CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Matthew Porter called the regular meeting to order at 6:02 p.m. The following City Council members were present: Councilman David R. Duke, Councilman Dave Strang, Mayor *Pro Tem Jeff* Forrester, Councilman Sid Hoover, Councilman Scott Williams, and Councilman Gino Mulliqi.

Staff present included: City Manager Brent Parker; Deputy City Manager Renae Ollie; Assistant City Manager Lety Yanez; Fire Chief Brandon Blythe; Digital Media Specialist Kristina Kelly; City Secretary Stephanie Storm; Finance Director Melissa Brown; Assistant Police Chief Tommy Walters; Community Services Director Jasen Haskins; Library Director Ofilia Barrera; Parks and Recreation Director Carmen Powlen; Operations Director James Brown; Animal Services Manager Shelia Patton; Engineering Project Manager Jenneen Elkhalid; Public Works Director Tommy Weir; and various support staff.

Mayor Pro Tem Forrester led the Invocation, and Councilman Hoover led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Council Action

2. A. Property Tax Collections for FY24-25 as of April 30, 2025 are 98.27%, in comparison to FY23-24 for the same time period of 98.55%. Sales tax is on a 2 month lag and five months have been received. Sales Tax has increased 4.61% from the same time period last year.

- B. Franchise Fees: Most franchise fees are recognized quarterly with electric fees making up the majority. FEC pays yearly and it has not been received.
- C. Building permit revenue is down 35% from the same time last year.
- D. Intergovernmental Rev: The majority of intergovernmental revenues come from monthly WISD reimbursements and Fire Services which are billed semi annually. Fire Services has received the first semi annual payment.
- E. Service Fees: Trash fees billed in October are applicable towards FY 2023-24 revenue with the remaining fees coming from other seasonal fees and EMS revenue. Only six months of Trash fees have been received.
- F. Interest Rates have gone down slightly. Cash Balances have increased due to property tax payments, so interest should begin to increase.
- G. Yearly transfer from Utility Fund
- H. Largest Carry Forward items: \$800,000 for Animal Shelter Remodel, \$615,587 for Ambulance and 2 Chassis, \$126,900 for Annual Emergency Comm Annual Radio Replacement, \$124,630 for Brown Street Railroad Project, \$100,000 Pavement Condition Index
- I. Yearly audit and county appraisal fees.

ORDINANCE NO. 2025-21

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF WYLIE, TEXAS, AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 2024-25, WHICH ESTABLISHED THE BUDGET FOR FISCAL YEAR 2024-2025; REPEALING ALL CONFLICTING ORDINANCES; PROVIDING FOR A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City Council heretofore adopted Ordinance No. 2024-25 setting forth the Budget for Fiscal Year 2024-2025 beginning October 1, 2024, and ending September 30, 2025; and,

WHEREAS, the City Departments and Divisions routinely review their budget appropriations to determine if any changes are necessary; and

WHEREAS, based upon said review the City staff now recommends that certain amendments to the Budget be considered by the City Council; see Exhibit A; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council has the authority to make amendments to the City Budget under Article VII, Section 4 of the City Charter, as well as State law; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council has determined that the proposed amendments to the FY 2024-2025 Budget; see Exhibit A, with the revenues and expenditures therein contained, is in the best interest of the City; and therefore, desires to adopt the same by formal action.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF WYLIE, TEXAS:

SECTION I. The proposed amendments to the FY 2024-2025 Budget of the City of Wylie; Exhibit A, as heretofore adopted by Ordinance No. 2025-21, are completely adopted and approved as amendments to the said FY 2024-2025 Budget.

SECTION II. All portions of the existing FY 2024-2025 Budget and Ordinance No. 2024-25, except as specifically herein amended, shall remain in full force and effect, and not be otherwise affected by the adoption of the amendatory ordinance.

SECTION III. Should any paragraph, sentence, sub-division, clause, phrase or section of this ordinance be adjudged or held to be unconstitutional, illegal or invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of this ordinance as a whole or any part or provision thereof, other than the part or parts as declared to be invalid, illegal, or unconstitutional.

SECTION IV. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption by the City Council and publication of its caption as the law and the City Charter provide in such cases.

