APPROVAL OF MINUTES: GENERAL GOVERNMENT COMMITTEE, FEBRUARY 14. 2024:

MOTION: Councilmember Dahlhoff moved, seconded by Councilmember

Cathey, to approve the minutes of February 14, 2024 as

published. A voice vote approved the motion.

CHAIR:

SELECTION OF COMMITTEE City Administrator Parks requested consideration of extending the meeting length up to 90 minutes to accommodate sufficient time for agenda topics. The committee also has the option of considering a different meeting time. Following discussion, members supported extending the meeting length for up to 90 minutes and retaining the current meeting time of 8 a.m.

Chair Althauser invited nominations for Chair.

Councilmember Dahlhoff nominated Michael Althauser to serve as Chair.

No other nominations were offered.

MOTION: Councilmember Dahlhoff moved, seconded by Councilmember

Cathey, to elect Michael Althauser to serve as Chair. A vote

approved the motion unanimously.

THURSTON COUNTY RENTAL ASSISTANCE **SURVEY:**

Manager Medrud reported that as part of the City's implementation of the Thurston Housing Action Plan, the General Government Committee requested current information about renters in the community. He introduced Elisa Sparkman, Communications Specialist, Thurston County Office of Housing and Homeless Prevention. Ms. Sparkman will present the results of the 2023 survey of Thurston County residents who received COVID-19 rental assistance through the Emergency Rent Assistance Program (ERAP)

and the Treasury Rent Assistance Program (T-RAP).

Ms. Sparkman reported Thurston County provided rental and utility assistance funds through the ERAP to renters from fall 2020 through summer 2023. During those three years, Thurston County provided approximately \$53.5 million in rent and utility assistance. In August 2023, Thurston County sent a survey to community members receiving assistance. The online survey was available in English and Spanish through Survey Monkey. The survey received a 30% response rate. Of the 2,000 people receiving assistance, 541 completed the survey.

Councilmember Cathey asked whether the program amount was based on a formula or at the request of Thurston County. Ms. Sparkman said most of the funds were allocated based likely on population. However, when funds were expended, the county requested additional funds because some counties were unable to meet deadlines for expending funds requiring those counties to return the funds. Thurston County was able to request those funds because of the county's effective disbursement system. Subsequently, Thurston County received additional funds in addition to the original allocation.

Ms. Sparkman reported that heads of households responding to the survey were mostly between the ages of 25 and 44. Most of those were responding on behalf of their households did not necessarily represent the same age, race, or ethnicity of their households. More women responded on behalf of their households.

Of the respondents asked about their current living situation, 19% reported they were homeless or in between housing or living with friends and family. Many are not currently renting housing. Two households indicated they no longer rent because they now own a home. The remaining responses varied among common rental situations with over half renting an apartment.

Most respondents received utility assistance in addition to rental assistance. Most respondents indicated they did not receive a shutoff notice; however, 20% of the 54% reported they received a shutoff notice but were able to pay prior to any shut off with some experiencing a temporary shut-off of utilities.

Approximately 39% reported receiving an eviction notice after receiving rental assistance. Most of those reporting did not experience eviction while 14% moved prior to the pay or vacate date. Approximately 13% reported an eviction in process while only 2% were evicted by court order. Of the 71% who reported prevention of

an eviction, they reported payment of rent or working with the Eviction Resolution Pilot Program through the Thurston County Dispute Resolution Center by negotiating a repayment plan. The pilot program worked closely with the ERAP and T-RAP teams as well as with volunteer legal assistance resources.

Respondents reported on their current situations. Approximately 75% reported that most of their income is spent on rent and utilities with 32% reporting income versus rental and utility obligations were equal or higher, 43% reported that most of their income was equal to their rent and utilities, 31% reported on their ability to cover their rent and utilities but nothing beyond essential needs, and only 4% reported that they are managing and can cover rent, utilities, essential needs, and additional comforts (25 households).

Responses to the question of current needs to receive additional rental assistance included a series of multiple choice responses:

- Need rent assistance now (8%)
- Need rental assistance for the next several years (8%)
- Need rental assistance for another year (16%)
- Need rental assistance for several months (22%)
- Need rental assistance to catch up (17%)
- Not right now but will if I have an emergency (24%)
- Not right now and do not think I will in the future (5%)

Approximately 71% of the respondents currently need rent assistance representing 381 households of the 541 households responding to the survey. Of those responses, 86 respondents reported needing long-term assistance and 25% of the respondents reported the need for assistance during an emergency representing 132 households. The availability of rental assistance funds today through the county's Eviction Prevention Rent Assistance Program, a new program offered last year and funded through a provision of document recording fees. From April 2023 to September 2023, 162 households were served countywide. Funding is short of community needs with the program continuously at capacity with closed waitlists. In 2023, funding availability was \$1.5 million, compared to \$17 million each year of the pandemic under the ERAP and T-RAP processes.

Seventy-five of the respondents reported an experience in rent increase since October 2021 when rental increases were allowed following the eviction moratorium. A rent increase of \$100 or more was reported by 35 respondents with 43 respondents reporting rent increases of \$600 or more per month.

Homelessness and housing stability are highly correlated with rent increases according to the Washington State Department of Commerce.

One hundred and eighty-five households reported that someone in their household experienced homelessness in the last five years. Recent experiences of homelessness places individuals at a higher risk of returning to homelessness.

The last survey question invited respondents to share information about their experience with rent assistance. Most of the responses were overwhelmingly of gratitude for the assistance with the main critique that the process was too long, and that help was still required.

The Eviction Prevention Rent Assistance Program is available today through Community Youth Services, Family Support Center, and Partners in Prevention Education working together to ensure program alignment. Document recording fees are not a stable source of funding for the program. Limited short-term rent assistance is also available through faith communities, school districts, and some homeless service agencies.

Councilmember Cathey asked whether document recording fees are the only source of funds for rent assistance, and whether there are other conversations in progress to discuss other possible sources of funding. Ms. Sparkman advised that at this time, information has been shared to assist in promoting conversations. She presented a similar presentation to the Washington State Senate Housing Committee and some statewide organizations in January 2024. She is hopeful those conversations can drive more discussions to identify other sources of funds to increase rent assistance funding. Based on funding during COVID and the ongoing need, it likely \$20 million in funds would be required for rental assistance in the region. Essentially, when funding resources are limited, screening tools for the funding program become more selective of who receives assistance.

Councilmember Cathey commented on the difficulty of individuals contacting churches and other organizations for rental assistance. It is difficult for many people experiencing difficulties to ask for help.

Councilmember Dahlhoff asked about other resources or points of contacts for individuals who do not qualify for immediate rent assistance but have obvious needs. Ms. Sparkman advised that social service organizations typically provide case management services for housing stability. The organizations are able to share information

on available resources within the community. The Dispute Resolution Center is providing services for landlord and tenants for the cities of Lacey, Olympia, and Tumwater. The Center's prior pilot program enabled working with the household that was served an eviction notice and in the process of receiving rent assistance to help resolve issues with the landlord.

Councilmember Dahlhoff cited several examples of landlords in Tumwater that are unwilling to work with the programs through the Dispute Resolution Center. She asked about the outcome in those circumstances when parties are unwilling to work to resolve the issue. Ms. Sparkman responded that it would likely entail a legal process. The state offers the statewide Eviction Defense telephone line option for tenants to contact for assignment through local Thurston County volunteer legal services or the Northwest Justice Project eviction attorneys.

Ms. Sparkman reported during COVID, participation in the Eviction Resolution Pilot Program was mandatory for landlords. Today, it is no longer mandatory to participate; however, the program continues to provide beneficial assistance. The cities provide funding to the Dispute Resolution Center to help fund the service.

Thurston County continues to experience an increase in evictions causing an increased demand on the court system and creating an eviction on an individual's housing record causing future housing stability issues that often lead to homelessness.

During the first half of 2023 when the programs were available, the average number of monthly evictions filed in Thurston County was 47.8. During the latter half of the year when the programs were no longer available, filings jumped to 73.6 per month reflecting an unprecedented rise in evictions. In October 2023, 98 evictions were filed.

Last year, the Thurston County Homeless Census Survey (Point in Time Count) asked participants who were actively experiencing homelessness what led to their homelessness. The top two reasons were job loss and unemployment and eviction and loss of housing. The survey asked about the support individuals need for obtaining permanent housing. The top response was rent assistance and more affordable housing.

The Thurston County 2024 Point in Time Count was completed in January with preliminary data scheduled for release soon. The same questions in the survey were replicated to compare the results with 2023 responses. Essentially, responding to homelessness costs more

than preventing evictions and keeping people housed. An increase in homelessness in the region results in additional financial and emotional strain on the homeless crisis response system, shelter capacity, homeless service agencies, front line staff, and community services, hospitals, and schools. Through the state's Right-of-Way Initiative, the region has been able to clear local homeless encampments. An increase in homelessness could result in a reemergence of encampments. Homeless individuals experience higher rates of illness and die on an average 12 years sooner than the general U.S. population. Homelessness creates new health problems for individuals and acerbates existing problems.

Ms. Sparkman reported the recommendation is to continue supporting legislative policy to increase funding for rent assistance and rent stabilization. The survey was a joint project with the Office of Housing and Homeless Prevention and Thurston County Public Health and Social Services with assistance from the department's epidemiologist and partner organizations involved in the ERAP and T-RAP programs.

The committee thanked Ms. Sparkman for providing the information and acknowledged that the depth of the task is often difficult to grasp. The presentation provided a view of the scope and the stakes. It is also likely rental rates will continue to increase acerbating the situation further.

Manager Medrud reported on a joint tour of the community by the Council and the Planning Commission on April 9, 2024. Staff is forwarding materials to help prepare for the tour. The tour will focus on all housing issues.

Councilmember Cathey asked about the committee's intent to discuss the Multifamily Tax Exemption Program for developers of multifamily housing. She asked to add a discussion of the program at an upcoming meeting.

