### RULES FOR DISCUSSION FROM THE FLOOR AND PUBLIC HEARINGS

## **DISCUSSION FROM THE FLOOR**

- Discussion from the floor is limited to three minutes per person. Longer presentations must be scheduled through the Administrator, Clerk/Treasurer's office.
- Individuals wishing to be heard must sign in with their name and address. Meetings are video recorded so individuals must approach the podium and speak clearly into the microphone.
- Council action or discussion should not be expected during "Discussion from the Floor."
   Council may direct staff to research the matter further or take the matter under advisement for action at the next regularly scheduled meeting.

## **PUBLIC HEARINGS**

The purpose of a public hearing is to allow the City Council to receive citizen input on a proposed project. This is not a time to debate the issue.

The following format will be used to conduct the hearing:

- The presenter will have a maximum of 10 minutes to explain the project as proposed.
- Councilmembers will have the opportunity to ask questions or comment on the proposal.
- Citizens will then have an opportunity to ask questions and/or comment on the project. Those wishing the comment are asked to limit their comments to 3 minutes.

In cases where there is a spokesperson representing a group wishing to have their collective opinions voiced, the spokesperson should identify the audience group he/she is representing and may have a maximum of 10 minutes to express the views of the group.

- People wishing to comment are asked to keep their comments succinct and specific.
- Following public input, Councilmembers will have a second opportunity to ask questions of the presenter and/or citizens.
- After everyone wishing to address the subject of the hearing has done so, the Mayor will close the public hearing.
- The City Council may choose to take official action on the proposal or defer action until the next regularly scheduled Council meeting. No further public input will be received at that time.

Pursuant to due call and notice thereof, the regularly scheduled meeting of the Spring Lake Park City Council Regular was held on September 7, 2021 at the City Hall, at 7:00 PM.

Administrator Buchholtz noted that Heidi Leaf was listed under "Others Present" in the August 16 City Council draft minutes but should have been listed under "Others Present" in the August 9 work session minutes instead. He asked that the Council to make that amendment to the draft minutes.

Motion made by Councilmember Wendling to approve the Consent Agenda, with the amendment to the minutes of August 9, 2021 and August 16, 2021 as stated above.

Voting Yea: Councilmember Wendling, Councilmember Delfs, Councilmember Dircks, Mayor Nelson. Motion carried.

#### 7. DEPARTMENT REPORTS

## A. Code Enforcement Report

Building Official Baker reported that the Certificate of Occupancy has been issued for 7813 Monroe Street. He stated that site work has commenced at 525 Osborne Road NE for the Suite Living assisted living/memory care project.

### B. Public Works Report

Public Works Director Randall stated that the tennis court at Terrace Park has been sealed. He noted that he is watching the progress at 525 Osborne Road.

## 8. ORDINANCES AND/OR RESOLUTIONS

## A. Resolution 21-32, Receiving Feasibility Report and Calling Hearing on Improvements - 2022 Street Improvement Project

Engineer Gravel submitted the Feasibility Report on providing improvement to Hayes Street NE, 80<sup>th</sup> Avenue NE, and Garfield Street NE. He said the report was authorized by Resolution 21-27, which was approved on July 19, 2021. He stated that the Feasibility Report includes a discussion of the existing condition of the streets, as well as a description of the improvements recommended for inclusion in the project. He stated the improvements include street rehabilitation and select repairs to the existing public storm sewer system. He stated that the estimated cost of the project is \$689,000 and that assessments are estimated at \$3,400 per lot.

Motion made by Councilmember Wendling to approve Resolution 21-32, Receiving Feasibility Report and Calling Hearing on Improvements – 2022 Street Improvement Project.

Voting Yea: Councilmember Wendling, Councilmember Delfs, Councilmember Dircks, Mayor Nelson. Motion carried.

## B. Resolution 21-33, Adopting Proposed 2021 Taxes Collectable in 2022

Administrator Buchholtz presented the proposed 2021, pay 2022, tax levy. He stated that the proposed tax levy is \$3,829,837, an increase of 5.46% from the current levy. He stated that the increase is due to a number of factors including employee salary and benefits costs, implementation of the compensation and classification study underway, mental health services for members of the Police Department, and general inflationary costs. He stated that the annual Truth in Taxation public hearing will be held on December 6, 2021 at 7:00pm at City Hall. He noted that the preliminary tax levy establishes the maximum levy for 2021, pay 2022, property taxes and that the final tax levy must be the same or lower than the preliminary tax levy.

Motion made by Councilmember Delfs to approve Resolution 21-33, Adopting Proposed 2021 Taxes Collectable in 2022.

Voting Yea: Councilmember Wendling, Councilmember Delfs, Councilmember Dircks, Mayor Nelson. Motion carried.