SECTION V. That all other ordinances and code provisions in conflict herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of any such conflict or inconsistency and all other provisions of the Wylie City Code not in conflict herewith shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION VI. The repeal of any ordinance, or parts thereof, by the enactment of the Ordinance, shall not be construed as abandoning any action now pending under or by virtue of such ordinance; nor shall it have the effect of discontinuing, abating, modifying or altering any penalty accruing or to accrue, nor as affecting any rights of the municipality under any section or provision of any ordinances at the time of passage of this ordinance.

Submission of this Non-Profit Park Event Application is required for special public non-profit events, 5K/fun runs, fundraisers, events with food and/or merchandise vendors, and all events wherein items will be sold. This form is reviewed by staff for approval prior to the requested event and must be submitted a minimum of twelve weeks in advance, and no sooner than 6 months prior to the event date being requested.

After City staff reviews the application, a Non-Profit Park Event Application may be considered for recommendation of approval by the Wylie Parks and Recreation Board, with the final review for approval completed by Wylie City Council if staff finds that:

- Priority use is given to City Events and private rentals;
- All fees have been paid;
- The event does not:
 - a. Conflict or compete with another approved non-City event, in consideration of event size, location, expected attendance, etc., as determined by staff;
 - b. Conflict or compete with City events and programs, as determined by staff (no car shows permitted 30 days prior to or 14 days after the City-sponsored Bluegrass on Ballard event);
 - c. Present an unreasonable danger to health or safety;
 - d. Cause loss or damage to City property;
 - e. Interfere with or place a burden on Public Safety services;
 - f. Interrupt the safe and orderly movement of pedestrians and vehicles.
- For events including food items, applicant provides documentation from the Collin County Environmental Services indicating whether or not a Food Service/Health permit is required for the event. This includes all food items: sold, free, food trucks, catering, homemade, prepackaged, etc.;

