Current Generation

- Currently we have 5 Generators that are capable of supplying power to the town.
- These generators are capable of producing 11.8 MW at full load
- At our current configuration the power plant can only supply 8 MW of power.
- The town during cold snaps in the winter is capable of drawing up to 10 MW of power.

Transformer configuration

- We have four 2 MW transformers that step the power coming from the Power Plant to the town. This is our weak point.
- Originally we were going to upgrade the transformers from 2 MW to 3 MW and even bought transformers to do this.
- The problem we encountered was the wire coming from the switching gear inside the Power Plant to the Transformers. In order to be capable of actually producing 3 MW from the switch gear to the transformer we would of needed to upgrade the wire from 500 mcm to 1000 mcm which is not only very expensive but very large and heavy in order to replace it we would have to hire contractors to install it.

Current plans to Upgrade

- The work around. In order to avoid all of this addition cost and head ache Wrangell Light and Power with the help of EPS (Electrical Power Solutions) came up with a new plan.
- Currently we are going to make Unit #1 a standalone unit. This will separate this
 Unit from our current Switch Gear and have its own transformer. Fortunately we
 have a 3 MW transformer on had due to failed Plans.
- By doing this we will not only solve the problem of over loading our current transformers but bring our 8 MW of power generation to 10.8 MW and possibly 11 MW with a brief 10% overload which this engine is rated to do for short periods.

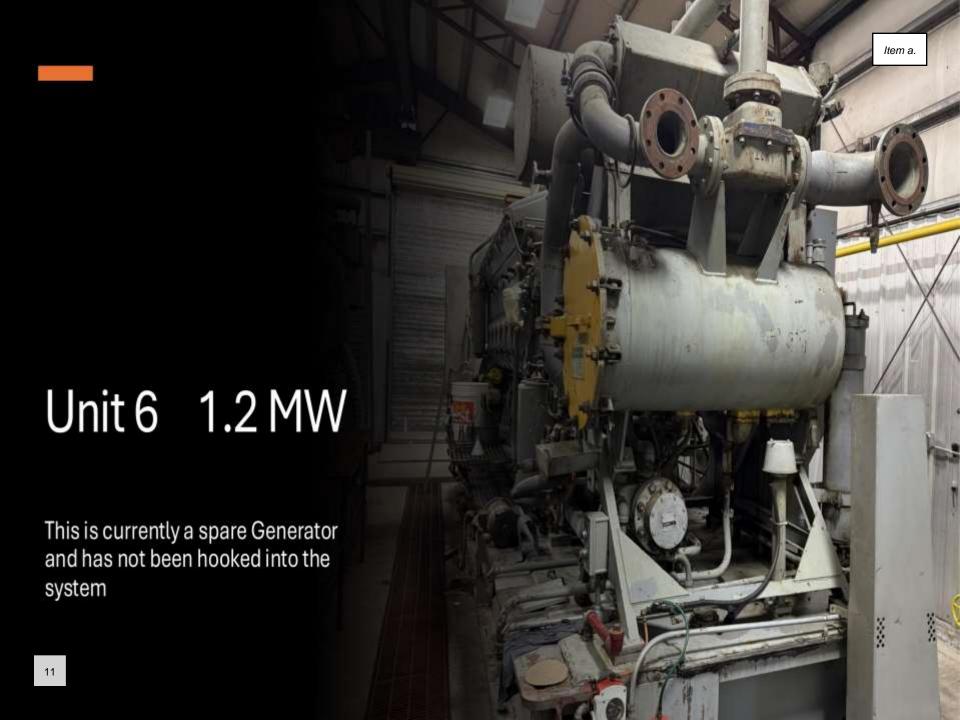

Electrical Feeder Locations

- Feeder 1 feeds Case Ave cuts up to to Church street continues down Second street splits and feeds Crittenden Ave and continues down Evergreen Ave and Airport Loop Road splits off to Spur road feeds the Industrial Lot and ends at Drive Through Brew.
- Feeder 2 Is the upper circuit on Case Ave where Feeder 1 splits up Church street Feeder 2 begins to feed Case Ave.
 Feeder 2 feeds Shakes street and all of downtown including the ship yard and ends at the ferry terminal.
- Feeder 3 feeds the north half of Panhandle continues up Zimovia Hwy feeding the hospital and Water Plant, everything up Pine street continues down Zimovia goes up Bennet Street feeds all of "Snob Hill" and 1st and 2nd Ave East Ending at Drive Through Brew.
- Feeder 4 feeds Peninsula and Ocean View the Southern half of Panhandle and continues south on Zimovia Hwy and feeds everything out the road.

PROCLAMATION Honoring the 2025 Wrangell High School Cross Country Teams



WHEREAS, the Wrangell High School Cross Country program has once again distinguished itself through outstanding athletic achievement, teamwork, and sportsmanship during the 2025 season; and

WHEREAS, under the leadership of Senior Boomchain Loucks and Freshman Jenna Meissner, both of whom remained undefeated across all divisions in Southeast Alaska, the Wrangell Wolves achieved historic milestones that will long be remembered; and

WHEREAS, for the first time in school history, both the boys and girls teams captured regional championships, marking the boys' fourth consecutive regional title and the girls' first regional title since 2014; and

WHEREAS, both Boomchain Loucks and Jenna Meissner claimed the individual regional titles, with Boomchain also breaking his own school record and setting a new Wrangell best of 16 minutes, 8 seconds during the regular season; and

WHEREAS, the Wrangell girls team went on to earn the first State Championship in school history for any girls program, with Jenna Meissner winning the individual State title and teammates Bella Ritchie and Alana Harrison placing 5th and 6th respectively out of a field of nearly 80 competitors; and

WHEREAS, the Wrangell boys team delivered a remarkable performance, finishing as State runner-up by just four points, demonstrating the depth and determination of the program; and

WHEREAS, the City and Borough of Wrangell especially commends the team's four graduating seniors—Boomchain Loucks, Jackson Powers, Ian Nelson, and Ben Houser—for their leadership, perseverance, and contributions in building a culture of excellence that has elevated Wrangell Cross Country to statewide prominence; and

WHEREAS, during their time in the program, these seniors have contributed to an unprecedented record of three State team titles, four State individual titles, five regional team titles, and five individual regional titles, making Wrangell Cross Country the winningest athletic program in school history; and

WHEREAS, the members of the 2025 State teams—Jenna Meissner, Bella Ritchie, Alana Harrison, Boomchain Loucks, Jackson Carney, Ian Nelson, Jackson Powers, Ryder Ritchie, Carter Howell, and Ben Houser—have represented Wrangell with distinction through their discipline, teamwork, and pride in their community; and

WHEREAS, this historic girls' State Championship stands as a tribute to all the Wrangell women who have competed before them, paving the way for future generations of student-athletes and cementing this team's place in Wrangell history as one of the greatest of all time; and

WHEREAS, Jenna Meissner and Boomchain Loucks were further recognized for their outstanding achievements as Athletes of the Week on October 13, 2025, reflecting not only their athletic excellence but also their character and leadership;

Proclamation

RECOGNIZING THE SOVEREIGN NATION STATUS OF THE WRANGELL COOPERATIVE ASSOCIATION AND CELEBRATING ITS PROFOUND CONTRIBUTIONS TO OUR COMMUNITY

WHEREAS, November is observed both Federally as Native American Indian Heritage Month and by the State of Alaska as Alaska Native Heritage Month; and

WHEREAS, the Wrangell Cooperative Association (WCA) is a federally recognized Tribe within our community, and the Assembly of the City and Borough of Wrangell, Alaska, desires to declare and reinforce formal recognition of the WCA as a Sovereign Tribal Government; and

WHEREAS, WCA promotes and maintains a vibrant culture and tradition, holding a deeply rooted sense of community with the mission to support the cultural, ceremonial, and subsistence lifestyle for all Alaskans, and to promote the safe use and availability of a healthy environment for present and future generations; and

WHEREAS, the Assembly of the City and Borough of Wrangell, Alaska, values and endorses a strong, effective, and honorable government-to-government relationship with WCA, and extends a warm welcome to WCA's new Tribal Administrator, Albert Rinehart; and

WHEREAS, in the area of Community Response and Social Wellness, WCA has been an indispensable partner, most recently in the landslide aftermath, by:

- Securing the country's first tribal-managed crisis counseling program, which was approved and funded by FEMA and SAMHSA; and
- Providing a team of therapists, emotional support dogs, and funding the Bouncing Back Program; and
- Sponsoring diverse community outreach efforts, including concerts and training by Team Hollywood and Krizz Kaliko, as well as hiring retired NBA champion Chucky Brown for student programming and a threeon-three tournament; and
- Playing a key role in securing a \$150,000 Native American Library Services Enhancement Grant for Wrangell's Library to provide academic tutoring and after-school programming for local youth; and
- Coordinating with the Central Council of Tlingit & Haida to expand our Head Start program and licensed child care services, thereby creating additional employment opportunities for our community; and

WHEREAS, in the area of Cultural Preservation and Historic Reconciliation, WCA has demonstrated powerful leadership by:

- Initiating the first totem carving replication project in 37 years—a \$520,000 endeavor that revitalizes Tlingit culture, strengthens community connections, and provides hands-on training for master carvers and apprentices with the goal of teaching our youth to once again read our totems; and
- Conducting a processional walk to retrace the steps of Shx'atoo and securing a formal apology from the U.S. Army for the 1869 bombardment of the Tlingit village **Kaachxaana.áak'w**; and
- Participating in the lighting ceremony of The Capitol Christmas Tree in Washington, D.C. by designing the tree emblem, performing a traditional welcome and paddle song, and formally blessing the tree; and
- Endorsing and financially supporting the new access route to the Mount Dewey Trail and offering the culturally meaningful name of **Sháchk Kináa Deiyí** (Path Over the Muskeg) for the new trail; and

WHEREAS, in the area of Environmental Stewardship and Public Health, WCA's Earth Branch and other initiatives have provided critical service by:

- Taking over the management of the 39-acre Garnet Ledge property, a historic reservation for the children of Wrangell; and
- Organizing a two-day e-waste drive to properly dispose of electronics and prevent the contamination of Wrangell's soil and groundwater; and
- Conducting numerous environmental projects, including stream temperature monitoring, community
 composting, and providing care and insight for Petroglyph Beach, one of Wrangell's most visited historic sites;
 and

WHEREAS, WCA was rightly named "Organization of the Year" by the Wrangell Chamber of Commerce for its collective visionary leadership, innovative approaches, and steadfast dedication, representing millions of dollars in contributions to the City and her citizens over the years.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, PATRICIA GILBERT, MAYOR FOR THE CITY AND BOROUGH OF WRANGELL, ALASKA, DO HEREBY PROCLAIM NOVEMBER 2025 AS:

