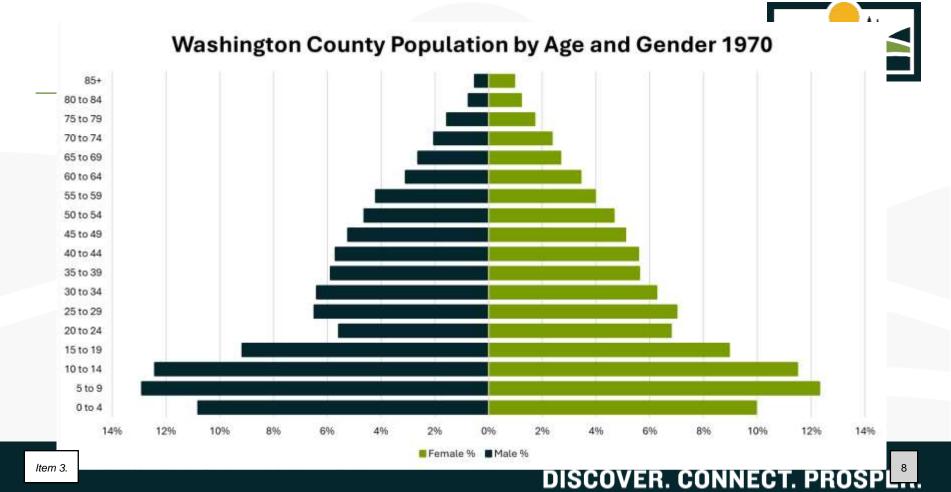

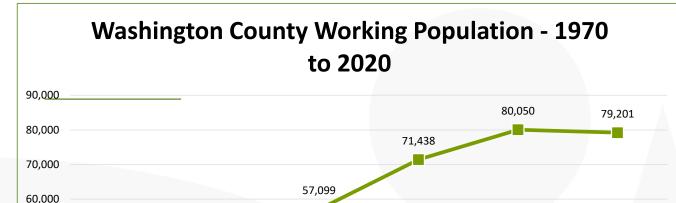

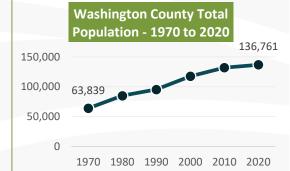

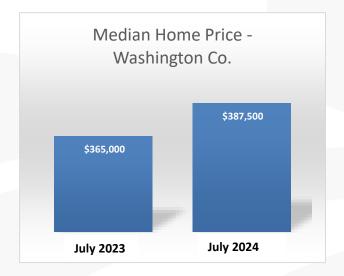

## **Next Generation Housing Initiative**



- Housing is identified as barrier for workforce retention/attraction
- Next Generation Housing launched in Oct. 2021:
  - Identified and implemented solutions that change housing barriers into opportunities
  - Satisfying the basic need of obtaining quality homes within 30% of household income
  - Creating community-driven neighborhoods
  - 1,000 new owner-occupied housing units by 2032
  - Quality smaller homes on smaller lots
  - Creating a model that can be replicated in the region/state





# **Next Generation Housing Initiative**

- Prohibited use of eminent domain
- Maximum price points (40% under \$340,000, 80% under \$360,000 and 100% under \$420,000)
- \$20,000/OODU acts as 0% loan for land acquisition, infrastructure, engineering, etc.
  - Revolves back to County at home close to fund future NGH Developments
  - 2. Utilize TID Increment to pay \$20,000/OODU back to County
- \$6,000 Permit Fee Incentive
- Owner-occupancy requirements in protective covenants

# **NGH** - Impact



#### NGH Impact on existing home values, buyer competition and sale times

- Skyway Park the home builder constructed same floor plan on two separate lots, one completed in March 2024 and second completed in December 2024. According to the appraisals, the home value has increased 3.9% over the last 8 months, based on comparable sales in the area.
- Oaks of Jackson, lower priced homes are selling faster
  - Homes listed below \$320,000 have accepted offers typically the same day listed
  - Homes listed below \$420,000 are typically listed for 29 days
  - Duplex style units are typically listed for 75 days

# Heart & Homestead Earned Down Payment Incentive



- Provides earned Incentives of 10% of the home purchase price or \$20,000, whichever is less, for owner-occupied homes purchased for less than \$420,000.
- Pre-paid to homebuyers at the time of closing on their home and secured by a subordinate mortgage.
- Earned over a 5-year period through volunteering time and financially donating to nonprofit Participating Agencies.
  - \$25 for every 1 hour volunteered
  - 70¢ for every \$1 donated

#### **NEW BUSINESS**

2. Discussion and Possible Action regarding the addition of a right turn only lane on southbound Prairie Street at Main Street.

Marquardt stated Councilperson Schanen requested this item to be reviewed by staff and the Public Works Committee. Staff reached out to Strand to get their comments.

Strand evaluated the southbound approach at the Main Street and Prairie Street intersection. It appears to be possible to mark a narrow southbound right-turn bay. The primary limitation would be to what size of vehicle should be accommodated for the westbound right-turn onto Prairie Street. We used pavement widths to sketch out the edge of pavement on an aerial for evaluation.

Attached were PDF's of two alternatives to show impacts to a standard SU (single unit) truck making the westbound right-turn. A SU is a reasonable representation of delivery vehicles similar to what UPS and FedEx use or small box trucks. The PDF labeled Version 1 is showing a 10-foot turn bay (when measured from the edge of pavement) and a 10-foot southbound through/left lane. There is approximately 14 feet of width (measured to the edge of pavement) for northbound traffic at the stop bar on Prairie Street. A SU truck was evaluated using AutoTurn on the westbound right turn. It showed that to stay entirely on the northbound side of the pavement, the truck will have to over track through

most or all of the gutter pan and be close to the traffic signal poles in the northeast corner of the intersection.

The PDF labeled Version 2 is showing an 8-foot turn bay (when measured from the edge of pavement) and a 10-foot southbound through/left lane. This would result in 10 feet of total width for the southbound right turn if the 2-foot gutter pan is used for that movement. There is approximately 16 feet of width (measured to the edge of pavement) for northbound traffic at the stop bar. An SU truck evaluated on the westbound right-turn showed that it will be able to stay on the pavement with no encroachment into the gutter pan and stay on the northbound side of the roadway.

The black lines on the PDF are pavement marking lines. We evaluated if the marked on-street parking south of the UW-W parking lot entrance would impact the storage length that would be available. We used a minimum urban turn bay taper to evaluate how close to the on-street parking it would be appropriate to mark the turn bay. It appears that you could mark an 80-foot-long turn bay and not have to impact the on-street parking area. If the parking stalls along the west side of Prairie Street are removed, the turn bay marking could be extended as far north as the parking lot entrance, if desired.

To accommodate a larger design vehicle and provide separate southbound turn lanes, the curb radii at the Main Street intersection would need to be reconstructed. This would include concrete pavement replacement, curb ramp replacement, traffic signal pole relocations, and tree removals.

According to Google Maps Street View, the dedicated turn lane idea was looked at in 2012. Pictures from 2007 and 2018 do not show the dedicated turn lane.

The fiscal impact to add a dedicated turn lane would be minimal and involve City employee labor time and the cost of paint.

Staff is open to the idea of creating a dedicated right turn lane, however, there are concerns.

- 1. An 80-foot turning lane can stack 4 to 5 vehicles. Does this create enough of a benefit.
- Anything longer would require the removal of parking stalls that are leased to the University. The University would need to approve this change, which would almost involve a reduction in payment to the City.
- 3. In Version 1 there is a risk of a traffic signal being hit due to the back wheels tracking in the gutter section.
- 4. In Version 2, there is a risk of a traffic signal being hit due to vehicles having to use the gutter section in the right turn lane.

Motion made by Board Member Majkrzak to repaint the line as indicated in the picture from 2012, minus the arrows, but with a sign, Seconded by Board Member Smith. The width of the lanes will be left up to the Public Works Department.

Marquardt stated painting is usually not done until after school is out. Therefore, it may not be set-up until the fall. Hicks suggested getting this item back on the agenda for December. Marquardt said he will bring it back if he hears comments or complaints.

6. Discussion and Possible Action regarding reducing parking and adding a sitting area at Parking Lot.

Kristen Burton, presented on behalf of the Whitewater Arts Alliance, 402 W. Main St., N1450 St. John's Road, Fort Atkinson. Ms. Burton stated the Whitewater Arts Alliance requested a sitting area adjacent to the mural on the Studio 84 Building be converted to a patio/seating area. The design included three raised beds. The Alliance is looking for a way to honor Carol Yasko. Ms. Burton was looking to see if the committee was agreeable to the possible conversion. In addition, the Whitewater Arts Alliance would have a signed agreement with the City of Whitewater stating the Alliance would manage the maintenance of the park.

Marquardt stated, as a reminder, in November 2024, the Public Works Committee listened to a proposal to improve Parking Lot C (corner of Center Street and Whitewater Street) to bring more awareness to the mural on the side of the building at 119 W. Center Street. The Committee was open to the concept but wanted a revised layout for the area, which included keeping some parking and possible dimensions of the enhanced area. Attached is a revised layout keeping the four parking stalls on the east side of the lot. The four parking stalls on the west side would be replaced with a raised sitting wall and a 20' x 25' paver patio area.

A map was shown regarding the approximate dimensions of the existing parking lot. For typical parking lots, standard stall lengths should be 18', and with perpendicular parking the aisle width should be 24'.

The quote associated with the design is \$35,391. The quote does not include the concrete parking lot as shown on the rendering.

Staff is open to the concept, but recommended a Memorandum of Understanding be developed outlining who is responsible and for what, especially in the future. Staff recommended the ongoing maintenance of the sitting walls, paver patio area, and garden beds and plantings not be the responsibility of the City.

Board Member Majkrzak suggested it be taken to Council for the larger group to review the information. Marquardt will have this item placed on the Common Council's agenda for Thursday, April 3, 2025.

3. Discussion and Possible Action regarding Wastewater Utility Building 600 roof replacement.

Marquardt stated over the past several years the Wastewater Utility has been replacing old roofs on buildings that were not addressed during the major plant upgrade. Building 600 roof is due for

buildings that were not addressed during the major plant upgrade. Building 600 roof is due for replacement and has numerous roof penetrations for equipment that is no longer used. In addition to the installation of the new roof, all unnecessary roof penetrations will be roofed over to minimize needless roof penetrations. Wastewater staff will aid in removal and isolation of any equipment that is due to be removed to reduce costs. Two quotes were received by reputable roofing contractors who have previously performed work at the WWTP.

F.J.A. Christiansen Roofing Co. Inc. quoted roof the replacement at \$112,000.00

Pioneer Roofing quoted the roof replacement at \$99,997.00 (which includes a new roof hatch and additional 2" of insulation).

This roof replacement was budgeted for as a part of the 2025 annual budget in the amount of \$105,000.

As this is considered a maintenance project, public bidding is not required, but due to the dollar amount, council approval is needed. Staff recommends a motion to approve Pioneer Roofing for the roof replacement of Building 600 and forward to council.

Motion made by Board Member Majkrzak to approve the Wastewater Utility Building 600 roof replacement by Pioneer Roofing, Seconded by Board Member Smith.

