There were no reports.

MANAGER'S REPORT:

Manager Medrud reported the joint session with the City Council has been scheduled at 6 p.m. on December 12, 2023. The Commission will receive two meeting notices for attending in person or remotely. The Commission is scheduled to meet following the conclusion of the joint meeting.

AMENDMENTS:

Planner Smith-Erickson recapped the series of briefings and questions about the Old Highway 99 Corridor Plan. She introduced Mary Heather Ames, Assistant Director of Transportation and Engineering.

Commissioner Kirkpatrick noted that the corridor plan appears to apply to the corridor beginning at 79th Avenue. The plan calls for expanding the highway to four lanes from 79th Avenue to 88th Avenue. He asked about the segment north from 79th Avenue to Tumwater Boulevard. Assistant Director Ames advised that the corridor plan is from 73rd Avenue to 93rd Avenue. The plan continues recent improvements completed from the recent Capitol Boulevard project. The plan recommends four lanes between 73rd Avenue and 88th Avenue and two lanes from 88th Avenue to 93rd Avenue. Tumwater Boulevard is located north of 73rd Avenue. A project completed approximately two years ago widened the highway to four lanes to the south of Tumwater Boulevard. The corridor study focused on the area south of those recent improvements.

Chair Robbins asked about the planning horizon for project improvements to serve additional growth in the area. Assistant Director

Ames explained that the traffic analysis forecasted a planning horizon of 2040 for peak hour traffic (worst-case scenario).

Commissioner Tobias referred to the presence of endangered species in Tumwater. He asked about potential impacts to the Mazama pocket gopher, which inhabits the airport area. Manager Medrud replied that the Olympia subspecies pocket gopher and the Streaked Horned Lark have primary habitat in the area of the Olympia Regional Airport. Commissioner Tobias asked about any anticipated impact to both species because of the project. Manager Medrud replied that overall, the impacts would be minor; however, any construction project requires a gopher study. If gophers are present, the project requires a series of federal permits, or if the City's Habitat Conservation Plan has been completed, the plan provides for a federal incidental take permit.

Commissioner Staff asked about planned lighting along the corridor and potential impacts to airport operations. Assistant Director Ames replied that the plan did not address illumination in detail. The City would follow street standards for illumination as the corridor is improved. The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) has specific requirements for illumination, which would be considered as the plan is implemented.

Assistant Director Ames referred to a question concerning bike lanes. For the majority of the corridor, the plan calls for a dedicated bike lane on the southbound (airport side) with a multi-use path located on the northbound side of the corridor comprised of a 10-foot wide combined walking and bicycling path for northbound traffic. The southbound side of the corridor has limited opportunities for stopping with the lane used primarily by bicyclists commuting whereas the northbound side of the corridor has many opportunities to stop and visit local businesses. The northbound bicycle lane would be bi-directional.

Planner Smith-Erickson requested the Commission schedule a public hearing on the two proposed amendments on December 12, 2023.

MOTION:

Commissioner Von Holtz moved, seconded by Commissioner Tobias, to schedule a public hearing on December 12, 2023 for Ordinance No. O2023-002, Final Docket for 2023 Comprehensive Plan Amendments. A voice vote approved the motion unanimously.

2025 COMPREHENSIVE PLAN PERIODIC UPDATE – LANDS FOR PUBLIC PURPOSES & Planner Smith-Erickson briefed Commissioners on two elements of the Comprehensive Plan Periodic Update - Lands for Public Purposes Element and the Utilities Element. The Commission is asked to review existing elements and consider specific issues and topics to address. Staff will review recent legislation on new requirements to incorporate diversity, equity, and inclusion within the update and the guidance

UTILITIES:

materials for updating the elements.

The State Growth Management Act (GMA) requires cities to demonstrate each element in the Comprehensive Plan meets the relevant 15 planning goals in the GMA. For both elements, the update focuses on urban growth goals to encourage development in urban areas where adequate public facilities and services exist or can be provided in an efficient manner, and ensuring public facilities and services necessary to support development are adequate for the next 20 years.

The Lands for Public Purposes Element includes: (1) Inventory of existing capital facilities owned by public entities; (2) Forecast of the future needs for such capital facilities; (3) Proposed locations and capacities of expanded or new capital facilities; (4) Lands for Public Facilities Element Maps showing the locations of the existing capital facilities owned by public entities; and (5) Essential Public Facilities and siting.

Capital facilities include:

- Transportation Systems
- Solid Waste Management (Landfill and Hazardous Waste)
- Sewage Treatment Facilities and Sanitary Sewer Systems
- Stormwater Systems and Facilities
- Water Systems and Facilities
- Parks, Recreation, and Open Space
- Fire Protection and Emergency Medical Services
- Police Protection
- School Facilities (Tumwater School District and Olympia School District)
- Library Services
- City Facilities

Chair Robbins inquired as to whether school facilities only include grade school rather than a community college. Manager Medrud explained that the policies are intended to create the opportunity for siting schools. Schools, such as a university would fall under the category of "essential public facilities." The City needs to allow for and accommodate for those types of land uses.

Commissioner Kirkpatrick asked whether the inventory of parks and recreation facilities within the element would be updated. Manager Medrud advised that the category of capital facilities apply to the Parks and Recreation Plan. Staff is considering options to accommodate an update, but it is unlikely to be accomplished as part of the Periodic Update process. Staff and City Administration are discussing options

for updating the Parks and Recreation Plan.

2016 Capital Facilities maps in the element include:

- Sewage Treatment Facilities and Sanitary Sewer System
- Stormwater Systems and Facilities
- Water Systems and Facilities
- School Facilities, Library Services, City Facilities

The Lands for Public Purposes Element includes Essential Public Facilities that are difficult to site such as:

- Airports
- State Education Facilities
- Large Scale State or Regional Transportation Facilities
- Correctional Facilities
- Solid Waste Handling Facilities
- Inpatient Facilities
- Mental Health Facilities
- Sewage Treatment Facilities
- Emergency Communication Towers and Antennas

Manager Medrud added that in 2022, the Commission considered potential amendments to the section to address substance abuse facilities in the City and where the use could be located. Some facilities were approved by the Thurston County, which have since been annexed to the City. Some of those facilities wish to expand and the City needs to consider the possibility given current regulations that prohibit expansion. Language in the Comprehensive Plan for Essential Public Facilities is similar to the language in the regulations, which requires an amendment to the Comprehensive Plan when changes are implemented in the code. Part of the update process is intended to minimize including the code within the Comprehensive Plan.

Chair Robbins asked whether the City currently has all nine uses. Manager Medrud advised that the City does not have state education facilities other than the education facilities located at the Brewing and Distilling Center as part of South Puget Sound Community College, as well as any solid waste handling facilities. The LOTT Clean Water Alliance owns property within the City for future development of a satellite plant connected to the main plant. However, LOTT has since moved away from that particular model and the future use of the property is uncertain at this time.

Planner Smith-Erickson reported the City is required to establish a process or amend its existing process for identifying essential public

facilities and the sites for those facilities. The current code includes the uses and zoning codes. The City must identify and site the expansion of essential public facilities.

The Utilities Element addresses the general location, proposed location, and capacity of all existing and proposed private utilities, such as natural gas, electricity, telephone, utility pipelines, cable television, cellular, and broadband internet. A utilities map of existing facilities is included in the element.

Some of the 2025 topics to address as part of the update for Lands for Public Purposes Element include:

- Address Organics Management Facility Siting (ESSHB 1799).
- Update inventory and projected needs for public buildings, facilities, and services over the 20-year planning period.
- Use the updated City and urban growth area 20-year population forecasts.
- Update provisions for protection of the quality and quantity of groundwater used for public water supplies.
- Allow expansion of the area in the City that would allow for essential public facilities such as inpatient facilities as part of Planning Commission's 2022 Comprehensive Plan amendment cycle recommendations.
- Group A water system plans must include climate resilience element if initiated after June 30, 2024.

Chair Robbins asked whether Organics Management Facilities mostly pertains to timber harvesting. Manager Medrud said the category applies to household waste rather than agricultural waste. Some commercial operations could be included as well as multifamily complexes.

2025 topics to address during the update of Update Utilities Element include:

- Include all electrical, telecommunication, and natural gas systems and make a good faith effort to gather information from them (E2SHB 1181)
- Update general location, proposed location and capacity of all existing and proposed gas, electric, cable television, and telecommunications to year 2045.
- Update wireless telecommunication facilities information as needed.
- Update the general location, proposed location, and capacity of all existing and proposed utilities.

- Incorporate provisions of the updated 2023 Hazard Mitigation Plan as appropriate
- Update Maps.

Planner Smith-Erickson reported the public comment period for the Hazard Mitigation Plan closed on November 17, 2023. Thurston Regional Planning Council (TRPC) submitted the core plan and some draft annexes to the Washington Emergency Management Department for a 30-day review. After receipt of the plan with comments, the plan will be submitted to the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) for a 45-day review.

Manager Medrud reported one comment from a Tumwater resident was included in the plan addressing how the community will understand the elements of the plan.

Planner Smith-Erickson reported some new requirements include special consideration for environmental justice in goals and policies (E2SHB 1181) in all elements and addressing Organics Management Facility Siting (ESSHB 1799).

Planner Smith-Erickson shared an illustration of the format for the Conservation and Utilities Elements. Staff is utilizing Department of Commerce Guidance Materials to assist in the update:

- Periodic Update Checklist for Fully Planning Cities (Commerce, March 2023)
- A Guide to the Periodic Update Process Under the Growth Management Act – Fully-Planning Counties & Cities (Commerce, 2022)
 - o Commerce Periodic Update Materials, including:
 - Capital Facilities Planning
 - Capital Facilities Planning Guidebook (Commerce, October 2014)
 - Stormwater
 - Building Cities in the Rain: Watershed Prioritization for Stormwater Retrofits (September 2016)

Next steps include completion of the gap analysis by November 2023, a briefing to the General Government Committee on December 13, 2023, and to the Public Works Committee on January 18, 2024

Manager Medrud noted the Periodic Update survey is available on the City's website. A postcard will be mailed to all City residents on December 4, 2023. The City has received 160 survey responses to date.

Commissioner Tobias commented on recent changes in technology with fewer people using landline telephones or subscribing to cable opting instead to livestream broadcasts. He asked about the plan's ability to account for required infrastructure to support an increase in various types of new uses such as cellular and streaming services. Manager Medrud said the plan is a high-level review of utility uses that could be sited in the City. The telecommunications chapter is very comprehensive. Overall, the review is at a higher level but accounts for future technology changes.

2024 LONG RANGE PLANNING WORK PROGRAM:

Manager Medrud reported the briefing and discussion would help guide staff in preparation of the joint work session with the City Council on December 12, 2023 to review the 2024 Long Range Planning Work Program.

The work program is prepared annually to guide the Community Development Department's work. It also serves as a way of prioritizing work items based on staffing capacity. The work program includes a section on many other projects (below the line) that lack the necessary resources to pursue. The process for establishing the work program enables the Commission to recommend projects to consider. The development of the work program is outlined in Section 18.60 of the Tumwater Municipal Code.

The proposed 2024 Long Range Work Program includes four main categories and associated projects:

- 1. Comprehensive Plan Amendment Docket Approximately 33% of all budgeted staff time. 2025 Comprehensive Plan Periodic Update (continued from 2022-23)
- 2. Development Regulation Amendment Docket Development Code Periodic *Update*, Urban Forestry Management Plan Amendments – Landscaping, Street Tree Standards, and Tree and Vegetation Preservation, and other Amendments (The urban forestry amendments are carried over from May 2023 when staff learned of the state's Wildland-Urban Interface Code. Efforts on the amendments ceased until staff reviewed how the new requirements might affect the City. It is likely efforts will restart on the three ordinances in March 2024.), 2024 Development Code Housekeeping Amendments and Thurston County Code Title 22 – Tumwater Urban Growth Area **Zoning**
- 3. Other Planning Projects Approximately 25% of all budgeted staff time. The Habitat Conservation Plan (HCP) is approximately 11% of all budgeted staff time. Work items

include Bush Prairie Habitat Conservation Plan (continued from 2016); Equity Toolbox (continued from 2022-23); Food System Plan (new in 2024); Hazard Mitigation Plan Update (continued from 2022-23); Managing Multifamily Tax Exemption Program (ongoing); Code Enforcement (ongoing); and Permit Review Support, Public Inquiries, and other items.

