontract any portion of this Agreement or transfer or assign any claim arising pursuant to this Agreement.
- 11.15 No-Third Party Beneficiaries. There are no third-party beneficiaries to this Agreement. No person or entity other than a party to this Agreement shall have any rights hereunder or any authority to enforce its provisions, and any such rights or enforcement must be consistent with and subject to the terms of this Agreement.
- 11.16 Execution in Counterparts. This Agreement and any amendments thereto, shall be executed on behalf of each party by its duly authorized representative and pursuant to an appropriate motion, resolution, or ordinance. The Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which shall be an original, but those counterparts will constitute one and the same instrument.

EXHIBIT I Method of Determining Billable Charge and Agency

Process Overview

The application of all billing rules in conjunction with Section 1.6 of this Agreement comprises the method for determining the principal basis for booking or confining a person. The County's billing system examines all open and active charges and holds for each calendar day and applies the billing priority rules and tie breaker rules as set forth below. Then the billable agency is determined from the billable charge(s) or hold(s) and the application of exception rules, for example, the special DUI sentencing rule or the special six-hour rule.

Billing Priority Rules

The Billing Priority Group is determined in the following order:

The Binning Triority Group is determined in the follow	,
1. Local felony charge(s)	A local felony charge is filed by the King County
	Prosecuting Attorney into a King County court.
2. Investigation holds from King County	An investigation hold is one that has been referred

Tie Breaker Rules

Tie breaker rules are applied in the following order to the Local Misdemeanor Priority Group (Number 4 above) when there are charges with multiple billable agencies. The first rule that applies determines the billable charge(s). The billable agency for the selected charge(s) is the billable agency.

1. Longest or only sentenced charge rule	This rule selects the charge(s) with an active sentenced charge or, if there is more than one active sentenced charge, the rule selects the charge with the longest imposed sentence length.	
2. Earliest sentence rule	This rule selects the charge(s) with the earliest sentence start date.	
3. Lowest sentence charge number rule	This rule selects the sentenced charge(s) with the lowest charge number as given in the DAJD booking system.	
4. Arresting agency rule	This rule selects the charge(s) or hold(s) with a charge billable agency that matches the arresting agency for the booking.	
5. Accumulated bail rule	This rule selects the agency with the highest total bail summed for all of the charge(s) and hold(s) for which the agency is the billable agency.	
6. Lowest charge number rule	This rule selects the charge or hold with the lowest charge number as given in the DAJD booking system.	

Attachment I-1: City and County Jail Charges Clarification

Attachment I-2

Jail Resident Transfers: Transfer Request Exemption Criteria, Notice and Billing (Relating to Section 1.6.9)

- A. In the event of one or more of the following transfer exception criteria are met, a transfer may be denied by the County, in which case the person for whom the City has sought a transfer remains a City Jail Resident:
 - (1) Jail Resident has medical/health conditions/treatments preventing transfer.
 - (2) Transfer location refuses Jail Resident.
 - (3) Jail Resident refuses to be transported and poses a security risk.
 - (4) Jail Resident misses transport due to being at court or other location.
 - (5) City refuses to sign transfer paperwork requiring the City to arrange transportation for Jail Resident back to King County, if needed, when City sentence ends.
- B. If the County has refused a transfer request and thereafter determines that it no longer needs to detain the person and the person would as a result become a City Jail Resident, then the County will provide notice to the City that it will become billable for the Jail Resident. The City will not incur a Maintenance Charge on the day of notice. If the City transfers the Jail Resident during the six calendar days immediately following the day of notice, it will not incur a Maintenance Charge for the first calendar day following notice but will incur a Maintenance Charge for each subsequent calendar day until the Jail Resident is transferred. If the City does not transfer the Jail Resident from the Jail during this six-day period, the City is billable beginning the calendar day following the day of notice from the County.
- C. The terms of this Attachment I-2 may be amended by administrative agreement evidenced by execution in writing by the Chief Executive Officer of the City and King County Executive.

EXHIBIT II Exception to Billing Procedure

For persons serving the one- and two-day commitments pursuant to the mandatory DUI sentence grid who report directly from the community to the Jail for incarceration, Jail Resident Day shall not be defined according to Section 1.16 of the Agreement. Instead, Jail Resident Day shall be defined as a twenty-four-hour period beginning at the time of booking. Any portion of a twenty-four-hour period shall be counted as a full Jail Resident Day. The number of days billed for each sentence shall not exceed the sentence lengths specified on the court commitment.