### 4. Discussion and Possible Action regarding Amendment No. 1 to Strand Task Order 24-10.

Marquardt stated Task Order 24-10 pertained to surveying and producing a topographic survey of the Starin Park Underground Detention Pond. The Task Order was intended to be amended upon learning the City's ranking in the Clean Water Fund (CWF), which were anticipated to be released in January. The DNR has still not released the rankings, however the facilities update plan still must be submitted by March 31, in order to apply for the funding. The DNR is encouraging communities who are interested in applying to still submit the facilities plan by March 31.

To keep this project moving along with the intention of applying by September 30, 2025, Strand has submitted the Amendment. Amendment No. 1 includes submitting the facilities update plan, hydraulic modeling, preparing design plans and specifications, preparing bidding documents, assisting with Clean Water Funding financing requirements and other related project requirements.

Task Order 24-10 was approved by the Public Works Committee and Council in November 2024.

The original Task Order had an estimated cost of \$17,400. The Amendment increases the compensation to \$149,500. \$200,000 was included in the 2025 CIP budget. The estimated cost of the underground detention basin is around \$3.6 million.

Staff recommends a motion to approve Amendment No. 1 to Task Order 24-10 and forward to Council.

Staff reviewed the MS4 Annual Report with the Committee. No action is required.

Hicks asked if Marquardt could get a price on a vacuum truck for leaves. Marquardt stated because of the bagging of leaves program, we do receive a good value in the phosphorus reduction for the Storm Water Permit.

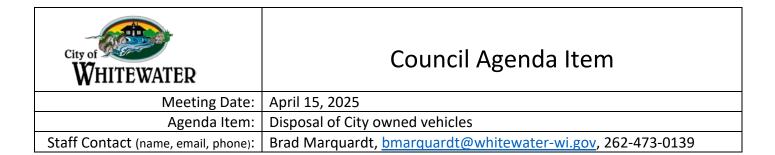

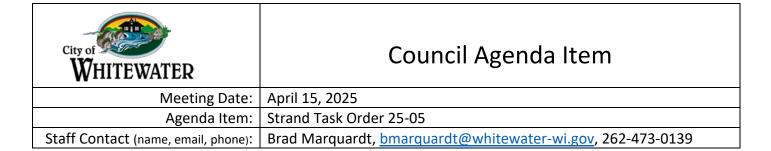

The Lead Service Line Replacement Project is set to begin in the middle of May and scheduled to be completed by the end of August. Based on this schedule, Strand has provided an Amendment to their original Task Order which was for the design of the Lead Service Line Replacement Project. The Amendment will provide contract administration, resident project representative services, grant administration, and assistance with reimbursement and closing documents for the Safe Drinking Water Loan Program.

### PREVIOUS ACTIONS – COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS

The Public Works Committee and Council approved the original Task Order for the design of the Lead Service Line Replacement Project in March 2024. 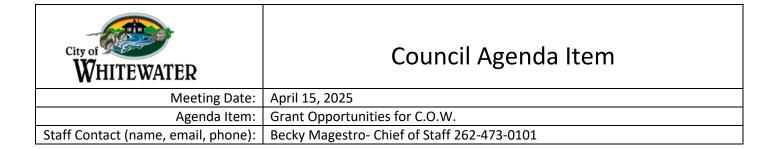

As a result of this analysis, she has provided a prioritized recommendation, highlighting the top grant opportunity that the City should pursue. This information will serve as a valuable guide in helping the City strategically pursue external funding to support current and future initiatives.

After reviewing the grant research spreadsheet and accompanying presentation, the City has identified several promising grant opportunities that could significantly support future projects and equipment needs across multiple departments. These opportunities have been shared with the respective department heads for further review and consideration.

- Whitewater Fire Department (WFD) received information on the Leary Firefighters Foundation Grant, which may assist in funding critical equipment and facility upgrades.
- Parks and Recreation was provided details on two programs: The Outdoor Recreation Legacy Partnership
   Program and the Land and Water Conservation Fund, both of which support recreational infrastructure and park improvement projects.
- **Department of Public Works (DPW)** was informed about the **Community Facilities Direct Loan Program**, which could be applicable to the planned construction of a new DPW garage.
- **Economic Development** was made aware of the **Community Development Investment Grant**, which may offer funding for projects related to **childcare facilities** and **city beautification**, **including park enhancements**.

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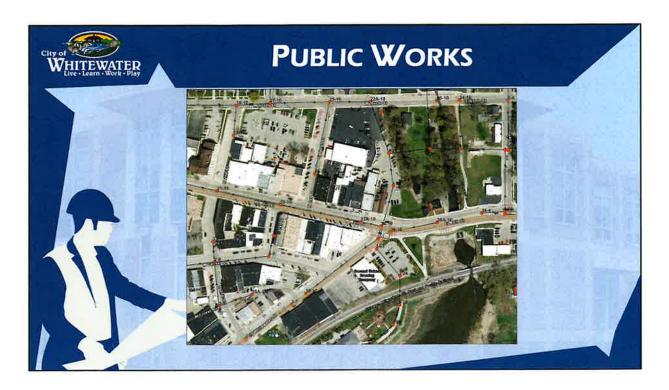

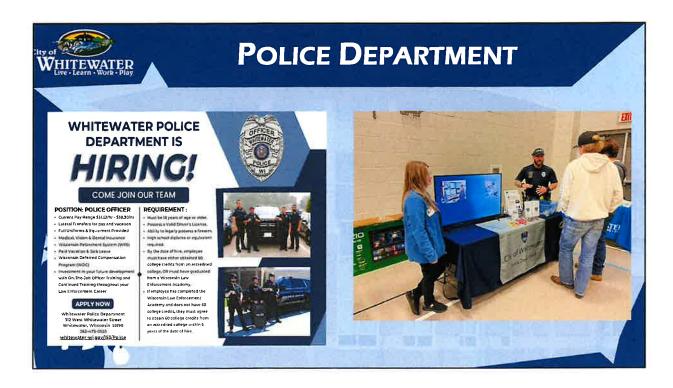
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#### For the week of March 31.

- The Street Department helped with election preparations and cleanup. Crews
  prepped the area by the Fire Department for sidewalk for the installation of the
  baby box. Crews did brush collection, Vac'd out dirt for utility locations for
  stump grinding, and started park cleanups. Other work included street
  sweeping, catch basin cleaning and street light preparations.
- The Water Department is busy with residential meter changeouts. Staff also coordinated with the school district and the Water & Fitness Center for a time to fix a leak that occurred in the softball field of the high school. Other work included backwashing, collecting water samples and completing the Consumer Confidence Report (CCR).
- Other items of interest include annual tubing replacement on the ortho analyzer, diagnosing a radar problem on the primary effluent splitter box, and fixing a low water level alarm on the UV disinfection.
- In GIS, updates were made to the city's parcel layer and maps were made for the Neighborhood Services and Economic Development Department. Continue to work with Johns Disposal to address questions with addresses and toters.



- Detective Kevin Gowan (GOW-un) has accepted our offer of employment, and his first day with our department will be April 21<sup>st</sup>. Kevin started his career with the Oregon Police Department in 2015 and has served as a detective there for over four years. His specialized training in ICAC investigations, digital forensics, evidence collection, homicide and death investigations, cyber and financial crimes, as well as narcotics investigations will be a tremendous asset to our department.
- Our patrol officer hiring process closed on April 7<sup>th</sup> and we received a total of 36 applications. The written test will be the next step of the process.
- Captain Vander Steeg organized a clinic for first responders through Wills for Heroes.
   Approximately 40 staff from the police and fire departments received basic estate planning offered by the attorneys at no cost.
- SRO James Garcia and Dispatcher Kenna Shrock (Sh-RAH-K) attended the Whitewater High School annual career fair to provide students with insight into what it's like working at the Whitewater Police Department (pictured above).

Monday, April 1<sup>st</sup> = The police department was found in compliance with the DOJ Crime Information Bureau's NDEX audit. 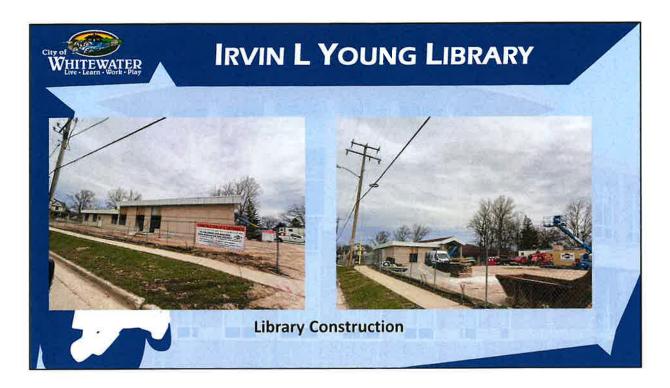

- Fire/EMS 515 report for Thursday, March 20<sup>th</sup> through Wednesday, March 26<sup>th</sup> Staff responded to 32 calls for service, making the daily average 4.5 calls for service each day.
- 5 calls for service required POC response. Average POC response for All Calls was 1.4 per call.
- March 27<sup>th</sup> through Wednesday, April 2<sup>nd</sup> Staff responded to 38 calls for service, making the daily average just over 5 calls for service each day.
- 6 calls for service required POC response. Average POC response for All Calls was 2.16 per call. Mutual Aid was requested 2 times from Whitewater during this time.
- April 3<sup>rd</sup> through Wednesday April 9<sup>th</sup>-We had 36 calls for service, 4 required POC. We had a 2 Alarm structure fire in the town of Lima on Sunday the 6<sup>th</sup>. The early part of the week was spent doing cleaning and equipment checks on apparatus, hose, and gear as the structure fire was a barn, and we were operating in the cow yard. Most everything was covered in mud.

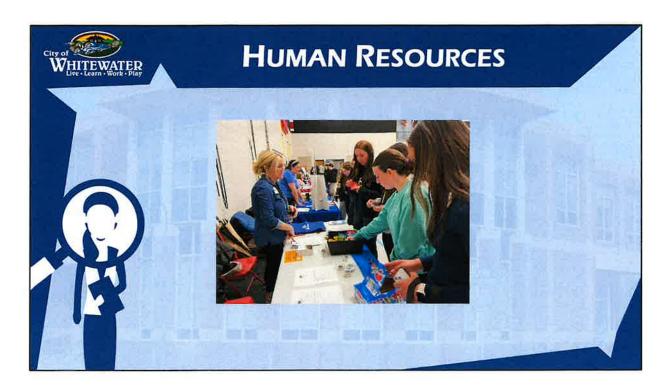

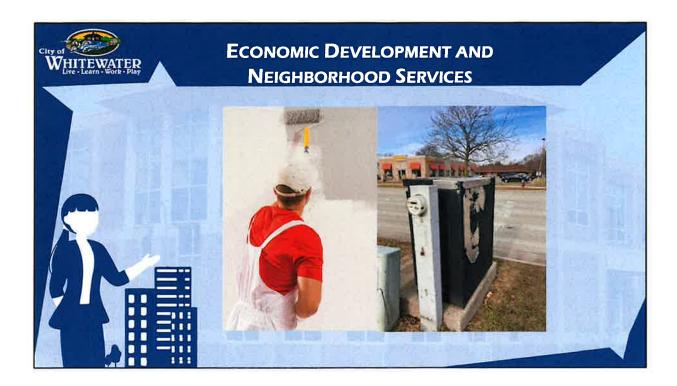


- On April 2nd, HR staff took part in the Whitewater High School Career Fair.

