- Approve minutes of the July 14, 2020 Board of Public Works meeting. Minutes of the July 14th meeting were presented. Motion (Matoushek/Zonnefeld) for approval. MOTION CARRIED (5-0)
- Approve Fall Yard Waste pick-up dates. (October 12 November 16) DPW Director Jeff Daane shared that these dates are similar to what has been used in previous years in a window following the Bulk Pick Up, which will run from October 5-7. Dates will be distributed via Facebook and websites. Motion (Matoushek/Zonnefeld) to approve the schedule as presented. MOTION CARRIED (5-0)
- 3. Handicapped Parking Ordinance - S. Watertown St. DPW Director Daane presented that this connects with the current ADA pathway that was added earlier this summer. This will involve a pair of 20-foot stalls for ADA parking along with ramped access. Motion (Vossekuil/Matoushek) to approve the ordinance and forward to the Common Council for action/approval. **MOTION CARRIED (5-0)**
- Aquatic Center Update

Recreation Director Rachel Kaminski shared an update on behalf of the Aquatic Center Staff. They handled the Wojahn Swim Program virtually, with 70 participants. The pool closes this Sunday for the season. The Waupun Coalition for Aging and an Aging Grant enabled the Senior Swim to continue clearly to the end of the year. \$1100 of donations were received from the WARP Fundraising drive to assist the Aquatic Center in covering COVID concerns. Rachel was very pleased with the staff and their work through a challenging summer. With capacity limits and the nice weather we've had, the Center was reaching its 75% capacity on weekends. Next month she will share with the BPW the full season statistics. Senior Center Update

5. Senior Center Update

Rachel Kaminksi reported that on August 3<u>rd</u> the Senior Center expanded their activities at the Center, at the Aquatic Center, and outdoors at Harris Park. The Aging Grant provided some excellent resources as they utilized Harris Park in the beautiful weather, and activity level has been high and feedback extremely positive. The plan is continue the current operation plans into September. Fond du Lac County Aging will not be doing in-person dining during September.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 20-

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER SIX OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE OF THE CITY OF WAUPUN ENTITLED "TRAFFIC CODE."

THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WAUPUN, DO ORDAIN:

SECTION 1: Section 6.03(2) of the Waupun Municipal code entitled "OTHER INTERSECTION CONTROLS" is amended to add the following subsections:

- (bl) A stop sign shall be placed at the intersection of Church St. and N. Harris Ave. so traffic proceeding easterly shall stop before entering the intersection with N. Harris Ave.
- (bm) A stop sign shall be placed at the intersection of Maple St. and N. Harris Ave. so that traffic proceeding easterly shall stop before entering the intersection with N. Harris Ave.

SECTION 2: This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon its passage and publication as provided by law.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 20-

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER SIX OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE OF THE CITY OF WAUPUN ENTITLED "TRAFFIC CODE."

THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WAUPUN, DO ORDAIN:

- SECTION 1: Section 6.03(3) of the Waupun Municipal code entitled "Modified Through Streets" is repealed to delete the following subsection:
 - (g) Rock Ave. and Newton Ave. Traffic proceeding northerly and southerly on Harris Ave. shall yield to traffic proceeding either easterly or westerly on both Rock Ave. and Newton Ave.
- SECTION 2: Section 6.03(2) of the Waupun Municipal Code entitled "Other Intersection Controls" is amended to add the following subsections:
 - Stop signs shall be placed at the intersection of Newton and N. Harris Ave. so that traffic proceeding north or south on N. Harris Ave. shall stop before entering the intersection.
 - (bp) Stop signs shall be placed at the intersection of Rock Ave. and N. Harris Ave. so that traffic proceeding north or south on N. Harris Ave. shall stop before entering the intersection.

Waupun Youth Hockey Association – Benefits to Youth

Our youth hockey program <u>benefits our youth</u> in a myriad of ways, including physically, emotionally and mentally.

Hockey is fantastic exercise. Hockey is one of the best cardiovascular games you can play. Alternating between skating and rest (what is known as interval training in the fitness world) improves the efficiency of the cardiovascular system, allowing it to bring oxygen to the muscles more quickly. It also helps to prevent injuries that often come with other sports that engage in repetitive movements. Playing hockey burns a ton of calories. Many children are facing problems with weight and diabetes as a result of eating foods that are high on taste, but low on nutrition. Playing hockey one or two times a week can offset those foods kids enjoy so much and give them the energy and desire to go outside instead of laying on the couch. Hockey requires a high level of coordination; regularly playing can develop a child's gross motor skills, which leads to improvement with the more difficult fine motor skills, and improves eye-hand coordination, which can translate to a better understanding of spatial relationships. It also requires strength, something that can benefit a child in whatever activity he or she pursues. Stronger muscles improve endurance and create stronger bones.

Hockey builds character. Since hockey is a team sport, children who play learn the value of working with others. They figure out how to rely on teammates and understand that cooperation is key to success. Children on hockey teams experience a team spirit that encourages trust, responsibility and sportsmanship. These lessons extend into adulthood as teammates turn into coworkers, coaches become bosses, and teams become the companies for which they work. An often overlooked benefit playing hockey, is developing the ability to accept the highs and lows in life with poise and balance. Experiencing the wins and losses that come with hockey helps a child deal with the wins and losses in life all that much better. Hockey also promotes a strong sense of self, a positive self-esteem and pride. Utilizing positive self-talk and managing stress will help balance a child's outlook on life.

Hockey improves mental agility. Hockey is a fast sport. Plays develop in seconds, and momentum can shift in the blink of an eye. A child who can learn how to operate in that sort of environment will improve his or her ability to make quick decisions and think on his or her feet. Concentration is also improved; being able to concentrate while playing will make it easier to concentrate while learning. It's also a sport of strategy. Understanding how one event can lead to—or even create—another is essential to life success. When a child develops the skills to do that on the ice, that child can then translate the skills to life. Children also learn how to use mental imagery, a skill that can aid in understanding how to do something. Mental imagery is also frequently used by adults to achieve goals.