- **4. General Management and Coordination** Approximately 20% of all budgeted staff time. Regional Housing Council is approximately 10% of all budgeted staff time.
 - a. General Coordination with Other Departments Code Compliance Team, Traffic Team, Green Team, Stormwater Team, GIS Team, and other items (ongoing)
 - b. General Coordination with Other Jurisdictions
 - 1) Regional Housing Council (minimum 0.25 FTE per Memorandum of Understanding) (ongoing)
 - 2) Work with the Port of Olympia, other cities, County, State, Tribes, Thurston Regional Planning Council, and Intercity Transit among others (ongoing)
 - 3) Department Management (ongoing)
 - 4) Training (ongoing)

Staff hours are estimated at 1,800 hours equating to one-third of all dedicated staff capacity. Within in each category, individual projects are identified with an estimate of staff time needed to complete, who proposed the project, how they address City Council strategic priorities, and detail on the work required. The work program also accounts for an additional planner position in Long Range Planning.

Commissioner Kirkpatrick inquired about the remaining elements of the HCP that require such a high level of work. Manager Medrud replied that comments on the plan received from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service require a substantial revision to the draft HCP to address those particular concerns. As part of the process, staff is identifying specific sources of funding in addition to development fees that may help support funding of the program, as well as reviewing different parcels for acquisition. The goal is to update the HCP by first quarter 2024 for resubmission to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Some elements of the following projects listed "below the line" may be addressed to include Aquifer Protection Standards Amendments, Autonomous Vehicle, and Electric Vehicle Infrastructure as part of the Development Code Update process.

Manager Medrud invited feedback and suggestions on the work program.

Commissioner Staff commented on the lack of electric vehicle charging stations in the City of Tumwater. More electric vehicle charging stations along the I-5 corridor within the City might attract more tourism to the City. He would prefer moving the item above the line or seeking federal funding or tax reductions. Manager Medrud agreed the demand is increasing. Internally within City facilities, the City is installing charging stations with three stations located at City Hall. State legislation requires jurisdictions along the I-5 corridor to identify and allow for the development of electric vehicle charging stations in particular areas. The City currently meets state requirements; however, discussions are worthy of pursuing to determine if code or policy changes are necessary to support the infrastructure. Charging stations are likely a coordination project with the City's climate position.

Commissioner Staff offered that the Tumwater Craft District would be an ideal location for rapid charging stations because of its close proximity to the interstate. Manager Medrud added that new state requirements for charging stations include multifamily and other large uses of a specific percentage.

Chair Robbins inquired as to the possibility of securing some grant funds to move charging stations above the line. Manager Medrud said any grant funds would be part of the process; however, any charging project would need to be clarified to justify any requests for grant funding. Staff is currently managing up to seven grants, which requires time and capacity.

Commissioner Staff asked whether staff has approached any of the major retailers about the possibility of installing charging stations. Manager Medrud offered to follow up with staff.

Discussion ensued on existing charging stations at the Tumwater Safeway and the difference between slow and rapid charging stations. Most motorists prefer rapid charging stations.

Commissioner Kirkpatrick asked whether mitigation land would also serve to satisfy the state requirement for more open space. Manager Medrud said the City is working on a legislative funding request for funds the state has allocated for carbon sequestration to include prairies, which would serve to support conservation of prairie lands for gophers and other species as well as for carbon sequestration.

Chair Robbins asked about the possibility of promoting more opportunities for events or the possibility of design competitions for architects or engineers involving students and businesses competing for design or engineering awards to assist the City in pursuing goals for

sustainability and type of development envisioned for the City. She cited the University of Washington's Sustainable Engineering Group and The Evergreen State College Center for Sustainability and Environment as a source of students, faculty, and potential professional contacts to assist the City in projecting the desired image the City envisions. Manager Medrud responded that the suggestion speaks to the efforts Sustainability Coordinator Jones Wood is pursuing. The issue also supports the development of the Climate Element in terms of how the City could support those types of activities.

Manager Medrud referred to the upcoming joint work session with the Council as an opportunity for the City Council and Planning Commission to discuss the draft 2024 work program as well as general topics related to their roles on a range of community development issues. A list of discussion topics to consider during the joint work session include:

- 1. What went well with the 2023 long range work program and what could be improved?
- 2. If adjustments to the 2024 long range work program are needed, what projects have less priority?
- 3. How well was coordination between the City Council and Planning Commission in 2023 and what could be improved in 2024?
- 4. Are there additional projects in 2024 to consider? If so, what projects currently proposed could be delayed?

Commissioner Kirkpatrick suggested that many of "below the line" items would likely be included as part of the Comprehensive Plan Periodic Update while acknowledging that the review might not be at the desired level of detail. Some dedicated staff hours for "below the line" items could be reduced if some are captured as part of the Periodic Update.

Chair Robbins cited her interest in the first topic of what has gone well and how the City can build on those successes.

In response to questions about the source of documents, Manager Medrud described how to access the City's website and the pages to visit to obtain desired information. Staff established a webpage for the Periodic Update to house all materials.

Discussion ensued on the goal of avoiding surprises for both the City Council and the Planning Commission and the importance of maintaining coordination and collaboration with the Council.

Manager Medrud advised of the possibility of canceling the December 26, 2023 meeting. Commissioner Von Holtz advised that she would be

unable to attend the joint meeting with the Council on December 12,

2023.

Chair Robbins opened the public hearing at 7:31 p.m.

Planner Smith-Erickson presented the 2023 Annual Development Code Housekeeping Amendments.

During 2022 and 2023, staff reviewed information on minor Tumwater Municipal Code (TMC) development code housekeeping amendments for consideration in 2023. The proposed amendments are minor corrections to the City's development regulations. The TMC establishes a process for development code housekeeping amendments similar to the process for annual Comprehensive Plan amendments. The City Council approved all items on the preliminary docket of proposed amendments for inclusion on the final docket on September 5, 2023. Following the public hearing and the Commission's deliberation, the City Council will consider the Commission's recommendation in January 2024.

The four proposed amendments include:

- Undergrounding Utilities Requirements Clarifies the requirement that new and existing electrical power, telephone, cable television, fiber optics and other transmission lines shall be installed underground. Any deviation would be addressed through the process in TMC Chapter 17.28 Deviation from Requirements. Planner Smith-Erickson reviewed proposed new language.
- Town Center Mixed Use Subdistrict First Floor Uses Code Section to be amended: TMC 18.23.050 TC Town Center Zone District Development and design standards. The proposal is specific to properties fronting main streets. The intent of the

Town Center Mixed Use subdistrict is to create a pedestrian environment with first floor land uses that generate pedestrian activity. The proposal clarifies uses allowed on the first floor of commercial and residential developments along main streets in the Town Center Mixed Use subdistrict. Uses added include professional services, medical clinics, child day care centers, and child miniday care centers. The difference between child day care center and a child miniday care center is the number of children in attendance per the requirements in state law.

- Manufactured Home Parks Open Space Requirements The current code does not require manufactured home parks not subject to land division to provide open space. The requirement would apply to any new development or substantial redevelopment of an existing use with five or more dwelling units
- Building Heights Over Sixty-Five Feet for Specific Industrial Uses - Establishes a conditional use permit process for specific industrial uses that exceed 65 feet in the LI Light Industrial and HI Heavy Industrial zone districts. Planner Smith-Erickson cited the specific sections of the code to be amended. A proposal must meet nine minimum conditions for consideration of a height increase.

The next steps following the public hearing are a briefing to the General Government Committee on the proposed amendments followed by a Council work session on January 23, 2024, and consideration by the Council on February 6, 2024.

There was no public testimony on the four proposed Housekeeping amendments.

Chair Robbins closed the public hearing at 7:46 p.m.

AMENDMENTS:

Chair Robbins described the public hearing format.

Chair Robbins opened the public hearing at 7:51 p.m.

Planner Smith-Erickson briefed the Commission on the Final Docket of the 2023 Comprehensive Plan Amendments. The docket includes two City-sponsored amendments comprised of the 2024-2029 Six-Year Capital Facilities Plan (CFP) and the Old Highway 99 Corridor Plan.

Old Highway 99 is a major transportation corridor connecting the City of Tumwater to south Thurston County communities. Commercial and residential use levels have increased in recent years extending peak commute hours and lengthening vehicle wait times. The Old Highway 99 Corridor Study documented that the corridor from 73rd Avenue to 88th Avenue should be widened to five lanes, two of which would be motor vehicle lanes in each direction and a bike lane. The study recommended a two-lane roundabout at Henderson Boulevard and 88th Avenue. At 93rd Avenue, the study calls for the installation of a single lane roundabout. Project stakeholders recommended the replacement of existing signals with roundabouts to add capacity along Old Highway 99, improve operations and travel times, reduce high-severity crashes, and significantly reduce intersection queues.

The Old Highway 99 Plan is the next step in the Capitol Boulevard planning process. From 2011 through 2013, the City working with consultants and members of the community developed a plan for the Capitol Boulevard corridor focusing on the areas between Israel Road and M Street.

The City requested feedback on the Old Highway 99 corridor in the fall of 2020. The five main improvements recommended by the community included bicycle lanes, sidewalks, reduced traffic congestion, intersection safety, and street lighting.

Planner Smith-Erickson presented the proposed 2024-2029 Capital Facilities Plan (CFP) amendment. The purpose of the CFP update is to address Growth Management Act (GMA) requirements to update the City's six-year Capital Facilities Plan with new data and analysis and confirm implementation actions every two years. The update reflects changes in the City since the last update of the CFP as part of the 2021 Comprehensive Plan Amendment. The CFP is an element of the City's' Comprehensive Plan and contains a list of capital projects with estimated costs and proposed funding methods.

The City Council approved the Final Docket on February 21, 2023. Staff from several departments reviewed the previous six-year CFP and determined specific amendments to update the plan. The Commission received briefings on the proposal on July 11, 2023, and August 8, 2023.

Manager Medrud advised that staff received a phone inquiry from a representative from the Washington State Department of Transportation. He advised the representative of the public hearing date and deadline for submittal of comments. No other comments were received by staff.

Commissioner Tobias asked about the status of conversion of septic tanks to City sewer in the City and within the urban growth area. Manager Medrud advised that it is an ongoing process. If a septic system is failing, staff works with the property owner to coordinate a sewer connection if a connection is possible. In some cases, the City has been working with larger and older areas to support conversion with some grant funding sources.

Commissioner Varela asked whether the Old Highway 99 Study addressed traffic backup as expansion of the lanes would only encompass some areas along the highway rather than the entire highway. Manager Medrud responded that the study considered expansion of the highway through the lens of projected growth over the next 20 years. Expansion was not an issue identified based on the current level of growth.

There was no public testimony.

Chair Robbins closed the public hearing at 8:02 p.m.

COMMISSIONER'S

REPORTS:

MANAGER'S REPORT:

Manager Medrud referred to the Attorney General's memorandum

concerning decisions surrounding the taking of property.

