Recreation Coordinator Behler shared about the Egg Hunt, Spring Fling programming, volunteer opportunities, and the Family Fairy Dance. Behler added that summer registration opens on April 18 and that the Activity Guide would be in mailboxes this week. Parks Supervisor Schull shared about the Memorial Park central restroom project, Memorial Park Skate Park rehabilitation project, the River Fox Playground, the Boones Ferry Master Plan, Regional Park 5 (Trocadero), Regional Park 6 (Cavallo), Regional Park 7 (Oulanka), and Regional Park 8 (Tivoli). Program Coordinator Ruggles shared that rental season has opened and that shelters, fields, and facilities can be rented.

The Wilsonville Diversity Equity and Inclusion Committee (DEI) was appointed by the Mayor and City Council in June 2021 and since then has started work on their strategic plan. This summer, the DEI committee will organize a Juneteenth Event sponsored fully by the committee. (The City hosted their first event last year but the committee has taken this on as their contribution to the community.) The event will bring community members together to celebrate and learn about Juneteenth (commemorating the emancipation of African American slaves). As a City Committee, there is not a budget or funds set aside for their work outside of staff support and a consultant to assist the City with establishing a DEI Strategy.

The DEI Committee Juneteenth Committee has reserved Town Center Park on June 18 for the celebration which will have a health theme in 2022. The committee hopes to provide education and fun in this community event. The hope is to attract a speaker, share an educational video, fun family activities, information about health focused on issues that people of color are susceptible to, and hopefully food. This will be an inclusive event for all!

How does your project promote education, diversity, arts, civic engagement and/or provide entertainment and strengthen the community?

The Juneteenth event is focused on bringing the Wilsonville community together for a few hours of celebration and education!

Education- the event will provide opportunities for community members to learn more about the importance and significance of Juneteenth as well as health issues facing our community – especially people of color.

Family Friendly Fun- the event hopes to offer activities including family friendly games and activities (chalk, games, etc). There will be activities for adults and kids alike and the committee is aiming to be inclusive of people of all ability levels.

Diversity – the event is open to all and will provide information about Juneteenth (commemorating the emancipation of African American slaves). The event is being organized by the Wilsonville Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Committee.

The Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Committee's Mission is "to connect Wilsonville to the diverse perspectives and lived experiences of its people. We advocate for equitable access and opportunity for every community member. We identify barriers to participation and inclusion, and pursue programs, policies, partnerships and ideas that remove those barriers"

The event has three goals; provide education about the importance of Juneteenth, health fair education focused on health issues that people of color are susceptible to, as well as a community-gathering event. Consistent with the DEI committee mission above, are focused on creating a welcoming and inclusive community for all, this event will have the same focus making it a successful event. All are welcome. The committee thinking about how the event is designed to be welcoming and inclusive for all community members.

How are you/your organization suited to produce this project/program? Provide the community resources that will be used if applicable (volunteers, local vendors, local contributions, etc.)

City Staff Liaison to the Committee and the DEI Committee Chair put on a similar event in 2021 on a much smaller scale (speaker, food and small gathering). The City Staff liaison also plans and executes City programs including the pre-pandemic annual Volunteer Appreciation Event, Tree Dedication events, Civics Academy Program as well as administering and completing projects associated with the Wilsonville – Metro Community Enhancement grant.

The Committee will work with staff to ensure that this is a successful event including receiving any possible donations, organizing vendors/ information tables and making sure that there are adequate numbers of people to manage the day of event.

Since the Diversity, Equity and Inclusion committee is new, there is not a funding source for events. There will be staff assistance for event permitting, communications, day of event coordination and grant management.

Wilsonville Community Senior's Inc. will be organizing a trip for 40 seniors (age 55+), to Seaside, Oregon and Fort Clatsop in Astoria, Oregon. The trip will take place in August of 2022. The trip requires the rental of a tour bus to transport all participants to each location. The bus will depart from Wilsonville City Hall at approximately at 8:30 AM to travel to Fort Clatsop as the first destination. The participants will have the opportunity to learn about the Lewis and Clark Expedition and other pertinent Oregon History. After visiting the Fort the bus will take the participants to Seaside Oregon where they will have lunch, spend time on the beach, and have access to other tourist attractions. The bus will depart at approximately 3:00 PM to return to Wilsonville around 5:00 PM.

How does your project promote education, diversity, arts, civic engagement and/or provide entertainment and strengthen the community?

This trip is designed to create interactive educational experience, to learn how the differing communities came together to support each other in trying times. The history of Oregon and our nation is vital to understanding how our systems and history are developed to bring us to modern times. The lunch is a chance for the participants to come together, share a meal, build community connection through conversation. For many seniors this trip is the only opportunity to visit the coast.

What are your organization's goals for this project? And, what population are you aiming to serve? (youth, seniors, families, underprivileged, persons with disabilities, etc..) Using measureable amounts whenever possible, consider the question: How will you know that you succeeded in your goals?

WCSI's goal is to help the senior citizens of Wilsonville experience a fun, social, and educational outdoor experience. WCSI will know we succeed our goal through feedback from the participants on the return trip. Additionally, this will be measured by having a full bus.