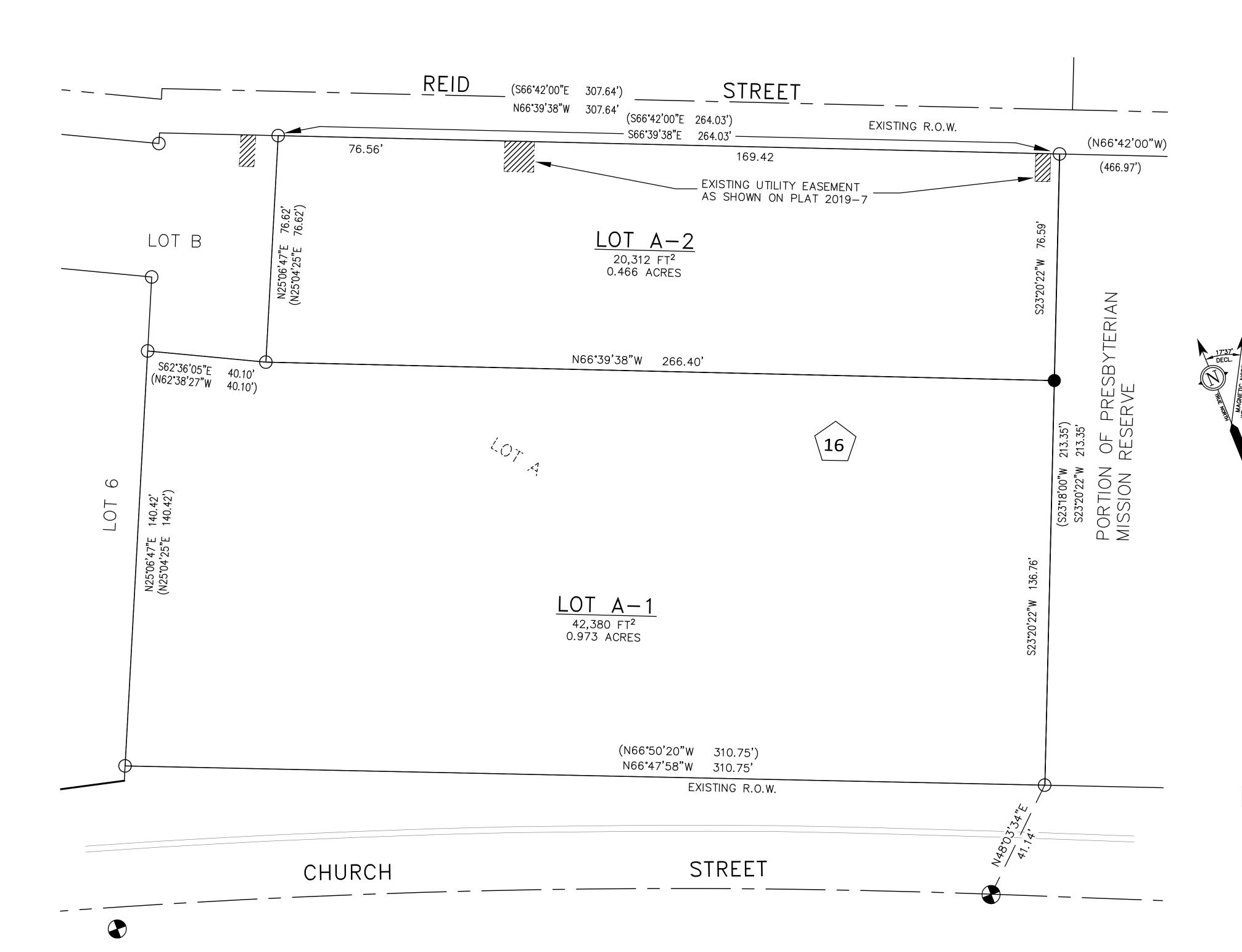

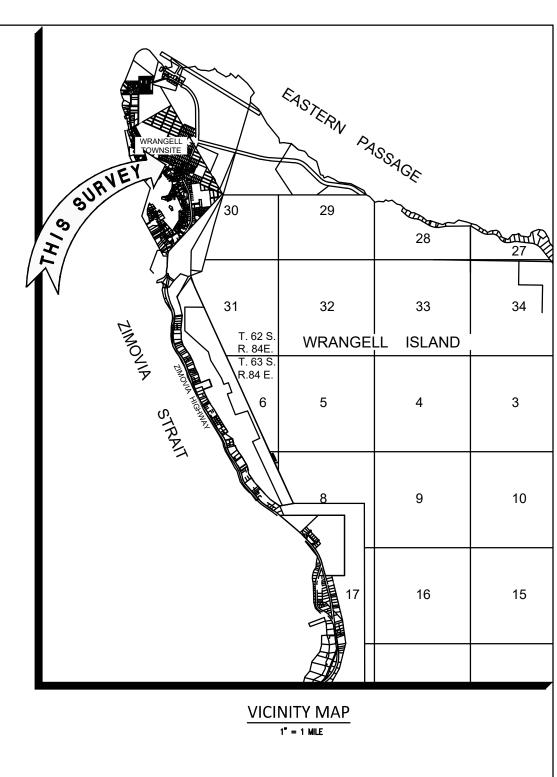

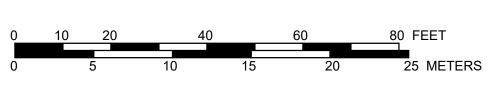
TYPICAL SECONDARY MONUMENT

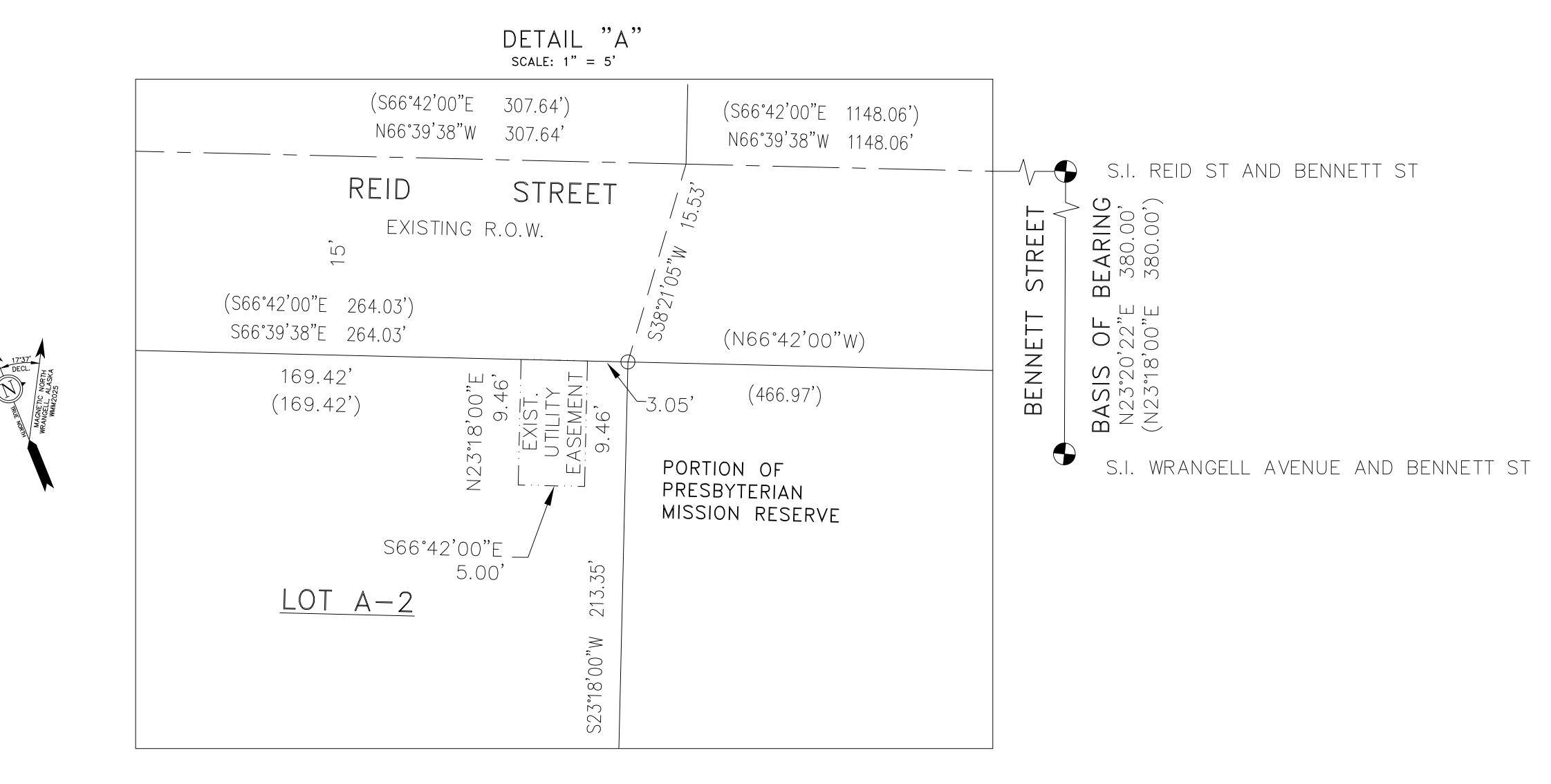

- Reliance finger repairs as needed.

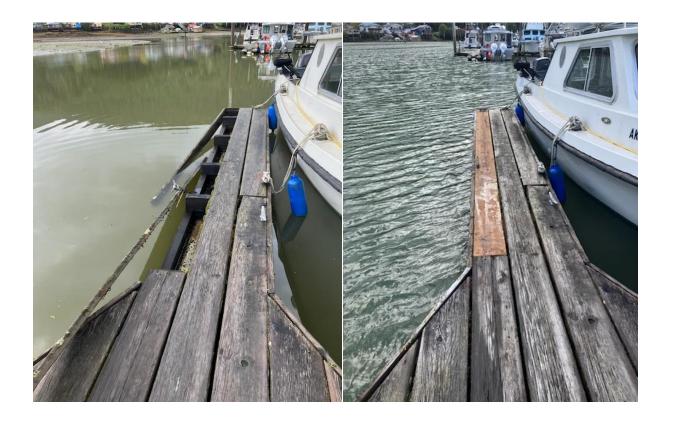
Summary

We're maintaining a strong focus on safety, vessel protection, and the long-term sustainability of our harbor facilities. Routine maintenance keeps day-to-day operations running smoothly, while our larger projects aim to deliver lasting upgrades. With most summer work now wrapped up, staff are concentrating efforts on the Reliance Pier and preparing for winter operations.

With moose season here we've got staff out on PTO. We had to move people around to cover at the Marine Service Center so it keeps running, so a few projects are moving slower than we'd like. Everyone is still keeping busy and getting the work done.

PORT:

The 2025 cruise ship season has officially ended. The final vessel, the ACL *American Constellation*, departed Wrangell on September 23. We are pleased to have wrapped up another successful season and can now turn our focus to planning for 2026, which is expected to be even busier.

Seasonal floats have been removed and winterized, and jet boat tour operations at the City Dock have concluded for the year. Harbor staff are now shifting priorities toward fall and winter facility preparations. Planning efforts with American Cruise Lines continue to move forward. Preliminary concepts for waterfront development are expected in November, possibly sooner. We have established a strong working relationship with ACL since the spring and will continue collaborating as project ideas take shape. Public meetings will be scheduled in the months ahead to provide updates and gather input from the community.

Negotiations are still ongoing regarding the move of the barge lines out to the 6.5-mile mill industrial site. Hopefully, I will have more to report on this in the near future.

I'm still looking into the details for individual spaces to rent out at the cul-de-sac by City Dock. There are a lot of moving parts with this, and I've noticed other communities are doing something along the same lines, just on a bigger scale. I've checked on what comparable spaces are renting for around here, so we'll likely be starting our bidding for these spots right in that range.

Meyers Chuck Update

The Meyers Chuck float replacement project remains on track and is expected to be complete by the second week of October. There have been a few minor weather delays and small holdups in product delivery, such as the safety ladders, but overall the project continues to progress well. Final completion and demobilization are anticipated shortly after these remaining items are addressed. The project is still well under budget.









Harbor Office

The new Wrangell Harbors and Marine Service Center website is now nearly complete. The site will provide online access to moorage applications, haul-out request forms, vendor listings, resource links, and an online payment option. Kate Thomas will be giving a presentation of the website at our October meeting and once launched it will mark a major step forward in modernizing customer service and reducing paperwork.

We are also still working on options for Title 14 enforcement regarding inactive vessels. This continues to be a priority as we look for the best way to ensure fair use of harbor stalls and keep space available for active, seaworthy vessels.

I will be attending the Alaska Association of Harbormasters and Port Administrators (AAHPA) annual conference in Juneau later this month. AAHPA is a statewide organization that brings together harbor and port professionals from across Alaska to share knowledge, discuss challenges, and work on solutions that improve operations and infrastructure for our coastal communities. The conference provides training opportunities, networking with other harbormasters and port directors, and a chance to learn about new technologies and funding opportunities that support harbor development and long-term sustainability. In addition, AAHPA awards scholarships each year to Alaska students pursuing marine-related trades and careers, typically ranging from \$1,000 to \$2,500, helping encourage the next generation of maritime professionals.

Association of Rural and Small Libraries Conference:

In September, I attended the Association for Rural and Small Libraries Conference in Albuquerque, New Mexico. The conference brought together library staff from across the country who serve small and rural communities to share ideas, resources, and inspiration. Sessions focused on creative and practical ways to make libraries welcoming daily destinations for all ages, strengthen community partnerships, and expand access to learning opportunities. The ideas and connections gained through ARSL will directly inform our upcoming programs and community initiatives.

IMLS Native American Library Services Enhancement Grant:

Shortly after returning from the conference, the Irene Ingle Public Library was awarded the IMLS Native American Library Services Enhancement Grant for \$150,000. This funding will support a part-time Library Programming Coordinator position for two years, after-school tutoring for high school students, guest speakers and authors, an eSports program, a youth book club, and other community-based initiatives. The grant will allow the library to strengthen partnerships, broaden access, and enhance the overall quality of life for Wrangell residents through expanded opportunities for learning, creativity, and connection.

Programming: Our fall programming season began in mid-September and is off to a strong start.

Wrangell Kids Club continues to see excellent participation, with 128 attendees at the library over just four sessions. Across all three departments, total attendance over the first four weeks reached an impressive 295 participants. New program materials funded by the Walker Foundation have greatly enhanced activities and engagement this season.

Toddler Story Time remains a beloved Friday morning tradition. Each Friday at 10:00 a.m., toddlers and their caregivers gather for stories, songs, crafts, playtime, and a snack to finish off the morning. So far this season, we've explored themes like Fall, Berries, and Froggie Friends—complete with special salamander guests from the Water Treatment Plant (thank you to Andrew Scambler!).

This fall we also launched a brand-new program, **Wrangell Littles Music Class at the Library**. We're so grateful to community member Kimberly Ottesen for leading this effort. Our first session had an enthusiastic turnout of 22 participants!

The **Wrangell Book Club** continues to meet monthly. This month's selection, *Moloka'i* by Alan Brennert, is a richly imagined novel set in Hawai'i more than a century ago—an epic story of a little-known time and place and a deeply moving testament to the resiliency of the human spirit.