President Singer and Council Members:

Thank you for the invitation to appear before you in March to talk about TIF and housing. I appreciated the robust conversation and questions, as the topics you are addressing are important and common for all cities in Wisconsin. I appreciate this opportunity to respond to questions raised, based on my own notes and an email from Taylor Zeinert. If I can provide any additional information, please do not hesitate to contact me.

1. I heard a number of questions from Council and citizens all requesting additional information and elaboration on comparisons between owner-occupied and renter-occupied housing, comparison to other communities in Wisconsin, particularly Menomonie (UW Stout) and Platteville (UW Platteville), and how I obtained the numbers on student rentals.

I understand these questions to be related to approval of new housing construction designed not for the student market and concerns among citizens that rental housing is oversupplied in Whitewater. But Whitewater's statistics are obviously skewed by the large student population relative to the non-student population. Therefore, as council considers additional development requests for single-family and multi-family, it would be helpful to estimate the housing demand in Whitewater outside of the student housing market.

For context, there is no single data source that regularly distinguishes between whether units are rented by college students or whether units are rented by other households. Even large commercial databases used by commercial real estate firms (which require subscriptions) such as CoStar or CoreLogic don't often have detailed occupancy characteristics at the building or property level.

As you are aware, Wis. Stat. 66.0104(2)(e)4 prohibits municipalities from establishing rental registries, other than collection of basic contact information. Even in municipalities that do have this minimal registry (such as Whitewater, Eau Claire, Madison, etc.), no characteristics on the occupants may be collected. And, as you are aware, any housing provider in the private market (i.e. not the university's dormitories) cannot limit or exclude possible tenants based on their student/non-student status.

These two facts make determining how many student-focused rentals exist in a city difficult. I would note that I was a member of a joint City-University task force on affordable student rental housing in Madison, and the consultant hired by the UW (JLL) was able to identify student-focused rental housing combining data from CoStar with AxioMetrics and College House firms. analysis can be found beginning page 7. If additional information is required, the city could consider hiring firms like JLL to conduct a more detailed analysis.

The analysis I presented was designed as a quick, first-order approximation using only Census data to backout how much student rental housing exists in Whitewater as well as to estimate rental demand for non-student households. My hope is that this analysis might provide you with some additional perspective relative to the concern about how to measure vacancy levels in rental housing in the city and whether there is demand for additional non-student rental housing.

In this memo, I update the analysis I presented in March in two specific ways: 1) I add the Jefferson County portion of Whitewater to the data presented at Council, which was limited only to the Walworth County portion; 2) I include other cities in Wisconsin with similarly sized UW institutions: Menomonie (UW Stout), Platteville, Eau Claire, La Crosse, and Stevens Point. Comparing yourselves with these other schools may provide insight into resident concerns about the balance of rental vs ownership housing and the mix of single-family relative to multi-family housing.

Census data (2023 5-year ACS) is our best available source, but doesn't do demographic breakdowns by student status for the variables you are interested in. The closest we can come is to estimate the number of renter households headed by 15-24 year olds and to assume that these represent students. Using Census variable B25007 (tenure by age of household) I can separate out 15-24 year old households (assumed to be students) from 25-34 year old households (assumed to not be students).

All of the other census variables we would be interested in are found in table B25125 (Tenure by Age of Householder by Units in Structure). However, this table lumps together 15-24 year old households with 25-34 year household heads. (Census data is often presented in large demographic categories to protect privacy in smaller places).

The table below presents data from these census variables for Whitewater along with other cities with UW system schools of similar size. Note that these Census data would only measure students living off-campus in private housing, not dormitories. Residents of dormitories are considered to be residents of "group quarters" and don't show up in Census housing variables.

A couple of observations to help your consideration:

- a) Whitewater has a much higher percentage of renters aged 15-34 who are students than do the other cities. Further study could help you determine whether this is because those other cities do a better job attracting non-student young people to work or live in their community and/or retain them after graduation, or whether this is primarily driven by commuting patterns.
- b) Looking at line 17, Whitewater has a higher percentage of its single-family-rental stock rented by students than do the other campus cities. Depending on the location of these units, the city could consider approving or supporting additional student-focused multifamily rental housing development near campus to absorb some of the student rental demand out from single-family housing units in order to re-convert those units back to homeownership for families.
- c) The average percentage of all single-family housing units in the State of Wisconsin that are rented is 12 percent, and the percentages of single-family units rented in the college towns in this analysis are substantially higher.
- d) the penultimate data line (line 23) shows the outcome of this analysis as the rental demand from non-students as a percent of all housing units. As you will see, Whitewater is below Menomonie, Platteville, and La Crosse on these measures. We can interpret this data roughly to answer the

question: outside of the student housing market, is the mix between rental and ownership housing titled too far in either direction. Whitewater is in the middle of these 5 other cities. Outside of housing serving students, Whitewater is not over-supplied in rental housing.

- e) Whitewater has the highest percentage of its existing multifamily rental housing stock occupied by students of all comparison cities (line 18). This is suggestive of the potential need for additional non-student multifamily housing.
- f) Whitewater has the highest percentage of all households as student renters (last line) compared to every other city in the analysis. Because the student population relative to the overall city population is a much higher percentage of Whitewater's population, there could be a misconception that rental housing is oversupplied.
- 2. Does Whitewater's distribution of housing (70% rental, 30% owner) affect market rate rents?

No. The market rate rent for any area is determined not by the percentage distribution of owner vs renter but instead by 1) the vacancy rate in the market in the past 3-6 months and 2) the level of income in the city. The first factor, vacancy rate, is the interplay between supply and demand. Outside of the student-specific market, when vacancy rates for rental housing are above about 5 percent, rents tend to fall. When vacancy rates are below 5 percent, rents tend to increase.

3. What is the impact of likely tariffs on construction costs?

In my presentation (slides 12 and 13), I showed that single family and multifamily construction costs are up over 40 percent since January 2020. A portion of this previous increase is due to the imposition of tariffs on Canadian lumber in 2017. More recently announced tariffs on aluminum, steel, and all imported products (such as gypsum from Mexico) will undoubtedly raise construction costs. Because the most recent round of tariff announcements (April 2, 2025) did exempt some construction materials, it is too early to tell the exact impact on construction costs.

4. How do other communities deal with the disclosures of financial information and rates of return in TIF approvals?

Whenever a developer applies for TIF assistance in any city I'm aware of, the developer presents a detailed proforma and financial information in a meeting with the finance staff or economic development/city manager staff or sends the information to the TIF consulting firm. In all the cities I'm familiar with, the process is that the developer submits a detailed proforma and then staff review those numbers based on their own expertise and experience to ensure compliance with TIF policies.

As I mentioned in my presentation, I did a very simple yield-on-cost analysis based only on the 1-page summary sheet from Ehlers that was made available to me. (Yield on cost calculations would be stabilized net operating income (NOI) divided by total cost. The Ehlers analysis summary provided and estimated assessed value, I applied a 5 percent cap rate to get an estimated NOI and divided by total project cost. I estimated the yield on cost with the TIF assistance to be 5 percent, which is on the lower end of market rate yield on cost. However, I did not see the detailed proforma and financial information).

Obviously, city staff and/or consultants conduct their own analysis on various measures of developer return (IRR or yield on cost) with- and without-TIF assistance. That's standard practice

and best practice. However, this detailed proforma information is never disclosed to the public, as it would expose a developer's personal financial position and trade secrets/business practices. In no city that I'm aware of does the city council or finance committee see the actual numbers, just a staff analysis indicating a) the analysis complies with city policy, b) the development would not be financially feasible (and therefore won't happen) but for TIF assistance, c) the recommended TIF incentive is enough make the project financially feasible but not too much to generate a higher-than-market return for the developer. The analysis summary I saw was prepared by Ehlers, one of the most respected and professional consulting firms in the state on TIF.

5. Explain more the comparison of rents between Madison and Whitewater: Madison has job growth but Whitewater does not?

My presentation made mention of median rents in the Madison and Whitewater markets for purposes of comparison of the possible need for TIF assistance for development in Whitewater that would not be needed in Madison. Based on a question and comment from a citizen, I should have been more clear that the median rent represents the 50<sup>th</sup> percentile rent: half of rents are higher and half of rents are lower.

In any rental market, there is a range of rents based on size, quality, location, and age of the unit. Obviously, new construction in Madison or Whitewater rents for substantially above the median rents in those cities, because median rents represent already-existing units. So, as I showed, the median rent in Madison is about \$700 more than in Whitewater. Median rents in Madison were about \$1700, but new construction rents are well above \$2400 for an equivalent sized unit. In the same way, the median rent in Whitewater is about \$1200, but clearly a new construction rent in Whitewater would be much higher (like around \$1700). Importantly, the comparison should not be between new-construction rents in Whitewater and median existing rents in Madison.

What the comparison shows is this: new construction rents in Madison of \$2400 for a 2 BR can support market rate construction without the need for TIF assistance. But new construction rents of \$1700 for a 2BR in Whitewater may not be able to support market rate construction without TIF assistance.

Higher rents in Madison means that developers can support more debt on each project for the same debt service coverage ratio (DSCR). The additional debt on a project is sufficient in Madison to make a development financially feasible.

Even with TIF assistance, a developer would need to finance a substantial portion of the construction costs with a loan. Relative to future rental demand, banks and other investors in the project will demand to see a market study by the developer indicating sufficient rental demand, otherwise they won't lend or invest in the project. You can be very certain that the bank scrutinized the project and market study very carefully. For the city, the PAYGO structure puts the risk on the developer (not the city) to demonstrate sufficient demand for the new housing.

6. Other cities do 50 percent on TIF, why does Whitewater do a higher number?

It is really hard, and not generally productive, to look for one summary measure to compare TIF projects across cities. Every project is different, and the percent of the increment going to the developer vs to the city is not a meaningful metric. Instead, the percentage of the increment going to

the developer is determined (as above) as that amount which turns a project from "no go" to go, but only enough to bring the developer up to a market return, no more. In some projects, that could be 50 percent of the increment, but in others it could be 90 or even 100 percent. There are too many other variables at play (timing of construction, length of time remaining for the life of the TID, interest rates on debt, etc.) to just look at the percentage of the increment going to a project vs the TID.

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#### Responses from Greg Johnson with Ehlers, Public Financial Advisors

## What happens if all TIDs exceed 12%? Can you amend the boundaries or are you locked in until you close the TID?

• If the incremental value of all TID's exceeds 12% of the City's total equalized value no new TID's can be created or territory added to an existing district unless territory is subtracted from an existing district, or an existing district is closed to get under the 12% limit. Subtraction of territory could negatively impact the financial performance of an existing district and if a district has a negative fund balance at the time of TID closure the City needs to absorb that deficit. Subtractions and TID closures need to be evaluated carefully.

# What are other communities doing for developer's incentives? East Troy is doing 50% and Elkhorn is doing 55%. What is the average? 90% is too high.

• Evaluating the percentage of increment offered as an incentive is only one component of evaluating a TIF assistance package. The first and most important step is to determine if the TIF assistance is the appropriate amount. Ehlers begins by working with the developer to obtain their financial information for the project. We also send the proforma and plans to the Assessor to get a value estimate, which is used to estimate TIF and property taxes. We enter the developer's financial information into Ehlers' proprietary proforma model. The model allows us to benchmark the investment returns for the project. Typical investment metrics are: Internal Rate of Return, Yield on Cost, Cash on Cash, and Equity Multiple. Different investors and banks sometimes focus on one or the other, or all of these, when looking to invest or finance a project.