Community Opportunity Grant History and Log of Awards

History:

Grant monies are funded by general fund tax dollars collected in Wilsonville. Known as the Community Opportunity Grant Program and handled by the Parks and Recreation Department. The Parks and Recreation Advisory Board serves as the review and award body for these funds.

The City Council established this fund in response to frequent requests for funds directly to the Council. The first funds were released for the 2009/10 fiscal year.

Purpose:

The amount of \$25,000 is designated to be used for events, programs or projects that benefit the community and enhance the quality of life/livability of the community.

Procedure:

- Funds are made available each fiscal year. Funds are separated into two 'opportunities'. All funds must be allocated by June 30 of each year.
 - i. Fall cycle - \$12,500 available in October
 - ii. Spring cycle - \$12,500 available in April
- Applications are competitive with all other applicants for each grant cycle.
- Applicants must be a local Wilsonville organization providing a program or project in the City of Wilsonville or an organization that is bringing a unique event or project to Wilsonville for the benefit of its residents or visitors.
- Applicants are not required to be a registered not-for-profit or tax exempt organization.
- Funds must be used for a specific project or a specific element of a project which is clearly identified in the application.
- Funds will not be awarded for general operating expenses of an organization.
- The written application is the primary means of communicating the project for review.

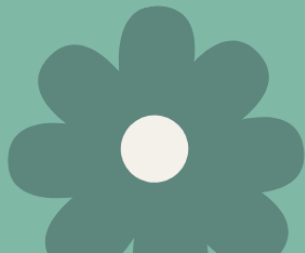

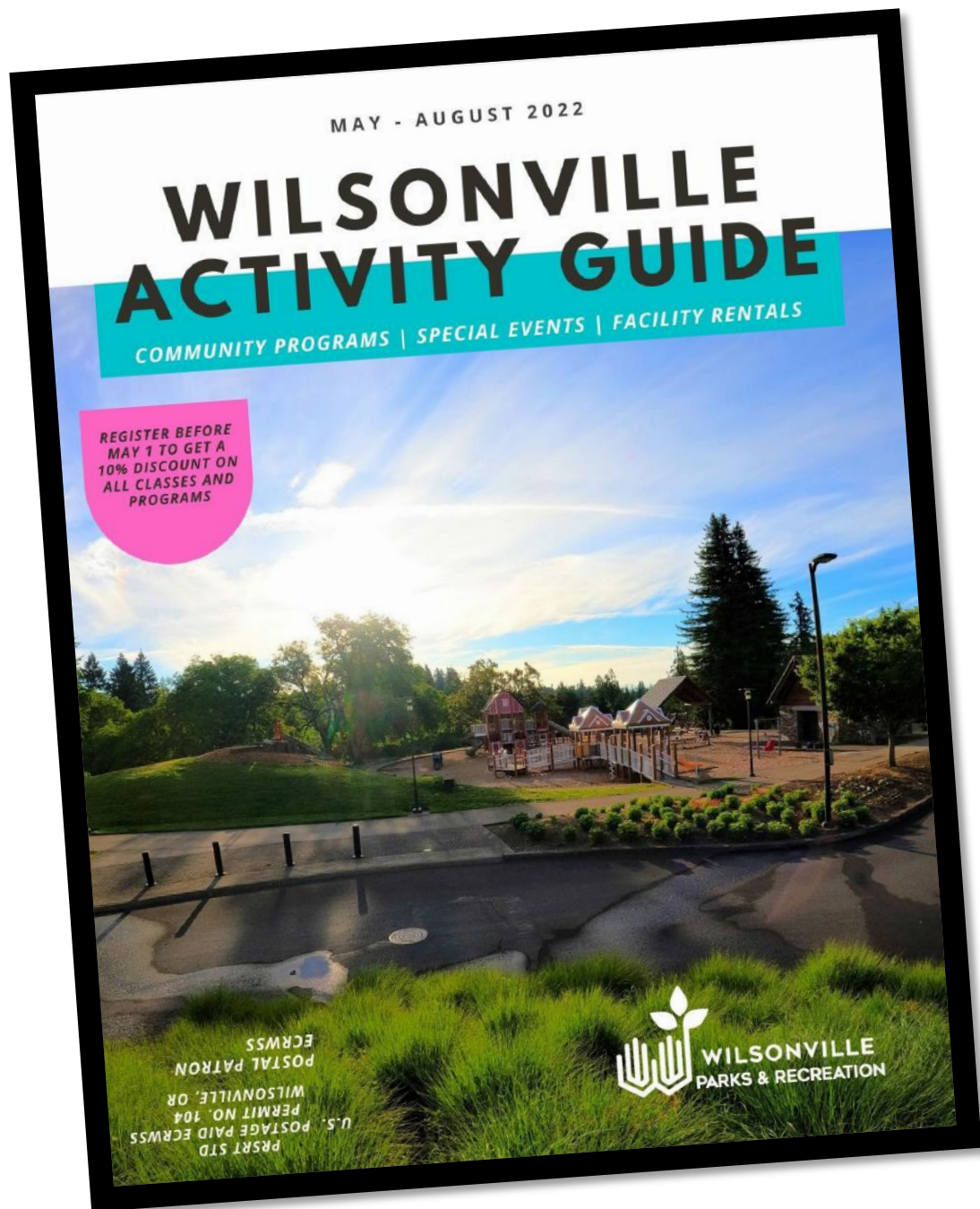