## C. Resolution 21-34, Cancelling or Reducing Bond Levies - 2021/2022

Administrator Buchholtz stated that State Law requires the County Auditor to levy the amount of debt service originally certified unless the City Council passes a resolution cancelling the levy. He stated that the proposed resolution cancels three debt service levies and reduces a fourth due to the City having funds on-hand to make the debt service payment. He stated that the debt service levies can be reduced due to revenues from a combination of Local Government Aid, Public Utility funds, special assessments, Municipal State Aid funds and General Fund budget allocations.

Motion made by Councilmember Dircks to approve Resolution 21-34, Cancelling or Reducing Bond Levies - 2021/2022.

Voting Yea: Councilmember Wendling, Councilmember Delfs, Councilmember Dircks, Mayor Nelson. Motion carried.

## D. Resolution 21-35, Granting Approval of Conditional Use Permit for Infinity Automotive at 8443 University Ave NE

John Shardlow, consulting planner at Stantec, presented the staff memorandum on the proposed request from Infinity Automotive for a conditional use permit for auto repair at 8443 University Avenue NE.

Administrator Buchholtz reviewed the recommendation from the Planning Commission on the application, recommended approval with the following conditions:

- The previous special use permit is voided with approval of this Conditional Use Permit
- Hours of operation shall be 7AM to 7PM, Monday through Saturday.

- Overhead doors are to be closed and all work on vehicles shall be performed inside the building.
- There shall be no outside storage of parts or equipment.
- No more than ten vehicles will be parked overnight (24 hours) on the front (west) side
  of the property and no more than twenty-four vehicles shall be parked overnight in the
  rear (east) side of the building.
- New landscaping shall be installed pursuant to a landscape plan approved by the City Planner by a date to be determined by the City Council for the west side of the property consisting of at least four overstory trees and at least twelve shrubs that will be 3 to 5 feet in height at maturity. All plant materials will be maintained for the duration of the Conditional Use Permit and will be replaced with approved equal if dead, damaged or destroyed. Administrator Buchholtz suggested October 31 as an appropriate date to complete the landscape plantings.
- If, in the opinion of the City's Building Official, the business satisfactorily follows the
  conditions in this CUP for a period of one year, the amounts owing on the outstanding
  administrative offense tickets will be waived by the City. If the conditions are not
  followed, new tickets may be issued and the additional amounts owing will be added to
  the existing amounts, with all such amounts to be certified to the property taxes to be
  paid in full.
- If the conditions of this permit are not met, the City Council may revoke the CUP under the provisions and process set forth in the City's Zoning Code.

Mayor Nelson expressed concern about the date proposed in the Resolution associated with planting landscaping, considering the drought the State is under. After further discussion, the City Council expressed comfort with November 1, 2021 and amended the resolution to require the landscaping be planted by that date.

Mayor Nelson stated that he felt that five-foot shrubs would be too tall, limiting site lines into the parking lot, which could screen criminal activity. He recommended the shrubs be no taller than 3 feet in height. There was no objection made by members of the City Council on this proposed amendment.

Councilmember Dircks asked that the language on Condition 6 be clarified. The City Council agreed to amend the first sentence of Condition 6 to read as follows: "New landscaping, pursuant to a landscape plan approved by the City Planner, shall be installed no later than November 1, 2021 on the boulevard at the front (west) side of the property, consisting of at least four overstory trees and at least twelve shrubs that will be 3 feet in height at maturity."

Motion made by Councilmember Dircks to approve Resolution 21-35, Granting Approval of Conditional Use Permit for Infinity Automotive at 8443 University Avenue NE, as amended.

Voting Yea: Councilmember Wendling, Councilmember Delfs, Councilmember Dircks, Mayor Nelson. Motion carried.

## A. Approve Job Description for Firefighter/Fire/Housing/Code Inspector Position and Fill Position

Building Official Baker presented the staff memorandum. He requested the City Council approve the job description and appoint Walter Morris to fill the newly created Firefighter/Fire/Housing/Code Inspector position. Administrator Buchholtz also requested the City Council approve Resolution 21-36, Firefighter Declaration of a Dual Position for Public Employees Retirement Association of Minnesota.

Motion by Mayor Nelson to 1) approve the job description for a new full-time Firefighter/Fire/Housing/Code Inspector; 2) appoint Walter Morris to fill the new position; and 3) approve Resolution 21-36, Firefighter Declaration of a Dual Position for Public Employees Retirement Association of Minnesota.

Voting Yea: Councilmember Wendling, Councilmember Delfs, Councilmember Dircks, Mayor Nelson. Motion carried.

## Dear city official,

Greetings from the Board of Directors and staff at the League of Minnesota Cities. We are writing to let you know that, after careful and deliberate discussions, the Board has adopted a 3% final dues schedule increase for the League's 2022 fiscal year. This is only the second dues increase in the past five fiscal years and reflects the evolving needs of our members in a post-pandemic environment.

Even though membership dues were held flat in fiscal year 2021 because of COVID-19 related concerns, we are pleased to report the League's operating and capital budgets were not significantly impacted by the effects of the pandemic. Our financial position remains healthy, backed by reasonable and stable fund balances and careful and deliberate planning for unforeseen expenses all reflected in positive audits.