If requested we negotiate with the developer, with the coordination and consent of the municipality, to provide the development the minimum amount of TIF or public support needed to finance the project. An assistance 'lookback' is often incorporated into the terms which allows the municipality to right-size the assistance after the project is occupied/stabilized and all revenue, expenses, interest rates, and costs are known. The delta between the developer's request for public assistance and the amount ultimately provided can result in a substantial savings to the municipality. After terms are agreed upon, Ehlers works collaboratively with the municipality and their attorney to draft a development/TIF agreement. Developers need to make money on projects. We work to make sure projects are financeable and developers have a fair market return and an upside, but developers often request more than what is needed to get a project

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done. Reasonable developer financial returns are often a range, and an exact number for assistance is not always the answer. Ehlers works on each project to determine the community goals the project will fill, and if the need is greater, the municipality may go further in the range of assistance determined. Each project has these considerations.

The percentage of increment offered can depend on the overall goals of a TID. If a TID is smaller and a specific development encompasses most of the district, and there are no other significant costs in the district expected besides the development incentive, paying a higher percentage of the increment could allow the district to close earlier. If a district is anticipated to pay an incentive and has debt service outstanding a smaller percentage payable to the developer may be needed to help support additional costs. Percentage of increment paid often varies for each TID and different developments due to many factors. Determining the amount of the assistance and how it is paid is just as important.

The paper says the goal for completion of the project is 5 years and we can expect to add another 682 students to the district. I understand they get funding on a per pupil basis but if they needed to build another school that funding would come from the community, right?

• If a new school is constructed all taxpayers contribute to the cost of school construction. The tax rate paid by properties in a TID is the same as properties outside of a TID.

This memorandum is provided in response to the inquiry regarding whether the City intends to continue utilizing the full allowable property tax levy in future years. The Finance Department does intend to continue recommending the use of the full allowable levy to the City Manager, who is responsible for recommending the annual budget to the Common Council. We believe this approach is fiscally prudent and in the best long-term interest of the community, as it supports critical services and reduces the need for future borrowing. It is important to note, however, that the final decision rests with the Common Council, which holds the authority to approve the budget and determine the final levy amount.

Using the full operational levy capacity each year provides the City with the necessary resources to maintain service levels, meet operational needs, and invest in long-term infrastructure improvements. Given the ongoing cost pressures from inflation, labor markets, and increasing demands for municipal services, maximizing our available levy helps ensure the City can continue delivering high-quality services without abrupt reductions or service interruptions.

More importantly, by fully utilizing the levy, the City can begin to more strategically plan for major capital expenditures by building up reserves in designated capital improvement accounts. Prefunding these accounts allows us to pay for infrastructure projects—such as road repairs, facility upgrades, equipment replacements, or utility improvements—using cash rather than debt. This practice significantly reduces the need to borrow, which in turn decreases the amount of interest the City must pay over time.

Reducing reliance on debt not only saves taxpayer dollars in the long run, but it also improves our overall financial position and credit profile. It enables more flexibility in future budgeting and ensures that the City can respond more effectively to unexpected needs or economic shifts.

In short, continuing to levy the full amount available under state law reflects a forward-looking, prudent approach to municipal finance—one that balances today's needs with tomorrow's responsibilities and helps secure a stronger financial future for the entire community.

#### **BACKGROUND**

(Enter the who, what when, where, why)

The Public Comment Ordinance was referred to the Finance Committee last fall for review and necessary revisions. At its September 24, 2024, meeting, the committee requested that all boards and commissions review the proposed policy and provide feedback, which would be presented to the Finance Committee before the end of the year.

The collected feedback was reviewed at the November Finance Committee meeting, after which the ordinance was recommended to the Common Council for consideration.

On December 3, 2024, the updated policy was presented to the Common Council, where minor edits were requested before the ordinance was brought back for final approval.

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# ORDINANCE No. \_\_\_\_\_AN ORDINANCE CREATING SECTION 2.62.060 PUBLIC COMMENT DURING COMMON COUNCIL AND COMMITTEE MEETINGS

The Common Council of the City of Whitewater, Walworth and Jefferson Counties, Wisconsin, do ordain as follows:

#### **SECTION 1. PURPOSE**

The purpose of this ordinance is to establish formal procedures governing public comment, public hearings, and participation in agenda items during meetings of the Common Council and its Committees to ensure orderly, efficient, and respectful discourse.

#### **SECTION 2. PUBLIC APPEARANCE CARD**

- (a) Members of the public who wish to speak during public comment, a public hearing, or on a specific agenda item may complete a Public Meeting Appearance Card (PMAC). Members of the public who wish to ask questions of the Common Council, its Committees, or presenters at meetings of the same shall fill out the PMAC so that they may be contacted with responses or answers to their inquiries.
- (b) The PMAC may also be used by individuals who do not wish to speak but wish to register their support or opposition to an agenda item.
- (c) Prior to taking action on any agenda item, the presiding officer of the meeting shall request the City Clerk/Secretary to identify individuals who have signed up to make a public comment.
- (d) The Clerk/Secretary shall call the names of speakers in an alternating order between those in support and those in opposition. This subsection shall be subject to alternating when possible.
- (e) Upon conclusion of verbal testimony, the Clerk/Secretary shall read the names and stated positions of those who submitted written comments, which shall be entered into the meeting minutes.
- (f) After all registered speakers have been heard, the presiding officer of the meeting shall ask for any remaining public comment. Those wishing to be heard at that time shall be afforded the same opportunity to comment as those who signed up to make a public comment.

#### **SECTION 3. TIME LIMITS FOR PUBLIC COMMENT**

- (a) Public Comment Period:
  - (1) Each speaker shall be limited to three (3) minutes.
  - (2) The total time allotted for public comment shall not exceed thirty (30) minutes.
- (b) Public Hearing:
  - (1) Each speaker shall be limited to five (5) minutes.
  - (2) The total time allotted shall not exceed thirty (30) minutes for both supporting and opposing speakers.

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(3) An extension of the total time allotted for public comment may be granted upon majority vote of the Common Council or Committee.

#### (c) Agenda Items:

- (1) Each speaker shall be limited to three (3) minutes.
- (2) Each speaker may be granted an extension of time to comment upon majority vote of the Common Council/Committee.
- (d) In instances where multiple individuals wish to address the same subject, a designated spokesperson may be identified to present on behalf of the group.
- (e) The presiding officer, with majority concurrence from the Common Council or Committee, may modify the time allocations in this section based on the complexity of the item and the number of speakers.
- (f) The Common Council or Committee may, by majority vote, allow additional comment periods if new information is presented.
- (g) Individuals may not cede their time to other individuals. The presiding officer of the meeting, by majority vote, may allow additional time to an individual representing a group of individuals that wish to address the same subject.

#### **SECTION 4. MEETING CONDUCT**

- (a) Expectations of Speakers:
  - (1) Speakers shall conduct themselves in a professional and respectful manner.
  - (2) All remarks shall be directed to the Common Council or Committee as a body, not to individual members, City staff, or members of the public.
  - (3) Speakers shall refrain from defamation, intimidation, personal affronts, threats of violence, or the use of profanity.
  - (4) Public members commenting who have not completed a PMAC shall state their name and address prior to making a public comment.
- (b) Expectations of the Public:
  - (1) Audience members shall not engage in shouting, clapping, or other disruptive behavior.
  - (2) Defamation, intimidation, personal affronts, threats of violence, or profanity shall not be permitted.
  - (3) Any behavior that disrupts the orderly conduct of the meeting is prohibited.
  - (4) Public members commenting who have not completed a PMAC shall state their name and address prior to making a public comment.
- (c) Expectations of Council/Committee Members:

- (1) Members shall preserve order and decorum at all times.
- (2) Members shall not delay or interrupt proceedings through conversation or other means.
- (3) Members shall not disturb a speaker or refuse to obey the directives of the presiding officer.
- (4) Members shall hold all questions to the public commenter until the end of the speaker's comments. Speakers may be allowed to briefly answer questions from the members.

#### **SECTION 5. ENFORCEMENT AND PENALTIES**

- (a) The presiding officer shall have the authority to enforce the provisions of this ordinance and may take necessary actions to maintain order, including warnings or removal of disruptive individuals.
- (b) Repeated violations may result in additional penalties as determined by the Common Council/Committee.

#### **SECTION 6. NOTICE REGARDING PUBLIC COMMENT**

- (a) The Staff of the City of Whitewater shall create a 36" x 48" posterboard to be displayed at all Common Council and Committee meetings under the projection screen, in front of the podium, or other easily visible area of the meeting room. The posterboard shall include the rules for public comment, to include:
  - (1) Reference to the City of Whitewater Municipal Ordinance regarding Public Comment during Common Council and Committee meetings.
  - (2) Please fill out a PMAC if you wish to be contacted with any responses or answers to any questions.
  - (3) You must clearly state your name and address prior to speaking.
  - (4) Please speak in a clear and loud manner into the microphone

Re: Public Comment Policy

At the September 24, 2024, meeting, the Finance Committee reviewed the Public Comment Policy. During this meeting, a motion was passed to standardize the policy's language across Council and committee meetings, set a three-minute limit for individual public comments, and establish a 30-minute time limit per side for public hearings. The updated policy was subsequently distributed to all committees for review and feedback, with a directive to return the input to the Finance Committee for further evaluation and a recommendation to the Common Council before the end of 2024. Below is a summary of the feedback received from the committees:

#### **Public Works**

In short, they really had no comments to make. They like the format, the consistency and the last paragraph on the first page, "The presiding officer, with the......wishing to speak on the item."

#### **PARC**

Asked about the language in public hearing "Per speaker time is the same. " Language needs clarification

Allowing someone to speak twice there are times that someone needs to make another comment. Change the card section use may be used instead of shall be use. Under the expectation of public keep the unruly behavior and speaking out when not recognized, but remove clapping.

#### **Cable TV Commission**

During public comment sessions, particularly when addressing a highly debated or sensitive issue, the council could consider taking a vote to extend the public comment period to 45 minutes instead of the standard 30 minutes. Additionally, it was suggested that guidelines be established to ensure appropriate language is used during meetings, especially considering that minors may have access to these discussions.

#### **Community Development Authority (CDA)**

Board member Kachel questioned the 3-minute length of time for an individual to speak. Board member Hicks stated the 3-minute rule is hard and fast; the new rule being considered allows for flexibility. Board member Kromholz stated that a time limit ensures that speakers get to the point in a reasonable amount of time. Chairman Marjzak would prefer the allowance for flexibility. Board member Kromholz would like to see comments limited to those individuals

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who live in or own property in Whitewater. Board member Hicks objected to requiring an individual to fill out a speaker card in order to speak. Board member Knight was in favor of encouraging more participation from the public.

#### **Police and Fire Commission**

- Due to PFC having relatively few public comments, there was a sentiment that filling out comment cards was "overkill."
- Overall, the sentiment was that the process makes sense for Common Council, but the PFC desired to have the flexibility not to use that system.

#### **Library Board**

The board wanted more clarification about time under the Time Limits section where it mentions "3 minutes with a limit of 30 minutes total" and "5 minutes with a limit of 30 minutes". They weren't clear what the 30 minutes meant in correlation to the 3 or 5 minutes. Also, how would a person attending the meeting online monitor their time limit when speaking?