Approximately 782 survey responses have been received through December 28, 2023 for the Comprehensive Plan Periodic Update. The City continues to receive responses with the number of surveys completed numbering over 800. Communications staff is developing a report summarizing the responses. An open house on the update has been scheduled both virtually and in-person on Wednesday, January 31, 2024 at 7 p.m. at the Tumwater Fire Station Training Room. Staff is developing the content and format of the open house and public outreach. The open house is the first of a number of different types of

public outreach events and activities to engage the public during the update process.

PUBLIC COMMENT:

There were no public comments.

2025 COMPREHENSIVE PLAN PERIODIC UPDATE – TRANSPORTATION: Manager Medrud reported the briefing is the last of the Phase 1 briefings and discussions on the current Comprehensive Plan. Staff is transitioning to review proposed changes and amendments to the Transportation Plan tentatively scheduled at the end of February. The Transportation Plan is one of the most important elements in the Comprehensive Plan as much of the City's budget is devoted to capital facilities and development activities. He introduced Assistant Director Ames to review the current Plan.

Assistant Director Ames reported the Growth Management Act (GMA) requires the City to demonstrate that each element in the Comprehensive Plan meets the relevant planning goals of the GMA. The GMA includes 15 goals that guide the development and the adoption of the City's Comprehensive Plan. The goals were updated by the Legislature in 2023. A new goal adds a transportation goal of: "Encourage efficient multimodal transportation systems that will reduce greenhouse gas emissions and per capita vehicle miles traveled, and are based on regional priorities and coordinated with county and city comprehensive plans." Achieving the goal will be accomplished through a combination of goals, policies, and actions within the Land Use Element and the Transportation Plan.

The City's 2016 Transportation Master Plan provides the functional framework for Tumwater's transportation vision. The City's Six-Year Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) informs decisions for achieving the vision.

General topics addressed during the update include:

- Diversity, equity, inclusion, and environmental justice throughout the Comprehensive Plan (new)
- All elements, plans, and maps will be updated for internal consistency
- The updated Comprehensive Plan will be comprised of shorter individual Elements and Plans with a focus on simplified and updated goals, policies, and implementation actions with appendices of technical information
- A new Comprehensive Plan Goal and Policy Guide will be created for staff and policymakers, as well as a new User Guide for community members
- Development of a mutually agreeable Memorandum of

Agreements between the City and tribes on collaboration and participation in the planning process

Topics addressed as part of the Transportation Plan update include:

- Update of maps
- Update of existing conditions and operations
- Update of planned improvements and future operations to 2045
- Update of the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)
- Update of the financial analysis
- Update transportation impact fees
- Update estimated traffic impacts to state-owned transportation facilities resulting from land use assumptions to assist the State Department of Transportation in monitoring the performance of state facilities, to plan improvements for the facilities, and to assess the impact of land-use decisions on state-owned transportation facilities
- Update land use assumptions used in estimating current and future transportation needs

Factored within the update of facilities and service needs is an inventory of air, water, and ground transportation facilities and services, including transit alignments and general aviation airport facilities, to define existing capital facilities and travel levels as a basis for future planning. Level of service standards will be reviewed for all locally owned arterials and transit routes to serve as a gauge to judge the performance of the system. For state-owned transportation facilities, a review of the level of service standards for highways will gauge the performance of the system. The review will identify specific actions and requirements for bringing into compliance locally owned transportation facilities or services that are below an established level of service standard, as well as updating forecasts of traffic for at least ten years based on the adopted Land Use Element to provide information on the location, timing, and capacity needs of future growth. The review will also identify state and local system needs to meet current and future demands.

The financial analysis update includes analysis of funding capability to balance needs against probable funding resources and a multi-year financing plan based on the needs identified in the Comprehensive Plan, the appropriate parts of which shall serve as the basis for the six-year street, road, or transit program required for cities and for public transportation systems. Should probable funding fall short of meeting identified needs, information will be included on how additional funding would be identified, or how land use assumptions would be reassessed to ensure level of service standards are achieved.

The Transportation Plan, the six-year Capital Facilities Plans for cities and for public transportation systems, and the ten-year investment program for the state must be consistent. A projection is required of state and local system needs to meet current and future demand.

The update includes a pedestrian and bicycle component of collaborative efforts to identify and designate planned improvements for pedestrian and bicycle facilities and corridors that address and encourage enhanced community access and promote healthy lifestyles, consider approaches that increase physical activity, describe any existing and planned transportation demand management strategies, such as high occupancy vehicle lanes or subsidiary programs and parking policies, an analysis of future funding capability to judge needs against probable funding resources, and a multi-year financing plan based on needs identified in the Comprehensive Plan.

Assistant Director Ames shared that she met with staff from Intercity Transit on another topic but did mention the City's work on the update of the Transportation Plan Element. Intercity Transit staff expressed interest in working with the City through the planning process and potential future projects to increase access to transit.

The update will describe intergovernmental coordination efforts, including an assessment of the impacts of the Transportation Plan, land use assumptions on the transportation systems of adjacent jurisdictions, and how the Plan is consistent with the Regional Transportation Plan, and identify lands useful for public purposes such as utility corridors, sewage treatment facilities, transportation corridors, landfills, stormwater management facilities, recreation, schools, and other public uses. The Plan will identify open space corridors within and between urban growth areas, including lands useful for trails. The Plan will be updated as needed on the process or criteria for identifying and locating essential public facilities in coordination with the update of the Lands for Public Purposes Element. Demand-management strategies will be updated as well as information on pedestrian and bicycle components to include collaborative efforts to identify and designate planned improvements for pedestrian and bicycle facilities and corridors that address and encourage enhanced community access and promote healthy lifestyles.

Staff is reviewing revisions to enable some form of Intercity Transit turnarounds on Littlerock Road and Old Highway 99 for future transit services, update and include information from the Thurston Thrives Walkability Study, Intercity Transit studies, and the Old Highway 99 Corridor Study, allow active transportation facilities, transportation

demand management, or public transportation services to meet concurrency, incorporate equitable implementation, estimate multimodal level of service impacts to state transportation facilities, add impact fee revenue for bike and pedestrian facilities, provide multimodal level of service and needs forecasts for arterials, transit routes, and active transportation facilities, afford priority to the greatest multimodal safety benefit to each category of roadway users, include Americans with Disabilities Act Transition Plan, and provide funding analysis to include state transportation facilities. A new requirement is incorporating environmental justice in goals and policies.

Assistant Director Ames reviewed the format and content of the current Transportation Master Plan.

To assist with the update, the Department of Commerce provided some guidance materials for updating the Transportation Plan. The next step of the update is hiring a consultant to assist in the update of the Transportation Plan. The City plans to issue a non-cost Request for Proposal (RFP) to solicit proposals from consultants on their respective qualifications for completing the work and a proposal scope of work with no request for costs. Costs will be negotiated after the selection of the consultant. The General Government Committee is scheduled to receive a briefing on the same information on January 10, 2024.

Assistant Director Ames invited comments, written comments, and questions from Commissioners.

Commissioner Tobias asked about the primary sources of revenue for the transportation budget. Assistant Director Ames said most transportation revenue is from grants, which is the largest source of The basis for grant funding is the Six-Year Transportation Improvement Program, which ensures the City is eligible for federal and state grants for transportation projects. The funding cycle is regularly scheduled through other funding sources such as the Surface Transportation Block Grants (STBG), Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP), and funding for air quality projects. Tumwater is positioned favorably with a voter approved Transportation Benefit District providing .02% sales tax for transportation projects in the City mostly related to paving and repaving projects. The third source of funds is from Transportation Impact Fees, which depend on the level of development in the City. Impact fees are utilized for projects identified in the Transportation Impact Fee Program. Staff is updating the Transportation Impact Fee Program as part of the Comprehensive Plan Periodic Update process.

Commissioner Varela asked whether the update plans to address

connecting the City to larger transportation options, such as the Sounder or light rail to Seattle and other locations to the north. Assistant Director Ames said the City's Transportation Master Plan does not address those options other than discussions facilitated by TRPC through regional efforts rather than independently by the City.

Manager Medrud asked whether TRPC is in the process of updating the Regional Transportation Plan. Assistant Director Ames affirmed the Regional Plan is undergoing an update. A specific study is underway to address high speed public transportation between the region and Seattle and other locations.

Commissioner Staff inquired as to whether staff has considered attracting traffic from Interstate 5 and how it impacts local transportation or options for funneling more traffic to Tumwater to increase tourism. Assistant Director Ames said the Transportation Plan addresses the tourism component in the form of transportation infrastructure to ensure the network can accommodate an increase in tourism activity. Concurrency is the primary component to address infrastructure level of service.

Manager Medrud added that the discussion about attracting more tourism to the City would also be addressed during the update of the Economic Development Plan.

Chair Robbins asked whether development proposals are ever required to submit origin destination studies or a traffic analysis of a proposed development.

Chair Robbins asked about the timeline for contracting with the consultant and the type of qualifications the City desires to include any regional transportation planning experience. Assistant Director Ames said staff is gearing up to advertise the position with several weeks afforded for applicants to prepare proposals. It likely will require one to two months to begin the update. Staff is seeking qualifications from firms that have experience and a reputation for completing a successful transportation master plan. Several well-qualified firms have been identified that have completed similar work for other jurisdictions.

Commissioner Staff commented on the possibility of the consultant working in coordination with *Experience Olympia and Beyond* as part of its destination tourism plan that included an impact study. The work was completed several months ago. Manager Medrud advised that the City contracts with TRPC for many types of projects and any recent studies completed in the region would be considered as part of the update.

Assistant Director Ames added that the City is considering the model used by TRPC for the region, which provides the basis for some of the analysis completed.

Commissioner Kirkpatrick cited the forecast of a major increase in population over the next 30 years. Areas served by Intercity Transit are where most of the new apartment complexes are being constructed. Since Intercity Transit does not offer extensive route service within the City, there are no benefits for a developer to build an apartment unless the property is served by an existing bus route. He asked about the possibility of working with Intercity Transit to assign some routes that would attract developers to the City to develop apartments in areas that are currently not served by transit. Assistant Director Ames responded that during recent discussions with Intercity Transit staff, the topic was addressed in terms of new housing developments located outside of Intercity Transit's regular service area. The agency is exploring other methods for serving those areas, such as a future pilot program in the City to increase transit service innovatively. Intercity Transit is willing to work with the City and explore ways of providing bus service that might not be a traditional bus route. As more development occurs the customer base increases enabling Intercity Transit to provide service. The issue is a "chicken and egg scenario" as transit depends on land density and customers to support bus service.

Commissioner Kirkpatrick noted that as the City of Lacey expands its transportation system north of Hawks Prairie, the city is opening many large properties that are much more attractive to the development community than in Tumwater. Manager Medrud noted that the issue is also a component of politics with more pressure by the City Council to promote more transit service from Intercity Transit. When Intercity Transit expanded service to Hawks Prairie, the impetus was partially attributed to the increase in the number of households, as well as political pressure from the City of Lacey.

Chair Robbins expressed interest in encouraging transportation connections through different avenues other than Intercity Transit such as offering incentives for Uber-type services or other models that are not public agencies to provide transit service to help the community meet its travel needs. She asked about the possibility of exploring options in the plans and analyses. Manager Medrud advised that it would be appropriate to explore, especially as the state now requires the City to plan and accommodate all income groups for housing and access to services. The City lacks the ability to meet all demands with transit routes because of some areas located outside of the service area.

Commissioner Staff asked whether the City has produced a map of current transit service and future bus service to map out desired transit service to serve the population. Manager Medrud cited the possibility of working with Intercity Transit staff to develop a transit service map of the City.

Commissioner Staff commented that a visual would be helpful as it would identify areas of disparity and provide an overall view of areas where equity has not been achieved. A map would be an impactful way and could possibly lead to more conversations with Intercity Transit on ways to meet needs.