Two examples are provided for illustration:

Two-day sentence served on consecutive days:

Two-day sentence served on non-consecutive days:

The Department of Adult and Juvenile Detention will apply this definition of Jail Resident Day to the City's direct DUI one and two-day Jail Residents by adjusting the City's monthly bill before it is sent to the City. If the changes are not made for some reason, the City will notify the Department of Adult and Juvenile Detention, which will make the necessary adjustments.

EXHIBIT IIICalculation of Fees, Charges and Surcharges

Starting on the Effective Date of this Agreement, the City shall pay the fees, charges, and surcharges with such annual adjustments for inflation as described below. Starting on the Effective Date of this Agreement, the City shall also pay offsite medical care charges as detailed below

2025 is the Base Year for fees, charges, and surcharges and is the basis from which the fees, charges, and surcharges are to be annually adjusted by applying the inflators set forth in Subsection 5.a. of this Exhibit III.

1. MAINTENANCE CHARGE AND CAPITAL EXPENDITURE CHARGE

The Maintenance Charge shall be calculated as described below.

- a. The **Maintenance Charge** starting **January 1, 2025**, and for the remainder of the calendar year 2025, **excluding** any adjustments for Capital Expenditure Charges, will be \$273.39. When combined with the Capital Expenditure Charges, the Maintenance Charge for calendar year 2025 is \$278.60. The Maintenance Charge shall be inflated in 2026 as described in Section 5, and annually thereafter throughout the term of the agreement. The City will not be charged a Maintenance Charge for a City Jail Resident where the Jail Resident has been offsite (e.g. housed outside of the Jail) for all twenty-four (24) hours of a Surcharge Day and subject to 1:1 Guarding Surcharge for the entirety of such twenty-four (24)-hour period.
- b. In addition to the annual adjustment to the Maintenance Charge described above, King County will increase the Maintenance Charge to capture the cost of **Capital Expenditures**. Capital Expenditures are defined as the cost of repairing and renovating current jail capacity and facilities and support and administrative facilities that benefit Jail operations. Additional Capital Expenditures will be included in the Maintenance Charge if such expenditures benefit City Jail Residents. Any Capital Expenditure that solely benefits County Jail Residents will not be charged to the City. Capital Expenditures do not include Jail Bed Expansion Projects. Capital Expenditures do not include Major Maintenance.
 - i. Capital Expenditures will be calculated in proportion to the square footage that benefits adult detention. Cities will be billed their proportionate share based on the total number of Jail Resident Days (as defined in Section 1.16). By August 15 of 2025, and each August 15 through 2028, DAJD will estimate the total number of Jail Resident Days for the following year and will provide notice to the City of the Capital Expenditure Charge to be included in the Maintenance Charge for the following year.
 - ii. Upon request of the City, the County shall provide its six (6)-year CIP and its six (6)-year major maintenance plan to the City. The County will provide a detailed line-item budget of each Capital Expenditure. If the City disputes that the Capital Expenditure benefits City Jail Residents or otherwise disputes the inclusion of the Capital Expenditure or any portion of the Capital Expenditures' budget in the maintenance fee, the matter will be resolved under the dispute resolution processes described herein. Capital Expenditures will not be charged to the City to the extent such Capital Expenditures are covered by federal grants, state grants, insurance proceeds, capital maintenance reserves or voter approved capital funding for jail related improvements.
 - iii. Capital Expenditures, if debt financed, shall begin being charged when debt service payments begin for the permanent financing of the Capital Expenditure and shall

continue until the end of the debt amortization unless the debt amortization is less than fifteen (15) years, in which case the charges to the City will be amortized over fifteen (15) years. If the Capital Expenditure is not debt financed, Capital Expenditure charges shall be based on actual expenditures. The County will make available documentation evidencing such expenditures.

iv. Beginning January 1, 2025, and continuing through calendar year 2025, the Capital Expenditure Charge for ISP for the City is \$5.21 and the Capital Expenditure Charge for the CSSP is \$0, for a combined total Capital Expenditure Charge of \$5.21 to be added to the Maintenance Charge set forth in subparagraphs a and b above.