Several of the committees/commissions have not met either due to need or lack of quorum including Parks & Recreation, Landmarks, Ethics, and the EOC. The Urban Forestry didn't have an opinion as they do not have anyone from the public attend their meetings. The Alcohol Licensing Review consists of three council members so it was not discussed during their meeting.

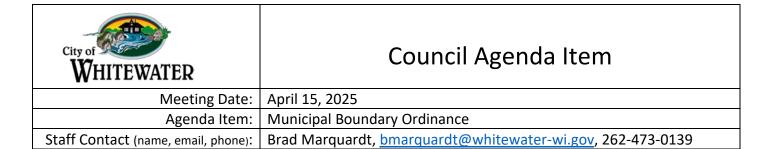

The Common Council of the City of Whitewater, Walworth and Jefferson Counties, Wisconsin, do hereby ordain as follows:

**SECTION 1.** Whitewater Municipal Code Section 1.24.010 is hereby amended to read as follows:

#### 1.24.010 City boundaries.

# ORDINANCE NO. <u>2025-O-13</u> AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 1.24 "CITY LIMITS"

The Common Council of the City of Whitewater, Walworth and Jefferson Counties, Wisconsin, do hereby ordain as follows:

## **Rezone Review**

The applicant, Arch Development, LLC seeks to rezone a portion of parcel 292-0515-3233-008 located off Tratt Street, in the City of Whitewater from the Agricultural Transition District, to the R-3, Multi-Family Residential District. The parcel is currently located in Jefferson County. A small portion of the parcel will remain in the AT District; however a majority of the property would be rezoned to R-3 for continued development of multi-family apartment complexes. They also seek to rezone /WUP 00359 from Agricultural Transition District, to the R-3, Multi-Family Residential District. Recently the applicant was approved to construct multi-family housing on the adjacent parcel in Walworth County, and all approvals were obtained. The applicant is proposing to continue phasing the development by constructing two additional buildings within

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the area that they are proposing to rezone. The applicant is not seeking approval for a CSM, or site plan review at this time.



Per Chapter 19.21 regarding the R-3 Zoning District, the existing parcel meets all requirements of the district. Additionally, The comprehensive plan describes future neighborhood as a carefully planned mix of primarily single-family residential development, including some two-family, higher density residential, and neighborhood compatible business and institutional uses that are consistent with the residential character of the area.

## Planner's Recommendations

- 1) Staff recommend that Plan Commission recommend **APPROVAL** of the Rezone to the City of Whitewater Common Council for a portion of the parcel located at 500 Tratt Street (292-0515-3233-008 & /WUP 000359), as it meets all requirements of the zoning district and is consistent with the comprehensive plan and future land use plan.
- 2) The following conditions are recommended with approval:
  - a. The area that is proposed to stay in the AT district should be parceled off via CSM to separate the zoning districts by lot and zoning designation.
  - b. Exact acreage or square footage of the proposed rezone area should be provided.
  - c. Exact acreage or square footage of the AT district should be provided.
  - d. The applicant will return for a full site plan review at a later date.

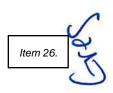

## **BACKGROUND**

On April 9, 2025 Chief Meyer received a memo from Superintendent Pate-Hefty stating that the School District would be ending the existing SRO (School Resource Officer) agreement, unless changes to the SRO contract red-lined by Pate-Hefty were made immediately.

The position of the Police Department is as follows:

We see tremendous value in the SRO position and want to ensure that no policy disagreement or personality conflict negatively impact the services provided by our SRO.

We do not believe it's in the best interest of the Police Department or the School District to make changes to the agreement until a new Superintendent is in place. Our preference is to auto-renew the current agreement. However, in lieu of auto-renewal, we recommend that a 120-day extension agreement (or similar timeframe) be entered so that any updates can be addressed with the involvement of the new Superintendent. This would help ensure clarity and agreement between Police Department and School District staff, as well as the governing bodies.

PD command staff have met with the Superintendent multiple times to work through challenges and policy implications of the current agreement. On the most recent occasion, January 29, 2025, the Police Chief provided the Superintendent with SRO contracts from five other local municipalities for review and comparison, with the understanding that those would be reviewed and that any further requested changes would be communicated. No communication regarding proposed alterations to the SRO contract were received from the Superintendent until the April 9, 2025 memo.

We believe a measured approach should be taken moving forward that includes input from the District Attorney, City Attorney, and School Board/Legal Counsel in addition to staff. This will ensure we create a well-crafted agreement for years to come.

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## FIRST AMENDMENT TO SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER AGREEMENT

This First Amendment (Amendment) to the SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER AGREEMENT (hereinafter "Agreement") is entered into between the WHITEWATER UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT (hereinafter "School District"), and CITY OF WHITEWATER, a Wisconsin municipal corporation, (hereinafter "City"), through the CITY OF WHITEWATER POLICE DEPARTMENT (hereinafter "Police Department") (hereinafter collectively referred to as the "Parties") as follows:

WHEREAS The School District, City, and Police Department entered into the original Agreement around July 1, 2019.

WHEREAS The School District, City, and Police Department now desire to amend the terms of the Agreement to extend its term.

NOW, THEREFRE, in consideration of the foregoing premises and the mutual terms contained herein, the Parties agree as follows:

## Section 3. Term of Agreement

The term of the Agreement is hereby extended for a period of 120 days from the original expiration date of June 30, 2025, making the new expiration date October 28, 2025. This agreement may be terminated earlier by mutual agreement of the Parties and upon the entry of a new school resource officer agreement.

This Amendment embodies the entire agreement between the School District, City, and Police Department with respect to the Amendment of the Agreement. In the event of any conflict or inconsistency between the provisions of the Agreement and this Amendment, the provisions of this Amendment shall control and govern.

Except as specifically modified and amended herein, all of the terms, provisions, requirements, and specifications contained in the Agreement remain in full force and effect. Except as otherwise expressly provided herein, the Parties do not intend to, and the execution of this Amendment shall not, in any manner impair the Agreement, the purpose of this Amendment being to amend and ratify the Agreement, as hereby amended and ratified, and to confirm and carry forward the Agreement, as hereby amended, in full force and effect.

As noted in the School Resource Officer Agreement, item 3, the term of the current agreement expires on June 30th of 2025. We have made multiple attempts through meetings in the last two years to change the language at the recommendation of our Board attorney. There has been no resolution following these meetings. According to the agreement, we are officially notifying you in writing before May 1st (as per the MOU) that we are ending the existing agreement. (This is to protect Whitewater Unified School District in the case we are required to bid out other police departments or services.) We have attached the language that we have provided on 3 occasions that aligns with our Board policy. If you would like to extend this agreement, we suggest you get redlined changes back to us immediately. Finally, you will need to provide a resolution on three major issues that have surfaced in the life of this MOU:

- 1) Failure on the part of Whitewater Police Department to cover dates of absence for the SRO. This year, the SRO (by the end of April) will have missed 27 days without planned coverage on our campus. Specifically, we would like a provision for this in the new MOU that requires Whitewater PD to cover absences (this aligns with the plan to bill WUSD a daily rate rather than cover the annual salary.)
- 2) Whitewater PD has failed to follow the WUSD Board policy regarding contacting parents in non-exigent circumstances in three circumstances. In the most recent situation, we may be involved with a parent's attorney due to the alleged violation of their parental rights on school grounds related to a child with a disability. This is unacceptable to violate parent rights, student rights, and Board Policy.
- 3) Whitewater PD has implemented a new policy, which we have not agreed to (without discussion or joint party approval) that WUSD staff need to contact "dispatch" for all needs related to the SRO or other WPD follow-up. (As recently as today, 4/9/25, the SRO requested staff "call dispatch.") This has created a serious disruption for our entire District Leadership Team, who do not support contacting dispatch for non-emergencies. For example, yesterday the SRO was asked to follow up on a truancy situation. Our staff were told, "call dispatch from here forward." (This is a concern for multiple reasons: it is an unnecessary step for our staff when they can simply speak to the SRO that WUSD is paying to contract on-site, it makes sensitive information about juveniles and their family addresses in our care, publicly available on scanners, and finally creates unnecessary panic about incidents that may be minor in nature.) This has never occurred in the history of administration in WUSD. (Our organizational history dates back 3 SROs and over 20 years with Dr. Lanora Heim.)

We are looking forward to resolving this in order to get an agreement in place.

#### SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER AGREEMENT

This Agreement is made pursuant to Sec. 66.0301, Wisconsin Statutes by and between the WHITEWATER UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT (hereinafter "School District"), and the CITY OF WHITEWATER, a Wisconsin municipal corporation, (hereinafter "City"), through the CITY OF WHITEWATER POLICE DEPARTMENT (hereinafter "Police Department") as follows:

#### WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the City, through the Police Department, agrees to provide the School District a School Resource Officer (SRO) Program in the School District; and WHEREAS, the School District and the Police Department desire to set forth in this SRO Agreement the specific terms and conditions of the services to be performed and provided by the SRO in the School District;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE PARTIES MUTUALLY AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

#### 1. Employment of School Resource Officers

- A. The SRO(s) shall be employee(s) of the Police Department and shall be subject to the administration, supervision and control of the Police Department.
- B. The SRO shall be subject to all personnel policies and practices of the Police Department except as such policies or practices may be modified by the terms and conditions of this agreement and School Board Policy 882.1-Rule.
- C. The Police Department, in collaboration with the School District in its sole discretion, shall have the power and authority to hire, discharge, and discipline SROs. It is understood and agreed that costs shared by the City and School District will remain in force if the assigned SRO has an extended leave of absence, which requires another Police Department officer(s) to be temporarily assigned to SRO duties.
- D. A joint committee composed of representatives of the Police Department and the School District shall make recommendations for the officer(s) to be assigned to the SRO position to the Chief of Police who shall assign such officers. Building administrators who are dissatisfied with a SRO's performance shall document their concerns and provide them to the Chief of Police.
- E. One SRO shall be assigned to the School District. The officer selected as the SRO shall be assigned at the discretion of the Chief of Police, in consultation with the Superintendent. If, at any time during the term of this Agreement, the Superintendent has concerns with the officer assigned as the SRO, the Superintendent may inform the Chief of Police who shall give the Superintendent's concerns reasonable consideration when assigning an SRO.

#### 2. Duty Hours

- A. SRO duty hours shall be determined by the provisions of the labor agreement between the Police Department and the Whitewater Professional Police Association (WPPA). Whenever possible, it is the intent of the parties that the SRO's duty hours shall conform to the school day.
- B. It is understood and agreed that time spent by SRO's attending municipal court, juvenile court, and/or criminal cases arising from and/or out of their employment as an SRO shall be considered as hours worked under this Agreement.

Department and an administrator of the school district to include building principals or Superintendent District Administrator.

#### 3. Term of Agreement

This agreement shall be for the term of July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2020 and shall automatically renew each July 1, for up to 5 years (through June 30, 2025) unless either party informs the other in writing prior to May 1 of its intent to not renew the agreement.

The agreement will be reviewed annually by both parties.

#### 4. Purpose of This Understanding

To clarify the role of the SRO to reduce misunderstandings between the Police Department and the School District as far as responsibilities, procedures and expectations of the SRO while on campus.