Assistant Director Ames said an inventory of the City's sidewalks exists as well as a plan for expanding sidewalks. In terms of bus service, it is also important to have access to bus stops. The City's interface with transit service is important to ensure facilities are available for walking and biking to a transit stop or another location with access to other types of public transportation.

Manager Medrud acknowledged that the suggestions were helpful because the City is required to accommodate all new state requirements.

Manager Medrud explained that the update on the Transportation Plan was delayed because of the pending receipt of state funds to fund the consultant contract. The City received notification at the end of December that it will receive funding. At the end of month, work on developing the Climate Element is scheduled to begin.

ORDINANCE NO.
O2023-017, TMC 18.38
FP FLOODPLAIN
OVERLAY:

Planner Smith-Erickson briefed the Commission on updates to the City's floodplain ordinance.

Approximately 300 towns, cities, and tribes participate in the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) National Flood Insurance Program in the state. Continued enforcement of the City's floodplain management regulations in TMC 18.38 enables FEMA to provide federally backed flood insurance to City property owners. As a condition of participation in the program, communities are required to adopt and enforce flood hazard reduction regulations meeting the minimum requirements of the National Flood Insurance Program.

In May 2023, staff participated in a FEMA floodplain community assistance visit with Department of Ecology staff to review the City's floodplain ordinance. The community assistance visit determined the ordinance was in good standing but required some minor updates.

In November 2023, FEMA notified the City of final flood determinations for Thurston County and incorporated areas. The FEMA flood hazard determination for the City is considered final. The Flood Insurance Study Report and the Flood Insurance Rate Map covering the City are effective on May 8, 2024.

Prior to May 2024, the City must amend its existing floodplain regulations for consistency with the model ordinance for floodplain management, the Endangered Species Act, and the National Flood Insurance Program.

Planner Smith-Erickson advised that the staff report includes summaries of the 15 proposed amendments, code sections affected, and proposed amendment language. Three new sections were added for detached accessory structures, storage and materials and equipment, and penalties. A notice of intent for ordinance O2023-017 was mailed to the State Department of Commerce on December 14, 2023. A SEPA Checklist for the ordinance was completed on December 13, 2023 for issuance of a Determination of Non-significance (DNS) in 2024.

Manager Medrud described the SEPA review process for proposed changes to the ordinance.

Planner Smith-Erickson asked Commissioners to review the proposed amendments and new sections in the ordinance for preparation for a future work session and address whether the proposed amendments are clear and easy for developers to understand within a floodplain. A work session is scheduled on January 23, 2024 with a tentative public hearing on the ordinance scheduled for February 13, 2024.

Commissioner Tobias requested information on the criteria for determining significance or non-significance during a SEPA review. Manager Medrud explained that the initial threshold is whether an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) is required. A significant ruling requires completion of an EIS to review all potential impacts in detail and identify associated alternatives. When SEPA was originally adopted in 1971, the cost was substantial to complete. Today, completion of an EIS is less common with some jurisdictions electing to conduct an EIS for an update on a comprehensive plan. The SEPA process is a threshold to determine whether an EIS is required, and, if not, the next level is a Mitigated DNS to address any impacts caused by various proposals. A Mitigated DNS is typically applicable to projects and is not typical for updates to ordinances.

Commissioner Kirkpatrick asked whether the City is required to provide notification to state agencies for a 60-day comment period if a SEPA is

not required. Manager Medrud advised that there are two different processes. The SEPA process includes a separate notification process to specific agencies and interested parties. The Notice of Intent process as codified under the Growth Management Act is a separate notification process administered through the Department of Commerce as the lead agency for the GMA. Most regulations or plans typically fall under the Department of Commerce notification process.

Chair Robbins inquired as to the frequency FEMA updates floodplain maps. Manager Medrud said the last similar process completed by the City was in 2015. Chair Robbins asked whether any event triggers an update. Manager Medrud explained that it is a federally timed process.

RESOLUTION NO. R2024-001, FOURTH EDITION HAZARDS MITIGATION PLAN FOR THE THURSTON REGION: Planner Smith-Erickson updated members on the status of the update of the Hazards Mitigation Plan for the Thurston Region. The fourth edition of the Plan outlines strategies to reduce the risk of the most destructive natural hazards of floods, earthquakes, and wildfires threatening the local area. The Plan's goals, policies, and actions will minimize lawsuits and protect people in the community and assets from future disasters.

Managed risks contain costs and promote sustainable communities. FEMA has enacted hazard mitigation planning requirements for states, tribes, and local governments through the adoption of the Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000. Local governments are required to adopt a federally approved Hazards Mitigation Plan to apply for and receive federal hazard mitigation assistance funding. The City of Tumwater Annex is the fourth edition, which was first adopted in 2003. Goals, policies, and actions if implemented would minimize losses and protect assets from future disasters. The Plan's mitigation strategy includes regional actions to improve multiagency coordination, build mitigation capabilities, and strengthen resiliency across Thurston County. Each Plan participant produces an Annex with prioritized actions to minimize losses within each jurisdiction.

The Plan must demonstrate that the community's proposed mitigation measures are based on a sound planning process that accounts for risks to the capabilities of the individual jurisdiction. Local governments are required to conduct a planning process that satisfies FEMA requirements to receive FEMA Plan approval.

Planner Smith-Erickson reviewed identified risks in the City. The City Annex identifies actions that are specific to the vulnerability of the community and the responsible parties for implementing actions. The City identified 20 initiatives to help mitigate and reduce impacts from natural hazards. The initiatives are categorized by initiative type that

include public outreach and information, planned coordination and implementation, data collection and mapping, development regulations, hazard preparedness, hazard damage reduction, and critical facilities and replacement retrofits.

Planner Smith-Erickson shared an example of a mitigation initiative for the City of Tumwater. Staff identified initiatives from the last update and reviewed example plans to select the initiatives. Some of the initiatives are incorporated within the Capital Facilities Plan, biennial budget, the 2020 Water System Plan, Deschutes Flood Reduction Plan, City of Tumwater Comprehensive Plan, development code updates, and 2023 and 2024 City Work Programs. The City Annex identifies potential City projects designed to mitigate the impacts of natural hazards that could occur in the future dependent upon funding, direction, and need. The mitigation initiatives are projects developed from input from each City department.

Planner Smith-Erickson shared an overview of the Annex structure comprised of 144 pages categorized into 12 sections. She summarized each section in the Plan. Jurisdictions must have at least one mitigation action for each identified hazard. The planning team is responsible for monitoring and maintaining the Plan. The Annex and the Regional Plan are a climate resiliency sub-element in the 2025 Comprehensive Plan Update.

Planner Smith-Erickson reviewed the schedule and activities for the update of the Regional Plan and Annexes. TRPC facilitated the planning for updating the Plan and serves as the lead for creation of the Regional Plan. The City's Annex was submitted in conjunction with the Regional Plan on November 27, 2023 to the Washington Department of Emergency Management Division for a 30-day review. Following the conclusion of the review, the Annex and Regional Plan will be forwarded to FEMA for its 45-day review. FEMA may recommend some revisions for further review.

Planner Smith-Erickson recommended scheduling a public hearing on the proposal on January 23, 2024.

Commissioner Kirkpatrick noted a public comment was included in the packet, but no response was included. He suggested addressing the comment. Manager Medrud advised that he responded to the individual and shared additional information as to the notification process.

Planner Smith-Erickson said the comment was received on November 11, 2023. The commenter expressed concerns about an existing development within a liquefaction area and whether residents living in

that area were notified of the situation.

Commissioner Varela commented on the delay in the update and questioned whether the City is currently subject to any negative implications because of an outdated Plan. Manager Medrud said that FEMA has not advised the City that it is not in compliance as the ongoing update falls within the window of response for ensuring the City's ability to apply for grant funding.

Chair Robbins asked about the scenario where the City is unable to receive funding from other resources and the City's liability risk for not implementing an initiative. Manager Medrud said he would follow up with an appropriate answer.

Chair Robbins asked about the involvement of lenders and insurers in assisting the City in mitigating risks. Manager Medrud advised that those entities did not have a formal role in the update process as the update is intended to identify risks and mitigation measures rather than serving as an opportunity for coordination with lenders and insurers. Chair Robbins suggested the Plan's public outreach activities should also include those entities as well.

Planner Smith-Erickson requested scheduling a public hearing on January 23, 2024 on the proposed resolution.

MOTION: Commissioner Tobias moved, seconded by Commissioner Staff, to

schedule a public hearing on January 23, 2024 for Resolution No. R2024-001, Fourth Edition Hazards Mitigation Plan for the Thurston Region. A voice vote approved the motion unanimously.

Chair Robbins reviewed the purpose and format of the public hearing on Resolution No. R 2024-001, Fourth Edition Hazards Mitigation Plan for the Thurston Region.

Chair Robbins opened the public hearing at 7:07 p.m.

Planner Smith-Erickson reported the Fourth Edition of the Hazards Mitigation Plan for the City of Tumwater outlines strategies to reduce the risk of the most destructive natural hazards such as floods, earthquakes, and wildfires that threaten the area. The Plan's goals, policies, and actions, if implemented, would minimize losses and protect the community and community assets from future disasters.

To manage risks, contain costs, and promote sustainable communities, the federal government enacted hazards mitigation planning requirements for states, tribes, and local government in the Disaster Mitigation Act of 2002. Local governments must adopt a federally approved Hazards Mitigation Plan to apply for and receive federal

hazard mitigation assistance funding. Goals, policies, and actions, if implemented, would minimize losses and protect assets from future disasters. The Plan's mitigation strategy includes regional actions to improve multi-agency coordination, build mitigation capabilities, and strengthen resiliency across Thurston County. Each Plan participant produces an Annex with prioritized actions to minimize losses within each jurisdiction.

The Plan must demonstrate that the community's proposed mitigation measures are based on a sound planning process that accounts for risks and the capabilities of the jurisdiction. Local governments are required to conduct a planning process that satisfies FEMA requirements to receive FEMA Plan approval. The Plan must be updated every five years.

The City is susceptible to hazards of earthquakes, flooding, landslides, severe weather, and wildfires. Central to the City's Annex are recommended projects, programs, and activities planning partners within the City would implement to provide long-term sustained benefits to reduce losses from the impacts of hazards that are identified in the Plan and referred to as initiatives. The Plan includes 20 initiatives categorized by different types, such as public outreach and information, planned coordination and implementation, data collection and mapping, development regulations, critical areas ordinance, hazard preparedness, and critical facilities and replacement retrofits.

Planner Smith-Erickson shared and described a sample mitigation initiative. Staff developed initiatives by selecting initiatives from the last update, from example plans provided by FEMA, and from other planning documents in the City.

Planner Smith-Erickson described the structure of the Plan and its organization comprised of 144 pages divided into 12 sections. The City Annex development process includes the Hazards Mitigation Planning Team, Work Group, meetings, stakeholders, public outreach, work cited, monitoring and maintenance, and continued public outreach strategies. Risk assessment is an evaluation of each jurisdiction's hazards. Risk assessments identify areas of impact and the extent of the risk, previous incidents, probability of occurrence, the effect of climate change, impacts and changes from development, and vulnerability. Jurisdictions must have at least one mitigation action for each mapped hazard.

The section on mitigation strategy includes an introduction to City mitigation initiatives, a prioritization process, the initiative format, a sample, and the proposed initiatives. The benefit cost review assists in

rating and prioritizing initiatives. The benefit cost review also assisted in naming conventions of the initiative. The City Hazard Mitigation Planning Team evaluated each proposed initiative project or action providing a high, medium, or low benefit using benefit review criteria.

Staff received one public comment expressing concerns about an existing development within liquefaction areas and whether residents living in those areas were notified. The comment pertained to an existing development and was not subject to the Tumwater development review process. Staff provided a response to the public comment.

Manager Medrud explained that liquefaction occurs when development is built on sand or other soft soils that can liquefy during an earthquake and undermine a structure.

