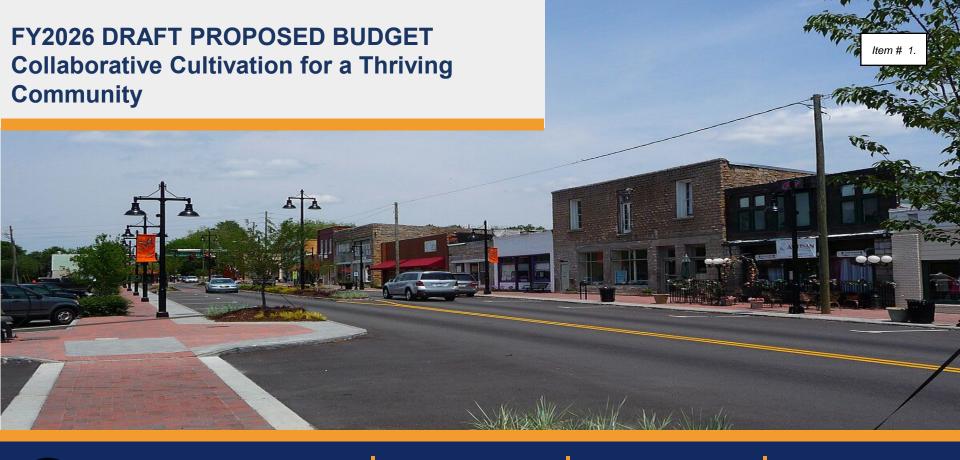

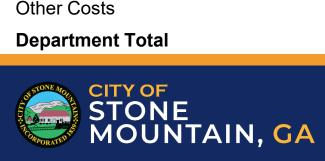

OVERVIEW

Stone Mountain Community Garden at VFW Park (SMCG) is an all volunteer effort and has been operating continuously since March 2011, as a partnership between the City of Stone Mountain and the Dekalb County/University of Georgia Extension Service (Extension Service). "We Grow Community." So far, the SMCG has provided 16,744 pounds of fresh produce to the Stone Mountain Ecumenical Food Pantry (Food Pantry) for distribution to local families with food insufficiencies — providing essential food for 4,186 families to date. This year, the SMCG has contributed over 910 pounds of fresh vegetables, fruits and herbs to the Food Pantry — helping 230 families.

The SMCG provides 54 spaces for individuals in the community to grow their own vegetables, fruits and flowers throughout the year. We maintain an apiary with three honey bee hives, a butterfly/pollinator garden, four composting systems, herb garden, children's garden, grape arbor, two vertical gardens and a newly added greenhouse. Pesticides are not used at the SMCG.

Master Gardeners support the Community Garden through the Extension Service. They play an important role in the community by providing gardening and environmental education — through workshops, classes and technical assistance onsite. At least one Master Gardener is on duty every Saturday morning and there is a Community Workday, the second Saturday of each month.

We continue to attract new gardeners and volunteers from the community.

CID has been researching several investigative platform service providers that meet the broadest needs of our agency. We have found that the information provided by our current provider, LexisNexis/Accurint, is often dated and results in the duplication of investigative efforts. Though there are many services that could benefit our agency, we have determined that some are too cost prohibitive for an agency/city our size.

With cost and results in mind, we are submitting the current proposal, which would end our services with LexisNexis/Accurint and ERAD in favor of CLEAR for Law Enforcement. This will decrease our monthly outlay in 2026, as we currently pay at least \$200.00 per month to LexisNexis for Accurint, and ERAD is \$4,950.00 per year (\$412.50 per month). We can end the Accurint agreement at any time and ERAD at year's end.

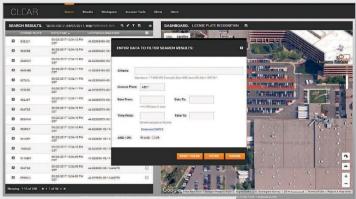

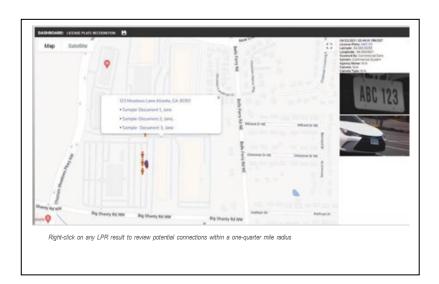

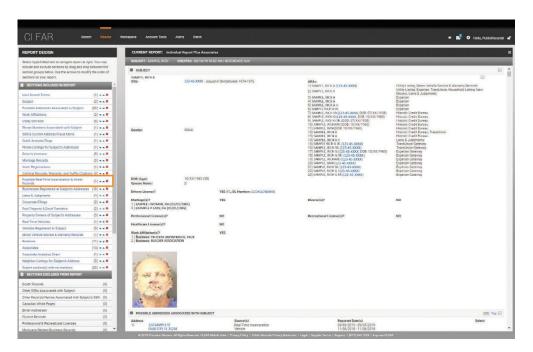

Item: Enter into a service agreement with Verizon Connect for vehicle tracking services.

Summary:

We request that a service sales order with Verizon Connect be initiated to provide vehicle location services (GPS) for the City's Police and Public Works vehicles.