Manager Medrud said staff intends to provide a report on the status of the program but cautioned against an extensive review of the program because of the lack of capacity in the existing work program. He recommended folding the discussion into the Council's larger discussion as part of the Housing Element and development code updates over the next several years.

Councilmember Cathey conveyed disappointment with the timeline because many in the community are unhappy about the tax exemption program as well as the lack of a Council discussion about the program. Manager Medrud advised that the Council can

prioritize the discussion and review; however, it would be important to consider deferring other work item(s) on the work program to afford adequate capacity for staff to pursue a review appropriately. The effort would likely entail several hundred hours of staff time.

The committee discussed next steps. Chair Althauser noted the work program has been established and approved by the Council. It would likely require the Council's review of the work program and agreement to remove a work item to accommodate a review of the tax exemption program. He suggested following up with Manager Medrud and Planner Smith-Erickson to identify potential work items that could be deferred. It is also important to note that no development projects are proposed that would utilize the program at this time.

Discussion ensued on the existing program and policy and the logical nest steps for reviewing the program and performance to inform any actions for changes. Councilmember Cathey agreed and added that the review should include discussions on how the program impacts the City financially, who bears the burden of the tax deferral, how the program might be impacting housing, and how it is affecting the City's housing goals. Councilmember Althauser and Councilmember Dahlhoff agreed it would be important to review the program because the rental housing market is much different than it was in 2016/2017. Both agreed that the issue is timing.

Manager Medrud responded to questions about the level of effort to prepare for a Council discussion. Essentially, it depends on the level of the conversation. A report on the status of the program could be scheduled during the committee's May meeting; however, any conversations surrounding the cost to the community would require additional research by staff. The briefing could include an outline of the steps for a further evaluation of the program. At that time, the committee could discuss the level of resources required and potential changes to the work program. Additionally, the Wildland-Urban Interface Code was adopted by the Legislature. Staff is preparing to reinitiate the urban forestry amendment process comprised of three ordinances for tree and vegetation preservation, landscaping, and street trees. The work is included in the work program. The proposed amendments would likely be presented to the committee in late spring/summer.

City Administrator Parks recapped the committee's interest in revisiting and understanding how the existing program adopted by the Council has been implemented. As a component of the required update of the Comprehensive Plan Housing Element, the Council is scheduled to discuss a series of new requirements the City is

obligated to review based on changes to the Growth Management Act. The Multifamily Tax Exemption Program is a component of the implementation of housing policies along with a variety of other strategies. A review of existing data and information on the status of the program could be compiled by staff. In the context of the Comprehensive Plan update, it would be appropriate for the Council to discuss policies surrounding the program. Generally, rising costs of housing are due to the lack of supply across all income levels. She thanked Manager Medrud for his articulation in understanding the programs and the staff process of prioritizing the work program of work items important to the community.

Manager Medrud added that at the June 14, 2023 committee meeting, members reviewed the status of the Multifamily Tax Exemption Program and Manufactured Home Park Preservation options. That original staff report and the presentation provide a good update on how the program has been utilized and potential next steps. He offered to explore additional information requested by members following their review of the materials.

The committee agreed to review the materials from the meeting and contact Manager Medrud with any additional questions to include in the May meeting.

RESOLUTION NO. R2024-007, AMENDING THE 2024 FEE RESOLUTION:

Director Niemeyer reported the proposal includes several minor changes because of an oversight when the Council adopted the Fee Resolution last November.

Most of the additions are Community Development fees with the exception of School Impact Fees for Tumwater School District that were not updated. The update is necessary to ensure the City collects the correct fees on new development for the school district. The resolution updates the fee schedule with the proposed changes. The request is to recommend placement of Resolution R2024-007 on the Consent Agenda at the March 19, 2024, City Council meeting with a recommendation for approval.

MOTION:

Councilmember Cathey moved, seconded by Councilmember Dahlhoff, to recommend placement of Resolution R2024-007 on the Consent Agenda at the March 19, 2024, City Council meeting with a recommendation of approval. A voice vote approved the motion unanimously.

With there being no further business, Chair Althauser adjourned the meeting at 9:04 a.m.

2025 Comprehensive Plan Update – Community Survey Results

In November 2023, the City of Tumwater launched its first online community survey as part of community engagement for the 2025 Comprehensive Plan periodic update. The intent of the survey was to inform the community about the update, gauge interest in specific topics and elements, identify preferences for notification and events, and evaluate how to improve public engagement. Over 22,000 postcards were mailed, and notices were posted on City's webpage and social media platforms.

The survey was a nonscientific survey that reflected the opinions of those who chose to respond to the survey. The survey closed February 14, 2024, and 975 responses were received.

This memorandum summarizes what staff learned, the demographics of those who participated in the survey, what the priorities are for those who responded, the best methods of public notification for those who responded, and where staff need to improve the City's community outreach to be more inclusive and reach all groups in the community.

Background

On a ten-year cycle, the City is required to conduct a 20-year Growth Management Act periodic update of its Comprehensive Plan and development regulations. Responding to changes since the City completed its last major periodic update of the Plan in 2016; the updated Plan and development regulations will reflect the community's vision and the state's requirements for the Plan and the City's development regulations.

The updated Comprehensive Plan will address diversity, equity, and inclusion throughout the Plan and incorporate climate mitigation, adaptation, and sustainability goals and actions in all the individual Elements.

The ten goals for the City's 2025 periodic update community engagement from the final Community Engagement Plan from July 2023 are to:

- 1. Provide information to enhance community understanding of issues.
- 2. Seek early and continuous involvement from people who care about the Comprehensive Plan and the community.
- 3. Offer opportunities for the community to provide feedback to staff and appointed and elected officials.
- 4. Develop an accessible, equitable, and engaging Plan.
- 5. Make community-driven planning the priority for the Plan.
- 6. Highlight projects implemented since the last Comprehensive Plan periodic update.
- 7. Use a flexible, phased approach.
- 8. Integrate and consolidate goals from all Elements of this Plan.
- 9. Develop a Plan that is in an easy to read and understandable format.
- 10. Rely on multiple communications strategies, tactics, and platforms to share information.

The Community Engagement Plan identifies ways that staff will engage with the community and stakeholders. The plan identifies surveys as one medium to assess community priorities. Staff reviewed the Community Survey from the 2016 update to determine which questions would be appropriate to ask again in 2024.

<u>Intent</u>

After holding internal meetings with the Communications Department, staff decided the focus of the first survey would be to inform the community that the update was underway and share information on how to participate in the 2024 Comprehensive Plan update. Staff wanted to let the community know the update is happening, find out what communication methods work best for the respondents, determine what days and times work best for public meetings for the respondents, and which topics and elements those who responded were most interested in learning more about.

By collecting demographic information such as ethnicity, income, types of residence, and age from those who responded, staff were able to identify gaps in the City's initial community outreach to address in future outreach to address gaps in inclusion and equity.

Responses

The survey was available online on the City's project website¹ from the beginning of November 2023 to February 14, 2024. There were 975 participants. The survey was shared on the City's social media and notice of the survey was mailed to all City residents by postcard on December 4, 2023.

The survey was a nonscientific survey that reflected the opinions of those who chose to respond to the survey, so conclusions drawn from the results should take that into account.


There were thirty-five questions in the survey. Attachment B is the presentation of the survey results. Attachment C is a summary of all the survey questions and written responses.

Demographics

The first eight and last four questions of the survey focused on demographic questions related to respondents' employment, residency, type of housing, income, gender, race/ethnicity, age, household type, and education.

Attachment D is the Tumwater 2023 Statistical Profile form November 2023 prepared by the Thurston Regional Planning Council. A comparison of the demographic responses from the survey with the 2023 Statistical Profile shows the difference between the profile of the survey respondents and the population of the community.

Work and Employment – Survey Responses











Type of Household and Income – Survey Responses




Household Income – 2023 Statistical Profile






Households by Income (2017-2021)*

The demographic responses in the survey showed that a majority of the respondents were white, home-owning, female between the ages of 35-54 couples with children at home with an annual income of \$124,999 or more.

While the survey was not representative of the community overall, it did allow staff to determine which groups that staff will need to expand their future community outreach efforts to include.

Four questions in the survey asked about the communication preferences of the respondents. Staff were able to gather information about the days and times for the survey respondents that




Looking at the City Now


Five questions in the survey asked about current City services, "quality of life," critical issues the City is facing, and what are the City's greatest assets.

The responses are summarized below. The questions provided multiple choice options and the ability to add comments. Though the data received is not representative of the community, there were obvious specific topics and concerns based on the comments. The tables below are summaries of the written comments received on each question. Summary and Next Steps

Overall, the 2025 comprehensive plan update received far more responses than the previous update. The 2015 Comprehensive Plan Survey posted through constant contact received 120 responses, this year's survey yielded 855 more responses.

The survey received far more responses than staff were expecting. Staff will make more efforts to reach out to renters, those making less than median income, the BIPOC community, eighteen to thirty-four years old and fifty-five and older, single with no children at home. Staff have started to reach out to non-profit groups, schools, realtors, renters, housing workgroups, and other potential groups to be a part of a stakeholder group for the Housing Element update, which will help give a better representation of the community when collecting input. Staff will use the day and times for future events, utilize email and preferred contact methods for future outreach.

After reviewing the responses, survey respondents appeared to have the following topics of interest: homelessness and safety, keeping the small town feel of Tumwater and reducing sprawl, preserving and creating green spaces in development, more recreational activities such as parks, redevelopment of the former Olympia Brewery and creating a downtown area, multimodal transportation, and more affordable housing options for different income segments and ages.






Type of Residence

Owner-Occupied Housing Unit Rate (2018 – 2022) 59.4%










Q23 What is your preferred platform for meetings?


Q33 Which category includes your current age?

Q34 Which of the following best describes your household at this time?