Planner Smith-Erickson reported the Community Capability Assessment is a unique set of capabilities and tools that can be leveraged to support hazard mitigation and increase resilience. Examples include the City's Capital Facilities Plan, Comprehensive Plan, and building and land use codes.

The Plan must describe the City's participation in the National Flood Program and how the City meets regulatory requirements.

Staff will frequently review and track the status of initiatives throughout the Capital Facilities Plan update, Tree and Vegetation code updates, 2025 Development Code Periodic Update, Washington Wildland-Urban Interface Code adoption, and the 2025 Comprehensive Plan Periodic Update and annual amendment process. The Annex and the Regional Plan are a climate resiliency sub-element in the 2025 Comprehensive Plan Periodic Update.

TRPC facilitated the planning for updating the Plan over the last several years and serves as the lead for creation of the Regional Plan. The City's Annex was submitted in conjunction with the Regional Plan on November 27, 2023 to the Washington Department of Emergency Management Division for a 30-day review. On January 16, 2024, TRPC advised the City that the Washington Emergency Management Division and FEMA anticipate the review of the Plan to be completed within a week.

Following approval of the Plan by FEMA, the City will initiate the adoption process beginning with the public hearing. The Commission is requested to recommend approval of Resolution No. 2024-001, Fourth Edition Hazards Mitigation Plan for the Thurston Region, to the City Council following the public hearing.

Commissioner Varela asked whether the City has experienced an event requiring FEMA to work with the City to address hazard mitigation. He cited the oil leak at the old brewery as an example. Manager Medrud said the response to the oil leak was provided by the State Department of Ecology.

Chair Robbins asked staff whether they explored potential outcomes if the City should receive little or no funding to implement initiatives. Planner Smith-Erickson explained that the capability assessments must document how the initiatives were created through work plans, through the CFP, the Water System Plan, and other City planning processes. The Plan must include initiatives but there is no requirement for completing implementation of any initiative as many previous initiatives continue to be ongoing. An explanation is included in each initiative as to why implementation is ongoing and highlights the need for any funding requirement. FEMA requires the City to demonstrate that the initiatives are in process and documented within work plans.

Chair Robbins asked whether the Plan addresses response awareness or public notification of natural disasters and response. Planner Smith-Erickson replied that in the event of an emergency, the Washington Emergency Management Division has implemented an alert system that the public can participate in to receive notifications. Staff is also working closely with Communications staff on public outreach to include some specific public outreach initiatives, as well as a mailing for property owners located in flood prone areas of the City. Additionally, the Tumwater Fire Department have plans in place to address emergencies. The initiatives are based on City projects and work programs. More public outreach could be considered during an emergency. The City's website also includes information on the Hazards Mitigation Plan, which is available to the public.

Commissioner Varela asked about efforts by staff to seek other sources of funding for some initiatives, such as seeking support from FEMA if the agency has some mechanisms to assist jurisdictions in moving initiatives forward. Planner Smith-Erickson said implementation of each initiative has an assigned lead. The initiatives are included in the City's work program. The Plan promotes more interdepartmental meetings between staff to monitor and track progress. City departments continually apply for different grants to help fund projects.

With there being no public testimony, Chair Robbins closed the public hearing at 7:35 p.m.

MOTION: Commissioner Varela moved, seconded by Commissioner Edwards,

to recommend the City Council approve Resolution No. R2024-001, Fourth Edition Hazards Mitigation Plan for the Thurston Region as presented. A voice vote approved the motion unanimously.

Planner Smith-Erickson briefed the Commission on proposed updates to the City's floodplain ordinance.

Approximately 300 towns, cities, and tribes participate in the FEMA National Flood Insurance Program in the state. Continued enforcement of the City's floodplain management regulations in TMC 18.38 enables FEMA to provide federally backed flood insurance to property owners in the City. As a condition of participation in the program, communities are required to adopt and enforce flood hazard reduction regulations meeting the minimum requirements of the National Flood Insurance Program.

In May 2023, staff participated in a FEMA floodplain community assistance visit with Department of Ecology staff to review the City's floodplain ordinance. The community assistance visit determined the ordinance was in good standing but required some minor updates to reflect current federal standards.

In November 2023, FEMA notified the City of final flood determinations for Thurston County and incorporated areas. The FEMA flood hazard determination for the City is considered final. The Flood Insurance Study Report and the Flood Insurance Rate Map covering the City are effective on May 8, 2024.

Prior to May 2024, the City is required to amend its existing floodplain regulations for consistency with the model ordinance for floodplain management, the Endangered Species Act, and the National Flood Insurance Program.

Planner Smith-Erickson advised that the staff report includes summaries of the 15 proposed amendments, code sections affected, and proposed amendment language. Three new sections were added for detached accessory structures, storage, materials, equipment, and penalties.

Planner Smith-Erickson reviewed the proposed changes to Tumwater Municipal Code (TMC).

TMC 18.38.017- Definitions was updated to clarify and add eight definitions to enhance correct interpretation of floodplain regulations. The definitions cover the following areas:

- "Alteration of watercourse" is any action that will change the location of the channel occupied by water within the banks of any portion of a riverine waterbody.
- "Area of special flood hazard" is the land in the floodplain within a community subject to a 1 percent or greater chance of flooding in any given year. It is shown on the flood insurance rate map (FIRM) as zone A, AO, AH, A1-30, AE, A99, AR (V, VO, V1-30, VE).
- "Special flood hazard area" is synonymous in meaning with the phrase "area of special flood hazard."
- "Flood elevation study (FES)" is an examination, evaluation and determination of flood hazards and, if appropriate, corresponding water surface elevations, or an examination, evaluation and determination of mudslide (i.e., mudflow) and/or flood-related erosion hazards. Also known as a flood insurance study (FIS).
- "Floodplain administrator" is the community official designated by title to administer and enforce the floodplain management regulations.
- "Flood proofing" is any combination of structural and nonstructural additions, changes, or adjustments to structures which reduce or eliminate risk of flood damage to real estate or improved real property, water and sanitary facilities, structures, and their contents. Flood proofed structures are those that have the structural integrity and design to be impervious to floodwater below the base flood elevation.
- "Highest adjacent grade" is the highest natural elevation of the ground surface prior to construction next to the proposed walls of a structure.
- "Mean sea level" for the purpose of the National Flood Insurance Program, is the vertical datum to which base flood elevations shown on a community's flood insurance rate map are referenced.
- "Structure" is a walled and roofed building, including a gas or liquid storage tank that is principally above ground, as well as a manufactured home.

Changes to TMC 8.38.090 – Special flood hazard areas includes updating language to reflect most current versions of the Flood Insurance Study (FIS) and Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRMs), and adding the acronym, "BFE" for Base Flood Elevation significance or non-significance during a SEPA review.

Changes to TMC 18.38.100 – Flood hazard data are intended to clarify how special flood hazard areas are identified using BFE and Flood

Insurance Rate Maps and clarification of the process and instances where the base flood and floodway data were not provided or available in the Flood Insurance Study and Flood Insurance Rate Maps.

Changes to TMC 18.38.130 – Floodplain development permit required includes revision of section name to improve clarity, removal of passive language, and a requirement for a permit in special flood hazard areas (SFHAs) defined in TMC 18.39.090.

Changes to TMC 18.38.140 – Floodplain development permit application include updated acronyms for consistency with the definitions section, and the addition of five subsections:

- E. If a project will alter the base flood elevation data (BFE) or boundaries of the SFHA, the project applicant shall provide the floodplain administrator with engineering documentation and analysis regarding the proposed change. If the change to the BFE or boundaries of the SFHA would normally require a Letter of Map Change, the project approval shall be conditioned accordingly.
- J. The application shall include the elevation in relation to mean sea level, of the lowest floor (including basement) of all structures recorded on a current elevation certificate with section B completed by the floodplain administrator.
- K. The application shall include the elevation relation to mean sea level to which any structure has been flood proofed.
- L. The application shall include, where development is proposed in a floodway, an engineering analysis indicating no rise of the base flood elevation (BFE).
- M. The application shall include any other such information that may be reasonably required by the floodplain administrator in order to review the application.

Changes to TMC 18.38.180 – Records include:

- Updated acronyms
- Clarified information required to be obtained for record.
- Removed passive language.
- Provides a process for floodplain administrator to ensure proposed construction will be safe from flooding when elevation data is not available.
- Adds a list of information the floodplain administrator shall obtain and make available to the public.

Changes to TMC 18.38.210 – Development and subdivisions include:

• Clarifies short subdivisions, short plats, and binding site plans are subject to TMC 18.38.210.

- Updated language to acronyms.
- Subdivisions or developments with over 50 lots or five acres must provide base flood elevation data with the application.

Changes to TMC 18.38.184 – Flood protection standards include:

- In areas where the base flood elevation (BFE) data has been determined or obtained (A zones), all new development must be elevated at least one-foot above BFE.
- Materials used shall be resistant to flood damage.
- Construction methods that minimize flood damage.
- All structures, including manufactured homes and substantial improvements, shall be anchored properly.
- New construction and substantial improvement of any residential structure in an Unnumbered A zone and BFE is not available shall be raised two feet above highest adjacent grade.
- An attached garage constructed with the floor slab below the BFE must be designed to allow for the automatic entry and exit of floodwaters.

TMC 18.38.270- Nonresidential construction section was reformatted. The proposed changes create clear standards for non-residential development. Within the AE and A1-30 zones or other A zoned areas, new construction and substantial improvement of any commercial, industrial, or other nonresidential structure shall have the lowest floor, including basement, elevated one foot or more above the BFE. Information was added for unnumbered A zone when the BFE is not available, the lowest floor must be at least two feet above the highest adjacent grade.

Changes to TMC 18.38.280- Manufactured homes add clarifying requirements for anchoring of manufactured homes that minimize flood damage and other anchoring requirements throughout TMC 18.38 that are applicable.

TMC 18.38.285- Detached accessory structures is a new section and adds standards to allow for structures to be built below the BFE used solely for parking of vehicles or limited storage. Different flood zones have different requirements for detached structures, such as size, elevation, materials, and items stored, and anchoring.

TMC 18.38.325- Storage of materials and equipment is a new section adding that the storage or processing of materials that could be injurious to human, animal, or plant life if released due to damage from flooding is prohibited in special flood hazard areas. Storage of other material or equipment may be allowed if not subject to damage by floods and if

firmly anchored to prevent flotation, or if readily removable from the area within the time available after flood warning.

Chair Robbins questioned the extent of outreach to property owners who might be affected by the proposed language. Of particular interest is whether any feedback from property owners was received regarding solutions that would be effective but not impossible to meet or other situations where the property is utilized differently and whether the proposed changes can accommodate those types of uses. Smith-Erickson responded that the question speaks to whether property owners are aware of the update in regulations that are located in a flood Chair Robbins said she is interested in knowing whether a threshold is included for a smaller volume of material while the regulations might disallow larger quantities as they might present a She cited an example of the Department of greater hazard. Transportation storing a large volume of sand or de-icer required during inclement weather. She asked whether staff has reached out to property owners to receive input on how the new regulations would impact them.

Commissioner Varela commented on those situations where equipment or materials could be moved during a warning but were not moved because efforts were diverted to evacuate a family.

Chair Robbins encouraged staff to pursue some public outreach to property owners who would be subject to the proposed regulations.

Planner Smith-Erickson cited her work on the Hazards Mitigation Plan and data on the number of commercial and residential structures that were identified in the City's floodplains. She offered to follow up with more information. Staff can pursue whether public notification is provided when the floodplain maps change or when changes occur in the Flood Insurance Study and Flood Insurance Rate Maps.