2. BOOKING FEE

- a. The booking fee shall be based on whether or not the City is using the County's Personal Recognizance (PR) screeners for individuals it brings to a County jail facility to be booked. The two booking fees starting January 1, 2025, and for the remainder of the calendar year 2025 will be initially set as follows:
 - i. The Base Booking Fee shall be \$199.81. This is the booking fee payable by Contract Cities that are not using the County's PR screeners. This Booking Fee shall include 40.86% of the total Budgeted Jail Costs associated with booking (including Jail Health Intake Services); this percentage of booking costs to be included in the Booking Fee shall remain fixed through the term of this Agreement.
 - ii. The **Standard Booking Fee** shall be **\$293.28**. This is the booking fee payable by Contract Cities using the County's PR screeners. This booking fee is composed of the Base Booking Fee plus the fee associated with the County's PR screeners.
- b. If the City has a court order on file as of the Effective Date, confirming that the City and not the County will have authorization to provide PR screening for City Jail Residents, then the City will be qualified for the Base Booking Fee as of the Effective Date. To qualify for the Base Booking Fee in subsequent years, the City must either provide a court order no later than July 1 of the prior year, confirming that the City and not the County will have authorization to provide PR screening for City Jail Residents, or a previously issued court order must remain in effect. If an authorizing court order is revoked or expires and is not renewed, the City will no longer qualify for the Base Booking Fee.

The Booking Fee shall be inflated in 2026 and annually thereafter as described in Section 5 below.

3. SURCHARGES

In addition to payment of the Maintenance Charge and the Booking Fees, the City shall pay Surcharges associated with services provided to City Jail Residents as described below. The types of services provided to a Jail Resident associated with each Surcharge, and a general description of each Surcharge, is set forth in Attachment III-1.

The initial Surcharge amounts described in paragraphs (a) - (d) below shall apply from January 1, 2025, through December 31, 2025, and shall be inflated for 2026 as described in Section 5 below, and annually each year thereafter.

a. **Infirmary Care**. For Medical Jail Residents, the City shall pay an Infirmary Care Surcharge of \$447.43 for each Surcharge Day.

- b. **Psychiatric Care**. For Non-Acute Psychiatric Jail Residents, the City shall pay a Psychiatric Care Surcharge of \$137.17 for each Surcharge Day.
- c. **Acute Psychiatric Housing**. For Acute Psychiatric Jail Residents, the City shall pay an Acute Psychiatric Care Surcharge of \$340.53 for each Surcharge Day.
 - i. The Acute Psychiatric Surcharge for each Surcharge Day shall be \$340.53
 - ii. The **Psychiatric Care Surcharge** for each Surcharge Day of \$137.17 is added to the Acute Psychiatric Housing surcharge for a total Acute Psychiatric Care Surcharge of \$477.70.
- d. **1:1 Guarding Surcharge**. The 1:1 Guarding Surcharge is the charge imposed when the County dedicates an individual officer to guard a City Jail Resident. The Surcharge shall be **\$97.61** per guard *for each hour* or portion thereof, and as further described in Attachment III-1.
- e. A **Surcharge Day** is defined as a 24-hour period from midnight to midnight, or any portion thereof, in which a Jail Resident receives any of the services within the Surcharges listed in subparagraphs (a) (c) above; *provided that* with respect to the Infirmary Care Surcharge, Psychiatric Care Surcharge and Acute Psychiatric Surcharge, a maximum of one (1) charge may be imposed within the twenty-four (24)-hour period for a single Jail Resident, and the charge imposed shall be the highest applicable charge. For example, if a Jail Resident is placed in Acute Psychiatric Care, released to the general population, and then again placed in Acute Psychiatric Care all within the same twenty-four (24)-hour period (midnight to midnight), a single Acute Psychiatric Care Surcharge will be imposed. Similarly, if a Jail Resident is placed in Acute Psychiatric Care and then in Non-Acute Psychiatric Care within the twenty-four (24)-hour midnight to midnight period, then a single Acute Psychiatric Care charge will be imposed.

4. OFFSITE MEDICAL CARE CHARGES

In addition to the Maintenance Charge, the Booking Fee, and the Surcharges detailed above, the City shall be responsible for payment of all Offsite Medical Care Charges incurred by a City Jail Resident.

5. INFLATORS AND RE-SETS OF FEES CHARGES, AND SURCHARGES

a. <u>Inflators</u>. Beginning January 1, 2026, and effective every January 1 through the term of the agreement, all fees, charges, and surcharges, excluding: (1) Offsite Medical Care Charges and, (2) the Capital Expenditure Charge components of the Maintenance Charge, shall be inflated by the percentage rates described below.