A big thank-you goes to Mary Fredricks for hosting **Craft Mornings**. In September, participants learned to make book vases from recycled books. The next session, scheduled for November 15, Mary will teach participants how to make turkeys by folding recycled book pages.

With the addition of a new Programming Coordinator, we're excited to continue expanding and enhancing our offerings for all ages.

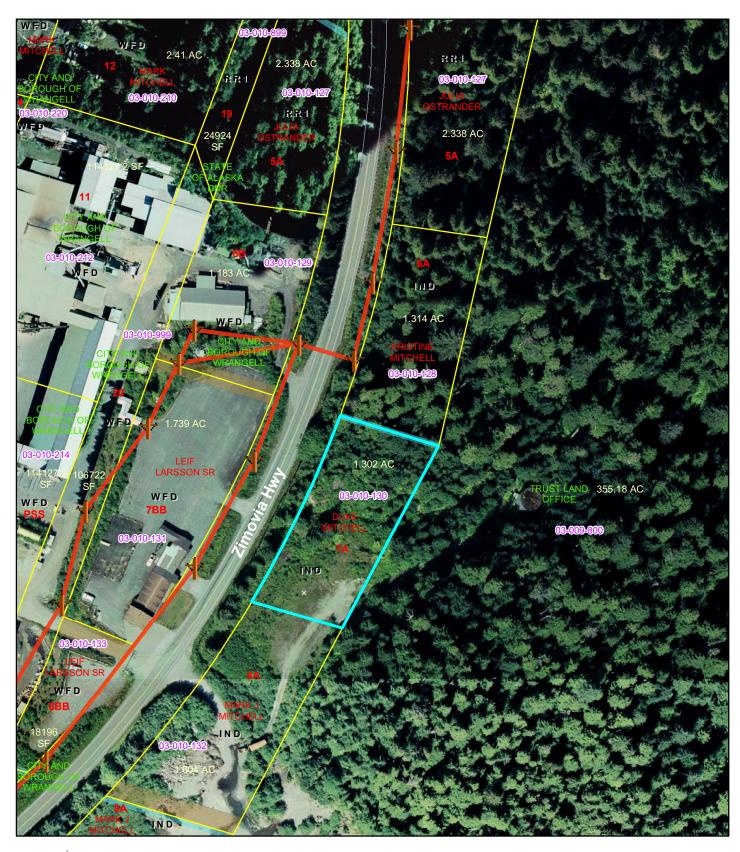

Introduction

Duke Mitchell has submitted a petition to rezone Lot 7A of the Mitchell-Buhler Replat, according to Plat No. 2015-3, from Industrial Development (I) to Rural Residential 1 (RR-1).

The 1.302-acre parcel is located adjacent to existing RR-1 land (north), across from the Former Mill Property, a large, multi-use waterfront development and industrial site, and in proximity to Alaska Mental Health Trust Land Office (TLO) property zoned Timber Management (TM).

Land immediately south of the parcel is zoned Industrial Development and provides access to TLO property, including an active rock pit. This industrial access corridor further separates the subject lot from the primary industrial waterfront uses to the west.

This petition is considered under WMC 20.76 - Amendments, which governs changes to the zoning map.

Background and Findings of Fact

Parcel Information

• Lot 7A, Mitchell-Buhler Replat, Plat No. 2015-3

- 1.302 acres
- Privately owned by Duke Mitchell

Location & Context

- North: Rural Residential 1 residential properties
- South: Industrial Development access to TLO rock pit
- East: Timber Management TLO managed lands
- West (across road): Waterfront Development/Industrial Former Mill Property, owned by CBW.

Existing Conditions

- The subject property is currently zoned Industrial Development and is adjacent to both residential and industrial uses.
- The property is being developed for residential purposes, but this use is not permitted in the current zoning district.
- The Borough's Future Growth Map designates adjacent lands to the north as residential, while preserving industrial areas as complementary to the Waterfront Development district.
- Borough water and sewer terminate north of the property; connections are not required if the property is beyond 200 feet from the municipal service. Electrical service is available.
- Approval of the rezoning would reduce the Borough's limited industrial land inventory but would not create adverse impacts for adjacent property owners.

Public Interest and Policy Considerations

Rezoning to RR-1 would bring the property into conformance with its intended residential use, provide an additional residentially zoned parcel, and remove the zoning barrier to completing development. The change would reduce industrial land inventory by one lot, but this reduction is not anticipated to negatively affect long-term industrial development capacity, given the supply of other water-dependent industrial properties nearby.

Staff Analysis

This request presents a discretionary land use decision in which either zoning designation could be justified based on existing conditions. The surrounding area already reflects a mix of residential and industrial uses, and a change to Rural Residential 1 would not substantially improve land use compatibility. From a long-range land management perspective, retaining the Industrial Development zoning may offer greater strategic value by preserving limited industrial land inventory adjacent to the Borough's large multi-use waterfront industrial complex immediately across Zimovia Highway. Maintaining industrial zoning in this location supports clustering of compatible economic activities and avoids further fragmentation of industrial lands.

At the same time, the proposed zoning amendment is not inconsistent with the Comprehensive Plan and would not create adverse impacts for adjacent property owners, given the similar mix of uses in the vicinity. The most notable potential impact would be on the applicants, as the industrial character of the waterfront complex is likely to remain and could intensify in the future through a variety of uses permitted in that district.

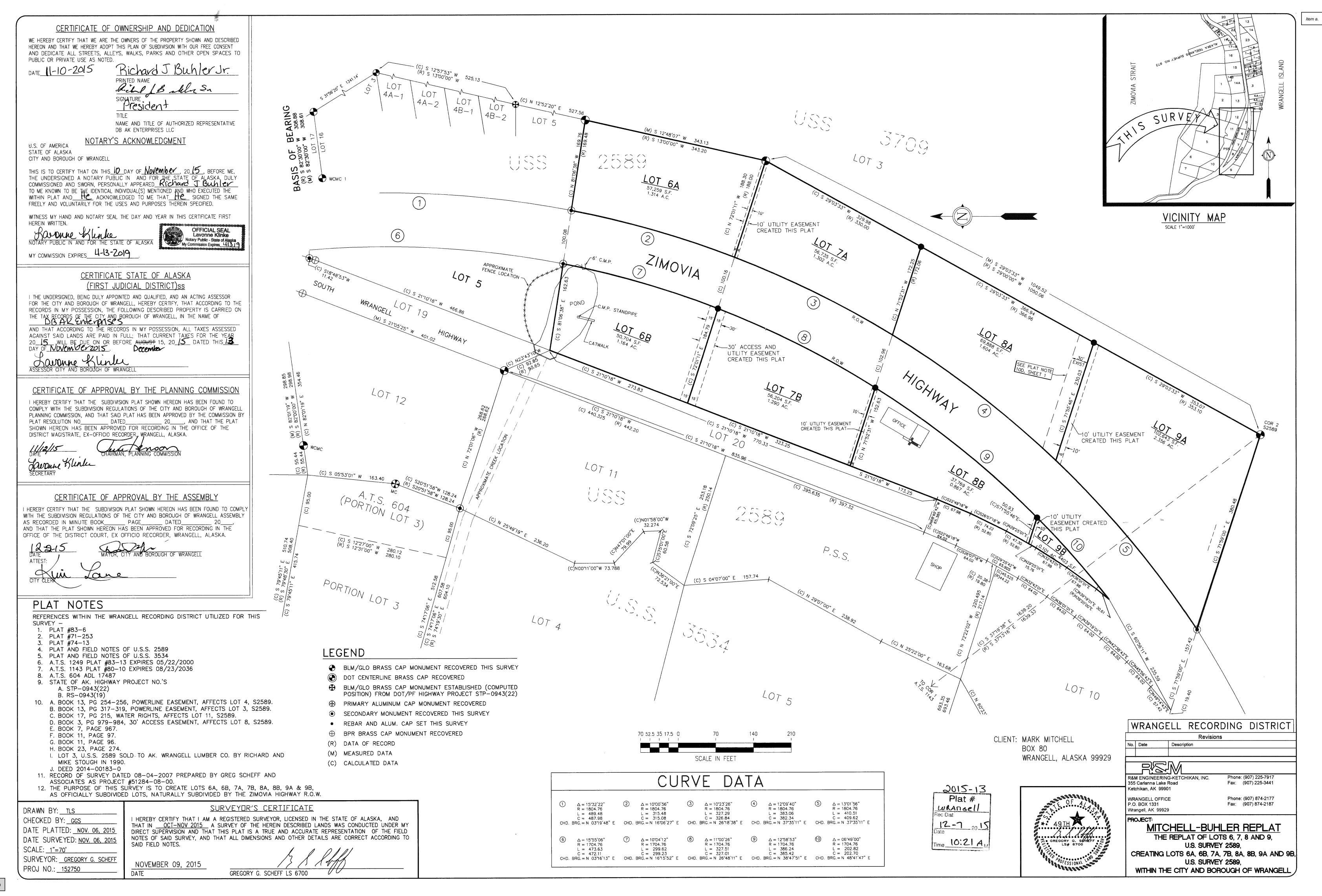

While the property lies near industrial waterfront lands, rezoning to RR-1 would align with its current and intended residential use, improve consistency with adjacent residential properties, and would not negatively impact neighboring landowners.

Following review of the findings of fact, the Commission voted to recommend approval of the rezoning request.

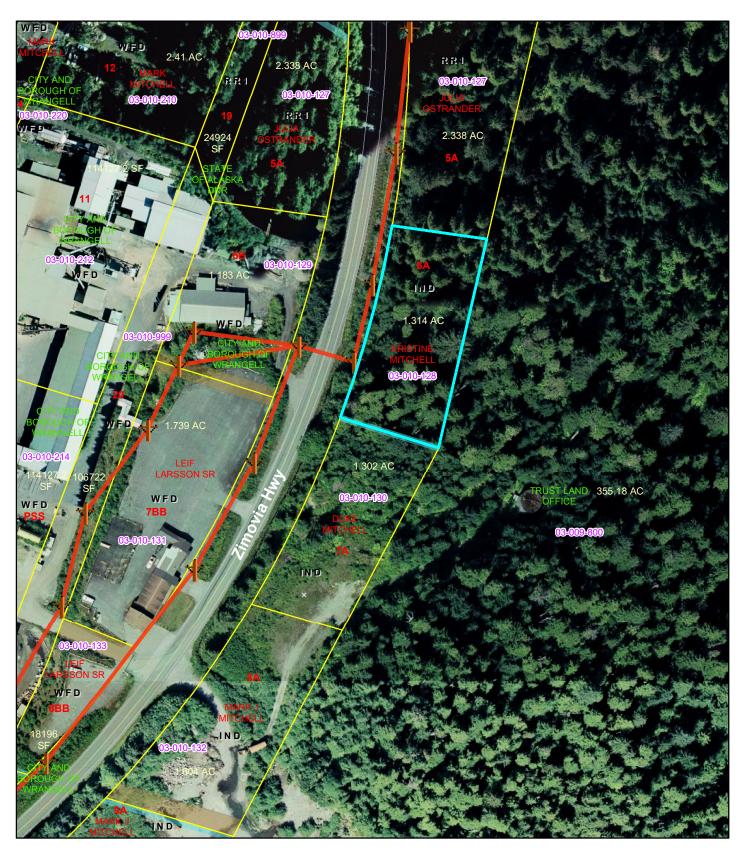

Subject: (PH) Petition to amend the zoning designation for Lot 6A of the Mitchell-Buhler Replat, according to Plat No. 2015-13, Zoned Industrial, changing the zone to Rural Residential 1, owned and requested by Kristine Mitchell and Michael Chesna.

Introduction

Kristine Mitchell and Michael Chesna have submitted a petition to rezone Lot 6A of the Mitchell-Buhler Replat, according to Plat No. 2015-3, from Industrial Development (I) to Rural Residential 1 (RR-1).

The 1.314-acre parcel is located adjacent to existing RR-1 land (north), across from the Former Mill Property, a large, multi-use waterfront development and industrial site, and in proximity to Alaska Mental Health Trust Land Office (TLO) property zoned Timber Management (TM).

Land immediately south of the parcel is zoned Industrial Development and provides access to the TLO property, including an active rock pit. This industrial access corridor further separates the subject lot from the primary industrial waterfront uses to the west.

This petition is considered under WMC 20.76 - Amendments, which governs changes to the zoning map.

Background and Findings of Fact

Parcel Information

- Lot 6A, Mitchell-Buhler Replat, Plat No. 2015-3
- 1.314 acres
- Privately owned by Kristine Mitchell and Michael Chesna

Location & Context

- North: Rural Residential 1 residential properties
- South: Industrial Development access to TLO rock pit
- East: Timber Management TLO managed lands
- West (across road): Waterfront Development/Industrial Former Mill Property, owned by CBW.

