RULES FOR DISCUSSION FROM THE FLOOR AND PUBLIC HEARINGS

DISCUSSION FROM THE FLOOR

- Discussion from the floor is limited to three minutes per person. Longer presentations must be scheduled through the Administrator, Clerk/Treasurer's office.
- Individuals wishing to be heard must sign in with their name and address. Meetings are video recorded so individuals must approach the podium and speak clearly into the microphone.
- Council action or discussion should not be expected during "Discussion from the Floor." Council may direct staff to research the matter further or take the matter under advisement for action at the next regularly scheduled meeting.

PUBLIC HEARINGS

The purpose of a public hearing is to allow the City Council to receive citizen input on a proposed project. This is not a time to debate the issue.

The following format will be used to conduct the hearing:

- The presenter will have a maximum of 10 minutes to explain the project as proposed.
- Councilmembers will have the opportunity to ask questions or comment on the proposal.
- Citizens will then have an opportunity to ask questions and/or comment on the project. Those wishing the comment are asked to limit their comments to 3 minutes.

In cases where there is a spokesperson representing a group wishing to have their collective opinions voiced, the spokesperson should identify the audience group he/she is representing and may have a maximum of 10 minutes to express the views of the group.


- People wishing to comment are asked to keep their comments succinct and specific.
- Following public input, Councilmembers will have a second opportunity to ask questions of the presenter and/or citizens.
- After everyone wishing to address the subject of the hearing has done so, the Mayor will close the public hearing.
- The City Council may choose to take official action on the proposal or defer action until the next regularly scheduled Council meeting. No further public input will be received at that time.



2025 Assessment Summary


The 2025 preliminary assessment for the City of Spring Lake Park has been completed in accordance with state statutes, Department of Revenue and Anoka County policies. This assessment is for the approximately 2,400 parcels in the City that fall within the Anoka County boundaries.

The assessing staff physically inspected 540 properties during the quintile review process for the 2025 assessment. There is a quintile map for the next 5 years at the end of this report. The appraisal staff also inspected properties where building permits were issued for improvements, remodeling, or demolition projects during 2024.

There were 115 total sales recorded in the 2025 assessment study period, which is October 1st, 2023, through September 30, 2024. The number of sales was similar to last year's assessment sales study (103 sales). Of the 115 sales, 103 were residential classification and 12 were commercial or industrial classification. There were 71 residential sales that met the criteria as "qualified sales", according to the MN Department of Revenue. Those sales were the basis for adjustments made to the improved residential properties throughout the city. There were only a few commercial or industrial sales that were "qualified". Given the low number of commercial, industrial and apartment sales in Spring Lake Park, those valuations were guided by overall County trends, with local adjustments made as appropriate.

The preliminary total estimated market value is \$889,094,400, a decrease of .51% from 2024. The new construction valuation for the year was \$406,700. After subtracting out the new construction amount, the overall city value is \$888,687,700, a decrease of .55%, due to market forces only (sales prices year over year).

The chart below illustrates changes in the total estimated market value of the City of Spring Lake Park for 2021 through 2025.

2025 Value Changes by Property Type

The table below depicts the change in total estimated market value from for each major classification or property type from assessment year 2024 to assessment year 2025. Specific properties may have an increase or decrease in estimated market value that are not necessarily representative of the aggregate value change for that property type. Each property within the city is valued based on its specific features and location.



The residential classification was the only property type that increased in overall value. Apartments total valuation decreased significantly at 10.9%, a reflection of much lower sale prices year over year. Total valuation of Industrial properties decreased 2.56% and the commercial overall valuation saw a slight decrease of nearly 1%.

2025 Percent of Total Value by Property Type

The table below depicts the percentage of total value associated with each property type within the City of Spring Lake Park. Residential properties make up the largest market share of value at 67.27%. Apartments account for the next largest share at 13.45%. Commercial and industrial are the smallest shares at 11.48% and 7.8% respectively.



Understanding the Minnesota Assessment Process

Mass Appraisal Defined

Property values for Minnesota real estate tax purposes are determined by mass appraisal. Mass appraisal is the practice of determining individual values based on statistical analysis of a group of sales for a large area. The values are determined as of a specific date and are based on arms-length transactions that occurred during a specified sales period.