Households by Income (2017-2021)*







CITY OF TUMWATER SERVICE PROVIDER AGREEMENT

2025 COMPREHENSIVE PLAN UDPATE CLIMATE ELEMENT DEVELOPMENT

	THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into in duplicate this day
of_	, 2024, by and between the CITY OF TUMWATER, a
Wa	shington municipal corporation, hereinafter referred to as the "CITY", and EXP
U.S	S. SERVICES, INC., a California corporation, hereinafter referred to as the
"SI	ERVICE PROVIDER".

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the CITY desires to have certain services and/or tasks performed as set forth below requiring specialized skills and other supportive capabilities; and

WHEREAS, sufficient CITY resources are not available to provide such services; and

WHEREAS, the SERVICE PROVIDER represents that the SERVICE PROVIDER is qualified and possesses sufficient skills and the necessary capabilities, including technical expertise, where required, to perform the services and/or tasks set forth in this Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the terms, conditions, covenants, and performance contained herein, the parties hereto agree as follows:

1. SCOPE OF SERVICES.

The SERVICE PROVIDER shall perform such services and accomplish such tasks, including the furnishing of all materials and equipment necessary for full performance thereof, as are identified and designated as SERVICE PROVIDER responsibilities throughout this Agreement and as detailed in Exhibit "A" Scope of Services and Exhibit "C" Schedule attached hereto and incorporated herein (the "Project").

2. TERM.

The Project shall begin no earlier than April 1, 2024, and shall be completed no later than December 31, 2025. This Agreement may be extended for additional periods of time upon mutual written agreement of the parties.

3. TERMINATION.

Prior to the expiration of the Term, this Agreement may be terminated immediately, with or without cause, by the CITY.

In the event of termination, the City shall pay and reimburse the Service Provider for all fees for services performed and direct cost associated with such termination.

4. COMPENSATION AND METHOD OF PAYMENT.

- A. Payments for services provided hereunder shall be made following the performance of such services, unless otherwise permitted by law and approved in writing by the CITY.
- B. No payment shall be made for any service rendered by the SERVICE PROVIDER except for services identified and set forth in this Agreement.
- C. The CITY shall pay the SERVICE PROVIDER for work performed under this Agreement a total sum not to exceed three hundred and nineteen thousand, eight hundred and eighty dollars, and no cents (\$319,880.00 as reflected in Exhibit "B' Budget.
- D. Upon execution of this Agreement, the SERVICE PROVIDER must submit IRS Form W-9 Request for Taxpayer Identification Number (TIN) and Certification unless a current Form W-9 is already on file with the CITY.
- E. The SERVICE PROVIDER shall submit an invoice to the CITY for services rendered during the contract period. The CITY shall initiate authorization for payment after receipt of said invoice and shall make payment to the SERVICE PROVIDER within approximately thirty (30) days thereafter.
- F. When subcontracting services or purchasing goods from third parties, as identified and approved in this Agreement, the SERVICE PROVIDER must submit written documentation establishing that the goods and/or services have been provided and the third party has been paid in order to receive payment for such goods and/or services.
- G. Invoices may be submitted immediately following performance of services, but in no event shall an invoice be submitted more than twenty (20) business days following the end of the contract term or the end of the calendar year, whichever is earlier.

5. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR RELATIONSHIP.

- A. The parties intend that an independent contractor relationship will be created by this Agreement. Subject to paragraphs herein, the implementation of services pursuant to this Agreement will lie solely within the discretion of the SERVICE PROVIDER. No agent, employee, servant or representative of the SERVICE PROVIDER shall be deemed to be an employee, agent, servant or representative of the CITY for any purpose, and the employees of the SERVICE PROVIDER are not entitled to any of the benefits the CITY provides for its employees. The SERVICE PROVIDER will be solely and entirely responsible for its acts and for the acts of its agents, employees, servants, subcontractors or representatives during the performance of this Agreement.
- B. In the performance of the services herein contemplated the SERVICE PROVIDER is an independent contractor with the authority to control and direct the performance of the details of the work; however, the results of the work contemplated herein must meet the approval of the CITY and shall be subject to the CITY'S general rights of inspection and review to secure the satisfactory completion thereof.
- C. As an independent contractor, the SERVICE PROVIDER shall be responsible for the reporting and payment of all applicable local, state, and federal taxes.
- D. It is recognized that the SERVICE PROVIDER may or will be performing services during the Term for other parties; provided, however, that such performance of other services shall not conflict with or interfere with the SERVICE PROVIDER'S ability to perform the services.

6. SERVICE PROVIDER EMPLOYEES/AGENTS.

The CITY may at its sole discretion require the SERVICE PROVIDER to remove an employee, agent or servant from employment on this Project. The SERVICE PROVIDER may, however, employ that individual on other non-CITY related projects.

7. <u>HOLD HARMLESS INDEMNIFICATION</u>.

A. <u>SERVICE PROVIDER Indemnification</u>. The SERVICE PROVIDER agrees to indemnify, defend and hold the CITY, its elected officials, officers, employees, agents, and volunteers harmless from any and all claims, demands, losses, actions and liabilities (including costs and all reasonable attorney fees) to or by any and all persons or entities, including, without limitation, their respective agents, licensees, or representatives, arising from, resulting from, or connected with this Agreement to the extent caused by the negligent acts, errors or omissions of the SERVICE PROVIDER, its partners, shareholders, agents,

employees, or by the SERVICE PROVIDER'S breach of this Agreement. The SERVICE PROVIDER expressly waives any immunity that may be granted to it under the Washington State Industrial Insurance Act, Title 51 RCW. The SERVICE PROVIDER'S indemnification shall not be limited in any way by any limitation on the amount of damages, compensation or benefits payable to or by any third party under workers' compensation acts, disability benefit acts or any other benefit acts or programs. This waiver has been mutually negotiated by the parties.

- B. <u>CITY Indemnification</u>. The CITY agrees to indemnify, defend and hold the SERVICE PROVIDER, its officers, directors, shareholders, partners, employees, and agents harmless from any and all claims, demands, losses, actions and liabilities (including costs and attorney fees) to or by any and all persons or entities, including without limitation, their respective agents, licensees, or representatives, arising from, resulting from or connected with this Agreement to the extent solely caused by the negligent acts, errors, or omissions of the CITY, its employees or agents. No liability shall attach to the CITY by reason of entering into this Agreement except as expressly provided herein.
- C. <u>Survival</u>. The provisions of this Section shall survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement with respect to any event occurring prior to such expiration or termination.

8. INSURANCE.

- A. The SERVICE PROVIDER shall procure and maintain for the duration of the Agreement, insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damage to property which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the work hereunder by the SERVICE PROVIDER, their agents, representatives, employees or subcontractors.
- B. The SERVICE PROVIDER shall provide a <u>Certificate of Insurance</u> evidencing:
- 1. <u>Automobile Liability</u> insurance with limits no less than \$1,000,000 combined single limit per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
- 2. <u>Commercial General Liability</u> insurance written on an occurrence basis with limits no less than \$2,000,000 combined single limit per occurrence and \$2,000,000 aggregate for personal injury, bodily injury and property damage. Coverage shall include but not be limited to: blanket contractual; products/completed operations; broad form property damage; explosion, collapse and underground (XCU) if applicable; and employer's liability.

- 3. <u>Professional Liability</u> insurance written on a claims made basis with limits of no less than \$2,000,000 per claim, and \$2,000,000 policy aggregate limit.
- C. Except for Professional Liability Insurance, The CITY shall be named as an additional insured on the insurance policy, as respect to work performed by or on behalf of the SERVICE PROVIDER and a copy of the endorsement naming the CITY as additional insured shall be attached to the Certificate of Insurance. The CITY reserves the right to request certified copies of any required policies.
- D. The SERVICE PROVIDER'S insurance shall contain a clause stating that coverage shall apply separately to each insured against whom a claim is made or suit is brought, except with respects to the limits of the insurer's liability.
- E. Any payment of deductible or self-insured retention shall be the sole responsibility of the SERVICE PROVIDER.
- F. The SERVICE PROVIDER'S insurance shall be primary insurance as respect to the CITY and the CITY shall be given written notice of any cancellation, suspension or material change in coverage within two (2) business days of SERVICE PROVIDER'S receipt of such notice.

9. TREATMENT OF ASSETS.

Title to all property furnished by the CITY shall remain in the name of the CITY and the CITY shall become the owner of the work product and other documents ("Deliverables"), if any, prepared by the SERVICE PROVIDER pursuant to this Agreement. Any use of the Deliverables for any purposes or projects not contemplated by this Agreement, and any use of incomplete Deliverables, shall be at the City's sole risk and without liability or legal expense to Service Provider.

10. <u>COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS</u>.

A. The Service Provider shall perform services in a manner consistent with the standard of care and skill ordinarily exercised by members of the profession practicing under similar conditions in the geographic vicinity and at the time the services are performed ("Standard of Care"). Consistent with the Standard of Care, the SERVICE PROVIDER, in the performance of this Agreement, shall comply with all applicable federal, state or local laws and ordinances, including being licensed to do business in the City of Tumwater by obtaining a Tumwater business license and any additional regulations for licensing,

certification and operation of facilities, programs and accreditation, and licensing of individuals, and any other standards or criteria as described in this Agreement to assure quality of services.

B. The SERVICE PROVIDER specifically agrees to pay any applicable CITY business and occupation (B&O) taxes which may be due on account of this Agreement.