Planner Smith-Erickson reported changes to TMC 18.38.360 – Floodway standards include:

- Clarifies encroachments, including fill, new construction, substantial improvements, and other development is prohibited unless a certification by a registered professional engineer demonstrating development would not result in any increase in flood levels during the occurrence of the base flood discharge.
- Clarifies that repairs, reconstruction, or improvements to a residential structure which do not increase the ground floor area may be allowed subject to outlined requirements.
- TMC 18.38.360(A)(1) is satisfied, or construction is allowed pursuant to TMC 18.38.360(A)(2), all new construction and substantial improvements in the floodway shall comply with all

applicable flood hazard reduction provisions of TMC 18.38.

A new section, TMC 18.38.450- Penalties for noncompliance is proposed:

- A. No structure or land shall hereafter be constructed, located, extended, converted, or altered without full compliance with the terms of this ordinance and other applicable regulations. Violations of the provisions of this ordinance by failure to comply with any of its requirements (including violations of conditions and safeguards established in connection with conditions), shall constitute a misdemeanor. Any person who violates this ordinance or fails to comply with any of its requirements shall upon conviction thereof be fined not more than one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) or imprisoned for not more than ninety (90) days, or both for each violation, and in addition shall pay all costs and expenses involved in the case. Nothing herein contained shall prevent the city of Tumwater from taking such other lawful action as is necessary to prevent or remedy any violation.
- B. Enforcement under this section is in addition to and does not preclude or limit any other forms of enforcement available to the city including, but not limited to, enforcement under any provision of TMC Chapter 1.10, nuisance actions, actions for injunctions, or any other civil or equitable actions to abate, discontinue, or correct, acts in violation of this code.

Commissioner Varela asked about the costs associated of jailing someone for 90 days, as violation of the penalty might be less expensive. It might be more beneficial for the individual to correct the violation of non-compliance as opposed to utilizing resources for imprisonment. Manager Medrud recommended the Commission consider adding a note within its recommendation to consider an alternative. He added that when the section was drafted, staff reviewed provisions from other jurisdictions. The draft language was based on the City of Olympia's plan, which may or may not be appropriate for the City of Tumwater.

Chair Robbins acknowledged the importance of reducing flooding risks but questioned how penalties would correct any situation. Manager Medrud explained that the provisions are intended to compel compliance rather than impose penalties.

Planner Smith-Erickson reported the City received a SEPA Determination of Non-Significance. Since the release of the notice, the City received some public comments. The next agenda packet will include those public comments. Next steps include scheduling a public

hearing on February 13, 2024 or scheduling another work session.

Chair Robbins favored more discussion on the issues addressed by the Commission on Sections 13 and 15. Manager Medrud suggested staff could provide some additional information in response to the questions as part of the public hearing presentation because of the timeline associated with the ordinance.

MOTION:

Commissioner Varela moved, seconded by Commissioner Edwards, to schedule a public hearing on February 13, 2024 on Ordinance No. O2023-017, TMC 18.38 FP Floodplain Overlay. A voice vote approved the motion unanimously.

ATTORNEY GENERAL'S ADVISORY MEMORANDUM: Manager Medrud reported the discussion pertains to the Attorney General's Advisory Memorandum and Recommended Process for Evaluating Proposed Regulatory or Administrative Actions to Avoid Unconstitutional Takings of Private Property. Under the Growth Management Act, the Office of the Attorney General is required to provide guidance to state agencies and local governments in an orderly, consistent process to evaluate proposed regulatory or administrative actions to assure that these actions do not result in unconstitutional takings of private property or raise substantive due process concerns. The process must be used by local governments that plan under the Growth Management Act. The Attorney General prepared guidance and reviews the laws each year to include federal case law to determine whether the guidance should be updated. The last update was issued in 2018 following some federal cases.

Staff uses the memorandum to guide the development of defensible policies and regulations that protect property rights. It is especially relevant as the Planning Commission considers new and amended policies and regulations that affect land use.

The three general constitutional principles include:

- 1. Police Power:
 - 1) State governments have the authority and responsibility to protect public health, safety, and welfare.
 - 2) This authority is an inherent attribute of state governmental sovereignty and is shared with local governments in Washington under the state constitution.
 - 3) Pursuant to that authority, which is called the "police power," the government can regulate or limit the use of property.
 - Examples include abatement of public nuisances, the termination of illegal activities, and the establishment of building codes, safety standards, sanitary requirements,

zoning regulations, or environmental protections.

2. Regulatory Takings:

- Government regulation of property is a necessary and accepted aspect of modern society and compensation is not required for every decline in the value of a piece of private property.
- 2) However, if government regulations go "too far," they can constitute a taking of property.
- 3) This does not necessarily mean that the regulatory activity is unlawful, but rather that the payment of just compensation may be required under the state or federal constitution.
- 4) The rationale is based upon the notion that some regulations are so severe in their impact that they are the functional equivalent of an exercise of the government's power of eminent domain.

3. Substantive Due Process under the 14th Amendment:

- 1) Substantive due process is the constitutional doctrine that legislation must be fair and reasonable in content and designed so that it furthers a legitimate governmental objective.
- Courts have determined that substantive due process is violated when a government action lacks any reasonable justification or fails to advance a legitimate governmental objective.
- 3) To withstand a claim that principles of substantive due process have been violated, a government action must (1) serve a legitimate governmental objective, (2) use means that are reasonably necessary to achieve that objective, and (3) not be unduly oppressive.

Under the U.S. Constitutional Provisions Takings Clause and Due Process Clauses:

- 1. The Fifth Amendment provides that private property shall not be taken for public use without the payment of just compensation.
- 2. Accordingly, the government may not take property except for public purposes within its constitutional authority and must provide just compensation for the property that has been taken.
- 3. The Fifth and Fourteenth Amendments also provide that no person shall be deprived of property without due process of law

Under the Washington State Constitution, Article 1, Section 16, provides, in part:

- 1. That "[n]o private property shall be taken or damaged for public or private use without just compensation."
- 2. In other words, the government may take private property, but must pay just compensation for the private property that is taken.

Warning Signals:

- 1. Does the Regulation or Action Result in a Permanent or Temporary Physical Occupation of Private Property? An example is a New York City case involving the installation of a cable box on the building, which was deemed as a taking as it took a portion of the property without providing compensation.
- 2. Does the Regulation or Action Deprive the Owner of All Economically Viable Uses of the Property? An example is from the State of South Carolina where a property owner wanted to develop property off the ocean. The state recently passed regulations for preservation of beaches. In some cases, all development activity was precluded because of the nature of building on a beach in a hurricane area. The affect of the regulation prohibited property owners from using their property. Under Washington State law, property owners are allowed to develop at the lowest level of development on a property containing critical areas.
- 3. Does the Regulation or Action Deny or Substantially Diminish a Fundamental Attribute of Property Ownership?
- 4. Does the Regulation or Action Require a Property Owner to Dedicate a Portion of Property, to Grant an Easement, or to Undertake Some Independent Financial Obligation?
- 5. Does the Regulatory Action Have a Severe Impact on the Landowner's Economic Interest? Note: The presence of a warning signal means there could be a constitutional issue that government staff should review with legal counsel.

The review process to evaluate proposed regulatory or administrative actions to avoid unconstitutional takings of private property by the City include:

- 1. Review and distribution of the Advisory Memorandum.
- 2. Using "warning signals", such as the examples in the Advisory Memorandum to evaluate proposed regulatory actions.
- 3. Application of an internal process to assess constitutional issues.
- 4. Incorporation of constitutional assessments into the City review process
- 5. Utilizing an internal process to respond to identified

constitutional issues.

Commissioner Kirkpatrick asked how the process affects the City's efforts for mitigation for endangered species. Manager Medrud said the City's Habitat Conservation Plan is based on a payment of an impact fee to mitigate the impacts of a potential take of endangered species. The payment of a fee is somewhat different as the state process requires presence of the species on the property. The City's interim process requires an applicant to complete a study. If gophers are present, development activity ceases until an alternative is identified. However, the lack of gophers enables proceeding with the development activity. Staff has learned through working with the federal government that the interpretation is different, as the federal government has determined that under the Endangered Species Act, the presence of potential habitat (soils) for the gopher determines whether there would be any impacts. If the property contains gopher soils from the federal perspective, the property has gophers regardless of whether gophers are present.

The Thurston County Habitat Conservation Plan is based on soils and a payment of a fee. Manager Medrud said he is not aware of any challenges to the plan. The City continues to develop its HCP but has not determined its specific approach.

Commissioner Kirkpatrick asked whether the fee is collected from the population. Manager Medrud said the fee is collected from the individual who is developing the property. However, the fee speaks to the issue of whether property owners should bear the burden of the larger issue of the community. As staff explored funding models, other sources of contribution were considered through the general government fund (Citywide funds) to support the HCP rather than relying on funding from development. Currently, a legal and an economic consultant are assisting staff.

Chair Robbins cited the City's previous planned actions and whether the City has ever been challenged for utilizing a planned action. Manager Medrud explained that planned actions are typically completed to save time for the developer, or it is used as a way to quantify potential impacts prior to development. Planned actions are defensible because they are based on particular development scenarios of either square footage or level of use based on a set of factors.

Manager Medrud encouraged the Commission to review the memorandum and become familiar with the provisions.

COMMISSIONER'S REPORTS:

There were no reports.

MANAGER'S REPORT:

Manager Medrud referred to the updated meeting schedule and topic list. The amount of time for the 2025 Comprehensive Plan Periodic Update has been extended through the end of 2025 based on the possibility that the Legislature will extend the update process by six months.

Staff testified during a legislative public hearing on the Wildland Urban-Interface Code on Friday, February 9, 2024. Dependent upon the timing of the Washington Building Code Council's review of the hearing results on the proposed changes, staff will determine when the update process will be reinitiated for all urban forestry amendments and add them to the meeting calendar. The amendments have been on hold pending resolution of the code at the state level.

PUBLIC COMMENT: There were no public comments.

PUBLIC HEARING:

ORDINANCE NO.
O2023-017, TMC 18.38
FP FLOODPLAIN
OVERLAY:

Chair Robbins reviewed the purpose and format of the public hearing on proposed changes to Ordinance No. O2023-017, TMC 18.38 FP Floodplain Overlay.

Chair Robbins opened the public hearing at 7:08 p.m.

Manager Medrud advised that staff did not receive any public comments on the proposed ordinance.

Manager Medrud reported the process is occurring across the state for the Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) National Flood Insurance Program. To ensure property owners located in floodplains or floodways have access to federally backed flood insurance, the City is required to update its floodplain management regulations to comply with FEMA standards. The update must be completed before new maps

become effective.

In May 2023, staff participated in a FEMA floodplain community assistance visit with Department of Ecology staff to review the City's floodplain ordinance. The community assistance visit determined the ordinance was in good standing but required some minor updates to reflect current federal standards.

In November 2023, FEMA notified the City of final flood determinations for Thurston County and incorporated areas. The FEMA flood hazard determination for the City is considered final. The Flood Insurance Study Report and the Flood Insurance Rate Maps covering the City become effective on May 8, 2024. The City utilizes both documents for regulatory purposes to identify properties that are located inside or outside of a floodplain. Prior to May 2024, the City is required to amend its existing floodplain regulations for consistency with the model ordinance for floodplain management, the Endangered Species Act, and the National Flood Insurance Program.

The staff report includes summaries of the 15 proposed amendments, the code sections affected, and proposed amendment language. Three new sections were added for detached accessory structures, storage, materials, equipment, and penalties.

Manager Medrud reviewed the proposed changes to Tumwater Municipal Code (TMC). Definitions was updated to clarify and add eight definitions to enhance correct interpretation of floodplain regulations. Language was added to reflect most current versions of the Flood Insurance Study (FIS) and Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRMs). The acronym of "BFE" for Base Flood Elevation significance or non-significance during a SEPA review was added. Language was clarified on how special flood hazard areas are identified using BFE and Flood Insurance Rate Maps, as well as the process and instances where the base flood and floodway data were not provided or available in the Flood Insurance Study and Flood Insurance Rate Maps.

