2. RECEIVE COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC

John Kaliebe shared comments about permanently closing Water St. He found meeting notes on the RDA website where the Smith Group said definitively that Water St. would not be permanently closed. He wants to know why center lines are not painted on S. Water St. He wants to know when the lamplight on Main St. from Church St. going east to the bridge is going to be fixed. They have been out since April 2023. He is also concerned about the use of bikes, scooters and skateboards on the sidewalks on Main. He is also concerned about the increase of motorized scooters and skateboards in the road going at a high speed.

3. REVIEW OF MINUTES

The minutes for the August 2, 2023 meeting have been presented to the Common Council without correction, so those minutes are simply noted at this point on this agenda.

4. BUSINESS

A. Public hearing for proposed gas meter within O'Connell Street public right-of-way.

The meeting was opened for public comments. Being no comments from the public, the public hearing was closed.

B. Review and take possible action: Proposed gas meter within O'Connell Street public right-ofway

Jaynellen explained that the owner needs to move the gas meter because by code it can no longer be in the basement and must be on the outside of the building. The owners has worked with WE Energies to determine the best place to put the gas meter. It has been determined that the north side of the building would be best. However, putting the meter there will be an encroachment, so the owner is requesting a variance. If a variance is granted, Engineering is required that bollards be placed around the meter to protect the meter and there must also be 5ft width of sidewalk. The owner is willing to put in the bollards and maintain a 5 ft. width of sidewalk.

MOTION: Blanke made the motion to approve the variance with the condition that the owner puts in the bollards and makes the sidewalk improvements – maintain the 5 ft. width requirement. Board seconded the motion. Motion passed unanimously.

At this point in the meeting a motion was made by Board, supported by Schmid and unanimously approved to move letter F. up on the agenda to accommodate the residents in the room who had come to speak on the matter.

F. Review and take possible action: traffic concerns on Carriage Hill Drive.

Mr. and Mrs. Bliefernicht came to speak about the speeding on Carriage Hill Drive. They say that there is high traffic volume at times with major tournaments at Brandt Quirk Park. Cars speed through the area and they are concerned that there will be accidents or someone will be hurt. The traffic does slow down when there is a police presence. The committee discussed many options: speed display signs that flash when the driver is speeding, speed humps, a 3-way stop. Cost is prohibitive in purchasing the speed display signs. If a speed study is done, it can't be scheduled until Summer when interns are available.

MOTION: Board made a motion to table the issue and to ask the city staff to explore the cost of a speed control display sign and whether there were funds available to purchase the sign. Schmid seconded the motion. Blanke proposed an amendment to the motion to do a traffic control study.

- Jaynellen said there were no personnel available right now to do a speed study.
- Jaynellen cautioned that should a speed study come back indicating that 85% of drivers are driving above the speed limit, it would mean that the speed limit in the area would have to be raised.

Blanke withdrew his motion. Blanke proposed another amendment to investigate putting in a 3-way stop at Carriage Hill and Country. Accepted as a friendly.

AMENDED MOTION: Table the issue and ask the city staff to explore the cost of a speed control display sign, whether available funding exists to purchase one. In addition, direct the city staff to investigate putting in a 3-way stop at Carriage Hill and Country. Motion passed unanimously. Information to be presented at the October meeting.

C. Review and take possible action: Add safety precautions at the crosswalk at the intersection of Labaree and Boughton Streets

Board has observed many near-misses at this location and is concerned that pedestrians will be hit by cars. In the past, there was a crosswalk sign placed in the middle of the crosswalk. Stacey Winkelman said that she would investigate that and put the sign back if possible. Discussion also surrounded the need for additional Auxiliary police offers to cross pedestrians during Riverside events like Riverfest. Also – the firework causes a distraction and perhaps traffic should be diverted while the fireworks are being deployed.

MOTION: Blanke made a motion to instruct staff to get a price on the flashing pedestrian signs and bring back a price and a suggested location at the next Public Safety meeting in October. Seconded by Schmid. Motion passed unanimously.

D. Review and take possible action: Adding No Parking on a portion of the 1100 block of Pleasant Street.

Residents would like no parking signs so that they can get in and out of their driveway more easily.

MOTION: Schmid made a motion to deny the request. Blanke seconded the motion. Motion passed unanimously.