11. NONDISCRIMINATION.

- A. The CITY is an equal opportunity employer.
- B. Nondiscrimination in Employment. In the performance of this Agreement, the SERVICE PROVIDER will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment on the grounds of race, creed, religion, color, national origin, citizenship or immigration status, families with children status, sex, marital status, honorably discharged veteran or military status, the presence of any sensory, mental, or physical disability or the use of a trained dog guide or service animal by a person with a disability, sexual orientation, genetic information, age or other basis prohibited by state or federal law; provided that the prohibition against discrimination in employment because of disability shall not apply if the particular disability prevents the proper performance of the particular worker involved. Such action shall include, but not be limited to: employment, upgrading, demotion or transfers, recruitment or recruitment advertising, layoff or termination, rates of pay or other forms of compensation, and programs for training including apprenticeships.
- C. <u>Nondiscrimination in Services</u>. The SERVICE PROVIDER will not discriminate against any recipient of any services or benefits provided for in this Agreement on the grounds of race, creed, religion, color, national origin, citizenship or immigration status, families with children status, sex, marital status, honorably discharged veteran or military status, the presence of any sensory, mental or physical disability or the use of a trained dog guide or service animal by a person with a disability, sexual orientation, genetic information, age or other basis prohibited by state or federal law. "Race" is inclusive of traits historically associated or perceived to be associated with race including, but not limited to, hair texture and protective hairstyles. For purposes of this subsection, "protective hairstyles" includes, but is not limited to, such hairstyles as afros, braids, locks, and twists. It is not an unfair practice when a distinction or differential treatment on the basis of citizenship or immigration status is authorized by federal or state law, regulation, rule or government contract.
- D. If any assignment and/or subcontract have been authorized by the CITY, said assignment or subcontract shall include appropriate safeguards

against discrimination. The SERVICE PROVIDER shall take such action as may be required to ensure full compliance with the provisions in the immediately preceding paragraphs herein.

- E. <u>Nondiscrimination in Benefits</u>. Pursuant to Tumwater Municipal Code (TMC) Chapter 3.46, the SERVICE PROVIDER shall provide employee benefits or an equivalent sum to the domestic partners of their employees involved in the SERVICE PROVIDER'S operations applicable to this Agreement if such benefits are provided to employees' spouses as more particularly set forth in Chapter 3.46 of the TMC, a copy of which is attached hereto as Exhibit "D" City Contracts Nondiscrimination In Benefits.
- F. <u>Nondiscrimination in Contractors / Subcontractors</u>. The City of Tumwater, in accordance with RCW 49.60.530 requires all covered contractors or subcontractors to actively pursue a diverse and inclusive workforce. Contractors and subcontractors are prohibited from all forms of discrimination listed in RCW 49.60.530.

12. ASSIGNMENT/SUBCONTRACTING.

- A. The SERVICE PROVIDER shall not assign its performance under this Agreement or any portion of this Agreement without the written consent of the CITY, and it is further agreed that said consent must be sought in writing by the SERVICE PROVIDER not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date of any proposed assignment. The CITY reserves the right to reject without cause any such assignment.
- B. Any work or services assigned hereunder shall be subject to each provision of this Agreement and proper bidding procedures where applicable as set forth in local, state and/or federal statutes, ordinances and guidelines.
- C. Any technical service subcontract not listed in this Agreement, must have express advance approval by the CITY.

13. NON-APPROPRIATION OF FUNDS.

If sufficient funds are not appropriated or allocated for payment under this Agreement for any future fiscal period, the CITY will not be obligated to make payments for services or amounts incurred after the end of the current fiscal period, and this Agreement will terminate upon the completion of all remaining services for which funds are allocated. No penalty or expense shall accrue to the CITY in the event this provision applies.

14. CHANGES.

Either party may request changes to the Scope of Services and performance to be provided hereunder, however, no change or addition to this Agreement shall be valid or binding upon either party unless such change or addition be in writing and signed by both parties. Such amendments shall be attached to and made part of this Agreement.

15. MAINTENANCE AND INSPECTION OF RECORDS.

- A. The SERVICE PROVIDER at such times and in such forms as the CITY may require, shall furnish to the CITY such statements, records, reports, data, and information as the CITY may request pertaining to matters covered by this Agreement.
- B. The SERVICE PROVIDER shall maintain books, records and documents, which sufficiently and properly reflect all direct and indirect costs related to the performance of this Agreement and shall maintain such accounting procedures and practices as may be necessary to assure proper accounting of all funds paid pursuant to this Agreement. These records shall be subject at all reasonable times to inspection, review, or audit, by the CITY, its authorized representative, the State Auditor, or other governmental officials authorized by law to monitor this Agreement.
- C. To ensure the CITY'S compliance with the Public Records Act, RCW 42.56, the SERVICE PROVIDER shall retain all books, records, documents and other material relevant to this agreement, for six (6) years after its expiration. The SERVICE PROVIDER agrees that the CITY or its designee shall have full access and right to examine any of said materials at all reasonable times during said period.

16. POLITICAL ACTIVITY PROHIBITED.

None of the funds, materials, property or services provided directly or indirectly under the Agreement shall be used for any partisan political activity, or to further the election or defeat of any candidate for public office.

17. PROHIBITED INTEREST.

No member, officer, or employee of the CITY shall have any interest, direct or indirect, in this Agreement or the proceeds thereof.

18. NOTICE.

Notice provided for in this Agreement shall be sent by certified mail to the addresses designated for the parties on the signature page of this Agreement.

19. ATTORNEYS FEES AND COSTS.

If any legal proceeding is brought for the enforcement of this Agreement, or because of a dispute, breach, default, or misrepresentation in connection with any of the provisions of this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover from the other party, in addition to any other relief to which such party may be entitled, reasonable attorney's fees and other costs incurred in that action or proceeding.

20. <u>JURISDICTION AND VENUE</u>.

- A. This Agreement has been and shall be construed as having been made and delivered within the State of Washington. It is agreed by each party hereto that this Agreement shall be governed by laws of the State of Washington, both as to interpretation and performance.
- B. Any action of law, suit in equity, or judicial proceeding for the enforcement of this Agreement or any provisions thereof shall be instituted and maintained in the superior court of Thurston County, Washington.

21. SEVERABILITY.

- A. If, for any reason, any part, term or provision of this Agreement is held by a court of the United States to be illegal, void or unenforceable, the validity of the remaining provisions shall not be affected, and the rights and obligations of the parties shall be construed and enforced as if the Agreement did not contain the particular provision held to be invalid.
- B. If it should appear that any provision hereof is in conflict with any statutory provision of the State of Washington, said provision which may conflict therewith shall be deemed inoperative and null and void insofar as it may be in conflict therewith, and shall be deemed modified to conform to such statutory provisions.

22. ENTIRE AGREEMENT.

The parties agree that this Agreement is the complete expression of the terms hereto and any oral representations or understandings not incorporated herein are excluded. Further, any modification of this Agreement shall be in writing and signed by both parties. Failure to comply with any of the provisions stated herein shall constitute material breach of contract and cause for termination. Both parties recognize time is of the essence in the performance of the provisions of this Agreement. It is also agreed by the parties that the forgiveness of the

nonperformance of any provision of this Agreement does not constitute a waiver of the provisions of this Agreement. This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, which counterparts shall collectively constitute the entire Agreement.

Chapter 3.46

CITY CONTRACTS - NONDISCRIMINATION IN BENEFITS

Sections:

3.46.010	Definitions.
3.46.020	Nondiscrimination in benefits.
3.46.030	Limitations.
3.46.040	Powers and duties of the city administrator.
3.46.050	Appeals.
3.46.060	Effective date.

3.46.010 Definitions.

For the purpose of this chapter:

- A. "Contract" means a contract for public works, consulting, or supplies, material, equipment or services estimated to cost \$50,000 or more;
- B. "Contract awarding authority" means the city officer, department, commission, employee, or board authorized to enter into or to administer contracts on behalf of the city;
- C. "Domestic partner" means any person who is registered with his/her employer as a domestic partner or, in the absence of such employer-provided registry, is registered as a domestic partner with a governmental body pursuant to state or local law authorizing such registration. Any internal employer registry of domestic partnership must comply with criteria for domestic partnerships specified by rule by the city administrator;
- D. "Employee benefits" means the provision of bereavement leave; disability, life, and other types of insurance; family medical leave; health benefits; membership or membership discounts; moving expenses; pension and retirement benefits; vacation; travel benefits; and any other benefits given to employees; provided, that it does not include benefits to the extent that the application of the requirements of this chapter to such benefits may be preempted by federal or state law.

(Ord. O2000-028, Added, 02/06/2001)

3.46.020 Nondiscrimination in benefits.

A. No contractor on a city contract shall discriminate in the provision of employee benefits between an employee with a domestic partner and an employee with a spouse. The contractor shall not be deemed to discriminate in the provision of employee benefits if, despite taking reasonable measures to do so, the contractor is unable to extend a particular employee benefit to domestic partners, so long as the contractor provides the employee with a cash equivalent.

- B. Other Options for Compliance Allowed. Provided that a contractor does not discriminate in the provision of benefits between employees with spouses and employees with domestic partners, a contractor may:
- 1. Elect to provide benefits to individuals in addition to employees' spouses and employees' domestic partners;
- 2. Allow each employee to designate a legally domiciled member of the employee's household as being eligible for spousal equivalent benefits; or
- 3. Provide benefits neither to employees' spouses nor to employees' domestic partners.
- C. Requirements Inapplicable Under Certain Conditions. The city administrator may waive the requirements of this chapter where:
- 1. Award of a contract or amendment is necessary to respond to an emergency;
 - 2. The contractor is a sole source;
- 3. No compliant contractors are capable of providing goods or services that respond to the city's requirements;
 - 4. The contractor is a public entity;
- 5. The requirements are inconsistent with a grant, subvention or agreement with a public agency;
- 6. The city is purchasing through a cooperative or joint purchasing agreement.
- D. Requests for waivers of the terms of this chapter are to be made to the city administrator by the contract awarding authority. Decisions by the city administrator to issue or deny waivers are final unless appealed pursuant to TMC 3.46.050.
- E. The city administrator shall reject an entity's bid or proposal, or terminate a contract, if the city administrator determines that the entity was set up, or is being used, for the purpose of evading the intent of this chapter.
- F. No contract awarding authority shall execute a contract with a contractor unless such contractor has agreed that the contractor will not discriminate in the provision of employee benefits as provided for in this chapter.
- G. All contracts awarded by the city shall contain provisions prohibiting discrimination in the provision of employee benefits, including provisions containing appropriate remedies for the breach thereof as prescribed by this chapter, except as exempted by this chapter or rule.

