Mayor Shealy announced the resignation of Councilmember Joe Wisniewski from seat #1. A motion was moved by Council Member Homola to excuse the absence of Council Member Carroll and was seconded by Council Member Viray and passed unanimously.

Citizen Communication

Jim Malinowski spoke about the Railroad having been in Yacolt since 1903. He would like to see Council support enhancing the railroad because the railroad has and can continue to contribute to the Town's economic development.

Casey Ellison left two letters for the Town Council at Town Hall to be read at the meeting. The letters stated that he observed people with ATVs and motor bikes around town and kids smoking at the Town park. He thanked the council for letting him help with town events and offered additional help, including asking if he could be the DJ for Rendezvous Days.

Unfinished Business

2. Rough Draft RFP for Security Cameras – Council member Homola asked about audio recording.

Attorney Ridenour spoke about specifications, and said there is more legal work needing to be done; he suggested the Town seek an independent security consultant and suggested a committee of council or staff meet with a consultant (not one of the bidders, must follow proper procurement process for legal compliance. He also suggested contacting a legal firm who specializes in procurement & RFPs, especially for security. Council members Homola and Peto volunteered for the committee. Peto will try to get consultant and schedule meeting before next council meeting. Also, Attorney Ridenour will get info on other law firms to staff to help create RFPs for this and future.

- 3. Rec Park Out Gate Options Public Works Director Gardner suggested a regular swing gate on a timer for the in-gate, and traffic-teeth for the out-gate. Estimated \$4-\$5k to put in electricity; the lines will need to be installed using underground boring equipment. Deputy Harris said traffic teeth work best. Council agreed. Gardner estimated the whole project to cost around \$10k. Attorney Ridenour explained why the purchasing process is in place, to make sure comparisons are accurate, although this project would be small enough not to trigger an RFP or strict procurement rules. However we must have records showing bids, who bid, who was called, what items and labor cost, what the prices were and the best price.
- **4. Elevator Maintenance Plans** Clerk Fields explained the need for a plan, Homola prefers shorter term plans, Gardner prefers Centric, Attorney Ridenour stated it will be a procurement; must get minimal competitive bids and the bidders must meet bid criteria requirements. Motion was made to cancel our current contract with Schindler Elevator.

5. Pole Building Prices – Clerk Fields showed prices she quickly found online for pole buildings at the request of Council members at the April meeting. Costs ranged from \$150-200k for building only. Council member Peto suggested 40 feet by 120 feet or larger. Gardner mentioned that the existing concrete pad on the Witt property is approximately 100 feet long.

New Business

6. Council Meeting Procedures and Requirements – Attorney Ridenour confirmed that the records of Yacolt's meetings exceed minimum requirements. He reminded council members they oversee meetings and citizens' role is observation at meetings, to ensure transparency. Council meetings are for council business. Council member Homola likes having a timer – it keeps citizen communication times fair. Attorney Ridenour reminded council members about maintaining decorum. Mayor Shealy likes citizens to be able to speak, but there is a fine line regulating allowing comments and keeping control of a meeting. There was more discussion about maintaining two separate citizen communication times per meeting. Attorney Ridenour advised that citizen comments should not be limited to items *not* on the agenda. Audience. Motion was made to remove the first sentence under Citizen Communication, but to keep both Citizen Communication times on future agendas.

- 7. Six Year Transportation Improvement Plan Hearing for 2025-2030 Mayor Shealy closed the regular meeting and opened the Public Hearing at 8:20 pm. After he outlined hearing procedures, Ann Van Antwerp asked if the Hubbard Ave. Improvement will require acquisition of more property because she is concerned about septic drain fields close to the road. She was assured road improvements would not come too close to people's drain fields. Gardner said he supports the Plan as drafted. Seeing no more discussion, Shealy closed the Hearing and reconvened the regular meeting. Ridenour advised Council members to review the Exhibits, drive around Town, and get their suggestions to the Clerk asap so that any revisions to the Plan can be made and a Resolution adopting the Plan can be passed at the June 10th Council meeting.
- **8.** Complete Streets Ordinance Council member Homola asked if passing this Ordinance would obligate the Town to spend more money on projects we have not planned for yet. Attorney Ridenour answered no, and noted exceptions under YMC 12.15.040. Motion was made to pass Complete Streets Ordinance 598.

9. Donation Requests – Town cannot donate to private citizens or companies. A suggestion was made that the Town promote private donations by doing things such as putting links on the Town's website to the donation button on the Why Racing Events website for the Bigfoot Run or to a link to help cover the cost of the fireworks show being put on by private citizens. We can however, do something like paying for Porta-Potties, which would benefit all of our citizens. Motion was made to donate \$0 for Fireworks and Bigfoot Walk/Run, Hellz Bellz Marathon, but provide Porta Potties.