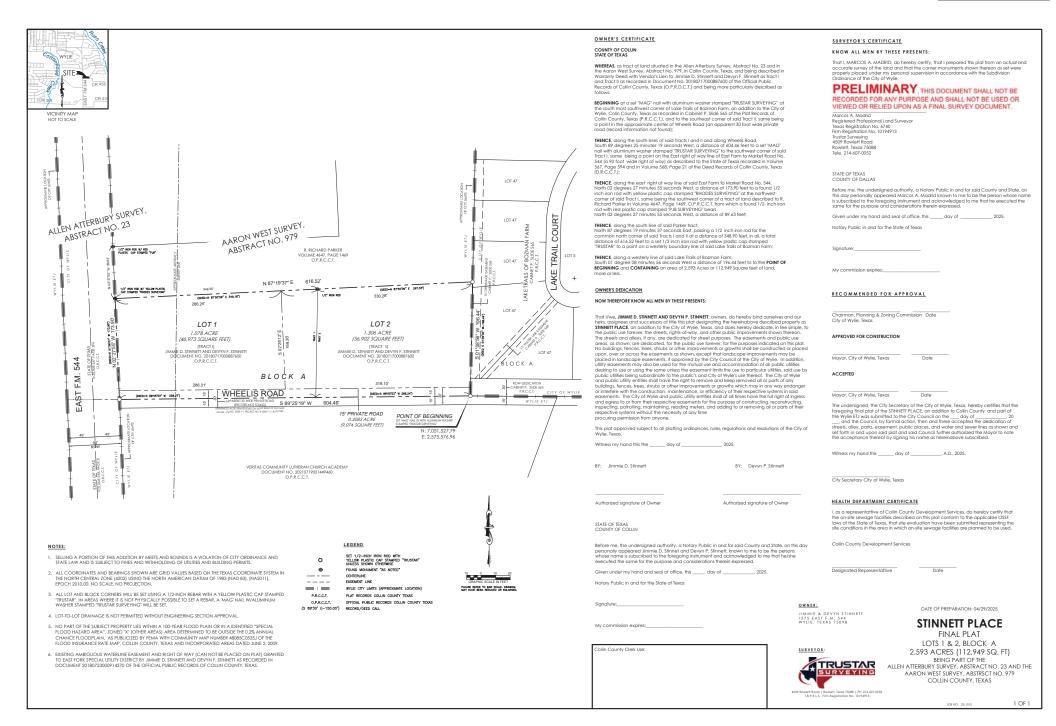

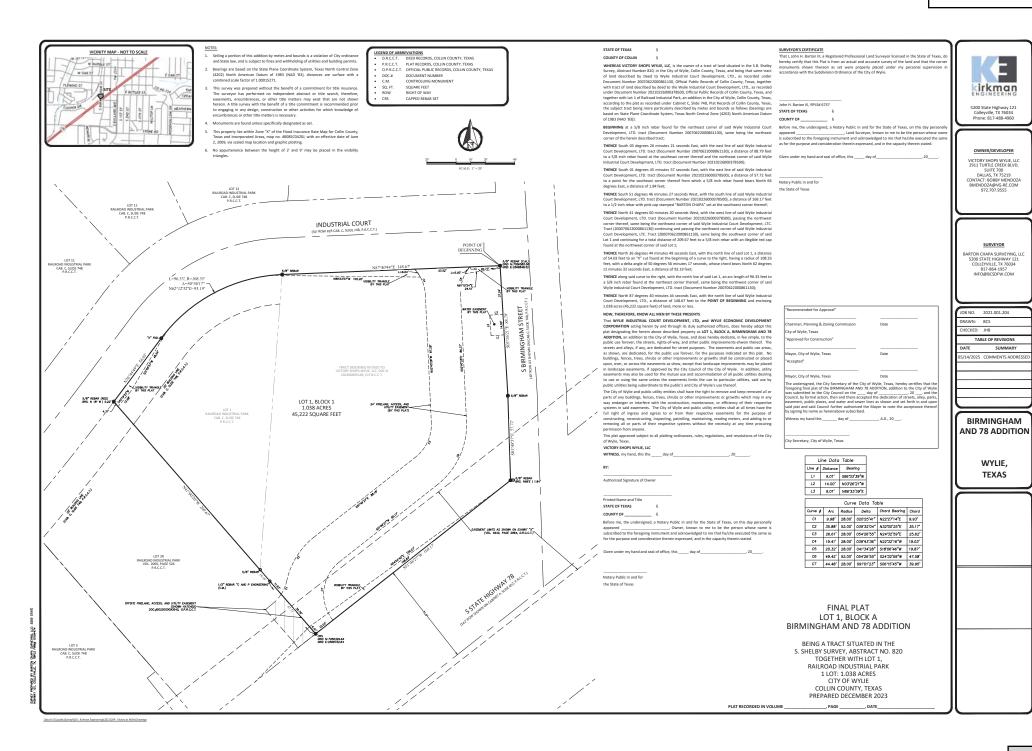

Recommendation

Wylie Fire Rescue (WFR") is requesting City Council approval to partner with the Center for Public Safety Management for Strategic Planning Services consulting to create a Fire and EMS Master Plan.

The International City/County Management Association ("ICMA") Center for Public Safety Management ("CPSM") was launched by ICMA to provide support to local governments in the areas of law enforcement, fire, Emergency Medical Services (EMS), emergency management, and 911-Communication Centers. CPSM and their experienced team of subject matter experts serve as the exclusive provider for public safety technical assistance for ICMA, creating an extensive record for academic research, teaching, and training programs.

The Master Plan will encompass both a baseline gap assessment and a "road map" to develop and achieve a planned response to specific factors to align with WFR's mission and service deliverables. The Master Plan will identify baseline capabilities, real or potential constraints, and deliver a set of goals and requirements to achieve identified objectives and desired outcomes.

CPSM will work directly with the City to gather the necessary data to analysis and develop performance goals and objectives, and compliance methodology relative to department response capabilities when benchmarked against the community risk assessments and standards of cover components.

The overall methodology will place a strong emphasis on understanding and meeting the needs of WFR. This includes WFR personnel and external customers in order to align the City's strategies and actions with the expectations and preferences of its first responders and the public at large.

Discussion

The Wylie Police Department is applying for a grant through the Motor Vehicle Crime Prevention Authority with funds established by SB224 aimed at reducing crimes involving motor vehicle theft, catalytic converter theft, and burglaries. It is an 80/20 matching grant that authorizes the City to purchase equipment and fund community outreach to help reduce or investigate motor vehicle crimes. The police department is requesting \$373,960 from the grant, which leave a match amount of \$62,326. Some of these funds will go towards items that are in our base budget and those funds will then go toward the match amount. The other funds will go towards expansion of current initiatives as well as some new projects to include real time crime software and drone as a first responder program, which will all be integrated with our current 911 system.

