Re: ARPA Fund Budget

As you all are aware, the Town has received \$2,803,013.00 in American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding from the Federal government. Per the Final Rule published by the U.S. Treasury, these funds must be obligated by December 31, 2024 and fully spent by December 31, 2026. Obligated, according to the rules governing ARPA, means that orders for materials/equipment are being placed or contracts for projects are being signed, etc. Since the Town opted for the "standard allowance", these funds can be used for "government services", which is very broad.

Staff has confirmed with our ARPA accounting consultant as well as our auditor that the Town can apply 100% of its ARPA funding to government services for the current and next fiscal years. Applying the funds in this manner will allow the Town to streamline reporting requirements and accomplish having the funds obligated and spent nearly immediately. This is similar to how many cities, including Tyrone, utilized CARES Act funding. Our specific application, if approved, would be as follows:

- \$1,515,923.96 from ARPA would be applied to the current budget under personnel expenses and reported in our annual report in April. This covers expenses for this FY from July 1, 2022 through December 31, 2022.
- The remaining \$1,287,089.04 from ARPA would be applied to the current budget under personnel expenses and reported in our next annual report in April 2024. This would cover expenses for this FY from January 1, 2023 through June 30, 2023.
- This will result in all of the \$2,803,013.00 from ARPA being transferred to the General Fund, creating a temporary surplus. Staff will ask Council to commit these funds to projects (as

Incorporated 1911

detailed below) in the FY 2024 budget beginning in July. This would ensure that the funding received under ARPA benefits the community as intended.

We had a discussion about ARPA at our planning meeting in 2022 and Council's direction at the time was to use the funding, in part, to improve sidewalks/MUPs in the downtown area and for safety signage/traffic calming in areas where we want to focus on sharing the road with golf carts. The plan that we are submitting for your review and consideration incorporates these concepts and several other improvements.

In order to ensure that a wide range of needs are met with this unprecedented amount of funding, I divided our funds into two separate expense categories: Community Impact and Government Operations. Community impact projects are those that the public can see, touch, and use or directly benefit from to include park/MUP/public facility improvements, economic development, and infrastructure improvements. Government Operations includes items that improve our ability to deliver services to our citizens more efficiently such as equipment, software, technology, and training. The funds will be divided, if Council approves of the plan, as follows:

- Community Impact: 80% or \$2,242,410.40
- Government Operations: 20% or \$560,602.60

As it stands, the Government Operations funding will be divided equally among four departments/functional areas as follows:

- Public Safety
- Administration & Municipal Court
- Leisure Services (Recreation, Library, Museum)
- Public Works

Each would receive \$140,150.65 in funding.

The remaining \$2,242,410.40 will be utilized for various projects and improvements.

A full listing of proposed projects and uses for these funds will be presented during the workshop.