As we noted in a letter to you in June, the past year has certainly been unique and challenging for all of us. Though the COVID-19 pandemic impact is not over yet, we are proud of our role in helping cities maintain budget stability over the past year through our advocacy for federal and state financial relief for our members, and through our efforts to keep League membership costs affordable. Our adopted budget does more than maintain the status quo by supporting expanded online learning for our members and broadens the League's capacity to respond to emerging issues and trends of our members.

You might recall that earlier this summer the League Board approved the staff recommendation to adopt a preliminary 4% dues schedule increase. The one percent reduction reflected in the final total was due to two primary considerations: 1) an increase in estimated 4M fee revenue; and 2) a reduction in the amount set aside for salary adjustments.

Attached is your 2022 membership dues invoice effective September 1. Please note that despite the fact that the scheduled dues increase for the coming year is 3%, a shift in your city's population might have an additional effect on the total dues your city pays for the coming year. ### FOURTH AMENDMENT TO TOWER LEASE AGREEMENT

THIS FOURTH AMENDMENT TO TOWER LEASE AGREEMENT (this "Fourth Amendment") is made and entered into on the date of the last party to execute this Fourth Amendment ("Effective Date"), by and between The City of Spring Lake Park, with an office at 1301 81<sup>st</sup> Avenue Northeast, Spring Lake Park, Minnesota 55432-2188 ("Landlord"), and Sprint Spectrum Realty Company, L.P., a Delaware limited partnership, successor in interest to Sprint Spectrum L.P., a Delaware limited partnership ("Tenant"). Landlord and Tenant are sometimes referred to collectively herein as the "parties" or each a "party".

### Recitals

The Parties hereto recite, declare and agree as follows:

A. Landlord and Tenant entered into a TOWER LEASE AGREEMENT, dated November 15, 1999, and a First Amendment, dated September 19, 2005, and a Second Amendment, dated November 17, 2014, and a Third Amendment, dated May 5, 2015 (the Tower Lease Agreement and the First, Second, and Third Amendments are collectively referred to herein as the "Lease") with respect to the water tower and property owned by Landlord and located at 8249 Arthur Street NE, Spring Lake Park, Minnesota 55432, the leased portion of which is herein referred to as the "Leased Premises".

B. Landlord and Tenant desire to enter into this Fourth Amendment in order to modify and amend certain provisions of the Lease.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, Landlord and Tenant covenant and agree as follows:

- 1. <u>Landlord Consent.</u> Landlord hereby grants Tenant the right and consents to Tenant's proposed upgrade/modification to the existing Antennae Facilities within the Leased Premises as described and depicted in the approved plan set dated May 25, 2021 which is attached hereto as Exhibit A-4 and by this reference incorporated herein, which equipment shall be considered part of the "Leased Premises" under the Lease.
- 2. Rent and Costs. The Rent that Tenant pays Landlord will be increased by Two Hundred and xx/100 Dollars (\$200.00) per Month as of thirty (30) days from the earlier of (a) the date of commencement of construction for the modification of the additional equipment, or (b) January 1, 2022. Thereafter, Rent shall escalate and be payable in accordance with the terms of the Lease. Tenant shall give at least five (5) business days' prior written notice to Landlord before commencing construction for the modification of the additional equipment contemplated in this Fourth Amendment. Tenant, and/or its designated construction contractor, shall be responsible for applying for and obtaining any necessary building permits and posting with Landlord any required escrow, bond, and proof of

insurance prior to commencing construction work. Tenant shall also schedule and participate in a pre-construction meeting with the Spring Lake Park City Engineer, prior to commencing any construction work.

- 3. <u>Approvals</u>. Each party represents and warrants to the other that the consent or approval of no third party, including, without limitation, a lender, is required with respect to the execution of this Fourth Amendment, or if any such third party consent or approval is required, the party requiring such consent or approval has obtained any and all such consents or approvals.
- 4. <u>Authorization</u>. The persons who have executed this Fourth Amendment represent and warrant that they are duly authorized to execute this Fourth Amendment in their individual or representative capacity as indicated, and are authorized to bind their respective entities, without qualification, to all terms contained herein.
- 5. Restoration. Tenant's right to occupy and use the Leased Premises as contemplated in Exhibit A-4 and pursuant to the terms of the Lease and this Fourth Amendment, is subject to the terms of the Lease and shall expire upon expiration or termination of the Lease. In the event of such expiration or termination, Tenant shall repair and restore the Leased Premises to the condition existing prior to the commencement date of the Lease between the parties affecting the Leased Premises, except for normal wear and tear and damage by the elements, unless a different agreement is reached, in writing, between Tenant and Landlord. If Tenant's equipment is not completely removed and the Leased Premises completely restored within 60 days of expiration of termination of the Lease, Landlord may remove Tenant's equipment and restore the Leased Premises, at Tenant's expense.
- 6. <u>Effect of this Fourth Amendment</u>. This Fourth Amendment shall only alter the terms of the Lease as specifically set forth herein. All other terms, provisions, obligations, and rights set forth in the Lease shall remain in full force and effect, subject to the terms of the Lease.
- 7. <u>Interpretation</u>. All capitalized terms used in this Fourth Amendment, unless otherwise defined herein, will have the same meaning as the terms contained in the Lease.
- 8. <u>Counterparts</u>. This Fourth Amendment may be executed in duplicate counterparts, each of which will be deemed an original.