#### 5. Duties of School Resource Officers

The SRO's duties will include, but not be limited to, the following:

- A. Be a visible, active law enforcement figure in the schools that supports and promotes school safety. -
- B. Assist the School District in dealing with specific law enforcement matters.
- C. Provide a classroom resource for law education using approved materials.
- D. Be a resource for students which will enable them to be associated with a law enforcement figure in the students' environment.
- E. Be a resource for teachers, parents and students for conferences on an individual basis dealing with individual problems or questions. Concerns me
- F. Make appearances before administrative groups, parent groups, and other groups associated with the School District and as a speaker on a variety of requested topics.
- G. Be the point of contact for all local law enforcement and state agencies requesting to conduct formal police interviews, interrogations, and arrests on District premises.
- H. Be familiar with helpful community agencies, such as mental health clinics, drug treatment centers, etc., that offer assistance to dependency-and delinquency-prone youths and their families. Referrals will be made when necessary.
- I. Develop plans and strategies with school administration to prevent and/or minimize dangerous situations which might result in student unrest.
- J. Coordinate all activities with the school administrator and concerned staff members and seek permission, guidance, and advice prior to enacting any programs within the school.
- K. Be first and foremost a law enforcement officer.

- L. Wear department uniform, business casual dress, and formal dress, with appropriate logos and name badges depending on the time of the school year, the type of school activity or program, and the requests of the school and/or police department.
- M. Carry the department-issued or approved duty weapons in accordance with department policy.
- N. Serve on the Safety Team of the School District.
- O. SROs investigating a juvenile or assisting other law enforcement officers with the custody or investigation of a juvenile, will attempt to conduct such police activities off school premises when possible. The SRO will use their best efforts to communicate with Building Administrators on day-to-day police activities conducted at school buildings. Because of the sensitive nature of some juvenile investigations or so as not to compromise an investigation, it may not always be possible for SROs to disclose information immediately to Building Administrators. In those situations, the Building Administrator or Superintendent will be notified as soon as reasonably practicable.
- P. Develop and maintain lines of communication between school staff, students, parents and the <u>Department.</u>
- Q. Assist school staff in establishing policies and procedures that will contribute to the safety of the school staff and students.
- R. Provide testimony and technical assistance to the District at expulsion hearings or other proceedings when appropriate.
- S. Coordinate and supervise security measures at school activities in conjunction with the principals including sports events, dances, plays, etc.
- O.Issue parking tickets for the school in which assigned.

#### 6. Chain of Command

- A. As employees of the Police Department, SROs will be subject to the chain of command of the Police Department.
- B. In the performance of their duties, SROs shall coordinate and communicate with the building administrator or the building administrator's designee of the school to which they are assigned.

#### 7. Access to Education Records

- A. The confidentiality of student records is established in state and federal law and school officials have the responsibility to justify the release of such confidential information.
- B. Pursuant to Section 118.125(2)(d) of the Wisconsin Statutes, the parties agree that the District will make pupil records available to officers of Police Department who have been individually designated by the School Board and assigned to the School District (i.e., the SRO) and who have legitimate educational interests, including safety interests, in the pupil records.
- C. The parties agree that any other disclosure of pupil records that is made by the District to the Police Department pursuant to this agreement shall be made only in the following circumstances:

- 1. The request for records is in connection with an emergency, and knowledge of the requested information is necessary to protect the health or safety of an individual. Sec. 118.125(2)(p), Wis. Stats.;
- 2. The person to whom the records are disclosed certifies in writing that the records concern the juvenile justice system and the system's ability to effectively serve the pupil and relate to an ongoing investigation or pending delinquency petition. Sec. 118.125(2)(n), Wis. Stats.; or
- 3. The request is for the pupil's attendance record, and the pupil is under investigation for truancy or allegedly committing a criminal or delinquent act. Sec. 118.125(2)(cg), Wis. Stats.
- 4. The request is justified based on other legal grounds approved by the school district.
- D. The parties also agree that, in the event the District makes any disclosure of pupil records pursuant to this agreement, the person to whom such records are disclosed must certify in writing that the records will not be disclosed to any other person or party, except as permitted by law.

#### 8. Access to Police Records

- A. District or school administrators may request police records of a student enrolled within the District from the Police Department.
- B. The Police Department may release records of a student enrolled in District to the District on its own initiative or at the request of District, specifically including:
  - <u>1</u>i. the use, possession or distribution of alcohol, controlled substances or controlled substance analogue;
  - 2#. the illegal possession by a juvenile of a dangerous weapon as defined in Wisc. Stat. sec. 939.22(10);
  - 3iii. an act for which the juvenile was taken into custody based upon law enforcement officer's belief that the juvenile was committing or had committed a violation of any state or federal law; and
  - 4iv. an act for which the student has been adjudged delinquent.
- C. District shall not disclose the information received under this section to the student or parents / guardians of the student without first receiving acknowledgement from the SRO that disclosure will not adversely affect an ongoing investigation.
- D. The Police Department will make it a policy to notify the District of any person enrolled in or employed by the District that is registered with the Department of Corrections (DOC) as a sex offender.

#### 9. Procedures

A. The SRO will generally not be involved in ordinary school discipline that does not involve a suspected violation of law or ordinance.

- B. The school administrator shall conduct his/her own investigation into whether the student violated school rules. This investigation may be conducted in conjunction with or separate from the SRO's investigation, but the school may not use the law enforcement officers' records as the sole basis for disciplinary action.
- **CB**. If an administrator believes that a municipal or criminal violation has occurred or is about to occur, the building administrator may request the SRO's involvement, who will conduct an investigation in conformance with the policies of the Police Department, except as otherwise modified by this agreement and School Board Policy 882.1-Rule.
- <u>DC</u>. If the SRO or Police Department receives information regarding a possible violation of law or ordinance on District premises, or other incident on or off District premises that endangers the property, health, or safety of others at school (including threats), the SRO shall notify the administration as soon as possible. The SRO <u>will will attempt to notify the administration</u> before conducting an investigation, unless the matter poses an imminent danger.
- D.The SRO shall notify the school administration of the results of an investigation into a possible violation of law or ordinance on District premises, or other incident on or off District premises that endangers the property, health, or safety of others at school (including threats) as soon as possible, as permitted by law.
- E. It will be the responsibility of the SRO to report all crimes, he or she is made aware of, originating on campus, to the Police Department. Information on cases that are worked off-campus by the police department or other agencies involving students on a campus served by the SRO will be provided to the SRO.t
- F. The SRO may assist the school administration in conducting a search, at the request of the school administration, as long as the SRO is assisting school officials in furtherance of the school's objective to maintain a safe and proper educational environment.

#### 10. Police Interviewing of Students at School

A. Students may be interviewed during school hours by the SRO, consistent with School Board Policy 882.1-Rule. Students may be interviewed during school hours by law enforcement officers other than the SRO in exigent circumstances. The SRO or other law enforcement officer will attempt to conduct such police activities off school premises when possible. The SRO will use their best efforts to communicate with Building Administrators on day-to-day police activities conducted at school buildings. Because of the sensitive nature of some juvenile investigations or so as not to compromise an investigation, it may not always be possible for SROs to disclose information immediately to Building Administrators. In those situations, the Building Administrator or Superintendent will be notified as soon as reasonably practicable.

The SRO, or law enforcement officer involved in anconducting a student interview, will make every effort to will contact the student's a parent or guardian before conducting the interview unless the interview is initiated by a student, involves child abuse, or concerns an urgent matter of health and safety.

#### 11. Taking a Student in Custody

A. The SRO will notify the school administration immediately upon determining if a student will be placed in custody.

B. The SRO will work with the school administration to ensure the process of taking the student in custody is least disruptive to the school environment while maintaining officer safety considerations.

#### 12. Off Duty Carrying of Firearms

A. Law enforcement officers employed by the Police Department shall be permitted to possess firearms, including concealed firearms, on school property while not acting in their official capacities as "on-duty" officers, pursuant to Section 948.605 of the Wisconsin Statutes. To avoid any disruption which could result, off-duty officers who choose to possess a firearm on school property under this Agreement shall do so in a concealed manner only.

B. Only law enforcement officers employed by the Police Department who are "peace officers" as defined by Wisconsin Statute, and who carry firearms in the course of their professional duties with the Police Department shall be permitted pursuant to this Agreement to possess firearms on school property while not acting in their official capacities as "on-duty" officers.

C. It is agreed that law enforcement officers covered by this Agreement are authorized and permitted, and therefore shall continue to take any and all steps that their oath and duties to the Police Department and the State of Wisconsin require, including when off-duty on District premises or property if said oath and duties so require.

#### 13. Payment of the SRO Program Cost

- A. SRO shall be paid through City Payroll.
- B. Program Cost includes budgeted wage, benefit, and payroll tax for SRO in accordance with the collective bargaining agreement between the Police Department and the WPPA. Program Cost excludes overtime and related additional pay, unless overtime is directly connected to a school related assignment, investigation, or function. Documentation of overtime may be requested and reviewed by the School District.
- C. Program Cost shall be shared by the City and School District.
  - 1a. The School District shall be responsible for 60% of the annual Program Cost. The City will invoice the School District for these costs.
  - 2b. The City shall be responsible for any and all remaining costs.

#### 14. Termination.

- a. In addition to termination as provided in Section 3, above, this Agreement may be terminated by either Party upon thirty (30) days written notice that any Party has failed to substantially perform in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Agreement. This Agreement may also be terminated without cause by either Party upon ninety (90) days written notice.
- b. <u>If the District terminates this Agreement pursuant to this section, the District will fulfill its obligations under Section 13 through the date of termination.</u>

#### 15. Miscellaneous.

- a. Modification. This document constitutes the complete understanding between the Department and District as to all matters addressed herein. Modifications to the terms shall be mutually agreed upon by the parties in writing and signed by the parties.
- b. <u>Non-Assignment</u>. This Agreement, and each covenant herein, shall not be capable of assignment, unless the express written consent of the School Board and the City is obtained.
- c. Merger. This Agreement constitutes a final written expression of all the terms of this Agreement and is a complete and exclusive statement of those terms.
- d. <u>Severability</u>. The invalidity or unenforceability of any provisions of this Agreement shall not affect the validity or enforceability of any other provision of this Agreement.
- e. <u>Entire Agreement. This Agreement constitutes the complete understanding between the Department and District as to all matters addressed herein. This Agreement shall supersede all prior agreements, understandings, or practices concerning such matters.</u>
- f. Governing Law and Venue. This Agreement shall be governed by, and be construed in accordance with, the laws of the State of Wisconsin without regard to the law of conflicts.
- g. Waiver. Any failure of a Party to enforce, for any period of time, any of the provisions under this Agreement shall not be construed as a waiver of such provisions or of the right of said Party thereafter to enforce each and every provision under this Agreement.

#### Joint Development Agreement

Whitewater Solar, LLC

City of Whitewater, Towns of Whitewater, La Grange, Cold Spring, Wisconsin

This Joint Development Agreement ("Agreement") is entered by and among Whitewater Solar LLC ("Whitewater Solar"), and the City of Whitewater, Town of Whitewater, Town of La Grange, and Town of Cold Spring (each a "Local Government" and together the "Local Governments"). Whitewater Solar and the Local Governments are referred to as the "Parties" herein.

#### **RECITALS**

Whitewater Solar desires to develop, construct and operate an approximately 180 megawatt (MW) solar photovoltaic electrical generating facility with necessary associated facilities, such as underground power collection lines, access roads, operating and maintenance facility, electrical substation and overhead transmission line connections in Jefferson County, which includes Cold Spring Township, and Walworth County, which includes the City of Whitewater, and the Townships of Whitewater and La Grange ("the Project").