Existing Conditions

- The subject property is currently zoned Industrial Development and is adjacent to both residential and industrial uses.
- The property is being developed for residential purposes, but this use is not permitted in the current zoning district.
- The Borough's Future Growth Map designates adjacent lands to the north as residential, while preserving industrial areas as complementary to the Waterfront Development district.
- Borough water and sewer terminate north of the property; connections are not required if the property is beyond 200 feet from the municipal service. Electrical service is available.
- Approval of the rezoning would reduce the Borough's limited industrial land inventory but would not create adverse impacts for adjacent property owners.

Public Interest and Policy Considerations

Rezoning to RR-1 would bring the property into conformance with its intended residential use, provide an additional residentially zoned parcel, and remove the zoning barrier to completing development. The change would reduce industrial land inventory by one lot, but this reduction is not anticipated to negatively affect long-term industrial development capacity, given the supply of other water-dependent industrial properties nearby.

Staff Analysis

This request presents a discretionary land use decision in which either zoning designation could be justified based on existing conditions. The surrounding area already reflects a mix of residential and industrial uses, and a change to Rural Residential 1 would not substantially improve land use compatibility. From a long-range land management perspective, retaining the Industrial Development zoning may offer greater strategic value by preserving limited industrial land inventory adjacent to the Borough's large multi-use waterfront industrial complex immediately across Zimovia Highway. Maintaining industrial zoning in this location supports clustering of compatible economic activities and avoids further fragmentation of industrial lands.

At the same time, the proposed zoning amendment is not inconsistent with the Comprehensive Plan and would not create adverse impacts for adjacent property owners, given the similar mix of uses in the vicinity. The most notable potential impact would be on the applicants, as the

industrial character of the waterfront complex is likely to remain and could intensify in the future through a variety of uses permitted in that district.

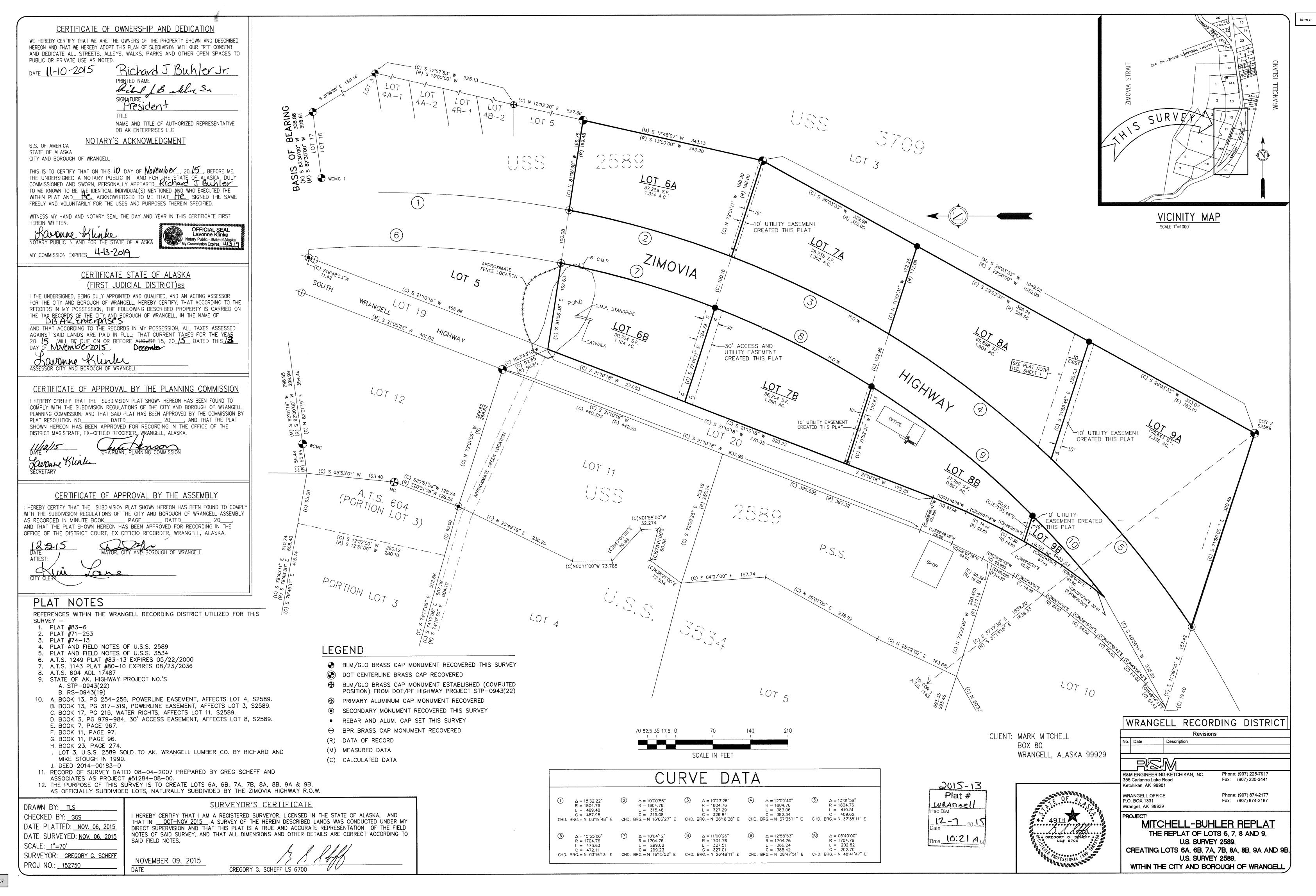
Staff Recommendation:

SUMMARY STATEMENT

Purpose. Ordinance No. 1092 updates and clarifies the Borough's differential tax zones under Chapter 5.04 of the Wrangell Municipal Code. It establishes clear definitions, boundaries, and classifications for Full-Service, Qualified Service, and Out-of-Service Tax Zones, aligning property tax policy with the actual level of Borough services provided across different areas.

Background. While WMC § 5.04.300 authorizes differential taxation zones, the prior code lacked consistent definitions and precise geographic descriptions. This ordinance corrects those deficiencies by:

- Defining each tax zone according to the level of tax-supported services provided.
- Providing legal descriptions of township and range sections to clearly delineate each zone.
- Setting an annual process for Assembly review to ensure the designations remain current.

Key Provisions.

- **Full-Service Tax Zone**: Encompasses Wrangell Island and surrounding areas that receive the full range of Borough services, including police, fire, EMS, public education, road maintenance, parks, and general government administration.
- Qualified Service Tax Zone: Encompasses areas, currently including Meyers Chuck, where the
 Borough provides a limited set of tax-supported services such as unconventional infrastructure
 responsibilities, limited law enforcement support, or partial/seasonal maintenance functions.
 The definition explicitly allows the Assembly to designate additional areas in future years where
 comparable service obligations arise.
- **Out-of-Service Tax Zone**: Covers remote areas of the Borough (such as the Stikine River and Zarembo Island) where the Borough provides minimal services, generally limited to search and rescue and limited law enforcement.

Process and Review. The ordinance amends WMC § 5.04.320 to require the Assembly to review differential tax zones annually alongside the adoption of the mill levy. Zones may be adjusted by ordinance or supplemented with maps or plats adopted by reference.

Impact. Adoption of Ordinance No. 1092 will:

- Improve clarity and transparency for taxpayers.
- Ensure tax classifications reflect the actual level of municipal service delivery.
- Provide the Assembly with a consistent framework for reviewing and modifying differential zones as community needs evolve.

Fiscal Note. There is no direct fiscal impact from adopting this ordinance. The designation of differential tax zones provides the framework for equitable property taxation but does not by itself change mill rates, which are adopted annually.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE ASSEMBLY OF THE CITY AND BOROUGH OF WRANGELL, ALASKA, AMENDING SECTIONS OF CHAPTER 5.04 – PROPERTY TAX, TO DEFINE DIFFERENTIAL TAX ZONES, IN THE WRANGELL MUNICIPAL CODE

- **SEC. 1.** <u>Action</u>. The purpose of this ordinance is to amend Sections 5.04.310 Differential tax zones and 5.04.320 Differential tax zones Adoption Classes Review, in the Wrangell Municipal Code.
- **SEC. 2.** <u>Amendment.</u> Sections 5.04.310 Differential tax zones and 5.04.320 Differential tax zones Adoption Classes Review, are hereby amended in the Wrangell Municipal Code as follows:

5.04.310 Differential tax zones - Defined.

The differential tax zones established by WMC § 5.04.300 shall include the following areas:

A. Sections 27, 28, 29, 34 and 35 of T 62 S, R 84 E; and Sections 1, 2, 11, 12, 13, 14, 24 of T 63 S, R 84 E.

- A. Full-Service Tax Zone The *Full-Service Tax Zone* encompasses all areas of the Borough where the City and Borough of Wrangell provides the full range of municipally-supported services, including but not limited to: police, fire protection, emergency medical response, road maintenance, parks and recreation, general government administration, public education, and library services. Residents and businesses located within this zone are subject to the full Borough sales tax rate and any other applicable municipal taxes, as they directly benefit from the complete set of Borough-funded services. This zone is further defined as follows:
 - 1. Sections 5, 6, 7, 8, 17, 19, 20, 29, 30, and 31 of Township 63 South, Range 84 East; Sections 5, 6, 8, 17, 18, 19, 20, and 30 of Township 64 South, Range 84 East; Sections 19, 20, 29, 30, and 31 of Township 62 South, Range 84 East; and Sections 1, 13, 24, 25, and 36 of Township 62 South, Range 83 East, generally described as Wrangell Island excluding portions of Wrangell Island East.
- B. Qualified Service Tax Zone The *Qualified Service Tax Zone* includes areas within the Borough where the City and Borough of Wrangell provides a limited set of municipally-supported services. These may include partial or seasonal road maintenance, limited public safety support, or other unconventional infrastructure responsibilities. This designation recognizes areas where the Borough has some service obligations, but not the comprehensive responsibilities present in the Full-Service Zone. This zone is further defined as follows:
 - 1. Sections 4, 5, 8, and 9 of Township 71 South, Range 86 East, generally described as the Meyers Chuck area.

- C. Out-of-Service Tax Zone The Out-of-Service Tax Zone applies to areas within the Borough boundaries where the City and Borough of Wrangell provides minimal municipally supported services. These areas generally do not receive road maintenance, public education support, or comprehensive public safety coverage, but may have access to search and rescue services and limited law enforcement support. This designation identifies areas where the Borough carries very limited responsibility for infrastructure or service delivery. This zone is further defined as follows:
 - 1. All property within the Borough not otherwise identified in WMC 5.04.310(A) or 5.04.310(B), generally described as including the Stikine River, Earl West, Wrangell Island East, Crittenden Creek, Mill Creek, Zarembo Island, Olive Cove, Sunny Bay, and Thoms Place areas.

5.04.320 Differential tax zones – Adoption – Classes – Review.

- A. On or before the second meeting in May March 20th of each year, the assembly shall may review and enact, if necessary, an ordinance establishing differential taxation zones for that tax year in addition to those or amending those currently defined in WMC § 5.04.310. The assembly shall review and approve, by resolution, the established differential tax zones along with the annual mill levy, no later than June 15 of each year. The establishment of additional differential taxation zones may be accomplished by adopting a map or plat by reference with appropriate designations in lieu of descriptions. The applicable taxation zones shall be designated on each taxpayer's assessment notice.
- B. At the time of annual review and adoption, if necessary, of additional differential tax zones as provided in subsection (A) of this section, the assembly shall also review the percentage of mill rate applicable to existing differential tax zone or zones and adopt any modification by ordinance defining such tax zone or zones or the applicable differential rate.
- **SEC. 3.** <u>Classification.</u> This ordinance is of a permanent nature and shall be codified in the Wrangell Municipal Code.
 - **SEC. 4.** <u>Effective Date</u>. This ordinance shall be effective upon adoption.

§ 5.04.300. Differential tax zones – Established. (Ord. 830 § 1, 2008)

A differential tax zone is hereby established for the purpose of levying property taxes at a different rate in the area or areas defined in WMC § 5.04.310. The applicable tax zone shall be designated on each taxpayer's assessment notice.

§ 5.04.310. Differential tax zones – Defined. (Ord. 830 § 1, 2008)

The differential tax zone established by WMC § 5.04.300 shall include the following areas:

A. Sections 27, 28, 29, 34 and 35 of T 62 S, R 84 E; and Sections 1, 2, 11, 12, 13, 14, 24 of T 63 S, R 84 E.

§ 5.04.320. Differential tax zones – Adoption – Classes – Review. (Ord. 830 § 1, 2008)

- A. On or before March 20th of each year, the assembly shall review and enact, if necessary, an ordinance establishing differential taxation zones for that tax year in addition to those or amending those currently defined in WMC § 5.04.310. The establishment of additional differential taxation zones may be accomplished by adopting a map or plat by reference with appropriate designations in lieu of descriptions. The applicable taxation zones shall be designated on each taxpayer's assessment notice.
- B. At the time of annual review and adoption, if necessary, of additional differential tax zones as provided in subsection (A) of this section, the assembly shall also review the percentage of mill rate applicable to existing differential tax zone or zones and adopt any modification by ordinance defining such tax zone or zones or the applicable differential rate.