Market Value Defined

As in private appraisal, <u>Market Value</u> is defined as:

The most probable price that a property should bring in a competitive and open market under all condition's requisite to a fair sale, the buyer and seller each acting prudently and knowledgeably, and assuming the price is not affected by any undue stimulus. Implicit in this definition are the consummation of a sale as of a specified date and the passing of title from seller to buyer under conditions whereby:

- buyer and seller are typically molivated
- both parties are well informed or well advised, and acting in what they consider their own best interests;
- a reasonable time is allowed for exposure in the open market;
- payment is made in terms of cash in U.S. dollars or in terms of financial arrangements comparable thereto;
- the price represents the normal consideration for the property sold unaffected by special or creative financing or sales concessions granted by anyone associated with the sale (a foreclosure sale or a short sale [a sale to avoid foreclosure] is not considered an armslength transaction).

Assessment Process Timeline

In Minnesota it is the duty of the Assessor to value and classify property. This is done annually as of the assessment date of **January 2nd**. Each year's assessment is based on arms-length transactions (sales that meet the criteria of an open market transaction) that occurred from October. 1st to September 30th (see below). When the assessment is completed the local taxing jurisdictions begin their budgeting process for the following year. They use the total assessment to determine their tax base and develop their tax rates. All aspects of the assessment, including but not limited to the assessment date, sales period and property tax classification, are dictated by state statute and under the oversight of the Minnesota Department of Revenue.

Sales Statistics Defined

Statistical analysis is used to test the accuracy of the assessment and help assessors to ensure equity between properties at the neighborhood, municipal and county levels. The Minnesota Department of Revenue also uses these same techniques to test for equity between counties. The primary statistics used are:

- **Median Ratio:** This is a measure of central tendency that is the midpoint of a group of sales ratios when arrayed from low to high. The median is a useful statistic as it is not affected by extreme ratios.
- **Aggregate Ratio**: This is the total market value of all sale properties divided by the total sale prices. It, along with the mean ratio, gives an idea of our assessment level. Within the city, we constantly try to achieve an aggregate and mean ratio of 94% to 95% to give us a margin to account for a fluctuating market and still maintain ratios within state mandated guidelines. Also referred to as the **Weighted Mean**.
- **Mean Ratio**: The mean is the average ratio. We use this ratio not only to watch our assessment level, but also to analyze property values by development, type of dwelling and value range. These studies enable us to track market trends in neighborhoods, popular housing types and classes of property.
- **Coefficient of Dispersion (COD)**: The COD measures the accuracy of the assessment. It is possible to have a median ratio of 93% with 300 sales, two ratios at 93%, 149 at 80% and 149 at 103%. Although this is an excellent median ratio, there is obviously a great inequality in the assessment. COD indicates the spread of the ratios from the mean or median ratio. The goal of a good assessment is a COD of 10 to 20. A COD under 10 is considered excellent and anything over 20 will mean an assessment review by the Department of Revenue.
- **Price Related Differential (PRD)**: This statistic measures the equality between the assessments of high and low valued property. A PRD over 100 indicates a regressive assessment, or the lower valued properties are assessed at a greater degree than the higher. A PRD of less than 100 indicates a progressive assessment or the opposite. A perfect PRD of 100 means that both higher and lower valued properties are assessed exactly equal.

2025 Residential Statistics

The following statistics are related to the Spring Lake Park 2025 assessment. In order to set final valuations, the sale prices are compared to the assessed values for the previous year and then adjusted to meet the DOR requirement of median ratio between 90%-105%. The COD (5.7) and PRD (100.4) are measures of uniformity and considered excellent.

Appeals Procedures

Each spring Anoka County sends out a property tax bill (based on the prior year assessment) along with the Notice of Valuation and Classification. Three factors that affect the tax bill are:

- 1. The amount your local governments (town, city, county, etc.) spend to provide services to your community.
- 2. The estimated market value of your property.
- 3. The **classification** of your property (how it is used).

The assessor determines the final two factors. You may appeal the value or classification of your property as described below:

Informal Appeal

- Property owners are encouraged to call the appraiser or assessor whenever they have questions or concerns about their market value, classification of the property, or the assessment process.
- Almost all questions can be answered during this informal appeal process.
- When taxpayers call questioning their market value, every effort is made to make an appointment to inspect properties that were not previously inspected.
- If the data on the property is correct, the appraiser can show the property owner other sales in the market that support the estimated market value.
- If errors are found during the inspection, or other factors indicate a value reduction is warranted, the appraiser can easily make the changes at this time.
- If property owners are not satisfied with the outcome of an informal appeal, they may proceed to the County Board of Appeal and Equalization.