Non-Medical Charges: The following fees and charges are subject to an annual inflator of the Seattle-Tacoma-Bremerton CPI-W (covering the twelve (12)-month period ending in June) plus 1.5% but shall in no event be lower than 1.5%.:

- i. Maintenance Charge
- ii. Booking Fee
- iii. Acute Psychiatric Housing Surcharge
- iv. 1:1 Guarding

Medical Charges: The following fees and charges are subject to an annual inflator of the Seattle-Tacoma-Bremerton CPI-W (covering the twelve (12)-month period ending in June) plus three (3) percent, but shall in no event be lower than three (3) percent:

- i. Infirmary Care Surchargeii. Psychiatric Care Surcharge
- b. <u>Final Fee, Charge and Surcharge Notice for Following Calendar Year</u>. No later than August 15, the County will provide notice to the City of the final fees, charges and surcharges listed in this Subsection 5.a. reflecting the application of the June-June CPI index in the manner prescribed in Subsection 5.a above.
- c. <u>Inflation Re-sets</u>. Notwithstanding the terms of Subsections 5.a and 5.b to the contrary, in the event the Seattle-Tacoma-Bremerton CPI-W (June-June) exceeds eight (8) percent then, as part of the August 15, final fee and charge notice, the County will include information demonstrating whether, based on factors affecting the DAJD Budgeted Jail Costs including but not limited to personnel costs, food, utilities and pharmaceuticals, the County's reasonably expected inflation experience for the DAJD Budgeted Jail Costs in the next calendar year (the "Expected Inflation Rate") is *less than or greater than* said CPI-W (June-June) rate. If the Expected Inflation Rate is lower than the CPI-W (June-June) rate, the County will apply the lower of the two rates to the fees and charges listed in this Subsection 5.c for the following calendar year.

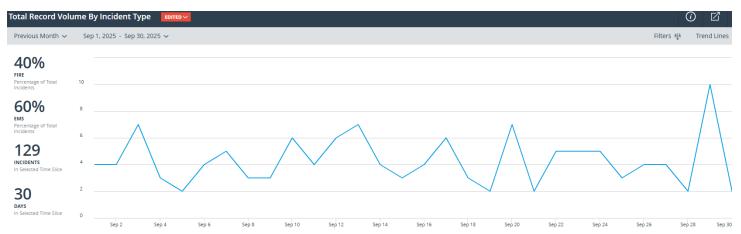

Incident Count September 2025

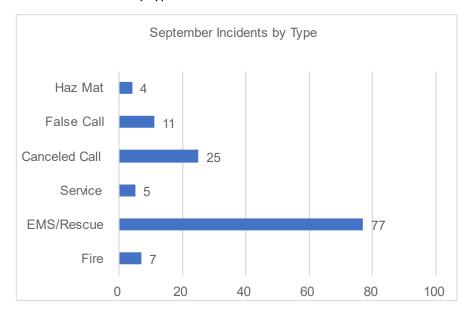
The Fire Department responded to 129 incidents in September. 60% of the incidents were for emergency medical services and 40% were fire or service-related incidents.

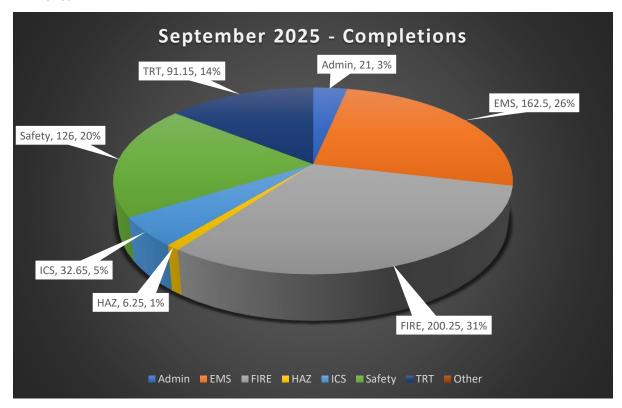
EMS Transports

The Fire Department responded to 77 EMS incidents in September and transported 37 patients to local hospitals. Patients were transported to Swedish Issaquah 24% of the time and Snoqualmie Valley Hospital 68% of the time. Of the transports, 3 originated from outside Snoqualmie's service area (North Bend 3, Fall City 0).