Discussion

OWNER: Nirmal Investments LLC

The applicant is requesting a Special Use Permit (SUP) on 1.47 acres to allow for the expansion of a hookah lounge use located at 2771 W. FM 544. The current zoning is Commercial Corridor and the existing hookah lounge is legally non-conforming due to the business being in operation prior to the Smoking Establishment use category being created in the Zoning Ordinance as of June 2023.

Per section 9.5 of the Zoning Ordinance expansion of a legally non-conforming use requires the business be brought into conformity, thus the request for the Special Use Permit for a Smoking Establishment. The request is to expand the floor area of the existing 1,800 sq. ft. by 900 sq. ft. for a total of 2,700 sq. ft.

The SUP conditions allow for the Hookah House and Lounge as a Smoking Establishment use. Additionally, all on-site smoking shall be conducted inside the establishment and the establishment is limited to the selling of hookah products only and is prohibited from selling or allowing the use of any other style of smoking or vaping products.

The current layout contains a lounge area for hookah smoking and eating. The request for the expansion is being made for additional space that will be available for the delivery of online food orders.

The property to the north is developed with a railroad track adjacent to a single family detached residential subdivision. The property to the east is developed with retail and personal service uses. The property to the south is zoned Agricultural and developed with a single family home. The property to the west is undeveloped.

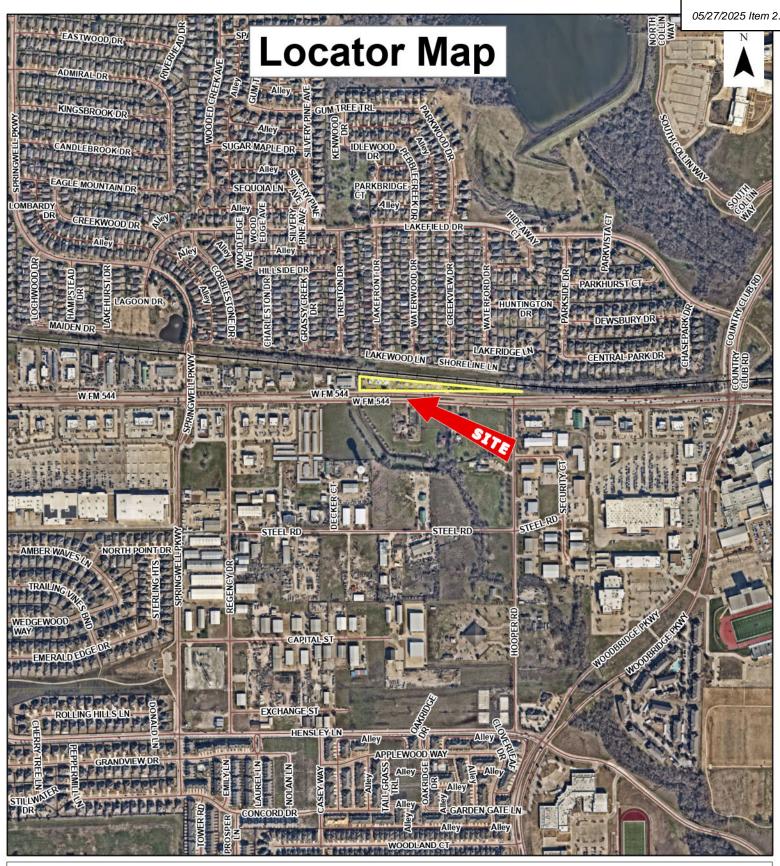
The subject property lies within the Regional Commercial sector of the Comprehensive Land Use Plan. Development within this sector's main purpose is to provide areas to allow for a broad range of commercial, retail, and office uses oriented toward major roadways. Heavy commercial or light industrial uses may be appropriate depending on compatibility with surrounding areas.

Notices were sent to twenty-seven property owners within 200 feet as required by state law. At the time of posting, one response was received in opposition and none in favor of the request.

If zoning is approved, a permit for the expansion shall be required prior to the space being allowed to be occupied by the business. Should the SUP be denied, the use will be able to continue in its current location and form.

P&Z Recommendation

After some discussion on the ventilation required (which the current use already has in place), the nature and disposition of the current business, and the types of hookah products the SUP limits the use of, the Commissioners voted 6-0 to recommend approval.