Nearly one year ago, the City entered into a vehicle tracking agreement with GeoTab since it could integrate into the Enterprise Fleet Maintenance platform. When functioning property, the GeoTab devices will send certain telemetry to Enterprise (mileage data, engine codes). It additionally has an interface for customers to track vehicle locations.

However, the GeoTab platform has not performed to expectation. We've dealt with a high rate of device failure, which leaves us unable to track affected vehicles. We not only use GPS devices for accountability, but also to locate officers if they are not responding to radio. We depend on these devices as part of our safety equipment, so we must demand a reliable product.

It is our hope to enter into an agreement with Verizon Connect and cancel the service from GeoTab.

Resource Impact:

This will be paid through our regular budget under 5040.52.3900 (Other Purchased Services). We anticipate a reduction in cost due to this change. The monthly charges are as follows:

- \$19.25 per month per vehicle with GeoTab (current vendor)
- \$15.98 per month per vehicle with Verizon Connect (proposed vendor)

Summary:

Background

In January 2025, the City of Stone Mountain ("City") applied for the FFY 2025 Historic Preservation Fund (HPF)Certified Local Government Survey and Planning Grant. The Grant will fund \$18,000 toward an update to the 2009 Stone Mountain Historic Resources Survey, which is necessary to:

- (1) Enable the Stone Mountain Historic Preservation Commission (HPC) to accurately define the borders of the local historic district and ensure the status of historic structures within the regional and National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) districts are still eligible properties.
- (2) Assist city residents, where funding is available, with the rehabilitation of buildings and structures
- (3) Maintain an inventory of two hundred and fifty-five (255) documented historic properties, which have not been updated in the past 15 years due to funding constraints.
- (4) Maintain the City's Certified Local Government (CLG) status

The City of Stone Mountain has attained Certified Local Government (CLG) status which affords participation in a program implemented through the National Park Service (NPS) and the Georgia Department of Community Affairs (DCA) Historic Preservation Division (HPD), that integrates historic preservation policies into local planning decisions. The continuance of this status requires the City to prepare and maintain an inventory of historic properties using local surveys approved by the DCA HPD, that meet the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Identification and Evaluation of Historic Properties.

The benefits associated with CLG status include eligibility to receive historic preservation grant funds, technical assistance, access to statewide training, workshops, conferences, and exclusive review of National Register of Historic Places nominees, provided program requirements are maintained.

A RESOLUTION OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF STONE MOUNTAIN, GEORGIA, TO ACCEPT THE 2025 HISTORIC PRESERVATION FUND CERTIFIED LOCAL GOVERNMENT SURVEY & PLANNING GRANT

WHEREAS, the City of <u>Stone Mountain</u>, Georgia (the "City") identified the need for additional funding to maintain its Certified Local Government ("CLG") status by updating its 2009 Stone Mountain Historic Resources Survey through the solicitation of consultant services for the assessment of two hundred fifty-five (255) documented properties, and offering incentives where funds are available to property owners for improvement of historic properties within the City Area Map ("Map") attached hereto; and

WHEREAS, the City has achieved the Certified Local Government ("CLG") status through a program implemented by National Park Service (NPS), and the Georgia Department Community Affairs Historic Preservation Division (DCA) that that affords eligible municipalities opportunities to receive historic preservation grant funds, technical assistance, access to statewide training, workshops, conferences, and exclusive review National Register of Historic Places nominees if program requirements are maintained; and,

WHEREAS, the Historic Preservation Fund Grant Program (the "Grant") appropriated annually by Congress through the NPS has awarded the City funds in the amount of \$18,000 to assist in achieving these goals; and,

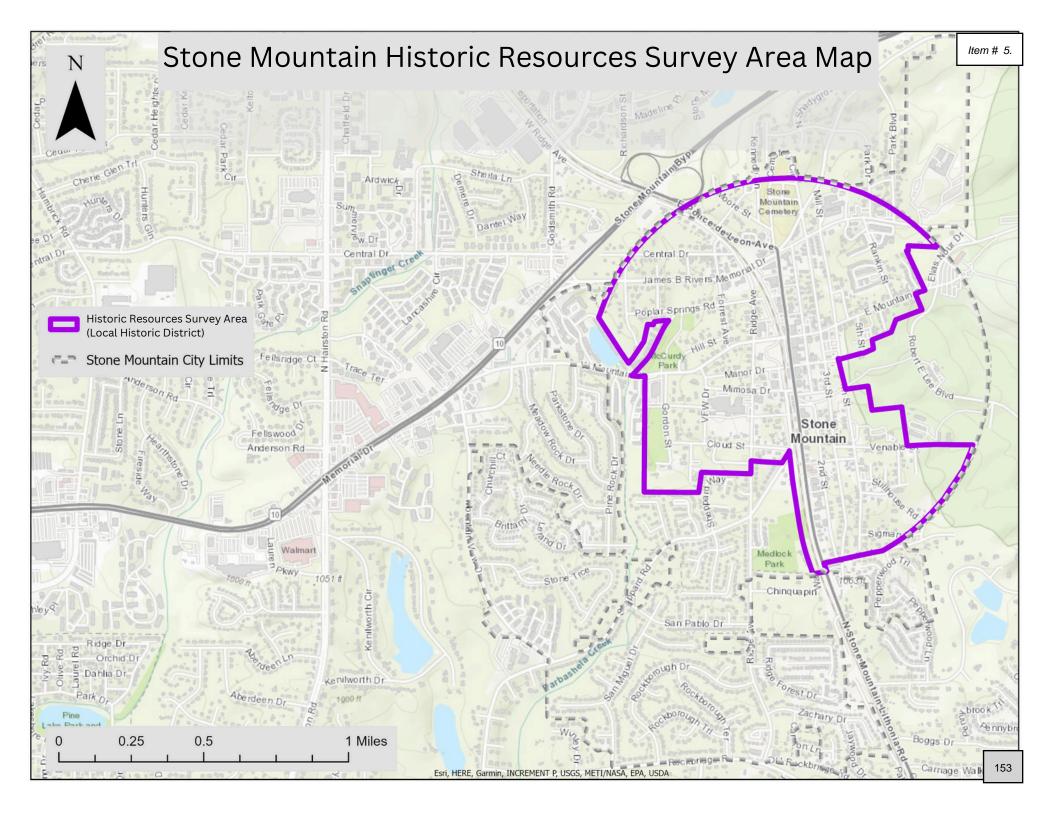
WHEREAS, the Mayor and City Council desire to authorize the City to contribute a forty percent (40%) match to the Grant as required by the terms of the Grant; and,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Mayor and City Council do hereby support the City's acceptance of the Grant Award as follows:

- 1. Officially accepts the grant funding in the amount of \$30,000 appropriated by Congress and administered through the NPS.
- 2. The required funding match on the part of the City is forty percent (40%), and the City shall contribute **Twelve Thousand** and 00/100 Dollars (\$12,000.00) in available funds, with said funds to be used to represent the City's required forty percent (40%) match for the 2025 Historic Preservation Fund CLG Survey & Planning Grant as awarded.
- 3. Authorize Mayor, City Manager, or an eligible designee, to enter into and execute all necessary agreements related to the Grant on behalf of the City.
- 4. Commits to fulfilling all requirements and obligations associated with the Grant, including but not limited to providing matching funds, submitting progress reports, and meeting state, federal and local regulations.

Certified Local Government Program: Preservation through Local Planning

Preservation activity occurs first at the local level; therefore, a community is in the best position to identify and protect its own resources. The Certified Local Government (CLG) program assists local governments with integrating historic preservation concerns into local planning decisions. Joining the CLG program is an important and effective way to preserve Georgia's historic places.

With the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, a federal and state partnership was initiated that created a national preservation program. The CLG program extends that federal and state preservation partnership to the local level. It enhances the local government role in preservation by strengthening a community's preservation program and its link with HPD.

In Georgia, the CLG program builds upon the longstanding working relationship between HPD and the local governments by expanding the scope of local responsibilities and opportunities for preservation. Any city, town, or county that has enacted an historic preservation ordinance, enforces that ordinance through a local preservation commission, and has met requirements outlined in the Procedures for Georgia's Certified Local Government Program, is eligible to become a CLG.

What are the benefits of becoming a CLG?

Once certified, a local government becomes eligible to:

- Apply for federal historic preservation grant funds only available to CLGs.
- Participate directly in the National Register of Historic Places program by reviewing local nominations prior to the GA National Register Review Board.
- Access technical assistance in the form of training sessions, information material, statewide meetings, workshops and conferences.
- Participate in partnerships among local, state, and federal preservation groups and organizations.

This Memorandum of Agreement ("MOA"), is made and entered into this 16th day of October, 2025 ("Effective Date"), by and between the Georgia Department of Community Affairs ("DCA") an agency of the State of Georgia, whose address is 60 Executive Park South, NE, Atlanta, GA 30329, and the CITY OF STONE MOUNTAIN ("City"), whose address is 875 Main Street, Stone Mountain, GA, 30083, collectively referred to as the "Parties."

WHEREAS, the State of Georgia is obligated to provide adequate public recreation and park facilities and to preserve scenic, historic, ecological and scientific sites while safely maintaining such areas to benefit all people;

WHEREAS, in accordance with Official Code of Georgia Annotated ("O.C.G.A.") §50-8-1 et seq., DCA is a department of the executive branch and has the power to enter into contracts for services and administer grants;

WHEREAS, O.C.G.A. §12-3-32 authorizes DCA to provide the above-mentioned services and facilities;

WHEREAS, O.C.G.A. §§12-3-5 and 12-3-32 authorizes DCA to contract and make cooperative agreements, leases, and rental agreements, with the United States Government, any county, municipality, local government, or any combination of same, any public or private

corporation, firm, or any persons whatsoever, any public authority, agency, commission or institution, or between state agencies, for any of the services, purposes, duties, responsibilities or functions vested in DCA; and

WHEREAS, DCA acts as the liaison between the State of Georgia and the National Park Service ("NPS"), U.S. Department of Interior, by administering the Federal assistance program for preservation of properties listed on the National Register of Historic Places, as provided by the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966; and