Local Board of Appeal and Equalization

- The Local Board of Appeal and Equalization is typically made up of city council members or township board members. In some jurisdictions, a special board is appointed and typically consists of real estate professionals.
- The Local Board meets in mid-April to early May.
- Taxpayers can make their appeal in person or by letter.
- If an interior inspection is denied, no adjustment can be made to value per MN Statute.
- The assessor is present to answer any questions and present evidence supporting their value.
- If property owners are not satisfied with the outcome of their appeal at this meeting, they may proceed to the County Board of Appeal and Equalization.

Open Book Meeting as Alternative to the Local Board of Appeal and Equalization

- Many cities in Anoka County, including Spring Lake Park, have chosen the Open Book Meeting appeal option rather than the formal Local Board of Local Board of Appeal and Equalization
- This year's Open Book meetings were held Tuesday, May 6th, 2025 from 1:00 7:00 PM and Wednesday, May 7th from 8:00 AM – 4:30 PM at the Assessor's office in the Anoka County office building.
- Property owners were notified of these meetings on the Valuation Notices and via a City newsletter article published in April. No Spring Lake Park property owners attended the meetings this year.
- If property owners are not satisfied with the outcome of their appeal at the Open Book Meeting, they may proceed to the County Board of Appeal and Equalization.

County Board of Appeal and Equalization

- The Anoka County Board of Appeal and Equalization meeting is on June 16, 2025.
- To appeal to the County Board of Appeal and Equalization, a property owner must first appeal to the Local Board of Appeal and Equalization if that meeting is held in the City. If the City has the Open Book Meetings, a property owner may go directly to the County Board meeting.
- The County Board of Appeal and Equalization follows the Local Board of Appeal and Equalization in the assessment appeals process.
- Again, if an interior inspection is denied no adjustment can be made to value per MN Statute.
- Their role is to ensure equalization among individual assessment districts and classes of property.
- If a property owner is not satisfied with the outcome of the County Board of Appeal and Equalization they can appeal to the Minnesota Tax Court.

Minnesota Tax Court


Depending on the type of appeal, property owners may take their case to either the Small Claims Division or the Regular Division of Tax Court until April 30th of the year in which taxes are payable.

It is my privilege to present the Spring Lake Park Police Department's Annual Report for 2024. As you read through the following pages, please keep in mind that this report provides a general overview of our day-to-day operations over the past year. It is not a comprehensive account of everything the department has accomplished, but rather a snapshot of our ongoing efforts to serve the community.

The year 2024 brought significant changes for the department, most notably with the remodel of City Hall. As part of this project, the Police Department moved into a new, state-of-the-art space located at the front of the building, complete with its own dedicated entrance. This modern facility enhances our ability to serve the residents of Spring Lake Park and has already shown positive impacts in officer recruitment and retention. We are grateful for this new home and the opportunities it brings.

Throughout 2024, our officers remained committed to delivering high-quality service, guided by our core values of Honor, Integrity, and Service. We continued to focus on community outreach and ensuring the safety and security of our residents. Programs such as Coffee with a Cop, Heroes and Helpers, and several Special Olympics events allowed us to strengthen our connection with the community. More details on these efforts can be found in the Patrol Division report.

Spring Lake Park continues to maintain its small-town character, even as we are surrounded by larger metropolitan areas. Notably, our overall crime rate and call volume decreased in 2024, despite a slight increase in officer-initiated activity, including traffic stops and resident interactions. We believe this proactive approach plays a key role in crime deterrence and will continue to encourage these efforts during patrol shifts.

In addition, we introduced new technologies and tools designed to enhance safety for officers, community members, and offenders alike. Information on these advancements can also be found in the Patrol Division report. These innovations support our mission: "To serve, protect, and enhance the quality of life in our community through Honor, Integrity, and Service." Thank you to our community for your continued trust and support of the Spring Lake Park Police Department in 2024 and in the years ahead. We are proud to serve you.

Lastly, I wish to thank our entire staff, City Administrator, Council Members and our community for their continued support of the Police Department.

Patrol Division:

The patrol division consists of six patrol officers and one school resource officer lead by two sergeants allowing for 24-hour coverage for our residents. A majority of our contacts with residents come from calls for service. Our officers have handled the increase of calls for service from the previous year while also conducting self-initiated activities such as traffic stops, neighborhood patrols, and after-hours business checks.

The start of 2024 brought on the remodeling of City Hall and the Police Department. The patrol division continued the high level of commitment to our community while assisting with extra assignments in order to make the transition to the new police department as smooth as possible. The police department moved from the rear of the building to a new addition with front access, and all of this required the patrol division to assist with moving items and setting up the new office and work areas.

