### City of Woodcreek Drainage Workshop Guidance to Questions and Responses

#### Question(s):

Define "Impactful" Drainage Improvements What are Woodcreek's Wants and Needs? What Do You Want to Accomplish? What Kind of Relief Do You Want to Achieve? Are There Any Unacceptable Impacts?

#### Responses

The responses to these questions help us understand Woodcreek's overall goals for improving drainage. They will define a starting point for drainage master plan.

#### Question:

How Frequently Is Flooding Acceptable?
Annually
Once Every 2-5 Years
Once Every 10 Years
Less Often?

#### Responses

The responses to these questions help us translate your expectations and quantify the magnitude of stormwater we will address in each area of concern. This criteria is very important in terms of cost, benefit and impacts of future projects. Things to consider:

• How frequently are impassable roads acceptable (more than 8" of stormwater)?

#### **Responses:**

The responses to this question helps us focus on the projects that bring the drainage relief the Council seeks. Based on Woodcreek's priorities, we may cull some areas of concern. Things to consider:

- Home flooding causes costly damage and present safety issues.
- Property flooding can cause costly damage but is generally considered more of a nuisance.
- Street access is generally important, especially when it comes to emergency access.

#### **Responses:**

The responses to these questions will help us understand how Woodcreek will make project by project decisions on what gets funded and what does not. We also hope to understand the relative importance of the factors you will consider while making decisions. Things to consider:

- Each potential project will provide a certain amount of public benefit and private benefit. For example, a street culvert project will reduce flooding over a road, resulting in a high degree of public benefit. However, a drainage channel project between a few homes would yield a high private benefit.
- Construction of drainage improvements will likely result in significant Impact to properties, particularly trees. These impacts a very personal.

• Most projects will require permanent and temporary easements for drainage and construction. Acquisition can be challenging, particularly if there is opposition.





**RE: Champions Court Turnaround** 

Dear Mr. Burton:

The City of Woodcreek requested Freeland Turk to assess the emergency vehicle access conditions on Champions Court and determine the feasibility of improving access by constructing a suitable turnaround.

**Existing Conditions** - Champion Court is a 225' long cul-de-sac (approximately 23' wide) intersecting Champions Circle in Woodcreek, Texas. The shape of the cul-de-sac is non-standard and does not follow the circular shape of the 100' diameter right-of-way. Numerous trees exist within the right-of-way, including one inside the paved street. The existing cul-de-sac does not provide an adequate turning area for emergency vehicles and is considered substandard.

**Circular Turnaround Approach** - A sufficient right-of-way exists to construct a standard cul-de-sac providing sufficient access for emergency services vehicles. However, constructing an 80-foot-diameter cul-de-sac will require removing several trees, which would have an undesirable environmental impact on the area. Since there is another available option, we do not recommend this approach.

Hammerhead Turnaround Approach - Sufficient right-of-way exists to construct a "hammerhead" sytle turnaround. This alternative approach will provide emergency service vehicles with adequate access and space to turn. The improvements needed include pavement widening, as shown on the attached exhibit. The location of the pavement widening was selected to minimize the impact on existing trees. We recommend the existing tree located in the pavement be removed to improve safety and facilitate turnaround movements. We recommend paving the turnaround area with Hot Mix Asphalt Concrete.



### THE CITY OF WOODCREEK RESOLUTION NO. 25-03-26

**WHEREAS**, Chapter 36 of the Texas Water Code states groundwater conservation districts may be created "in order to provide for the conservation, preservation, protection, recharging, and prevention of waste of groundwater, and of groundwater reservoirs or their subdivisions, and to control subsidence caused by withdrawal of water from those groundwater reservoirs or their subdivisions, consistent with the objectives of Section 59, Article XVI, Texas Constitution"; and

**WHEREAS**, in order to protect the private property rights of individuals, the Texas Legislature amended Chapter 36 of the Texas Water Code in 2011 by adding language which includes, "the legislature recognizes that a landowner owns the groundwater below the surface of the landowner's land as real property"; and

**WHEREAS**, if aquifers are not reasonably regulated by local groundwater conservation districts, irreparable damage could be done to our natural resources and landowner property rights may be infringed upon by the commercial production of groundwater that results in the malicious drainage of the landowner's real property; and

**WHEREAS**, in order for groundwater conservation districts to properly manage groundwater resources, districts require adequate funding for operations and the gathering of scientific information necessary for sound management strategies; and

**WHEREAS**, the Hays Trinity Groundwater Conservation District's (HTGCD) enabling legislation provided limited funding mechanisms, and

**WHEREAS**, the HTGCD's primary funding mechanism, connection fees, will diminish as permitted water reaches the maximum amount allowed, resulting in little to no funding for the district at a time when groundwater resource management will be of great importance;

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that the City of Woodcreek City Council supports legislation to amend the HTGCD's enabling legislation that gives standard Chapter 36 of the Texas Water Code authority to manage and protect the Trinity Aquifer for the long-term benefit of all of its users; and allow for reasonable production fees.

The meeting at which this Resolution was passed was open to the public, and that public notice of the time, place, and purpose of said meeting was given as required by the Open Meetings act, Texas Government Code, Chapter 551.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

- [(2) assess or collect any fees except as authorized by

#### Section 8843.151 or 8843.152].

SECTION 2. Subchapter D, Chapter 8843, Special District Local Laws Code, is amended by adding Section 8843.1511 to read as follows:

- Sec. 8843.1511. PRODUCTION FEE. (a) The district may assess a production fee as provided by Section 36.205, Water Code.
- (b) A fee assessed under this section may not exceed the greater of:
- (1) 38 cents per 1,000 gallons of groundwater withdrawn; or
- (2) the raw surface water cost of other wholesale water suppliers providing water to customers in the district.
- (c) The district may use revenues generated by fees assessed under this section for any lawful purpose.
  - (d) This section does not apply to:

S.B. No. 2660

- (1) a well used exclusively for an agricultural use, as defined by Section 36.001, Water Code; or
  - (2) a well that is exempt under district rules.

SECTION 3. The following provisions of Chapter 8843, Special District Local Laws Code, are repealed:

- (1) Section 8843.055;
- (2) Section 8843.057;
- (3) Section 8843.103;
- (4) Section 8843.104;
- (5) Section 8843.105;
- (6) Section 8843.106; and
- (7) Section 8843.154.

SECTION 4. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this

 $$\rm S.B.\ No.\ 2660$  Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this Act takes effect September 1, 2025.