WHEREAS, the City has duly applied for and been awarded a matching Historic Preservation Fund federal pass-through grant ("Grant") in the amount of Eighteen Thousand Dollars and Zero Cents (\$18,000.00) for the City of Stone Mountain Historic Resource Survey as defined in Exhibit B such amount to be no greater than sixty percent (60%) of the allowable cost to the City of the project work, which is described, together with the budget for carrying it out, in Exhibit B, which is attached hereto and by reference specifically incorporated herein. Payments on a sixty percent (60%) reimbursement basis may be made at reasonable intervals and upon submission to DCA of a request for reimbursement, supported by required financial documentation and progress reports.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises, covenants and agreements contained herein, the Parties hereto agree as follows:

Section 1 Statement of Work and Terms

- 1.1 The City shall perform the necessary responsibilities as specified in the Scope of Work ("SOW"), stated in Exhibits "A-D," attached hereto, during the specified term of this MOA.
- 1.2 Project work shall be carried out in conformance with the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Evaluation, Identification, and Registration, part of the Secretary of Interior's Standards for Archaeology and Historic Preservation. At the completion of the project, all work will be reviewed by DCA in order to assure compliance with the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Evaluation, Identification, and Registration, part of the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Archaeology and Historic Preservation. Final products that do not conform to the applicable Secretary of the Interior's Standards and approved scope of work will not be reimbursed.
- 1.3 The City shall notify and obtain approval by DCA prior to employing or otherwise securing the services of any consultant to be compensated with funds provided for in this Agreement.
- 1.4 The City shall carry out the approved City of Blank Historic Resource Survey Phase 1 Project work between the date of written notification by DCA of the approval and **September 30, 2027**.

- 1.5 The City shall submit one copy of the first draft of the project to DCA for review and comment no later than **October 15, 2026**. The City shall submit one copy of the second draft to the DCA no later than **December 31, 2026**, for review and approval.
- 1.6 The City shall submit the required number of copies of the final project, as specified in Exhibit B, to DCA no later than **March 15, 2027**. This is the period of performance. All project work should be completed by this date.
- 1.7 The City shall notify DCA in the event of any of the following conditions:
 - a) Problems, delays or adverse conditions which will materially affect the progress of the project work.
 - b) The need for adjustment to the project work or cost estimates.
- 1.8 The City shall submit progress reports summarizing the status of project work. Such reports shall be submitted to DCA with each on a regular basis, until the completion of the project.
- 1.9 The City shall submit one (1) copy of the completion report along with the final reimbursement request. Final payment shall not be made until the completion report has been approved.
- 1.10 Any publications, exhibits, public announcements, news releases or presentation related to this project shall acknowledge federal assistance as follows: This (material or preservation project) has been financed with assistance from the Historic Preservation Fund, administered by the National Park Service, U. Section 2 Disbursements and Financial Records

- 2.1 Reimbursement under this MOA is contingent upon the local government's continuous compliance with all Qualified Local Government eligibility criteria, as established by DCA and adhere to local, state, and federal audit requirements, including the timely submission of required audit reports to the Georgia Department of Audits & Accounts.
- 2.2 DCA shall issue disbursements to the City in accordance with this MOA as follows:
 - a. DCA will disburse the Grant to the City in an amount not more than sixty percent (60%) of the allowable cost to the City of the project work, as approved by DCA.
 - b. DCA will disburse an amount not to exceed \$18,000.00 to the City not later than November 30, 2027 (60 days after the end date).
- 2.3 Payments on a sixty (60%) percent reimbursement basis may be made at reasonable intervals during project work and upon submission to the City of a request for reimbursement supported by required financial documentation and a statement of work accomplished to date. Reimbursements can only be provided against cash expenses.
- 2.4 Both Parties and any subcontracted parties shall maintain their registration with the System for Award Management ("SAM"), accessed at http://www.sam.gov. Failure to maintain registration can impact obligations and payments under this MOA and/or any other financial assistance or procurements documents the City may have with the Federal government.
- 2.5 Accurate records of all costs relating to the project work whether cash expenditures or donated services, materials or equipment shall be maintained by the City in a separate ledger, in accordance with acceptable management and accounting practices, and submitted to DCA. All record retention shall be in accordance with the regulations outlined in 2 CFR 200.333.
- 2.6 The City shall maintain financial documentation concerning the project work until a successful audit has been completed by DCA and DCA has notified the City in writing that such records are no longer needed. Copies of such records or any portion thereof shall be supplied to DCA upon request. For a period of three (3) years or until the City has been notified in writing by DCA that such records are no longer needed, whichever is earlier. The City shall maintain records of any other sources of state or federal funding for the project work in order that duplication of work or matching capability may be prevented. The City shall complete an audit within ninety (90) days after the end of the fiscal year in which the project ends and any other required financial or programmatic documentation as specified by the Single Audit Act of 1984 (31 U.S.C. 7501 et seq.) and all applicable Federal and State laws, regulations or guidelines.

Section 3 Notice

- Any and all notices, designations, consents, offers, acceptances or any other communication provided for herein shall be given in writing by e-mail, registered or certified mail, return receipt requested, by receipted hand delivery, by Federal Express, courier or other similar and reliable carrier which shall be addressed to the person who signed the MOA on behalf of the party at the address identified by DCA. Each such notice shall be deemed to have been provided:
 - (i) At the time it is actually received; or,
 - (ii) Within one (1) day in the case of overnight hand delivery, courier, or services such as Federal Express with guaranteed next-day delivery; or,
 - (iii) Within five (5) days after it is deposited in the U.S. Mail in the case of registered U.S. Mail.
 - (iv) From time to time, the Parties may change the name and address of the person designated to receive notice. Such a change of the designated person shall be in writing to the other party and as provided herein.

