Council President Baldwin addressed the voluminous crowd, and explained that the room capacity cannot exceed 175 as per the Fire Marshall.

Council President Baldwin advised that Council was back on the record at 7:45 for the regular meeting.

All Present Stood for Salute to Flag.

Council President Baldwin asked Mr. Starkey for a summary of the Executive Session.

Mr. Starkey advised that a personnel matter concerning department head salaries was discussed during the Executive Session portion of the meeting.

REPORT OF MAYOR/COUNCIL/ADMINISTRATION

Mayor's Report- Vito Perillo

Mayor Perillo had no report.

Engineer's Report- Thomas Neff

Mr. Neff discussed resolution R-18-187 on tonight's Consent Agenda regarding the bid for the Heritage Boulevard Pump Station Project. Mr. Neff explained that the purpose of the project is to provide a series of upgrades to the pump station as well as the removal of a manhole. He announced that the Hance Park improvements are nearing completion; and next month he will begin the process of awarding a bid for the Borough Hall curb and sidewalk replacement.

Finance Director- Thomas Fallon

Mr. Fallon reported that the Borough received their Independent Audit Report for 2017. He stated that it is an excellent report of the Borough's financial statements, transactions and operations and explained that it was considered a clean opinion with no adjustments, comments or recommendations reported. Mr. Fallon personally thanked the Borough employees involved with the financial processes for working as a team for the benefit of the Borough. He discussed that there will be a resolution on next month's meeting agenda to approve the Audit Report. Mr. Fallon referenced two resolutions on tonight's agenda and explained that in reference to R-18-180 the Borough received the allocated funds for the Clean Communities Grant, which will be inserted into the budget through said resolution. He stated that R-18-186 authorizes the Tax Collector to mail 3rd quarter estimated tax bills however they are waiting on State approval of the tax rate, and cannot be mailed out until this approval goes through.

Borough Administrator- Michael Skudera

Mr. Skudera discussed Resolution R-18-183, the Mayor's appointment of DPW Director Mark Shaffery. He stated that Mr. Shaffery has done an excellent job as interim director and thanked him for his work maintaining Borough parks, roads, and sewers. Mr. Skudera spoke about the several Eagle Scout projects in progress in Tinton Falls and how the Borough is working to streamline the approval process with a proposal form on the Borough website.

Director of Law- Kevin Starkey

Mr. Starkey had no report.

Borough Clerk's Report- Melissa Hesler

Ms. Hesler had no report.

Council's Report

Ms. Fama thanked those in attendance tonight for their interest and dedication to resolving the major issues at the Hance-Sycamore intersection. Ms. Fama stated that she and fellow Council members have met with county officials to discuss this issue. Council will continue to listen to the feedback and concerns of residents and will continue to have the Borough's best interest in mind.

Mr. Pak echoed the words of Councilwoman Fama and discussed the meeting he had with Monmouth County on July 5 in regards to the data, study, and proposal of the project. He explained that the county is analyzing the busy traffic pattern between the hours of 7:30-9:00 AM. Mr. Pak stated that he and Council are looking for a proposal that is less intrusive, but most importantly safe. He discussed his thoughts on a traffic light being installed at that intersection and doesn't believe this solution will be effective. He states that the county is receptive to these concerns and is working to create a more flexible solution.

Mr. Siebert thanked the public for attending tonight's meeting and for their interest and ideas that council has received via email, he assured residents that council is taking the time to review all comments and they are considering the Borough's best options.

Mr. Manginelli had no report.

Mr. Baldwin reported that the County engineers are reading and reviewing all of the letters submitted by the Borough's concerned residents. He stated that Council has also read through all of the comments and are working to ensure the County will be receptive and responsive to all. Mr. Baldwin asked Mr. Neff, Borough Engineer to address some of the rumors and misconceptions regarding the Hance-Sycamore intersection.

Mr. Neff stated that he is speaking strictly from an engineer's standpoint in an effort to provide the facts. He addressed a rumor that Hope Road, south of Sycamore will become a county road. Mr. Neff stressed that the county has no plans to take over Hope Road. He discussed the process in which the county would have to follow in order to acquire Hope Road, which includes getting the permission of the Borough. Mr. Neff clarified that the Borough has no plans to widen Hope Road and also stated the County has no plans to widen Hance or Sycamore. Mr. Neff briefly addressed traffic concerns and explained that the plans being discussed tonight are only preliminary concepts and are not final.