§ 5.04.330. Assembly authority to fix tax rate. (Ord. 830 § 1, 2008; Ord. 703 § 4, 2001; Ord. 441 § 10, 1982; Ord. 420 § 8, 1981)

- A. The assembly shall fix a rate of tax levy and designate the number of mills upon each dollar of value assessed taxable real property that shall be levied in accordance with the provisions of WMC § 5.04.010.
- B. In setting the tax rate for the differential tax zone or zones defined by WMC § 5.04.310, the assembly may take into account the different levels of services provided to the tax zone or zones defined by WMC § 5.04.310 and set a different rate of levy for that zone by providing for a percentage of mill rate applicable to each existing differential tax zone.

REAL ESTATE PURCHASE AND SALE AGREEMENT

This REAL ESTATE PURCHASE AND SALE AGREEMENT (this "<u>Agreement</u>"), dated this 23 day of ______, 2025 ("<u>Effective Date</u>"), is entered into by and between the City and Borough of Wrangell, a Unified Home Rule Borough ("<u>Seller</u>"), having an address at 205 Brueger St., Wrangell, Alaska 99929 and Brett Woodbury, an individual ("<u>Purchaser</u>"). Seller and Purchaser may collectively be referred to herein as the "<u>Parties</u>" and individually as a "<u>Party</u>."

RECITALS

WHEREAS, Seller owns certain unimproved real property located in the community of Wrangell as further described in this Agreement; and

WHEREAS, subject to the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement, Seller desires to sell such real property to Purchaser and Purchaser desires to purchase such real property from Seller.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual agreements, covenants, and provisions set forth herein, and intending to be legally bound hereby, the Parties agree as follows:

AGREEMENT

- Section 1. Sale of the Property. Seller agrees to sell and convey to Purchaser and Purchaser agrees to purchase from Seller, upon the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth, all right, title, and interest of Seller in certain unimproved tidelands property (the "Property"), more specifically described on Exhibit A attached hereto.
- Section 2. Consideration. The consideration paid in exchange for the purchase of the Property shall be the construction by Purchaser of a new parking lot along Reid Street to improve road safety and provide additional parking in the school zone (the "Consideration"). Additionally, Purchaser agrees to haul overburden from another road project to build the pad for the parking lot. If additional rock is needed, Purchaser will supply it and complete the pad to the appropriate grade. The construction of the parking lot shall be completed no later than December 1, 2025, unless otherwise agreed to in writing by the Parties. The Parties agree that the value of the Consideration is equal or greater than the fair market value of the Property.
- Section 3. Storm Drainage Easement Reservation. Seller expressly reserves for itself, its successors and assigns, a perpetual, non-exclusive easement over, under, across, and through that portion of the Property currently occupied by the existing public storm pipe, together with the right of ingress and egress across the Property as reasonably necessary to access, maintain, repair, replace, and operate such facilities. Purchaser acknowledges the existence of the storm drainage pipe on the Property and agrees that Purchaser shall take title to the Property subject to this easement, and that Purchaser shall not interfere with or impair the use, maintenance, repair, replacement, or operation of such storm drain pipe or related facilities. Purchaser shall execute the Utility Reservation and Easement Agreement attached as *Exhibit B* hereto for recording in the Wrangell Recording District.
- Section 4. Real Property Taxes, Assessments, and Adjustments. In addition to the consideration set forth in Section 2, real property taxes accrued against the Property shall be prorated through the date of Closing. Thereafter, Purchaser and its successors and assigns shall be responsible for any and all real property taxes, assessments, and adjustments.
- Section 5. Purchaser's Access. At any time prior to the Closing, and at all times, subject to Section 6, Purchaser, its agents, employees, consultants, inspectors, appraisers, engineers, and contractors (collectively, "Purchaser's Professional Contractors") shall have the right to enter upon and pass through the Property during normal business hours to examine and inspect the same, as well as to conduct reasonable

tests, studies, investigations, and surveys to assess utility availability, soil conditions, environmental conditions, physical condition, and the like of the Property.

- Section 6. Purchaser's Right to Inspect. In conducting the inspections or otherwise accessing the Property, Purchaser shall at all times comply with all laws and regulations of all applicable governmental authorities and maintain insurance in reasonable amounts and provide evidence of same to Seller prior to Purchaser's Professional Contractors' entry onto the Property.
- Section 7. Indemnification of Seller. Purchaser agrees to indemnify and hold Seller harmless from and against Seller's losses, costs, damages, liens, claims, liabilities, or expenses arising, arisen, or to arise out of or referring or relating in any way to Purchaser's and/or Purchaser's Professional Contractors' access to or inspections of the Property.
- **Section 8**. **Seller's Contingencies**. Before this Agreement may be executed and the transactions contemplated in this Agreement may be consummated, the Assembly of the City and Borough of Wrangell must formally approve this Agreement and the transactions contemplated in this Agreement.
- Section 9. Closing Date. The consummation of the sale by Seller and the purchase of the Property by Purchaser (the "Closing") shall be held when the parking lot described in Exhibit A is completed to the satisfaction of the Seller or at such other date as agreed upon in writing by the Parties (the "Closing Date"). There shall be no requirement that Seller and Purchaser physically meet for the Closing unless the Parties hereto mutually agree otherwise.
- **Section 10**. **Seller's Closing Deliverables**. At Closing, Seller shall obtain or execute and deliver or cause to be delivered to Purchaser, the following documents, items, or things, all of which shall be duly executed, acknowledged, and notarized where required by Seller, as appropriate:
 - (a) One (1) original Quit Claim Deed (the "<u>Deed</u>") for recording in the Wrangell Recording District;
 - (b) A copy of the resolution of the members of the Assembly of the City and Borough of Wrangell authorizing this Agreement and the transactions contemplated hereby; and
 - (c) All other documents as may be reasonably requested by Purchaser, to consummate this Agreement and the transactions contemplated by this Agreement.
- **Section 11**. **Purchaser's Closing Deliverables.** At Closing, Purchaser shall obtain or execute and deliver or cause to be delivered to Seller, the following documents, items, or things all of which to be duly executed, acknowledged, and notarized where required by Purchaser, as appropriate:
 - (a) Parking lot construction completed to the satisfaction of the Seller;
 - (b) Executed Utility Reservation and Easement Agreement for recording in the Wrangell Recording District; and
 - (c) All other documents as may be reasonably requested by Seller to consummate the transactions contemplated by this Agreement.
- Section 12. Property Sold "AS IS, WHERE IS, AND WITH ALL FAULTS." Except as expressly set forth in this Agreement to the contrary, Purchaser is expressly purchasing the Property in its existing condition, "AS IS, WHERE IS, AND WITH ALL FAULTS" with respect to all facts,

circumstances, conditions, and defects, and Seller has no obligation to determine or correct any such facts, circumstances, conditions, or defects or to compensate Purchaser for same. Seller has specifically bargained for the assumption by Purchaser of all responsibility to investigate the Property, laws and regulations, rights, facts, leases, service contracts, violations, employees, and all risk of adverse conditions and has structured the Purchase Price and other terms of this Agreement in consideration thereof. Purchaser has undertaken all such investigations of the Property, laws and regulations, rights facts, leases, and violations, as Purchaser deems necessary or appropriate under the circumstances as to the status of the Property and based upon same, Purchaser is and shall be relying strictly and solely upon such inspections and examinations and the advice and counsel of its own consultants, agents, attorneys, and officers. Seller makes no warranty or representation that any proposed development, construction, land use, or activity on the Property by Purchaser or any other party or entity will be authorized or permitted by the City and Borough of Wrangell or any other governmental authority.

Section 14. Environmental Laws/Hazardous Materials. Seller makes no warranty or representation with respect to the presence of Hazardous Materials on, above, or beneath the Property or any parcel in proximity thereto or in any water on or under the Property. Purchaser expressly accepts the risk and assumes any and all liability for the facts, circumstances, conditions, and defects, if any, listed on the Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation, Division of Spill Prevention and Response, Contaminated Sites Database. The Closing hereunder shall be deemed to constitute an express waiver of Purchaser's right to cause Seller to be joined in any action brought under any Environmental Laws.

Section 25. Remedies.

SUMMARY STATEMENT:

The Dispatch/Corrections Officer and Police Seargent positions are being moved on the Non-Union Wage and Grade table to bring them to a competitive pay range. The job descriptions for both positions reflect the new grades. The Police Officer position remains in the same grade the steps in the table are being increased.

The Police Lieutenant job description and position on the Non-Union Wage and Grade table has been removed, since it is not needed.

The following are the recommended adjustments:

Proposed Adjustments by Position:

• **Corrections/Dispatch:** +\$2.00 per hour

• **Police Officer:** +\$2.00 per hour

• **Sergeant:** +\$2.00 per hour

Summary:

The proposed wage adjustments are intended to bring Wrangell's Police Department compensation more in line with comparable Alaska municipalities and support long-term recruitment and retention goals.

Rationale:

A recent FY 2025 municipal salary survey identified that Wrangell's **Corrections/Dispatch** positions are the lowest paid among surveyed communities. The proposed \$2.00/hour increase moves these positions toward the lower-mid range of comparable pay scales while maintaining competitiveness with like-sized municipalities.

For **Police Officer** and **Sergeant** classifications, compensation lags similarly sized departments. A \$2.00/hour increase narrows that market gap and reflects the increased workload being carried by a smaller team. Historically, the department operated with **seven sworn positions**: four officers, one sergeant, one lieutenant, and one chief. Through attrition, staffing has been reduced to **five sworn positions** (three officers, one sergeant, one chief).

Recently, the Borough secured a \$218,160 COPS Hiring Grant to fund an additional officer with a school resource officer (SRO) emphasis—addressing a key community need. With this grantfunded position, and the Borough's commitment to retain it after the grant period, the department

will operate with **six certified officers**, which is considered appropriate for Wrangell's population and service demands.

Fiscal Impact:

The average fully burdened cost of an officer in FY 2026 is **\$120,201**. The estimated total impact of the proposed wage adjustments is **\$45,000-\$55,000**, assuming consistent staffing levels and comparable hours worked.

The Dispatcher/Corrections Officer receives emergency and routine calls and assists with all aspects of corrections. The position performs telephone investigation, preparation of call information, operation of computer terminals, operation of telephone equipment, and includes considerable contact with the general public and other public service agencies. The position also assists with booking, processing, and surveillance of inmates.

Essential Duties and Responsibilities

- Receives telephone calls utilizing complex telephone equipment, listens to callers to accurately ascertain the nature of the call and prioritize information according to standard procedures.
- Maintains accurate records of events, written logs and reports of action taken that may be used in legal proceedings.
- Uses references and resources such as standard policies and procedures, emergency dispatch protocols, maps, phone directories, reverse directories and others to solve questions, determine appropriate action and provide service to the public.
- Adjusts questioning style based upon the nature of the problem, whether the caller is an adult, child, hard-of-hearing, etc., and the emotional state of the caller (angry, hostile, fearful, confused, etc.).
- Enters information in a timely manner at workstation computer terminal while continuing to question and listen to caller.
- Determines appropriate course of action based upon information obtained from the caller. Controls conversations to quickly gather vital information while being courteous and efficient.
- Prepares and serves meal for inmates during their assigned shift.
- Performs all correction duties in the day to day operation of the facility
- Controls access to facilities. Maintains key/equipment control. Inventories materials and

equipment.

SUMMARY STATEMENT:

The Irene Ingle Public Library, in partnership with the Wrangell Cooperative Association, has been awarded a \$150,000 Native American Library Services Enhancement Grant from the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS). This two-year grant will enhance the library's role as an educational and cultural cornerstone for Wrangell.

Project funds will fund the Library Programming Coordinator, a part-time benefited position that will expand the library's capacity to plan, promote, and deliver consistent, high-quality programming for all ages. The coordinator will assist in program development, help manage outreach, and recruit volunteers to assist with activities, ensuring that programs remain vibrant, inclusive, and responsive to community needs.

In addition to continuing the library's current popular programs—such as Toddler Story Time, Wrangell Kids Club, the Winter Reading Program for Grownups, the Summer Reading Program, the annual Bookmark Contest, etc.—this grant will allow us to expand and diversify our offerings. Planned additions include after-school tutoring at Wrangell High School in partnership with Wrangell Public Schools, a Senior Coffee Hour that provides technology and other types of assistance, a year-round youth book club, a youth eSports club, additional weekend family events, and opportunities to host local authors, artists, and expert, as well as bring in guest authors and presenters from outside Wrangell.

The grant will also make it possible to restructure underutilized programs such as Homework Hangout and Bring Your Own Craft Nights to better reflect our community's interests and participation patterns. Together, these enhancements will ensure that the library's programs continue to evolve to meet Wrangell's educational, cultural, and social needs.

Through these initiatives, the Irene Ingle Public Library will continue to strengthen its role as a vital community hub—a place where residents of all ages can learn, create, and connect. This grant represents a significant investment in Wrangell's future, improving educational outcomes, cultural engagement, and lifelong learning opportunities across the community.

RECOMMENDATION MOTION:

Move to Approve Resolution No 10-25-1991.