- 1. The Parties agree that it is in the best interests of each to memorialize the rights, obligations and responsibilities of the Parties with respect to construction and operation of the Project.
- 2. The Parties further agree that the below Agreement is the product of joint negotiations and its primary purpose is to foster cooperation and good-faith dealing.
- 3. The Parties agree that construction of the Project and its associated facilities, including (i) solar energy collection and electrical generating equipment; (ii) overhead and underground electrical distribution, collection, transmission and communications lines or cables, electric combiners, inverters, transformers and substations, energy storage facilities, and telecommunications equipment, switchyards, and other interconnection facilities; (iii) internal roads and crane pads; (iv) meteorological measurement equipment; and (v) control buildings, operations and maintenance facilities and buildings are under the jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin ("PSCW"). This Agreement is conditioned on Whitewater Solar's initial and maintained compliance with all applicable state, federal, and local laws and permit or approval requirements, including any requirements associated with the Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity ("CPCN") issued by the PSCW and any requirements in permits issued by the Department of Natural Resources ("DNR").
- 4. All time periods listed below in the Agreement are based on calendar days unless otherwise noted.
- 5. The term "facility" or "facilities" as used in this Agreement includes, but is not

limited to, the solar photovoltaic electrical generating facility which is the subject of this Agreement, including all necessary associated facilities described above, and all components related to the Project, except for fences, landscaping, and access roads as applicable.

- 6. Walworth County and Jefferson County are individually referred to herein as a "County" and collectively together, the "Counties."
- 7. Any amendment to this Agreement must be negotiated among the Parties and agreed to by mutual consent of all Parties, which shall be in writing and signed by all Parties.

#### **AGREEMENT**:

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises, covenants, and agreements contained herein, the Parties to this Agreement hereby stipulate and agree as follows:

- 1. Planning and Construction Phase. The Parties understand and agree that approval of the Project is solely under the jurisdiction of the PSCW and that the Project's preliminary site plans are subject to approval from the PSCW for substantive site design changes. The Parties further agree that the Local Governments may not require changes to the Project, absent PSCW's request for such changes, unless there is a change in law which authorizes the Local Governments to enforce laws and ordinances which they are prevented from enforcing by state law at the time this Agreement is executed.
  - a <u>Planning Phase</u>. Upon request from a Local Government, Whitewater Solar shall, within five (5) business days of any request, provide copies of proposed plans for above ground facilities and below ground facilities of the Project and proposed equipment haul routes, provided such plans have been prepared for the PSCW. Whitewater Solar shall also provide, upon request, any updated exhibits, after issuance of a CPCN by the PSCW. The Local Government may also access electronic copies of Whitewater Solar's CPCN application, including exhibits and later-filed modifications to such exhibits, on the PSCW's electronic records filing system in Docket No. 9828-CE-100.
  - b. Pre-Construction Schedule. Whitewater Solar will provide the Local Governments relevant site plans, including the erosion control plan, construction timelines, and other relevant construction information, at least seventy-five (75) days prior to the start of construction on the Project, to allow the Local Governments an opportunity to review the construction information. To the extent necessary, Whitewater Solar reserves the right to provide amended site plans, construction timelines, and other relevant construction information prior to the start of construction on the Project which shall be provided to the Local Governments within ten (10) days of completion of such amended site plans, construction timelines, or other relevant construction information. For the avoidance of doubt, the Local Governments' rights under this Section 1(b) shall be limited to the review of construction information only.
    - 1. Members of the Project's construction team will attend a pre-

construction meeting with staff from the Counties at a mutually agreeable date not less than forty-five (45) days prior to the start of construction.

- c. <u>Post Construction Schedule</u>. At least sixty (60) days following completion of construction, Whitewater Solar shall meet with the Counties to discuss post-construction items including, but not limited to, necessary post-construction vegetation management, stormwater management, and erosion control planning.
- d. Whitewater Solar shall provide the Local Governments' staff with copies of the Glare, Sound, Electromagnetic Frequency, and Storm Water studies submitted to the PSCW during the CPCN review process, as well as any other studies which have been completed related to the development of the Project and that have been filed in PSC Docket No. 9828-CE-100. Whitewater Solar may satisfy this requirement by posting such studies to a publicly accessible website dedicated to the Project. The Parties may also access electronic copies of Whitewater Solar's CPCN application, including exhibits and later-filed modifications to such exhibits, via the PSCW's electronic records filing system in Docket No. 9828-CE-100.
- e. The Parties agree that Whitewater Solar and its successors, assigns, contractors, agents, and representatives may use public roads as part of the construction, operation, maintenance and repair of the Project.
- f. Whitewater Solar agrees that it shall seek and obtain all permits from the relevant jurisdiction typically required of others, such as driveway permits and rights-of-way crossing permits. Each Local Government agrees that it will not unreasonably withhold, condition, or delay approval of any permit that may be required for the construction of the project, including, but not limited to, utility right of way crossings, access road encroachments, building permits, and/or electrical permits.

#### g. <u>Compliance and Complaint Process</u>.

- 1. Whitewater Solar shall identify a Project contact to the Local Governments on its behalf, for compliance and complaints, if any.
- 2. During construction, the construction site manager of the engineering, procurement, and construction ("EPC") firm selected by Whitewater Solar will be designated as the Project contact, under Section (1)(g)(1). above. The selected EPC firm shall be contractually obligated to Whitewater Solar to abide by the applicable permit requirements.
- 3. After construction completion, Whitewater Solar's full-time operations team will be its Project contact under Section (1)(g)(1). Complaints shall be submitted through the Project website and the Local Governments will be provided with the operations team's contact information.

#### 2. Project's Use of Haul Routes and Road Repair Obligations.

- a. Whitewater Solar will use commercially reasonable efforts to enter into a Road Use Agreement ("RUA") with each Local Government prior to the full mobilization for the construction of the Project to cover any construction-related damage on local roads within the Project area that are designated as "Haul Routes" in Exhibit 2. Such RUAs will be substantially similar in form to the Road Use Agreement in Exhibit 3.
- b. Prior to the full mobilization for the construction on the Project, Whitewater Solar, at its expense, shall have signs put in place to identify Haul Routes.
- 3. Project's Drainage Repair Obligations. If drainage infrastructure or systems located outside the Project boundary, including culverts, are damaged by Whitewater Solar or any party under the control of Whitewater Solar (including, for the avoidance of doubt, any contractor of Whitewater Solar), Whitewater Solar shall cause the restoration of such drainage infrastructure or system to pre-existing condition. "Pre-existing condition" shall mean the flow capacity existing immediately prior to the Project commencing construction. Whitewater Solar is responsible for all expenses related to repairs, relocations, reconfigurations, and replacements of drainage infrastructure and systems that are damaged by Whitewater Solar or any party under the control of Whitewater Solar.

## 4. Allocation of Utility Aid Shared Revenues Proceeds Between Local Governments.

- a Whitewater Solar is subject to taxation under Chapter 76 of Wisconsin Statutes, which requires payment of a generator license fee. The Utility Aid Shared Revenue program is the program by which the Wisconsin Department of Revenue ("DOR") distributes some of the revenues collected under the generator licensee fee to counties and municipalities.
- b. Based on the Utility Aid Shared Revenue program, the Parties estimate the Project may generate an estimated \$900,000 in annual revenues for distribution to the Counties and Local Governments, in the aggregate, according to the Utility Aid Shared Revenue formula which compares favorably to the current property tax revenues generated from the land that will be used for the Project.
- c. Despite the increase in Local Government revenues as set forth above, the Parties acknowledge there may be an annual reduction in property tax revenue because the land located in the Primary Project Area, as depicted in the CPCN Application ("Primary Project Area") will be removed from local property tax rolls because Whitewater Solar is subject to taxation under Chapter 76 of Wisconsin Statutes.
- d. The Utility Aid Shared Revenue program does not distribute revenue to school

districts or technical colleges. Since the land used by the Project will be removed from local property taxes because Whitewater Solar is subject to taxation under Chapter 76 of Wisconsin Statutes, Whitewater Unified School District ("WUSD"), Madison Area Technical College ("MATC"), and Gateway Technical College ("Gateway") will see decreases in the amount of property tax revenue they receive. Accordingly, Whitewater Solar hereby agrees to pay certain amounts intended to reflect the portions of property tax that would otherwise have been distributed to WUSD, MATC, and Gateway, directly to WUSD, MATC, and Gateway. The certain amount paid to each entity will be calculated and mutually agreed upon by Whitewater Solar and the Counties prior to commencement of construction on the Project.

- e. If a change in law results in the elimination or reduction of the Utility Aid Shared Revenue program, the elimination or reduction of the generator license fee (under Wis. Stat. § 76.28 and § 76.29), and the land used by the Project is not returned to the applicable taxing jurisdiction's property tax rolls, which result in tax payments to a Local Government in an amount less than what was previously being received through the Utility Aid Shared Revenue program, then Whitewater Solar will compensate the Local Government for the difference between the lost property tax revenue and the previous payments received by the Local Government, up to the amount of the Project's prior year's generator license fee (under Wis. Stat. § 76.28 and § 76.29).
- f. Neither Whitewater Solar nor its direct or indirect owners or affiliates shall take any affirmative action, including lobbying, to directly or indirectly interfere, impede, eliminate, or reduce the Utility Aid Shared Revenue program currently in effect or the amounts paid to the Local Governments under such program.
- In the event that the Project's in-service date is delayed later than February 29, g. 2028, and to the extent that such delay creates a documented and material budget shortfall in a given year for a Local Government caused by elimination or reduction of reasonably anticipated payments from the State of Wisconsin under the Utility Aid Shared Revenue program had the Project not experienced the in-service date delay, the Local Government may provide written notice and documentation of the material budget shortfall to Whitewater Solar. Upon receipt of such notice and documentation of the material budget shortfall, Whitewater Solar agrees to compensate the Local Government in an amount sufficient to cover the portion of the documented material budget shortfall ("Governmental Budget Shortfall Payments") that is attributable to the Project. In no event shall Whitewater Solar be obligated to make Governmental Budget Shortfall Payments described in this Section 4(g) without sufficient documentation being provided to demonstrate the creation of such budget shortfall. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Whitewater Solar shall not be obligated make any future Governmental Budget Shortfall Payments from and after the date upon which (a) Whitewater Solar provides written notice to the Local Government that construction on the Project will not commence, or (b) a

change in law results in modification or elimination of the Utility Aid Shared Revenue program.

- **Decommissioning.** The Parties acknowledge that all decommissioning security obligations shall be held by the Counties. Any claim against any decommissioning security must be brought by a County pursuant to the joint development agreement entered into by Whitewater Solar and the Counties (the "County JDA"). The Local Governments shall not have any right to make a claim related to decommissioning against Whitewater Solar.
- 6. Public Safety and Emergency Medical Services. The Parties acknowledge that construction of a solar photovoltaic electrical generating facility does not create any unique or especially dangerous environments or situations for local emergency responders. Whitewater Solar will require that all contractors on the Project site during construction shall meet all applicable state, federal, and industry best practice standards for employee and public safety consistent with the size, location and surroundings of the Project. Whitewater Solar intends to request meetings with local emergency response agencies to provide Project and facility familiarization and establish communication channels. Should any aspect of the Project's construction or operations present unfamiliar equipment or situations for local emergency responders, Whitewater Solar will endeavor to arrange for adequate professional training to deal with such concerns.
- **Setbacks**. Project Setbacks shall be as listed in Exhibit 1 to this Agreement, unless otherwise required by the PSCW.