PUBLIC DISCUSSION OPEN

Joseph Augustine, 1188 Sycamore Avenue- Mr. Augustine discussed his frustrations with traffic on the western end of Sycamore Ave. He stated that he has spoken with local authorities and Tinton Falls Sgt. LoPresti in regards to speed reduction on this road. He addressed Mr. Pak and council's reports that the County has control over this road, he stated that the people of Tinton Falls are the county and should have a say in this matter. Mr. Augustine inquired whether or not this project has any correlation to the revitalization of Fort Monmouth. Mr. Baldwin explained the purpose and plan of FMERA and addressed any traffic concerns.

Michael Fasano Esq. and Rich Lomuro Esq. Attorneys for residents- Mr. Fasano and Mr. Lomuro explained that they represent a group of concerned residents in town. They inquired whether or not Council will pass a Resolution opposing the two proposals presented by the County. He stated that the people of Tinton Falls want assurance from Council that they are not in agreement with these two plans. Mr. Starkey, Director of Law explained that the county has come before the council on two occasions with presentations and various proposals in search of both Council and resident input. The county is working on another proposal with the public's feedback in mind. Discussion ensued regarding the County's proposals.

Erin Rudowski, 22 Wilkens Court- Ms. Rudowski voiced her concerns with the Hance Sycamore intersection and stated that she is in favor of lowering the speed limit as well as a traffic light to slow down the heavy flow of traffic. She discussed her opposition against widening these roads as it will promote heavy traffic.

Pam Farley, 206 Riverdale Avenue East- Ms. Farley questioned whether or not Mr. Pak is in agreement with the residents. Mr. Pak clarified that he is 100% committed to the residents of Tinton Falls and will continue to support and address their concerns. Ms. Farley inquired whether or not the County has any plans to address the residents and Councilwoman Fama explained that they will be back to present their next proposal as soon as it is ready. Ms. Fama voiced her support for the residents and stated that she lives her too and will continue to do what is best for the Borough.

Carola D'Enery, 76 Hope Road- Ms. D'Enery inquired when the County is going to come back with a new idea and a different proposal, since they have received the emails from concerned residents. Mr. Baldwin explained that it is unclear at this time when this will be but he is hoping that it will happen as soon as possible. Ms. D'Enery asked that council consider lowering the speed limit on these roads. Mr. Baldwin explained that Council cannot make any promises however they are also concerned about the speed.

Bill Schutte, 15 Birchwood Court- Mr. Schutte explained that the issue at this intersection exists between the hours of 7:30AM- 9:30AM and 4:30PM-6:00PM. He suggests simpler solutions to this issue rather than widening roads and taking property from residents.

Peter Karavetes, 784 Sycamore Avenue- Mr. Karavetes personally thanked Mr. Pak, Ms. Fama, and Mr. Siebert for their dedication to this issue. He questioned Mr. Starkey as to why Council cannot adopt a resolution and vote no in opposition of the County's plans. Mr. Starkey stated that because it is a County road, the County has the authority to make the final decision. The Freeholders and the County Engineers have the legal power to make these decisions, the Borough Council does not. Mr. Karavetes respectfully disagreed and stated that the only way the Council can show their opposition to plans one and two is through a resolution. He inquired about the 4 ton weight limit on Hope Road and asked why the Borough does not enforce this law. Borough Administrator Skudera stated that he will have the Police Chief look into this issue.

John Clark, 36 Fairfield Drive- Mr. Clark discussed the County's proposals and his concerns about the traffic at this intersection. He described his fears of the County taking over Hope Road and asked the Council to put this in writing to ensure Hope will remain a Borough Road. Mr. Neff discussed the County's reasoning behind widening the road and adding two turn lanes and explained that this will benefit the residents who live on these roads.