Summary/ Background: RCW 35.77 requires that all cities and towns create perpetual six-year

plans for proposed transportation improvements. Yacolt is required to update its six-year plan annually before July 1 of each year. Yacolt's proposed new plan was developed by the Town Engineer, the Public Works Director and the Town Clerk with review by the Mayor and Town

Council.

A public hearing on the proposed plan was held during the Council's May 13, 2024 meeting. The legal and procedural requirements for the plan were summarized in the Council's packet for that meeting which is available on the Town's website. Copies of the proposed plan were distributed to members of the public in attendance during the meeting.

The Council generally approved the elements of the plan, but wanted to review road conditions for themselves so that final adjustments to the plan could be suggested before the June 10 Council meeting. Staff received no suggestions for changes.

One addition was suggested by the Town Engineer and has been added incorporated in the plan. That change adds "General Maintenance" on page 1 as a priority project for 2025. The addition was prompted by conversations between the Town Engineer and the regional director for the Transportation Improvement Board about funding opportunities for maintenance work that would extend the useful life of the Town's streets, and reduce the need for more costly repairs and replacements.

Yacolt's final plan must be adopted and filed with the Secretary of Transportation within 30 days of its adoption, and in any event, no later than July 1.

Resolution #626

A RESOLUTION OF THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF YACOLT, WASHINGTON, ADOPTING THE TOWN'S REVISED COMPREHENSIVE SIXYEAR TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PLAN FOR 2025-2030, AND REPEALING ALL CONFLICTING ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS

Whereas, the Town of Yacolt, (hereafter "*Town*" or "*Yacolt*"), is required by RCW 35.77 to review and revise annually its Six-Year Transportation Improvement Plan, consisting of street-related improvement projects in priority order, proposed to be completed within the next six years;

Whereas, the purpose of the revised and extended plan is to ensure that the Town will have plans available in advance for use as a guide in carrying out a coordinated street construction program, and as a program and schedule for the financing of anticipated public improvements;

Whereas, notice of the time and place for a public hearing on the revised and extended plan was published in the Town's official newspaper on May 1, 2024, with said public hearing being scheduled for May 13, 2024, during a regular public meeting of the Town Council;

Whereas, the scheduled public hearing was held on May 13, 2024, at which the Council accepted testimony from the general public on the revised and extended plan, and discussion was had as to the improvements of various streets and related transportation facilities within the Town, together with the specific priority of each project, as required by RCW 35.77.010;

Whereas, the revised and extended plan provides a logical and necessary means to implement in a coordinated and financially feasible manner elements of the Town's Comprehensive Plan; to coordinate the Town's plans with other government agencies; and to qualify the Town for various tax and grant funding opportunities;

Whereas, the Town Council makes the following findings with respect to the revised and extended plan:

- 1). The revised and extended plan is consistent with Yacolt's Growth Management Plan;
- 2). The revised and extended plan addresses pedestrian and bicycle facilities adequately;
- 3). The cost of providing significant bicycle routes would be excessively disproportionate to the need or probable use of such facilities at this time versus the need for street maintenance and construction;
- 4). The revised and extended plan is exempt from the expenditure requirements for non-motorized traffic facilities described in RCW 47.30.050 pursuant to the terms of that statute; and,
- 5). The revised and extended plan described in this Resolution is in the best interest of the public and the residents of the Town of Yacolt;

Whereas, the Town has satisfied applicable public hearing and notice requirements prior to adoption of this Resolution:

Whereas, the Yacolt Town Council desires to adopt the revised and extended plan attached to this Resolution as Exhibit A; and,

Whereas, the Town Council of the Town of Yacolt is in regular session this 10th day of June, 2024, and all members of the Town Council have had notice of the time, place, and purpose of said meeting:

NOW THEREFORE, be it Resolved by the Town Council of the Town of Yacolt, Washington, as follows:

<u>Section 1 - Adoption of Plan</u>. The Town of Yacolt's Comprehensive Six-Year Transportation Improvement Plan for 2025-2030, attached hereto as Exhibit "A", is hereby adopted as the current transportation improvement plan for the Town of Yacolt.

Projects and timeframes identified in the Six-Year Transportation Improvement Program are estimates only, and may change due to a variety of circumstances. The projects and timeframes are not intended by the Town to be relied upon by property owners or developers in making development decisions.

In the event a railroad ceases to use any railroad right-of-way within the Town, the Town will utilize all reasonable options available under state or federal law to preserve the right-of-way for future rail purposes pursuant to RCW 35.77.010(3).