**2021 MS4 Permit and SWPPP Update (193805251).** Annual Report and Public Meeting due by June 30<sup>th</sup>. Pond, structural BMP, and outfall inspections due by July 31<sup>st</sup>. Program analysis due in December. Coordination with CCWD related to TMDL information will happen as needed. The application has been submitted to MPCA for their review. Annual Public Meeting was held on July 6, 2021. Ordinance updates have been processed.

**Risk and Resiliency Assessment (RRA) and Emergency Response Plan (ERP) – Water System (193805314).** This is an assessment and evaluation of the water system based on requirements of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and Department of Homeland Security (DHS). ERP completion by 12/30/21. The RRA was completed and certified by the EPA at the end of June. *The next step is the completion of the ERP. The target date for completing the ERP is November 15, 2021.* 

**Utilities for 525 Osborn Road Project (193805012).** This city project was for off-site utilities for 525 Osborne Rd. Construction was completed in 2020. *Final Contractor payment will be processed one final close-out documents are received from Contractor.* 

Suite Living Spring Lake Park (Hampton Cos. project at 525 Osborne). Sewer and water connections have been made. Site work continues.

**Stormwater Utility Plan (193804944).** The city is considering a stormwater utility charge. Ordinance has been processed. *The next step is to work with billing department on implementation set-up.* 

**2021 Sewer Lining Project (193805204).** This project included lining in the general area between Terrace and Monroe and south of 81<sup>st</sup> Avenue. Terry Randall is watching this project. Construction Contracts have been signed. *A Preconstruction Conference has been scheduled for September 30<sup>th</sup>*.

**2021 Street Seal Coat and Crack Repair Project (193805205).** The 2021 area is the area south of 81<sup>st</sup> Ave. and west of Monroe St. Crack repair, seal coat, and sweeping has been completed. *Final contractor payment will be processes when documents are received from Contractor.* 

**Sidewalk Project:** Possible sidewalk improvements in Triangle Park and at City Hall. This work will be delayed until 2022 and may be combined with the 2022 Street Project.

**2022 Street Improvements Project (193805383).** This project will include pavement replacement in the Garfield-Hayes neighborhood. Resolution ordering Feasibility Report approved on July 19<sup>th</sup>. Feasibility Report was received on Sept. 7<sup>th</sup>. Neighborhood open house was on September 13<sup>th</sup>. *Public Improvement Hearing will be on October 4<sup>th</sup>*.

**2021 Storm Pond and Basin Inspections:** Staff has inspected storm ponds in the area east of TH65 and north of 81<sup>st</sup> Ave. in 2021. Repair work on many of the city (public) ponds has been completed. Letters have been sent to owners of private ponds to inform them of required maintenance.

### North Metro Telecommunications Commission Meeting Talking Points

# Market is Eager for New Issues



Market Commentary - September 15, 2021 by Shelby McQuay

### **Trends in Municipal Markets**

Once an issuer sells bonds and receives the proceeds, that's not the end of the story. Daily, municipal bonds are traded on the secondary market. On average, about \$10 billion of municipal bonds are changing hands each day. Issuers are typically unaware as it doesn't affect the interest rate or the payment the issuer received at the time of issuance. If you hold any bond mutual funds, this secondary market is the market those funds are most often trading in. Based on data compiled by Bloomberg, the par amount of bonds traded so far this year has marked a 22-year low. This trading slump leaves investors, including those sitting in cash, eager for any new offerings. Bloomberg has also tallied \$10.6 billion of new municipal offerings that are scheduled during the next month. The Bond Buyer's 30-day visible supply is just under \$14 billion. By either measure, this amounts to about \$10 billion less than the amount of cash that will be returned to bondholders as debt matures and is called for redemption. Investors will be looking to reinvest their cash. This demand for new issues is one of the primary factors keeping municipal borrowing rates from increasing.



Recently, municipal bond yields have exhibited tremendous stability, as demonstrated in the table above and the chart that follows. Municipal bond yields have been far less volatile than U.S. Treasury yields at nearly every point along the maturity spectrum, including the benchmark 10-year Treasury.


Weekly Rates September, 2020 - September, 2021



We do not anticipate this trend reversing through the end of the year, as heavy maturities and redemptions occur in December and January, while new issue volume wanes during the holiday period. In fact, many of our clients are proceeding with refundings that will be priced in the next couple months, assuming rates remain stable.