Section 4 Termination.

- 4.1 Termination Due to Loss of Funding.
 - a. The Parties hereto expressly recognize that DCA receives federal funding which is available to DCA for the purposes of contracting for the aforementioned services above, and therefore, the City expressly understands and agrees that all its rights, demands and claims to compensation arising under this MOA are contingent upon availability of such funds to DCA. In the event that such funds or any part thereof are not available to DCA, this MOA will terminate immediately.

4.2 Termination of Convenience

a. DCA may terminate this MOA at any time by written notice to the City of such termination and specifying the effective date thereof, at least thirty (30) days prior to the effective date of such termination. The City shall be paid its costs, including contract close-out costs, and profit on work performed up to the time of termination. The City shall promptly submit its termination claim to DCA to be paid.

4.3 Termination Upon Default

a. If the City fails to perform in the manner called for under this MOA, or if the City fails to comply with any other provision of the MOA, DCA may declare the failure to perform an event of default and shall serve a notice on the City setting forth the manner in which City is in default. If it is determined by DCA that the City had an excusable reason for not performing, such as a strike, fire, or flood, events which are not the fault of or are beyond the control of the City, DCA, after setting up a new delivery of performance schedule, may allow the City to continue work, or treat the termination as a termination for convenience.

Section 5 Federal Requirements.

Thus, costs associated with activities to influence legislation pending before the Congress, commonly referred to as "lobbying," are unallowable as charges to HPF-assisted grants, either on a direct or indirect basis (18 U.S.C. § 1913). Section 6 Miscellaneous.

- 6.1 This MOA sets forth the entire agreement and understanding between the Parties as to the subject matter hereof and merges all prior discussions between them; and neither party shall be bound by any conditions, definitions, warranties, understandings or representations with respect to such subject matter other than as expressly provided herein.
- 6.2 This MOA may not be modified or altered except in writing by an instrument duly executed by authorized officers of DCA and City. No other terms and conditions, oral

or written, be they consistent, inconsistent, or additional to those contained herein, shall be binding upon the Parties, unless and until such terms and conditions shall have been specifically accepted in writing by the Parties.

- Nothing in the MOA shall be construed as creating or constituting the relationship of a partnership, joint venture, (or other association of any kind or agent and principal relationship) between the Parties thereto. No party has the authority to enter into any contract or create an obligation or liability on behalf of, in the name of, or binding upon another party to this MOA.
- The laws of the State of Georgia shall govern and determine all matters arising out of or in connection with this MOA without regard to the choice of law provisions of the laws of the state of Georgia. In the event any proceeding of a quasi-judicial or judicial nature is commenced in connection with this MOA, such proceeding shall solely be brought in a court or other forum of competent jurisdiction within Fulton County, Georgia. This provision shall not be construed as waiving any immunity to suit or liability, including without limitation sovereign immunity, which may be available to DCA.
- With the express written consent of the other party, either party may assign in whole or in part, any of its rights and obligations here under to any other party, including its affiliates or successors, as may be provided by state and federal law program requirement, provided however, that notwithstanding any such agreement assignor retains primary responsibility for ensuring the obligations in Section 1 and Section 2 of this MOA are accomplished by an appropriate governmental entity.
- If any provision of the MOA is determined by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, such determination shall not affect the validity or enforceability of any other part or provision of the MOA. EXHIBIT B SCOPE OF WORK CITY OF STONE MOUNTAIN FY2025 HISTORIC RESOURCES SURVEY

The City will conduct a comprehensive historic resources survey of an <u>estimated</u> **438** (or as many as *funds will allow up to 500*) individual resources, which will include buildings, structures, sites, and objects, constructed before 1985, and located within the City of Stone Mountain. The survey area includes the National Register of Historic Places-listed Stone Mountain Historic District. The survey area is defined on the map attached to this contract as Exhibit C.

All project work shall conform to the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Archaeology and Historic Preservation, which include the Standards for Evaluation, Identification, and Registration. The project work will be prepared in accordance to (a) National Register Bulletin: Guidelines for Local Surveys: A Basis for Preservation Planning; (b) the Historic Preservation Division's guidance materials for identifying and documenting Georgia's historic resources, including the "Georgia Historic Resources Survey Manual, "GNAHRGIS Polygon Tool Comprehensive User Guide," and "GNAHRGIS Field Maps Demo," available online;" (c) the DCA's Georgia's Natural, Archaeological, and Historic Resources Geographic Information System (GNAHRGIS) web-based GIS database; (d) ArcGIS Online GIS geodatabases and map layers in the 'PolyTool Windshield District' folder provided by the SHPO (if applicable to project); and (e) the mobile app ESRI Field Maps (if applicable to project).

The City will ensure that the consultant(s) meets professional requirements according to the Secretary of the Interior's Professional Qualification Standards (36 CFR Part 61) and possesses the following:

- 1. A thorough knowledge of and familiarity with American architectural history;
- 2. Demonstrated experience in researching and describing historic resources, conducting architectural surveys, and writing historic contexts;
- 3. A thorough knowledge of and familiarity with identifying and evaluating Georgia's historic resources including architectural styles and types, the GNAHRGIS database, and survey procedures;
- 4. Demonstrated writing skills; and
- 5. Experience with digital photography.