SUMMARY STATEMENT:

To address the local housing shortage, the Borough is developing a single-family residential subdivision with roads and utilities, known as the Alder Top Village Subdivisions. The Subdivision Phase I, which incorporates 22 of the total 42 residential lots, saw the Subdivision Phase I Site Work project, including engineering design, site and roadway development, and archaeological ground disturbance monitoring completed in early 2024. The Subdivision Phase I Roadway and Utilities project is under construction during Summer/Fall 2025.

In Spring 2025, the City and Borough of Wrangell (Borough) applied for a Denali Commission grant to supplement local funding the Alder Top Village Subdivision - Phase I Roadway and Utilities project. The Denali Commission grant funding would serve to provide supplemental funding for the project in addition to the Residential Construction Fund's approved FY26 capital budget allocation in the amount of \$2,440,500.

The Denali Commission has notified us that grant funding, in the amount of \$300,000, was approved for award. Award documents were received in October 2025, and to obligate the funds, the Borough is required to sign the grant agreement based on the terms and conditions attached hereto as Exhibit A to Resolution No. 10-25-1991.

By approving Resolution 10-25-1991, the Wrangell Borough Assembly accepts the Denali Commission grant award in the amount of \$300,000 and amends the FY2026 budget by transferring the grant funds into the Residential Construction CIP Fund for the Alder Top Village Subdivision - Phase I Roadway and Utilities project. Resolution 10-25-1991 also authorizes the Borough Manager and his Designees to execute the grant agreement and authorizes expenditure under the grant.

1. Project Summary

- a. <u>Scope of Work</u>: Construction of new subdivision road. Project activities will include contractor mobilization, construction surveying, clearing and grubbing, archaeological monitoring, gravel roadway, water main, sewer main, coordination for trenching and backfill for local utilities' installation.
- b. <u>Deliverables</u>: Completion of 2,800 feet of new road surfacing with crushed aggregate with full installation of water, sewer, and electrical utilities.
- c. <u>Budget</u>: The Commission makes \$300,000 available for the project via this Financial Assistance Award (FAA) and is designated as a non-federal match to other federal funds. This amount includes all direct, indirect, and pre-award costs (if any) authorized pursuant to <u>2 CFR 200.458</u>. Other partners on the project include City and Borough of Wrangell, who in total are contributing an additional \$2,025,680 towards the project. Total project cost \$2,325,680. All Commission funding shall be used for the scope of work identified in this FAA only. Any funds remaining after the full scope of work has been completed shall be returned to the Denali Commission consistent with <u>2 CFR 200.345</u>.
- d. <u>Delivery Method</u>: The City and Borough of Wrangell (CBW) will oversee all tasks and subcontracts for the project. CBW has already contracted with a contractor through a competitive procurement process to complete the construction of the project. Additional details on project delivery can be found in Attachment A: Scope of Work.
- e. <u>Performance Period</u>: The Period of Performance for this FAA is 1 June 2025 through 30 March 2026. In accordance with <u>2 CFR 200.309</u>, recipients can only incur obligations or costs against this FAA during the Period of Performance, unless specifically authorized in the Special Provisions (Section 16 of this document). If a project cannot be completed within the approved Period of Performance, an extension request must be made in accordance with the Commission's <u>Recipient Guidelines and Requirements</u> (RGR), available at <u>www.denali.gov</u>.
- f. <u>Place of Performance and Beneficiaries</u>: The place of performance is Wrangell, Alaska. Wrangell has a population of 2,127, about 30% of whom identify as American Indian and Alaska Native in some way (Source: 2020 Decennial Census).

The City and Borough of Wrangell is:

- identified as a distressed community in the Commission's <u>2024 Distressed</u> <u>Communities Report</u>
- not identified as Threatened in the Commission's <u>2019 Statewide Threat Assessment</u>

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2. Project Reporting and Commission Site Visits

Progress reports and a closeout report are required under this FAA. Progress Reports shall be submitted at the frequency stipulated in the Special Provisions.

The Closeout Report shall be completed within 90 days of the end of the Period of Performance. All reports must be submitted using the Denali Commission's online Project Database System, available at <u>Denali Commission Project Database</u>.

Commission staff or agents of the Commission may visit the project site or home office to monitor progress during or after the Period of Performance. The Recipient shall coordinate and make information available to facilitate such site visits.

Refer to the *Recipient Guidelines and Requirements* document for further information related to reports and site visits.

3. Payments

The Commission shall make payments under this FAA per <u>2 CFR 200.305</u> by electronic transfer in response to a <u>Standard Form 270 (SF-270)</u> "Request for Advance or Reimbursement", submitted by the Recipient. At a minimum, all SF-270s must include summary cost information on labor, materials, contracts/consultants, and indirect costs. Detailed documentation is required for any single expenditure greater than \$50,000. The Special Provisions will indicate if Preaward Costs and/or Advance Payments are authorized under this FAA. Recipient and/or Recipient's design professionals shall judiciously account for the potential for increased rates of permafrost thaw, coastal/riverine erosion, and flooding during the design life of the infrastructure.

Real Property Disposition: When the original ownership or lease arrangements for the real property improvements change, or when the real property improvements are no longer needed for the originally authorized purpose, City and Borough of Wrangell must contact the Commission for approvals and/or disposition instructions in accordance with <u>2 CFR 200.311</u>.

RECOMMENDATION MOTION:

Move to Approve Resolution No. 10-25-1992.

SUMMARY STATEMENT:

The City and Borough of Wrangell, Alaska was awarded project loan funding from the United States Department of Agriculture, Rural Development, for the Water Treatment Plant Improvements

project. Loan funding was awarded through two separate loans, which, together total \$5,782,000. Loan funds were used for the design and construction of improvements to the Water Treatment Plant to house two parallel Dissolved Air Flotation (DAF) with multimedia filtration and a piped below-grade disposal directly to the existing wastewater treatment plant to manage backwash disposal.

The loans are required to be secured by Revenue bonds with parity lien position in the amounts of \$3,821,000 and \$1,961,000. The bond will be fully registered as to both principal and interest in the name of the "United States of America, Acting through the United States Department of Agriculture." Bond Counsel has been utilized in preparation of these documents.

The USDA loans are on parity with another lender, the State Revolving Fund, for the same capital improvement project, and the resolution identifies additional lenders with existing water fund loans who, in the event of default, will be affected on a proportionate basis.

For the 2017 loan under attached Loan Resolution A, repayment will be scheduled over a period of 40 years. Payments will be equal, semi-annual amortized installments beginning six months after the loan closing date. The precise payment amount will be based on the interest rate at which the loan is closed.

For the 2023 loan under attached Loan Resolution B, repayment will be scheduled over a period of 40 years. Payments will be equal, semi-annual amortized installments beginning six months after the closing date. The payment amount will be based on the interest rate at which the loan is closed.

Bond/Loan Resolutions must be duly adopted and executed prior to loan closing. Resolution 10-25-1992 authorizes the Borough to issue revenue bonds in the total amount of \$5,782,000 to finance the improvements to the Water Treatment Plant, fixing certain details associated with the bonds, and authorizing the sale of the bonds.

A RESOLUTION OF THE ASSEMBLY OF THE CITY AND BOROUGH OF WRANGELL, ALASKA, AUTHORIZING THE BOROUGH TO ISSUE WATER REVENUE BONDS TO FINANCE IMPROVEMENTS TO THE WATER TREATMENT PLANT; FIXING CERTAIN DETAILS OF SUCH BONDS; AND AUTHORIZING THEIR SALE

WHEREAS, the City and Borough of Wrangell, Alaska (the "Borough"), is a municipality organized and operating under the laws of the State of Alaska; and

WHEREAS, the Borough is authorized to own, operate, and maintain a water utility; and

WHEREAS, the Borough is authorized by the Constitution and laws of the State of Alaska to issue revenue bonds to finance all or part of the cost of acquisition, construction, and installation of improvements and betterments to the water utility of the Borough; and

WHEREAS, the Assembly has determined that the public health, safety, and welfare will be furthered by the water treatment plant improvement project described hereinafter and has further determined to issue water revenue bonds of the Borough in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$5,782,000; and

WHEREAS, the Assembly has determined to issue its water revenue bonds in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$5,782,000 to the United States of America, acting through the United States Department of Agriculture, Rural Utilities Service; and

WHEREAS, the Borough has received the prior written consent of the State of Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation Division of Water State Revolving Fund Loan Program to the issuance of the water revenue bonds authorized herein;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE ASSEMBLY OF THE CITY AND BOROUGH OF WRANGELL, ALASKA, THAT:

Section 1: DEFINITIONS

As used in this Resolution, the following words shall have the following meanings:

- A. <u>Additional Bond</u> means any bond issued pursuant to Section 16B of this Resolution.
 - B. <u>Assembly</u> means the Assembly of the Borough.

- C. <u>Bond</u> means each "City and Borough of Wrangell, Alaska Water Revenue Bond" herein authorized to be issued, sold, and delivered in one or more series in the aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$5,782,000.
 - D. <u>Bond Fund</u> means the "Bond Fund" referred to in Section 12 of this Resolution.
- E. <u>Bond Register</u> means the registration books on which are maintained the names and addresses of the Registered Owners.
- F. <u>Bond Registrar</u> means the bond registrar, transfer agent, and paying agent appointed and designated in Section 6 of this Resolution.
 - G. <u>Borough</u> means the City and Borough of Wrangell, Alaska.
- H. <u>Borough Clerk</u> means the Clerk of the Borough, or other officer of the Borough who is the custodian of the seal of the Borough and of the records of the proceedings of the Borough, or the successor in functions, if any.
- I. <u>Capital Improvement Fund</u> means the "Capital Improvement Fund" referred to in Section 10 of this Resolution.
- J. <u>Costs of the Project</u> means all or any part designated by the Assembly of the costs of the Project, or interest therein, which costs, at the option of the Assembly, may include all or any part of the incidental costs pertaining to the Project, including:
 - (1) Preliminary expenses advanced by the Borough from funds available for the use therefor, or advanced by the United States government, or from any other source, with approval of the Assembly, or any combination thereof;
 - (2) The costs of making surveys, audits, preliminary plans, other plans, specifications, estimates of costs, and other preliminaries;
 - (3) The costs of appraising, printing, estimates, advice, services of engineers, architects, financial consultants, attorneys at law, clerical help, or other agents or employees;
 - (4) The costs of contingencies;
 - (5) The costs of the issuance of the Bonds;
 - (6) The costs of funding any short-term financing, bond anticipation notes, and other temporary loans pertaining to the Project and of the incidental expenses incurred in connection with such loans;
 - (7) The costs of any properties, rights, easements, or other interest in properties, or any licenses, privileges, agreements, and franchises; and

(8) All other expenses necessary or desirable and pertaining to the Project, as estimated or otherwise ascertained by the Assembly.

K. <u>EDA Grants</u> means the following:

- (1) United States Department of Commerce Economic Development Administration Grant No. 07 01 07472 to the Borough (Wrangell Water Treatment Plant Improvement Project) dated September 25, 2019, in the amount of \$2,996,953; and
- (2) United States Department of Commerce Economic Development Administration Grant No. 07 01 07472.01 to the Borough (Wrangell Water Treatment Plant Improvement Project), dated March 20, 2024, in the amount of \$2,144,677.
- L. <u>Finance Director</u> means the Finance Director of the Borough, or the successor in functions, if any.
- M. <u>Gross Revenue</u> means all revenues received by the Borough from the System and may include, at the discretion of the Borough, money derived from one, all, or any combination of revenue sources pertaining to the System, including rates, charges, rents, fees, and any other income derived from the operation or ownership of, the use of services of, or the availability of or services pertaining to, or otherwise derived in connection with, the System or all or any part of any property pertaining to the System.
 - N. <u>Mayor</u> means the Mayor of the Borough, or the successor in functions, if any.
- O. <u>Net Revenue</u> means Gross Revenue after the deduction of Operation and Maintenance Expenses.
- P. <u>Operation and Maintenance Expenses</u> means all reasonable and necessary current expenses of the Borough, paid or accrued, of operating, maintaining, and repairing the System or of levying, collecting, and otherwise administering the Net Revenue for the payment of the Parity Bonds; and the term includes (except as limited by contract or otherwise limited by law) without limiting the generality of the foregoing:
 - (1) Engineering, auditing, reporting, legal, and other overhead expenses of the various Borough departments directly relating and reasonably allocable to the administration of the System;
 - (2) Fidelity bonds and property and liability insurance premiums pertaining to the System, or a reasonably allocable share of a premium of any blanket bond or policy pertaining thereto;
 - (3) Payments to pension, retirement, health, and hospitalization funds and other insurance;

- (4) Any taxes, assessments, excise taxes, or other charges which may be lawfully imposed on the Borough, the System, revenues therefrom, or any privilege in connection with their operation;
- (5) The reasonable charges of the Bond Registrar pertaining to the Bonds or pertaining to the Project, if any;
- (6) Contractual services, professional services, salaries, other administrative expenses, and the cost of materials, supplies, repairs, and labor, pertaining to the issuance of the Bonds and to the ordinary operation of the System; and
- (7) All other administrative, general, and commercial expenses.
- Q. <u>Parity Bonds</u> means, collectively, the Parity Loans, the Bonds, and any Additional Bonds.
 - R. <u>Parity Loans</u> means the following:

 - (2) Alaska Drinking Water Fund Loan Agreement between the Borough and the State of Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation Division of Water State Revolving Fund Loan Program (Water Main Replacement) Number 917051 dated July 13, 2018, in the amount of \$542,249; and
 - (3) Alaska Drinking Water Fund Loan Agreement between the Borough and the State of Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation Division of Water State Revolving Fund Loan Program (Water Treatment Plant) Number 917071-S dated May 13, 2022, in the amount of \$3,821,000.