In late 2024, we had two new officers join our department, bringing our staff of sworn officers to 11. The department was given approval to add a 12th officer, and we are actively seeking to hire for that position. The additional officer will allow increased coverage on the schedule rotation while allowing all officers to focus on their own physical and mental health. Many studies have shown this is a critical benefit to each officer personally, as well as to increase their effectiveness as officers.

* * *

The patrol division has implemented a variety of new tools, and each one is increasingly important as our officers have the overall goal of safety for everybody, including the offenders. Two of these tools are new "less lethal" options when dealing with an uncooperative offender. In 2024, the patrol division started using the 40mm launcher. These propel large less-lethal munitions, with the objective of gaining compliance without resulting in a higher level of force. In early 2025, the department will implement PepperBall, which consists of small projectiles that are deployed similar to that of a paintball. These projectiles contain a chemical irritant, and officers can deploy the irritant at a safe distance. The type of irritant also allows offenders to decontaminate more quickly than traditional pepper spray.

For the past couple of years, the department has been utilizing tools meant to enhance officer, community, and offender safety. One of these tools is a robot that can go up and down stairs, and allow the officers to view unknown areas without putting themselves in harm's way. The officers also have access to a pet microchip scanner. This scanner is used to reunite a lost pet with the owner in a timely fashion without the need of placing the pet on a hold. The patrol division also utilizes a mobile speed sign to help deter speeding in areas that we receive complaints.

Beginning in 2025, the patrol division will have a Traffic Safety/Patrol Officer position. This officer will assist in addressing neighborhood traffic complaints through the use of analysis, education, enforcement and follow up. This position will collaborate with fellow officers to help identify and prioritize locations that need attention. The patrol division will continue to participate in the department's "Selected, Intensified Traffic Enforcement" or "SITE" program along with the "Towards Zero Death" program, which is administered by the Minnesota Department of Public Safety.

During 2024, the patrol division continued our community outreach and education. We partnered with community groups and other agencies to help connect with our residents. Here are a few of the programs in which we participated:

- Participated with Special Olympics Minnesota for the Torch Run and Polar Plunge
- Assisted our Parks and Rec with Mature Drivers classes, Easter Egg hunt and Family Fall Fest, along with providing safety measures for Tower Days
- Met with our local Scouts groups
- Participated in Night to Unite block parties
- Partnered with SBM Fire for their Santa Parade and open house events
- Partnered with SLP School District on the Start Your Engines and Tower Days 5K Fun Run events

- Assisted SLP Lions with their Trunk or Treat event
- Partnered with neighboring agencies and school districts for the Heroes and Helpers events

Investigative Division:

The Spring Lake Park Police Department Investigations Unit is dedicated to serving our community and ensuring justice for crime victims by conducting thorough criminal investigations and empathetic victim communication. In 2024, our Investigator Tony Bennek, pursued our mission by performing investigations into various crimes against individuals and property.

Crimes against individuals encompassed armed robberies, aggravated assaults, criminal sexual assault, violation of protection orders, neglect of vulnerable adults, and child endangerment. Property-related offenses included fraud, property damage, burglary, motor vehicle theft, and retail theft, among others. Throughout the year, we delved into a total of 328 criminal cases and referrals from child and adult protection agencies, with 97 cases forwarded for charging consideration.

Beyond case investigations, Investigator Bennek assisted with managing evidence and property, squad car maintenance, oversaw civil forfeitures, and monitored our predatory offenders that reside in Spring Lake Park.

In addition to our investigative responsibilities, Investigator Bennek provided crucial support to the patrol division. This involved responding to complex and resource-intensive calls and covering open shifts due to manpower shortages.

Records Tech Division:

Our Spring Lake Park Records Technician Division continued to provide a high level of customer service and efficiency in 2024. The Spring Lake Park Records Technician Division staffs the front police department window at the Spring Lake Park Police Department and provides phone support for citizens Monday-Friday. In addition to helping connect citizens to public safety services, our records unit achieved the following:

- Processed approximately 6000 police reports and supplement reports
- Filed approximately 980 citations
- Processed 60 permits to purchase firearms
- Completed 400 local records checks
- Processed 133 criminal history queries
- Processed 47 background checks for city employment and business licensing, and Parks & Rec.