3.46.030 Limitations.

The requirements of this chapter only shall apply to those portions of a contractor's operations that occur:

- A. Within the city;
- B. On real property outside of the city if the property is owned by the city or if the city has a right to occupy the property, and if the contractor's presence at that location is connected to a contract with the city; and
- C. Elsewhere in the United States where work related to a city contract is being performed. The requirements of this chapter shall not apply to subcontracts or subcontractors of any contract or contractor.

(Ord. O2000-028, Added, 02/06/2001)

3.46.040 Powers and duties of the city administrator.

The city administrator shall have the power to:

- A. Adopt rules and regulations in accordance with this chapter establishing standards and procedures for effectively carrying out this chapter;
- B. Determine and impose appropriate sanctions and/or liquidated damages for violation of this chapter by contractors including, but not limited to:
- 1. Disqualification of the contractor from bidding on or being awarded a city contract for a period of up to five years; and
- 2. Contractual remedies, including, but not limited to, liquidated damages and termination of the contract;
 - C. Examine contractor's benefit programs covered by this chapter;
- D. Impose other appropriate contractual and civil remedies and sanctions for violations of this chapter;
- E. Allow for remedial action after a finding of noncompliance, as specified by rule;
- F. Perform such other duties as may be required by ordinance or which are necessary to implement the purposes of this chapter.

(Ord. O2000-028, Added, 02/06/2001)

3.46.050 Appeals.

Any aggrieved party may appeal a decision of the city administrator to the mayor by the submittal of a written request to the city attorney within ten working days of the decision to be appealed. The mayor's decision will be in writing with findings identified upon which the decision was made. Subsequent appeal will be to the Thurston County superior court.

3.46.060 Effective date.

The provisions of this chapter shall apply to any contract awarded on or after January $2,\,2002.$

Washington, hereinafter referred to as the "SERVICE PROVIDER".
WITNESSETH:
WHEREAS, the CITY desires to have certain services and/or tasks performed as set forth below requiring specialized skills and other supportive capabilities; and
WHEREAS, sufficient CITY resources are not available to provide such services; and
WHEREAS, the SERVICE PROVIDER represents that the SERVICE PROVIDER is qualified and possesses sufficient skills and the necessary capabilities, including technical expertise, where required, to perform the services and/or tasks set forth in this Agreement.
NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the terms, conditions, covenants, and performance contained herein, the parties hereto agree as follows:
1. <u>SCOPE OF SERVICES</u> .
The SERVICE PROVIDER shall perform such services and accomplish such tasks, including the furnishing of all materials and equipment necessary for full performance thereof, as are identified and designated as SERVICE PROVIDER responsibilities throughout this Agreement and as detailed in Exhibit "A" Scope of Services attached hereto and incorporated herein (the "Project").
2. TERM.

The Project shall begin no earlier than _____(date), and shall be

completed no later than December 31, 2025. This Agreement may be extended

additional periods of time upon mutual written agreement of the parties.

3. TERMINATION.

Prior to the expiration of the Term, this Agreement may be terminated immediately, with or without cause, by the CITY.

4. COMPENSATION AND METHOD OF PAYMENT.

- A. Payments for services provided hereunder shall be made following the performance of such services, unless otherwise permitted by law and approved in writing by the CITY.
- B. No payment shall be made for any service rendered by the SERVICE PROVIDER except for services identified and set forth in this Agreement.
- C. The CITY shall pay the SERVICE PROVIDER for work performed under this Agreement a total sum not to exceed _____.
- D. Upon execution of this Agreement, the SERVICE PROVIDER must submit IRS Form W-9 Request for Taxpayer Identification Number (TIN) and Certification unless a current Form W-9 is already on file with the CITY.
- E. The SERVICE PROVIDER shall submit monthly invoices to the CITY for services rendered during the month prior. The CITY shall initiate authorization for payment after receipt of said invoice and shall make payment to the SERVICE PROVIDER within approximately thirty (30) days thereafter.
- F. When subcontracting services or purchasing goods from third parties, as identified and approved in this Agreement, the SERVICE PROVIDER must submit written documentation establishing that the goods and/or services have been provided and the third party has been paid in order to receive payment for such goods and/or services.
- G. Invoices may be submitted immediately following performance of services, but in no event shall an invoice be submitted more than twenty (20) business days following the end of the contract term or the end of the calendar year, whichever is earlier.

5. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR RELATIONSHIP.

A. The parties intend that an independent contractor relationship will be created by this Agreement. Subject to paragraphs herein, the

implementation of services pursuant to this Agreement will lie solely within the discretion of the SERVICE PROVIDER. No agent, employee, servant or representative of the SERVICE PROVIDER shall be deemed to be an employee, agent, servant or representative of the CITY for any purpose, and the employees of the SERVICE PROVIDER are not entitled to any of the benefits the CITY provides for its employees. The SERVICE PROVIDER will be solely and entirely responsible for its acts and for the acts of its agents, employees, servants, subcontractors or representatives during the performance of this Agreement.

- B. In the performance of the services herein contemplated the SERVICE PROVIDER is an independent contractor with the authority to control and direct the performance of the details of the work; however, the results of the work contemplated herein must meet the approval of the CITY, which shall not be unreasonably withheld, and shall be subject to the CITY'S general rights of inspection and review to secure the completion thereof.
- C. As an independent contractor, the SERVICE PROVIDER shall be responsible for the reporting and payment of all applicable local, state, and federal taxes.
- D. It is recognized that the SERVICE PROVIDER may or will be performing services during the Term for other parties; provided, however, that such performance of other services shall not conflict with or interfere with the SERVICE PROVIDER'S ability to perform the services. The SERVICE PROVIDER agrees to resolve any such conflicts of interest in favor of the CITY.

6. SERVICE PROVIDER EMPLOYEES/AGENTS.

The CITY may at its sole discretion require the SERVICE PROVIDER to remove an employee, agent or servant from employment on this Project. The SERVICE PROVIDER may however employ that individual on other non-CITY related projects.

7. HOLD HARMLESS INDEMNIFICATION.

A. <u>SERVICE PROVIDER Indemnification</u>. The SERVICE PROVIDER agrees to indemnify, defend and hold the CITY, its elected officials, officers, employees, agents, and volunteers harmless from any and all claims, demands, losses, actions and liabilities (including costs and all attorney fees) to or by any and all persons or entities, including, without limitation, their respective agents, licensees, or representatives, arising from, resulting from, or connected with this Agreement to the extent caused by the negligent acts, errors or omissions of the SERVICE PROVIDER, its partners, shareholders, agents, employees, or by the

SERVICE PROVIDER'S breach of this Agreement. The SERVICE PROVIDER expressly waives any immunity that may be granted to it under the Washington State Industrial Insurance Act, Title 51 RCW. The SERVICE PROVIDER'S indemnification shall not be limited in any way by any limitation on the amount of damages, compensation or benefits payable to or by any third party under workers' compensation acts, disability benefit acts or any other benefit acts or programs. This waiver has been mutually negotiated by the parties.

- B. <u>CITY Indemnification</u>. The CITY agrees to indemnify, defend and hold the SERVICE PROVIDER, its officers, directors, shareholders, partners, employees, and agents harmless from any and all claims, demands, losses, actions and liabilities (including costs and attorney fees) to or by any and all persons or entities, including without limitation, their respective agents, licensees, or representatives, arising from, resulting from or connected with this Agreement to the extent caused by the negligent acts, errors, or omissions of the CITY, its employees or agents. No liability shall attach to the CITY by reason of entering into this Agreement except as expressly provided herein.
- C. <u>Survival</u>. The provisions of this Section shall survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement with respect to any event occurring prior to such expiration or termination.

8. INSURANCE.

- A. The SERVICE PROVIDER shall procure and maintain for the duration of the Agreement, insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damage to property which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the work hereunder by the SERVICE PROVIDER, their agents, representatives, employees or subcontractors.
- B. The SERVICE PROVIDER shall provide a <u>Certificate of Insurance</u> evidencing:
- 1. <u>Automobile Liability</u> insurance with limits no less than \$1,000,000 combined single limit per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
- 2. <u>Commercial General Liability</u> insurance written on an occurrence basis with limits no less than \$2,000,000 combined single limit per occurrence and \$2,000,000 aggregate for personal injury, bodily injury and property damage. Coverage shall include but not be limited to: blanket contractual; products/completed operations; broad form property damage; explosion, collapse and underground (XCU) if applicable; and employer's liability.

- 3. <u>Professional Liability</u> insurance written on a claims made basis with limits of no less than \$2,000,000 per claim, and \$2,000,000 policy aggregate limit.
- C. The CITY shall be named as an additional insured on the insurance policy, as respect to work performed by or on behalf of the SERVICE PROVIDER and a copy of the endorsement naming the CITY as additional insured shall be attached to the <u>Certificate of Insurance</u>. The CITY reserves the right to request certified copies of any required policies.
- D. The SERVICE PROVIDER'S insurance shall contain a clause stating that coverage shall apply separately to each insured against whom claim is made or suit is brought, except with respects to the limits of the insurer's liability.
- E. Any payment of deductible or self-insured retention shall be the sole responsibility of the SERVICE PROVIDER.
- F. The SERVICE PROVIDER'S insurance shall be primary insurance as respect to the CITY and the CITY shall be given written notice of any cancellation, suspension or material change in coverage within two (2) business days of SERVICE PROVIDER'S receipt of such notice.

9. TREATMENT OF ASSETS.

Title to all property furnished by the CITY shall remain in the name of the CITY and the CITY shall become the owner of the work product and other documents, if any, prepared by the SERVICE PROVIDER pursuant to this Agreement.

10. COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS.

- A. The SERVICE PROVIDER, in the performance of this Agreement, shall comply with all applicable federal, state or local laws and ordinances, including being licensed to do business in the City of Tumwater by obtaining a Tumwater business license and any additional regulations for licensing, certification and operation of facilities, programs and accreditation, and licensing of individuals, and any other standards or criteria as described in this Agreement to assure quality of services.
- B. The SERVICE PROVIDER specifically agrees to pay any applicable CITY business and occupation (B&O) taxes which may be due on account of this Agreement.

11. NONDISCRIMINATION.

- A. The CITY is an equal opportunity employer.
- B. Nondiscrimination in Employment. In the performance of this Agreement, the SERVICE PROVIDER will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment on the grounds of race, creed, religion, color, national origin, citizenship or immigration status, families with children status, sex, marital status, honorably discharged veteran or military status, the presence of any sensory, mental, or physical disability or the use of a trained dog guide or service animal by a person with a disability, sexual orientation, genetic information, age or other basis prohibited by state or federal law; provided that the prohibition against discrimination in employment because of disability shall not apply if the particular disability prevents the proper performance of the particular worker involved. Such action shall include, but not be limited to: employment, upgrading, demotion or transfers, recruitment or recruitment advertising, layoff or termination, rates of pay or other forms of compensation, and programs for training including apprenticeships. "
- C. <u>Nondiscrimination in Services</u>. The SERVICE PROVIDER will not discriminate against any recipient of any services or benefits provided for in this Agreement on the grounds of race, creed, religion, color, national origin, citizenship or immigration status, families with children status, sex, marital status, honorably discharged veteran or military status, the presence of any sensory, mental or physical disability or the use of a trained dog guide or service animal by a person with a disability, sexual orientation, genetic information, age or other basis prohibited by state or federal law. "Race" is inclusive of traits historically associated or perceived to be associated with race including, but not limited to, hair texture and protective hairstyles. For purposes of this subsection, "protective hairstyles" includes, but is not limited to, such hairstyles as afros, braids, locks, and twists. It is not an unfair practice when a distinction or differential treatment on the basis of citizenship or immigration status is authorized by federal or state law, regulation, rule or government contract.
- D. If any assignment and/or subcontract have been authorized by the CITY, said assignment or subcontract shall include appropriate safeguards against discrimination. The SERVICE PROVIDER shall take such action as may be required to ensure full compliance with the provisions in the immediately preceding paragraphs herein.
- E. <u>Nondiscrimination in Benefits</u>. The provisions of this subsection are only applicable to contracts with an estimated value of

\$50,000 or more. Pursuant to Tumwater Municipal Code (TMC) Chapter 3.46, the SERVICE PROVIDER shall provide employee benefits or an equivalent sum to the domestic partners of their employees involved in the SERVICE PROVIDER'S operations applicable to this Agreement if such benefits are provided to employees' spouses as more particularly set forth in Chapter 3.46 of the TMC, a copy of which is attached hereto as Exhibit "B".

F. <u>Nondiscrimination in Contractors / Subcontractors</u>. The City of Tumwater, in accordance with RCW 49.60.530 requires all covered contractors or subcontractors to actively pursue a diverse and inclusive workforce. Contractors and subcontractors are prohibited from all forms of discrimination listed in RCW 49.60.530.

12. ASSIGNMENT/SUBCONTRACTING.

- A. The SERVICE PROVIDER shall not assign its performance under this Agreement or any portion of this Agreement without the written consent of the CITY, and it is further agreed that said consent must be sought in writing by the SERVICE PROVIDER not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date of any proposed assignment. The CITY reserves the right to reject without cause any such assignment.
- B. Any work or services assigned hereunder shall be subject to each provision of this Agreement and proper bidding procedures where applicable as set forth in local, state and/or federal statutes, ordinances and guidelines.
- C. Any technical service subcontract not listed in this Agreement, must have express advance approval by the CITY.

13. NON-APPROPRIATION OF FUNDS.

If sufficient funds are not appropriated or allocated for payment under this Agreement for any future fiscal period, the CITY will not be obligated to make payments for services or amounts incurred after the end of the current fiscal period, and this Agreement will terminate upon the completion of all remaining services for which funds are allocated. No penalty or expense shall accrue to the CITY in the event this provision applies.

14. CHANGES.

Either party may request changes to the Scope of Services and performance to be provided hereunder, however, no change or addition to this Agreement shall be valid or binding upon either party unless such change or addition be in writing

and signed by both parties. Such amendments shall be attached to and made part of this Agreement.

15. MAINTENANCE AND INSPECTION OF RECORDS.

- A. The SERVICE PROVIDER at such times and in such forms as the CITY may require, shall furnish to the CITY such statements, records, reports, data, and information as the CITY may request pertaining to matters covered by this Agreement.
- B. The SERVICE PROVIDER shall maintain books, records and documents, which sufficiently and properly reflect all direct and indirect costs related to the performance of this Agreement and shall maintain such accounting procedures and practices as may be necessary to assure proper accounting of all funds paid pursuant to this Agreement. These records shall be subject at all reasonable times to inspection, review, or audit, by the CITY, its authorized representative, the State Auditor, or other governmental officials authorized by law to monitor this Agreement.
- C. To ensure the CITY'S compliance with the Public Records Act, RCW 42.56, the SERVICE PROVIDER shall retain all books, records, documents and other material relevant to this agreement, for six (6) years after its expiration. The SERVICE PROVIDER agrees that the CITY or its designee shall have full access and right to examine any of said materials at all reasonable times during said period.

16. <u>POLITICAL ACTIVITY PROHIBITED.</u>

None of the funds, materials, property or services provided directly or indirectly under the Agreement shall be used for any partisan political activity, or to further the election or defeat of any candidate for public office.

17. PROHIBITED INTEREST.

No member, officer, or employee of the CITY shall have any interest, direct or indirect, in this Agreement or the proceeds thereof.

18. NOTICE.

Notice provided for in this Agreement shall be sent by certified mail to the addresses designated for the parties on the signature page of this Agreement.

19. ATTORNEYS FEES AND COSTS.

If any legal proceeding is brought for the enforcement of this Agreement, or because of a dispute, breach, default, or misrepresentation in connection with any of the provisions of this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover from the other party, in addition to any other relief to which such party may be entitled, reasonable attorney's fees and other costs incurred in that action or proceeding.

20. JURISDICTION AND VENUE.

- A. This Agreement has been and shall be construed as having been made and delivered within the State of Washington. It is agreed by each party hereto that this Agreement shall be governed by laws of the State of Washington, both as to interpretation and performance.
- B. Any action of law, suit in equity, or judicial proceeding for the enforcement of this Agreement or any provisions thereof shall be instituted and maintained in the superior court of Thurston County, Washington.

21. SEVERABILITY.

- A. If, for any reason, any part, term or provision of this Agreement is held by a court of the United States to be illegal, void or unenforceable, the validity of the remaining provisions shall not be affected, and the rights and obligations of the parties shall be construed and enforced as if the Agreement did not contain the particular provision held to be invalid.
- B. If it should appear that any provision hereof is in conflict with any statutory provision of the State of Washington, said provision which may conflict therewith shall be deemed inoperative and null and void insofar as it may be in conflict therewith, and shall be deemed modified to conform to such statutory provisions.

22. ENTIRE AGREEMENT.

The parties agree that this Agreement is the complete expression of the terms hereto and any oral representations or understandings not incorporated herein are excluded. Further, any modification of this Agreement shall be in writing and signed by both parties. Failure to comply with any of the provisions stated herein shall constitute material breach of contract and cause for termination. Both parties recognize time is of the essence in the performance of the provisions of this Agreement. It is also agreed by the parties that the forgiveness of the nonperformance of any provision of this Agreement does not constitute a waiver of

the provisions of this Agreement. This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, which counterparts shall collectively constitute the entire Agreement.

Scope of Work

During the term of this agreement, Fehr & Peers (CONSULTANT) and team will perform professional services in connection with the update of the Transportation Master Plan (TMP) and Transportation Impact Fee (TIF) program as described in the following scope of work. This agreement will commence with the issuance of a Notice to Proceed by the City of Tumwater (CITY).

Project Overview

The updated Tumwater TMP will provide a framework to guide transportation investments over the next 20 years in accordance with the community's transportation priorities. It will be developed through close collaboration between CITY staff, stakeholders and the public at-large, and the Planning Commission and City Council to help improve mobility and quality of life. The purpose of this scope is to outline the CONSULTANT team's tasks and deliverables in the TMP process.

In addition to the TMP update, the CONSULTANT will work with CITY staff to update the TIF, incorporating project lists updated and reviewed as part of the TMP and ensuring that recent legislative changes are incorporated in the program design.

No Environmental Impact Statement or environmental checklist is included in this scope of work, although much of the information developed as part of this scope of work may be utilized by CITY staff if environmental documentation is required.

The project team will be led by the CITY project manager and will include the CONSULTANT team project manager, CONSULTANT team members, and other CITY staff.

The CONSULTANT will perform the following tasks:

Task 1 - Project Management

1.1 Kickoff Meeting (April 2024)

The CONSULTANT will attend an in-person project kickoff meeting to review project scope, schedule, budget, and deliverables to ensure expectations are clear. That meeting will discuss the relationship between the TMP and the TIF update, as well as the timing of touches with the community, Planning Commission and City Council throughout the project.

Deliverables:

- Meeting agenda
- · Meeting summary with actions

1.2 Biweekly Check-in Calls and Invoicing (April 2024-November 2025)

The CONSULTANT will attend up to 30 half-hour biweekly check-in calls with the CITY's project manager. The bi-weekly check in calls are expected to occur between April 2024 and November 2025, and will likely be less frequent at certain phases of the project, such as during the comprehensive plan adoption process in the latter half of 2025. In advance of biweekly check-in calls, the CONSULTANT with prepare an agenda and follow up on the meeting with notes summarizing action items.