- W. <u>Revenue Fund</u> means the "Revenue Fund" referred to in Section 11 of this Resolution.
- X. <u>Short-Lived Asset Reserve Fund</u> means the "Short-Lived Asset Reserve Fund" referred to in Section 14 of this Resolution.
- Y. <u>System</u> means the water utility of the Borough, as the same now exists, including its assets, real, and personal, tangible and intangible, and as it may later be added to, extended, and improved, and shall include buildings, structures, utilities, or other income producing water facilities from the operation of or in connection with which the revenues of the payment of the Bond to be issued hereunder will be derived, and the lands pertaining thereto.

Section 2: THE PROJECT

- A. <u>Project Description</u>. The water treatment plant improvement project consists of the acquisition, construction, and installation of a pre-packaged water treatment system, including rapid mix, flocculation, dissolved air flotation, and dual media filtration system to meet an approximately 2.26 million gallon per day capacity; an approximately 9,500 square foot building to house the pre-packaged water treatment system including site work, thermal, and moisture protection, exterior doors, windows, and louver openings, and a standby diesel-powered generator with automatic transfer switch, together with costs of engineering, legal, accounting, and other necessary professional services, costs of bond issuance, interest on borrowed funds during construction, and costs incidental thereto (the "Project").
- B. <u>Project Changes</u>. The Assembly may make changes in the Project prior to or in the course of actual construction, provided such changes are found necessary and desirable by the Assembly and that such changes do not substantially affect or alter the plans or the cost of the Project.
- C. <u>Costs</u>. \$5,782,000 of the Costs of the Project will be paid from the proceeds of the Bonds. Any balance will be paid from other lawfully available funds of the Borough, including grant and loan funds.

Section 3: THE BONDS

The Bonds, each designated "City and Borough of Wrangell, Alaska Water Revenue Bond" (each, a "Bond"), in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$5,782,000, are hereby authorized to be issued, sold, and delivered in one or more series pursuant to Alaska

Statutes Chapter 29.47. The designation of each Bond is hereby authorized to be modified to accurately reflect its series, if any, and the year in which it is delivered.

Each Bond shall consist of a single, transferable, amortized revenue bond, shall be issued in fully registered form, shall be dated as of the date of its delivery, and shall bear interest on the unpaid balance, at the lower of the rate charged by the United States of America, acting through the United States Department of Agriculture, Rural Utilities Service, at the time of loan approval or at the time of loan closing.

Each Bond shall be payable in equal semi-annual installments of principal and interest, with the first installment of principal and interest being due six months after the date of delivery of the Bond, and semi-annually thereafter until maturity. The final semi-annual installment may be in such greater or lesser amount as is necessary to fully pay the Bond. The principal of and interest on each Bond shall be fully paid within a period not to exceed forty (40) years from its date.

The sale of each Bond to the United States of America, acting through the United States Department of Agriculture, Rural Utilities Service (the initial "Registered Owner"), is hereby authorized and approved.

The Borough hereby agrees to comply with the requirements of the United States of America, acting through the United States Department of Agriculture, Rural Utilities Service, as contained in the Amended Letter of Conditions pertaining to the Project dated September 28, 2023, and in the RUS Bulletin 1780-27 Loan Resolutions pertaining to the Project adopted by the Assembly on October 21, 2025.

Section 4: EXECUTION

Each Bond shall be executed by the manual signature of the Mayor and attested by the manual signature of the Borough Clerk, and the seal of the Borough shall be impressed thereon.

Section 5: PLACE AND MANNER OF PAYMENT

Both principal of and interest on each Bond shall be payable in lawful money of the United States of America to the Registered Owner by Pre-Authorized Debit (PAD), at the address of the Registered Owner as shown on the Bond Register, or at such other address as shall be designated in writing to the Borough by the Registered Owner.

Section 6: BOND REGISTRAR

The Finance Director is hereby appointed as bond registrar, transfer agent, and paying agent (the "Bond Registrar"). The Bond Registrar shall keep, or cause to be kept, sufficient books for the registration and transfer of each Bond. The Bond Registrar is authorized, on behalf of the Borough, to carry out all of the Bond Registrar's powers and duties under this Resolution.

Each Bond may be transferred only upon the Bond Register, upon the surrender thereof to the Bond Registrar, together with a form of transfer duly executed by the Registered Owner or its attorney duly authorized in writing. Upon the transfer of a Bond, there shall be issued in the name of the transferee or transferees a new fully registered Bond or Bonds of any authorized denomination or denominations and of the same maturity and interest rate, and of the same aggregate principal amount, as the surrendered Bond. The new Bond or Bonds shall bear the same date as the date of the surrendered Bond, but shall bear interest from the date to which interest has been paid or duly provided for.

Section 7: PREPAYMENT; NO DEFEASANCE

Prepayments of scheduled installments of a Bond, or any portion thereof, may be made at any time at the option of the Borough. Refunds, extra payments, and loan proceeds obtained from outside sources for the purpose of paying down a Bond shall, after payment of interest, be applied to the installments of the Bond last to become due and shall not affect the obligation of the Borough to pay the remaining installments as scheduled. Prepayments may be made on any business day in the amount of \$1,000 or multiples thereof. Notice of any intended prepayment of a Bond shall be provided to the Registered Owner not less than twenty (20) days prior to the prepayment date. The Bonds are not subject to defeasance prior to maturity, in whole or in part.

Section 8: RATES AND CHARGES

The Borough has established, may from time to time revise, and shall maintain and collect water rates and charges for furnishing the services of the System to its customers, which rates and charges are, and shall continue to be, uniform as to all persons or properties that are of the same class, which rates and charges shall be collected from the users thereof.

Section 9: PLEDGE OF NET REVENUE; SPECIAL OBLIGATIONS

The Net Revenue is hereby pledged for the payment of the Parity Bonds and shall be used and applied in the order of priority provided in Section 11 of this Resolution. The Parity Bonds do not constitute an obligation of the State of Alaska, either general or special, or a general obligation of the Borough, but are special obligations of the Borough, payable exclusively from the Bond Fund and the Net Revenue pledged to be paid into the Bond Fund.

Section 10: CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT FUND

The Borough shall maintain a special fund to be used and applied for the payment of Costs of the Project (the "Capital Improvement Fund"). The Borough shall deposit all proceeds of the sale of the Bonds into the Capital Improvement Fund. Any interest earnings on investments credited to the Capital Improvement Fund shall remain in and be used for the purposes of the Capital Improvement Fund. The Borough's share of any liquidated damages or other money paid by defaulting contractors or their sureties will be deposited into the Capital Improvement Fund to assure the completion of the Project.

When the Project has been completed and all costs related thereto have been paid in full, any balance remaining in the Capital Improvement Fund shall be deposited into the Bond Fund.

Section 11: REVENUE FUND

The Borough shall maintain a special fund into which the Gross Revenue shall be deposited immediately upon receipt (the "Revenue Fund").

- A. <u>Use of Gross Revenue</u>. The Gross Revenue shall be used for the payment of the following obligations in the following order of priority:
 - (1) First Charge and Lien: The costs of Operation and Maintenance Expenses;
 - (2) Second Charge and Lien: The principal of and interest on the Parity Bonds;
 - (3) Third Charge and Lien: To maintain the Reserve Fund and the Short-Lived Asset Reserve Fund; and
 - (4) For any purpose of surplus funds, as provided in Section 15 of this Resolution.
- B. <u>Interest Earnings</u>. Interest earnings on investments credited to the Revenue Fund shall remain in and be used for the purposes of the Revenue Fund.
- C. <u>Surplus Funds</u>. Funds remaining in the Revenue Fund after having been applied to designated funds for the purposes provided in this Section shall constitute surplus funds and may be used for the purposes set forth in Section 15 of this Resolution.

Section 12: BOND FUND

The Borough shall maintain a special fund for the sole purpose of paying principal of and premium, if any, and interest on the Bonds (the "Bond Fund"). The Borough shall deposit into the Bond Fund, from Net Revenue available in accordance with Section 11A of this Resolution or, at the option (but not obligation) of the Borough, other money legally available therefor, each installment of principal of and premium, if any, and interest payable on each Bond on or before each payment date, which the Borough shall pay from the Bond Fund to the Registered Owner on or before each payment date. The money herein allocated to the Bond Fund shall be used solely to pay installments of principal of and interest on the Bonds when due. If the Borough for any reason shall fail to make such deposit, then the Borough shall deposit into the Bond Fund, from the Reserve Fund as provided in Section 13 of this Resolution, an amount equal to the deficiency.

Section 13: DEBT SERVICE RESERVE FUND

- A. <u>Deposits</u>. The Borough shall maintain a special fund to provide for deficiencies in the Bond Fund (the "Reserve Fund"). The Borough shall deposit into the Reserve Fund, within one year after the date of issuance of each Bond, from Gross Revenue available in accordance with Section 11A of this Resolution or, at the option (but not obligation) of the Borough, other money legally available therefor, after taking into account the amount then on deposit therein, an amount equal to one-tenth of an annual payment of principal and interest on the Bonds, and on each anniversary date of each Bond thereafter, for a period of ten years, or until such time as the Reserve Fund provides for at least two semi-annual installments of principal and interest on the Bonds.
- B. <u>Deficiencies or Withdrawals</u>. Whenever any money is withdrawn from the Reserve Fund to pay the principal of or interest on the Bonds, or if a deficiency exists therein, the amount so withdrawn or the amount of such deficiency shall be restored by not more than 12 monthly deposits from Gross Revenue available in accordance with Section 11A of this Resolution or, at the option (but not obligation) of the Borough, other money legally available therefor, until the Reserve Fund again provides for at least two semi-annual installments of principal and interest on the Bonds.
- C. <u>Investments</u>. All money in the Reserve Fund may be kept in cash or deposited in institutions permitted by law in an amount in each institution not greater than the amount insured by any department or agency of the United States government, or may be invested and reinvested in any legal investment permitted for Borough money maturing not later than the last maturity date of the Bonds. Interest earned on any such investment shall be credited to the Bond Fund.

Section 14: SHORT-LIVED ASSET RESERVE FUND

The Borough shall maintain a special fund for the repair and/or replacement of major System assets (the "Short-Lived Asset Reserve Fund"). The Borough shall credit to the Short-Lived Asset Reserve Fund, from Gross Revenue available in accordance with Section 11A of this Resolution or, at the option (but not obligation) of the Borough, other money legally available therefor: on the date of issuance of the Bonds, and annually thereafter, the amount of not less than \$58,511; and on a regular basis, any additional amount needed to finance the short-lived assets needs of the System. The Borough will not withdraw money from the Short-Lived Asset Reserve Fund without receiving the prior written consent of the United States of America, acting through the United States Department of Agriculture, Rural Utilities Service. Money withdrawn from the Short-Lived Asset Reserve Fund will be used exclusively for the repair and/or replacement of major System assets.

Section 15: SURPLUS FUNDS

Funds remaining in the Revenue Fund after having been applied to or designated funds for the purposes provided in paragraphs (1) through (3) of Section 11A of this Resolution shall constitute surplus funds and may be used for any of the following purposes:

- A. To pay the costs of unusual or extraordinary maintenance of or repair to the System;
- B. To pay the principal of and interest on any subordinate lien obligations that have been issued to provide water facilities in or for the Borough;
 - C. To improve, extend, enlarge, or replace any water facilities;
 - D. To acquire or construct additional water facilities in or for the Borough;
- E. To call or redeem prior to their fixed dates of maturity any Parity Bond or subordinate lien obligation issued to provide water facilities for the Borough; and
 - F. For any other lawful purpose.

Section 16: ADDITIONAL BONDS

- A. <u>No Prior Lien</u>. The Borough shall not incur any indebtedness secured by a charge and lien on Gross Revenue prior or superior to the Second Charge and Lien provided for in Section 11A of this Resolution that secures payment of the Parity Bonds.
- B. <u>Additional Bonds</u>. The Borough may incur indebtedness secured by a charge and lien on Gross Revenue on a parity with the Second Charge and Lien provided for in Section 11A of this Resolution that secures payment of the Parity Bonds ("Additional Bonds") only with the prior written consent of the United States of America, acting through the United States Department of Agriculture, Rural Utilities Service.
- C. <u>Subordinate Lien Obligations</u>. The Borough may incur indebtedness secured by a charge and lien on Gross Revenue subordinate to the Third Charge and Lien provided for in Section 11A of this Resolution that secures payments into the Reserve Fund and Short-Lived Asset Reserve Fund only with the prior written consent of the United States of America, acting through the United States Department of Agriculture, Rural Utilities Service.