## 8. <u>Sound Impacts</u>.

- a. The Project will comply with PSCW noise standards set forth in Wis. Admin. Code § PSC 128.14 and Jefferson County sound standards set forth in the Jefferson County Zoning Ordinance for the zoning district where the Project is located, which together include maximum sound levels attributable to the facility during daylight and nighttime hours.
- b. The Project's inverters and substation, which constitute noise emitting equipment from the solar facility, shall not exceed the PSCW mandated maximum nighttime sound level of 45 dBA, nor the maximum daytime sound level of 50 dBA, at the walls of the noise-sensitive receptors, hereby identified as the single-family residences within proximity of the Project. Additionally, the Project will meet the daytime sound standard thresholds at the Project's boundaries, as set forth in Jefferson County's Zoning Ordinance, currently in effect.
- c. Construction Hours. Hours of construction will be between 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m., Monday through Saturday, and between 10:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. on Sunday.
- **Equipment Height.** The height of the Project's equipment shall be no higher than fourteen (14) feet, with the exception of the Project substation and any required overhead electrical

lines.

10. <u>Vegetation Management Plan.</u> The Parties agree that Whitewater Solar will hire a regionally qualified consultant to create a Vegetation Management Plan for the construction and operation of the Project. Where commercially reasonable, and as approved by the PSCW, the Project will utilize regionally appropriate plants and grasses across the Project's developed area and incorporate pollinator habitat. During Project operation, Whitewater Solar will spray, mow, and otherwise maintain all developed acreage inside the fence, subject to PSCW approval of such activities in the Vegetation Management Plan.

#### 11. <u>Vegetative Buffer.</u>

- a. Whitewater Solar will attempt to work with non-participating landowners adjacent to the Project that do not already have sufficient natural vegetative screening that reasonably obscures the view of the Project to develop a landscaping plan prior to the commencement of construction. Non-participating landowners adjacent to the Project will have the ability to indicate a preference for Whitewater Solar to install one of the following: (A) trees, (B) shrubs, (C) trees and shrubs, or (D) nothing. Under no circumstances shall any vegetative screening cast shadows on the Project's photovoltaic cell panels. If adjacent non-participating landowners decline to indicate a landscaping preference, Whitewater Solar may, at its option, install (A) trees, (B) shrubs, (C) trees and shrubs, or (D) nothing. The exact species of trees and shrubs installed will be determined based on coordination with a landscaping company selected at Whitewater Solar's sole discretion and subject to availability at the time of procurement/planting.
- b. Whitewater Solar shall reasonably maintain, in its discretion, areas owned or controlled by Whitewater Solar between the Project's fence line and adjoining property boundary lines.
- c. Whitewater Solar agrees to create and maintain an appropriate vegetative buffer designed to prevent or minimize erosion around drainage ditches at a distance required by the PSCW or the appropriate state regulatory authority if waters are deemed "navigable" by the PSCW.

#### 12. Fencing.

a. Whitewater Solar shall install deer fencing around the solar equipment at the height of seven (7) feet or a height mandated by the PSCW to mitigate changes to the aesthetics of agricultural landscape and to prevent larger animals from gaining access to solar equipment. In the event of a conflict between a height of seven (7) feet or a height mandated by the PSCW, the height mandated by the PSCW shall control.

- b. The fencing specified for the Project will have openings large enough to allow the safe passage of small mammals.
- c. The Project shall include areas where larger wildlife such as deer will have crossings or passage at locations where wildlife trails are located, along stream and drainage corridors, and at other locations as needed. The DNR Wildlife Biologist shouldbe contacted to provide guidance on locations and a plan shall be provided to the Local Governments before construction of any fencing.
- d. The Project's substation fence may utilize chain link and barbed wire, as required by electrical code.
- e. No fence shall cross a "navigable" waterway.
- f. Impairments to fencing that are aesthetically unpleasing shall be remedied within two (2) weeks of written notification to Whitewater Solar by the Local Government within which such fencing section is located. In the event leaning or tilting of the fencing occurs that exceeds plus or minus ten (10) degrees of perpendicular, such fencing will be corrected by Whitewater Solar back to perpendicular within two (2) weeks of receiving written notice on the issue from the Local Government within which such fencing section is located.
- 13. <u>Dust Control</u>. Whitewater Solar will use commercially reasonable efforts to reduce the creation of dust throughout the construction process. Dust-related complaints and disputes shall be handled in accordance with the process described in Section 26 of this Agreement.
- 14. <u>Visual Considerations</u>. The Project's facilities shall not be used for any type of advertising. Whitewater Solar may erect and maintain a single project identification sign. The Project shall be minimally lighted so as not to disturb neighboring properties, provided, however, reasonably necessary lighting to provide safety and security of facilities shall be allowed. Whitewater Solar will provide the Local Governments with a description of permanent Project lighting plans when available. Whitewater Solar shall maintain all facilities in a manner to preserve the aesthetics of all facilities including, but not limited to, not allowing equipment or fencing to deteriorate or remain in a state of disrepair within view of the public or adjoining landowners.
- **Topsoil Disturbance and Preservation.** The Project will not remove material amounts of topsoil from the Project area. Proposed site grading shall be conducted in a manner which ensures that topsoil is adequately preserved and retained. For the avoidance of doubt, topsoil may be removed for access roads, substations, and permanent parking areas, provided however, that topsoil removed from these areas will remain on site.
- **16. Grading.** Upon request, prior to the full mobilization for the construction of the Project, Whitewater Solar will provide copies of all grading plans to the Local Governments.

- **Phasing**. The Parties acknowledge that the construction of the Project may take place through one or more phases at Whitewater Solar's election. In the event Whitewater Solar elects to construct the Project in phases, the obligations of Whitewater Solar hereunder will, to the extent applicable, relate only to the respective phase of the Project then being undertaken by Whitewater Solar.
- **Snowmobile Paths.** Whitewater Solar and the Local Governments agree to meet prior to commencement of construction regarding the location of snowmobile paths within the Project area. Whitewater Solar also agrees to communicate and coordinate with snowmobile clubs that have chapters within the Project area prior to commencement of construction.
- **19. Assignment of Interest.** Whitewater Solar shall have the sole and exclusive right to sell, assign, or lease any or all portions of the Project or interests in Whitewater Solar to any non-party entity at any time without notice to the other Parties. In such event, such non-party entity shall, with Whitewater Solar or, in the event of total sale, assignment or lease, the new owner of the Property shall, have the same rights and obligations as Whitewater Solar as set forth in this Agreement. Whitewater Solar, its successors or assigns, shall, at all times and at its sole expense, maintain the Project in good condition and repair. Whitewater Solar shall also have the sole and exclusive right (without any consent from the other Parties required) to collaterally assign its interest in this Agreement to any parties providing debt, equity or other financing for the Project to Whitewater Solar or any of its affiliates. For the avoidance of doubt, no direct or indirect change in control of the ownership interests of Whitewater Solar, LLC, or any sale of direct or indirect ownership interests in the Whitewater Solar, LLC (including any tax equity investment or passive investment) shall constitute an assignment requiring the consent of any of the other Parties under this Agreement. Whitewater Solar shall notify the Local Governments of any and all proposed changes in the direct owner or substantial operation of the Project. Whitewater Solar will attempt to schedule introductory meetings between the Local Governments and any future owner.
- **Cooperation.** Whitewater Solar and the Local Governments agree to communicate and cooperate in good faith concerning the safe construction and operation of the Project and preventing or correcting any materially adverse conditions that may be created by the Project. Whitewater Solar and the Local Governments agree that Whitewater Solar and the appropriate offices within each Local Government shall meet prior to commencement of construction to communicate on the timing of construction and the use of emergency services, if needed.
- **21. Indemnification.** Whitewater Solar agrees to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless each Local Government and its supervisors, trustees, administrators, employees, and representatives (collectively the "Indemnified Parties") against any and all losses, damages, claims, expenses, including reasonable attorneys' fees, and liabilities for physical damage to the property of such Local Government and for physical injury to any person, to the extent caused by activities or operations of Whitewater Solar, its agents and employees, for the performance or non-performance of its duties pursuant

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to this Agreement except to the extent such physical damage to property or physical injury to persons is caused by the negligence or intentional misconduct of a Local Government, or its supervisors, trustees, administrators, employees, or representatives. This indemnification obligation shall survive the termination of this Agreement.

- **Insurance.** Whitewater Solar shall at all times during construction and its operation of the Project carry Commercial General Liability insurance with a minimum liability of \$5,000,000 per occurrence, and Automobile Liability insurance with a minimum liability limit of \$1,000,000 per occurrence, or, Whitewater Solar, if a qualified self-insured in the State of Wisconsin, shall maintain not less than \$5,000,000 of claims-first-made excess general liability insurance on an occurrence basis over its self-insured retention that may change from time to time. Such excess insurance shall include automobile liability. Certificates of insurance will be provided to the Local Governments upon written request.
- **Compliance with Laws.** Whitewater Solar shall at all times comply in all material respects with all federal, state and local laws, statutes, ordinances, rules, regulations, judgments, and other valid orders of any government authority with respect to its activities associated with the Project and shall obtain all material permits, licenses, and orders required to conduct any and all such activities.
- **24. Entire Agreement.** This Agreement, including all Exhibits and other documents and agreements referenced herein, constitutes the Entire Agreement among the parties hereto in respect to the Project. However, this Agreement shall be deemed and read to include and incorporate all of the Exhibits hereto and any related approvals of the Local Governments. In the event of a conflict between this Agreement, any related approvals by the Local Government, or the PSCW, the PSCW's requirements shall be deemed controlling. In the event of a conflict between this Agreement and the County JDA, the provisions of the County JDA shall control. No modification, waiver, amendment, or change of this Agreement shall be valid unless the same is in writing and signed by the Parties.
- **Relevant Law.** Any and all disputes arising under this Agreement and/or relating to the actual development and/or construction of the Project shall be resolved pursuant to the laws of the State of Wisconsin.
- Government notifies it in writing of any dispute related to this Agreement to (1) make a determination of its validity, and if so determined to be valid, (2) provide a plan in which to reasonably remedy such complaint. In the event such a dispute cannot be resolved after steps (1) or (2) above, the aggrieved Local Government shall provide written notice of said dispute to Whitewater Solar within fifteen (15) days after the occurrence of steps (1) or (2) (a "Notice of Dispute"). The Notice of Dispute shall include a description of the nature of the dispute and the remedy sought by the Local Government. The Parties shall endeavor to resolve the dispute by mediation with a mediator mutually acceptable to the Parties. The administration of the mediation shall be as mutually agreed by the Parties. The mediation shall be convened within thirty (30) days, or as soon thereafter as possible, of the issuance of a Notice of Dispute. The costs of the mediator shall be equally shared by

the Parties. All disputes which are not resolved by good faith discussions or mediation shall be resolved by arbitration with a single arbitrator and in a venue mutually acceptable to the Parties. If the Parties cannot agree on an arbitrator, either party may petition either the Jefferson County Circuit Court or the Walworth County Circuit Court for appointment of an arbitrator. Such arbitration shall be in accordance with Wis. Stat. Chapter 788 (Arbitration) in effect at the time of the dispute.