### Additional Unemployment Benefits Ending

In March, the federal government extended the \$300 weekly enhanced unemployment benefit. Following the federal extension, roughly half the states chose to forgo the extended benefit in the face of unmet labor demand under the notion that enhanced unemployment benefits were inhibiting workers from re-entering the labor force. Last week marked the official end to the federal extension. We may not be able to tease out the effects of the additional benefits for quite some time, if ever, with noise in the data like varied reopening rates and employees choosing to stay home for a number of reasons beyond unemployment benefits. However, the initial comparison data suggest that the increased unemployment payments had no statistical impact on the labor recovery rate among states that ended those benefits early.




Employers may be holding on to employees that they would have otherwise let go in light of the reemergence of pandemic related restrictions in the hospitality industries in particular. This could be propping up the statistics in what otherwise could be another dip due to the uptick in restrictions.

### **August Inflation Data Released**

The U.S. Consumer Price Index (CPI) for the month of August, as reported by the Labor Department, rose a seasonally adjusted 0.3% in August from the prior month. The CPI measures the change in prices paid by consumers for a basket of goods and services. The chart below from the Bureau of Labor Statistics shows the 13-month high in June. The recent downward trend may be support for the Fed's mantra that inflation is transitory, reinforcing its policy stance of keeping the fed funds target range unchanged. Thus far, it does not seem inflation data have been important to the Fed's decisions regarding its asset purchase program, with unemployment and economic growth being the primary motivators of potentially diminishing the amount of monthly asset purchases.

The year over year increase in August is 5.3%, well above the Fed's target rate of inflation of 2% (the Fed's preferred measure of inflation is the PCE deflator). In addition to actual data, the Fed also considers consumer expectations of future inflation. The Federal Reserve Bank of New York's Survey of Consumer Expectations reports that short- and medium- term inflation expectations rose to new series highs. Though respondents may not be "experts" in the area of economics and inflation, they buy "stuff," nearly all of which has gone up in price or is subject to backlogs (or both). Additionally, the Labor Department reported its Produce Price Index for August, which surged to its highest annual rate since 2010 at 8.3% year-over-year. This was on the heels of a 7.8% increase in July, which had also set a recent record. While future increases in prices may be transitory (meaning they will ebb from current elevated levels), it is highly unlikely prices will subsequently fall once inflation data becomes muted.

### **Municipal Bond Tax Law Changes**

This past weekend, the House Ways and Means Committee presented its= tax provisions as a part of the Democrats proposed reconciliation package, which includes three items this Commentary had mentioned in prior editions plus one additional policy proposal:

- Increase in the bank qualified limit to \$30 million, from \$10 million, and extended to the borrower level
- Restoration of tax-exempt advance refundings
- Creation of a new direct-pay tax advantaged bond program, much like Build America Bonds
- Expansion of the use of Private Activity Bonds (PABs)

The increase to the bank qualified limit affects issuers that reasonably expect to issue less than the stated threshold in a calendar year, which has not been increased since the tax reform act of 1986. Tax-exempt, comes with a tax-advantage which allows for more attractive after-tax yields for financial institutions, generally resulting in lower rates for the tax-exempt borrower.

Restoring the ability to issue tax-exempt advance refunding bonds has been regularly proposed since it was prohibited in the 2017 Tax Cuts and Jobs Act. If this provision is restored, tax-exempt advance refundings would allow issuers to refinance their existing debt with call dates greater than 90 days out at lower tax-exempt interest rates, thereby increasing savings (relative to taxable rates for advance refundings currently).

A new direct-pay bond program would mimic the program dynamics of the Build America Bond program of 2000. As was the case for the 2009 program, the issuer would pay the investors taxable interest that is subsidized by the federal government through a direct rebate to the issuer as a stated % of the interest amount. As a safety net, the current proposal alleviates the dynamic in which a portion of the subsidy was sequestered by the federal government, causing the net cost of such bonds to increase to issuers over time.

The final bulleted initiative, not previously packaged as part of municipal bond law changes, would allow additional access to the 4% federal low income housing tax credit by lowering the minimum financing requirement. Current law requires that multifamily housing projects must be more than half financed with PABs. The proposed legislation lowers the threshold to 25%.

Exciting as this may be for issuers of municipal bonds, the current proposal – the "Build Back Better" plan – has no Republican support.

### Municipal Market Comments

#### **Powell Wows And Ida Slams Gulf Coast**

If the rampant spread of California's wild fires wasn't enough to cast a sobering reminder that climate-related events can leave behind catastrophic damage, the passage of Hurricane Ida, attaining category 4 status as it made landfall, wreaked havoc upon the New Orleans area. Last week's hurricane brought about some horrific reminders of the devastation caused by Hurricane Katrina in 2005, 16 years ago to the day. *Thankfully, however, both the physical and human toll extracted by Ida were far less consequential compared to some of the more recent hurricanes, although we would maintain that the loss of even one life is of enormous proportion. If history is any guide, the overall economic impact of Hurricane Ida will become more exact over the days and weeks to come. With President Biden's swift emergency declaration for Louisiana as well as for Mississippi, access to FEMA money can now take place.* 

As preparations were being made in anticipation of Ida's arrival, market stakeholders were eagerly awaiting the start of this summer's Jackson Hole, Wyoming economic summit hosted virtually by the Kansas City Fed, with a keynote speech scheduled to be delivered by Chairman Jerome Powell last Friday. Without seeming like we are bestowing gratuitous accolades upon Mr. Powell, we were quite impressed with his messaging and while there was some degree of nuance in his delivery, we do not think that market stakeholders could have received a more thoughtful, balanced, and transparent commentary.