Training:

September brings with it a quick run towards fall weather and completions of training that are weather-dependent. Much of this is practical related and not so much in the virtual world. While this can make for busy days, especially incorporating administrative tasks, the crews have found a way to keep their pace for the year. In September, crews trained on pediatric emergencies, respiratory and geriatric emergencies, as well as incident command along with search and rescue. Throughout September, we achieved a 37% increase in training hours compared to last year, marking a record pace for our department. We also graduated one more volunteer from his rookie book/onboarding training, which completes the initial training progress for our current volunteers. During September, crews trained for over 640 hours, focusing on fire suppression and rescue (31%), emergency medical services (26%) and safety training (20%). The month also maintained a focus on wildland firefighting operations with hose deployment training. The following chart compares training hours by type.

Inspections

In September, crews completed 20 occupancy inspections with 14 violations needing correction. Most common violations noted during this timeframe were related to expired fire extinguishers and failed emergency lighting. These inspections consisted of business office locations, storefronts, manufacturing, and schools. Due to increasing call volumes, crews are experiencing having to rebalance priorities for completing administrative tasks. This is reducing the number of occupancy inspections being completed. Many of the completed inspections resulted in occupancies performing annual maintenance as prescribed by the code. The following chart is a breakdown of violations for September 2025:

Recruitment -

The city continues to have minimal open positions and is also excited to have ongoing internal promotions. Ryan Barnet was promoted to Parks/Streets Superintendent which then in turn led to the promotion of Dalton Hawk to the Lead Parks/Street Technician. We are excited to see their impact leading this team and will now be looking to backfill the Parks/Streets Tech II position. To add much needed administrative support in the Parks/PPW department, Michelle Daly has started as a new Administrative Assistant. Our finance department will be conducting interviews this month for the Accounts Payable Clerk position. And, after a very involved, thorough promotional process, the fire department is excited for a new Lieutenant to be named and to hire a firefighter to backfill that promotion.

Union Negotiations

Negotiations have been ongoing with the IAFF Union.

Employee Training/Activities/Recognition -

The "listening sessions" are finishing up & continuing to be scheduled around the police and fire department availability with the desire to get useful feedback towards our goal of continued improvement and satisfied employees in all departments.

Upcoming citywide trainings include the annual blood born pathogen training, as well as CPR/First Aid training for those that missed the classes in March. New hires are completing the FEMA trainings so that we can ensure all employees are prepared should an emergency happen. A city wide EOC/FEMA training exercise will take place in early December. All city employees will complete a Phishing training in the next month to bring awareness to the technological risks we all face.

The Wellness committee continues to plan events for employees to attend, most recently a benefits presentation took place that included representatives from Association of WA Cities (AWC) and the Department of Revenue Services (DRS). Employees also showed up in big numbers for a tour of our water and wastewater facilities. It appears that everyone learned something new and were able to understand a bit more about the impact of those departments. Thank you to Matt Hedger and Tom Holmes for taking the time to give us a tour!

The HR department selects an employee to be recognized in our "Employee Spotlight" every quarter after the Employee Newsletter is released. The most recent employee recognized was Michael Peter from our police department. His spotlight along with the other two we've done this year are included here.

Personnel Policy Handbook

The HR department is grateful for the support from the Administration and in Council to approve the new Personnel Policy Manual. This update will allow employees to have a more complete, up to date guide as they navigate employment with the city. The HR department is deploying the new policy manual, answering questions and ensuring employees have easy access to this and other resources via Employee Access (part of the Tyler Munis modules).





Thai Pham, Wastewater

Thai joined the City in January of 2024 as the Wastewater Senior Industrial Maintenance Technician III. He has 30 years of electrical engineering experience and a Master's degree from Perdue in Electrical Engineering. Thai's position was new for the City, as it was previously filled by a contractor in the private sector, which happened to be Thai!

Can you explain the basics of your job?

I take care of the computer system that automates the wastewater plant and the telemetry part of it.

What project are you working on now?

Right now I am working on upgrading the PLC panels (Programmable Logic Controller panels) for the water and wastewater plants that are aging out. They were built in 1997 so I am bringing the hardware and software up to date. Wastewater is complete and water should be completed in June.

What do you enjoy most about your job?

I like working with our small team. Everyone is friendly and easy to work with, and we have a relaxing work environment.

How did you get into this field?

After college I worked at General Motors in Michigan, where I worked on robots and different parts of automation within technical systems. I worked for many years at the company TSI, who helped build the system for the City's wastewater treatment plant.

What was your biggest accomplishment since you've started at Snoqualmie?

I've accomplished a lot. The PLC upgrade is almost done for wastewater. The wastewater system is completely off the City's IT network which will prevent hacking so that the plant is more secure.

What's the biggest challenge you've faced in your role?