The CONSULTANT will also provide monthly invoices and progress reports documenting the status of both scope progress and budget expenditure.

Deliverables:

- Biweekly check-in calls, agendas, and meeting notes
- Monthly invoices and progress reports

Task 2 – Laying the Groundwork

Over the years, the CITY has undertaken many efforts related to transportation planning. These efforts have resulted in the identification of a variety of values, goals, and policies for transportation. The purpose of this task is to identify a single, unified set of transportation priorities that advance the CITY's overall vision for transportation, which will guide overall development of the TMP's vision and goals. It is assumed that these priorities will set the framework for any future updates to the CITY's transportation policies, including level of service and administrative policies.

While the set of priorities do not have to be final, the end goal of this task is to be able to succinctly state four to six priorities for the CITY to remain laser-focused on in developing its TMP.

2.1 Priorities Workshop (May 2024)

The CONSULTANT team will lead a two-hour in-person workshop with CITY staff to identify 4-6 priorities for the TMP. The CONSULTANT will strategize with CITY staff on best framing for the conversation to ensure a productive workshop.

The CONSULTANT will produce a summary of the workshop for the project record, identifying apparent transportation priorities to help guide the balance of the project. The CITY will review the summary and provide one round of comments, which the CONSULTANT will use to update the final workshop summary.

Assumptions:

- CITY staff will select and invite participants
- Meeting will be held in person

Deliverables:

- Workshop materials including the meeting agenda and PowerPoint slides
- Draft and final meeting summary, which summarizes the transportation priorities

Task 3 – Public and Stakeholder Outreach Support

Building champions for the TMP is incredibly important. Community engagement is a key component of the overall process.

This engagement effort will be performed in close coordination with outreach for the Comprehensive Plan Update. The CITY will lead public outreach efforts for the TMP and TIF update, with the CONSULTANT providing supporting materials and attending up to two in person outreach events.

3.1 Public Outreach (May 2024-July 2025)

The CONSULTANT will develop communication material and assist CITY staff via attendance and participation at one in-person outreach event to inform community members and stakeholders and gather their feedback.

- CONSULTANT will provide digital materials for up to four public outreach activities. These
 materials could include project flyers, fact sheets, poster sized maps and other collateral,
 and website text.
- The CONSULTANT has reserved up to 45 hours for the preparation of these materials (shown as 3.1.1 in the fee table).
- CITY will print any materials needed for in-person engagement and will host all online content.
- CONSULTANT will prepare for and participate in one in-person outreach event (up to two hours per event), as identified by CITY staff.

Deliverables:

- Materials for outreach activities
- Attendance at up to one in-person event

3.2 City Council and Planning Commission Meetings (August 2024-December 2025)

The CONSULTANT is available to support CITY Staff at up to five meetings to either the City Council or Planning Commission over the course of this project. These meetings may include either the CONSULTANT providing a formal presentation or participating in a discussion. The hours associated with this task include preparation of meeting materials as well as virtual participation in meetings.

Additionally, the CONSULTANT will prepare for and attend one joint Planning Commission-City Council Transportation Tour, no longer than four hours.

Deliverables:

- CONSULTANT attendance at up to five City Council or Planning Commission meetings (virtual)
- Meeting presentation materials
- Attendance at transportation tour

Task 4 – Technical Foundation

This task covers many of the technical tasks needed to complete the TMP, including the compilation and interpretation of data and travel forecasting based on TRPC's travel model.

4.1 Data Collection (April-May 2024)

The CONSULTANT will coordinate with CITY staff on data availability, leveraging CITY technical resources wherever possible. This task includes time for reviewing the CITY's GIS database, collaborating with CITY staff on additional data needs/gaps, and if needed, purchase of count data or "big data" to support technical analysis.

- The CONSULTANT will facilitate up to \$10,000 worth of data collection (the equivalent of up to 40 PM peak period turning movement counts OR 40 volume only tube counts for roadway segments) if needed to fill data gaps

Deliverables:

- All GIS data files will include metadata that includes file summary, description and date and updates provided to CITY staff
- Traffic count information

4.2 Travel Demand Model & LOS Analysis (April-June 2024)

The CONSULTANT will coordinate with Thurston Regional Planning Council (TRPC) staff on their runs of the regional trip-based travel demand model. The model runs by TRPC will be used to create traffic volume forecasts for up to two alternatives. The CONSULTANT will evaluate intersection level-of-service (LOS) grades as part of this task, and future forecasted LOS as part of Task 6.2. CONSULTANT will not run the TRPC model due to land use data privacy considerations but will need access to model output results as part of this process.

Base Year Model

City of Tumwater land use information and transportation network assumptions from the TRPC model will be coordinated by TRPC and CITY staff. All validation and calibration of the existing year model is assumed to be completed by TRPC staff.

The transportation network will be evaluated for a 2024 existing scenario using segment level volumes (likely based on the TPRC existing year model) and intersection LOS (likely based on actual turning movement counts). A Synchro network will be developed to provide average intersection delay and LOS using the Highway Capacity Manual (HCM) methodology for up to 40 intersections and volume/capacity (V/C) rations for up to 10 roadway segments.

Assumptions:

- TRPC will complete all model runs
- The CITY will provide TRPC with any necessary updates to the land use estimates for the base year
- Up to 40 intersections will be evaluated in Synchro for existing conditions and up to 10 roadway segments will be evaluated based on V/C ratios

Deliverables:

LOS tables/maps for up to 40 intersections and 30 roadway segments



4.3 Planning Context and Existing Conditions (May-June 2024)

CONSULTANT will work with CITY staff to determine a set of key transportation issues. Once the key transportation issues are identified, CONSULTANT will use these findings to conduct a needs assessment for the following transportation modes and programs:

- Vehicle Congestion
- Active transportation (biking, walking, rolling, etc.)
- Transit Needs
- Freight and Truck Mobility
- Collision data
- Equity
- Potentially others as identified during completion of Tasks 2 and 3

This assessment will include an evaluation of existing conditions for the items identified above.

Specifically for safety, CONSULTANT will summarize collision data and develop heat map figures of collisions that occurred over the most recently available five-year span, contributing circumstances, vehicle actions, and/or severity.

The CONSULTANT will develop a brief memorandum documenting the planning context and existing conditions analysis and findings.

Assumptions:

 CITY will provide CONSULTANT with available technical data (such as roadway, bike facility, and sidewalk GIS inventory data) within two weeks of data request

Deliverables:

• Draft and final memorandum with figures documenting existing conditions for the above topics

Task 5 – Modal Network Development and MMLOS Policies

This task is focused on developing a multimodal level of service (MMLOS) framework for Tumwater. It will identify priority networks for each mode and identify level of service policies for each network, which will be confirmed in later phases of the project once the travel demand forecasting is complete. This task also includes the CONSULTANT providing suggested edits to the policies included in the TMP of the CITY's currently adopted Comprehensive Plan.

5.1 Creation of Layered Network (July-August 2024)

After completing the LOS analysis and planning context/existing conditions under Task 4, the CONSULTANT will develop a series of proposed layered networks for the City of Tumwater that include the following modal priority networks:

- Pedestrian
- Bicycle
- Transit, which will include consideration of planned networks by Intercity Transit
- Freight
- Auto

Deliverables:

- Draft and final priority network maps (pdf, geodatabases including shapefiles and layer files, and .mxd files).
- Draft and final memo describing how these priority networks guide infrastructure recommendations and tie to LOS policies

5.2 Level of Service (June 2024)

CONSULTANT will lead one meeting with CITY staff, in which CONSULTANT will work to develop multimodal LOS standards (for autos/trucks, transit, bikes, and pedestrians) that support Tumwater's goals. These LOS standards will relate to the CITY's updated goals and policies.

Deliverables:

- Meeting materials including agenda and meeting summary
- Draft and final memorandum summarizing recommended MMLOS policy

Task 6 – Project Prioritization, Selection, Costing, Funding Identification, and Policies Update

Following on the understanding of trends and the identification of priorities, the CONSULTANT will identify future projects that advance the CITY's priorities, explore the costs of the projects, how they would be funded, and recommend updates to policies in the CITY's TMP.

6.1 Prioritization Criteria (August 2024)

Building off the technical analysis and community input acquired in Tasks 2 through 5, the CONSULTANT will work with the CITY to develop criteria to prioritize the proposed draft project list (see task 6.3). Then, the CONSULTANT will refine the spreadsheet based on CITY comments for use in project evaluation.

6.2 Future Year Modeling (August-November 2024)

The future year scenarios for the TMP will be evaluated in this phase. The CITY will provide TRPC with the appropriate land use and transportation network assumptions within the City of Tumwater for TRPC to develop inputs to the travel model. TRPC will also be responsible for updating the model inputs outside of the CITY consistent with the regional assumptions. The travel model will be used to evaluate up to two future year scenarios. The CONSULTANT will use the TRPC model results in the following way:

- Segment level V/C ratios will identify segment-based LOS for up to 10 roadway segments
- The CONSULTANT will create turning movement forecasts for up to 40 intersections and complete Synchro analysis

Deliverables:

- Travel demand forecasts and Synchro files for two future year scenarios
- Draft and final forecasting and future operations memo.

6.3 Project List Development (November-December 2024)

Building on the prior tasks, the CONSULTANT will begin to identify multimodal projects to improve Tumwater's transportation infrastructure. This includes reviewing transportation projects in adopted CITY plans and programs as well as suggesting capital improvements that fill a gap in the multimodal networks or address LOS standard deficiencies. These improvements will address needs identified for all modes in Task 5 and will be prioritized using transportation prioritization criteria established in Task 6.1.

The CONSULTANT will lead one virtual workshop with CITY staff to review the list of transportation projects in adopted plans and programs, projects developed as part of this task, and any outstanding project list needs.