<u>Section 2 - Instructions to the Clerk.</u> The Town Clerk shall:

- a). Transmit a copy of this Resolution, (with the attached revised and extended Comprehensive Six-Year Transportation Improvement Plan for 2025-2030), to the Secretary of Transportation for the Washington State Department of Transportation. The Town Clerk is directed to file these documents with the Washington State Department of Transportation within thirty (30) days of the adoption of this Resolution, or by July 1, 2024, whichever date is earliest;
- b). Cause notice of the adoption of this Resolution to be published forthwith in the Town's official newspaper pursuant to Section 6 below;
- c). Promptly forward copies of this Resolution to the Washington Transportation Improvement Board, (TIB), the appropriate department of the Public Services Department of Clark County, Washington, and such other offices as may be required; and,
- d). Promptly post a copy of this Resolution on the Town's website for public inspection.

<u>Section 3 - Repealer</u>. All ordinances, resolutions, and/or parts of ordinances and resolutions of the Town of Yacolt in conflict herewith, are hereby repealed.

<u>Section 4 - Severability</u>. If any section, sentence, clause or phrase of this Resolution shall be held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, such invalidity or unconstitutionality shall not affect the validity or constitutionality of any other section, sentence, clause or phrase of this Resolution.

<u>Section 5 - Adoption of Recitals</u>. The foregoing Recitals are hereby ratified and confirmed as being true and correct and are hereby made a part of this Resolution upon adoption hereof.

<u>Section 6 - Effective Date</u>. This Resolution shall be effective upon passage, approval and signatures hereon in accordance with law. The Town Clerk may publish the following summary of this Resolution:

Item Title: Resolution 627 Opposing Commercial Use of the Railroad in Yacolt

Proposed Meeting Date: June 10, 2024

Action Requested of Council: Consider Adopting Resolution 627, which opposes commercial development and use of the Railroad through Yacolt; discuss pros and cons; decide if you want to table the issue again or not.

Proposed Motion: "I move that the Town adopts (or rejects, or tables) Resolution 627, opposing commercial development and use of the railroad in Yacolt."

Summary/ Background: Plans have been proposed to reinforce and then use the railroad for commercial use, to haul large loads of rock from Chelatchie through Battle Ground and further south. This would bring long, heavy trains right down the middle of Yacolt multiple times a day. Many citizens and entire communities have expressed opposition to this use of the railroad for various reasons. Other citizens have recommended support of the railway improvements and commercial use of the railroad as a potential economic boost. This Resolution would express the Town of Yacolt's wish to oppose commercial use of the railroad through our little Town. The Resolution was brought before Council for discussion at our April 8th Council meeting, and the Council members decided to table the issue until this meeting, to allow them time to gather more information before making their decision.

Resolution #627

A RESOLUTION OF THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF YACOLT IN OPPOSITION TO THE PROPOSED AND FUTURE EXPANSION OF THE FREIGHT RAIL DEPENDENT USE (FRDU) AFFECTING THE TOWN OF YACOLT AND ADJACENT COUNTY LANDS

Whereas, the Freight Rail Dependent Use (FRDU) is slated to be expanded to include heavy industrial use and zoning within the Town and surrounding area;

Whereas, train traffic adjacent to residential neighborhoods will likely decrease property values and curb appeal;

Whereas, all of the crossings within Yacolt are located in neighborhood commercial and residential neighborhoods and will require an audible horn lasting at least 15 seconds, decreasing the livability and small town feel of our community;

Whereas, large sums of government funding will be required to upgrade these crossings and provide maintenance which could be better used for other public needs;

Whereas, train traffic will likely increase potential delays in emergency vehicle response, adversely affecting our medically fragile population;

Whereas, all of the railroad crossings in Yacolt are at grade and non-signalized. They are located within high traffic intersections and neighborhoods used frequently by pedestrians, and will create safety hazards and traffic delays;

Whereas, the Town of Yacolt has no current or proposed customers for the railroad and would receive no positive economic gain from the industrial use of the railway;

Whereas, the industrial use of the railway has the potential to limit or eliminate the existing railroad tourist attractions which run most of the year;

Whereas, a commercial railroad would adversely affect and create a public safety concern during Yacolt's community events which tend to center around the railroad area; and

Whereas, the Town Council is in regular session this 10th day of June, 2024, and all members of the Town Council have had notice of the time, place, and purpose of said meeting:

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Town Council of the Town of Yacolt as follows:

<u>Section 1</u>: Any reactivation of the Chelatchie Prairie Railroad within the Yacolt Town limits would adversely affect Yacolt's economic health and livability.

<u>Section 2</u>: The Yacolt Town Council strongly urges the immediate cessation of the proposed and future expansion of the Freight Rail Dependent Use (FRDU).

<u>Section 3</u>: The Town Clerk of the Town of Yacolt is hereby directed to forward copies of this Resolution to the Clark County Council, all cities within Clark County, legislators of the 17th, 18th, 20th,

and 49th districts, the Washington State Department of Commerce, and the Governor of the State of Washington.