The City will ensure that consultant(s) is familiar with data categories and procedures for the GNAHRGIS system and is aware of the information contained in **Exhibit D**.

The City will ensure that all survey data and digital photographs are entered in the GNAHRGIS online database within the contract period. All data groups in GNAHRGIS will be completed for each resource surveyed. The following photographic documentation parameters will be met:

- When utilizing the district polygon tool to survey a district, a minimum of ten (10) digital photographs for polygon resources will be uploaded, per the applicable district survey requirements outlined in the guidance materials referenced above.
- When surveying individual resources without using the district polygon tool, a minimum of two (2) digital photographs per individual resource will be uploaded per the applicable individual resource survey requirements outlined in the guidance materials referenced above.
- All photographs will **date to within six (6) months** of the survey date, per surveyed resource will be uploaded.

Resource information is entered and stored via the GNAHRGIS website. Printed (hard copy) resource "forms" are not required and are not reimbursable as part of this grant.

The City will provide a survey area map delineating surveyed parcels. The map will indicate the survey area boundary, any relevant local or National Register of Historic Places-listed historic district boundaries and any **proposed** amendments to existing boundaries, **ALL** addresses, legal parcels, **ALL** GNAHRGIS ID numbers and **ALL** street names, and be at a scale of 1" = 200'. The map will include a key explaining boundaries.

The City will provide a native digital copy in PDF file format of the survey report and the survey map, to DCA within the contract period.

The survey report is to include at a minimum:

- Executive summary, which includes the total number of surveyed resources;
- **Project description**, including how the survey was funded, who sponsored the survey, the name of the surveyor, and a general description of the survey area, including a clear statement and justification of the boundaries of the area surveyed, and the total number of surveyed resources;
 - In describing the survey's funding, include the following disclaimer:
 - "This (material or preservation project) has been financed with assistance from the Historic Preservation Fund, administered by the National Park Service, U. S. Department of Interior, through the Historic Preservation Division of the Georgia Department of Community Affairs. Any opinions, findings, conclusions or recommendations expressed in this [project/product] are those of the author(s) and do not necessarily reflect the views or policies of the Department of the Interior or the Georgia Department of Community Affairs, nor does the mention of trade names, commercial products or consultants constitute endorsement or recommendation by these agencies. - **Survey methodology**, including the fieldwork techniques and research methods employed while conducting the survey references to previous surveys and any re-survey completed as part of this project;
- Recommendations for future preservation activities, including: potential National Register nominations for individual resources and/or historic districts with basic boundary justification(s) for any proposed historic districts, as applicable; potential updates and/or amendments to existing National Register historic district listings, as applicable; designation recommendations for potential local historic districts, as applicable; and potential economic development, heritage tourism, and other preservation planning activities;
 - The following disclaimer must be included in this section:

 "This survey does not change the existing National Register nomination or listing in any way, including but not limited to: contributing/noncontributing status of properties, period of significance, boundaries, and/or additional documentation. Any amendments, additional information, increase or decrease of boundaries must be made through the formal National Register process outlined in 36 CFR 60, as amended."
- Survey results and architectural analysis, including the total number of surveyed resources divided into appropriate categories; a table listing all of the building types and all of the architectural styles as identified in GNAHRGIS, in addition to narrative defining the building types and architectural styles; local architectural character; some general observations (such as integrity and condition of resources, character-defining features, and apparent developmental trends), and local landmarks and eccentricities;
- Appendix 1: table listing all GNAHRGIS ID numbers associated with the survey paired with the address of the resource that each GNHARGIS ID number represents.
- Appendix 2: A survey map that delineates the survey area; existing local historic district and National Register-listed district boundaries and potential updates and/or

amendments to these existing district boundaries; and the boundaries of identified potential new historic districts (this map will be in addition to the separate 1"=200' map discussed above).

The above criteria are the minimum standards. For more detailed guidance on the survey report, please refer to the Georgia Historic Resources Survey Manual.

All project development by the City shall be reviewed by DCA. The review process includes reviewing and approving consultant selection, the consultant contract, GNAHRGIS data, draft data from Field Maps or an ArcGIS shapefile of polygons (if applicable to project), first draft of the survey report and map, subsequent drafts of the survey report and map, final draft of the survey report and map, and other materials determined necessary during project development.

Prior to review by DCA, the City shall review drafts of the survey report and map. The City shall ensure that the consultant provides GNAHRGIS survey data point documentation at the 25% and 75% data entry due dates.

The City will complete project work by the following due dates. Timelines will not be adjusted unless extreme circumstances require. Timeline adjustments will be requested and approved via written correspondence.

If funds allow for survey of additional resources outside of these boundaries, the consultant and the City should work with DCA to define additional survey area boundaries in a systematic manner.