Josh Peruti, 51 Cloverdale Circle- Mr. Peruti inquired about alternative ways to notify residents about upcoming meetings regarding the Hance-Sycamore issue. Mr. Skudera discussed the Code Red System and how to sign up for text-message alerts through the Borough website. Mr. Peruti also voiced his concern with the speed limit on these roads and the danger of fast traffic.

Stephen Scarepicco, 77 Hope Road- Mr. Scarepicco asked to hear from all four members of the Borough Council in regard to their positions on this matter. He discussed his concerns with the speed limit and the safety of Borough

residents. Mr. Baldwin addressed Mr. Scarepicco's concerns and explained that his number one priority is to ensure the county choses a safe solution.

Debra McNally, 793 Sycamore Avenue- Ms. McNally discussed the Tinton Falls Master Plan and stated that the council should use this as a guidebook to address the county's proposals. She explained that lowering the speed limit and adding sidewalks in this residential area could help control the heavy flow of traffic that moves through this neighborhood. She states that this is a very unique issue and the Borough should consider hiring a safety expert to examine the intersection and propose a safe solution.

Rich August, 793 Sycamore Avenue- Mr. August voiced his disappointment with Council for not discussing their personal feelings on the County's proposals. He also stated that traffic enforcement can help solve this issue with police presence at this intersection. He encourages Council to do the right thing and protect the residents of Tinton Falls

Michael Simpson, 25 Devon Court- Mr. Simpson voiced his concerns with the Hance-Sycamore intersection and stated the Master Plan should have been referenced during this process. He inquired about the County process and asked if residents are able to meet with any County representatives to discuss their feelings on this situation. Mr. Baldwin referred him to the County Freeholders meeting. Mr. Simpson addressed traffic and pedestrian concerns and suggested ways the Council and residents can work together to solve this issue.

Maryann Zaleski, 29 Edison Avenue- Ms. Zaleski discussed traffic and safety issues at this intersection and encouraged the Borough and County to explore other options. She expressed her feelings and frustrations with this issue and illustrated how this intersection impacts her daily life. She also inquired about voicing her concerns to the County. Mr. Baldwin and Mr. Starkey referred her to Joe Ettore and Tom Arnone and announced their upcoming Workshop meeting.

John Davies, 7 *Palermo Drive*- Mr. Davies addressed the need to regulate the flow of traffic between these two roads and believes that some of the County proposals are too robust for this intersection. He discussed possible alternative solutions to calm the flow of traffic such as the integration of a traffic signal without widening the road. Mr. Davies

inquired about eliminating heavy truck traffic on Sycamore. Mr. Neff explained that the Borough could coordinate with the DOT and the County to mandate weight restrictions on these roads. Mr. Baldwin thanked Mr. Davies for his suggestions and encouraged other residents with an engineering background to discuss alternative options with the County.

Allen Lewis, 141 Cherry Street- Mr. Lewis briefly spoke about traffic concerns and referenced similar intersections in Monmouth County.

Ron Wollner, 8 Green Meadow Drive- Mr. Wollner voiced his sympathy for residents who live along Hance and Sycamore and addressed his concerns with the safety of this particular intersection. He suggested the installation of a traffic light at this intersection to correct this dangerous roadway and to keep people safe.

Frank Valentino, 108 Riveredge Road- Mr. Valentino discussed the massive redevelopment project of Fort Monmouth and the increase in traffic this will bring, particularly worsening the situation at Hance and Sycamore.

Michael Terzano, 18 Society Hill Way- Mr. Terzano voiced his concerns with the overblown development and construction in Tinton Falls. He discussed alternative solutions to this issue that would be less intrusive rather than the elaborate plans the County has presented.

Barbara Turning, 32 Periwinkle Circle- Ms. Turning inquired about the status of the Borough Newsletter. Mr. Skudera explained that this project has been budgeted for however nothing has been done yet. She also inquired about Community Day and Mr. Skudera clarified that it is coordinated by Councilman Pak and Chief Scrivanic, the event will be held in October, an official date has not been set. Ms. Turning questioned who represents Tinton Falls during the FEMERA meetings and Mr. Baldwin explained that the Mayor is the first representative, however if he cannot attend he would take his place.

There being no further comments from the public, Mr. Manginelli offered a motion to close the Public Discussion, seconded by Mr. Pak.