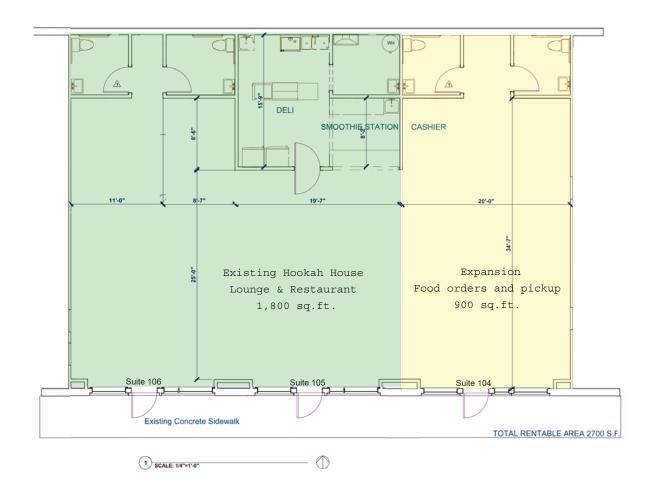

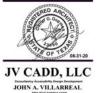

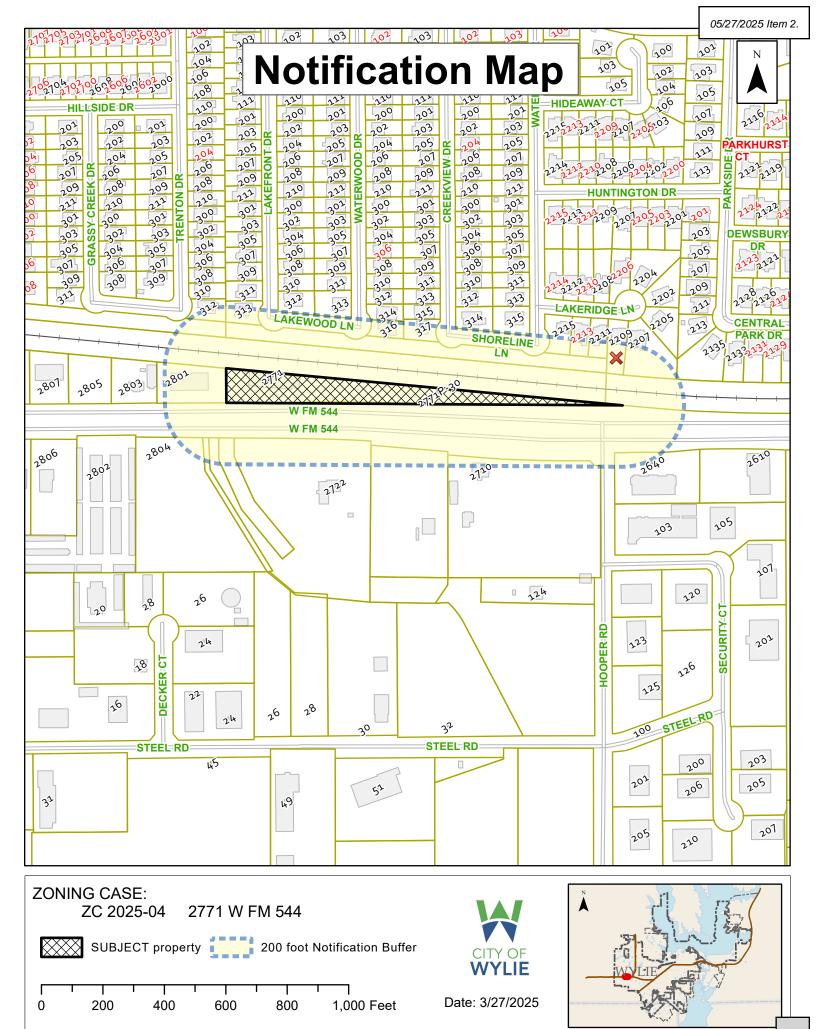

Discussion

OWNER: Wylie Economic Development Corporation

The applicant is requesting a Special Use Permit (SUP) for a drone delivery service from Flytrex on 0.47 acres located at 709 Cooper Drive. A Special Use Permit is required as the proposed use is unlisted and undefined within the Listed Uses of the Zoning Ordinance found in Section 5.2. The SUP allows for conditions to be established for the proposed use as allowed by Section 5.6 of the Zoning Ordinance.