Let's not forget that this speech was widely anticipated to provide guidance on the level of Central Bank support for a tapering of the Fed's balance sheet before the end of the year. Leading into Jackson Hole, a number of key policymakers argued for near-term, decisive moves to slow the pace of asset purchases even in the wake of expanding Delta variant transmission rates. Some were also open in their views of when the tapering sequence should conclude and factored quite heavily into their policy calculus current thoughts of economic and inflationary metrics as well as the expectation that perhaps Delta is nearing its peak with a national economy proving its adaptability to the new health policy normal.

Interestingly, not only will the voter composition of the FOMC shift at the beginning of next year, Mr. Powell's

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term as Fed Chair expires in February, 2022, although President Biden has yet to announce his decision as to whether or not he intends to re-nominate Powell to a second term. *In our view, Chair Powell has represented himself and the Fed with distinction and the utmost integrity and we assign a high probability of him being nominated/confirmed to a new four-year term.* As we listened to the Chair's speech, there was clear indication that meaningful progress has been achieved on meeting the Fed's objectives for tapering asset purchases and that the process to pull back historical levels of accommodation is likely to begin this year with conclusion to come sometime in the first half of 2022.

Having said this, we have to acknowledge that the risks associated with the COVID variants are significant and that a slowing impact upon the economic rebound should not be ruled out, thus exposing the outlook for monetary policy to potential timing adjustments. While there is little concern that current economic momentum may be derailed, we could see some softening in labor market advances. In our view, the Fed understands the risks on both sides of the timing issue and so policymakers have taken careful steps to orchestrate an orderly process that would minimize any disruptive effects upon the financial markets. Some Central Bankers believe that the asset purchases have overstayed their welcome given, for example, overly inflated housing values that seem to be locking out certain first-time homebuyers and other lower-income candidates.

As part of his messaging, Chair Powell made it quite clear that the timing and pace of the tapering cycle would not signal the Fed's thought process on future hikes in the fed funds rate, which will be subject to a more stringent test. "We have said that we will continue to hold the target range for the federal funds rate at its current level until the economy reaches conditions consistent with maximum employment, and inflation has reached 2% and is on track to moderately exceed 2% for some time", according to Mr. Powell. He further noted, "We have much ground to cover to reach maximum employment, and time will tell whether we have reached 2% inflation on a sustainable basis."

During his speech, Chair Powell reiterated his transitory outlook for inflation and observed that global disinflationary forces remain, but noted that inflation at current levels may be a cause for concern and that Central Banks cannot rely on inflation being transitory, further admitting that it is difficult to distinguish transitory inflation from more sustained inflation. With wage growth consistent with the Fed's longer-term inflation expectations, there is little concern for a wage/price spiral and there is reason to believe that supply/demand imbalances should exhibit continued improvement. Mr. Powell reiterated the Fed's desire to anchor inflation at 2%, even if inflation spends some time above its 2% target.

We continue to maintain that the recovery demonstrates uneven performance, with certain sectors trailing others. We agree that initiating a rate tightening sequence could be harmful if it comes too early and if substantial slack remains in the labor market. Acknowledging that employment gains arrived faster than expected, Chair Powell commented that there is still a lot of ground to cover for achieving maximum employment. Market participants are awaiting the release of August's labor data for signs of further acceleration in job formation.

While there was no express timeline given for the Fed's balance sheet tapering, he did provide assurances that the Central Bank is prepared to adjust policy as needed. As it presently stands, *liftoff is priced in for early 2023, but we may see a migration to higher government bond yields given the emergence of several technical conditions during the tapering process as Treasury securities dealers lose their buyer of last* 

resort and find themselves formulating new risk assessment models. Having said this, continued strong foreign demand for U.S. Government securities, evolving COVID-19/ variant transmission concerns, and a still-dovish-biased global central banking community may very well combine to limit yield advances. For now, we would be hard-pressed to envision a 10-year benchmark Treasury yield much above 1.75% by the end of the year.

We began this week's commentary discussing the aftermath of Hurricane Ida and, again, we must be grateful that the impact was not far worse. With sustained winds of 150 miles per hour, Ida blew down over 2,000 miles of utility transmission lines and 216 substations owned and operated by Entergy Corp., leaving more than 1 million homes and businesses in Louisiana without power, with another 100,000 users left in the dark in Mississippi. As of this writing, while a number of customers in Louisiana have been brought back on line, Entergy Corp. has indicated that its system endured "catastrophic damage" and that it could take "weeks' to restore power to all of the company's customers.