Reserve Division:

The Spring Lake Park Police Department Reserve Unit provided many valuable volunteer hours to the department and the community in 2024. During the course of 2024, our Reserve Unit consisted of one reserve lieutenant who worked one hundred fifty-three hours in our community throughout the year. The reserve unit provided services that would normally take up a considerable amount of time of our officers. This allows officers to focus on other incidents in our community. Utilizing the 2024 Dollar Value of Volunteer Hours for the State of Minnesota, this equated to approximately \$5,555.43 in wages saved.

On behalf of the entire department, we thank Reserve Lieutenant Rob Schmidt for his service and dedication to the police department and our community.

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS

Pursuant to due call and notice thereof, the regularly scheduled meeting of the Spring Lake Park City Council Worksession was held on May 05, 2025 at the City Hall, 1301 81st Ave NE, Spring Lake Park, at 6:00 PM.

1. CALL TO ORDER

MEMBERS PRESENT Councilmember Ken Wendling Councilmember Goodboe-Bisschoff Councilmember Lisa Dircks Councilmember April Moran Mayor Robert Nelson

STAFF PRESENT Public Works Director Linngren, Building Official Baker, Police Chief Antoine, Administrator Buchholtz

2. DISCUSSION ITEMS

A. Parking Ordinance Discussion

Administrator Buchholtz provided background on the proposed ordinance amendment to Section 7.08.020 of the City Code, which was prompted by resident concerns about parking near mailboxes interfering with USPS mail delivery, particularly in the 79th Avenue and Van Buren Street area. He explained that the Police Department found the existing ordinance language too vague for effective enforcement. He stated that in response to the Department's concerns, staff has proposed revisions to state that no vehicle shall be parked within 10 feet of either side of a curbside mailbox between 8:00 AM and 6:00 PM, Monday through Saturday, excluding federal holidays.

Chief Antoine and Administrator Buchholtz clarified that enforcement will primarily be complaint-based, though officers will cite violations if observed. Chief Antoine noted that violations will be issued as state citations rather than administrative tickets due to past inefficiencies and legal restrictions with administrative citation enforcement.

Councilmember Goodboe-Bisschoff inquired about communication efforts. Administrator Buchholtz stated that curbs would not be painted due to resource limitations. However, he said that outreach will include social media posts, newsletter articles, and coordination with the high school to educate students.

Councilmember Dircks inquired about the rationale behind the 6:00 PM end time, suggesting that USPS delivery in the area may occur later. Administrator Buchholtz agreed

to contact USPS to confirm local delivery hours and evaluate whether the end time should be adjusted.

Public comments were invited. Several residents expressed support for reinstating "No Parking During School Hours" signs along Van Buren Street and on 79th and 80th Avenues due to traffic, visibility, and access issues. A petition with 19 of 31 homes in favor was presented.

Councilmembers discussed the balance between neighborhood concerns and public access to streets. There was general support advancing the ordinance amendment and for studying the reinstatement of "No Parking During School Hours" signage on the specified streets.

Councilmembers also discussed reducing the snowfall parking restriction threshold from three inches to two inches to match actual plowing practices, which staff confirmed was the rationale.

CONSENSUS OF THE COUNCIL is to proceed with the ordinance amendment clarifying mailbox parking restrictions and updated snow removal thresholds, to study the reestablishment of "No Parking During School Hours" signage on Van Buren Street between 79th and 81st Avenues and on 79th and 80th Avenues between Able Street and Van Buren Street.

3. REPORT

A. Council and Staff Reports

Administrator Buchholtz reported on city-wide cyber-security upgrades, as required by CJIS requirements, to include stronger email encryption and filtering, multifactor authentication, and SEIM monitoring.

4. ADJOURN

The meeting was adjourned at 6:50pm.

Subject:	2024 General Fund Year End Transfers

The City's preliminary, unaudited financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2024, indicate that the General Fund closed the year with a surplus. The resulting fund balance exceeds the City Council's adopted fund balance policy, which sets a reserve target between 35% and 50% of budgeted expenditures. Staff is recommending a transfer of \$450,000 from the General Fund to various designated funds in support of planned capital projects and initiatives.

Purpose of Transfers

The proposed fund transfers align with key priorities of the City Council and support long-term infrastructure and equipment needs without requiring additional tax levies:

1. Park Equipment and Improvements Fund (Fund 226) - \$125,000

This allocation funds the full replacement of the deteriorated tennis and basketball courts at Terrace Park, which are beyond repair. As part of the project, the existing tennis court will be converted into four pickleball courts, consistent with the recommendation of the Parks and Recreation Commission and in response to growing community interest in the sport.