The Flytrex business model has drones fly to local partnered commercial shops and restaurants for the delivery of items of less than 6.6 lbs within a 5-mile roundtrip area.

The drone delivery service shall be required to maintain a Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) Part 135 certification to operate in accordance with Title 14 of the Code of Federal Regulations. The drone operations are approved and overseen by the FAA with the FAA maintaining sole enforcement duties. The drone service provider, Flytrex, has obtained and maintains all necessary approvals to operate in the greater Dallas-Fort Worth Area.

The SUP conditions allow for the use of a 115' X 50' ornamental metal fence perimeter for drone docking at a height of six feet. Two gates for access are proposed along the perimeter fencing. Within the perimeter 14' launch pads are proposed and an 18'X 16' shed for storage and operations. The entire site will be powered by the electric grid and not require the use of a generator. Hours of operation shall be between 8:00 a.m. and 9:30 p.m.

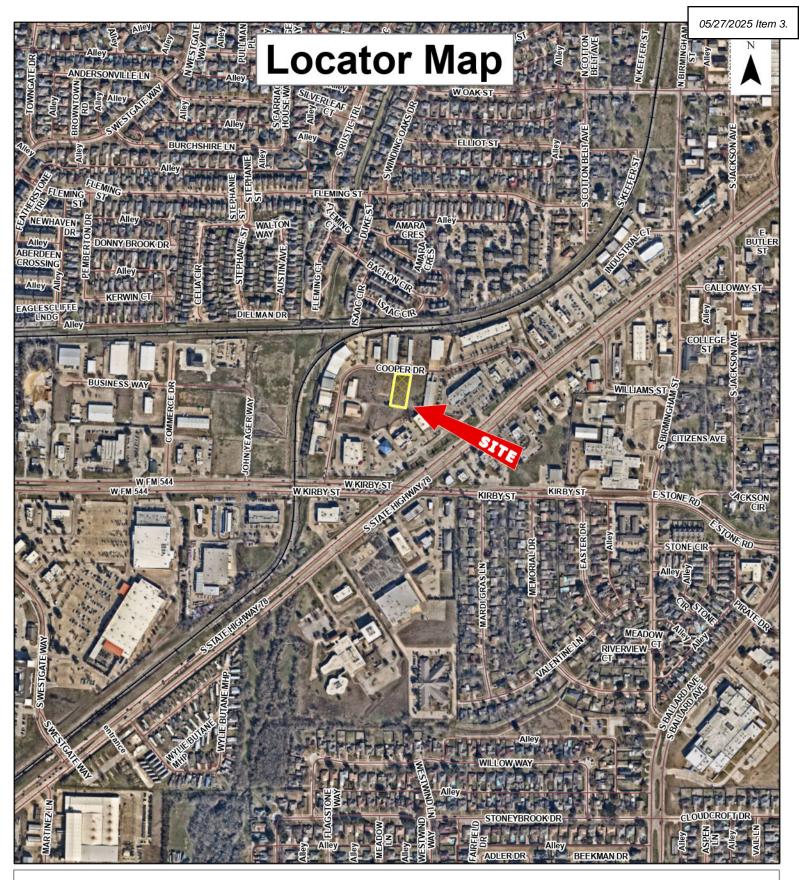
If approved, the zoning exhibit shall serve as the site plan for the drone delivery development.

The property to the east, west, and south is undeveloped and owned by the Wylie Economic Development Corporation. The property to the north is zoned Commercial Corridor and developed with a storage building with an outside storage area.

The subject property lies within the Regional Commercial sector of the Comprehensive Land Use Plan. Development within this sector's main purpose is to provide areas to allow for a broad range of commercial, retail, and office uses oriented toward major roadways. Heavy commercial or light industrial uses may be appropriate depending on compatibility with surrounding areas.

Notices were sent to seventeen property owners within 200 feet as required by state law. At the time of posting, one response was received in favor and none in opposition of the request.