Assumptions:

 CITY staff will provide a list of multimodal transportation projects currently planned for Tumwater and actively participate in project list development meetings

Deliverables:

- Meeting materials including agenda and meeting summary
- Draft and final list and description of projects with initial prioritization ranking (see also financially constrained project list under task 6.4)



Draft and final map of identified projects

6.4 Project Costing (November-December 2024)

The CONSULTANT will inform the development of a financially constrained project list, by providing planning-level cost information. This includes "order-of-magnitude" per-mile costs for line items including intersection improvements, sidewalks, bicycle facilities, roadway extensions, and complete streets enhancements. These "order of magnitude" costs will not consider context-specific considerations, such as right of way or slope.

Assumptions:

- CONSULTANT will provide order-of-magnitude costing for the remaining projects from the project list (up to 16 hours)
- Additional projects to be costed will be considered as additional scope of services

Deliverables:

 One (1) draft and one (1) final PDF copy (and native Excel file) of planning level estimates (summary and backup) with location map of projects

6.5 Funding Assessment (December 2024-January 2025)

To ensure that there are appropriate financial resources available to complete the identified policies, programs, and projects, CITY staff will develop information about Tumwater's funding capacity for transportation capital projects. CITY staff will first complete a capacity analysis to evaluate baseline funding available over the planning period based on:

- Review of historical transportation revenues
- Any current transportation funding projections
- Update long term (20 years) funding projections
- Review of historical transportation revenues, by source
- CONSULTANT will help identify potential funding options for filling any identified funding gaps
- CITY will assess expected future costs using the current policy, programmatic, and project costs and projected future needs from the prior subtasks

The CONSULTANT will compare the CITY led funding capacity to estimated programmatic expenses and the cost of the initial project list, to demonstrate the CITY's ability to fund their desired projects during the planning period. If a funding gap is identified, CONSULTANT will identify potential new sources of revenues that could be considered (including but not limited to updated transportation impact fees, local improvement districts, transportation benefit districts, grant funding, etc.) to develop a funding strategy to balance identified needs with resources. Both a draft and final funding section will be prepared based on the analysis. In addition, policies

related to transportation funding and implementation will be reviewed and modified to be consistent with the funding plan.

Assumptions:

 The work will be conducted primarily by CITY finance staff, with support from CONSULTANT

6.6 Transportation Policies Update and Mode Shift Targets (July-December 2024)

The CONSULTANT will provide recommended updates to the policies contained in the most current version of the TMP. These recommended updates will include suggested edits to current policies, removal of policies, and addition of policies to respond to guidance from the Department of Commerce, TRPC, and align with the priorities identified in Task 2.1 and layered network and level of service policies developed in Tasks 5.1 and 5.2, as well as other potential recommendations developed in Tasks 6.1-6.5.

Additionally, the CONSULTANT will work with the CITY to develop targets for vehicle miles traveled (VMT) reduction and mode shift away from single occupancy vehicles in order to align with the targets in the Thurston Climate Mitigation Plan.

Deliverables:

- Draft and final memorandum summarizing recommended edits to TMP policies and VMT/mode shift targets
- Matrix of policy changes (additions, deletions, and modifications) provided in track changes document

Task 7 – Document Production

The goal of this task will be to create Tumwater's draft TMP document, which lays out the vision developed through the prior tasks in this scope.

7.1 Administrative Draft Plan (January 2025-February 2025)

Based on findings of Task 1 through 6, the CONSULTANT will compile an updated TMP document. This document will be concise and reader-friendly, while also conveying the necessary information to fulfill the scope items described above.

In response to a single consolidated round of comments from CITY staff, the CONSULTANT will prepare a Final Plan for adoption.

Task 8 – Transportation Impact Fees Update

The goal of this task will be to update the CITY's transportation impact fee program.

8.1 Impact Fee Kickoff Meeting (May 2025)

CONSULTANT will initiate the impact fees update by holding a staff workshop that asks the following key questions, which are central to this impact fee update:

- What is working well with the CITY's current impact fee program and what should be changed?
- What types of multimodal projects should impact fees fund?
- Should the program be vehicle-trip based or person-trip based?

- Should the program be based on a single, citywide rate or should it be zone-based?
- What types of land use categories should be included in the fee schedule?

8.2 Review and Update Transportation Project List (June 2025)

CONSULTANT will review the multimodal transportation project list developed as part of Tumwater's TMP to identify capital projects that could meet impact fee eligibility. Following the meeting, CITY staff will provide CONSULTANT with the most current information available about project costs (although this information should be largely developed in previous tasks) and any identified non-impact fee funding sources for projects. CONSULTANT will compile this information to develop an initial draft transportation impact fee project list.

8.5 Determine Share of Trips Attributable to Growth in Tumwater (July 2025)

Chapter 3.46

CITY CONTRACTS - NONDISCRIMINATION IN BENEFITS

Sections:

3.46.010	Definitions.
3.46.020	Nondiscrimination in benefits.
3.46.030	Limitations.
3.46.040	Powers and duties of the city administrator.
3.46.050	Appeals.
3.46.060	Effective date.

3.46.010 Definitions.

For the purpose of this chapter:

- A. "Contract" means a contract for public works, consulting, or supplies, material, equipment or services estimated to cost \$50,000 or more;
- B. "Contract awarding authority" means the city officer, department, commission, employee, or board authorized to enter into or to administer contracts on behalf of the city;
- C. "Domestic partner" means any person who is registered with his/her employer as a domestic partner or, in the absence of such employer-provided registry, is registered as a domestic partner with a governmental body pursuant to state or local law authorizing such registration. Any internal employer registry of domestic partnership must comply with criteria for domestic partnerships specified by rule by the city administrator;
- D. "Employee benefits" means the provision of bereavement leave; disability, life, and other types of insurance; family medical leave; health benefits; membership or membership discounts; moving expenses; pension and retirement benefits; vacation; travel benefits; and any other benefits given to employees; provided, that it does not include benefits to the extent that the application of the requirements of this chapter to such benefits may be preempted by federal or state law.

(Ord. O2000-028, Added, 02/06/2001)

3.46.020 Nondiscrimination in benefits.

A. No contractor on a city contract shall discriminate in the provision of employee benefits between an employee with a domestic partner and an employee with a spouse. The contractor shall not be deemed to discriminate in the provision of employee benefits if, despite taking reasonable measures to do so, the contractor

is unable to extend a particular employee benefit to domestic partners, so long as the contractor provides the employee with a cash equivalent.

- B. Other Options for Compliance Allowed. Provided that a contractor does not discriminate in the provision of benefits between employees with spouses and employees with domestic partners, a contractor may:
- 1. Elect to provide benefits to individuals in addition to employees' spouses and employees' domestic partners;
- 2. Allow each employee to designate a legally domiciled member of the employee's household as being eligible for spousal equivalent benefits; or
- 3. Provide benefits neither to employees' spouses nor to employees' domestic partners.
- C. Requirements Inapplicable Under Certain Conditions. The city administrator may waive the requirements of this chapter where:
- 1. Award of a contract or amendment is necessary to respond to an emergency;
 - 2. The contractor is a sole source;
- 3. No compliant contractors are capable of providing goods or services that respond to the city's requirements;
 - 4. The contractor is a public entity;
- 5. The requirements are inconsistent with a grant, subvention or agreement with a public agency;
- 6. The city is purchasing through a cooperative or joint purchasing agreement.
- D. Requests for waivers of the terms of this chapter are to be made to the city administrator by the contract awarding authority. Decisions by the city administrator to issue or deny waivers are final unless appealed pursuant to TMC 3.46.050.
- E. The city administrator shall reject an entity's bid or proposal, or terminate a contract, if the city administrator determines that the entity was set up, or is being used, for the purpose of evading the intent of this chapter.
- F. No contract awarding authority shall execute a contract with a contractor unless such contractor has agreed that the contractor will not discriminate in the provision of employee benefits as provided for in this chapter.
- G. All contracts awarded by the city shall contain provisions prohibiting discrimination in the provision of employee benefits, including provisions containing appropriate remedies for the breach thereof as prescribed by this chapter, except as exempted by this chapter or rule.

(Ord. O2000-028, Added, 02/06/2001)

3.46.030 Limitations.

The requirements of this chapter only shall apply to those portions of a contractor's operations that occur:

- A. Within the city;
- B. On real property outside of the city if the property is owned by the city or if the city has a right to occupy the property, and if the contractor's presence at that location is connected to a contract with the city; and
- C. Elsewhere in the United States where work related to a city contract is being performed. The requirements of this chapter shall not apply to subcontracts or subcontractors of any contract or contractor.

(Ord. O2000-028, Added, 02/06/2001)

3.46.040 Powers and duties of the city administrator.

The city administrator shall have the power to:

- A. Adopt rules and regulations in accordance with this chapter establishing standards and procedures for effectively carrying out this chapter;
- B. Determine and impose appropriate sanctions and/or liquidated damages for violation of this chapter by contractors including, but not limited to:
- 1. Disqualification of the contractor from bidding on or being awarded a city contract for a period of up to five years; and
- 2. Contractual remedies, including, but not limited to, liquidated damages and termination of the contract;
 - C. Examine contractor's benefit programs covered by this chapter;
- D. Impose other appropriate contractual and civil remedies and sanctions for violations of this chapter;
- E. Allow for remedial action after a finding of noncompliance, as specified by rule;
- F. Perform such other duties as may be required by ordinance or which are necessary to implement the purposes of this chapter.

(Ord. O2000-028, Added, 02/06/2001)

3.46.050 Appeals.

Any aggrieved party may appeal a decision of the city administrator to the mayor by the submittal of a written request to the city attorney within ten working days of the decision to be appealed. The mayor's decision will be in writing with

findings identified upon which the decision was made. Subsequent appeal will be to the Thurston County superior court.

(Ord. O2000-028, Added, 02/06/2001)

3.46.060 Effective date.

The provisions of this chapter shall apply to any contract awarded on or after January 2, 2002.