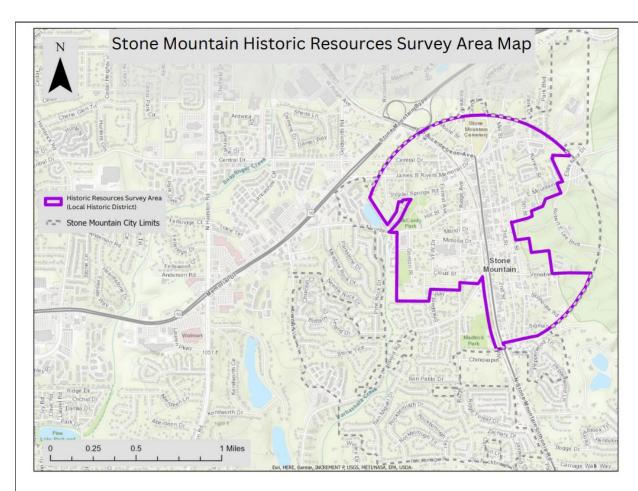


EXHIBIT D

NOTE ON RESURVEY OF RESOURCES CITY OF STONE MOUNTAIN FY2025 HISTORIC RESOURCES SURVEY

Include the following language in the Request for Proposal, as budgeting for resurvey of resources can impact cost and time allowances:

In 1993, the City of Stone Mountain was surveyed, and resources documented through this survey were later entered into GNAHRGIS with varying degrees of accuracy. Therefore, this survey will likely have a high number of resurveyed resources. The below image of GNAHRGIS shows resources located within and around the proposed survey area. This means the surveyor will need to identify previously-surveyed points in GNAHRGIS and link new survey data (or resurveyed resources) to the previous entry to avoid duplicate entries for the same resource.

The surveyor will need to find the previous point or GNAHRGIS ID number via an address search, by locating the resource geographically using the GNAHRGIS map, or by exporting survey data from the GNAHRGIS Public website and filtering the points to identify those within the current survey area boundary. The address search method for locating previously surveyed resources will likely be the most helpful within municipalities or when a resource's address is clearly defined. In more rural areas of the county, where an exact address may not be immediately apparent, the method of geographically locating the resources using the GNAHRGIS map will likely be more effective.

These points are not abled to be captured using ESRI Field Maps. These must be done within the GNAHRGIS system.

These processes are discussed in detail in the GNAHRGIS help guides located within the web site.

Account for this process in determining time and budget allowances for this survey.

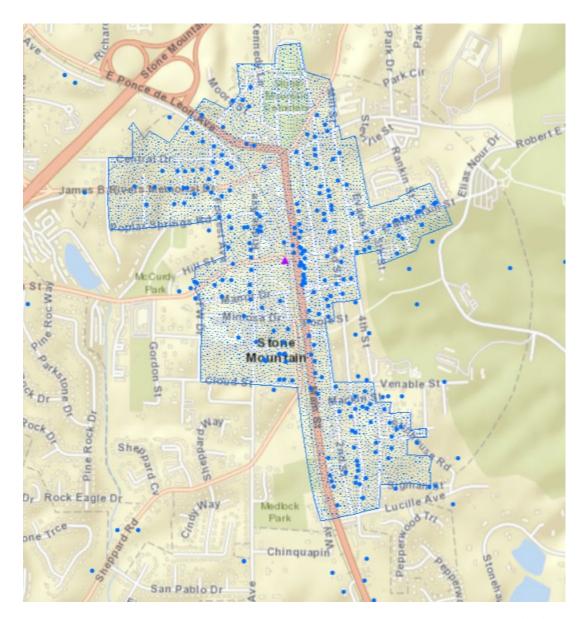


Figure 1 Screenshot of GNAHRGIS database of survey area, 9/12/2025

Subject: The applicant is requesting a Special Use Permit to allow for a small tattoo

studio.

Background:

According to tax records, the existing structure was constructed in 1942, according to current tax records. The duplex is 1,664 square feet and the applicant is requesting the special use permit for suite B – which occupies approximately 495 square feet of the duplex.

Analysis: Pursuant to Article II of the City of Stone Mountain Zoning Ordinance, Staff has reviewed the special use permit request in accordance with the required review criteria.

A. Whether or not there will be a significant adverse effect on the neighborhood or area in which the proposed use will be located.

The existing building hosts an existing commercial space, which has been used for salon/consumer services prior to this request. This request would not change the existing use of the building and requires no site changes to operate. There are no signification adverse effects anticipated on the neighborhood or area.

B. Whether or not the use is compatible with the neighborhood.

The proposed use is compatible with the neighborhood. There are several existing commercial or professional/institutional spaces in the surrounding area, situated along Main Street.

- C. Whether or not the proposed use will constitute a nuisance as defined by state law. It is not anticipated that the proposed use will constitute a nuisance.
- **D.** Whether or not property values of surrounding property will be adversely affected. Adjacent property values are not anticipated to be adversely affected through the establishment of the requested use.
- E. Whether or not adequate provisions are made for parking and traffic considerations. It is not anticipated that the proposed use will cause a burden on traffic. This is an existing commercial space that will utilize existing public parking, situated behind the existing commercial spaces.
- F. Whether or not the site or intensity of the use is appropriate.

The proposed use, as a tattoo studio, does appear to be appropriate for the area. The applicant has described the proposed use to be small in scale, with one resident artist and a single work-space, to achieve a low-foot traffic business.

G. The location or proximity of other similar uses (whether conforming or non-conforming).

Staff know of no other directly similar uses within city limits.