I don't have a lot of challenges in my role because I've been doing this work for so long. The biggest adjustment for me when I came to the City was having an earlier work schedule and waking up early. When I worked in the private sector, I started later in the morning. But overall, working for the City has brought me a much better work/life balance.

What are some fun facts about you that others might not know?

I like to meet people and get to know them.

What's your favorite way to spend the weekend?

In my spare time I like to garden, go for walks, watch movies at home, and work on small remodeling projects around the house. I'm currently working on remodeling our bathroom.

What advice would you give to new employees?

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I would say to be sincere, straightforward, and tell others what you need. I think it's so important to show respect to new employees so they can trust me. Because you know, I'm here for the long run.





Theresa Tozier, Fire Department

Teresa joined the City in January of 2017 as a Firefighter. She earned a Bachelor's degree from Duquesne University in 2011 and passed her national boards exam that same year.

Can you explain the basics of your job?

As a Firefighter, I'm part of a team of problem solvers – for whatever emergency we're dealing with, whether it's medical, a car accident, or a fire – we are a jack of all trades. We really have to adapt and overcome to whatever the situation requires.

The other big part of my job involves community connection. We work a lot with the community doing fire inspections, checking hydrants, and school visits, and we really do take ownership of the city since we are a small department. We get to know businesses in the community and really do our best to keep track of those folks that we see regularly.

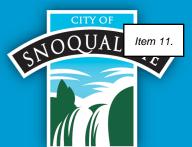
What project are you working on now?

A project I'm in charge of is our Rope Rescue Program for the department. I'm considered a trainer and subject matter expert, which means I train other firefighters in King County zones 1 and 3, and track and maintain our equipment at our station.

I've also been working with Deputy Chief Brown to develop a Peer Support program. I've written a policy that the Chiefs are currently reviewing. The program would provide critical incident stress debriefings, confidentiality and help for first responders in crisis, and appropriate referrals to more advanced care/professionals whenever needed.

How did you get into the field of firefighting?

Firefighting has been sort of a love story for me. I have a degree in sports medicine and worked in physical therapy for years. I liked my job but started to realize that I didn't want to do it forever. One of my clients at the time was a female firefighter, and I had never known a female firefighter. As I got to know her and learned about her job, I decided to go back to school to get my EMT certificate. I started volunteering at Index Fire, which is a small, mostly volunteer run station. Then I put myself through the fire academy and ended up volunteering and working several part-time jobs at Lake Stevens, Index, Granite Falls Fire. At one point I was working 5 jobs (which I don't recommend).



What do you enjoy most about your job?

I enjoy the people I work with. We've been really lucky at the station and have always managed to get really good people to work here. I would hang out with every single one of my co-workers outside of work because I like them that much.

What was your biggest accomplishment since you've started at Snoqualmie?

I'm most proud of my work with the Peer Support and Rope Rescue programs. I'm proud that I've been able to help folks put these into practice at Snoqualmie. The Ropes program now mirrors King County's program, so we all speak the same language and have the same equipment when we need to do a rope rescue.

What's the biggest challenge you've faced in your role?

One of the biggest challenges I've faced was the Covid-19 pandemic and the constant changes it brought to my job. It was difficult to stay up to date with what seemed to be daily changes to policies and protocols.

What are some fun facts about you that others might not know?

- I'm a Steelers fan.
- I have a cat named Bubba who is pretty rad (see photo).
- I'm a Lord of the Rings nerd. I'm currently reading the books and love the movies. I'm also doing a Lord of the Rings Conqueror Challenge where the goal is to walk 660 miles, mirroring the characters' journey from The Shire to Mordor.
- If I am reincarnated, I want to come back as a manatee.

What's your favorite way to spend the weekend?

I love to walk and get outside. I live in Woodinville and love walking around my town, talking with my neighbors, wine tasting, and rock climbing.

What advice would you give to new employees?

My advice to new Firefighters is to be a sponge and learn from others. As time goes on, you'll find your own ways of doing things but always lean into positivity and take care of yourself.

And my advice to everyone is to replace the batteries in your smoke detectors every 6 months and put in new detectors every 10 years!





Michael Peter, Police Department

Michael joined Snoqualmie in February of 2023 as a Police Officer. He studied Law & Justice and Sociology at Central Washinton University and graduated Magna Cum Laude in 2022.

Can you explain the basics of your job?

Public safety is the most important part of my job as an Officer. That can include responding to accidents, collisions, or traffic hazards, but also holding people accountable and trying to prevent crime.