Thankfully, while the power grid suffered extensive damage, the levees and other critical infrastructure rebuilt following Hurricane Katrina largely survived Ida's impact. Area hospitals, already crowded from COVID patients, came under intense capacity pressure. Now, rising water tables and area flooding create a primary concern. Chemical plants, refineries and the Louisiana Offshore Oil Port found themselves directly in Ida's path, significantly curtailing daily crude production and refining capacity. Damage to critical agricultural export infrastructure and container terminals are directly affecting grain shipments.

Typically, the impact to municipal credit following a natural disaster is manageable with FEMA recovery allocations made available to those jurisdictions under a national state of emergency declaration. Furthermore, various municipalities are benefitting from comfortable cash reserves and federal stimulus funding tied to pandemic recovery efforts. We do note that some of the weaker area municipalities may realize unexpected liquidity pressure and may take on greater credit risk. While it will take some time to assess fully the damages upon the oil and gas industry, prices at the pump have been driven higher, and can be expected to display volatility ahead of the extended Labor Day weekend.

Let's remember that the refining industry had already experienced a number of plant closures thanks to pandemic-induced demand weakness and last winter's Texas deep freeze. According to a number of reputable sources, Hurricane katrina was the most expensive U.S. natural disaster with a price tag approximating \$125 billion in total damages (2005 \$). With damages still being tallied, the latest figures place overall costs of between \$20-\$30 billion for Ida.

Prior to and following Jackson Hole, tax-exempt muni yields largely held steady. Throughout the month of August, long-dated muni yields rose 13 basis points, but much of that price weakness was captured within the first two weeks of the month. We suspect that had it not been for supportive summer technical conditions, munis would have likely exhibited even more volatility last month. Parsing the performance data for August, we can see the challenges of booking additional positive returns given such low absolute yield levels and the more limited potential for higher valuations. Of course, uncertainty and anxiety over Central Bank policy did not help matters. We would note, however, thinner secondary trading volume during August may have somewhat skewed overall performance for the month.

Throughout August, individual retail investors exhibited some resistance given frothy bond prices and a relatively greater degree of luxury to be more discerning when it comes to searching for value. With this in mind, municipal bond mutual fund flows have now been positive for 25 consecutive weeks as cash continues to be deployed, and we do not see anything on the horizon that would disrupt these substantive inflows. Against this backdrop, we do not foresee a material loosening up in credit spreads or even a substantive reversal in the currently rich muni valuations that have characterized the market for some time now. Of course, when the technical drivers alter course, let's be prepared to take advantage of likely investment opportunities.

It has been a while since the muni index displayed negative monthly returns, but this is what occurred in August. Although U.S. Treasury securities underperformed munis in early August with both benchmark indices turning negative thanks, in part, to the strong July employment report, UST returns for the month, while negative, outperformed the broader muni index, a loss of 17 basis points versus a loss of 37 basis points respectively. Year-to-date, munis are still outperforming UST, 1.53% versus (-) 1.43% respectively. *Again, a weaker technical environment for munis would have likely widened last month's performance gap.* 

The 10-year and in tenors all outperformed the broader muni index in August, with the 15-year and out maturities underperforming. The stronger shorter-end returns last month likely reflect weaker pent-up demand for longer-dated securities despite advancing reinvestment needs given sidelined expectations for higher tax rates and more visible market volatility against a backdrop of more prevalent inflationary concerns and a closer pivot in Fed policy that could pressure Treasury yields higher.

General Obligation bonds outperformed revenue bonds during August, a loss of 34 basis points versus a loss of 40 basis points respectively. We note that hospital revenue bond performance was somewhat softer than that of the broader revenue sector following previous months of outperformance. Various hospitals are being deluged by rising COVID/Delta caseloads with a renewed shift to less profitable ICU admissions from higher margin procedures such as elective surgeries.

Muni high-yield once again decidedly outperformed the broader index with a contained loss of 16 basis points and far outperforming the market through August 31<sup>st</sup>, returning 7.23%. *Muni IG spreads remain tight with frothy (albeit we have seen some recent cheapening), less attractive valuations particularly for higher quality cohorts, interest rates still remain historically low, and the search for yield amid improving credit conditions continues unabated and high yield investors are willing to take on heavier credit risk in order to book more compelling yield.* 

Accordingly, we can point to better high yield flow activity relative to other segments of the municipal bond market and we think that this dynamic could continue for a while longer, although it remains questionable as to how much more performance there is to unlock. As concern over rising interest rates mounts, high yield can act as a defensive strategy, yet for many names availability can be challenging. We note that certain sectors are normalizing in terms of spread and are being priced accordingly, yet others remain under pressure as the credit story plays out longer term.