E. Review and take possible action: Add signage "All Pets Must Be On a Leash" on City portion of Interurban Trail.

Board has received concern from a resident about the number of dogs that are off-leash on the Interurban Trail. Blanke reminded the committee that – sign or no sign – having a dog off-leash is not permitted in city limits. Others confirmed that this is a problem.

MOTION: Board made a motion to put two signs up saying "All Pets Must Be On a Leash" with the ordinance cited located at both city entrances to the trail. Davis seconded the motion. Board and Davis voted in favor. Blanke and Schmid voted against the motion. The motion did not pass.

5. **ADJOURNMENT:** There being no additional business to come before the Committee, a motion was made by Alderperson Schmid, seconded by Alderperson Board, to adjourn. The motion carried unanimously.

Review and take possible action: Remove and relocate "Children at Play" Sign from Kiewert Street

BACKGROUND:

Review and take possible action: Remove and relocate "Children at Play" Sign from Kiewert Street

The Mayor received a request from a resident on Highland Avenue for the existing "Children at Play" sign to be removed from Kiewert Street and placed near the alley where it is dark. The alley is near Highland Avenue.

Engineering Division does not recommend the placement of these signs for the following reasons:

False Sense of Security. The <u>Institute of Transportation Engineers (ITE)</u> states, "Caution-Children at Play or Slow Children signs should not be used since they may encourage children to play in the street and may encourage parents to be less vigilant." "Children at Play" signs give parents a false sense of security in letting their children play in the streets.

Liability. The "Children at Play" sign is not MUTCD-standard. When you install signs that do not conform with MUTCD you may be creating liability for your community/agency.

Rarely Effective Solution. The NCHRP (National Cooperative Highway Research Program) conducted a study of pedestrian accidents and found that 80% of collisions involving children resulted from an unsafe or illegal act by the child. This sign does not reduce the speed of traffic or make drivers more observant.


Guidance. "Children At Play" signs do not provide guidance to motorists as to a safe speed.

Over-Signage. If you place a "Children at Play" sign on a couple of blocks in your community, drivers may think the roads without the sign are children-free zones. Motorists need to expect children to be at play in all residential areas.

As stated in the MUTCD, "The use of warning signs should be kept to a minimum as the necessary use of warning signs tends to breed disrespect for all signs."





RE: Public Safety and Welfare Committee Wednesday, October 4, 2023 at 5:00 p.m.

Review and take possible action: Request for streetlight on East/West alleyway between Labaree St and Highland Ave: Engineering received a request from a property owner for a streetlight to be added to the east/west alleyway between Labaree Street and Highland Avenue. The request came before Public Safety & Welfare Committee in late 2021. The direction taken at that time was to add a LED light to the existing pole and to trim the branches around the tree. Shortly after the meeting, the Mayor asked Engineering to create a criteria checklist for new street light requests. This would assist current and future PS&W Committees to objectively review these requests. The Engineering Division prepared, presented to this Committee, and this Committee approved a "New Street Light Criteria" in early 2023. The checklist is attached for your use.

The resident at that time shared a concern about the safety in the area. No money is budgeted for this streetlight in the 2023 budget. A site map is attached for your use.

NEW STREET LIGHT CRITERIA

BACKGROUND: Typically WE Energies or lighting professionals study and determine via "lumines" and other criteria the location and proper number of street lights that are needed. When we add additional lights, there is a potential to create an imbalance or nuisance.

Guiding Principles:

For alley street lights: no more than up to two per block

On street street lights: Subject to Engineering and/or WE Energies study

Any street light request, if approved, shall be placed in the following year's Fund #1 budget

The check list below represents steps/considerations to be completed prior to the request getting placed on the committee agenda

The following is an agenda item for the above referenced Committee meeting:

1. Review and take possible action: Ordinance to Amend 500-10 (D) (1) Left Turn Prohibited

BACKGROUND:

Chapter 500-10 Section D of the municipal ordinance code covers "Left Turns Prohibited". Item (1) is for no left turns for westbound traffic on Main at S. Third Street during the hours of 2:30 p.m. and 5:30 p.m. There is an overhead pole with an electric sign stating this. This sign has not been functional for many years; something this division and assumably many others have not noticed. The Street Division has had to remove this overhead pole to allow the Water Division to replace a hydrant at the northeast corner of this intersection. We are asking the committee for your thoughts on whether we should spend funds to repair this electrical sign and re-install, or since it hasn't been functional in many years should this be removed? If we do permanently remove it, we will need to update the ordinance.