Another important part of law enforcement right now is called Community Oriented Policing (COP). This is where we talk with community members and create meaningful interaction, which helps build trust and allows us to get to know the community we're serving.

What project are you working on now?

One of my new roles in the Department is Taser Instructor. Every year officers get re-certified for tasers through an 8-hour training day, which includes classroom and scenario testing. My role as the instructor is to create PowerPoints, teach the material, and prepare the scenes for testing.

I've also been newly appointed to serve on the Washington State Traffic Safety Committee. These are statewide meetings throughout the year to leverage resources for improving traffic safety in Washington cities. The Committee can help agencies apply for grant funding for police vehicles, or Lidar machines, or even provide officers from neighboring cities to support DUI patrols for certain holidays or events.

How did you get into the field of law enforcement?

At CWU I randomly took a law and justice class, and in that class something clicked for me. I really liked it, so I took another one. And from there, it just took off. I decided to double major in Law & Justice and Sociology. The program was taught by a lot of retired City of Ellensburg Police Officers, and they have a similar small-town vibe as Snoqualmie, which I love. I graduated in 2022 and applied to Snoqualmie. During the 6 months it took to get hired, I did some construction work, but I knew that law enforcement was what I was working toward.

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What do you enjoy most about your job?

I enjoy the community discussions in our small town. I really think working in a small town provides more opportunities to foster a positive relationship with the community. Things like handing out stickers to kids at a park or getting a smile and a wave from community members or seeing smiling little kids in the back seat of their parent's car during a traffic stop make our job better. This job can be so hard, so those positive interactions remind us why we do this work, and they're beneficial to every officer's wellbeing.

What was your biggest accomplishment since you've started at Snoqualmie?

I'd say my biggest accomplishment has been being given the opportunity to be put in a supervisor role early in my career. I've served as both a Field Training Officer (FTO) and Officer in Charge (OIC). The Department has given me a lot of supervisor-type opportunities and I'm very appreciate of that. As FTO, you have to watch your trainee respond to a crime and help them reflect on what went well and where they can improve. Being a younger FTO with not as much experience, I had to ask a lot of questions of my more-senior FTOs to help me grow.

What's the biggest challenge you've faced in your role?

I had to learn early on in FTO the importance of taking initiative to research or figure out something myself. You can't know every law, it's just not possible, and someone isn't always going to be there to help you or give you the answer. Sometimes in order to give a citizen accurate information, I had to practice humility by saying, "I don't know, give me 5 minutes and I'll find out the answer for you". For some of the more complex cases, I've had to call a prosecutor on the spot and ask for their recommendation. But to me, it's better to say 'I don't know, let me find out' and follow up with the correct answer, than to just ramble off something in the moment that may not be accurate.

What are some fun facts about you that others might not know?

- I'm originally from the Bay Area, California
- I came to Washington to play baseball at CWU in Ellensburg. I played SS, 2nd and 3rd base.

What's your favorite way to spend the weekend?

I like to hike – I recently hiked Snow Lake and it was challenging but beautiful. I also like to visit the ocean, or local lakes and rivers. I golf consistently, about every few weeks, and I enjoy visiting my brother in San Francisco – we like to explore the city on bike or by foot.

What advice would you give to new Police Officers?

- Patience! It's a long 4-to-7-month process to get hired as an officer, so be patient with it.
- Don't be afraid to ask questions. You won't know everything, so be resourceful and ask other
 officers your questions.
- Trust yourself. You'll have to make decisions in a second with little time to think, but trust your training and knowledge of the law to make that fast decision.

Dear City Council,

The IT Department continues to be busy this month with preparing for future projects and migrating servers. We are continuing to be responsive to requests for support and the cases are being resolved in a timely manner.

Here are some updates for the month of September:

- The Parks and Public Works Departments are actively engaged with us in migration to the new Cloud VOIP phone system. We will be moving the upgrade date again due to issues with their main number. The old provider is having issues locating the circuit so it can be migrated.
- We have reviewed proposals for new server replacements generously approve by City Council. You will see a couple of Agenda Bills in the October 21st F&A Committee Meeting and hopefully the October 27th Council Meeting. We estimate completing this project by early next year.
- The all-staff online cybersecurity training has been delayed until mid-October due to server migration work. We are also working on messaging before deploying the training.
- The server migration work has been completed successfully. We are now in the process to making modifications to improve server performance and other post-migration tasks. As mentioned in last month's update, our virtual server management platform decided to dramatically increase the licensing cost of their software. I could not justify the increase to you and the residents of the city. We have migrated our server to a software that is included in other licensing we purchase.