Should there be sustained market disruption in the pace and/or direction of municipal fund flows with a market correction of material consequence given the currently low base level of yields, the muni high

yield sector could see a more pronounced widening-out in spreads (perhaps brought about by a credit event). While value can be found with acquiring high yield securities, high yield investors should exercise care when seeking alpha, as various credits are being structured with weaker covenants. We believe that tightly secured covenants are of particular benefit in a contractionary period whereby revenue disruption could occur.

We acknowledge that certain high yield issuers are diluting credit protection as a way to preserve some degree of debt flexibility with the knowledge that high yield product is in tight supply and above-market income is in high demand. We note that high yield municipal bond defaults are rising (especially among more highly speculative business models), against a generally stable high yield credit backdrop, with more recent transactions showing impairment and transitioning into eventual monetary default. Currently, we do not envision acute credit stress in the high yield space that could undermine performance through year-end.

With four months remaining in the year, we remain sanguine on the performance trajectory for munis as we continue to see new issue supply unable to keep pace with bond redemptions and maturing securities. Furthermore, now that the Fed appears to be approaching the beginning stages of the tapering process, with interest rate liftoff still a long way off, perhaps market participants can be less reactive to monetary policy pronouncements through the balance of the year (yes, we know this is wishful thinking). Although we believe that munis still have the ability to generate positive performance, admittedly such performance could be compromised should technicals become much less constructive and prospects for higher taxes fade considerably, even from currently elevated levels of doubt.

While technicals should remain supportive of muni performance, just how munis perform relative to UST will be largely determined by the Treasury market's response to Fed-speak, future inflationary data and viral transmission rates. In August, UST continued to reveal confidence in Central Bank guidance and held off from showing adverse reactions to the inflationary narrative, although volatility did emerge later in the month. The Fed is working overtime so as to avoid a repeat of the 2013 "taper tantrum", referring to the future easing of the Fed's QE program.

Even without a lift in federal tax rates, munis should continue to offer very desirable credit quality and diversification attributes, and these very attributes are expected to further entice foreign investment into the asset class. As for domestic banks and insurance company interest, we would expect to see continued value in the muni tax exemption for regional banks and P&C insurance companies. Of course, ongoing interest in taxable munis from foreign buyers should elevate muni placement upon the global investment stage. We advise a careful assessment of all muni portfolio holdings and we would encourage investors to engage in swap opportunities as a way to bolster overall portfolio credit quality and tighten in duration where appropriate.

While taxable muni returns turned negative in August, they still outperformed the broader muni index, declining 19 basis points and bringing year-to-date (through August) taxable returns lower to 1.76%. For several months now, we have seen less interest rate sensitivity exposure for the taxable muni index. August also saw more muted concerns over (i) advancing inflation, despite evidence of noted price pressure (ii) prospects for heavier stimulus, and (iii) a market hold-out for a balance sheet tapering – which is now just around the corner.

However, we think that taxable technicals had a heavier hand in the outperformance last month given lighter taxable muni supply and foreign buyer interest seeking favorable yield advantages, diversification attributes and above average credit quality. With more limited supply of taxable munis, domestic institutional buyers, which tend to have a heavier appetite for these securities compared with that of individual investors, actively participate in taxable offerings as a relative value play regardless of deal size, thus creating an attendant tightening of taxable spreads.

August saw a drop in taxable muni supply by 40% year-over-year as overall muni volume declined by 8.4% during the same time period. Lower taxable issuance comes as little surprise given prior quarters of outsized taxable volume. We think that a shift in issuer sentiment contributed to the lower August volume with a number of factors to consider. The infrastructure debate continues as Congress has yet to finalize infrastructure legislation and in the meantime, issuers are trying to assess their capital needs. Further, there are new state and local funding allocations that issuers are still trying to figure out how best to incorporate such funds into the budgetary process. The uncertainty surrounding Central Bank monetary policy and the added market volatility in the Treasury market was a contributing factor.

As long as rates are low enough and if you have a compelling enough spread environment that produces fertile ground for taxable advance refunding issuance, this structure will continue to be viable. We do note, however, part of that advance refunding need has been satisfied, and the rate and spread relationships are not necessarily as compelling as they were at the beginning of the year. With the August volatility and the attendant back-up in rates, such resultant market conditions have served to create lower taxable muni volume. We continue to expect aggregate taxable sales for 2021 to be around 20% of total muni volume as opposed to the 30% of full-year 2020 issuance.

Lower taxable muni volume can also be attributable to the use of financing alternatives such as forward-delivery bonds, private placements and the marketing of certain debt issued with corporate CUSIPS. Forward delivery bonds are a vehicle that provides, from an issuer perspective, a way to avoid or reduce interest rate risk and lock in savings by utilizing a structure that works like a current refunding, thus getting around existing call constraints. With forwards, however, an issuer may run the risk of a deal not closing should the purchase contract allow for certain investor outs, such as failure to attain a rating assignment, issuance of a qualified legal opinion, or loss of tax-exemption. Investors typically benefit from additional yield spread given the potential that they may be unable to take delivery of the securities.

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