Section 4, Item D.

- (2) Storage prohibited. It shall be unlawful for any owner or operator of a camping trailer, dual purpose motor home, fifth-wheel recreational vehicle, mobile home, motor home, or trailer to store or allow to be stored said property or vehicle on City streets, alleys or in any municipal parking lots within the City limits of the City of Watertown in any of the following places:
 - (a) In any area which is zoned residential; or
 - (b) In any area that is zoned commercial or business.
- (3) Occupancy prohibited. It shall be unlawful for any owner or operator of a truck camper, boat, bus, camping trailer, dual purpose motor home, fifth wheel mobile home, mobile home, motor home, or trailer to allow such vehicle or property to be occupied or used for living or housekeeping purposes or for the housing or keeping of animals on any City street, alley or municipal parking lot.
- Parking of trailers prohibited; disposition.
 [Added 6-2-2015 by Ord. No. 15-20]
 - (1) Parking of trailers detached from motor vehicles is prohibited on all City streets and public areas. This subsection shall not apply to stopping or standing for the purpose of, and while actually engaged in, loading or unloading or in receiving or discharging passengers while the motor vehicle remains operator-attended as necessary to move it in case of an emergency or to avoid obstructing traffic. "Trailer," "stopping," "parking," "motor vehicle," "standing" or any synonymous term shall have such meaning as prescribed under Ch. 340, Wis. Stats., where and as necessary to give effect to the purpose of this section.
 - (2) Parking of a trailer attached to a motor vehicle is prohibited on all City streets and public areas where such parking is continuous in excess of 48 hours. For all purposes of application and enforcement hereunder, a trailer shall be considered parked continuously in a single location unless it is moved by lawful means no less than 300 feet from and beyond any initially observed location.
 - (3) Exceptions. Exceptions by permit to this section are prescribed under § 457-7 of this Code or by privilege or right as provided for or mandated under Wisconsin State Statutes.
 - (4) Disposition. Any trailer determined by a law enforcement officer to be parked contrary to this section may be removed, impounded and disposed of pursuant to and in a like manner as prescribed for a motor vehicle under Chapter 497 of this Code.

§ 500-10 Prohibited turns.

- A. The operator of a vehicle may not make a U-turn upon a highway at any of the following places: [Amended 7-21-2015 by Ord. No. 15-25]
 - (1) At any intersection at which traffic is being controlled by a traffic officer unless instructed by the officer to make a U-turn.
 - (2) In mid-block on any street in a business district.
 - (3) In mid-block on any through highway in a residence district.
 - (4) On any street adjacent to any school when children are present.
- B. No person shall back his vehicle into an intersection at which turns are prohibited by Subsection A(1) for the purpose of turning the vehicle so as to proceed in the opposite direction upon the highway.
- C. In this section, mid-block means any part of a street or highway other than an intersection.
- D. Left turns prohibited. No person shall make a left turn at any of the following places:
 - (1) Westbound traffic on Main Street shall be prohibited from making a left turn south onto Third Street between 2:30 p.m. and 5:30 p.m. on all days except Sundays and holidays.
 - (2) Southbound traffic on State Trunk Highway 26 shall not make a left turn into the driveway south of the intersection with Bernard Street.
 - (3) Southbound traffic on State Trunk Highway 26 shall not make a left turn into the first driveway south of the intersection with West Main Street on the east side of the street (Walgreens).
 [Added by Ord. No. 99-48]
 - (4) Northbound traffic on State Trunk Highway 26 shall not make a left turn into the first driveway north of the intersection with West Milwaukee Street on the west side of the street (Auto Zone).
 [Added by Ord. No. 00-04]
 - (5) Westbound traffic on Gateway Drive shall not make a left turn south onto South Church Street (STH 26). [Added by Ord. No. 02-02]

§ 500-11 Authority to designate safety zones, loading zones and lanes for traffic.

A. The Council may cause to be designated by marker or markers certain places on highways as safety zones, or erect and maintain islands of safety, and regulate and control traffic with respect to such safety zones and islands of safety.




Good morning,