We will have more details on upcoming and ongoing projects in future updates:

- Simplifying our service desk to better serve our users.
- Restructuring and updating our server infrastructure.
- Operating System Upgrades
- Building new processes for Asset Management that is proactive.
- Cybersecurity updates.

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Monthly Report – September 2025

Public Works General/CIP Projects:

<u>Fall Operations</u>: Crews are transitioning from summer to autumn operations mode. Irrigation systems are being shut down and winterization activities are beginning. Mowing and brush cutting activities will continue until the winter season. As mowing activities wind down, we will transition to facility maintenance and winter projects.

<u>Tyler Munis Implementation</u>: Public Works has completed implementation of the asset management system and continues to make improvements on its application to the individual divisions. Parks and Public Works has processed approximately 1,600 separate work orders in the last month and over 17,600 work orders since implementation in October of last year.

<u>Utility Rate Study</u>: PPW staff have begun work on the General Facility Charges (GFCs) rates, which are anticipated to be completed this year.

<u>Road Maintenance and Repair</u>: Streets division is currently focused on pavement maintenance with pothole filling and repairing traffic signs. New signage has been placed in the school zones, especially around Mt Si High School. Public Works will soon be placing flashing beacons at the cross walks around the high school to improve visibility and reduce traffic speeds. Engineering is currently working on paving, utility infrastructure, and road maintenance projects for next summer.

<u>Splashpad</u>: The Splashpad operating season has come to an end for this year. The facility will be winterized and a few maintenance projects will soon begin. A pole mounted security camera will be placed near the facility to monitor the splashpad, skatepark, and restroom facilities. Public Works will also begin a drainage project around the pad to mitigate the muddy conditions experienced this summer.

<u>Water Reclamation Facility Phase 3</u>: Work is nearing completion at the Kimball Creek Lift station. Performance testing and commissioning are expected to take approximately 90 days, at which time the project will be completed.

<u>Reclaimed Irrigation Reservoir</u>: Work continues at the project site with construction of the concrete reservoir. The floor has been finished, and crews are getting ready to pour the walls in early October. Project completion is anticipated on or before June 30, 2026.

<u>River Trail</u>: A preconstruction kickoff meeting was scheduled for this week. The contractor is ready to get started and groundbreaking is anticipated in the next couple weeks. Project completion is anticipated for early 2026.

<u>Sandy Cove Bank Stabilization</u>: Permits from the Corp of Engineers have yet to be obtained, although Public Works has received notice that the project is approved. The current plan is to advertise the project for bid in late January 2026. Project completion is anticipated for Summer 2026.

Staffing: PPW has recently added one new position and filled two additional vacancies:

- <u>Administrative Assistant (new position)</u> Michele Daly emerged as the top candidate from over 20 applicants. Michele comes to us from the Snoqualmie Valley School District with outstanding references. She begins her new position with Public Works October 6, 2025.
- <u>Parks and Streets Superintendent</u> Ryan Barnet was promoted to Parks and Streets
 Superintendent. Ryan has been with the City for over 10 years and has demonstrated
 outstanding leadership qualities and dedication to the job. We are very pleased to have Ryan
 join the PPW leadership team.
- <u>Parks and Streets Lead</u> Dalton Hawk was promoted to Parks and Streets Lead position. Dalton
 was the clear choice from a strong group of internal and external applicants. In the two years he
 has been with the City, Dalton has emerged as a natural leader within the Parks Division.
- <u>Parks and Streets Technician</u> PPW will soon advertise for a new technician in the Parks and Streets Division to fill Dalton's position.
- <u>Water Maintenance Tech</u> PPW will soon advertise for a new Water Maintenance Technician to replace Austin Hilton, who moved away to Michigan. He will be missed.

Wastewater Division

- Treated 30 million gallons of sewage in September
- Reclaimed and recycled 25.8 million gallons of water for irrigation in September
- Continued flow and load monitoring at Casino/Hotel
- Completed review of 384th Avenue sewer accounts. Reviewed CCTV footage of more than 100 parcels and collected system data.

- Provided operations support for Reclaim Water Reservoir project

- Completed Lake Alice Gate with new custom-built gate constructed inhouse by Matt Miller.
- Will replace four manhole lids on Park Street near Mt Si HS
- Will complete Echo Glenn flow meter and communication repairs when parts arrive.

Water Division
