c. Text Amendment to Massing Standards in the Historic District Presenter: Rebecca Brehmer, Projects/Planning Coordinator, CFM, CZO

At the regular October SHPC meeting, a request was made by the Historic Board to amend the massing standards to exclude small additions or projects. A draft text amendment was brought to the SHPC at the November meeting, and it was tabled for more review. The updated draft ordinance proposed to the Swansboro Unified Development Ordinance adds to *Appendix III Section 11.1 New Construction Standards* that if a small outbuilding is 150 square feet or less or if an addition of a home is 250 square feet or less or not visible from any street, a massing study is not required.

Recommended Action: Make a motion to recommend amending Appendix III Section 11.1 New Construction Standards to the Unified Development Ordinance and forward those recommended changes to the Planning Board for their review.

#### DRAFT ORDINANCE

WHEREAS North Carolina General Statute 160D-605 and 160D-701 requires that zoning regulations shall be made in accordance with a Comprehensive Plan; and

WHEREAS the Board of Commissioners finds that the proposed text amendment to the Unified Development Ordinance regarding a revision to the massing standards that massing studies do not apply to outbuildings and additions 100 sq. ft or less in the Historic District to be consistent with the Town of Swansboro CAMA LAND USE Plan updated January 22, 2019, and amended August 28, 2023.

NOW BE IT ORDAINED by the Town of Swansboro Board of Commissioners that the Town Unified Development Ordinance be amended.

Appendix III
HISTORIC DISTRICT DESIGN STANDARDS
SECTION 11 NEW CONSTRUCTION

11.1 New Construction Standards

(Text highlighted in yellow are amendments that need to be added to the Unified Development Ordinance.)

It is the intent of these regulations to assure that new construction, including additions to existing improvements, is congruous with the special character of the district. In considering new construction, the Commission and/or the Planner shall direct design that is harmonious with the character of the district. If a small outbuilding is 150 square feet or less or an addition of a home is a 250 square feet or less or not visible from any street, a massing study is not required.

**Overview:** On December 7<sup>th</sup>, 2023, two SHPC members, Kim Kingrey and Elaine Justice, and the Projects Planning Coordinator attended the Historic Resilience Workshop held by the NC School of Government in New Bern.

The workshop summarized three new resources that have recently been released on these topics: "Historic Resilience Primer", "A Handbook for Historic Resilience Community Planning", and "Resilience Design Standards". All of these resources can be found at the Historic Resilience Project Website (<a href="https://live-sog-hrp.pantheonsite.io/">https://live-sog-hrp.pantheonsite.io/</a>). Those who went found it to be a very relevant and needed topic of discussion with a good portion of our Historic District being at direct risk from natural hazards such as hurricanes. The resources give ready to go templates on community engagement and design standards ready to be adopted into our ordinance.