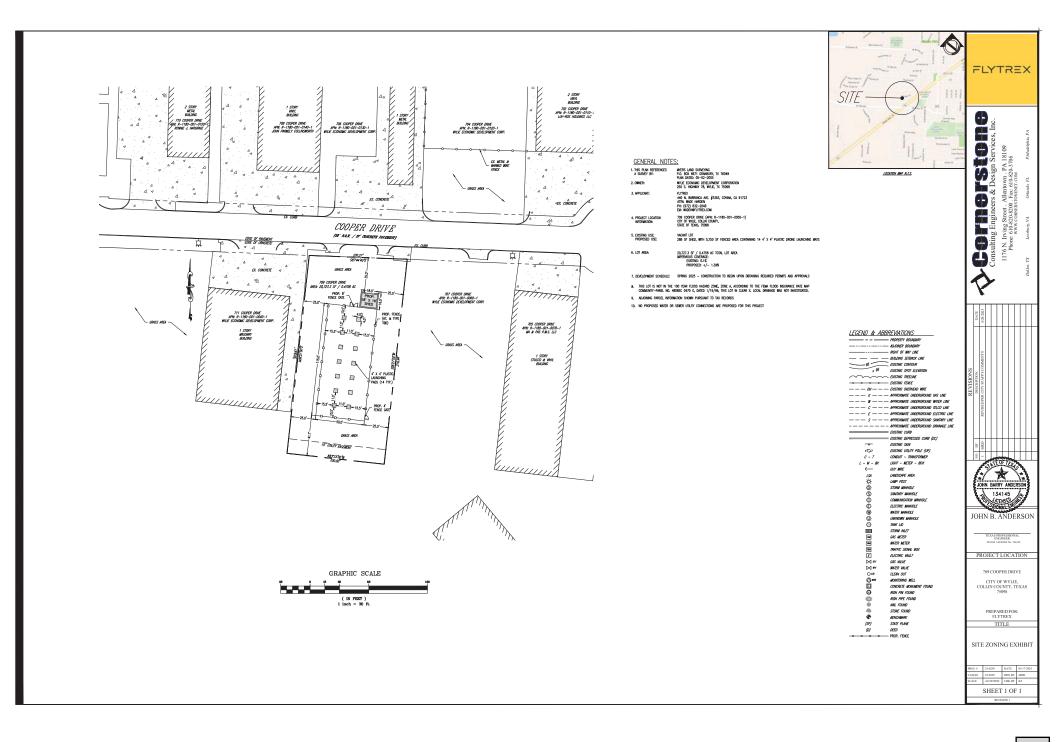

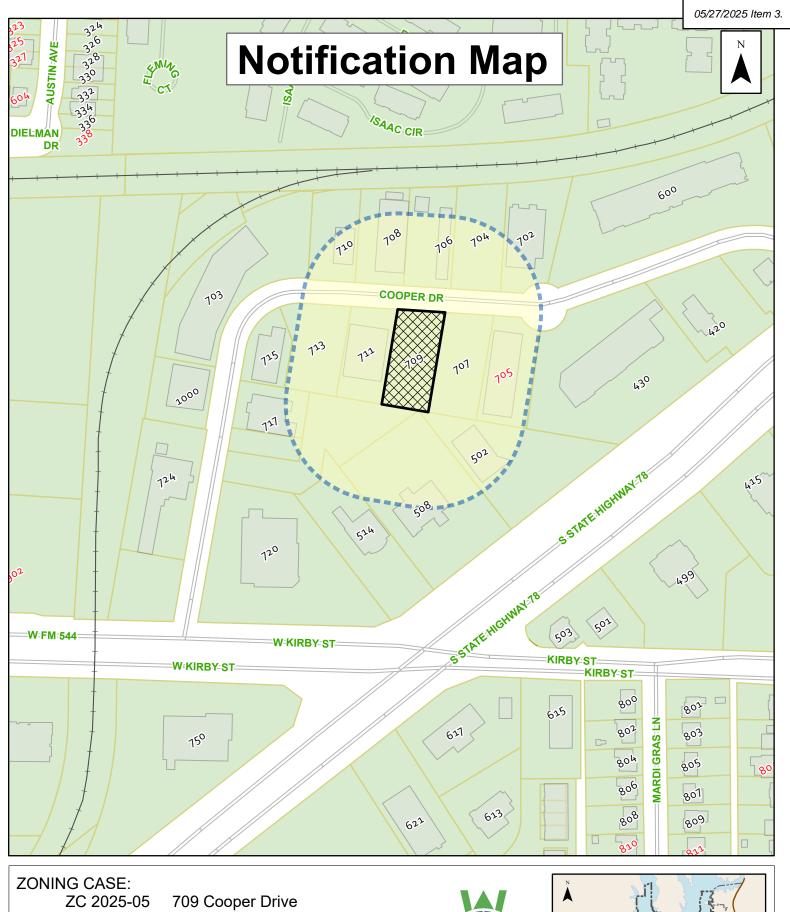

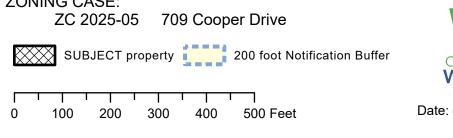

- This Special Use Permit shall not affect any regulations of the Commercial Corridor District (CC) set forth in Article 4 and 5 of the Comprehensive Zoning Ordinance (adopted as of June 2023), except as specifically provided herein.
- 2. The design and development of the drone delivery development shall be in accordance with Section III below and the Zoning Exhibit (Exhibit B).

III. SPECIAL CONDITIONS:

- 1. The development will have an approximately 115' X 50' area (as depicted on Exhibit B) with 4' X 4' plastic launch pads screened by an ornamental metal fence at a minimum of 6' in height.
- 2. A maximum of 14 drones shall be allowed to be operating from the site.
- 3. A maximum 18' X 16' storage shed shall be allowed on site.
- 4. Hours of operation shall be limited to between 8:00am and 9:30pm
- 5. All aircraft "drones" utilized shall be approved by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) for commercial delivery.
- 6. The Zoning Exhibit (Exhibit B) shall serve as the Site Plan for the Drone Delivery development. Approval of the Special Use Permit shall act as site plan approval.
- Should the proposed use cease operations for more than 180 days, the SUP shall expire and the zoning shall revert to the base Commercial Corridor zoning.

Consider, and act upon, the award of bid #W2025-87-2 for Stone Road Maintenance Activities from W.A. Allen to Bennett Road to Texas Materials Group in the total amount of \$6,809,012 and authorizing the City Manager to execute any and all necessary documents.

Recommendation

Motion to approve the Item as presented.

Discussion

The Stone Road Maintenance Activities from W.A. Allen to Bennett Road includes improvements to approximately 29,973 square yards of Type D and Type B HMAC pavement. This City and Collin Country funded project will reconstruct Stone Road in the same alignment as existing but with a stronger subgrade to prevent future roadway failures. The scope also includes limited drainage improvements that includes the installation of 1,282 linear feet of ADS HP/Class III RCP storm sewer pipe with TxDOT-standard headwalls and riprap. Additionally, the project will incorporate 8,202 square yards of straw matting with tank dam seed for erosion control and vegetation restoration.

