1. ROLL CALL

2. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

4. COMMENTS FOR THE PUBLIC (Limited to 3 minutes each)

Dean Hirvela, 2730 42nd Street, expressed concern that the cemetery rates are too high. He also complimented Recreation Clerk Ashley Hagerty for the outstanding job she is doing with the Community Garden, as well as the Cemetery staff for their efforts.

John Gomez, 2023 Garfield Street, question regarding what they are going to do when ropes come down on Pierce St to prevent parking on the grass. question on pollinator plants that were planted on the old tennis courts if that was done by a contractor, also asked what was used as topsoil, also asked if flag pole will remain at Paddlers Park.

5. NEW BUSINESS

a. Pet Cemetery - Action Recommended

Action Item – Pet Cemetery:

Approved a 4x4 plot size (allowing up to four cremation burials per plot). Fees established as follows: \$200 per plot, \$200 for opening/closing, and \$250 for a flush grass marker with engraving. No irrigation will be provided, and only imitation flowers will be permitted.

b. Cemetery Rate Changes - Action Recommended

Action Item – Cemetery Rate Changes:

Approved the following cemetery rate changes: increase plot rate to \$800, add a Winter Burial Fee of \$150, and increase Saturday/After-Hours Burial fee to \$400.

c. Review of Recreation Program Rates - Action Recommended

Action Item – Review of Recreation Program Rates:

Approved the following program rate changes: Spring Flag Football increased to \$50; Girls Ponytail Softball to \$55; Girls Single A Softball to \$80; and Winter Indoor Soccer (2nd–4th grade) to \$45.

d. 2025 Concert Results & 2026 Concert/Event Direction

The 2026 special events and concert list were reviewed (attached). All events will remain the same as in previous years, with the following additions: a 250th U.S. Birthday/Time Capsule opening to the 4th of July celebration, and a beach and downtown or Walsh Field food truck rally. The Board expressed general support for the events, but indicated a preference for fewer Friday Night Live events, citing concerns that they may negatively impact local businesses.

e. Neshotah Park and Beach Signage Improvements

Neshotah Park Signage Strategic Plan: A committee has been formed to review and develop a strategic plan for all signage at Neshotah Park and Beach. The plan aims to reduce the overall number of signs, improve their efficiency, and enhance the connection between the trails, beach, and downtown. Additional details are attached.

f. Community Youth Sports Summit

The Two Rivers Community Youth Sports Summit is a collaborative, iterative planning process designed to create a shared vision for youth sports in Two Rivers, spanning from youth leagues through high school. The Board suggested involving current youth and high school coaches, athletic directors, past athletes who have graduated, and former coaches.

8. DIRECTOR'S REPORTS

a. Program and Event Updates

Updates were provided on various programs, including Football, Yoga, and Soccer; events, including Concerts, Paddle Palooza, and Ethnic Fest; and Senior Center offerings, such as Trust Car Rides, Meals, and other programs and events. Detailed information and attendance numbers are attached.

b. Parks and Facilities Updates

Updates were provided on park and facility projects, including the tennis court at Neshotah Park, buoys, the fishing deck at Washington Park, and tree and stump removals. Preparations for winter, including winterizing ball fields and bathrooms, were completed. Bench installations were also noted. Additionally, the department will be hiring Community House attendants and has received one application for financial assistance for programs.

c. Planning and Grants Updates

Paddlers Park received initial native plantings and will receive further improvements as part of the Wisconsin Coastal Management Grant of \$30,000, which will fund a concrete boat launch, dock, ADA-accessible path, and new signage. Phases of the Riverside Park Master Plan were reviewed, along with the award of a \$324,500 DNR Stewardship Grant. Additional grant applications totaling \$150,000 have also been submitted to help minimize city funding requirements.



Neshotah Park & Beach Signage Improvements

Scope: Complete a comprehensive review and strategic plan for all the signage at Neshotah Park and Beach. Design, install, or rearrange signage by Memorial Day of 2026. Ensure that the signage style and theme will integrate and compliment future way-finding signage efforts throughout the community.

Goals:

- Reduce and/or make the amount of signage more efficient
- Improve clarity of communications with signage
- Establish a style/theme that will integrate with future community-wide signage
- Create new wayfinding and trailhead signage for the park
- Improve connection between downtown business and beach visitors

Funding: This project is a part of the current Neshotah Park & Beach improvement effort that is funded 50% with a DNR grant and 50% with city funds. \$60,000 is set aside for planning and sign installation.

Committee Participation: Mainstreet Director, DPW Director, Hamilton Wood Type Museum Director, Schroeders Department Store, Two Rivers Historical Society

Community Youth Sports Summit

The Two Rivers Community Youth Sports Summit, is a collaborative planning initiative designed to create a shared vision for youth sports in Two Rivers. Led by Parks and Recreation Department staff, the summit will be guided by a steering committee made up of community partners.

The main event will be a 5-hour facilitated session at the JE Hamilton Community House with up to 30 participants. Attendees will receive a \$75 stipend, and youth will actively contribute through participation and a two-part survey, one for adults and one distributed in schools. An informational flyer will be shared with all students.

The summit will feature a dedicated "Girls and Women in Sports" track and seed new initiatives such as girls' flag football, enhanced softball, and expanded wrestling opportunities. It will also guide strategies for maximizing future facility investments, including the district's planned athletic complex upgrades. The resulting strategic plan will align resources, expand access, and sustain youth sports participation for years to come.

Recreation Economy for Rural Communities

The City of Two Rivers has been accepted into the US EPA's Recreation Economy for Rural Communities (RERC) program. Two Rivers is the first community in Wisconsin, and the first in the upper Midwest, to be selected for this national level program.

The Recreation Economy for Rural Communities planning assistance program helps communities identify strategies to grow their outdoor recreation economy and revitalize their main streets. The RERC planning assistance process involves developing a local steering committee in each partner community and pairing them with a team of federal agency partners and consultants, who then work with the community over several months. The team supports the steering committee to identify the community's vision, goals, and actions they wish to take to boost outdoor recreation, revitalize their main streets and promote equitable access to the outdoors for residents and visitors alike. The process involves several planning calls, a community workshop and several follow-up implementation calls. Through the planning process, all partner communities develop a Community Action Plan, which identifies specific actions and next steps.

The Parks and Recreation Department, Explore Two Rivers, and Two Rivers Mainstreet will facilitate the effort as a steering committee.





 - \$174,500 City funding