2. Forestry Fund (Fund 251) – \$50,000

With the ongoing Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) epidemic affecting the City's tree canopy, this additional funding will expand the City's ability to remove and replace infested trees in the City's rights-of-way.

3. Revolving Construction Fund (Fund 400) – \$75,000

This allocation contributes toward the City's share of the 2025 Street Improvement Project. Utilizing fund balance for this purpose reduces the need to levy taxes payable from 2026 through 2035 to reimburse the Revolving Construction Fund for the City's share of the project. 4. Sealcoating Fund (Fund 407) – \$100,000

Funding for crack sealing and sealcoating in 2025 is essential for extending the life of City streets and maintaining overall pavement quality. This proactive maintenance strategy reduces long-term repair and reconstruction costs.

5. Equipment Fund (Fund 434) – \$100,000

The additional funding for the Equipment Fund helps ensure the timely replacement of vehicles and equipment identified in the City's 2025–2029 Capital Improvement Plan, supporting effective and efficient service delivery across departments. Properly capitalizing the Equipment Fund eliminates the need to issue a certificate of indebtedness for planned equipment purchases.

Budget Amendment

To account for these transfers, a corresponding amendment to the 2024 General Fund budget is required. The line item for permanent transfers out (101-49000-7000) is increased from \$127,500 to \$577,500.

Recommendation

Staff recommends approval of Resolution 2024-33 authorizing the specified year-end fund transfers and amending the 2024 General Fund budget accordingly. These strategic allocations utilize surplus funds responsibly, reduce future tax burdens, and advance multiple City priorities in parks, infrastructure, forestry, and fleet management.

Re: New Engine & Rescue Purchase

As outlined in the SBM Capital Improvement Plan, staff intend to replace an aging fire engine and one rescue truck. Both apparatuses have reached the end of their NFPA recommended service life and will be replaced with modern, more reliable units that align with our current and future operational needs.

In conjunction with the planned replacements, SBM has significantly reduced the overall Capital Improvement Plan to more than \$2.5 million over the next five years. These adjustments reflect our commitment to fiscal responsibility and are designed to better align with our current and future operational demands. The revised plan prioritizes essential resources while maintaining a sustainable capital investment strategy.

Due to extended lead times and projected cost increases, we request authorization to place both orders now. The current lead time for the new engine is greater than 30 months, and the rescue is 7 months. Payment for both trucks will be due at the time of delivery. By placing the orders now, we are locking in current pricing and securing a production spot to ensure timely delivery.

SBM staff has developed detailed specifications and received quotes from three manufacturers. After a thorough evaluation, E-ONE has been selected to build both trucks. We are leveraging the HGAC purchasing consortium to ensure a streamlined procurement process that is both costeffective and compliant with public purchasing requirements.

- The Capital Plan budgeted \$1,075,000 for the replacement engine. The current quote for E-ONE is \$975,000, resulting in savings of \$100,000. However, if the order is delayed, a projected 12% price increase would raise the cost by approximately \$1,092,000, exceeding the budgeted amount.
- The budgeted amount for the rescue truck is \$430,000. The current quoted price is \$422,000, which is within budget. However, projected increases would bring the truck to \$472,640, exceeding the approved allocation.

We believe placing the orders now is both financially prudent and operationally necessary.



Police Report April 2025 Submitted for Council Meeting: May 19, 2025

The Spring Lake Park Police Department responded six-hundred and ninety-nine calls for service for the month of April 2025. This is compared to responding to eight hundred twenty-five calls for service in April of 2024.

- Pleasant View Dr NE will be one-way traffic going northbound from 79th Ave NE to 81st Ave NE

This change will allow for parking on both sides of the street, but still maintaining a traffic flow as there will not be opposing traffic. There will be temporary signage along the route during the weekend. As always, vehicles parked on the street are not allowed to block mailboxes or driveways. The area along 79th Ave NE along the park side of the street will be reserved as handicap parking, along with some motorcycle parking east of the entrance to the park. Please see the attached map for further explanation of the temporary change.

This temporary traffic flow change is only for the two days of Tower Days at Lions Lakeside Park during the hours of the festivities.

Subject:	Ordinance 503, Amending Parking Regulations

Ordinance 503 proposes targeted amendments to Section 7.08.020 of the Spring Lake Park City Code to improve clarity, enhance public safety, and address recent resident concerns about access to mailboxes and snow-related parking issues. The ordinance updates existing regulations and introduces new language, as outlined below.

The Ordinance amends Subsection D.2 to prohibit parking within ten (10) feet of either side of a curbside mailbox, between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m., Monday through Saturday (excluding federal holidays).