The City has received multiple complaints from residents regarding the deteriorating condition of Stone Road in this area. Over the years, only limited repairs have been made by both the City and Collin County due to underlying subgrade issues related to water retention. The continued degradation of the roadway has also been exacerbated by increased traffic volumes and the use of detour routes by drivers seeking to avoid congestion. In response, the City entered into an Interlocal Agreement (ILA) with Collin County in 2024 to jointly fund roadway improvements. Under this agreement, Collin County will contribute 27% approximately \$1,838,433 of the total construction costs. The remaining \$4,970,579 (73%) will be funded through the City.

The City conducted a competitive sealed bid process in accordance with procurement requirements. Four (4) bids were received, with the apparent low bidder being Texas Materials Group. The bid and contractor references were reviewed and evaluated by the engineering firm of record, Kimley-Horn and Associates. Based on their review, Kimley-Horn recommends awarding the contract to Texas Materials Group as the lowest responsive and responsible bidder.

Staff recommends awarding contract #W2025-87-2 for Stone Road Maintenance Activities from W.A. Allen to Bennett to Texas Materials Group in the total amount of \$6,809,012. This total includes the base bid of \$5,743,769. The base bid portion of the project also includes improvements that benefit 32 of the 60 lot owners along the corridor, for which written approvals have been obtained. Bid Alternate 4 for \$490,866, and a 10% contingency of \$574,377 for potential change orders, as outlined in Texas Local Government Code 252.048. Bid Alternate 4 include possible improvements (same as for the base bid) for the other 28 property owners during the construction phase. The contingency amount is based solely on the base bid. Texas Materials Group is the lowest responsive and responsible bidder.