H. Whether or not adequate controls and limits are placed upon commercial deliveries.

It is not anticipated that any commercial deliveries, for the requested special use, will be required. However, the space is an existing commercial property, with adequate parking behind the building which would facilitate loading or deliveries, if necessary.

I. Whether or not adequate landscaping plans are incorporated to ensure appropriate transition.

The proposed use is for an existing commercial, village center mixed-use lot that has existing landscaping; no site changes are proposed.

J. Whether or not the public health, safety and welfare of the surrounding neighborhoods will be adversely affected.

The subject property is located along a corridor that has primarily commercial/institutional uses, with some single-family residences. The proposed use is not anticipated to produce adverse impacts on the public health, safety, and welfare of surrounding neighborhoods. There will not be an undue strain on resources (i.e.: schools, transportation, water) based on the characteristics of the proposed use.

K. Whether it is consistent with the Comprehensive Plan.

The property falls within the Mixed-Use designation on the Future Land Use Map, which calls for combined land use types that are often physically and purposefully integrated. The property also falls within the Historic Core Character Area, which encourages mixed commercial, professional, and residential activity that provides connection and maintains the historic nature of the City; the proposed use does not include a change to the existing character and development pattern for the area. This request is consistent with the Comprehensive Plan.

Staff Recommendation:

Pursuant to Article II of the City of Stone Mountain Zoning Ordinance, Staff has reviewed the request in accordance with the required review criteria and recommends **APPROVAL** of the Special Use Permit for a tattoo studio.

BACKGROUND:

Background:

A vacation home facility is defined as: "a residential type establishment, with commercial enterprise, offering whole house rental with no more than four lodging rooms for temporary occupancy for a fee that does not offer food to guest." The occupancy of the guest shall not exceed 14 consecutive days during any 90-day period.

The existing home was constructed in 1949. The home is 1,220 square feet, containing 2 bedrooms and 1 bathroom.

Analysis: Pursuant to Article II of the City of Stone Mountain Zoning Ordinance, Staff has reviewed the special use permit request in accordance with the required review criteria.

A. Whether or not there will be a significant adverse effect on the neighborhood or area in which the proposed use will be located.

The existing building is a single-family home, which is currently used as office space. This request would reduce the number of available long-term rentals for citizens in the City of Stone Mountain but would return the building to a residential use. There are no signification adverse effects anticipated on the neighborhood or area with the proposed staff conditions.

B. Whether or not the use is compatible with the neighborhood.

The proposed use is compatible with the neighborhood. This is an existing single-family home primarily surrounded by low-intensity or residential uses.

- C. Whether or not the proposed use will constitute a nuisance as defined by state law. It is not anticipated that the proposed use will constitute a nuisance.
- **D.** Whether or not property values of surrounding property will be adversely affected. Adjacent property values are not anticipated to be adversely affected through the establishment of the requested use.
- **E.** Whether or not adequate provisions are made for parking and traffic considerations. It is not anticipated that the proposed use will cause a burden on traffic. This is an existing single-family home with an established driveway/parking area.
- F. Whether or not the site or intensity of the use is appropriate.

The proposed vacation home facilities within the home does appear to be appropriate if accompanied by staff recommended conditions.

G. The location or proximity of other similar uses (whether conforming or non-conforming).

There is a Short-Term Rental – Homestay located on Poplar Springs Road; this similar use location is not significantly close to the requested use's location.

H. Whether or not adequate controls and limits are placed upon commercial deliveries. It is not anticipated that any commercial deliveries will be required.

I. Whether or not adequate landscaping plans are incorporated to ensure appropriate transition.

The proposed use is for an existing single-family lot that has existing landscaping and tree cover.

J. Whether or not the public health, safety and welfare of the surrounding neighborhoods will be adversely affected.

The subject property is located along a corridor that has primarily single-family residential homes that serve as the entry to Stone Mountain Park property. The proposed use is not anticipated to produce adverse impacts on the public health, safety, and welfare of surrounding neighborhoods. There will not be an undue strain on resources (i.e.: schools, transportation, water) based on the characteristics of the proposed use.

K. Whether it is consistent with the Comprehensive Plan.

The property falls within the Single-Family Residential designation on the Future Land Use Map, which calls for single-family residential uses. The property also falls within the Park Edge Character Area, which does not expressly call for residential land uses, but the proposed use is a continuation of the existing residential character and development pattern for the area. Generally, this request is consistent with the Comprehensive Plan.

Recommendation:

Staff recommends approval of the Special Use Permit with the following conditions:

- 1. The applicant shall apply for a Short-Term Rental Permit and Business License annually.
- 2. Provide no more than three lodging (guest) rooms with a minimum of 70 square feet per room.
- 3. Occupancy of a lodging room shall require at least 40 square feet per individual.
- 4. Occupancy by guest(s) shall not exceed 14 consecutive days during any 90-day period.
- 5. Vacation home facilities shall be required to have a smoke alarm in each lodging room (guest room) and a fire extinguisher visible and accessible to guests. The facilities are subject to at least one annual inspection at the time of initial licensing and during renewal of the same.
- 6. There shall be no on-street parking allowed for guests.
- 7. No business and advertising signs shall be permitted.

The Planning Commission voted to **recommend approval** of the request, with a vote of 6-0.