This amendment is aimed at ensuring clear and consistent access for USPS vehicles to support reliable mail delivery. The mailbox parking restriction was developed in collaboration with residents, Police Department staff, and USPS representatives to establish a practical and enforceable buffer zone around curbside mailboxes. A USPS postal worker noted that while the target for completing delivery routes is 4:00 p.m., it's common for deliveries to run until 6:00 p.m., with occasional delays pushing delivery as late as 8:00 p.m. Setting the restriction through 6:00 p.m. offers a reasonable buffer to accommodate the vast majority of delivery schedules.

The Ordinance also amends Subsection E, which reduces the minimum snowfall depth triggering a parking restriction from three inches to two inches. This change reflects how our Public Works Department already operates and helps the Department clear streets more quickly and effectively during winter weather.

Staff recommends adoption of Ordinance 503 and adoption of the resolution calling for summary publication of the ordinance.

Dear Mayor and City Council Members,

On April 7, 2025, residents from the 79th Street and Van Buren Street area brought forward concerns regarding student vehicles being parked near driveways and mailboxes, which they believe pose traffic safety issues within the neighborhood. In response, City Administration and the Police Department collaborated to draft a proposed ordinance to establish clear enforcement standards.

A City Council workshop was held on May 5, 2025, during which the proposed ordinance was discussed. Following consultation with the U.S. Postal Service, it was determined that the revised ordinance would require vehicles to be parked at least 10 feet away from mailboxes citywide between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. During the workshop, residents expressed broader concerns about any parking in the area during school hours and submitted a petition with 19 signatures, requesting that "No Parking During School Hours" signage be reinstated in the neighborhood.

At the Council's direction, further discussions were held with the local school. On May 12, 2025, City Administrator Buchholtz and I met with Principal Boucher to better understand the school's parking policies. Principal Boucher shared that the school currently provides 343 designated parking spaces for full-time student use, which are oversold by approximately 5%. An additional 70 parking spots in the staff lot are made available for part-time students. The annual cost of a student parking permit is approximately \$60 less than that of neighboring schools. Permits are generally limited to juniors and seniors, with limited exceptions for sophomores.

Principal Boucher acknowledged the school's limitations in accommodating all students seeking parking permits and reaffirmed the school's commitment to being a good neighbor. He indicated that the school is willing to support the City and Police Department in educating students about current and future parking regulations in and around the school.

City staff, including patrol officers and myself, have continued to monitor the Van Buren neighborhood. During routine checks, I have observed between 10 to 15 vehicles parked in the area, all of which were parked legally. While this does not rule out occasional issues, our enforcement efforts remain active and ongoing whenever violations are observed.

City Administrator Buchholtz and I have reviewed the ordinance and the potential reinstallation of "No Parking During School Hours" signage. At this time, we recommend updating the ordinance to include the new mailbox parking restriction and allowing staff additional time to explore other potential solutions to address the neighborhood's parking concerns. We believe there are several viable options, but further engagement with stakeholders and residents is necessary before a final recommendation can be made.

Please feel free to reach out to me with any questions ahead of the upcoming Council meeting—I welcome the opportunity to discuss this matter further.

SPRING LAKE PARK ORDINANCE 503

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 7 OF THE SPRING LAKE PARK CODE RELATING TO PARKING REGULATIONS

NOW THEREFORE, be it ordained by the Council of the Spring Lake Park, in the State of Minnesota, as follows:

SECTION 1: <u>AMENDMENT</u> "7.08.020 Parking Restrictions" of the Spring Lake Park Municipal Code is hereby *amended* as follows:

AMENDMENT

7.08.020 Parking Restrictions

- A. *Parking; Time Limit.* It shall be unlawful for any person to leave, park, permit, or allow any motor vehicle to stand or remain upon any city street or right-of-way for more than 24 hours at any time.
- B. Large Trucks And Commercial Vehicles; Parking Restricted.
 - 1. *Legislative findings*. The City Council finds that the parking of large trucks, tractors, and other commercial vehicles on the streets and rights-of-way within the city, for other than temporary parking for delivery or unloading, creates an unnecessary risk of personal injury, and often produces excessive noise.
 - 2. *Prohibition*. It is a violation of this chapter for any person to leave, park, permit, or allow any motor vehicle described below upon any public street or right-of-way:
 - a. Commercial trucks with over one ton carrying capacity;
 - b. Tractors used for hauling trailers;
 - c. Trailers (the type pulled by tractor); or
 - d. Commercial buses, except that school buses used in the transportation of children to and from school may be parked upon the street or public right-of-way between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. during the school year.
 - 3. *Exception*. Temporary parking of the above motor vehicles for delivery or unloading is excepted from this paragraph.
- C. *Property Standing On Right-Of-Way Restricted*. No property of any kind or description, except motor vehicles, together with property lawfully attached thereto, may be parked, stored, or permitted to stand upon any city street or right-of-way at any time, except as the same may be permitted by act of the City Council.
- D. Interference With Access Prohibited.
 - 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to leave, park, or permit any motor vehicle to be parked in front of or in a manner or place so as to that interferes with or