The section on floodplain development permits was revised to improve clarity, remove passive language, and include a new requirement for a permit in special flood hazard areas (SFHAs). Acronyms were updated for consistency with the definitions section and five new subsections were added to provide additional detail on the application materials applicants must include within their applications.

Recording keeping was changed to reflect updated acronyms, elimination of passive language, addition of a process for floodplain administrator to ensure proposed construction would be safe from flooding when elevation data are not available, and an addition of a list of information the floodplain administrator shall obtain and make available to the public.

Changes to development and subdivisions clarified that short subdivisions, short plats, and binding site plans are subject to the floodplain ordinance, updated language to acronyms, and subdivisions or developments with over 50 lots or five acres must provide base flood elevation data with the application.

Changes to the section on flood protection standards include:

- In areas where the base flood elevation (BFE) data has been determined or obtained (A zones), all new development must be elevated at least one-foot above BFE.
- Materials used shall be resistant to flood damage.
- Construction methods that minimize flood damage.
- All structures, including manufactured homes and substantial improvements, shall be anchored properly.
- New construction and substantial improvement of any residential structure in an Unnumbered A zone and BFE is not available shall be raised two feet above highest adjacent grade.
- An attached garage constructed with the floor slab below the BFE must be designed to allow for the automatic entry and exit of floodwaters.

The nonresidential construction section was reformatted. The proposed changes create clear standards for non-residential development. Within the AE and A1-30 zones or other A zoned areas, new construction and substantial improvement of any commercial, industrial, or other nonresidential structure shall have the lowest floor, including basement, elevated one foot or more above the BFE. Information was added for unnumbered A zone when the BFE is not available, the lowest floor must be at least two feet above the highest adjacent grade.

Changes to manufactured homes add clarifying requirements for anchoring of manufactured homes that minimize flood damage and other anchoring requirements throughout TMC 18.38 that are applicable.

Detached accessory structures is a new section on standards for allowing structures to be built below the BFE used solely for parking of vehicles or limited storage. Different flood zones have different requirements for detached structures, such as size, elevation, materials, and items stored, and anchoring.

Storage of materials and equipment is a new section prohibiting storage or processing of materials that could be injurious to human, animal, or plant life if released due to damage from flooding in special flood hazard areas. Storage of other material or equipment may be allowed if not subject to damage by floods and if firmly anchored to prevent

flotation, or if readily removable from the area within the time available after flood warning.

Changes to floodway standards include:

- Clarifies encroachments, including fill, new construction, substantial improvements, and other development is prohibited unless a certification by a registered professional engineer demonstrating development would not result in any increase in flood levels during the occurrence of the base flood discharge.
- Clarifies that repairs, reconstruction, or improvements to a residential structure, which do not increase the ground floor area, may be allowed subject to outlined requirements.
- TMC 18.38.360(A)(1) is satisfied, or construction is allowed pursuant to TMC 18.38.360(A)(2), all new construction and substantial improvements in the floodway shall comply with all applicable flood hazard reduction provisions of TMC 18.38.

The Commission previously discussed the new proposed section on penalties for noncompliance. That particular section of the ordinance has been revised since the Commission's review on January 23, 2024. Section A reflects a change with the proposal to strike all language addressing specific monetary fines and the potential of jail time up to 90 days for any violations of the provisions. The language was removed and replaced with existing regulations in Title 1 for both criminal and civil procedures, which are sufficient to outline the penalty process if violations occur that are not resolved.

The Notice of Intent process has been completed through the State Department of Commerce. The SEPA Determination of Non-Significance received no public comments.

In response to a question during the work session regarding FEMA notification of the draft maps, FEMA is required to publish two notices in the newspaper of record for the communities affected by map changes. FEMA published notifications in *The Olympian* newspaper. The process includes a 90-day appeal period. No appeals were submitted during the 90-day period.

Draft FEMA maps are available online as well as the Thurston County Lakes Flood Map update and the Preliminary Hazard Map Update comparison.

Staff requests the Commission forward a recommendation of approval of the ordinance to the City Council following the conclusion of the public hearing. The Council is scheduled to consider the ordinance in March 2024.

With no public testimony, Chair Robbins closed the public hearing at

7:21 p.m.

MOTION:

Councilmember Tobias moved, seconded by Commissioner Edwards, to recommend approval of Ordinance No. O2023-017, Tumwater Floodplain Overlay, TMC 18.38 to the City Council. A voice vote approved the motion unanimously.

JOINT MEETING APPROACHES:

Manager Medrud reported on the completion of the Request for Proposals (RFP) process for the middle housing development code amendments. Staff selected a firm to assist the City with the amendments. An approved contract is scheduled for consideration by the end of February. The consultant will assist staff and the Commission address housing-related issues within the development code, as well as new requirements to expand different types of residential uses to existing single-family zones. A draft of the amendments is anticipated to be completed by the end of 2024.

Interlocal agreements for the land capacity analysis are nearing approval that are required for the update of the Land Use and Housing Elements. Staff completed the process for allocating housing across all economic groups for the City. The process will examine whether existing zones and property are sufficient to provide the required housing. Thurston Regional Planning Council is leading the process. Following receipt of the information, reviews will be initiated for specific changes to land use and housing.

In terms of the housing discussion, staff is working with the City of Lacey, Thurston County, and the City of Olympia on selection of a consultant to assist with the completion of a displacement study as a required element of the Housing Element update. New requirements require jurisdictions to address racially disparate impacts as a component of the update. The displacement study will support the work, as it will identify risks of particular neighborhoods through gentrification or allowing for increased density housing and ways to mitigate impacts. Four firms submitted proposals. Staff is currently reviewing the proposals with interviews scheduled within a week.

The joint meeting approaches discussion is prompted by the joint meeting with the City Council in December 2023 to review the 2024 work program. Ongoing conversations between members addressed actions that could improve the relationship between the Council and the Commission and some options to consider.

Manager Medrud referred to the meeting schedule and noted a series of joint meetings with the Council for both work sessions and tours within the community. The first joint meeting is scheduled in April as a joint

tour of Tumwater and adjoining neighborhoods for a discussion on housing. In June/July, the focus of the joint work sessions is on the development code, climate, and economic development. A joint tour is scheduled in August focused on transportation.

Manager Medrud invited feedback from members on the proposed schedule and ways to improve working together both with staff and the City Council.

Commissioner Varela asked about the availability of any tools or software programs to collaborate with the City Council. Manager Medrud said staff followed up with Communications staff because of specific requirements for accessibility and public information. At this time, the City lacks a process for sharing files between meetings or between the Commission and the City Council because of the possibility of triggering a quorum, which requires sufficient public notification. Instead, the focus is on communications within the meetings and as part of the agenda packets prepared by staff with staff serving as the conduit for processing comments and ideas for ongoing joint meeting discussions.

Chair Robbins inquired as to whether the consultant contracts could include assistance in structuring joint sessions with the City Council or other advisory bodies. Manager Medrud said it likely the work on middle housing and climate would be conducive for assistance by the consultant as there is a significant component included for public outreach. No proposals have been received to date for the Transportation RFP. The RFP process is still open. He envisions a component included in the transportation consultant contract. He added that the process relies on staff resources with support from Communications staff. Margo Hoffman recently joined the City as the City's Community Engagement Specialist. She serves as a resource for contacting and working with individuals. The City has expanded efforts by Communications staff as part of the update process.

Chair Robbins recommended defining a focus for each joint session to ensure meeting efficiency.

Commissioner Edwards offered that publishing meeting goals or desired outcomes would be helpful to guide the joint discussion.

Manager Medrud advised that the March meetings include discussions on the structure of the housing tour with the Council.

Manager Medrud reported the Council is updating the Strategic Priorities following its initial retreat and another retreat scheduled in the

next several days. Staff envisions existing strategic priorities to be improved with no major change in themes.

The amendments to the Comprehensive Plan in 2023 as well as the housekeeping amendments were reviewed and approved by the Council with only one change to the development code adding language regarding shadows created by structure height above the standard height limits. The Council wanted to ensure the code was sufficient to require the applicant to demonstrate the proposed structure would not impact neighboring properties.

CHANGES TO AGENDA:

There were no changes to the agenda.

COMMISSIONER'S REPORTS:

There were no reports.

MANAGER'S REPORT:

Manager Medrud referred to the updated meeting schedule. The meeting scheduled on March 12, 2024 has been cancelled. The next meeting is scheduled on March 26, 2024. The Commission is scheduled to participate in a bus tour with the City Council on April 9, 2024. Staff is preparing the tour itinerary. The tour is intended to visit some examples of middle housing to see how some of the examples could be incorporated within City design policies moving forward, as well as a discussion on housing issues. The tour includes neighborhoods in the Tumwater and Olympia.

In June through August, some joint work sessions with the Council are scheduled to review different elements of the Comprehensive Plan.

It is likely the Legislature will extend the deadline for completion of the Comprehensive Plan Periodic Update by six months to the end of December 2025.

PUBLIC COMMENT: Chair Robbins welcomed several students in attendance.

2025 COMPREHENSIVE PLAN PERIODIC UPDATE – COMMUNITY OUTREACH: Manager Medrud briefed Commissioners on the status of community outreach for the Comprehensive Plan Periodic Update.

Community engagement is guided by the Community Engagement Plan. The first open house was held on January 31, 2024. Staff compiled all public comments received both online and in-person during the open house. More outreach activities are planned during 2024. The process builds on work completed on the Community Engagement Plan. Based on some new state requirements as part of the Housing Element update and the new Climate Element, areas of focus will include engaging communities that have not typically been involved in the update

process. The objective of the community engagement process is to provide the community and stakeholders with equal opportunities to participate in the Periodic Update process.

For the Commission, the focus will be assisting staff in identifying various community members and community groups related to housing and other community economic groups. Manager Medrud encouraged members to provide any contact information for individuals or groups who should be contacted. Staff plans to schedule individual meetings to initiate the outreach process over the next several months. Staff is seeking as many opportunities as possible to reach a broader audience.

The Community Engagement Plan identifies tactics, strategies, and platforms intended to inform and consult with the community throughout the update. The entire process is intended to be flexible.

Five steps of the Periodic Update process include:

- Engage the Community
- Gather and Analyze Data
- Evaluate Policies
- Revise Policies
- Review and Update Regulations

The City contracted with a consultant to assist staff on the middle housing development code update. Several consultants responded to the Request for Qualifications (RFQ) for the Climate Element. Two proposals were submitted for assistance in updating the Transportation Plan. Staff is working through another RFQ process for the update of the Economic Development Plan. Policy revision steps are scheduled later in the year and into 2025. Concurrently, staff will review and recommend updates to development regulations.

The City's website includes all documents associated with the 2025 Comprehensive Plan Periodic Update process.

The first online survey closed on February 14, 2024. Approximately 920 surveys were completed. The Commission will receive a briefing on the results of the survey at its March 26, 2024 meeting. A number of participants expressed interest in addressing some specific issues surrounding the elements.

As part of the housing update, individual conservations are being scheduled with different organizations and individuals over the next several months to set the framework for the larger update. The intent is to provide more opportunities for focused hybrid open houses and a one-time in-person meeting. Manager Medrud encouraged

Commissioners to share information on potential organizations and groups that might be interested in receiving information about the update.

The initial open house agenda spanned a two-hour hybrid meeting with the first part sharing information on the open house process and introductions to staff and the topics. A series of online polls, as well as written polls were offered. Staff presented a 70-minute update on all elements followed by a question and answer session. The meeting ended with summary of the update process. Sixteen individuals participated virtually and 43 individuals attended in person with seven staff members.