Section 17: INVESTMENTS

Surplus funds in any of the funds required to be maintained by this Resolution may be invested in any investment permitted by law.

Section 18: GENERAL COVENANTS

The Borough covenants with the Registered Owners as follows:

- A. <u>Complete Project</u>. The Borough will complete the construction of the Project with all practical dispatch and in a sound and economical manner.
- B. <u>Operate System</u>. The Borough will operate the System in an efficient and economical manner and prescribe, revise, and collect such charges in connection therewith

so that the services, facilities, and properties of the System may be furnished at the lowest possible cost consistent with sound economy and prudent management.

- C. <u>Good Repair</u>. The Borough will operate, maintain, preserve, and keep the System and every part thereof in good repair, working order, and condition.
- D. <u>Corporate Status</u>. The Borough will maintain its status as a municipality of the State of Alaska and will take no steps to disincorporate or otherwise change its corporate status.
- E. <u>Preserve Security</u>. The Borough will preserve and protect the security of the Bonds and the rights of the Registered Owners.
- F. <u>Collect Revenues</u>. The Borough will collect and hold in trust the revenues and other funds pledged to the payment of the Bonds and apply such revenue or other funds only as provided in this Resolution.
- G. <u>Service Bond</u>. The Borough will pay and cause to be paid punctually the principal of each Bond and the interest thereon on the date or dates and at the place or places and in the manner mentioned in the Bond, and in accordance with this Resolution.
- H. <u>Pay Claims</u>. The Borough will pay and discharge any and all lawful claims for labor, materials, and supplies which, if unpaid, might by law become a charge or lien upon the Gross Revenue, or any part of Gross Revenue, or any funds in the hands of the Finance Director, prior or superior to the Second Charge and Lien on Gross Revenue provided for in Section 11A of this Resolution that secures payment of the Parity Bonds or that might impair the security of the Bonds, to the end that the priority and security of the Bonds shall be fully preserved and protected.
- I. <u>Encumbrances</u>. Except to secure the EDA Grants, the Borough will not mortgage or otherwise encumber, sell, lease, or dispose of the System or any part thereof, nor enter into any lease or agreement which would impair or impede the operation of the System or any part thereof necessary to secure adequate revenues for the payment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds, nor which would otherwise impair or impede the rights of the Registered Owners with respect to such revenues of the operation of the System without provisions for the retirement of the Bonds then outstanding from the proceeds thereof.
- J. <u>Insurance</u>. The Borough will procure and keep in force insurance upon all buildings and structures of the System and the machinery and equipment therein that are usually insured by entities operating like property, in good and responsible insurance companies. The amount of the insurance shall be such as may be required to adequately protect the Borough and the Registered Owners from loss due to any casualty, and in the event of any such loss, the proceeds shall be used to repair or restore the System or for the payment of the Bonds.

- K. <u>Fidelity Bonds</u>. The Borough will procure suitable fidelity bonds covering all of its officers and other employees charged with the operation of the System and the collection and disbursement of revenues therefrom.
- L. <u>Engineers</u>. The Borough will employ consulting engineers of acknowledged reputation, skill, and experience in the improvement and operation of the System for any unusual or extraordinary items of maintenance, repair, or betterments as shall be required from time to time, all reports, estimates, and recommendations of such consulting engineers to be filed with the Assembly and furnished to the Registered Owners upon request.
- M. <u>Accounts</u>. The Borough will keep proper and separate accounts and records in which complete and separate entries shall be made of all transactions relating to the System, and it will furnish complete operating and income statements upon request.
- N. <u>Delinquencies</u>. The Borough will not furnish water service to any customer whatsoever free of charge, and it shall, not later than sixty (60) days after an account becomes delinquent, take such legal action as may be reasonable to enforce collection of any collectible delinquent account.

Section 19: AMENDMENTS

- A. The Borough from time to time and at any time may adopt a resolution or resolutions supplemental hereto, which resolution or resolutions thereafter shall become a part of this Resolution, for any one or more of all of the following purposes:
 - (1) To add to the covenants and agreements of the Borough in this Resolution, other covenants and agreements thereafter to be observed, which shall not adversely affect the interest of the Registered Owners, or to surrender any right or power herein reserved.
 - (2) To make such provisions for the purpose of curing any ambiguities or of curing, correcting, or supplementing any defective provisions contained in this Resolution, in regard to matters or questions arising under this Resolution as the Assembly may deem necessary or desirable and not inconsistent with this Resolution and which shall not adversely affect, in any material respect, the interest of the Registered Owners.

Any such supplemental resolution may be adopted without the consent of the Registered Owners, notwithstanding any of the provisions of subsection B of this Section.

B. With the consent of the Registered Owners, the Assembly may adopt a resolution or resolutions supplemental hereto for the purpose of adding any provisions to or changing in any manner or eliminating any of the provisions of this Resolution or of any supplemental resolution.

C. Upon the adoption of any supplemental resolution pursuant to the provisions of this Section, this Resolution shall be deemed to be modified and amended in accordance therewith, and the respective rights, duties, and obligations of the Borough under this Resolution and the Registered Owners shall thereafter be determined, exercised, and enforced thereunder, subject in all respects to such modification and amendments, and all terms and conditions of any such supplemental resolution shall be deemed to be part of the terms and conditions of this Resolution for any and all purposes.

Section 20: REGISTERED OWNERS' REMEDIES; RECEIVER

By action or suit in equity, the Registered Owners may, in the event of a material breach of any of the foregoing covenants, cause the appointment of a receiver, which receiver may: enter and take possession of the System and any Net Revenue for the payment of the Parity Bonds, on a pro rata basis; prescribe fees to be derived from the System; and collect, receive, and apply all Net Revenue or other money pledged for the payment of the Bonds in the same manner as the Borough might do in accordance with the obligations of the Borough.

Section 21: RESOLUTION A CONTRACT

The provisions of this Resolution shall constitute a contract between the Borough and the Registered Owners.

Section 22: SEVERABILITY

If any one or more of the covenants or agreements provided in this Resolution to be performed on the part of the Borough shall be declared by any court of competent jurisdiction to be contrary to law, then such covenant or covenants, agreement or agreements, shall be null and void and shall be deemed separable from the remaining covenants and agreements in this Resolution and shall in no way affect the validity of the other provisions of this Resolution or of the Bonds.

Section 23: REPEALER

All prior resolutions or parts thereof, to the extent inconsistent herewith, are hereby repealed and shall, to the extent of such inconsistency, have no further force or effect.

Section 24: AUTHORIZATION

The Mayor, Borough Manager, Borough Clerk, Borough Attorney, and Finance Director, or any one of such officers, as may be appropriate to the circumstances, are hereby authorized to execute, on behalf of the Borough, all such additional documents as may be necessary to effect the sale and delivery of the Bonds.

Section 25: EFFECTIVE DATE

This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon passage and approval.

WHEREAS, it is necessary for the _City and Borough of Wrangell, Alaska

(Public Body)

(herein after called Association) to raise a portion of the cost of such undertaking by issuance of its bonds in the principal amount of

Three Million Eight Hundred Twenty-One Thousand and No/100

pursuant to the provisions of **Resolution No. 11-19-1499**

_; and

WHEREAS, the Association intends to obtain assistance from the United States Department of Agriculture, (herein called the Government) acting under the provisions of the Consolidated Farm and Rural Development Act (7 U.S.C. 1921 et seq.) in the planning. financing, and supervision of such undertaking and the purchasing of bonds lawfully issued, in the event that no other acceptable purchaser for such bonds is found by the Association:

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises the Association hereby resolves:

- 1. To have prepared on its behalf and to adopt an ordinance or resolution for the issuance of its bonds containing such items and in such forms as are required by State statutes and as are agreeable and acceptable to the Government.
- 2. To refinance the unpaid balance, in whole or in part, of its bonds upon the request of the Government if at any time it shall appear to the Government that the Association is able to refinance its bonds by obtaining a loan for such purposes from responsible cooperative or private sources at reasonable rates and terms for loans for similar purposes and periods of time as required by section 333(c) of said Consolidated Farm and Rural Development Act (7 U.S.C. 1983(c)).
- 3. To provide for, execute, and comply with Form RD 400-4, "Assurance Agreement," and Form RD 400-1, "Equal Opportunity Agreement," including an "Equal Opportunity Clause," which clause is to be incorporated in, or attached as a rider to, each construction contract and subcontract involving in excess of \$10,000.
- 4. To indemnify the Government for any payments made or losses suffered by the Government on behalf of the Association. Such indemnification shall be payable from the same source of funds pledged to pay the bonds or any other legal ly permissible source.
- 5. That upon default in the payments of any principal and accrued interest on the bonds or in the performance of any covenant or agreement contained herein or in the instruments incident to making or insuring the loan, the Government at its option may (a) declare the entire principal amount then outstanding and accrued interest immediately due and payable, (b) for the account of the Association (payable from the source of funds pledged to pay the bonds or any other legally permissible source), incur and pay reasonable expenses for repair, maintenance, and operation of the facility and such other reasonable expenses as may be necessary to cure the cause of default, and/or (c) take possession of the facility, repair, maintain, and operate or rent it. Default under the provisions of this resolution or any instrument incident to the making or insuring of the loan may be construed by the Government to constitute default under any other instrument held by the Government and executed or assumed by the Association, and default under any such instrument may be construed by the Government to constitute default hereunder.
- 6. Not to sell, transfer, lease, or otherwise encumber the facility or any portion thereof, or interest therein, or permit others to do so, without the prior written consent of the Government.
- 7. Not to defease the bonds, or to borrow money, enter into any contractor agreement, or otherwise incur any liabilities for any purpose in connection with the facility (exclusive of normal maintenance) without the prior written consent of the Government if such undertaking would involve the source of funds pledged to pay the bonds.
- 8. To place the proceeds of the bonds on deposit in an account and in a manner approved by the Government. Funds may be deposited in institutions insured by the State or Federal Government or invested in readily marketable securities backed by the full faith and credit of the United States. Any income from these accounts will be considered as revenues of the system.
- 9. To comply with all applicable State and Federal laws and regulations and to continually operate and maintain the facility in good condition.
- 10. To provide for the receipt of adequate revenues to meet the requirements of debt service, operation and maintenance, and the establishment of adequate reserves. Revenue accumulated over and above that needed to pay operating and maintenance, debt service and reserves may only be retained or used to make prepayments on the loan. Revenue cannot be used to pay any expenses which are not directly incurred for the facility financed by USDA. No free service or use of the facility will be permitted.

According to the Paperwork Reduction Act of 1995, an agency may not conduct or sponsor, and a person is not required to respond to, a collection of information unless it displays a valid OMB control number. The valid OMB control number for this information collection is 0572-0121. The time required to complete this information collection is estimated to average 1 hour per response, including the time for reviewing instructions, searching existing data sources, gathering and maintaining the data needed, and completing and reviewing the collection of information.

- 11. To acquire and maintain such insurance and fidelity bond coverage as may be required by the Government.
- 12. To establish and maintain such books and records relating to the operation of the facility and its financial affairs and to provide for required audit thereof as required by the Government, to provide the Government a copy of each such audit without its request, and to forward to the Government such additional information and reports as it may from time to time require.
- 13. To provide the Government at all reasonable times access to all books and records relating to the facility and access to the property of the system so that the Government may ascertain that the Association is complying with the provisions hereof and of the instruments incident to the making or insuring of the loan.
- 14. SUMMARY STATEMENT: The proposed resolution adopts the Southeast Conference Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS)—also known as the Southeast Alaska 2030 Economic Plan—as the official regional economic development plan for the City and Borough of Wrangell.

The CEDS, developed by the Southeast Conference as the federally designated Economic Development District for Southeast Alaska, serves as the guiding framework for the region's long-term economic direction. The plan outlines strategies for diversification, infrastructure investment, workforce development, and community resilience across the region.

Adoption of the CEDS aligns Wrangell with the overarching theme and direction of the Southeast Alaska economy and demonstrates regional collaboration in pursuit of shared goals. This alignment also strengthens Wrangell's eligibility and competitiveness for state and federal funding opportunities administered through the U.S. Economic Development Administration and other agencies that reference the regional CEDS.

Locally, Wrangell's economic initiatives are consistent with the CEDS, including investments in waterfront infrastructure, housing, utilities, tourism facilities, and community services. These efforts also reflect the Borough Assembly's adopted priorities of Economic Development, Infrastructure and Maintenance, Quality of Life, and Communications.

WHEREAS, the Southeast Alaska 2030 Economic Plan, also known as the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS), identifies regional goals and strategies to strengthen economic resilience, promote innovation, and improve infrastructure and community well-being across Southeast Alaska; and

WHEREAS, the City and Borough of Wrangell recognizes that local and regional economic development are inherently interconnected, and that coordinated investment in infrastructure, housing, transportation, and workforce development is essential to long-term prosperity; and