hinders access by persons or vehicles to mail boxes or receptacles therefor, or to park or permit to be parked any vehicle in a place or manner so as to obstruct or hinder access to any driveway, whether the same are public or private.

- 2. No vehicle shall be parked within ten (10) feet of either side of a curbside mailbox, as measured along the edge of the roadway or curb line, between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m., Monday through Saturday, except on federal holidays when mail is not delivered. This restriction is intended to ensure unobstructed access by authorized mail delivery vehicles.
- E. *Seasonal Restrictions*. It shall be unlawful for any person to park or permit to be parked any vehicle upon any city street between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 8:00 a.m. from November 1 through March 31. It shall also be unlawful for any person to park any vehicle upon any city street following a snowfall of <u>threetwo</u> inches or more in depth regardless of the time of day, until such time as the snow has been plowed curb to curb.

SECTION 2: EFFECTIVE DATE This ordinance shall have full force and effect upon its passage and publication.

The following is a summary of Ordinance No. 503, a copy of which is available in its entirety for review during regular office hours at the City of Spring Lake Park, 1301 81st Avenue NE, Spring Lake Park, MN, or for review on the City's website, <u>www.slpmn.org</u>.

The Ordinance prohibits parking within ten (10) feet of either side of a curbside mailbox between 8:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m., Monday through Saturday (excluding federal holidays), to ensure access for mail delivery; clarifies that obstructing access to driveways and mailboxes is prohibited; and modify winter parking restrictions to apply after snowfall of two (2) inches or more, rather than three (3) inches.

A complete copy of Ordinance 503 is available at Spring Lake Park City Hall during regular business hours and on the City's official website.

The Ordinance takes effect upon publication in the City's newspaper of record."



2025 MS4 Permit and SWPPP Update (193801776 Task 450). Pond, structural BMP, and outfall inspections are due annually. Program analysis and annual training is due by December. Annual meeting is usually held in June but can be held anytime. Annual Reports to the MPCA are generally due in June. Part 1 of new Permit Application was submitted on April 17, 2025. *MPCA will require documentation of partnerships with the watershed districts regarding construction inspections – need to do this in 2025.*

2024 Sanburnol Drive NE, Elm Drive NE, and 83rd Avenue NE (193806347). Construction started on June 10th. Final paving has been completed. A Contract Change Order has been processed to reflect miscellaneous changes that occurred during construction. *Project close-out will occur in June 2025. Message has been sent to Contractor instructing them to repair bad seeding areas.*

2025 Street 79th Avenue and Taylor Street NE Mill and Overly Project (193807275). The project includes 79th Avenue (between Able St. and TH-65) and Taylor Street NE (between 79th Ave and Osborne Rd.). A Public Improvement Hearing was held on December 2, 2024. Bids have been received. *Public Assessment hearing was held on May 5th.*

The current schedule for the major project tasks is:

City Hall Building (193806049). Design started in January 2023. Plans approved on October 16, 2023. Contract awarded on February 5, 2024. *Construction continues with final issues being addressed.*

1-Year Warranty Televising for 2023-2024 Sanitary Sewer Lining Project (193805871). Visu-Sewer continues with the 1-year warranty inspection. George Linngren is watching this. *Work has been completed. Waiting for final report from Contractor.*

2025 Seal Coat and Crack Repair Project (193807361). Includes streets north of Osborne Rd, east of Monroe St., and west of TH-65. Will also include Univ. Service Dr. and Terrace Road north of 81st Ave. Construction Contract with Allied Blacktop has been signed. *Late-June construction*.

Possible Future Storm Sewer Lining Project (19380xxxx). The CIP includes future lining of storm sewers. Public works is evaluating sewers for a possible lining project in 2025. *Quote request will be sent to contractors.*

Terrace Park Improvements Project (19380xxxx). The Parks and Recreation Director has identified repairs necessary for court repairs. A 2025 repair project will be completed.