The majority of participants own a home in the City, which is not necessarily reflective of the City's entire population with approximately 45% of the community renting a residence. The population of Tumwater is approximately 27,000 people with 26,000 different types of employment positions in the City. Most community members work elsewhere. Staff is working on ways to capture more individuals who work in the City as part of the update of the Economic Development Plan as well as those individuals who own a business in the City.

In term of race and ethnicity, most of the open house participants were white with some Hispanic participants, which is not reflective of the community population according to the recent U.S. Census. According to the Census, the City's population makeup is less than 80% white with a mix of other races.

Participants learned about the open house through word of mouth, social media, postcard mailing, from staff, next-door app, senior center, schoolteacher, and other sources.

Some of the questions asked by participants covered a wide spectrum of issues:

- Are more essential facilities like schools and social services being proposed? The City works closely with the Tumwater School District and the Olympia School District as part of the capital planning process to inform each school district about population growth and future land uses and development in the City.
- When will the survey results be posted? Survey results are scheduled to be posted in March 2024.
- Is the City trying to attract specific businesses or identifying any that are lacking? The question is addressed as part of the update of the Economic Development Plan.

- How will affordable housing be provided for future generations?
- How can I be more involved with the housing challenges in our community?
- How were housing projections determined? City housing projections are based on projections provided by the state to each county. Counties work with local jurisdictions to allocate housing needs for the next 20 years.
- How will density, land use, and zoning designations change? Changes are anticipated because of the new requirement to accommodate housing for all economic classes.
- How will the E-Street extension project be addressed? *The City is scheduling a separate meeting about the project during early* 2024.
- Will old or unused sites be considered for redevelopment?
- What are the steps to address the housing crisis?
- How do we create walkable neighborhoods and needed sidewalks? An emphasis of the Transportation Plan update is walking, bicycling, and other modes of travel other than a vehicle.
- How do we fund housing, services, essential facilities, and social services?

Commissioner Edwards inquired about the possibility of using the questions from the community open house to create a frequently asked question and answer document and posting it on the website. Manager Medrud replied that the Community Engagement Plan includes information on ways the City will responds to comments and questions. Staff is working to develop a document to include on the website.

Manager Medrud reported the three focus areas of the update are affordable housing, climate and environment, and transportation. Open house participants expressed interest in all topics in addition to other categories. Some suggested topics were shared on housing with participants supporting all options. Similar feedback was received on climate and environment by addressing greenhouse gas emissions and climate adaptation. Much interest was conveyed by participants on transportation forecasting and modeling with some interest in bicycle and pedestrian infrastructure and access to public transportation. As part of the Request for Proposal process for the consultant for the Transportation Plan update, the City included a specific request for public engagement during the update of the Transportation Plan.

Participants were asked about preferred ways to learn about future conversations (ranked by preference):

- Email
- City Website

- Social Media
- Postcard/Direct Mail
- Utility Bill Insert
- Text
- Council/Public Meetings
- Doorhanger
- Cable

Manager Medrud summarized the phases of the update process:

Phase 1 – 2024-2025 – Community Engagement

- Data Collection
- Review of existing Plan Elements, Development Code, and State Requirements
- Community Engagement Website, Social Media, Community Survey, and Open Houses

Phase 2 – 2024 – Plan Development

- Open Houses on specific topics such as housing, climate, and transportation
- Planning Commission and City Council meetings on proposed amendments (Joint City Tours with City Council, Tuesday, April 9, 2024 – Housing & Tuesday, August 13, 2024 – Transportation)

Phase 3 – 2025 – Legislative Adoption Process

- Planning Commission review and public hearings(s)
- City Council review and approval

Commissioner Tobias asked about the possibility of other surveys including an option for participants to rank their issue in order of importance or priority to help determine a weighted average of the top issues of importance. A ranked choice survey could be useful for the City and the Commission. Manager Medrud replied that the survey was intended specifically for the participants of the open house. Survey data includes some ranked data. The survey was based on a willingness to participate rather than a scientific survey.

Chair Robbins noted that many of the responses are interrelated. She asked about potential ways to create the appropriate context between the different elements because they are all interdependent. Manager Medrud agreed and indicated that staff attempted to present each element separately to assist the community in learning about the individual components of the plan as a way to avoid overwhelming them with so much information.

Chair Robbins asked about any outreach to the Squaxin Island Tribe. Manager Medrud affirmed that staff is pursuing a process to outreach the tribes to include the Squaxin Island Tribe, Nisqually Indian Tribe, and Confederated Tribes of the Chehalis Reservation. Staff will be contacting each Tribal Chair and tribal staff, extending invitations, and sharing information about the update process.

Chair Robbins suggested contacting different cultural community festivals/events to share information. Manager Medrud confirmed staff is pursuing those types of avenues. Planner Smith-Erickson also contacted local businesses and groups to share information about the update and community open houses and other engagement opportunities.

Planner Smith-Erickson added that the City hired a Community Engagement Specialist who is assisting staff with community outreach and social media. The first open house served as a resource to assist in identifying other ways to reach a broader audience.

Manager Medrud noted that the Department is currently in the process of hiring a new Senior Planner. The position will assist in the update process as well.

2025 Comprehensive Plan Update – Community Survey Results

In November 2023, the City of Tumwater launched its first online community survey as part of community engagement for the 2025 Comprehensive Plan periodic update. The intent of the survey was to inform the community about the update, gauge interest in specific topics and elements, identify preferences for notification and events, and evaluate how to improve public engagement. Over 22,000 postcards were mailed, and notices were posted on City's webpage and social media platforms.

The survey was a nonscientific survey that reflected the opinions of those who chose to respond to the survey. The survey closed February 14, 2024, and 975 responses were received.

This memorandum summarizes what staff learned, the demographics of those who participated in the survey, what the priorities are for those who responded, the best methods of public notification for those who responded, and where staff need to improve the City's community outreach to be more inclusive and reach all groups in the community.

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Background

On a ten-year cycle, the City is required to conduct a 20-year Growth Management Act periodic update of its Comprehensive Plan and development regulations. Responding to changes since the City completed its last major periodic update of the Plan in 2016; the updated Plan and development regulations will reflect the community's vision and the state's requirements for the Plan and the City's development regulations.

The updated Comprehensive Plan will address diversity, equity, and inclusion throughout the Plan and incorporate climate mitigation, adaptation, and sustainability goals and actions in all the individual Elements.

The ten goals for the City's 2025 periodic update community engagement from the final Community Engagement Plan from July 2023 are to:

- 1. Provide information to enhance community understanding of issues.
- 2. Seek early and continuous involvement from people who care about the Comprehensive Plan and the community.
- 3. Offer opportunities for the community to provide feedback to staff and appointed and elected officials.
- 4. Develop an accessible, equitable, and engaging Plan.
- 5. Make community-driven planning the priority for the Plan.
- 6. Highlight projects implemented since the last Comprehensive Plan periodic update.
- 7. Use a flexible, phased approach.
- 8. Integrate and consolidate goals from all Elements of this Plan.
- 9. Develop a Plan that is in an easy to read and understandable format.
- 10. Rely on multiple communications strategies, tactics, and platforms to share information.

The Community Engagement Plan identifies ways that staff will engage with the community and stakeholders. The plan identifies surveys as one medium to assess community priorities. Staff reviewed the Community Survey from the 2016 update to determine which questions would be appropriate to ask again in 2024.

<u>Intent</u>

After holding internal meetings with the Communications Department, staff decided the focus of the first survey would be to inform the community that the update was underway and share information on how to participate in the 2024 Comprehensive Plan update. Staff wanted to let the community know the update is happening, find out what communication methods work best for the respondents, determine what days and times work best for public meetings for the respondents, and which topics and elements those who responded were most interested in learning more about.

By collecting demographic information such as ethnicity, income, types of residence, and age from those who responded, staff were able to identify gaps in the City's initial community outreach to address in future outreach to address gaps in inclusion and equity.

Responses

The survey was available online on the City's project website¹ from the beginning of November 2023 to February 14, 2024. There were 975 participants. The survey was shared on the City's social media and notice of the survey was mailed to all City residents by postcard on December 4, 2023.

The survey was a nonscientific survey that reflected the opinions of those who chose to respond to the survey, so conclusions drawn from the results should take that into account.


There were thirty-five questions in the survey. Attachment B is the presentation of the survey results. Attachment C is a summary of all the survey questions and written responses.

Demographics

The first eight and last four questions of the survey focused on demographic questions related to respondents' employment, residency, type of housing, income, gender, race/ethnicity, age, household type, and education.

Attachment D is the Tumwater 2023 Statistical Profile form November 2023 prepared by the Thurston Regional Planning Council. A comparison of the demographic responses from the survey with the 2023 Statistical Profile shows the difference between the profile of the survey respondents and the population of the community.










Household Income - 2023 Statistical Profile


Median Household Income*

The demographic responses in the survey showed that a majority of the respondents were white, home-owning, female between the ages of 35-54 couples with children at home with an annual income of \$124,999 or more.

While the survey was not representative of the community overall, it did allow staff to determine which groups that staff will need to expand their future community outreach efforts to include.

Communication Preferences

Four questions in the survey asked about the communication preferences of the respondents. Staff were able to gather information about the days and times for the survey respondents that worked best for public meetings, obtaining contact information, and the best way to be notified. 




Five questions in the survey asked about current City services, "quality of life," critical issues the City is facing, and what are the City's greatest assets.





Not enough housing for seniors, retirement homes, fixed income, or assisted/independent living.

Need more middle housing and mixed development- with options to buy duplexes/condo/smaller houses.

Not enough affordable housing – rent or owning. Rentals are too high priced, and people cannot save to buy houses.

Smaller more affordable single-family residences or multifamily units that could be purchased.

Concerns homelessness and crime in public places/parks.

Question #21

There were 485 written survey responses to Question #21 "What do you want the City to consider when working on housing issues?" and they are found on pages 76 – 97 of Attachment C.

Sample of responses to "What do you want the City to consider when working on housing issues?"

Concern with high density housing, schools being crowded, lack of infrastructure to support growth, and population growth.

Regulations that protect property taxes, short term rentals and private companies purchasing housing and using as rentals, controlling the rental market and prices, capping interest rates.

Anti-growth and development, keep single family residences or do not build more housing and apartments. Providing more housing will not solve homelessness.

Concern with overcrowding and traffic impacts.

Lower impact fees, streamline and create a faster permitting system, and stop raising property taxes to incentivize more affordable housing.

Provide facilities for behavioral health services and treatment centers.

Affordability for all income / age groups.

Summary and Next Steps

Overall, the 2025 comprehensive plan update received far more responses than the previous update. The 2015 Comprehensive Plan Survey posted through constant contact received 120 responses, this year's survey yielded 855 more responses.

The survey received far more responses than staff were expecting. Staff will make more efforts to reach out to renters, those making less than median income, the BIPOC community, eighteen to thirty-four years old and fifty-five and older, single with no children at home. Staff have started to reach out to non-profit groups, schools, realtors, renters, housing workgroups, and other potential groups to be a part of a stakeholder group for the Housing Element update, which will help give a better representation of the community when collecting input. Staff will use the day and times for future events, utilize email and preferred contact methods for future outreach.

After reviewing the responses, survey respondents appeared to have the following topics of interest: homelessness and safety, keeping the small town feel of Tumwater and reducing sprawl, preserving and creating green spaces in development, more recreational activities such as parks, redevelopment of the former Olympia Brewery and creating a downtown area, multimodal transportation, and more affordable housing options for different income segments and ages.















Q14 How would you rate the overall quality of life in Tumwater today?






Q23 What is your preferred platform for meetings?






Q33 Which category includes your current age?

Q34 Which of the following best describes your household at this time?













New Residential Units Issued Building Permits





Households by Income (2017-2021)*




